PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the 29th day of July, 1920, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property in the Parish of Sturry in the County of Kent now vested in us:

“ Whereas under and by virtue of two indentures particulars whereof are set forth in the schedule hereunder written the lands tithe rent charges tenements and hereditaments

situate in the Parish of Sturry aforesaid, and particularly described in the same indentures and schedule became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us:

“ And whereas none of the said lands tithe rent charges tenements and hereditaments is subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but the same are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed:

“ And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our Common Fund it is expedient that the said lands tithe rent charges tenements and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands tithe rent charges tenements and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands tithe rent charges tenements and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, under and by virtue of the said indentures or either of them, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry

appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements, or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purpose of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in Law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been

duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Canterbury.

We the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College in the University of Cambridge in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria Chapter 48) did at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose held on the 3rd day of August 1920 by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the persons present and voting make the Statutes hereunto annexed for the said College such Statutes to be in substitution for the existing Statutes of the said College; and we do on the date hereunder mentioned seal the Statutes hereunto annexed for Corpus Christi College in the University of Cambridge and do hereby declare them to be Statutes wholly for the said College within the meaning of Section 30 of the said Act.

STATUTES.

FOR CORPUS CHRISTI COLLEGE IN THE UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE.

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PRÆFATIO DOMINI FUNDATORIS.

Ad perpetuam rei memoriam. Cum nos, Henricus Dux Lancastriæ Aldermannus et Confratres Gildæ Corporis Christi et Beatæ Mariæ in Canteburgia, ob specialem devotionem et recordationem quam habemus in institutione divinissimi Sacramenti Corporis et Sanguinis Domini, ab Excellentissimo Principe Edwardo, Dei gratia Angliæ et Franciæ Rege, licentiam impetravimus, quod in quodam messuagio nostro cum petinentiis in Canteburgia prædicta Eliensis Dioceseos, ubi vigere dinoscitur studium generale, quamdam Domum sive Collegium Sociorum, Scholarium, et aliorum, sub nomine Domus sive Collegii Corporis Christi et Beatæ Mariæ per quendam Magistrum ejusdem Domus regendam, juxta ordinationem nostram infra scriptam, instituere et fundare possimus;—Nos igitur Aldermannus et Confratres antedicti, cum consilio proborum et doctorum virorum de provida et pia gubernatione dictæ Domus, cupientes recte et salubriter ad Dei gloriam et divini cultus augmentum providere, sic statuendum et ordinandum duximus.

We, the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College in the University of Cambridge in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria Chapter 48) do hereby make the following Statutes for Corpus Christi College in the University of Cambridge and do declare them to be Statutes wholly for the said College within the meaning of Section 30 of the said Act.

1. The Visitor.

The Visitor of the College shall be the Chancellor of the University for the time being.

2. The Foundation.

The House shall consist of a Master or Keeper, twelve Fellows (subject to the provisions in these statutes for the increase or diminution of the number of Fellows), the

Bible Clerks and six Scholars on the Old Foundation.

The number of Fellows, Bible Clerks and Scholars may be increased or decreased by the Master and Fellows at their discretion, as the interest of the College and the state of its revenues may seem to require.

3. *The Master.*

The Fellows shall choose as Master the person in their judgment best qualified to preside over the College as a place of education, religion, learning, and research.

4. *Election of the Master.*

When the office of Master becomes vacant, the senior Fellow resident in Cambridge shall, within three days after the vacancy is made known to him, call together all the resident Fellows, who shall then choose one of their number to preside over meetings of the Fellows during the vacancy in the Mastership. If the senior Fellow resident in Cambridge fails to call together the resident Fellows, the Fellow next senior to him, then resident in Cambridge, shall call them together. The Fellows shall at the said meeting appoint a day and hour for the election of a Master, not less than fourteen days nor more than thirty days after such meeting. The presiding Fellow shall without delay send notice of the day and hour appointed to all the absent Fellows.

At least a majority of the Fellows then existing shall be present at the election.

At the time appointed for the election, the grace of the Holy Spirit being first invoked by the Dean of Chapel, or, in his absence, by some other Fellow, the presiding Fellow and the senior Fellow present, or, if the presiding Fellow be the senior Fellow present, the Fellow next in seniority shall first write their own votes and then receive the votes in writing of the other Fellows. The person for whom a majority of the Fellows present, or half the Fellows present, including the presiding Fellow, have voted shall be declared to be elected.

If at the first meeting there shall be no election, then the meeting shall stand adjourned to some other time to be fixed by the meeting, and so from time to time, provided that if at the end of sixty days from the occurrence of the vacancy no person be elected, the appointment of a Master for that turn shall be made by the Visitor from among the persons for whom any vote has been given.

No election of a Master shall be invalid by reason only of the meeting at which such decision was made not having been convened by the right person, or any other inadvertent irregularity in the convening of the meeting.

In the event of any irregularity in the election, the Visitor shall have power to order a fresh election, if he think fit, on the appeal of not less than three Fellows present at the election.

5. *Admission of the Master.*

The Master elected or appointed shall make the following declaration in the presence of the Fellows:—

Profiteor quod officium Magistri sive Custodis pro tempore gubernationis meae fideliter praestabo. Statuta, Ordinationes et Consuetudines laudabiles huius Collegii, quantum in me est, salva observabo, eademque Statuta diligenter et fideliter exequar, et ab aliis,

quantum in me est, observari procurabo. Bona et possessiones dicti Collegii fideliter custodiam, custodiri que faciam. Ita do fidem.

After which declaration made, the presiding Fellow shall admit him with the following form of words:

Auctoritate mihi commissa admitto te Magistrum sive Custodem huius Collegii in nomine Patris et Filii et Spiritus Sancti. Amen.

6. *Duties of the Master.*

The Master shall preside over and govern the Fellows and all other Members of the College, and see that they severally perform their duties.

He shall in person, or by deputy, together with the Bursar, visit the College lands in every third year, and provide that they be kept in due repair and order.

He shall take care that all leases and other deeds under the seal relating to the College property be copied into a register provided for the purpose.

He shall on his election, and from time to time as necessity shall arise, appoint by writing under his hand one of the Fellows to act as his deputy in case of his absence or temporary inability to act; in the event of the absence or incapacity of both the Master and his deputy the Fellows shall appoint one of their number temporarily to perform the duties.

In the event of the absence of the Master at any time or for any cause, his deputy, whether nominated by him or by the Fellows as provided for by this Statute, shall be empowered to perform all the duties of the Master under these Statutes.

7. *Residence of the Master.*

The Master shall reside in College during two-thirds at least of each term, and altogether during two hundred and ten days at least in each year, unless he shall be absent on the business of the College, or on account of illness or other good reason, such absence to be approved by the majority of the Fellows.

8. *Stipend and Emoluments of the Master.*

The Master shall have the use of the house, with garden, stable and outbuildings, assigned for the purpose in the College.

He shall receive, in lieu of the Rectory of Abchurch in London, formerly attached to the Mastership, and other allowances except commons, an annual sum of five hundred pounds (£500). He shall also receive the accustomed payment from Dr. Spencer's Estate, and the payment provided for by the will of Bishop Mawson.

9. *Removal or Resignation of the Master.*

If the Master shall have been convicted by a Court of competent jurisdiction of any crime, the Visitor shall proceed to inquire into the fact of such conviction, and, if it be established, shall deprive the Master of his office.

If any five or more of the Fellows shall prefer to the Visitor a charge against the Master of disgraceful conduct, or of malversation in his office, or of gross neglect of duty, whereby he has in their judgment become unfit to preside over the College, the Visitor shall, with all convenient speed, proceed to inquire into the facts of the case, and, if the charge be established, shall deprive the Master of his office.

If the Master shall at any time become incapable of performing the duties of his office, the Visitor, on being satisfied thereof, after an inquiry held by him on the application of three or more of the Fellows, may either deprive the Master of his office or appoint one of the Fellows to act in the Master's place during his incapacity, and may assign to the person so appointed such portion as the Visitor shall think fit, not exceeding one-third, of the income assigned to the Mastership.

The Master may at any time by notice in writing under his hand resign his office as Master.

10. *Pension of the Master.*

In the event of the Master resigning through ill-health or age, or being removed for incapacity, he shall receive as an annual pension a sum to be fixed by the Visitor, not exceeding £500 per annum, payable out of the pension funds or the general income of the College, provided that the Visitor be satisfied that the grounds for the Master's resignation are adequate; in fixing the amount of the annual pension the Visitor shall have regard to the financial position of the College as well as to the circumstances of the Master.

The Master shall not, however, be eligible to receive a pension unless he shall have held the office of Master for ten years, or unless he shall have held one or more of the offices mentioned in Statute 18 and the office of Master for a period of fifteen years, continuous or otherwise.

11. *Qualification of Fellows.*

In the election of Fellows those persons shall be chosen who are, in the opinion of the electors, most fit to share in the government and work of the College as a place of education, religion, learning and research.

12. *Election and Admission of Fellows.*

The election of a Fellow shall always be made in term time, and not less than fourteen days' notice shall be sent by the Master to all the Fellows, whether resident in Cambridge or not, of the time appointed by the Master and Fellows for the election.

At the time appointed the Master and the senior Fellow present shall stand in scrutiny. They shall first write their own votes, and then receive the votes in writing of the other Fellows. The person for whom a majority of the Master and Fellows present, or half of those present, including the Master, has voted, shall be declared to be elected.

If in a first or second or third scrutiny there be no person elected, the meeting shall stand adjourned to a day to be fixed by a majority of the Master and Fellows present, such day to be not less than fourteen days nor more than twenty-one days after such meeting, and the Master shall without delay send notice of the day appointed to all the Fellows. If at this second meeting in a first or second or third scrutiny no person shall be elected, the appointment of a Fellow to the vacant Fellowship shall be made by the Master from among the persons for whom any vote has been given.

No election of a Fellow shall be made unless the Master and one-half at least of the Fellows then existing be present, but this provision may be waived with the consent of the Visitor given in writing.

The Fellow elected or appointed shall make the following declaration:

Profiteor quod observabo omnia Statuta et laudabiles Consuetudines Collegii nostri, quamdiu in eo versatus fuerim: et quod Magistro sive Custodi huius Collegii obediens ero in omnibus licitis et honestis: et quod Collegii honorem et utilitatem, quantum in me est, meo consilio et auxilio iuvabo. Ita do fidem.

After which declaration made he shall be admitted by the Master, or by one of the Fellows named by the Master, with the following words:

Auctoritate mihi commissa admitto te Socium huius Collegii in nomine Patris et Filii et Spiritus Sancti. Amen.

The Master and Fellows may, in any special case in which the interests of the College so require, make it a condition of the tenure of a Fellowship, at the time of election, that the Fellow shall, if called upon to do so within one year from the date of his election, accept any specified office in the College, and hold it for such period or periods as the Master and Fellows may from time to time require. They may also at the time of election impose such other conditions as to residence in Cambridge as in their discretion shall seem desirable. On any breach of any such conditions the Fellowship shall become vacant, unless the said breach shall be waived by the majority of the Master and Fellows.

13. *Professorial Fellowship.*

One of the Fellowships shall be deemed to be and shall be a Professorial Fellowship, and shall be held according to the terms and conditions prescribed by the Statutes of the University for Professorial Fellowships made under the powers of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877.

14. *Supernumerary Fellows.*

Any Fellow, other than the holder of the Professorial Fellowship, may signify to the Master in writing his wish to become a Supernumerary Fellow. If the Master and Fellows consent, he shall become a Supernumerary Fellow, and shall be and remain a Fellow to all intents and purposes, and hold his Fellowship for the time and in the manner provided by the Statutes, and enjoy all the benefits of the same, save and except that he shall not be entitled to any dividend.

Such Fellow, however, shall not count towards making up the minimum number of Fellows required by these Statutes, but a new Fellow shall be elected within one year after the consent given as aforesaid.

15. *Non-Resident Fellows.*

In case of an election to a Fellowship, the holder of which will not be required to reside, the College may limit the length of tenure of the Fellowship to three years, and the Fellow so elected shall receive a payment of £4 for every night kept by residence either in term time or during the Long Vacation residence, the maximum dividend receivable in this way being fixed at £100; provided that the College may, at the time of his election, or at any subsequent time, fix the dividend of a Fellow so elected, without regard to any residence kept, at £100. Not more than two Fellowships shall be held under this arrangement at the same time. The College may also, at a meeting

called for the purpose, convert such a Fellowship into an ordinary Fellowship, and in that case the tenure of the Fellowship shall be for six years, to be reckoned from the date of original election; and such Fellow shall for the remainder of his tenure receive the dividend of an ordinary Fellow.

16. *Honorary Fellows.*

The Master and Fellows may, by the votes of at least two-thirds of those present at a meeting called for the purpose by the Master and Fellows, of which not less than fourteen days' notice shall have been sent by the Master to all the Fellows, elect any person, whom they may consider it desirable so to distinguish, to be an Honorary Fellow of the College. They may by a like vote terminate the tenure of an Honorary Fellowship.

No Honorary Fellow shall have any voice or authority in the affairs of the College, or be entitled by virtue of his Honorary Fellowship to any dividend; but he shall enjoy such other privileges and advantages as the Master and Fellows may from time to time determine.

17. *Suspension and Deprivation of Fellows.*

If any Fellow shall wilfully violate or neglect to comply with any of the Statutes of the College, it shall be the duty of the Master and Fellows at a College Meeting, on proof of such misconduct, to admonish such Fellow; and if, notwithstanding such admonition, he shall contumaciously persist in such misconduct, the Master shall, if two-thirds at least of the Master and Fellows, other than the Fellow whose conduct is impugned, present at a College meeting called to consider the question, to which all the Fellows shall have been summoned, concur in such sentence, suspend such Fellow from the enjoyment of his Fellowship for such time as they shall think fit, such time to be reckoned as part of his six years' tenure, or deprive him altogether of his Fellowship.

If any Fellow shall be convicted by a Court of competent jurisdiction of any crime, the Master shall with all convenient speed summon a meeting of all the Fellows exclusive of such Fellow. The Master and Fellows assembled at such meeting shall proceed to investigate the case; and if the fact of such conviction be established, the Master shall, if the majority of those present so determine, deprive such Fellow of his Fellowship and expel him from the College.

If the Master shall in any case think it proper to cause an inquiry to be instituted as to whether or not the conduct of any Fellow has been disgraceful and such as to render him unfit to be a Fellow of the College, or if any two Fellows shall prefer before the Master a charge against any Fellow of disgraceful conduct rendering him unfit in their judgment to be a Fellow of the College, the Master shall call a meeting for the purpose of considering the question, summoning all the Fellows other than the accused and the Fellows, if any, preferring such charge. The Master and Fellows assembled at such meeting shall proceed to investigate the case, giving the accused person an opportunity of being heard in his defence, and the accusing Fellows, if any, an opportunity of proving their case. And if such disgraceful conduct be proved, the Master shall, if two-thirds of those present so determine, deprive the offending Fellow of his Fellowship and expel him from the College.

In every case of suspension or deprivation

and expulsion of a Fellow, there shall be a right of appeal to the Visitor, who shall have power to confirm or reverse the sentence or vary it at his discretion.

18. *Vacation of Fellowships.*

Except as specified in Statute 15 or hereinafter, every Fellowship shall become vacant at the end of six years from the date of admission.

The time, however, during which a Fellow shall have held the office of Tutor, Assistant Tutor, Bursar, Director of Studies, Lecturer, Dean, or Librarian shall not be counted as part of the six years for which his Fellowship is tenable.

If a Fellow shall have held one or more of the offices of Tutor, Assistant Tutor, Bursar, Director of Studies, Lecturer, Dean, or Librarian for twenty years, he may retain his Fellowship for life, provided that not more than four Fellowships shall be thus retained at any one time.

On the expiration of the Fellowship of any Fellow he may be re-elected for special reasons, if two-thirds of the Master and Fellows present at a meeting called for the purpose so determine.

If a Fellow holds the office of Professor, Registrary, or Librarian in the University, he may retain his Fellowship as long as he continues to hold that office, subject to the provisions of Statute 17. [i.e., Suspension and Deprivation of Fellows.]

Notwithstanding any provision of these Statutes, if a Fellow accepts from the College the presentation to a benefice, of which the net annual value, not deducting the retiring pension, if any, of the preceding incumbent, is not less than four hundred pounds (£400) a year, his Fellowship shall become vacant at the end of one year from the time of his licence or institution.

19. *College Meetings.*

There shall be at least one College Meeting in every term, on a day to be fixed by the Master, of which notice shall be sent to all the Fellows.

The Master may call a College Meeting at any time. He shall call a College Meeting on a written requisition signed by three Fellows, stating the object for which the meeting is to be called: he shall send notice of such meeting to all the Fellows within four days from the receipt of such requisition, to be held on a day not more than ten days after the date of the notice.

No business shall be transacted at any College Meeting unless four at least of the Master and Fellows are present.

The Master and Fellows shall have power to require the attendance of any Fellow at any College Meeting, if the interest of the College seem to them to require it.

The Master shall have a casting vote in addition to his ordinary vote.

The Master shall have the power to suspend the carrying into effect of any order passed by a majority of the Master and Fellows until such order shall have been reconsidered and approved by a majority of the Master and Fellows present at a meeting specially summoned for the purpose, and such meeting shall be held not more than fourteen days after the meeting at which such order was first approved. This power of suspension shall not, however, be

valid in cases where its exercise would defeat the purpose of the original order.

20. *Residence of Fellows and Officers.*

Any College Officer shall reside in College if a majority of the Master and Fellows are of opinion that his absence would be a cause of injury to the College. Every person, who is fulfilling the duty of residence in College under this Statute, shall sleep in College at least five nights in each week, unless for special reason he shall have been excused by a vote of the Master and Fellows; and if he shall be absent on either of the remaining nights, he shall have a deputy, approved by the Master, and such deputy shall sleep in College. Provided always that a house communicating with the College, and approved by the Master and Fellows shall, for the purposes of this Statute, be deemed to be within the College.

During Full Term at least two Fellows, one of whom shall be either a Tutor or the Dean of College, or in the absence through grave cause of both such officers, a deputy approved by the Master, shall sleep in College. And during that part of the Long Vacation in which members of the College *in statu pupillari* are allowed to reside, at least one College Officer or Fellow shall sleep in College. The Master and Fellows shall make such provision as may from time to time seem to them expedient for the residence of College Officers or Fellows in College during the other vacations.

21. *Distribution of College Revenues.*

The revenues of the College shall be applied in the first instance to the payment of the stipends of the officers and scholars of the College, and of whatever may be required to be paid by the Statutes of the College, or by the Statutes of the University, or by the approved customs of the College, or by any lawful ordinance. The remainder shall then be divided among the Master and Fellows in such manner that the Master shall receive twice the amount received by each Fellow receiving a full dividend, the surplus, if any, to be applied to the general purposes of the College, including the formation of a Pension Fund. Provided, however, that the dividend paid to each of the Fellows, exclusive of any pension, shall not exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty pounds (£250.) in any year.

22. *Payments for University Purposes.*

The College shall pay annually to the University the sum authorized by the Statutes of the University made under the powers of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, to be levied from the College.

23. *Surplus Income.*

If at any time it shall appear to the Master and Fellows that the revenues of the College are greater than the amount required to afford to each of the Fellows a dividend of two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) a year, exclusive of rooms and commons but inclusive of all other allowances, they may approve a scheme for increasing the number of Fellowships or Scholarships or Exhibitions, or for providing a fund for granting gratuities to poor and deserving members of the College *in statu pupillari*, or for applying the surplus in some other way for the benefit of the College or of the University; and the said scheme shall thenceforth have the same force and effect as if it formed part of these Statutes.

24. *College Accounts and Audit.*

Within fifteen days before or after the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary in every year, the Master, Bursar, Tutor, Steward, and Bailiffs shall render account of all sums received and expended by them respectively on behalf of the College during the year ending at the preceding Michaelmas.

At least six Fellows shall be present at the audit of the said accounts. The accounts shall be audited either by a professional auditor or by the Master and Fellows; in the latter case two Fellows shall be elected to be Auditors, and it shall be their duty in conjunction with the Master or his deputy to examine the said accounts, before the day appointed for the audit, and, if they be found correct, to sign them. The Master or his deputy and the Auditors shall be paid adequate stipends for their trouble.

The Bursar shall deliver up at the end of the audit all receipts, acquittances, and other papers required to verify the accounts, for safe preservation in the College Chest.

The Bursar, Tutor, Steward, and other officers of the College may be required, if the Master and Fellows think fit, before their admission to office, respectively to give security for rendering true accounts and for the payment of the balances, if any, which may remain in their hands at the time of audit.

25. *Dinner in Hall and Assignment of Rooms*

The Master and Fellows shall be provided with dinner in the Hall at the expense of the College, the cost of such dinner not to exceed a moderate sum determined from time to time by the Master and Fellows. If the Master do not dine in Hall, he shall receive the customary allowance in lieu of commons.

Rooms in College shall be assigned to the Fellows and other members of the College by the Master.

A married Fellow shall not be at liberty to bring his wife or any member of his family to reside or sleep in College unless suitable rooms approved by the Master and Fellows are provided by the College.

26. *The Bursar.*

When there is a vacancy in the office of Bursar, the Master may, if he think fit, nominate one of the Fellows for a probationary period of three years, and on the expiration of such period the Master and Fellows may confirm the appointment from time to time for such period or periods as may seem to them fit. In the event of the Master declining to nominate, the appointment for the probationary period shall be made by the Master and Fellows not necessarily from among the Fellows.

The Bursar shall be paid a stipend to be determined by the Master and Fellows after his nomination or election.

Provided, however, that if at any time the business of the College shall appear in the judgment of the Master and Fellows to have been badly done or neglected by the Bursar, it shall be lawful for them by a vote passed at a special meeting called for the purpose, in which two-thirds of the whole body concur, to deprive him of his office.

The Bursar shall not let or hire any College lands or buildings above the annual value of £40 without the consent of a majority of the

Master and Fellows; nor shall any goods or property of the College be sold, exchanged, or alienated without the consent of a majority of the Master and Fellows.

27. *The Dean of College.*

The Dean of College shall be responsible for the maintenance of discipline over the members of the College *in statu pupillari*. He shall be appointed by the Master and Fellows for such period or periods as they shall from time to time determine. He shall be paid a stipend to be fixed by the Master and Fellows. He may be deprived of his office for grave cause by a vote of two-thirds of the Master and Fellows present at a special meeting called for the purpose.

28. *The Dean of Chapel.*

The Dean of Chapel shall be in Holy Orders and shall be responsible for the due conduct of divine service in the College Chapel and for the religious instruction of all members of the College *in statu pupillari* belonging to the Established Church. He shall be appointed by the Master and Fellows for such period or periods as they shall from time to time determine. He shall be paid a stipend to be fixed by the Master and Fellows. He may be deprived of his office for grave cause by a vote of two-thirds of the Master and Fellows present at a special meeting called for the purpose.

29. *The Librarian.*

When there is a vacancy in the office of Librarian, the Master may, if he think fit, nominate one of the Fellows for a probationary period of three years, and on the expiration of such period the Master and Fellows may confirm the appointment from time to time for such period or periods as may seem to them fit. In the event of the Master declining to nominate, the appointment for the probationary period shall be made by the Master and Fellows not necessarily from among the Fellows. He shall be paid a stipend to be fixed by the Master and Fellows after his nomination or election.

The Librarian shall observe the rules prescribed by the Master and Fellows for the discharge of his office. He may be deprived of his office for grave cause by a vote of two-thirds of the Master and Fellows present at a special meeting called for the purpose.

30. *The Educational Staff.*

The Educational Staff of the College shall consist of a Tutor or Tutors, Assistant Tutors, Directors of Studies, Lecturers, Assistant Lecturers and Supervisors of Studies, the number of each being determined from time to time by the Master and Fellows.

When there is a vacancy in the office of Tutor, the Master may, if he think fit, nominate one of the Fellows for a probationary period of three years, and on the expiration of such period the Master and Fellows may confirm the appointment from time to time for such period or periods as may seem to them fit. In the event of the Master declining to nominate, the appointment for the probationary period shall be made by the Master and Fellows, not necessarily from among the Fellows. He shall be paid a stipend to be fixed by the Master and Fellows after his nomination or election. If at any time in the judgment of the Master and Fellows a Tutor shall appear to be incompetent or to have neglected

his duties, it shall be lawful for them by a vote, in which two-thirds of the whole body concur, passed at a special meeting called for the purpose, to deprive him of his office.

The Assistant Tutors, Directors of Studies, Lecturers, Assistant Lecturers, and Supervisors of Studies shall be appointed by the Master and Fellows for such period or periods as they shall from time to time determine.

The Master and Fellows shall fix from time to time the stipends to be paid to the members of the Educational Staff, and also the Tuition Fees to be paid by Students of the College.

31. *The Caution Money.*

All Caution Money shall be received by some officer appointed by the Master and Fellows for the purpose. It shall be placed to the credit of a fund to be called the Caution Fund.

The Caution Fund shall be managed and the income thereof applied in such manner as the Master and Fellows shall direct. The accounts of it shall be audited annually with the other accounts of the College. The Master and Fellows may at any time direct that a portion of the Caution Fund be placed in the hands of a Tutor.

32. *The Bible Clerks and Scholars.*

The Bible Clerks and Scholars shall be of good character and sufficient learning, and shall be elected by the Master and Fellows.

The Bible Clerks shall perform such duties in connection with the Chapel as may be assigned to them by the Master and Fellows.

The Bible Clerks and Scholars shall conduct themselves with propriety and approve themselves to the Master and Fellows by their industry and progress; in the event of any failure to observe this statute, it shall be lawful for the Master and Fellows to deprive a Bible Clerk or Scholar of his emoluments.

No scholar shall retain his scholarship after he is of standing to take the degree of Master of Arts or other equivalent degree.

No one shall be allowed to compete for a scholarship before commencing residence in the University if his age exceeds nineteen years on October 1st preceding the examination. The tenure of such scholarships shall be for not more than two years in the first instance subject to good conduct and diligence and progress, and the maximum emolument shall be £80 inclusive of rent of rooms and all allowances.

33. *College Discipline.*

The Bible Clerks, Scholars, and all members of the College *in statu pupillari* shall pay due respect and obedience to the Master and other officers of the College; they shall conduct themselves quietly and with decorum; and shall observe the Statutes and all rules made from time to time for the government of the College.

If any person *in statu pupillari* fails to observe the said Statutes and rules, or commits any offence against good behaviour and the discipline of the College, he shall be punished by the Master or the Dean of College or other officer of the College. But no one shall be removed from the College whether for a time or permanently, or be deprived of his emoluments, except by a vote of the Master and Fellows at a special meeting called for the purpose of considering the question.

34. *The College Seal and Muniments.*

There shall be in the College a Chest with three keys of different make, one of which shall be kept by the Master and each of the others by a Fellow elected for the purpose by the Master and Fellows.

In this Chest shall be kept the common seal of the College, the Royal Charter, and other documents and writings of chief importance; the remaining documents being placed for safe custody in other places provided for the purpose.

The Common Seal shall not be put to any writing which has not been laid before a meeting of the Master and Fellows, and approved by a majority.

The Common Seal shall be affixed in the presence of the Master and one other of the key-keepers.

35. *Commemoration of Benefactors.*

The Master, or the preacher appointed by him, shall be paid by the Bursar forty shillings for his sermon at the Commemoration of Benefactors.

At every Commemoration of Benefactors a moderate feast in Hall shall be provided at the expense of the College, and the customary alms shall be given to the poor at the discretion of the Master and Fellows.

36. *Divine Worship and Religious Instruction.*

Having regard to the provisions of the fifth* and sixth† sections of the Universities Tests Act, 1871, the Master and Fellows may provide stipends from the revenues of the College for persons who may be appointed to carry out those provisions: and shall make such regulations as they may deem expedient for the celebration of Divine service, and for the due maintenance of religious worship and discipline.

37. *College Pensions.*

If a Fellow shall have discharged the duties of one or more of the offices of Tutor, Assistant Tutor, Bursar, Dean of College, Dean of Chapel, Librarian, Director of Studies, or Lecturer for more than ten years, he may be allowed a pension at the discretion of the Master and Fellows.

* "The governing body of every college subsisting at the time of the passing of this Act in any of the said universities shall provide sufficient religious instruction for all members thereof *in statu pupillari* belonging to the Established Church."

† "The Morning and Evening Prayer according to the Order of the Book of Common Prayer shall continue to be used daily as heretofore in the chapel of every college subsisting at the time of the passing of this Act in any of the said universities; but notwithstanding anything contained in the statute thirteenth and fourteenth Charles the Second, chapter four, or in this Act, it shall be lawful for the visitor of any such college, on the request of the governing body thereof, to authorize from time to time in writing the use on week days only of any abridgment or adaptation of the said Morning and Evening Prayer in the chapel of such college instead of the order set forth in the Book of Common Prayer."

38. *Duxford St. Peter's Pension Fund.*

The annual income arising from the Duxford St. Peter's Pension Fund shall be applied to the fund for providing pensions for Officers of the College.

39. *Presentation to Benefices.*

The Master and Fellows shall present to the several benefices in the patronage of the College, in every case in which they can with propriety do so, a Fellow or former Fellow, or a Chaplain or former Chaplain, or other present or former Officer, or a former Scholar of the College, regard being had to length of service in the College; but it shall not be necessary to present any such person, and no such person shall have any claim to any such presentation on the ground of seniority or on any other ground.

40. *Interpretation of Statutes.*

If any question shall arise in regard to the meaning of any of these Statutes, it shall be decided by a majority of the Master and Fellows. But it shall be competent to any party affected by such decision to appeal to the Visitor, provided that he appeal within two calendar months (or within such period not less than two calendar months as shall be allowed by the Master and Fellows for the purpose) after the decision shall have come to his knowledge. The Visitor if appealed to within due time may affirm vary or reverse the decision of the Master and Fellows, and his decision shall be final.

41. *Change in the Value of Money.*

No alteration in the specific sums mentioned in these Statutes shall be made in consequence of any change in the value of money, or for any other reason except by Statute made in accordance with the provisions of the 54th and 55th sections of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877.

42. *Addresses.*

Every Fellow shall leave with such person as the Master and Fellows may appoint the name of the place of address to which notices intended for him should be sent; and in all cases in which by the Statutes notice is required to be given to any Fellow, it shall be sufficient that the notice be sent to such address by post or otherwise.

43. *Preservation of Interests.*

The interests and conditions of tenure of emoluments of such of the Master and Fellows as were elected before the 3rd day of August, 1920, shall be regulated by the Statutes in force before the approval of these Statutes by the King in Council, provided that any of such Master and Fellows may within one year after the said approval of these Statutes signify to the Master and Fellows by writing under his hand that he wishes to be placed under the operation of these Statutes, and his interests and the conditions of tenure of his emolument shall be thenceforth governed by these Statutes, and shall accordingly be the same as if these Statutes had been in operation at the date of his election to such emolument, and his past services, if any, in the College or University office shall be of the same avail as if they had been services under these Statutes, but so that in no case shall his rights in respect of a pension be diminished.

44. *Repeal of Former Statutes.*

The Statutes of the College confirmed by Order of the Queen in Council, June 29th, 1882, are hereby repealed, save and except so far as regards the interests and conditions of tenure of emoluments of any person who before the confirmation of these Statutes became a member of the College, or before the 3rd day of August, 1920, was elected to a University or College emolument within the meaning of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, but the repeal of the said Statutes shall not be taken to revive the provisions of any former Statutes of the College which were repealed by the said Statutes.

The concluding Exhortation of the ancient Statutes affixed hereto shall remain in the Statute Book of the College.

Cui cum Patre et Sancto Spiritu sit omnis honor, gloria, et imperium in sæcula sæculorum. Amen.

SUPPLEMENTAL STATUTE.

Statute for the Foundation of Bishop Mawson.

Notwithstanding any provision of the Will of Bishop Mawson, the payments to the Scholars on Bishop Mawson's Foundation and the conditions of their residence shall be such as may be determined from time to time by the Master and Fellows.

STATUTES AS TO BYE-FOUNDATIONS
AT CORPUS CHRISTI COLLEGE.

(Approved by the Queen in Council, April 16, 1861.)

1. *Archbishop Parker's Norwich Scholarships, 1569.*

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by His Majesty in Council there shall

be no further election to either of the two Fellowships founded by Archbishop Parker in 1569, nor to either of the two Scholarships founded by him at the same time, with preference to Scholars from Norwich, Wymondham, or Aylsham Schools.

The whole of the annuity now received by Corpus Christi College from the Corporation of Norwich for the maintenance of the Fellows and Scholars on the above Foundation shall (subject and without prejudice to existing interests therein) be henceforth appropriated to the maintenance of one Exhibition at Corpus Christi College.

In the election to such Exhibition Scholars from the Schools of Norwich, Wymondham, and Aylsham respectively shall enjoy the same right of preference to which they are now entitled in the election to Scholarships on the above Foundation.

The Candidates for such Exhibition shall be nominated from among the Scholars of Norwich, Wymondham, and Aylsham Schools, by the Mayor and Corporation of Norwich, in the same manner as the Scholars on the Foundation of Archbishop Parker have been heretofore nominated.

The Exhibitioner so elected shall enjoy such additional advantages (if any) in respect of rooms and commons as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time determine.

The Candidates for such Exhibition shall be examined in such manner as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time direct, in order to ascertain their fitness to become Students of the College.

In default of any duly qualified Candidate from any of the Schools of Norwich, Wymondham, or Aylsham, the Exhibition then vacant shall be treated as open to general competition.

The Exhibitioner shall be subject to such regulations as to residence, instruction, and discipline as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time determine, and may be deprived of, or suspended from, his Exhibition by the Master and Fellows for any misconduct which shall, in their judgment, merit such deprivation or suspension.

The Exhibition shall be tenable until the person holding it shall be of standing to take the degree of Bachelor of Arts, or, if the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College think fit, until he is of standing to take the degree of Master of Arts, but no longer.

No person shall be entitled to preference in the election to such Exhibition in respect of his place of education unless he shall have been educated at such place of education for two years at the least last preceding the election, or last preceding his matriculation in the University.

2. *Canterbury Scholarships, 1569.*

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by His Majesty in Council there shall be no further election to any of the three Scholarships founded by Archbishop Parker in 1569, with preference to Scholars from Canterbury School, or in default thereof to Scholars from Westminster School.

In lieu thereof there shall be established at Corpus Christi College two Exhibitions, with the like preference to Scholars from Canterbury School, or in default thereof to Westminster School, as is now enjoyed by Scholars from

those Schools in respect to the said Scholarships.

Each of the two Exhibitioners shall receive Thirty Pounds a year, and shall be entitled in addition to a set of rooms in the College.

The Candidates for such Exhibitions shall be nominated by the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury out of Scholars of Canterbury School, or in default thereof by the Dean and Chapter of Westminster out of Scholars of Westminster School, in the same manner as the Scholars on the above-mentioned Foundation are now nominated; but no preference shall be shown in such nomination or election to any Candidate in respect of his place of birth or parentage.

The Candidates for such Exhibitions shall be examined in such manner as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time direct, in order to ascertain their fitness to become Students of the College.

In default of any duly qualified Candidate from Canterbury School, or in default thereof from Westminster School, the Exhibition then vacant shall be treated as open to general competition.

The Exhibitioners shall be subject to such regulations as to residence, instruction, and discipline as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time determine; and any of them may be deprived of, or suspended from, his Exhibition by the Master and Fellows for any misconduct which shall, in their judgment, merit such deprivation or suspension.

Each Exhibition shall be tenable until the person holding it shall be of standing to take the degree of Bachelor of Arts, or, if the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College think fit, until he is of standing to take the degree of Master of Arts, but no longer.

No person shall be entitled to preference in the election to such Exhibition in respect of his place of education, unless he shall have been educated at such place of education for two years at the least last preceding the election, or last preceding his matriculation in the University.

3. *Eastbridge Scholarships.*

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by His Majesty in Council there shall be no further election to either of the two Scholarships founded by Archbishop Parker in 1569, out of funds derived from Eastbridge Hospital, Canterbury, for Scholars from the Free School of Canterbury.

In lieu thereof there shall be established at Corpus Christi College one Exhibition of the annual value of £6 13s. 4d., with the same preference to Scholars from Canterbury School as is now enjoyed by Scholars of the above Foundation.

In the election to such Exhibition no Candidate shall be entitled to any preference in respect of his place of birth.

The Candidates for such Exhibition shall be examined in such manner as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time direct, in order to ascertain their fitness to become Students of the College.

In default of any duly qualified Candidate from Canterbury School, the Exhibition then vacant shall be treated as open to general competition.

The Exhibitioner shall be subject to such regulations as to residence, instruction, and discipline as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time determine, and may be deprived

of, or suspended from, his Exhibition by the Master and Fellows for any misconduct which shall, in their judgment, merit such deprivation or suspension.

The Exhibition shall be tenable until the person holding it shall be of standing to take the degree of Bachelor of Arts, or, if the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College think fit, until he is of standing to take the degree of Master of Arts, but no longer.

The Exhibition shall be tenable with either of the two Exhibitions constituted in lieu of the Canterbury Scholarships founded by Archbishop Parker in 1569.

No person shall be entitled to preference in the election to such Exhibition in respect of his having been educated at Canterbury School, unless he shall have been educated at such School for two years at the least last preceding the election, or last preceding his matriculation in the University.

4. *Archbishop Parker's Norwich Scholars, 1567 and 1574.*

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by His Majesty in Council there shall be no further election to any of the three Scholarships founded by Archbishop Parker in 1567, with preference to Scholars from Norwich or Aylsham Schools, nor to the Scholarship founded by the said Archbishop Parker in 1574, with the like preference.

In lieu thereof there shall be established at Corpus Christi College one Exhibition of the annual value of Twenty-four Pounds, with the like preference to Scholars from Norwich or Aylsham Schools as is now enjoyed by them in respect to the Scholarships on the above Foundation.

The Exhibitioner so elected shall enjoy such additional advantages (if any) in respect of rooms and commons as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time determine.

No Candidate shall be entitled to any preference in the election to such Exhibition in respect of his place of birth.

The Candidates for such Exhibition shall be examined in such manner as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time direct, in order to ascertain their fitness to become Students of the College.

In default of any duly qualified Candidate from Norwich or Aylsham Schools, the Exhibition then vacant shall be treated as open to general competition.

The Exhibitioner shall be subject to such regulations as to residence, instruction, and discipline, as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time determine, and may be deprived of, or suspended from, his Exhibition by the Master and Fellows for any misconduct which shall, in their judgment, merit such deprivation or suspension.

The Exhibition shall be tenable until the person holding it shall be of standing to take the degree of Bachelor of Arts, or, if the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College think fit, until he is of standing to take the degree of Master of Arts, but no longer.

No person shall be entitled to preference in the election to such Exhibition in respect of his place of education, unless he shall have been educated at such place of education for two years at the least last preceding the election, or last preceding his matriculation in the University.

5. *Sir Nicholas Bacon's Scholarships.*

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by His Majesty in Council the six Scholarships at Corpus Christi College, founded by Sir Nicholas Bacon, shall (after the expiration of the interests of the present holders thereof) be reduced to one Scholarship.

The Scholar for the time being holding such Scholarship shall receive the whole of the annuity derived from the estates of Sir Nicholas Bacon, and shall be entitled in addition to a set of rooms in College, together with such other advantages (if any) as the Master and Fellows may determine.

Such Scholar shall bear the name of Sir Nicholas Bacon's Scholar; but the representative of Sir Nicholas Bacon shall not be entitled to nominate the said Scholar, nor shall a Scholar from Redgrave School be entitled to any preference in the election to such Scholarship; but the election to such Scholarship shall be made in the same manner as that to the eight Foundation Scholarships of the College; and the Scholar holding it shall be subject to the same rules as to tenure and residence, and also as to instruction and discipline, as the said Foundation Scholars.

6. *Small Scholarships—Caston, Mere, etc.*

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by His Majesty in Council the funds derived from the several Foundations of John Parker, of Alice Caston, of John Mere, of John Borage, of Archbishop Sterne, and of Samuel Chapman respectively, which have been heretofore applied to the maintenance of Scholars at Corpus Christi College, in accordance with the terms of the several Benefactions, shall (after the expiration of the interests of the present holders thereof) be consolidated into one fund, to be applied and distributed in such manner as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time think fit for the encouragement and reward of deserving Students of the said College. And no person shall henceforth be entitled to claim a preference in the distribution of the proceeds of such funds in respect of his place of birth, or of his being of any particular name or kindred.

7. *Sykes' Exhibitions.*

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by His Majesty in Council there shall be no further election to any of the four Exhibitions founded by Mr. Sykes in 1768 for Scholars educated at St. Paul's School.

In lieu thereof there shall be established at Corpus Christi College one Exhibition of the value of Thirty-six Pounds a year, for a Scholar from the said School.

No person shall be entitled to present himself as a Candidate for such Exhibition who has not been educated at St. Paul's School for the space of three years at least.

The Candidates for such Exhibition shall be examined in such manner as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time direct, in order to ascertain their fitness to become Students of the College.

In default of any duly qualified Candidate from St. Paul's School, the Exhibition then vacant shall be treated as open to general competition.

The Exhibitioner shall be subject to such regulations as to residence, instruction, and discipline, as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time determine, and may be deprived of, or suspended from, his Exhibition by the Master and Fellows for any misconduct which

shall, in their judgment, merit such deprivation or suspension.

The Exhibition shall be tenable until the person holding it shall be of standing to take the degree of Bachelor of Arts, or, if the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College think fit, until he is of standing to take the degree of Master of Arts, but no longer.

8. Stock Exhibition.

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by His Majesty in Council there shall be no further election to the Scholarship at Corpus Christi College founded by Mr. John Stock in 1780, for a Scholar from St. Paul's School.

In lieu thereof there shall be established at the said College an Exhibition of the value of Thirty Pounds a year, for a Scholar educated at St. Paul's School and recommended by the Head Master.

No person shall be entitled to present himself as a Candidate for such Exhibition who has not been educated at St. Paul's School for the space of three years at least.

The Candidates for such Exhibition shall be examined in such manner as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time direct, in order to ascertain their fitness to become Students of the College.

In default of any duly qualified Candidate from St. Paul's School, the Exhibition then vacant shall be treated as open to general competition.

The Exhibitioner shall be subject to such regulations as to residence, instruction, and discipline, as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time determine, and may be deprived of, or suspended from, his Exhibition by the Master and Fellows for any misconduct which shall, in their judgment, merit such deprivation or suspension.

*Prohibition of Movement of Dogs out of
Inner Controlled Area.*

1. No dog shall be moved out of the Area described in the Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "an Inner Controlled Area"), unless it is accompanied by a licence of the Ministry, authorizing such movement and signed by an Officer of the Ministry, and any such licence may be subject to such conditions as to the detention and isolation of the dog or otherwise as the Ministry may think necessary

or desirable and shall be specified in the licence: Provided that this Article shall not apply to:—(a) the movement of a dog under a licence granted by the Minister under the Importation of Dogs Order of 1914 and the Importation of Dogs (Amendment) Order of 1918 (No. 2) to a port in Great Britain for shipment, or to a place of detention for the purpose of detention and isolation; or (b) the movement of a dog through such area by railway from a place outside the area to another place outside the area without unnecessary delay and without being rebooked within the area.

Control and Muzzling of Dogs in Inner Controlled Area.

2.—(1) A dog in an Inner Controlled Area shall at all times

(a) whilst in or on any public place be efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle, and shall also be led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment: Provided that the requirement as to leading shall not apply to a dog in charge of a competent person while being used for the driving or tending of cattle or sheep;

(b) whilst in or on any other place be—

(i) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or

(ii) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or

(iii) efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle.

Provided that paragraph (b) shall not apply to any pack of hounds while being exercised under the supervision of two or more competent attendants or to any dog in charge of a competent person while being used for the capture or destruction of vermin or rabbits.

(2) The provisions of this Article shall not apply to any dog confined in a suitable hamper, crate, box or other receptacle, so constructed as to render it impossible for such dog while so confined to bite any person or animal.

(3) Article 4 (*Control of Dogs in Scheduled District*) of the Wiltshire and District (Muzzling and Control of Dogs) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," shall not apply to an Inner Controlled Area.

Seizure, Detention, and Disposal of Uncontrolled Dogs.

3.—(1) Any dog found in or on any public place in an Inner Controlled Area in respect of which the provisions of this Order as to control or muzzling are not being complied with, may be seized by the Local Authority or by the police, and any dog so seized shall be dealt with by the Local Authority in the manner directed by Article 5 of the principal Order (*Seizure, Detention, and Disposal of Uncontrolled Dogs*), which Article shall apply accordingly.

(2) Articles 2 and 3 of the principal Order as hereinafter modified shall apply to dogs moved in contravention of this Order.

(3) Where any dog is seized by an Inspector of the Ministry, and is detained and isolated by the Ministry under the principal Order or this Order, the owner of the dog shall from time to time as may be notified to the owner by the Ministry pay to the Ministry the expenses of the detention and isolation of the dog, and if the owner of the dog fails to comply

with this provision the Ministry may destroy or otherwise dispose of the dog as they think expedient without further notice to the owner.

Offences.

4.—(1) If a dog is moved in contravention of Article 1 of, this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the dog, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the dog is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2) If any dog is not kept under control in manner prescribed by this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-fourth day of August, nineteen hundred and twenty.

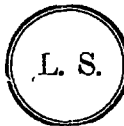

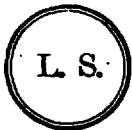

In the administrative county of Carmarthen.

The parishes of Quarter Bach, Llanddeusant, Myddfai, Llanfair-ar-y-bryn and Llangadock, and Llandilo-Fawr Rural (except its detached part).
