His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the undermentioned rewards for distinguished service in the Field in South Russia:—

**AWARDED THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER.**

Lt. (T./Capt.) Angus McPherson, M.C., D.C.M., 'Arg. & Suth'd. Highrs. and M.G. Corps.

For gallantry and devotion to duty during the fighting round Odessa, at the end of January, 1920. Capt. McPherson particularly distinguished himself by his excellent work with his Machine Gun School Cadets, who would follow him anywhere, and who were used in the defence of the town at the last moment. He set a fine example of courage and devotion to duty.

Maj. Hudleston Noel Hedworth Williamson, M.C., R.F.A.

For gallantry and devotion to duty at Celeschina, on 27th July, 1919, when he assisted a young Russian Officer who was fighting an 18-pounder gun against an

armoured train at 3,000 yards' range. The fire from the train was heavy, and it was entirely due to Major Williamson's advice and presence that the duel ended in favour of the single 18 pounder.

**AWARDED THE MILITARY CROSS.**

Capt. (T./Maj.) Robert Hugh Holmes Jackson, O.B.E., E. Surr. R., Spec. Res., and M.G. Corps

For gallantry and devotion to duty under fire, on the 12th March, 1920, at Ushun. Major Jackson, observing that the situation on the right was critical owing to enemy reinforcements, and that our line was beginning to waver, at once proceeded there, and, by his personal example under heavy machine-gun fire, inspired the attack.

T./Capt. Eric George Sherbrooke Walker, Gen. List.

For gallantry at Ushun on the 8th and 10th March, 1920. He attached himself to the Police Regiment and remained with them throughout the two days' counter-attacks, during which they sustained heavy casualties

By his personal example and coolness, under heavy machine-gun fire, he was largely responsible for the decisive success gained.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the undermentioned rewards for distinguished service in the Field with the Waziristan Force, India.

**AWARDED A BAR TO THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER.**

Capt. Nilkanth Shriram Jatar, D.S.O., I.M.S., attd. 2/76th Punjabis, Ind. Army.

For gallantry near Kotkai, on 5th January, 1920, when, during a withdrawal under heavy fire, he rendered valuable assistance in bringing in wounded, and, whilst doing so, was himself severely wounded.

**AWARDED THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER.**

Capt. Thomas Mervyn Osborne Catterson-Smith, 1/12th Pnrs., attd. 3/34th Sikh Pnrs., Ind. Army.

For gallantry at Pioneer Piquet, on 21st December, 1919. Owing to the retirement of the covering party, his working party was suddenly attacked in force and surrounded. By his coolness, sound leadership and example, he inspired his men and repulsed five assaults. Though twice wounded he remained in control, and did not withdraw his command till all ammunition had been expended.

Maj. Harold Exham, O.B.E., 2/7th, attd. 2/9th Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For cool courage and fine leadership. On the 14th January, 1920, when the Commanding Officer of the 2/5th Gurkha Rifles had been killed and the Battalion and the accompanying troops had sustained very heavy casualties, Major Exham was ordered to take over command. By fine leadership and determination he succeeded in holding a position with very few troops against several strongly pressed enemy attacks. Again at Makin, on the 21st February, 1920, he commanded the 2/5th Gurkha Rifles, and carried out successfully a difficult operation under heavy fire, and subsequently extricated his advanced Companies and a considerable number of wounded by skilful handling of his command.

Lt. (T./Capt.) Herbert Archer Fagan, M.C., 2/9th Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and determination on several occasions, particularly at Sorarogha, on the 18th January, and at Makin, on the 19th February, 1920. In the first instance he was in charge of a Company ordered to establish a piquet in a position which was much exposed, and commanded by fire. He set a fine example in beating off attacks and in attempting to establish the piquet. Subsequently he withdrew his Company with great skill. In the second instance he again showed gallantry and leadership, when troops on the left were ordered to withdraw.

**AWARDED A BAR TO THE MILITARY CROSS.**

Lt. Clarence Robert Collie Lundy, M.C., 3/34th Sikh Pnrs., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and good leadership at Jandola on the 17th December, 1919, when in command of a detachment covering a working party. Though heavily attacked, he maintained his position till forced to retire, as his right flank had become exposed owing to the withdrawal of adjoining troops. He withdrew his command with great skill and few casualties, and inflicted heavy loss on the enemy. On the 21st of December, he again showed gallantry under critical conditions, and, though wounded, maintained his position till ordered to retire.

**AWARDED THE MILITARY CROSS.**

Lt. (T./Capt.) Maurice Bryer Allsebrook, 2/9th Gurka Rif., Ind. Army

For gallantry and good leading in the Barari Tangi on the 28th January, 1920, when he led his company with great dash and captured a hill which had withstood all previous attacks. By example and coolness he encouraged his men to advance over fire-swept ground, and enabled a piquet to be established on a most important hill. On two other occasions Capt. Allsebrook displayed great courage and devotion to duty, and was wounded on the 19th February, 1920.

T./Lt. Ben Philip Athaide, I.M.S., attd. 1/103rd Mahratta L.I., Ind. Army.

For gallantry at Palosina on the 19th December, 1919, when in charge of an outpost. He displayed great devotion in attending to the wounded under fire, and when the line was forced back, he remained till almost surrounded by the enemy, and was the last to leave.

Capt. Eric Alfred Bald, 3/11th Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For gallantry, devotion to duty and leadership on the 8th April, 1920, during the withdrawal from Sina Tiza Camp, when with a few comrades he rendered valuable service in conducting the withdrawal of a piquet. He brought into shelter a wounded officer, and finally assisted in repulsing the enemy at close quarters.

Capt. Aubrey George Albert Barton, 3/34th Sikh Pnrs., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and skilful leading at Palosina on the 19th December, 1919, when, after the Force had retired from Mandanna Hill, he led a volunteer party across the river in the face of enemy opposition, and brought in two wounded comrades. Again, on the 9th January, 1920, near Kotkai, by skill and coolness he extricated his company from a critical situation. At Makin, on the 19th February, 1920, he again showed great determination, and blew up two towers under heavy fire.

Lt. Leonard Arthur Cuthbert, I.A.R.O., attd. 2/19th Punjabis, Ind. Army.

At Girmi, on the 22nd October, 1919, he showed gallantry, decision, and sound tacti-

cal judgment in ordering and leading a counter attack when his company was being severely pressed during a retirement. The counter attack was successful, and caused severe enemy casualties.

T./Capt. Naval Maneckji Pestonji Dotivala, I.M.S., attd. 2/5th Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For most conspicuous gallantry in action at Sorarogha on 18th January, 1920, and at Makin on the 20th February, 1920. On both occasions he displayed the greatest gallantry and disregard for danger in his care of the wounded during the action. He set a very fine example to all.

Lt. William Elliott, 27th Mtn. By., R.A., T.F.

For gallantry at Asa Khan on the 14th January, 1920, when, under heavy fire, he brought his section into action in the river bed against a Mahsud sword rush. His coolness steadied his men, and his prompt action inflicted many casualties, and restored moral at a critical moment.

Lt. Jim Willoughby Hyices Harrison, 2/1st, attd. 2/9th, Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and devotion to duty during the withdrawal down the Baddar Toi on the 1st April, 1920, when closely pressed by the enemy. The rear party having suddenly come under heavy fire at close range, Lt. Harrison, with a few men, remained to assist the withdrawal of a piquet. This he succeeded in doing, but in checking the advance he was exposed to great danger at close quarters and was severely wounded. By his devotion to duty he saved many casualties.

Capt. Neville Godfray Hind, 2/2nd, attd. 4/3rd, Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and devotion to duty on the 19th February, 1920, at Makin, when he conducted a skilful attack on a tower. On reaching his objective he came under heavy fire from across a nullah. He then personally attempted to enter the tower and bomb the enemy, and was severely wounded. His example and leadership were responsible for the success of the day's work.

Capt. Lionel Rankin Knight, 3rd Bn., Q.V.O., Corps of Guides.

For gallantry near Jandola on 11th December, 1919. When during a very hard-pressed retirement the enemy was enfilading the right flank at close range, this officer, realising how precarious the situation was, at once collected men, charged the enemy, and restored the situation.

Lt. Leslie Norman Loder, 3/34th Sikh Pnrs., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and coolness at Palosina on the 21st December, 1919, when his company, forming part of a working party, was surrounded and suffered from heavy fire. Though wounded, he remained in the position encouraging his men, and, when the last of a Lewis gun team was killed, he himself brought the gun into action at close range, inflicting heavy casualties, until again

thrice hit. By his personal example and determination he maintained his position till ordered to retire.

Capt. (A./Maj.) William Vernon McCalmont, 2nd Bn., 10th Jats, Ind. Army.

For gallantry and initiative at Khajuri, Tochi Valley, on the 22nd October, 1919, when in command of reinforcements sent from Idak to extricate a convoy. He controlled the situation effectively, led his men with bravery and coolness, and his tactical dispositions during the march of the convoy to Idak were most skilful.

Capt. Henry Darrell Minchinton, 1/1st, attd. 2/9th, Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and skilful leading during the withdrawal down the Baddar Toi on the 8th April, 1920, when his company was closely pressed under heavy fire at close range. He remained behind with a few men, extricated a piquet of another unit, and, after having returned to a less exposed position, again went forward with a comrade to rescue casualties. He showed great devotion to duty throughout.

Lt. Blair Stirling Mould, 1/2nd, attd. 4/3rd, Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and devotion to duty on the 17th February, 1920, at Makin, when he went forward with Captain Hind in the attack on the tower, and took over the command when that officer was wounded. By determination he was enabled to set the tower alight, and subsequently, when sniping was heavy, succeeded in evacuating his wounded under cover of dusk. His able handling of the situation brought the action to a successful termination.

Sub. Naurang Singh, 1/150th Infy., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and good leading on the 5th October, 1919, near Manjhi, when surrounded by superior numbers, he extricated his platoon in an able manner. Under his orders seventeen men, eight of whom were wounded, fought their way  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles to Manjhi. He showed personal courage in remaining to the last searching for wounded.

Lt. Frederick Campbell O'Connell, 1/55th Coke's Rif., F.F.

For gallantry at Asa Khan on the 14th January, 1920, when he led his company under heavy fire to secure a position which was essential for the security of the left flank of the battalion. When established in the position he set a fine example under heavy fire.

Lt. Robert Francis Rutledge, 34th Poona Horse, attd. 21st Cav., F.F.

For gallantry and devotion on the 21st November, 1919, between Jatta and Murtaza Posts, when, after a brisk engagement, the troops under the command of Captain Byrne were ordered to retire. Lieutenant Rutledge, observing that three dismounted men were in difficulty getting a wounded man away, and realising that the retirement would be delayed, galloped back in face of heavy fire, took the wounded man on his horse, and carried him to a place of safety.

Lt. (A./Capt.) Walter Sherrard Smith, I.A.R.O., attd. 1/55th Coke's Rif., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and devotion to duty at Kaniguram on the 6th March, 1920, when he searched the village under heavy sniping fire. He then assisted, under heavy fire, to establish a piquet on the hill beyond, suffering many casualties. On the 7th March he again showed great determination, under heavy fire, in his endeavours to complete the defence of the piquet and to ration it. Finally, on the 8th March, he succeeded in his endeavours, but was severely wounded. He set a fine example of courage and endurance.

Capt. John George Smyth, V.C., 15th Ludhiana Sikhs, Ind. Army, Hdqrs., 43rd Infy. Bde.

For gallantry and initiative at Khajuri, Tochi Valley, on the 22nd October, 1919, when, having been sent forward from Idak to clear up the situation, his quick appreciation, dispositions and leadership averted a serious disaster and contributed largely towards the saving of a valuable convoy attacked by the enemy. He showed great gallantry under heavy fire, inspired his command, and brought the convoy safely to Idak.

Lt. William Robert Thomson, 1/109th Infy., Ind. Army.

For gallantry on Black Ridge, near Palosina on the 21st December, 1919. After the troops on his left had been withdrawn, this Officer held on to the left flank with a few men until forced to retire by superior numbers of the enemy. Again rallying his party, he advanced by bombing to his original position, which he held till ordered to withdraw. He showed great coolness in a difficult situation, and set an excellent example to his men.

Capt. Cecil Wotton Toovey, 82nd Punjabis, Ind. Army.

For gallantry on the 21st December, 1919, at Palosina camp, on Black Hill Ridge. When in command of the battalion, which was driven off the ridge by the enemy, he gallantly organised and led a counter-attack under heavy fire, though himself wounded. He displayed conspicuous coolness and set a fine example to his command.

Lt. (A./Capt.) Archibald Dargue Weir, I.A.R.O., attd. No. 6 A.M. By., M.G. Corps.

For gallantry and initiative at Khajuri, Tochi Valley, on the 22nd October, 1919. He commanded his battery with skill, and thereby saved many lives and a large part of a valuable convoy.

Lt. Richard Harvey Wycherley, 3/34th Sikh Pnrs., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and devotion to duty on the 19th December, 1919, at Palosina, when, during the retirement of two units, he seized a Lewis gun, ran up a small hill alone, and though practically surrounded, kept up a heavy fire on the enemy and checked their advance. Again, on the 21st December, 1919, when a working party had been forced to retire, this Officer rendered valuable services in collecting stragglers and organising a counter attack, during which he was

wounded. He showed great coolness and initiative throughout.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the undermentioned rewards for distinguished service in the Field in Mesopotamia:—

**AWARDED THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER.**

Maj. and Bt. Lt.-Col. Donald Elphinstone Robertson, 11th Lrs., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and skilful leadership near Quirayah, on the 9th June, 1920, when, having been attacked by superior forces, he was forced to retire. His dispositions were most judicious, and he inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy, and, when reinforced, his vigorous offensive was most effective.

**AWARDED THE MILITARY CROSS.**

Lt. Richard Eric James Holmes, 1/39th Garhwal Rif., Ind. Army.

For gallantry and good leading near Mosul on the 9th June, 1920, when in command of a small detachment operating against Arab raiders. He handled his men with such skill and dash through a series of small actions that he scattered with heavy losses several mounted bands which were collecting to attack our convoys. It was due to his vigorous action that the convoys system on that section of the road suffered no serious interference.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of a Bar to the Military Medal to the undermentioned Non-Commissioned Officer and Man:—

79443 Gnr. Porter, R., M.M., R.F.A. (Liverpool). (BALKANS)

(M.M. gazetted 18th June, 1917.)

South of Doiran on the 6th May, 1918, Gnr. Porter showed exceptional bravery by assisting to repair a broken telephone wire in an exposed position, and later by keeping a trench mortar in action despite the risk and exposure entailed by him in dismounting the gun. At the conclusion of firing he proceeded in the open to fetch a stretcher for the removal of casualties.

553914 Sjt. A. Stokes, M.M., R.E. (Catford). (FRANCE)

(M.M. gazetted 12th June, 1918.)

For able direction and courage during the attack on Favreuil on the 25th August, 1918. Sjt. Stokes successfully laid and maintained telephone lines under heavy fire, which it was imperative should be established without delay.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Military Medal to the undermentioned Non-Commissioned Officers and Men for bravery in the field:—

**ROYAL FIELD ARTILLERY.**

46597 Sjt. Saunders, G. C. ([E] Woolwich).  
On 16th September, 1916, near Martin-

puich, for conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty in laying a line through a heavy barrage until badly hit in the calf of the leg.

ROYAL ENGINEERS.

343841 T./Cpl. Moreton, C. W. (Winchester). (MESOPOTAMIA)

For gallantry and devotion to duty at Abu Kemal on the 11th/12th January, 1920, by continuing to send wireless messages under circumstances of considerable danger during an attack by Arab tribesmen.

ROYAL SCOTS.

350366 Cpl. Barclay, J., 9th Bn. (Edinburgh).

When employed on traffic control North of Ypres from 31st July, 1917, onwards, this N.C.O., despite heavy shell fire, continued to keep the traffic moving and roads clear, thus facilitating the forward movements of guns and ammunition.

ROYAL WEST SURREY REGIMENT.

202721 Pte. (L./C.) Carter, F., 1st Bn. (Stratford).

For conspicuous bravery N.E. of the Selle during the period 22nd-26th October, 1918, while acting as stretcher bearer. He crawled out to the wounded under machine-gun fire, bound them up and dragged them to a place of safety.

SUFFOLK REGIMENT.

12579 Pte. Roberts, H. H., 2nd Bn. (Babraham).

On the 30th August, 1918, at Ecoust, he went forward alone and made ineffective an enemy machine-gun which was holding up the advance. He wounded two of the gun team and captured an officer and four men.

CANADIAN FORCE.

335115 Sig. Dunbar, R.A., 16th Bde., Can. F.A. (N. RUSSIA)

On 16th October, 1918, during an attack, maintained communication between artillery and infantry with marked success.

888525 Pte. Butt, B. G. L., 46th Inf. Bn.

During the night 26th/27th July, 1918, before Oppy, he took part in a raid on the enemy lines, and gave valuable and gallant assistance in carrying out the task. His devotion to duty and courage on such occasions is most marked.

AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

5012 Gnr. Killip, J. J., Aust. F.A.

At Jeancourt, on the 3rd October, 1918, Gnr. Killip, with another signaller, laid and maintained a telephone line under continuous shell fire and through gas, enabling valuable information to be transmitted to the artillery in support
