WHEREAS by Section 8 of the Air Force (Constitution) Act, 1917, it is enacted that:—

(1) For the purpose of the administration of matters relating to the Air Force and to the defence of the realm by air there shall be established an Air Council consisting of one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who shall be President of the Air Council, and of other members who shall be appointed in such manner and subject to such provisions as His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct.

(2) His Majesty may, by Order in Council, make provision with respect to the proceedings of the Air Council and the manner in which the business of the Council is to be distributed among the members thereof:

And whereas by Section 14 of the Air Force (Constitution) Act, 1917, Orders in Council

made under that Act may be varied and revoked by subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas His Majesty by Orders in Council dated the 21st day of December, 1917, the 2nd day of January, 1918, the 4th day of March, 1918, and the 11th day of May, 1918, made provision with respect to the constitution of the Air Council and the manner of the appointment of the members thereof:

And whereas it is enacted by Section 2 of the Air Navigation Act, 1919, that the purposes of the Air Council shall include all matters connected with air navigation:

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for the reconstitution of the Air Council and to consolidate the said Orders:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) The Air Council shall consist of the following members, that is to say:—

One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State who shall be President of the Air Council.

The Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Air.

The Chief of the Air Staff.

The Controller-General of Civil Aviation.

The Director-General of Supply and Research.

The Secretary of the Air Ministry.

(2) Of the members of the Air Council (other than the President) the Chief of the Air Staff shall be appointed by His Majesty and the other members shall be appointed by the Secretary of State.

(3) There may be included in the Air Council such additional members (if any) not exceeding two, as may be appointed by the Secretary of State.

(4) The Secretary of State is to be responsible to His Majesty and Parliament for all the business of the Air Council.

All business, other than business which the Secretary of State specially reserves to himself, is to be transacted in the following principal divisions:—

(a) The Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Air to be Vice-President of the Air Council and to be responsible to the Secretary of State for so much of the business of the Air Council as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(b) The Chief of the Air Staff to be responsible to the Secretary of State for the administration of so much of the business relating to organisation, disposition, personnel, equipment, armament and maintenance of the Air Force as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(c) The Controller-General of Civil Aviation to be responsible to the Secretary of State for the administration of so much of the business relating to Civil Aviation as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(d) The Director-General of Supply and Research to be responsible to the Secretary of State for the administration of so much of the business relating to aeronautical research, inspection and supply as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(e) The Secretary of the Air Ministry to be responsible to the Secretary of State for such duties discharged by the Air Ministry as are not assigned to other members of the Council, for the control of expenditure, and for the co-ordination of Air Ministry business; and to be also designated Secretary of the Air Council and as such charged with the preparation of all official communications of the Council.

(5) Subject to the foregoing provisions as to the transaction of business in separate divisions the powers and duties of the Air Council may be exercised and performed by any three of their number and notwithstanding that any office, the holder of which is a member of the Air Council, is temporarily vacant, provided however that documents may be signed on behalf of the Air Council by any two members of the Air Council.

(6) This Order in Council shall be substituted for the Orders in Council, dated 21st day of December, 1917, the 2nd day of January, 1918, the 4th day of March, 1918, and the 11th day of May, 1918.

WHEREAS by Section 36 of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, it is enacted that His Majesty may by Order in Council direct that the said Act shall apply as if, subject to the conditions, exceptions and qualifications (if any) contained in the Order, any place out of His Majesty's dominions in which His Majesty has jurisdiction and which is named in the Order, were a British possession, and to provide for carrying into effect such application:

And whereas the Territory of Western Samoa is a place out of His Majesty's dominions in which His Majesty has jurisdiction:

And whereas it is expedient to extend to that Territory the provisions of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in the exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Western Samoa (Fugitive Offenders) Order in Council, 1920.

2. The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, shall apply to the said Territory of Western Samoa as if that Territory were a British possession, subject to the provisions following.

3. In the application of the said Act to the said Territory,—

(a) Every reference in the Act to the Governor of a British possession shall be read as a reference to the Administrator or other chief executive officer of the said Territory.

(b) Every reference in the Act to a Magistrate shall be read as a reference to a Judge or other judicial officer possessing criminal jurisdiction within the said Territory and every such Judge or other officer may exercise accordingly the jurisdiction conferred by the Act upon a Magistrate.

4. So much of the fifth section of the said Act as relates to the information to be given by the Magistrate to a fugitive shall have no application within the said Territory, and in lieu of such information the person acting as the Magistrate shall inform the fugitive that in any British possession to which he may be conveyed he has the right to apply for a writ of habeas corpus or other like process.

5. So much of the sixth section of the said Act as requires the expiration of fifteen days before the issue of a warrant shall have no application within the said Territory.

6. For the purpose of Part II of the said Act the said Territory of Western Samoa and the Dominion of New Zealand shall be deemed to be one group of British possessions.

WHEREAS by Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, c. 29), as amended by the Patents and Designs Act, 1914 (4 & 5 Geo. 5, c. 18), and the Patents and Designs Act, 1919 (9 & 10 Geo. 5, c. 80), it is enacted as follows:—

"91.—(1) If His Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government of any Foreign State for mutual protection of inventions, or designs, or trade marks, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in that State, or his legal representative or assignee, shall be entitled to a patent for his invention or to registration of his design or trade mark under this Act or the Trade Marks Act, 1905, in priority to other applicants; and the patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in the Foreign State:

"Provided that—

"(a) The application is made in the case of a patent within 12 months, and in the case of a design or trade mark within 4 months, from the application for protection in the Foreign State; and

"(b) Nothing in this Section shall entitle the patentee or proprietor of the design or trade mark to recover damages for infringements happening prior to the actual date on which his complete specification is accepted, or his design or trade mark is registered, in this country.

"(2) The patent granted for the invention or the registration of a design or trade mark shall not be invalidated:—

"(a) In the case of a patent, by reason only of the publication of a description of, or use of, the invention; or

"(b) In the case of a design, by reason only of the exhibition or use of, or the publication of a description or representation of, the design; or

"(c) In the case of a trade mark, by reason only of the use of the trade mark, in the United Kingdom or the Isle of Man during the period specified in this Section as that within which the application may be made.

"(3) The application for the grant of a patent, or the registration of a design, or the registration of a trade mark under this Section, must be made in the same manner as an ordinary application under this Act or the Trade Marks Act, 1905:

"Provided that—

"(a) In the case of patents the application shall be accompanied by a complete specification, which, if it is not accepted within the 12 months from the application for protection in the Foreign State, shall with the drawings (if any) be open to public inspection at the expiration of that period; and

"(b) In the case of trade marks, any trade mark the registration of which has been duly applied for in the country of origin may be registered under the Trade Marks Act, 1905.

"(4) The provisions of this Section shall apply only in the case of those Foreign States

with respect to which His Majesty by Order in Council declares them to be applicable, and so long only in the case of each State as the Order in Council continues in force with respect to that State.

"(5) Where it is made to appear to His Majesty that the Legislature of any British Possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs, or trade marks, patented or registered in this country, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to apply the provisions of this Section to that Possession, with such variations or additions, if any, as may be stated in the Order":

And whereas by Section 103 of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by Section 6 of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act (Amendment) Act, 1885, and by Section 1 of the Patents Act, 1901, and since repealed by Section 98 of the said Patents and Designs Act, 1907, provisions were made to the same or like effect as those above set forth as contained in Section 91 of the last-mentioned Act, and by the said Section 98 it was provided that "this repeal shall not affect any Convention, Order in Council, Rule, or Table of Fees having effect under any enactment so repealed, but any such Convention, Order in Council, Rule, or Table of Fees in force at the commencement of this Act shall continue in force, and may be repealed, altered or amended, as if it had been made under this Act":

And whereas it pleased Her late Majesty Queen Victoria to make an arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said Section 103, by and in virtue of a Declaration signed and sealed by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, on the 17th March, 1884, duly conveying the accession of Great Britain and Ireland to the International Convention and Protocol for the protection of Industrial Property, signed by Representatives of certain Powers on the 20th March, 1883, and duly ratified on the 6th June, 1884, power being reserved to Her Majesty to accede thereafter to the provisions of the said Convention and Protocol on behalf of the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, and any of Her Majesty's Possessions, which Declaration of Accession was duly accepted by the French Government on behalf of the Signatory Powers by and in virtue of a Declaration dated the 2nd April, 1884:

And whereas on the 14th December, 1900, at Brussels, an Additional Act was agreed upon between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the Heads of the Foreign Countries parties thereto for the purpose of modifying certain of the provisions of the said International Convention and the Protocol annexed thereto, the ratification of which Additional Act was duly effected:

And whereas by a Convention signed at Washington on the 2nd June, 1911, His Majesty and the Heads of the Foreign States named therein agreed to make certain modifications in and additions to the said Convention dated 20th March, 1883, as revised at Brussels on the 14th December, 1900, the ratification of which Convention was duly effected by Great Britain and certain other States:

And whereas by various Orders in Council Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and His late Majesty King Edward VII. and His present Majesty have been pleased to declare that the hereinbefore mentioned provisions of the said

Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883 (as amended), should apply to the several Foreign Countries named in the said Orders parties to the said Convention and Protocols:

And whereas Roumania has acceded to the said International Convention Protocol and Additional Act as revised as Washington on 2nd June, 1911:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers in Him vested by the above-recited provisions, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth declare, and it is hereby declared, as follows:—

1. The provisions of Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Act, 1907, as amended by the Patents and Designs Act, 1914, and the Patents and Designs Act, 1919, shall apply to Roumania.

2. This Order shall take effect from the 6th October, 1920.

"And whereas it is provided by Order in Council of His late Majesty, dated 25th January, 1908, that an allowance of 2s. a week is to be paid in all Ships in which a Chaplain is allowed, and in other Ships as therein provided, to any properly qualified person of the Ship's Company who plays the harmonium or any other suitable instrument and conducts the Choir during Divine Service:

"And whereas we consider it expedient to increase the allowance payable to such persons in Your Majesty's Naval Training Establishment at Shotley and in Your Majesty's Ships 'Impregnable,' 'Fisgard,' and 'Indus':

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the increase to 10s. a week of the allowance payable in the above Training Establishments to any properly qualified person discharging the duties of Organist and Choir Master, such increase to take effect from the 13th day of August, 1920.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by your Order in Council, to sanction the formation of a special Supernumerary list of Officers retained for Wireless Telegraphy Duties only, under the conditions laid down in the attached Schedule:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.

"SCHEDULE.

"(1) A list of Royal Marine Officers retained for Wireless Telegraphy duties and Supernumerary to the Establishment of the Royal Marine Force to be instituted and to be known as 'The Supernumerary List, Royal Marines (W/T).'

"(2) Officers on this List to be eligible for selection for promotion on the Supernumerary List up to and including the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel: promotion to be considered when the Officer's turn for promotion would have come had he remained on the general active list of Officers. Such Officers not to be required before promotion to pass the military examinations laid down for Royal Marine Officers on the Active List.

"(3) The rates of full, half and retired pay to be the same as for officers of the same rank on the general list and the same rules as to reckoning service and as to retirement, including age for compulsory retirement, retirement for non-service and optional retirement, to apply.

"(4) Officers on this list not to be eligible afterwards to transfer back to the general list."

- "To all Petty Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers who have definite responsibility and charge of Boys out of instructional hours ... 6d.
 "To Leading Seamen employed in the same capacity as above ... 3d.

"These allowances to be payable in Boys and Youths Training Establishments; in Sea-going Training Ships; and, from 1st May, 1919, in the Boy Artificer Training Establishments.

"The allowances not to be payable until the men concerned have completed a period of at least two months on probation and shown themselves fully capable of carrying out the Training duties satisfactorily. Payment then to commence from the date of completing the probationary period.

"The allowances to be payable to Pensioners employed on the above duties with effect from 1st May 1919."

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the proposals contained in the attached two Schedules, the arrangements shown therein to come into force from the dates specified, power being reserved to us to vary the rates of pay shown with the Scales laid down, or to associate payment with such conditions as may be deemed necessary :

" Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

" And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council dated the 25th day of March, 1920, sanction was given for the payment of War Gratuities to Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces who were employed during the late War and paid at Naval rates of pay:

" And whereas we are of opinion that certain Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces who were employed during the late War but were not paid at Naval rates of pay are also deserving of the award of a gratuity on the termination of their services:

" We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the payment at our discretion of gratuities to these Officers as set forth in the attached Schedule:

" The Lords Commissioners of Your

Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.

" **SCHEDULE.**

(1) The Gratuity to be at the rate of 31 days' pay for each complete year of service.

(2) The conditions governing the award to be the same as those which apply to the ordinary War Gratuity.

(3) No Service rendered subsequent to the 1st August, 1919, and no Service for which pay has not been issued direct from Naval Funds, to count for the Gratuity.

(4) The rate of pay on which the Gratuity would be assessed to be not the full pay of the rank held but the pay actually drawn on the 1st August, 1919 (or on the last day of service if previous to that date), or on the 11th November, 1918, if more advantageous, and to be exclusive of the Retired Pay element, if any, merged in such rate of pay.

(5) The gratuity to have retrospective effect to the 2nd August, 1914.

(6) The scheme to apply only to those to whom commissions have been granted. Thus in no circumstances is a gratuity to be paid for any period of service as a civilian or for service by an Officer in a civilian post or capacity. It is likewise not to be issuable to persons who have been continued in their pre-war employment, even though they have been granted Commissions, on the institution to which they belong being taken over for Admiralty purposes.

(7) Officers who are eligible for this gratuity to be demobilised as and when they can be released, on the same lines as other Officers without a month's notice or any pay in lieu thereof being given. In the case of Officers whose services have already been terminated and who have received pay in lieu of notice, the amount of such pay in lieu of notice to be deducted from the gratuity. No deduction to be made in the case of Officers who did duty up to the expiration of the notice given to them.

(8) Any gratuity payable to an Officer under this Authority to be assessed on his service qualifying therefor irrespective of any gratuity for which he may be eligible under Order in Council 25th March, 1920, in respect of some other portion of his war service.

(9) In any matter not affecting the scale herein laid down, the Admiralty to be the sole administrators and interpreters of the rules for the assessment of this Gratuity, and of the eligibility of any Officer or class of Officers for the same."

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all Pay, Pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by His late Majesty's Order in Council of the 22nd day of November, 1909, it is provided that Lieutenants of Your Majesty's Marine Force shall be promoted to the rank of Captain as vacancies occur on the establishment, or, if not sooner promoted, after 11 years from the date of seniority as Second Lieutenant subject to certain conditions:

"And whereas we consider that automatic promotion to the rank of Captain after 11 years bestows upon the Marine Officer an undue advantage over the Naval Officer of corresponding rank:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the substitution of the following Regulation for that contained in the Order in Council of the 22nd day of November, 1909, viz. :—

(1) Lieutenants of the Royal Marines, other than Quartermasters and Officers promoted from Warrant rank for long and zealous service, who have passed the prescribed examination and are considered deserving of advancement, to be promoted to the rank of Captain in vacancies on the Establishment, and if not so promoted within 12 years from date of seniority as Second Lieutenant, to be eligible for promotion to Captain on the expiration of such 12 years, provided that no seniority has been forfeited by sentence of Court Martial or otherwise.

(2) These arrangements not to apply to Marine Officers now serving, and to be subject to the period of service being hereafter

extended if recommended to Your Majesty by us.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal: "

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

WHEREAS by Section 2 of the Poisons and Pharmacy Act, 1908, it is, amongst other things, enacted that "so much of the Pharmacy Act, 1868, as makes it an offence for any person to sell or keep open shop for the sale of poisons, unless he is a duly registered pharmaceutical chemist or chemist and druggist, and conforms to regulations made under section one of that Act, shall not apply in the case of poisonous substances to be used exclusively in agriculture or horticulture for the destruction of insects, fungi, or bacteria, or as sheep dips or weed killers which are poisonous by reason of their containing arsenic, tobacco, or the alkaloids of tobacco, if the person so selling or keeping open shop is duly licensed for the purpose under this section by a local authority, and conforms to any regulations as to the keeping, transporting, and selling of poisons made under this section, but nothing in this section shall exempt any person so licensed from the requirements of any other provision of the Pharmacy Act, 1868, or of the Arsenic Act, 1851, relating to poisons;" and that "His Majesty may by Order in Council make regulations as to

"(a) the granting of licences under this section; and

"(b) the duration, renewal, revocation, suspension, extent, and production of such licences; and

"(c) the keeping, inspection, and copying of registers of licences; and

"(d) the fees to be charged for licences and for inspection and copying of registers; and

"(e) the keeping, transporting, and selling of the poisonous substances to which this section applies;

and generally for the purposes of carrying this section into effect":

And whereas by Orders in Council, dated respectively the 2nd day of April, 1909, and the 10th day of November, 1911, certain Regulations hereinafter called "the principal Regulations," and certain additional Regulations, were severally made in pursuance of the said Act:

And whereas it is expedient that certain further variations should be made in the Regulation numbered 14 of the principal Regulations as varied by the said Order in Council, dated the 10th day of November, 1911:

And whereas the provisions of Section one

of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby make the Regulation which is hereunto annexed, and doth hereby order that that Regulation do come into force forthwith, and do continue in force until revoked or varied by any Regulation which may hereafter be made under the said recited enactment.

REGULATION REFERRED TO IN THE FOREGOING ORDER IN COUNCIL.

POISONS AND PHARMACY ACT, 1908.

The following Regulation shall be substituted in place of No. 14 of the principal Regulations as varied by the Order in Council dated the 10th day of November, 1911:

A poisonous substance shall not be sold except in an enclosed vessel or receptacle as received from the manufacturer, which vessel or receptacle must be of sufficient strength to withstand rough usage, securely closed and free from leakage and distinctly labelled with the name of the substance and the word "Poison," and with the name and address of the seller, as provided by Section 17 of the Pharmacy Act, 1868, and also with a notice of the special purpose for which it has been prepared. For the purposes of this Regulation the person on whose behalf any sale is made shall be deemed to be the seller.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, and of the Act of the 5th year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (Session 2), Chapter 26, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing certain improvements at the Archbishop's House of Residence belonging to the See of York, which is situate at Bishopthorpe, in the County of York:

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, now Archbishop of York, is desirous that certain improvements should be made at the said Archbishop's House of Residence and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed improvements and we have approved the same:

"And whereas the said Archbishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed improvements a sum of £800 (being a

sum which, together with the outstanding balance of the sum already borrowed upon the same security, does not exceed 2 years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Archbishopric of York.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York (testified by his having affixed his signature and Archbishop's Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Archbishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding £800 and that as a security for the same the said Archbishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by Deed for the term of 20 years, or until the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid with the interest for the same as herein-after mentioned and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following: that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of 12 months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Archbishop or his successors shall yearly, at the end of the second period of 12 months so computed and at the end of every such like period of 12 months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, one-fifteenth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of 12 months computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of £4 per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid, and that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as herein-before mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of 40 days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Cosmo Gordon, now Archbishop of York, as every succeeding Archbishop of York until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that the said Governors and their successors shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times

and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the Archbishopal House of Residence aforesaid.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of York.

“ Whereas by the authority of an Instrument bearing date the 11th day of November, 1845, and being under the Common Seal of the late Church Building Commissioners and under the hand and seal of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, then Bishop of Winchester, certain portions of the Parish of Christchurch and the Chapelry of Holdenhurst, in the said County of Southampton, and in the said Diocese of Winchester, were assigned as a Particular District to the consecrated Church of Saint Peter, situate at Bournemouth, in the said Chapelry of Holdenhurst, and the said

Particular District was called ‘ The Particular District of Saint Peter, Bournemouth ’ :

“ And whereas the said Particular District of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, has under the provisions of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, become a New Parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and by the above-mentioned Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94 :

“ And whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 21st day of February, 1874, and published in the London Gazette on the 24th day of the same month, part of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, was constituted a separate District for spiritual purposes, and the said District was named ‘ The District of Saint Michael, Bournemouth ’ :

“ And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 25th day of July, 1882, and published in the London Gazette on the 28th day of the same month, part of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, was constituted a separate District for spiritual purposes, and the said District was named ‘ The District of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth ’ :

“ And whereas the said district of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, and the said District of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, have become New Parishes of the character contemplated by the above-mentioned Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37; by the above-mentioned Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104; and by the above-mentioned Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94 :

“ And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, of the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, and of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned :

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or Representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, and the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, shall be altered so that (first) all those portions of the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, and of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, which are described in the First Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the Map or Plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such New Parishes and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth; and (secondly) all that portion of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, which is described in the Second Schedule hereunder written and is

delineated and set forth upon the said Map or Plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from such New Parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or any of them, or any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

The territory to be annexed to the New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, in the County of Southampton and in the Diocese of Winchester, being

(1) All that portion of the New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon the east by the New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, upon the north-east by the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, upon the west by the New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Bournemouth, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of Queen's Road near its junction with Suffolk Road where the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Bournemouth, an isolated portion of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, and the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, all meet, and extending thence first eastward to and then first north-eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of Suffolk Road for a distance in all of 25 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Crescent Road upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, from the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth.

(2) And also all that portion of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, which is bounded upon the north-east by the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, upon the west and upon the south-west by the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, from the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, at the junction of the road leading along the north-eastern side of The Triangle with Commercial Road, and extending thence first north-eastward, and then south-eastward along the middle of Commercial Road for a distance of 11½ chains or thereabouts to The Square, and extending thence south-eastward in a straight line for a distance of 3 chains or thereabouts to the point near the middle of The Square at the southern angle of the boundary of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth.

"THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

The territory to be dissevered from the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, and to be annexed to the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, being:—

All that portion of the said New Parish of

Saint Peter, Bournemouth, which is bounded upon the south by the Sea, upon the east and upon the north-east by the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Michael, Bournemouth, from the said isolated portion of the New Parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, at the junction of Poole Road with Clarendon Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Clarendon Road for a distance of 24 chains or thereabouts to its junction with West Cliff Road and the road called West Overcliff Drive, and extending thence first southward, then south-eastward and then again southward along the middle of West Overcliff Drive for a distance of 13 chains or thereabouts to its junction with McKinley Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of McKinley Road for a distance of 2 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such road across Middle Chine, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said chine for a distance of 19 chains or thereabouts to the Sea."

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Winchester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th

years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called the said Benefice) of Llandinabo, in the County of Hereford and in the Diocese of Hereford:

"Whereas under or by virtue of (1) the will, dated the 5th day of July, 1869, of Samuel Richard Bosanquet, of Dingestow Court, in the County of Monmouth, Esquire, who departed this life on the 27th day of February, 1882, and whose said will was (together with two codicils not affecting the subject of this transfer) proved on the 26th day of February, 1883, in the Principal Probate Registry by the executors therein named, (2) an Indenture bearing date the 1st day of June, 1883, and expressed to be made between the Reverend George William Pigott, of the one part, Samuel Courthope Bosanquet, of Dingestow Court aforesaid, Esquire, the Reverend Claude Bosanquet, of Number 31, Cheriton Gardens, Folkestone, in the County of Kent, Clerk in Holy Orders (since deceased), and Frederick Albert Bosanquet, of Number 3, King's Bench Walk, Temple, in the City of London, one of Her Majesty's Counsel, of the other part, (3) an Indenture of Disentail dated the 14th day of March, 1890, and expressed to be made between the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet, of the first part, Samuel Ronald Courthope Bosanquet, the eldest son of the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet, of the second part, and Charles Thomas Arnold, of the third part, (4) an Indenture of Appointment dated the 2nd day of June, 1890, and expressed to be made between the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet, of the first part, the said Samuel Ronald Courthope Bosanquet, of the second part, and the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet, Claude Bosanquet (since deceased), and Frederick Albert Bosanquet, of the third part, and (5) an Indenture of Re-settlement dated the 11th day of November, 1890, and expressed to be made between the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet, of the first part, the said Samuel Ronald Courthope Bosanquet, of the second part, and the said Charles Thomas Arnold, of the third part, supplemental to the before-mentioned Indenture of Disentail, of the 14th day of March, 1890, the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Llandinabo is now vested in the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet and Frederick Albert Bosanquet as the surviving trustees of the said will of the said Samuel Richard Bosanquet (hereinafter collectively referred to as 'the Trustees') and stands limited to such uses as the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet and Samuel Ronald Courthope Bosanquet shall from time to time or at any time by any deed or deeds revocable or irrevocable jointly appoint and the Trustees and the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet and Samuel Ronald Courthope Bosanquet are accordingly the persons whose consents are necessary to this present transfer:

"And whereas the said Samuel Courthope Bosanquet and Samuel Ronald Courthope Bosanquet are desirous that the whole Advow-

son or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Llandinabo in respect of which they have such power of appointment as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said Diocese of Hereford and the Trustees have agreed to concur in such transfer in manner hereafter appearing:

"And whereas the Right Reverend Herbert Hensley, now Bishop of Hereford, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said Herbert Hensley, Bishop of Hereford, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Edwyn, Bishop of Southwell, (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and Episcopal Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, first a new Rural Deanery shall be formed out of the Rural Deanery of Alfreton, within the said Archdeaconry of Chesterfield, and shall be named the 'Rural Deanery of Heanor' and shall comprise and consist of the Parishes or Cures of Codnor and Loscoe; Heanor; Ironville; St. Andrew, Langley Mill; Pentrich; and Ripley; and secondly, a new Rural Deanery shall be formed out of the Rural Deanery of Staveley within the said Archdeaconry of Chesterfield, and shall be named 'the Rural Deanery of Bolsover' and shall comprise and consist of the Parishes and Cures of Barlborough; Bolsover; Clown; Elmton with Cresswell; Pleasley; Scarcliffe; Shirebrook; Upper Langwith; and Whitwell; and each of the said Parishes or Cures hereinbefore referred to shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean of the Rural Deanery in which it is hereby included or to which it is hereby transferred, and shall not belong to or be a part of any other Rural Deanery, nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other Rural Dean.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid, or any of them by virtue of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas a notice of the said Scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Archdeacon affected by the Scheme, that is to say, to the Archdeacon of Chesterfield, and he has expressed his approval of the same:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Southwell.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM.

THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES (GAS AND COAL) (SCOTLAND) ORDER, 1920, DATED OCTOBER 16, 1920, MADE BY THE SECRETARY FOR SCOTLAND UNDER REGULATIONS 2J AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by Regulation 2J as read with Regulation 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations and by arrangement with the Board of Trade, I hereby order as follows:—

(1) In this Order the expression "Local Authority" shall mean the Council of a County or Burgh or any District Committee to which a County Council shall delegate its powers under the Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920.

(2) I hereby confer and impose upon the Local Authority and upon such of their officers as they may designate or appoint for the purpose the powers and duties necessary to provide for the due discharge within their district, in conformity with the Defence of the Realm Regulations, of the functions assigned to Local Authorities by the Gas and Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920, the Lighting, Heating and Power

(Emergency) Order, 1920, and the Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920.

(3) (a) Any expenses incurred by a Local Authority in the execution of this Order shall be defrayed out of the public health general assessment provided that such expenses shall not be reckoned in any calculation as to the statutory limit of that assessment.

(b) Where any Local Authorities have combined for any of the purposes of this Order, any expenses incurred by these Local Authorities under this Order shall be defrayed in such proportions as may be agreed upon, or in default of agreement as may be determined by me.

(4) A District Committee, Parish Council, Education Authority or other local body may make available without charge, or on such terms as may be agreed, to a Local Authority or to any Committee appointed by the Authority, any of their premises and the services of any of their officers for the purposes of the Gas and Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920, the Lighting, Heating and Power (Emergency) Order, 1920, and the Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920.

(5) This Order may be cited as the Local Authorities (Gas and Coal) (Scotland) Order, 1920.

The Trade Board further give notice, that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 14th October, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the variation of the Minimum Rates by the Trade Board, and specifying 18th October, 1920,* as the date from which the variation of such Minimum Rates shall become effective.

- For Workers under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour.
- For Workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour.
- For Workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES AND OVERTIME RATES (AS FIXED AND AS VARIED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS. EFFECTIVE AS FROM 18TH OCTOBER, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by

(B) Minimum Rates as Varied, effective as from 18th October, 1920:—

For Workers of 18 years of age and over:—

(a) Who have not completed six months' employment in the trade, 7½d. per hour.

(b) Who have completed six months' employment in the trade, 8d. per hour.

PART II.

Overtime Rates—Male and Female Workers—All Ages.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 48.

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on generally recognised district Holidays not exceeding six in number in any one year shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Male and Female Workers in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the normal number of hours declared by the Trade Board, as set out in Section I of this Part of this Notice, shall be as follows:—

(1) For all time worked on Sundays and on generally recognised district Holidays not exceeding six in number in any one year, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time.

(2) For all time worked in excess of 48 hours in any week the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half, except in so far as Double Time is payable under the provisions of paragraph (1) of this Section.

NOTE.—The hours which Female Workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART III.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Scotland in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

The manufacture, wherever carried on, of mineral or aerated waters, non-alcoholic cordials, flavoured syrups, unfermented sweet drinks and other similar beverages, and the manufacture in unlicensed premises of brewed liquors,

including:—

(a) The operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling and all other operations preparatory to the sale of any of the afore-said liquors in bottles, jars, syphons, casks or other similar receptacles; and

including also:—

(b) The operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling, and all subsidiary operations preparatory to the sale in bottles, jars or other similar receptacles of cider, ale, stout, porter and other alcoholic beers, where all or any of such last-mentioned operations are, or is, conducted or carried on in asso-

ciation with or in conjunction with all or any of the operations specified under (a) above so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for workers, and whether the two sets of operations or any of them are, or is, carried on simultaneously or not.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.
