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TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918. LAUNDRY TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN.)

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED) FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

EFFECTIVE AS FROM 8TH NOVEMBER, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for that branch of the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirt-making) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, having given due notice on 19th July, 1920, of proposal to vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates, Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-workers, and Overtime Rates for Female Workers as set out in their Notice, dated 14th November, 1919, hereby give notice, that they have varied the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates, Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-workers and Overtime Rates for Female Workers, the Minimum Rates as varied being as shown in the Schedule set out below which is incorporated herewith.

The Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 2nd November, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates as varied by the Trade Board and specifying 8th November, 1920*, as the date from which such rates shall become effective.

* *Note.*—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period but in any case not later than 13th November, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

Minimum Rates of Wages (as Varied) for Female Workers other than Those Specified in Part II of this Schedule.

SECTION I.—General Minimum Time-Rates.

For Workers under 15 years of age, 12s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 2d. per hour.

For Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 4d. per hour.

For Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 5d. per hour.

For Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6½d. per hour.

For Workers of 18 years of age and over, 30s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 7½d. per hour.

Provided that—

(a) The Minimum Rates for Workers of 16 and under 18 years of age who have had less than six months' experience in the laundering of articles of any description or in the processes and operations incidental

thereto in any laundry which is carried on by way of trade or for the purpose of gain, or as ancillary to another business shall be:—

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 4d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 5d. per hour.

(b) The Minimum Rate for Workers of 18 years of age and over who have had less than 12 months' experience in the branches of Trade specified in paragraph (a) above shall be:—

During the period of employment required to complete the 1st six months of such experience, 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6½d. per hour.

During the period of employment required to complete the 2nd six months of such experience, 27s. 6d. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6¾d. per hour.

SECTION II.—*Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate.*

(a) For Female Workers of all ages, 9d. per hour.

(b) In cases where a Worker is employed upon Piece-work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker (*i.e.*, a Worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question), not less than 9d. per hour.

SECTION III.—*Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-Workers.*

For Workers under 15 years of age, 12s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 3d. per hour.

For Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 4d. per hour.

For Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 18s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 4½d. per hour.

For Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 22s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 5½d. per hour.

For Workers of 18 years of age and over, 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6¼d. per hour. Provided that—

(a) The Minimum Rate for Workers of 16 and under 18 years of age who have had less than six months' experience in the branches of Trade specified in paragraph (a) of the proviso to Section I above shall be:—

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 4d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 5d. per hour.

(b) The Minimum Rate for Workers of 18 years of age and over who have had less than 12 months' experience in the branches of Trade specified in paragraph (a) of the proviso to Section I above shall be:—

During the period of employment required to complete twelve months of such experience, 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6½d. per hour.

SECTION IV.—The above Rates are Hourly Rates, and are payable in respect of each hour of employment, except in so far as higher rates are payable under the provisions of Part III below.

PART II.

Minimum Rates of Wages (as Varied) for Female Workers Specially Employed for Emergency Work or whose Employment is of a Casual Nature.

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, the following shall be the Minimum Rates for Workers who are specially employed for emergency work or whose employment is of a casual nature.

SECTION I.—*General Minimum Time-Rates.*

For Workers under 18 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For Workers of 18 years of age and over, 8d. per hour.

SECTION II.—*Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate.*

(a) For Female Workers of all ages, 9½d. per hour.

(b) In cases where a Worker is employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker (*i.e.*, a Worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question), not less than 9½d. per hour.

PART III.

Overtime Rates (as Varied) for all Female Time-Workers.

SECTION I.—The Trade Board hereby declare, in accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that the normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

In any week, 48 hours.

On Saturday or the weekly half-holiday, 5 hours.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of all hours worked in excess of the declared normal number of hours per week and for all hours worked in excess of the declared number of hours for Saturday or the weekly half-holiday, notwithstanding in this case that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48, shall be as follows:—

(a) For Female Workers as specified in Part I of this Schedule:—

Workers under 15 years of age, 3¾d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7¾d. per hour.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 9½d. per hour.

(b) For Female Workers as specified in Part II of this Schedule:—

Workers under 18 years of age, 9½d. per hour.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 10d. per hour.

Provided that for all time worked where allowed by an exemption order under Section 150 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the Overtime Rate for all hours worked in excess of nine on Saturday and Sunday shall be One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(c) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece-workers.

NOTE.—The hours which women, young per-

sons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Female Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919 (that is to say, the laundering of articles of every description and all processes and operations incidental thereto performed by way of trade or for the purpose of gain), as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, by virtue of which all processes of laundering and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the

articles specified in the Appendices to the three last-mentioned Orders are excluded from the scope of the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

The above Minimum Rates are without prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages.

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for that branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they PROPOSE TO VARY the General Minimum Time-Rates Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, Guaranteed Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers which become effective from 8th November, 1920, and set out in their Notice dated 4th November, 1920, the proposed Variations being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

This Notice is issued with the consent of the Minister of Labour.

- (I) The Trade Board propose to declare in accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that the normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

On Saturday or the weekly half-holiday	5 "

Provided that:—

All hours worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

- (II) The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a female worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

- (a) For all hours worked in excess of 5 on Saturday or the weekly half-holiday the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter, for the first two hours, and One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time and-a-Half, thereafter, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.
- (b) For all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Double Time, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.
- (c) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours and Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-Sections (a) and (b) of this Section.
- (d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece-Workers.

NOTE.—The hours which women, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

- (c) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours and Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-Section (b) of this Section.
- (d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece Workers.

NOTE.—The hours which women, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART III.

SECTION I.—The Proposed Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Female Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919 (that is to say, the laundering of articles of every description and all processes and operations incidental thereto performed by way of trade or for the purpose of gain), as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, by virtue of which all processes of laundering and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles specified in the Appendices to the three last-mentioned Orders are excluded from the scope of the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919.

SECTION II.—The Proposed Minimum Rates set out in the Schedule shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactment, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

The Proposed Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule are without prejudice to Workers earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any OBJECTIONS to this above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 8th November, 1920. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Laundry Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely and, so far as possible, with reasons what is objected to.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FIXED FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

Effective as from 8th November, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, in England and Wales for the Milk Distributive trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Milk Distributive) Order, 1920, having given due notice on 14th June, 1920, and 5th August, 1920, of Proposal to Fix General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that THEY HAVE FIXED General Minimum Time Rates and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers, and HAVE DECLARED the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, and that the Minimum Rates as fixed and the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade are as shown below.

And the Trade Board FURTHER GIVE NOTICE that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 1st November, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates as fixed by the Trade Board, and specifying 8th November, 1920,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates shall become effective.

* NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full-pay period, but in no case later than 14th November, 1920.

Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (All Ages).

SECTION (i.).—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows :—

In any week ...	48
On any day other than Sundays and customary public holidays and statutory holidays ...	7
On Sundays and customary public holidays and statutory holidays ...	6

SECTION (ii.).—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows :—

A. As respects all workers other than shop

assistants (as defined in Part IV. (iii.) of this Notice) and clerks :

(a) For the second hour of Overtime on any day except the day which constitutes the usual weekly half-holiday, Sundays and Customary Public Holidays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—*i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(b) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public Holidays and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime after the first hour of Overtime on the day which constitutes the usual weekly half-holiday, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—*i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

(c) For all Overtime after the first hour of Overtime worked on Sundays and Customary Public Holidays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—i.e., Double Time.

Provided, that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on six days in the week:—

The Overtime Rates shall be payable only where on any day (except Sundays and Customary Public Holidays and Statutory Holidays) the number of hours worked exceeds eight; and in the case of Sundays and Customary Public Holidays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rates shall be payable only where on any of these days the number of hours worked exceeds six.

NOTE.—During the first hour in excess of seven hours on any day other than Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and during the first hour in excess of six hours on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the minimum rate applicable shall be the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Parts I. and II. above.

B. As respects Shop Assistants (as defined in Part IV. (iii.) of this Notice) and Clerks:

(a) For all hours in excess of six hours on Sundays and on Customary Public Holidays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—i.e., Double Time.

(b) For all hours in excess of six hours of Overtime in any week the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—i.e., Time-and-a-Half; except in so far as a higher Overtime Rate may be payable under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Sub-Section B. (Except as respects Overtime on Sundays and on Customary Public Holidays and Statutory Holidays, no Overtime Rates shall be payable in any week until 54 hours have been worked).

NOTE.—During the first six hours in excess of 48 in any week the minimum rate applicable shall be the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Parts I. and II. above, except in so far as a higher rate may be payable under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Sub-Section B.

PART IV.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

SECTION (i.).—A Foreman is a person who is employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Milk Distributive) Order, 1920, and to whom is deputed the duty of exercising supervising authority over workers exceeding five in number (exclusive of the foreman) working in any shop, department, or other branch of the trade.

SECTION (ii.).—A Roundswoman is a female person in charge of a round or rounds.

SECTION (iii.).—A Shop Assistant is a male or female person wholly or mainly employed in a shop in serving customers and/or in checking in and out.

PART V.

The Minimum Rates set out in the respective Scales A, B and C in Parts I and II of this Notice shall apply as follows:—

SECTION (i.).—The Rates set out in Scale A shall apply to areas administered by Rural District Councils, but shall not apply to any town or village having a population exceeding 10,000 within any Rural District Council Area.

SECTION (ii.). The Rates set out in Scale B shall apply to all areas other than those specified in Sections (i) and (iii) of this part of this Notice.

SECTION (iii.).—The Rates set out in Scale C shall be applicable to London; that is to say, the City of London and the Metropolitan Police Districts, except such parts as are administered by a Rural District Council.

Provided that the Rate applicable to a roundsman or a roundswoman shall be determined by reference to the area in which the greater part of his or her round of distribution lies.

PART VI.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in England and Wales, in respect of any time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Milk Distributive) Order, 1920; that is to say:—

1. (a) The wholesale or retail sale of fresh milk, when carried on as a main or distinct business, or as a distinct branch or department of a business.

(b) The sale of food or drink for consumption on the premises, or of other goods when any such sale is carried on in association with and as a subsidiary part of such business, branch or department as aforesaid, if such sale involves the employment of workers who are principally employed in the sale specified in (a) above.

2. (a) The following operations, when incidental to the sales specified in 1 above:—

(i) Boxing, parcelling, labelling, weighing, measuring, checking, bottling, unpacking, packing.

(ii) Collecting, delivering, despatching, horse-keeping, cleaning vehicles.

(iii) Portering, lift or hoist operating, time-keeping, storing, stock-keeping, warehousing, cleaning premises.

(iv) Pasteurising, cooling, separating of milk.

(v) Cleaning utensils or receptacles.

(vi) Blending, testing, sampling.

(vii) Other incidental operations.

(b) Clerical work or canvassing when incidental to and carried on in conjunction with the work specified in 1 above.

But excluding any operations in:—

(a) The transport of goods by common carriers.

(b) Any industry or trade concerned exclusively with carting and operations incidental thereto.

(c) Post Office business.

(d) Agriculture within the meaning of the Corn Production Act, 1917.

PART VII.

SECTION (i.).—The above General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid

clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION (II).—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, to workers of greater skill or length of experience, or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Toy Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Toy) Order, 1920, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime-Rates for Male and Female Workers, and to declare the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates as set out below:—

PART I.

PROPOSED GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR
MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.—For Male Workers.

Workers under 15 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 4d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 5d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 24s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 6d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 28s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 7d. per hour.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 36s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 9d. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 44s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 11d. per hour.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 52s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 1s. 1d. per hour.

Workers of 21 years of age and over, 64s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 1s. 4d. per hour.

SECTION II.—For Female Workers.

Workers under 15 years of age, 12s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 3d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 4d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 5d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 24s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 6d. per hour.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 30s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 31s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 7¾d. per hour.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 32s. per week of 48 hours—i.e., 8d. per hour.

Workers of 21 years of age and over, 34s. per week of 48s. hours—i.e., 8½d. per hour.

SECTION III.—The Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Sections I and II. of this Part of this Notice for Workers under 21 years of age shall be payable subject to the proviso that such workers are employed under conditions which, in the circumstances of the case, offer a reasonable prospect of advancement to the General Minimum Time-Rate of 1s. 4d. per hour in the case of Male Workers and of 8½d. per hour in the case of Female Workers. Otherwise the General Minimum Time-Rate payable to workers under 21 years of age shall be 1s. 4d. per hour in the case of Male Workers and 8½d. per hour in the case of Female Workers, irrespective of age.

PART II.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Male and Female
Workers employed on Time-Work.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	48
On any day other than Saturday	8¾
On Saturday	4½

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Trade Board propose to Fix Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker employed on time-work in any branch of the Trade specified in Part III of this Schedule in excess of the declared normal number of hours as follows:—

For Male and Female Workers employed on Time-Work:

1. For the first two hours overtime on any day except Saturday, Sunday or Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., time-and-a-quarter.

2. For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., time-and-a-half.

3. For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., double-time.

4. For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of this Section.

Provided that:—

(a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable where on any of

such five days the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.

(b) Where a worker (e.g., a worker of the Jewish Religion) is customarily employed on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out above shall apply to such worker in like manner as if in the provisions of this part of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

Note.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART III.

The above proposed Minimum Rates shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts; to all Male and Female Workers (including Homeworkers) in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Toy) Order, 1920; that is to say, the manufacture of articles intended for the amusement of children, including dolls, metal, wooden or other hard toys, soft toys, books made from textile materials, requisites for table games, bricks, blocks, puzzles, balls, Christmas crackers, Easter eggs, masks or drums,

including also—

(a) The assembling of parts of any of the above-mentioned articles.

(b) The operations of storing, boxing, packeting, labelling, or despatching, and all other warehousing or packing operations incidental to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

but excluding

(a) The manufacture of toys when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of other articles, so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers.

(b) The manufacture of sports requisites.

(c) The manufacture of toy perambulators, toy wheel barrows, toy scooters, nursery yachts, toy cycles, toy cars, toy horses, dolls' houses, or other similar toys when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of perambulators, invalid carriages or folding push cars, so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers.

(d) The manufacture from ceramic materials of dolls or dolls' parts, dolls' china, marbles or similar articles when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of other pottery.

(e) The making of articles from sugar confectionery.

(f) The making of hollow-ware, including boxes and canisters, from sheet iron, sheet steel or tinplate, or any operations incidental thereto.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall be payable clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Health Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorized by any Act to be made

from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages which may be lodged with them within two months from 8th November, 1920. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Toy Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1920.

*THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (REPAYMENT AND RETURN OF CONTRIBUTIONS) REGULATIONS, 1920.

The Minister of Labour, in pursuance of Sections 25 and 35 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, and all other powers in that behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations:—

REPAYMENT UNDER SECTION 25.

(1) For the purpose of repayments to insured contributors or their personal representatives in accordance with Section 25 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, compound interest at the rate of two and a half per cent. per annum shall be calculated in respect of the period between the end of the insurance year in which the first contribution, being a contribution of which account is to be taken in accordance with that section, was paid and the end of the insurance year coincident with or immediately preceding the date of payment of the last contribution in respect of which repayment is made.

(2) The amount paid in respect of interest shall be such sum as would have accrued if a proportionate part of the difference between the amount paid by the insured contributor in respect of such contributions (exclusive of any contributions refunded under any of the provisions of the Act) and the amount received by way of unemployment benefit had become due at the end of the insurance year in which the first contribution was paid and at the end of each insurance year within the period aforesaid.

(3) Fractions of one penny shall not be taken into account in calculating the amount of the "proportionate part" or in the resultant amount of refund found to be due, and for the purpose of calculating interest each insurance year shall be treated as if it were in fact a complete calendar year

RETURN OF CONTRIBUTIONS PAID IN ERROR.

(4) Where any contributions have been paid in respect of any person under the erroneous belief that the contributions were payable in respect of that person under the general provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, that person and his employer or either of them may make application to the Minister for the return of the contributions so paid by them respectively; and the Minister, if he is satisfied that the contributions paid were in fact so paid as aforesaid, and that they were not payable under the general provisions of the said Act, shall repay to the applicants or either of them a sum equal to the amount of the contributions so paid by them respectively. Provided that in calculating the amount of any repayment to be made to a person under this Regulation there shall be deducted the amount (if any) paid to that person by way of unemployment benefit in respect of or by reason of those contributions.

(5) An application under Regulation 4 of these Regulations shall be made in such form as the Minister may direct, and such application shall be made within one year from the date on which the last contribution so paid as aforesaid was in fact paid.

(6) These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Repayment and Return of Contributions) Regulations, 1920, and shall come into operation on the eighth day of November, 1920.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT,
1920.THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (TRANSITIONAL)
REGULATIONS, 1920.

The Minister of Labour, in pursuance of Section 35 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, and all other powers in this behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations:—

1. (1) These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Transitional) Regulations, 1920, and shall come into operation on the 8th day of November, 1920.

(2) The expression "the Act" means the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920. The expression "day" means any period of twenty-four hours, but does not include any part of a day being Sunday.

2. These Regulations shall apply only to persons who are insured or are required to be insured under the Act and who were also insured or required to be insured under the provisions of the National Insurance (Unemployment) Acts, 1911 to 1919, and any reference in these Regulations to a person insured or required to be insured under the Act, shall be deemed to include, where necessary, a person insured or required to be insured under

the National Insurance (Unemployment) Acts, 1911 to 1919.

Contributions.

3. Where a period of employment commences before the 8th November, 1920, and continues on or after that date and contributions are payable under the National Insurance (Unemployment) Acts, 1911 to 1919, in respect of that part of the period before the 8th November, 1920, and under the Act in respect of that part of the period on or after the 8th November, 1920, a contribution shall be paid in respect of the former part of the period in the manner and at the time and rate prescribed in the Regulations made under the National Insurance (Unemployment) Acts, 1911 to 1919, and shall be deemed to be a contribution properly paid under the said Acts, and a contribution shall be paid in respect of the latter part of the period in the manner and at the time and rate prescribed by the Regulations under the Act.

4. For the purposes of Section 46 (1) of the Act a fraction of a contribution in the total number of contributions paid in respect of any person under the National Insurance (Unemployment) Acts, 1911 to 1919, may be disregarded.

Benefit.

5. Two periods of unemployment of not less than two days each, separated by a period of not more than two days, during which the insured contributor has not been employed for more than twenty-four hours shall be treated as a continuous period of unemployment, notwithstanding that some or all of the days are days prior to the commencement of the Act.

6. Where a continuous period of unemployment commences prior to the 8th November, 1920, and extends to or after that date, unemployment benefit shall be payable after the first six days counting from the commencement of the period or after the first three days counting from the 8th November, 1920, whichever is the earlier.

7. Where a period of unemployment of not less than six days of which some or all are before the 8th November, 1920, is followed within six weeks by a period of unemployment either

(a) commencing on or after the 8th November, 1920, and consisting of three days; or

(b) commencing before the 8th November, 1920, and containing at least three days not before that date; or

(c) consisting of not less than six days of which at least one was on or after that date,

then those two periods shall be treated as if they were a continuous period of unemployment, and the expression "continuously unemployed" shall be construed accordingly wherever it occurs in the Act or in any regulations made thereunder.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT,
1920.

THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (ARRANGEMENTS UNDER SECTION 31) REGULATIONS, 1920*.

The Minister of Labour, by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, hereby makes the following Regulations:—

Application for an Arrangement under Section 31.

1. Every application by an employer for an arrangement under Section 31 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") shall be made in such form as the Minister of Labour (hereinafter referred to as "the Minister") may direct.

Employer to Deposit with the Minister Sum Sufficient to Cover Estimated Amount of Contributions.

2. Every arrangement made by the Minister with an employer under Section 31 of the Act for the performance of all or any of the duties of the employer required under the Act, or under the National Health Insurance Acts, 1911 to 1920, shall provide that the employer shall deposit with the Minister a sum sufficient to cover the estimated maximum amount of the contributions payable by the employer during a period of fourteen weeks or such less period as may be agreed between him and the Minister, both on his own behalf and on behalf of the persons in respect of whom the arrangement is made, and that the employer shall not, unless such a deposit is made, be entitled to make deductions under sub-section (4) of Section 5 of the Act, or under sub-section (2) of Section 4 of Part I. of the National Insurance Act, 1911, from any wages or other payments due by him to any of those persons.

Right to Inspect Book or Card in Custody of Employment Exchange Under an Arrangement.

3. Every person shall have the same right of inspecting his book or card while it is in the custody of a Local Office of the Ministry, by virtue of an arrangement under Section 31 of the Act as he would have had if the book or card had been in the custody of the employer, and the provisions of the Unemployment Insurance (Collection of Contributions) Regulations, 1920, and National Health Insurance (Collection of Contributions) Consolidated Regulations, 1918 to 1920, relating to the right of any person to inspect his book or card shall apply accordingly with the substitution of the Minister for the employer, and the arrangement shall be such as to make the position of such person as regards obtaining possession and making delivery of his book or card in accordance with the provisions of the Regulations referred to substantially as favourable as if no arrangement had been made.

Provisions as to Payment by Employer of Costs Incurred by Exchequer.

4. Every such arrangement shall provide for the payment by the employer of a sum calculated in accordance with a scale approved by the Treasury for performing on behalf of the employer such of the duties imposed on him by

the Act or under the National Health Insurance Acts, 1911 to 1920, as are performed by the Ministry of Labour under the arrangement.

Power to Cancel Arrangements.

5. The Minister may at any time, by notice in writing to that effect, cancel as from the date of the notice or any later date specified in the notice, any arrangement made with an employer under Section 31 of the Act, if, in his opinion, the employer ceases to comply with any of the conditions contained in the arrangement or in these Regulations, without prejudice, however, to the right of the employer to receive such sums as may be repayable in respect of the balance of the deposit held by the Minister under the arrangement, or to the payment by the employer of such sums as may be payable under the arrangement by him to the Minister in respect of any period prior to the termination of the arrangement.

Definitions.

6. For the purpose of these Regulations the terms "Book" and "Local Office" shall have the meaning attached to them in the Unemployment Insurance (Collection of Contributions) Regulations, 1920, and the term "Card" shall have the meaning attached to it in the National Health Insurance (Collection of Contributions) Consolidated Regulations, 1918 to 1920.

Application as to Scotland and Ireland.

7. A reference in these Regulations to the National Health Insurance (Collection of Contributions) Consolidated Regulations, 1918 to 1920, shall include a reference to the corresponding Regulations for Scotland and Ireland.

Commencement and Short Title.

8. These Regulations shall come into operation on the 8th day of November, 1920, and may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Arrangements under Section 31) Regulations, 1920.

(1) As a gatekeeper at a Hospital, whose duties are to open and shut gates, keep a gate-book, and see that only authorised people come in and go out.

(2) As a sempstress at a Training Colony, whose duties are to sew and mend underwear, &c., of the staff and patients.

(3) As a baker at a Hospital, whose duties are to bake bread and cakes.

(4) As a caretaker at a Casual Ward, whose duties are to clean and look after a casual ward not in use.

(5) As a yard foreman at a Hospital, whose duties are to take charge of stable staff and motor drivers.

(6) As a foreman at a Hospital, whose duties are to supervise the porter staff for the carrying in and out of patients and stores.

(7) As a ward-maid at a Hospital, whose duties are to clean wards and bring in meals for patients.

(8) As an attendant in a Casual Ward, whose duties are to receive and look after the inmates.

(9) As a driver mechanic at a Hospital, whose duties are to drive cars and execute slight repairs.

(10) As a motor-driver at an Ambulance Station, whose duties are to drive ambulances.

(11) As a stores porter at a Training Colony, whose duties are to receive, check and issue stores, food and clothing.

(12) As a porter at a Training Colony, whose duties are to carry coals and furniture, clean windows, and carry patients in and out.

(13) As a stableman at a Laboratory, whose duties are to clean stables and feed horses.

(14) As a head laundress at a Training

Colony, whose duties are to supervise the washing of clothes, linen, etc.

(15) As a Laundry man at a Training Colony, whose duties are to wash clothes, linen, etc.,

is such employment as to make the above persons employed persons within the meaning of the Act, and especially whether such employment is employment in domestic service.

**KENT (FAVERSHAM DISTRICT) (FOOT-
AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF
1920 (No. 9).**

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

1.—(1) The Area described in the Schedule hereto is hereby declared to be a Prohibited Area for the purposes of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as the "principal Order."

(2) Part III of that Order is hereby applied to such parts of the Scheduled District which includes the said Prohibited Area as are not within the Prohibited Area.

(3) The provisions of Article 2 of the Kent (Faversham District) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1920 (No. 7) shall continue to apply to the Prohibited Area, and the provisions of Article 6 of the "principal Order" shall be read and have effect subject to this modification.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the ninth day of November, nineteen hundred and twenty.

3. This Order may be cited as the KENT (FAVERSHAM DISTRICT) (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1920 (No. 9), and shall be read with the Kent (Faversham District) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1920 (No. 7) and the Kent (Faversham District) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1920 (No. 8).
