

enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented;

(b) In such partly walled graves and earthen graves as are now existing in the Chapelyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the said Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1855, it is (amongst other things) provided that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to vary any Order in Council made under (amongst others) the Burial Act, 1853, as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the said Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield), ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, did make a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, so much of the said Order in Council of the 3rd day of October, 1895, as relates to burials in the Wesleyan Chapel and Chapelyard, Grimesthorpe, in the Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield) aforesaid, should be varied as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 22nd July, 1920, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 1st day of September, 1920, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that so much of the said Order in Council of the 3rd day of October, 1895, as relates to burials in the Wesleyan Chapel and Chapelyard, Grimesthorpe, in the Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield) aforesaid, be varied so as to provide that burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the said Chapelyard in the said Parish.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of *Nevern*, in the County of *Pembroke*, and to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of *Belchamp Walter*, in the County of *Essex*, 10 days' previous Notice of his intention in that behalf, did, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, make Representations to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any Burial Ground in the Civil Parish of *Nevern*, in the said County of *Pembroke*, and in the Civil Parish of *Belchamp Walter*, in the said County

of *Essex*, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that Burials should be discontinued therein, as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 13th August, 1920, Notice of such Representations was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 21st September, 1920, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parishes of *Nevern* and *Belchamp Walter*, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

NEVERN.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of *St. Brynach*, *Nevern*, and in the Churchyard attached thereto, except as follows:—

(a) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave;

(b) In the said Churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

BELCHAMP WALTER.—Forthwith and entirely in the *Belchamp Walter* Parish Church and in the Churchyard attached thereto.

Provided that in earthen graves now existing in the said Churchyard the burial may be allowed of the bodies of the following persons at their decease, viz., *Mrs. Margaret Montague Raymond*, *Mr. John Hayward Peigg*, *Dr. Perry* and *Mrs. Golding*, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall in any case be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
