WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 5th day of November, 1920 (C.W. 18,993/20), in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and

Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to approve, *inter alia*, of Chief Officers of Your Majesty's Coast Guard Service (Old Scheme) being eligible for retired pay on the following scale with effect from the 1st April, 1919:—

Maximum.	Minimum.	Addition.
£200	£120	£10 for each year's service in charge of a W./T. or War Signal Station, and £6 for each year's service in charge Stations other than above.

"And whereas on occasion the exigencies of the Service require that a Chief Officer be

appointed to a Station of which he is not actually in charge, and we consider that in these circumstances he should receive, like other Officers of corresponding rank, an increment of retired pay for each complete year of service in his rank:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of Chief Officers of Coast Guard (Old Scheme) being eligible as from the 1st April, 1919, to receive retired pay at our discretion on the following revised scale, subject otherwise to the provisions contained in Section IX., Schedule Y. of Order in Council of the 22nd January, 1920, thus providing for the grant to these Officers of an increment of retired pay in respect of service although not actually in charge of the Stations to which they are appointed:—

Maximum.	Minimum.	Addition.
£200	£120	£6 for each complete year's service as Chief Officer with a further addition thereto of £4 for each complete year's service in charge of W./T. and War Signal Stations.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Article 81 of the Southern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1898 (hereinafter referred to as the Principal Order) it is provided that the British South Africa Company (hereinafter referred to as the Company) shall from time to time assign to the natives inhabiting Southern Rhodesia, land sufficient for their occupation, whether as tribes or portions of tribes, and suitable for their agricultural and pastoral requirements, including in all cases a fair and equitable proportion of springs or permanent water:

And whereas in pursuance of the said Article the Company have from time to time assigned areas of land known as Native Reserves to the natives inhabiting Southern Rhodesia for their occupation as aforesaid:

And whereas by a Commission dated the 5th day of May, 1914, the High Commissioner appointed certain Commissioners (hereinafter referred to as the Southern Rhodesia Native Reserves Commission) to examine the said Native Reserves, having special regard to the

sufficiency of land suitable for the agricultural and pastoral requirements of the natives including in all cases a fair and equitable proportion of springs or permanent water, and bearing in mind not only their present requirements but their probable future necessities consequent on the spread of white settlement to areas not within the Reserves and the growth of the native population, and subject to such alterations by increase or diminution of reserves as they the said Commissioners might think desirable, to make recommendations in order that the said Reserves should be finally assigned and demarcated:

And whereas the Company have now assigned lands for the occupation of natives in accordance with the recommendations contained in the final report of the said Southern Rhodesia Native Reserves Commission, and it is expedient that such land shall be secured for the sole and exclusive use and occupation of natives and that this assignment of lands shall, subject to the provisions of this Order, be taken to be a final assignment to the natives inhabiting Southern Rhodesia of land sufficient for their occupation, as provided by the hereinbefore recited Article 81 of the Principal Order:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Southern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1920, and shall be construed and read as one with the Principal Order.

2. The lands known as native reserves assigned by the Company for the occupation of natives by the Government Notice No. 57 of the 15th February, 1918, as amended by the Government Notices No. 127 of the 19th March, 1920, No. 206 of the 23rd April, 1920, No. 337 of the 25th June, 1920, No. 340 of the 2nd July, 1920, (which notices are republished in the First Schedule to this Order), are hereby vested in the High Commissioner and set apart for the sole and exclusive use and occupation of the native inhabitants of Southern Rhodesia and no such lands shall be alienated except subject to the terms of Article 84 of the Principal Order and the provisions hereinafter contained in this Order. Provided however that no such land shall be alienated under the terms of Article 84 of the Principal Order as sites for townships, unless the High Commissioner is satisfied that such sites are required for the development of important mineral discoveries.

3. It shall be lawful for the Administrator in Executive Council, with the consent of the High Commissioner, to make such adjustments of boundaries as are contemplated by Section 78 of the final report of the Southern Rhodesia Native Reserves Commission (which section is reprinted in the Second Schedule to this Order) provided always that in case of such adjustment the area of no Native Reserve shall be materially affected or diminished thereby. Any lands which either under the provision of this Article or of Article 84 of the Principal Order may be assigned to natives in exchange for land released from the Native Reserves shall thereupon form part of the Native Reserves and be

subject to the terms of Article two of this Order.

4. No person other than a native shall occupy any portion of a Native Reserve except by special permission given in accordance with such regulations as may be issued by the Administrator, with the approval of the High Commissioner.

5. The boundaries of the belt of land six miles wide on each side of the railway line to be constructed between Umvuma and Odzi, which is excluded from the Sabi Reserve by the terms of the Government Notice No. 57 of the 15th February, 1918, shall be defined by a Government Notice to be published in the Gazette and shall be subject to the approval of the High Commissioner, who shall have power to require such modifications of the breadth of the belt (which shall no where exceed twelve miles) to be made as may, in his opinion, be necessary in the interests of native settlements.

6. The re-assignment of the Native Reserves effected by the Government Notices mentioned in Article 2 of this Order shall, subject to the provisions of this Order, be taken to be a final assignment by the Company to natives inhabiting Southern Rhodesia of land sufficient for their occupation, as required by Article 81 of the Principal Order, and that Article is hereby revoked accordingly.

7. In the case of any land hitherto forming part of a Native Reserve but no longer included in any Native Reserve under the provisions of this Order, such land shall be taken to be released from assignment as land for the occupation of natives inhabiting Southern Rhodesia, provided always that for a period of four years from the commencement of this Order no native shall be removed from any such land except in accordance with the provisions of Article 85 (1) of the Principal Order, and all questions relating to the settlement of natives on any such land shall be dealt with and decided in the manner provided by Article 82 of the Principal Order.

Provided further that in the case of the belt of land referred to in Article 5 of this Order, the period of four years hereinbefore mentioned shall be reckoned from the date of the publication of the Government Notice defining the boundaries of such belt.

8. This Order shall come into operation forthwith and shall be published in the Gazette, and the High Commissioner shall give directions for the publication of this Order at such places and in such manner and for such times as he thinks proper for giving the due publicity thereto.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

GOVERNMENT NOTICE 57 OF 15TH FEBRUARY, 1918.

No. 57.] [15th February, 1918.

It is hereby notified that the British South Africa Company has, in terms of Section 81 of the Southern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1898, assigned the land described hereunder for the occupation of natives.

SALISBURY DISTRICT.

Chikwakwa Reserve.—Bounded as follows: From the junction of the Umwindsi and Inyagui rivers, up the latter to its junction with the Nora river; thence up the Nora to its junction with the Chinyika river; thence up the

Chinyika to the south-east beacon of the farm Chinyika; thence along the eastern boundaries of the farms Chinyika, Vuta, Mashona Vley, Mashona Kop, Neptune, Colga, Orihi and Ivanhoe and the north-eastern boundary of Strath Lorne to the Umwindsi river; thence down the Umwindsi river to the starting point.

Chindamora Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by the Poti river; on the east by the farms Bonny and The Vale, and a line joining the south-west beacon of The Vale and the most westerly beacon of Saratoga; on the south by Halstead, a line joining the most westerly beacon of Halstead with the north-east beacon of Borrowdale and Section No. 1 of Borrowdale; on the west by the farms Thelksinoi and Pote, and the Poti river.

Mšana Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by a line drawn through a well defined range of hills forming the southern watershed of the Nyamasanga river, extending east to the Umwindsi river and west to the Chindamora reserve; on the east and south-east by the Umwindsi river and the farms Frascati, Marsala and Saratoga; on the west by the Chindamora reserve.

Kunzwi Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north and west by the Nora river; on the east by the Inyagui river; on the south by a line drawn from the north-west beacon of the farm Middlesex to the junction of the Nora and Nyambanje rivers.

Seki Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the point where the Nyatsimi river crosses the southern boundary of the farm Longlands in an easterly direction along the southern boundaries of Longlands and St. Mary's to the south-east beacon of the latter; thence direct to the south-west beacon of Iddesleigh Extension and along the southern boundary of this farm to the Hunyani river; thence up the Hunyani river to the Dunstan Estate; thence southerly along the western boundary of that estate, and along its southern boundary back to the Hunyani river, and up the Hunyani river to the farm Ardlussa; thence southerly along the western boundary of Ardlussa, and along the southern boundaries of Ardlussa and Great Bromley Estate to the north-west beacon of Hedon; thence along the western boundary of Hedon till the Nyarasheshi river is reached; thence westerly down the Nyarasheshi river, and down the Nyatsimi river to the starting point.

Chinyika Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By the properties Gilnockie, Guernsey, Graseley, Bellevue, Warrendale, Mashonganyika, Bain's Hope, James and Gardiner so as to exclude them all.

HARTLEY DISTRICT.

Mondoro Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the point where the Nyasuisa river crosses the south-eastern boundary of Greendale, near the west beacon of Duiker, down the Nyasuisa to its junction with the Marirangwe river; thence down the Marirangwe to its junction with the Umfuli river; thence down the Umfuli river to its junction with the Doronanga river; thence up the Doronanga, and along the western boundaries of the farms Goral, Brakveld, Adlam's Rest and Wheelerdale and the north-western boundary of Werwaching to the Ngesi river; thence down the Ngesi river to the drift on the old Hunter's road; thence northerly along that road to the drift on the Umsweswe river; thence down the Umsweswe to the eastern boundary of Dawn;

thence along the eastern boundaries of Dawn, Rutala hills and Elandfontein to the Sivundazi river; thence down that river to its junction with the Umfuli river; thence up the Umfuli to its junction with a stream emerging from the farm Fort Martin at its south-east beacon; then up that stream to the southern boundary of Fort Martin, and along the southern, eastern and northern boundaries of that farm, and the eastern boundary of farm Emojeni to its north-east beacon; thence direct to the south-west beacon of farm Malham; thence along the southern boundaries of Malham, Beverly and Linden Park, the eastern boundary of Linden Park, the southern boundaries of Sandringham and Rock, the eastern boundary of Rock, and the south-eastern boundaries of Nyadgori, Serui Source and Greendale to the starting point.

Sanyati Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the junction of the Umniati and Sakugwe rivers, running up the Sakugwe for a distance of seventeen miles direct; thence to the highest point on the Nyamsinu hills; thence to the highest point on the Nyarupise hills and continuing in this direction to the Umniati river; thence down the Umniati river to the starting point.

LOMAGUNDI DISTRICT.

Sipolilo Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the junction of the Dande and Impinge rivers up the Dande to the point in the line joining Gurungwe hill with the geodetic station Nyamanji; thence direct to Gurungwe hill; thence to the north-west beacon of the farm Disi, and along the western boundary of that farm to the Mabare river; thence down the Mabare to the point in the line joining Chiwe hill with the most southerly beacon of the farm Czarna; thence to that beacon and along the south-eastern boundary of Czarna to the Impinge river; thence down the Impinge to the starting point.

Zwimba Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the junction of Hunyani and Karoo rivers, up the Hunyani till the farm Rothwell Extension is reached; thence along the south-west boundary of Rothwell Extension and the north-west boundary of Mowbray to the Umsengaisi river, and down that river to the south-east beacon of Renardia; thence along the eastern boundary of this farm to its northern beacon; thence to Chembere hill; thence to the geodetic station Mtjekwe, on the Mchekakasungabeta range; thence along the crest of this range to a point in the prolongation of the line joining the hills Nyazurge and Ngarire; thence along this said line to the Karoo river, and down the Karoo to its junction with the Hunyani river.

Magondi Reserve.—Bounded as follows: From a point where the Muchi river flows through the Mchekakasungabeta hills, following down that river to its junction with the Wasanje river; thence down the Wasanje river to its junction with the Umfuli river; thence up the latter river to a point to be beaconed at the southern foot of the Mchekakasungabeta hills; thence north along the crest of those hills to the point first named.

Urungwe Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from a point on the Naodsa river, opposite an unnamed hill and shortly below the junction of the Naodsa and Kamsanga rivers, in a south-easterly direction to Chishumba hill; thence generally southwards through Gwiwa and Mutimrengwa hills to Chiniri hill;

thence westwards to Kawaya hill; thence north-westwards to Zemaiwe hill; thence westerly to Bashungwe hill; thence generally northwards through other hills to Nyongwicha hill, and thence north to the top of the range lying to the north of and along the Gachegache river; thence to a point on the Naodsa river opposite to Nurige hill; thence up the Naodsa river to the starting point.

DARWIN DISTRICT.

Chimanda Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by a series of straight lines joining the hills from east to west, Tsimburgwe, Chirihe, Ngoma, Nahwa and Msiriswi (Pulpit Rock); on the east by the Donga river, from the nearest point to Tsimburgwe hill to the Mazoe river; on the south by the Mazoe river; on the west by a line drawn from Msiriswi hill southwards to Zunje hill, and thence to the bifurcation of the Ntokwe river near its source; thence down the Ntokwe to the Mazoe river.

Madziwa Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the south-east beacon of Lawley's Concession to the most westerly beacon of the farm La Belle Esperance; thence along the south-western boundaries of this farm and the farms Fura and Thebus, and along the south-eastern boundary of the latter farm to its east beacon; thence to Mount Darwin; thence to Denda hill; thence south along the old telephone line to the Umfurudzi river; thence up the Umfurudzi river and that one of its headwaters which flows close to and to the west of the south-east beacon of the farm Batcombe; thence along the southern and south-eastern boundaries of this farm and the eastern boundary of Butleigh to the north-east beacon of the latter farm; thence direct to the starting point.

Kandeya Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from Mount Chimaia to the junction of the Spekateka and Danga rivers; thence down the Danga river to its junction with the Ruia river; thence up the Ruia river to its junction with the Matondwi river; thence up the Matondwi river to its source; thence direct to the northern beacon of the farm Thorn Hill; thence direct to the most easterly beacon of Lawley's Concession; thence along the north-eastern boundary of Lawley's Concession to the Ruia river; thence down the Ruia river to its junction with the Ruiana river; thence up the Ruiana river to its source near Bwezero hill; thence to Bwezero Hill and thence to Mount Chimaia.

Chiswiti Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by a line joining the beacon near the Nyatandi river, and marked 1578 on the map, with the beacon Binya; on the east by the Nyatandi river from the beacon marked 1578 to its source, and by a straight line from the source of the Nyatandi due south to the Danga river; on the south by the Kandeya reserve; on the west by a line joining the beacon Binya with the beacon Chimaia.

Mzarabani Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north-east and north by the Hoya river from its junction with the Umsengedzi river to that one of its sources rising some three-and-a-half miles west of Mafindu trigonometrical beacon; on the south by a line taken along the crest of the Mavuradonna mountains from a point above the Hoya source referred to, to a point on the Umsengedzi river some four miles

to the south of Bandilombidzi trigonometrical beacon; on the west by the Umsengedzi river.

MAZOE DISTRICT.

Bushu Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the south by the farms Lion's Den, Wapley and Highlands, and a line joining the most easterly beacon of Wapley with the north-west beacon of Highlands; on the west by a straight line six-and-a-half miles in length drawn due north from the north-west beacon of Lion's Den; on the east by a straight line drawn from a point in the northern boundary of Highlands one-and-a-quarter miles from the north-west beacon to a point distant six-and-a-half miles and situated one mile east of a true north direction; on the north by a straight line joining these two northern points.

Chiweshe Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the point on the Ruia river where the southern boundary of Lawley's Concession crosses it, up the Ruia river to the northern beacon of Chomkuti; thence along the north-western and western boundaries of the farms Chomkutl, Brockley, Makori and Duntarvie; thence along the northern boundaries of Glendale and Moore's Concession to the south-east beacon of Nyachura; thence to the south-east beacon of Tekke, and along the eastern boundaries of Tekke, Arda and Hasfa to the north-east beacon of the latter; thence direct to Chitonzwa hill; thence to Rumanje hill; thence to Mount Chaona; thence to the western beacon of Lawley's Concession, and along the southern boundary of the latter to the Ruia river.

MREWA DISTRICT.

Mangwendi Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the junction of the Inyagui and Chibakwi rivers to a point on the range of hills running north from Mount Zhombuki and about six miles from the said mountain; thence to Mount Zhombuki; thence to the junction of the Nyaderi and Munyukwi rivers; thence to the south-west beacon of the farm Nyazikatzi, and along the southern boundaries of Nyazikatzi, Nyamademu and Zete to the south-east beacon of the latter; thence to a point due east of and some nine miles from the south-east beacon of the farm Athlone; thence to this beacon; thence along the boundaries of the farms Athlone, Exeter, Koodoo Range, Alpha, Glen Noe and Caskie Ben to the southern beacon of the latter, so as to exclude all these farms; thence to the northern beacon of Mount Pleasant; thence along the boundaries of the farms Mount Pleasant, Mignon, Bimi, Rupture, Sussex, Suffolk, Kent and Middlesex to the Inyagui river; thence down the Inyagui to the starting point.

Uzumba Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by the Maramba reserve; on the east by the Nyaderi river; on the south generally by a line drawn from a point on the Nyaderi river, opposite to Mount Mtuwa, to a point eleven miles to the northward of Zhombuki hill, and on the continuation of a line drawn along the range of hills of which Zhombuki forms the southern point; thence to a point on the said range which is the north-eastern point of the Mangwendi reserve, and thence to the junction of the Inyagui and Chibakwi rivers; on the west by the Inyagui and Mazoe rivers.

Maramba Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north-west by the Mazoe river; on the

north-east by the northern Nyamayemba river shown on the map, and a straight line drawn from the source of that river to the junction of the Mazoe and Ntokwe rivers; on the south-east by the Nyaderi river; on the south by the Shamba river and a line drawn from the source of the Shamba river to the junction of the Mazoe and Umfurudzi rivers.

Fungwi Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north-west and north by the Mazoe river; on the south-east by the Nyaderi river; and on the south-west by the Maramba reserve.

MTOKO DISTRICT.

Mtoko Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the nearest point on the Nyaderi river to the hill Mtuwa, running through this hill to the hill immediately behind the present Native Commissioner's station (this hill has no native name); thence to Mtemwa hill; thence to Jeta hill; thence to Myata and Mapaca hill; thence to the most northerly peak of Susamoya range; thence north to the Nyachinonga range, and along the crests of the Nyachinonga, Inyarugwenje and Tsutskwe ranges, and continuing in this line to the Nyamakaranga river; thence down this river to its junction with the Nyaderi river; thence up the latter river to the starting point.

INYANGA DISTRICT.

Inyanga Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By the properties Turners, Sterkstroom, Scotsdale, Inyanga Block, Inyanga Valley, New Hanover, Aberdeen, Ngarawe, Zewa, Yahokwe and Ngajeasi so as to exclude them all.

Inyanga North Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line beginning on Chiromba hill on the Ruenya river near the Portuguese border and running south-east to Mazira hill; thence south to Shuenda hill; thence to the north-east beacon of the St. Swithin's Block and along the north boundary of this block to the beacon on the Nani police reserve; thence to the beacon on Mount Nani; thence west to the junction of the Nyandira river with the Ruenya river, and thence down the Ruenya river to the southern border of Lawley's Concession; thence along the boundary of this property to its south-east beacon, and along its eastern border to the Ruenya river, and thence along this river to the first named point on Chiromba hill.

MAKONI DISTRICT.

Makoni Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By the properties Lesapi Valley, Timaru, Wick, St. Triashill, Bannockburn South, Mount Gondo, East Castles, Castles, Ejenja North, Osborne, Amberwell, Buffalo Bush, Kwapassi Reserve, Mount Zonga, The Chase, Forest Hill and Makoni so as to exclude them all, and by the Inyamajura river between Buffalo Bush and the Kwapassi Reserve.

Weya Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north-east by Williamsdale; on the east by Inyati Block; on the south and south-west by the farms Claremont, Mparura, Maruma and Tynwald, a line from the northern beacon of the latter farm to the north-east beacon of St. Benedict, the farm St. Benedict, and the surveyed northern boundary of the old Fairfield Estate; on the north-west and north by the Mafuri river and the farm Muskwe.

Chikori Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north-west and north by the Nyagadzi river; on the east by the Nyangombi and

Mwarazi rivers; on the south-west by a line drawn from a point on the Mwarazi river opposite a beacon on a hill abutting on this river, and some two or three miles above the junction of the Nyangombi and Mwarazi rivers, in a north-westerly direction through the said beacon, and through a second beacon on another hill in the direction of Dakatome hill to the beacon on this latter hill, and thence to a beacon on a hill situated near the Nyagadzi river and a short distance below the junction of the Nyagadzi and Mabindu rivers, and continuing on to the Nyagadzi river.

Chiduku Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by a line drawn from the most westerly beacon of the farm The Willows, along the southern boundary of that farm to the south-west beacon of Lesbury; thence southward along a range of hills for a mile; and thence north-east to a beacon about midway in the present southern boundary line of Lesbury; thence to the north-east beacon of that farm; and thence to the south-west beacon of Cheronga; thence along the southern boundary of Cheronga to its south-east beacon; on the east by the farms Recondite, Lesapi Falls, Rooking Stone, Mount Tikwiri, Tiny, Cotleigh, Charlton and Everton; on the south generally by the Inyazura river to its junction with the Mchiki river, and the Mchiki to its junction with the Rusawi river; on the west by the Rusawi river, and the south-eastern boundary of the farm Chiswana; on the north-west by a straight line joining the most easterly beacon of Chiswana with the most westerly beacon of The Willows.

MARANDELLAS DISTRICT.

Wedza Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by the farms Ropako, Zana, Ballinard Extension and Wye Valley, and by a line joining the south-east beacon of Zana with the south-west beacon of Ballinard Extension; on the north-east by the Rusawi river; on the south by a line drawn from the junction of the Mchiki and Rusawi rivers due west to the Sabi river; on the south-west by the Sabi river; on the west by the farms Rundu, Mungo, Injina, Mawiri and Chimanza.

Narira Reserve.—Bounded as follows: Part I. on the north by the Wiltshire Estate; on the east by the Sabi reserve; on the south by the Lancashire Estate; on the west by Spurwing, Ngosi, Kildoon and Gungubu. This area is surveyed. Part II. on the north-east and south by the Sabi reserve; on the west by the Lancashire Estate. This area is surveyed.

Mangeni Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By the properties Worcestershire, Norah Lee, Homanshurst, Altona, a line from the southern beacon of Altona to the north-east beacon of Totton, the properties Totton, Gabajena, Money Putt and Hampshire so as to exclude all the properties mentioned.

Umgesi Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by the Ngesi river; on the east by the farms Ngesi Poort, Change and Mooi Laagte; on the south by a line drawn from the mid-western beacon of Mooi Laagte to the northern beacon of Manese Poorte; thence to the northern beacon of Glen Connor; thence to the north-western beacon of this farm, and thence to a point five miles along the Rhodesdale north-eastern boundary south of the Ngesi river; on the west by Rhodesdale.

Chikwanda Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the junction of the Mungesi and Mashambara rivers, up the Mungesi and along the north-eastern boundary of Mara Ranch, and the north-western boundaries of Mara Ranch and Yettom, and the north-eastern boundary of Cleveland to its north beacon; thence direct to the north-east beacon of Marowa; thence along the northern and western boundaries of Marowa and the northern boundaries of Dromore, Good Hope,

Spring Field, Sand Drift, Welgevonden and Welkom Hoek to the Popotekwe river; thence up the Popotekwe river and round the southern, eastern and northern boundaries of Verlos back to the Popotekwe river; thence up the Popotekwe river to the southern boundary of Merrilies; thence along the southern boundaries of Merrilies, Morpeth and Dysart to the Mtilikwe river; thence down the Mtilikwe to its junction with the Chingwanombi river; thence up the latter river to its source; thence direct to the source of the Mashambara river; thence down that river to its junction with the Mungesi river, the starting point; excluding, however, the alienated farm Excelsior.

VICTORIA DISTRICT.

Zimutu Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by the farms Chatsworth, Ingogo and Rocklands; on the east by the Popotekwe river; on the south by the farms Umyambi, Koollala, Branksholm and Copota; on the west by the Umvuma-Victoria railway strip; excluding also a piece of land 2,000 feet in length by 500 feet in breadth from the centre of the railway line around the Zimutu railway siding.

Manaza, Nyamandwi, Simanuriki, Mutudza, Ngwane, Machena and Mbamba; thence to a point on the Chiredzi river in the northern boundary of Chiredzi Ranch; thence following the northern boundary of this ranch to the beacon on Mount Gwangwangwa; thence to Mounts Charowedza, Zoza, Wuni and Tsazahomi; thence to the junction of the Mtilikwe and Mushavukwe rivers; thence up the Mtilikwe to its junction with the Tshibaka river; thence up the Tshibaka to its junction with the Nyabusikana river, and up the latter river to its source; thence direct to the source of the Nyabesi river, and down the Nyabesi river to a point due south of the southern beacon of the farm Vlakfontein; thence direct to that beacon; thence along the eastern boundary of Vlakfontein and the southern boundary of Iram to the Rurgwi river; thence down the Rurgwi to its junction with the Chiredzi river; thence up the Chiredzi to the southern boundary of the farm Allendale; thence along the southern, eastern and northern boundaries of Allendale back to the Chiredzi river; thence up the Chiredzi to its junction with the Msoro river; thence to Mounts Chinyangara, Mueyi, Mundandi, Garakacha, Chembazi, Marangaranga, Mutondwi and Rutonga; thence to the nearest point on the Nandari river; thence down that river to its junction with the Mungezi river, and down the Mungezi to its junction with the Devuli river, and down the Devuli to the starting point.

Ndanga East Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by a line drawn from a point on the Sabi river, opposite to the south-west beacon of the farm Mamzwera, to the highest point on the Bangarupinja range of hills; on the east by the Sabi river; on the south by the Mrondonzi river; on the west by a line drawn from the highest point on the Bangarupinja range, along that range to its southern spur; thence to the junction of the Chonpimbi and Mkwasini rivers; and thence to a point on the Mrondonzi river eight miles up from its junction with the Sabi river.

UMTALI DISTRICT.

Maramba Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by the farms Pulpit Rock, Madzadza, Chimhite, Samwambeia, Maraleli and Wild Park; on the east by the Odzi river; on the south-west by the Sabi river; on the west by the Makuni river.

Zimunya Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By the properties Dora Estate, Dora, The Rhine, Zimunya's Town, Howth, Clydesdale and Gilmerton so as to exclude them all.

Umtasa South Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by Lynnfield and Jerain; on the east by Inyashuti; on the south by the Odzani river; on the west by the Zongoro river, Umtasa's Mission and Peniart Lucha.

Umtasa North Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By a line drawn from the most southerly beacon of Holdenby, along the Anglo-Portuguese boundary to beacon No. 4 on Mount Panga, on the Anglo-Portuguese border; and thence to the most easterly beacon of the farm Korsten; and by the properties Korsten, Faith, Mount Ruunji, Hondi Gorge South, Hondi Gorge North, Rupangu, Nyawari, Frobisher, Chipungu Waterfall and Holdenby, so as to exclude them all.

Umzingwane Reserve.—Bounded as follows: By the properties Duncal, Springvale, Hilton and Worringham, so as to exclude them all.

MATOBO DISTRICT.

Shashani Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north-west by Mount Edgecombe; on the north-east by the farms Valley, Junction and Ikezi, and the Mwewe river; on the south-east by the farms Montana Vista and Tabas N'Yoni, and a line from the western beacon of Montana Vista to the northern beacon of Tabas N'Yoni; on the west by the Shashani river.

Matopo Reserve.—Bounded as follows: On the north by the properties The Matopo Block, Society Brethren in Christ, Absent and Essexvale; on the east by Glen Lategan, The Range, Long Field, The Grange and Hollins Block; on the south by Zwemele Block, Leilavale, Kozi and Gwandavale; on the west by the Tuli river.

GWANDA DISTRICT.

It is hereby notified that the British South Africa Company has, in terms of section 81 of the Southern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1898, and the note appended to the definition of the Lower Gwelo Reserve published in Government Notice No. 57 of 1918, assigned the land described hereunder for the occupation of natives.

Section 78 of the Final Report of the Southern Rhodesia Native Reserves Commission.

* * * *

78. The second point deals with those boundaries where, owing to a lack of topography upon the map, we recommend that the line should run direct from one point to another. In most cases reserves will be bounded either by river courses or by surveyed farms, but there are a few instances where such clear and natural boundaries are unobtainable at present. In a few cases these straight lines are of some length, though, as a rule, they are short, and therefore suitable. The longest is 35 miles; no other line is over 19 miles, and most are much shorter. We recommend that the longer, straight lines should be inspected as soon as Your Excellency's approval is notified, and where possible a series of natural points, such as hills or prominent rocks, should be selected to correspond with the line recommended. As it will very seldom be possible, we suppose, to obtain such points exactly in the direct line, we recommend that a limit be placed beyond which the final demarcation may not extend either in the direction of excess or reduction. We think that limit should be 100 acres upon every mile of length of the line. As an example we refer to the northern portion of the Eastern boundary of the Chiwehwe (or Negomo) Reserve in the Mazoe district (Map No. 4). This line is one of the longest and is shown to be actually 16 miles in length, and the limit of acreage would therefore be 1,600 acres. Upon inspection it will no doubt be found that some suitable hill points will be discovered east and some west of the line, and none very far from it. It is probable that the variation from the areas of individual reserves as given in this report will be "compensating," that is, that if the area of one reserve is reduced, that of the next reserve may be increased; in no case can it be great.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the 12th day of June, 1902, and made between Thomas Atkinson, of Portland, in the County of Lincoln, Farmer and Grazier, of the one part and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the other part, the cottage with out-buildings, garden and land containing together one acre three roods and two perches or thereabouts situate in the Parish of Quadring aforesaid, and coloured red and blue on the plan drawn on the said indenture, became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us:

"And whereas no part of the said land, tenement and hereditaments is subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but the same are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed:

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvements of our Common Fund it is expedient that the said land, tenement and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such land, tenement and hereditaments, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any part of the said land, tenement and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, under and by virtue of the said indenture with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions

of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Lincoln.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to Thomas William Elliott under the following circumstances:—

On August 11th, 1919, a miner named Onley at the Hucknall Colliery was entombed between the face at which he was working and the débris of a large fall of stones and rubbish from the roof. There were several men at hand, who proceeded to remove a certain amount of the fall until a small gap was made between the fallen rubbish and the edge of the roof. These men had become exhausted when Elliott, the manager, reached the scene, and he, without waiting to consider the danger, squeezed through, reached the wrists of the imprisoned man and succeeded in pulling him out. Elliott's act was a courageous, prompt and plucky one; he did not stop to estimate the danger of a further fall, and certainly saved Onley's life, as the roof gave way further immediately after the rescue, and it would then have been impossible to get through.

Also to Albert Edward Smith.

On the 9th September, 1919, whilst timber at the Dinnington Main Colliery was being drawn from a part of the workings, a fall of material occurred which struck a man named James Sharpe and pinned him by one foot. Some workmen from adjoining places went at once to try to rescue him, but they were unable to get him away. The fall of material had displaced some timber, and the ground was very unsettled. Albert E. Smith, one of the officials of the mine, quickly came to the spot, and, seeing that Sharpe was in grave danger of being buried by the unsafe and unsupported roof, he arranged for a temporary chock to be set up. The chock had barely been erected when about two tons of material fell, which would but for the chock have killed Smith. The chock, however, protected him, and the men were able after the fall to continue the work for the liberation of Sharpe. Immediately afterwards the whole place collapsed.

RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE ANGLO-GERMAN MIXED ARBITRAL TRIBUNAL CONSTITUTED UNDER ARTICLE 304 OF THE TREATY OF VERSAILLES.

TIME FOR PRESENTATION OF CLAIMS.

1. The time within which claims are to be submitted to the Tribunal shall be as follows:—

(a.) *Appeals under Article 296, Annex, paragraph 20.*

Within thirty days of the communication of the joint decision of the two clearing offices to the Appellant.

(b.) *Claims under Article 297.*

Within twelve months from the date of the

publication of these rules in the place at which such Claimant is residing, or within six months from the date on which the Claimant learnt that damage or injury had been inflicted on his property, rights or interests, or within six months from the date on which the Claimant learnt that restitution under section (f) of the said Article had been made or refused, whichever period is the longer.

(c.) *Claims under Article 305.*

Within twelve months of the publication of these rules in the place at which such Claimant is residing, or within twelve months of the date on which the decision was given, or within six months of the date on which such decision came to the knowledge of the Claimant, whichever period is the longer.

(d.) *In all other Cases.*

Within twelve months from the date of the publication of these rules in the place at which such Claimant is residing, with the exception of those cases provided for in Rule 22 where the limitations of time imposed by these rules are stated not to apply.

After the expiration of the times prescribed by this rule, no claim will be accepted without the special leave of the Tribunal.

2. All claims, answers and other written proceedings must be delivered or sent by post to the Tribunal Secretariat, at 21, St. James's Square, London, S.W. 1.

GENERAL RULES RELATING TO WRITTEN PROCEEDINGS.

MEMORIAL.

3. The claim shall be typewritten or printed and shall state:—

(a.) The name, nationality, domicile and address of the Claimant.

(b.) In cases where the Claimant is not claiming in his own right and on his own behalf, in what right he claims and the name, nationality, domicile and address of the person on whose behalf he is claiming.

(c.) In cases where the claim is made by a company or body corporate, its name, nature and domicile and place of incorporation (if any), and the address of its office or chief offices; and in cases where the claim is made by an association not being a company or body corporate (whether recognised by the law of the country where it is domiciled as a legal entity or not), in addition to the above, the names and nationality of all persons who are partners of such association or interested therein.

(d.) Whether the claim is brought against a Government or national, and in the latter case giving the name and last known address of such national, or if such national be a company, body corporate or other association, the address of its chief office, if known, or if the address of the chief office be not known, of the office of which the address is known to the Claimant.

(e.) The nature of the claim, the relief sought and, where the relief sought is pecuniary, the amount claimed.

(f.) Under which article and paragraph of the Treaty the claim is made.

(g.) The name and address of the solicitor or other authorised representative (if any) of the Claimant.

(h.) The person to whom, and address at which, all communications are to be sent on behalf of the Claimant.

4. The claim shall be accompanied by a concise statement of the facts and an exhibit of copies of any documents relied upon in support thereof.

5. The claim accompanied by such statement and exhibit shall be known as and is hereinafter referred to as the memorial.

6. Six true copies of the memorial shall be supplied with the memorial. The memorial shall, unless otherwise agreed by the parties and permitted by the Tribunal, be in English; and if the memorial be not in English, it shall be accompanied by an English translation and at least three of the copies shall be copies of such translation.

7. On receipt of the memorial and the six copies thereof, the Secretariat will acknowledge such receipt to the Claimant, and will transmit one copy to the Government Agent of the Claimant and two copies of the memorial to the Government Agent of the Respondent. Such last-mentioned Agent shall acknowledge the receipt thereof to the Secretariat and shall cause one copy of the memorial to be served on the Respondent.

8. Except in cases provided for in Rule 35 (a), the receipt of the memorial by such Agent shall be sufficient notice to the Respondent of the claim made against him, and the Respondent shall, within sixty days after the receipt of the memorial by such Agent, present his answer to the Tribunal. If no answer be presented, the case may be proceeded with in the absence of the Respondent as provided in Rule 33.

RESPONSE.

9. Rule 3 (d), (b), (c), (g) and (h) and Rule 4 shall apply *mutatis mutandis* to the answer; and in addition the Respondent must in his statement of facts accompanying the answer, if he desires to dispute the allegations in the memorial, expressly deny or otherwise answer or explain the same. Any facts not dealt with by the Respondent will be treated as admitted. The answer shall be accompanied by an exhibit of copies of documents relied on.

10. The answer accompanied by such statement and exhibit shall be known as and is hereinafter referred to as the response.

11. Six true copies of the response shall be supplied with the response to the Tribunal and the provisions of Rule 6 shall apply to the response.

12. On receipt of the response and the six copies thereof, the Secretariat will acknowledge such receipt to the Respondent and will transmit one of such copies of the response to the Claimant (who shall acknowledge the receipt thereof to the Secretariat), and one to the Government Agent of the Claimant and one to the Government Agent of the Respondent.

13. Should the Respondent desire to make a claim against the Claimant, he must do so by a separate claim, and not by a counter-claim, but the Tribunal may, if it thinks fit, hear both claims at the same hearing.

14.—(a.) If the Respondent objects to the jurisdiction of the Tribunal to entertain the claim or any part thereof, he shall specifically take such objection in his answer, and the Tribunal may, if it thinks fit, consider and decide the point before further dealing with the case.

(b) If the Tribunal should be of opinion that under the provisions of the Treaty its jurisdiction may be excluded, or if a Re-

spondent objects to the jurisdiction of the Tribunal to entertain the claim or any part thereof, the Tribunal may, if it thinks fit, require the party raising this objection to satisfy the Tribunal that its jurisdiction is excluded, or may require evidence on the point to be forthcoming from an expert of the law of the country concerned, or may make such other order as may seem just, and may, if it thinks fit, adjourn the case until such evidence has been obtained or until the order has been carried out.

(c.) It shall be the duty of the respective Government Agents to inform the Tribunal if they have grounds for believing that the jurisdiction of the Tribunal is excluded.

REPLY AND REJOINDER.

15. If the Claimant desires merely to deny the facts alleged in the response it is not necessary for him to present a reply, but, if the Claimant desires to answer the facts alleged in the response otherwise than by way of denial, a reply must be sent to the Tribunal within thirty days from the receipt of the response by the Claimant, who shall with the reply supply six copies thereof to the Tribunal. The Secretariat will acknowledge receipt thereof to the Claimant and will transmit one copy of the reply to the Respondent, who shall acknowledge the receipt thereof to the Secretariat, and one copy to each of the Government Agents. Except in such cases, no reply shall be allowed.

If the Respondent desires merely to deny the facts alleged in the reply it is not necessary for him to present a rejoinder, but if the Respondent wishes to answer the facts alleged in the reply otherwise than by way of denial, a rejoinder must be presented to the Tribunal within thirty days from the receipt of the reply by the Respondent, who shall with the rejoinder supply six copies to the Tribunal. The Secretariat will acknowledge the receipt thereof to the Respondent and will transmit one copy of the rejoinder to the Claimant and one copy to each of the Government Agents.

Except in such cases no rejoinder shall be allowed and no further written proceedings after the rejoinder shall be allowed, other than the written argument provided for by Rule 28, except by special leave of the Tribunal.

The provisions of Rule 6 shall apply to the reply and to the rejoinder.

JOINT CLAIMS AND JOINDER OF PARTIES.

16. Where two or more persons are jointly interested in the same claim, they shall present a joint claim, and where the relief sought is sought against two or more persons jointly, the claim shall be made against them jointly.

17.—(a.) If the Respondent contends that any person not joined as Claimant ought to be so joined in accordance with the preceding rule, he may within twenty days of receipt of the memorial send in, in duplicate, a notice to the Secretariat naming such person and requiring the Claimant to join such person as Claimant and stating the reason why he requires such joinder. The Secretariat will forward such notice to the Claimant, who shall within thirty days from the receipt thereof state whether he consents to and will effect such joinder, in which case all proceedings shall be stayed until it is effected, or whether he refuses or is unable to effect such joinder, stating his reasons for such refusal or inability.

(b.) If the Claimant consents to and is

willing to effect such joinder, the written consent of the person to be joined shall be sent to the Tribunal within twenty-one days, and the Secretariat shall thereupon amend the memorial by adding the names of such person as Claimant, and notice of such joinder will be sent to the Respondent and the Government Agent of the Claimant and Respondent, and all further proceedings shall be continued as if such joinder had been made from the commencement.

(c.) If the Claimant fails to answer the notice as provided by Rule 17 (a) or refuses or states that he is unable to effect such joinder or if the written consent is not sent as provided by Rule 17 (b), notice thereof shall be given by the Secretariat to the Respondent, who may within ten days apply to the Tribunal to stay all proceedings until such joinder be effected. The Secretariat shall give notice of such application to the Claimant, and such application shall be heard by the Tribunal on a date to be fixed by the Tribunal not less than fourteen days after notice of such application has been sent to the Claimant.

18. If the Tribunal is satisfied that any person refuses to join as Claimant, although he ought to join, the Tribunal may allow the case to proceed without such joinder, but in that case the Tribunal may refuse to entertain any claim in the future by such person with respect to the subject-matter of the claim in the presenting of which he ought to have joined.

19. If any person proceeds against some only of the persons jointly liable to him on the same claim and the Tribunal decides the case whether in favour of or against the Claimant, the Tribunal may refuse to entertain any claim in the future by such person against the other person or persons so jointly liable.

20.—(a.) If a Respondent contends that some other person who is not joined as Respondent is jointly liable with him to answer the claim, he may within twenty days after the receipt of the memorial send a notice to the Secretariat that he requires such person to be joined as Respondent, giving his name and address, and stating the reasons why he requires him to be joined; and with such notice shall send a sufficient number of copies to enable the Secretariat to send one to the Claimant and to each of the persons whom the Respondent requires to be joined. The Secretariat will thereupon send such notice to the Claimant and to each of the persons named by the Respondent, and the Claimant and each of the said persons shall reply within ten days whether they consent to such joinder or not. In the event of the Claimant and each of such persons consenting to the joinder, the Secretariat will amend the memorial by adding them as parties, and the Claimant shall cause copies of the memorial to be served on each of such persons, and all future proceedings shall be continued as if such joinder had been made from the commencement.

(b.) If either the Claimant or any of such persons do not consent to the joinder within ten days, the Secretariat shall notify the Respondent accordingly, and the Respondent may within ten days apply to the Tribunal to stay all proceedings until such joinder be effected. The Secretariat shall give notice of such application to the Claimant and such other person or persons, and such application shall be heard by the Tribunal on a date to be fixed by the Tribunal not less than fourteen days after

notice of such application has been sent to the Claimant and such person or persons as aforesaid.

21.—(a.) If any person not being a party claims to have a legitimate interest in prosecuting or resisting the claim, he may apply to the Tribunal to be joined as claimant or respondent as the case may be, or to be allowed to intervene in the case in such manner as the Tribunal may direct.

(b.) If a Respondent contends that he is entitled to some right over against some other person in reference to the claim brought against him, he may give such person notice of his claim against him and at the same time serve him with a copy of the memorial. Such person may thereupon apply to the Tribunal to be joined as Respondent or to be allowed to intervene in the case in such manner as the Tribunal may direct. If such person does not intervene and the Tribunal should be of opinion at the hearing that there are grounds for coming to the conclusion that the Respondent may succeed in his claim against such person, the Tribunal may, if it decides in favour of the Claimant, stay execution in order to enable the Respondent to prosecute his claim against such person, upon such terms as to security and otherwise as the Tribunal may think just.

SPECIAL RULES FOR PARTICULAR CASES.

22. In addition to the above general rules, the following rules shall be observed in the undermentioned cases:—

(1.) Cases under Article 305.

The person alleging that he is prejudiced by the decision shall be the Claimant and the other party to the cause or proceeding in which the decision was given or, if there be no such party, the Government shall be Respondent. The claim shall be accompanied by a copy of the decision and shall state in what respect the decision is impugned, with which Section or Sections of the Treaty it is alleged to be inconsistent and in what respect and what relief is claimed. The Claimant may also accompany his claim by copies of any essential written proceedings of the case in which the decision was given, authenticated in the manner prescribed by the law of the country to which the Court belongs. The Tribunal may of its own motion require the record of the Court to be transmitted to the Tribunal and it shall then be open to the inspection of the parties and their agents.

(2.) Appeals under Article 296, Annex, paragraph 20.

The Appellant shall be Claimant, and the party in whose favour the decision was given and the two clearing offices shall be Respondents. The claim shall state the grounds of the appeal and shall be accompanied by a copy of the decision appealed against and of all documents in the possession of the Claimant relevant to the case, and by a reasoned argument by the Claimant in support of his appeal. Together with the claim and documents, three copies thereof shall be supplied to the Tribunal, and the Claimant shall serve copies thereof on the opposite party and the Agents of the two clearing offices.

The Agent of the clearing office of which the Respondent is a national shall within thirty days of receipt of the claim supply to the Tribunal four copies of all documents relating to the case which are in his possession or power, unless the Claimant has already supplied them

with his claim, and a statement of any facts found by the clearing offices. In addition, the Respondent or the clearing offices may supply a reasoned argument in writing in support of the decision of the two clearing offices.

Any of the parties (including the Agents of the clearing offices) may apply to the Tribunal to hear arguments before it, but in the absence of such application the Tribunal shall be at liberty to determine the case on the written proceedings without further argument, or to notify to the parties if it desires to hear an argument.

The Secretariat on receipt of the claim shall inform the Claimant what is the amount of deposit to be paid or security to be given, and such deposit shall be paid or security given within ten days, and in default the claim may be dismissed.

(3.) Cases under Article 296, Annex, paragraph 16.

Where cases are referred to the Tribunal under the above provision, the procedure laid down elsewhere in these rules shall not apply. The parties shall present a case jointly to the Tribunal, or each may present a case separately. In either event the contentions of the parties shall be set out in the case or cases, which shall be accompanied by all relevant documents. Six true copies of the case or cases and documents shall be prepared and lodged with the Secretariat. The matter will be determined by the Tribunal as laid down by Article 296, Annex, paragraph 18. The limitations of time imposed by these rules shall not apply to such cases; but where the two clearing offices are unable to agree whether a debt claimed is due, or in case of a difference between an enemy debtor and an enemy creditor or between the clearing offices, and the parties to the dispute do not desire to present a case jointly, either clearing office may, within ten days after giving notice to the other clearing office of such intention, refer the case to the Tribunal under the conditions provided for by Article 296, Annex, paragraph 16. The enemy creditor or the enemy debtor may similarly, after giving twenty days' notice to the two clearing offices, refer the case to the Tribunal, unless the case shall have been referred to the Tribunal meanwhile by the clearing offices or either of them. The case shall proceed as if it had been referred to the Tribunal by the clearing offices.

CLOSE OF WRITTEN PROCEEDINGS.

23. The Secretariat will inform the respective Government Agents and parties when the written proceedings are closed.

24.—(a) Within twenty days after the date of the notice that the written proceedings are closed, the parties shall send to the Secretariat a statement of the witnesses, if any, whose testimony they desire, giving in each instance the name, nationality, occupation and address of such witness, and stating whether the party desires that the testimony of such witness shall be given at the hearing of the case or whether it is desired that the evidence shall be taken upon commission, and shall at the same time furnish all parties and the Government Agents with a copy. The Tribunal will thereupon determine whether the evidence shall be taken on commission or will make such other order as seems fit. The Tribunal will before making an order hear any party or Government Agent who may desire to be heard on the matter on his forthwith applying to be heard, and will

fix a date for all parties to be heard if they desire.

(b) Where the Tribunal orders that the witness shall be heard at the hearing, the Government Agents shall be responsible for summoning the witness in accordance with the method applicable in each case unless the Tribunal otherwise directs. Travelling expenses and subsistence money must be supplied to the witness at the expense of the party at whose instance he is summoned. The amount of the same will be fixed by the Tribunal, and must be paid in advance to the Secretariat. If the subsistence money so paid should prove insufficient, the party at whose instance the witness was summoned must pay any further amount necessary, otherwise the witness will be allowed by the Tribunal to depart.

(c) Where the Tribunal directs that evidence shall be taken on commission the evidence shall be returnable to the Tribunal and copies shall be supplied by the Secretariat to any party or either Government Agent or any other person interested, and in the opinion of the Tribunal entitled to the same, on application and payment.

(d) Where it is desired that books, documents or other objects in the possession or power of any person should be produced for the use of the Tribunal, application may at any time after the close of the written proceedings be made to the Tribunal to obtain their production. The Tribunal will thereupon, if it thinks fit, endeavour to obtain possession of such books, documents or other objects by direct request addressed to such person, and, if such request is not complied with, will take such other steps as may be requisite and desirable to ensure production. Books, documents or other objects so coming into the custody of the Tribunal shall, if the Tribunal thinks fit, be open to inspection by such persons and at such times as the Tribunal shall direct.

25. Should a party or either of the Government Agents desire to inspect any books or documents in the possession, power or control of any party or of either Government Agent, he shall make application to that party or Agent to produce such books or documents for inspection; and if such production is refused, application therefor may be made to the Tribunal upon ten days' notice being given to that party or Agent, and the Tribunal may make such order thereon as it thinks fit.

26. The Tribunal may of its own motion at any stage of the proceedings require evidence on any point.

27. The Tribunal may of its own motion at any stage of the proceedings require any party or either Government Agent to produce any book or document before it, or to allow any person designated by the Tribunal to examine and take extracts from any book or document in the possession of such party or Agent.

28. If in cases other than those under Article 296 any party or either of the Government Agents desires to submit a reasoned argument in writing, he may do so at any time after the written proceedings are closed, and not less than ten days before the date fixed for the hearing of the case, but such argument in writing shall be based only on facts alleged in the memorial, response, reply or rejoinder.

The submission of such written argument shall not preclude the parties or Agents submitting it from also adducing oral argument. The Tribunal reserves the right, if it shall think fit, to require in addition oral argument

in cases where only written argument has been submitted.

29. The President will on the conclusion of all preliminary matters fix the date and place of hearing, and the Secretariat will inform the respective Government Agents and parties of his decision.

30. The hearing shall be in public, and the parties shall either by themselves or by counsel or other recognised advocate present their cases. In cases connected with patents the parties may by leave of the Tribunal be represented by patent agents and *Patentanwälte*. Unless otherwise ordered, the Claimant shall begin and have the right to reply.

31.—(a) The parties shall have the right themselves to give evidence, and shall, if required by the Tribunal, do so. Each party may call such witnesses as he pleases before the Tribunal and may question them by himself or his counsel or admitted representative. Each party shall have the right to question any witness called by the other party (including the opposite party himself) whether before the Tribunal itself or elsewhere, by himself or by counsel or other admitted representative.

If the party who does not call the witness questions him, the party who has called him may thereupon put further questions to the witness on matters arising out of the questions put to the witness by the other party. Unless the Tribunal shall otherwise order, no further questions shall be put to the witness by or on behalf of the parties. The Tribunal, however, will at any stage put any questions that it may think fit:

Provided always that a party to a case shall not be summoned or compelled to give evidence unless the Tribunal shall have given leave for such witness to be summoned or to give evidence or unless the Tribunal shall have required of its own motion that such party shall attend and give evidence.

(b.) No oath shall be required from or administered to any witness before the Tribunal or on any Commission ordered by the Tribunal, unless the Tribunal otherwise directs.

32. The Tribunal may at any stage of the proceedings obtain a report from any person on any particular point, such person to be agreed upon by the parties or in default of agreement to be appointed by the Tribunal. The Tribunal may view any premises, locality or object if it deem such a view necessary.

33. If any party fail to appear, the case may be proceeded with in his absence, but the Agent of the Government of such party may intervene and himself take up the case, and the Tribunal may on the application of such Agent or on its own motion adjourn the case.

34. It shall be permissible for either Government to conduct the case of its national through its Agent, and such Agent may appear either in person or by counsel or other recognised advocate. Either Agent may also appear independently of the parties by himself or by counsel or other recognised advocate, and may intervene in the proceedings in such manner and at such time as the Tribunal may direct.

35.—(a.) If the Government Agent of the Respondent after making all reasonable efforts shall be unable to cause the memorial to be served upon the Respondent as provided by Rule 7 at the expiration of 21 days from the receipt of the memorial by such Agent, he shall forthwith report such failure to the Secretariat, giving the reasons for such failure and stating the steps he has taken to effect service,

and the Secretariat shall inform the Claimant that the Respondent has not been served.

(b.) On the application of the Claimant, the Tribunal may thereupon, if it thinks fit, allow the claim to be proceeded with or may make such other order in the matter as it thinks fit. The Government Agent of the Respondent shall be entitled to intervene on such application being made, and the Claimant shall give ten days' notice to such Agent of such application.

36. If at any stage of the proceedings a party requires to prove any specific fact it shall be open to the party to give a notice to the other party to admit or dispute such fact. If the party to whom notice is so given disputes the fact, and such fact is subsequently established, the Tribunal may in its discretion order the party who had disputed such fact to pay the costs of proof and any other costs occasioned thereby, whatever may be the result of the case, provided always that any such admission shall only be binding upon the parties.

37. Where a claim is made against either Government, and such claim is admitted by the Government in question, it shall be competent to the parties to agree upon a form of decision setting out with sufficient detail the claim which is admitted and the payment and restitution or other remedy or relief agreed upon, and to submit the same to the Tribunal, who, if it thinks fit, and if the Government Agent of the national claiming has not objected, will register the same as a decision, and the same shall, when registered, be deemed for all purposes to be a decision of the Tribunal: Provided that the Tribunal will not register any such decision unless the Government prove that he has submitted a true copy of the same to his Government Agent at least ten days previously. The same procedure with any necessary modification may be adopted where the claim is made against a national of either Government, provided that in such a case the Agent of neither Government has objected, and it is proved to the satisfaction of the Tribunal that the respective Government Agents have had true copies of the form of decision submitted to them at least ten days previously.

38. If in any case the parties agree upon the facts and desire the determination of the Tribunal on those facts, they shall submit an agreed statement of facts to the Tribunal, and it shall be competent to the Tribunal, with or without argument, according to the desire of the parties, to determine the questions at issue, provided that the Tribunal may in any case require arguments to be presented to them:

Provided also that in all cases the assent of the Government Agents, in writing, to the correctness of the facts as stated shall be obtained, except where the claim is against a Government.

DECISION.

39. The decision of the Tribunal will in all cases be drawn up in writing and registered, and copies thereof will be sent by the Secretariat to the parties and Government Agents. The decision will also deal with costs and expenses.

40. The Tribunal reserves to itself the power to correct an error in any decision or other order arising from a slip or accidental omission, or to explain any ambiguity or other doubtful expression appearing in the decision. It shall be open to the parties or to the Government Agents to give notice of application to the

Tribunal for any such correction or for any such explanation within thirty days of the publication of the decision. No such application will be heard after the expiration of that period.

41. The Tribunal reserves the right to stay execution on its decisions in any case where it appears proper to do so.

42.—(a.) The Tribunal may require to be satisfied that all notices and communications prescribed by these Rules have been duly received. The production of a receipt from the postal authority of the posting of a registered postal packet shall be conclusive evidence of the receipt of a notice or communication by the person to whom it is addressed until the contrary is proved. In cases in which delivery by registered post is not practicable, heavy books and documents may be sent by ordinary post and unregistered or by public carrier, and, on proof of such posting or delivery to such carrier, the books or documents shall be deemed to have been received by the person to whom they were addressed, unless and until the contrary is proved.

(b.) All communications to the parties shall be delivered at or sent to the address and to the person named by them as provided by Rule 3 (h).

(c.) If service or delivery as above provided should prove impracticable, the Tribunal will, upon application, give such directions as it may think fit, or may dispense with services.

43. In cases where any person is not residing in Europe, the additional time taken for any postal communications to reach or to arrive from the country in which such person is residing shall not be taken as included in the time prescribed by these rules; and further time may be granted on the application of any party where, owing to difficulties of communication or other good cause, such extension appears desirable.

Party shall include any person who has intervened in or has been allowed to take part in the case.

44. The proper expenses of witnesses will be allowed, and may be advanced by the Tribunal if called in pursuance of its order.

45. The Tribunal will permit amendments of written proceedings, extensions of time, and grant other dispensations from these rules in all such cases as may be necessary in the interests of justice and equity, and the Tribunal reserves power from time to time to alter, abrogate or add to these rules as experience may require.

46. These rules are supplemental to the rules of procedure relating to the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal laid down in Sections III. to VII. of Part X. of the Treaty, and must be read in conjunction with such rules of procedure.

ANGLO-GERMAN MIXED ARBITRAL TRIBUNAL.

The following announcement is made by the Board of Trade:—

The Mixed Arbitral Tribunal to be established between the United Kingdom on the one

land and Germany on the other hand under Article 304 of the Treaty of Versailles has been constituted and is about to begin work in London. The President of the Tribunal is Professor Eugène Borel, a Swiss jurist and Professor of Public and International Law in the University of Geneva. The British and German members are respectively Mr. R. E. L. Vaughan Williams, K.C., of Lincoln's Inn, and Dr. jur. Adolph Nicolaus Zacharias, Senatspräsident of the Hanseatic Oberlandesgericht.

A great part of the work of the Tribunal is to decide as to debts under Article 296 of the Treaty where a difference has arisen between an enemy debtor and an enemy creditor or between the British and German clearing offices. Under Article 297 the Tribunal can determine compensation to be borne by Germany in respect of damage or injury inflicted on the property, rights or interests of British Nationals in German territory as they existed on August 1, 1914, by the exceptional war measures or measures of transfer mentioned in the Annex to that Article. The other matters within the jurisdiction of the Tribunal are set out in Articles 299, 300, 302, 304, 305 and 310 of the Treaty.

The Procedure before the Tribunal is to some extent regulated by Sections III. to VII. of Part X. of the Treaty, but the Tribunal has settled further and more detailed rules dealing with the manner in which claims must be submitted. Printed copies of these Rules of Procedure, which have been issued in the Series of Statutory Rules and Orders (No. 2062), may be purchased, price threepence, through any bookseller, or may be obtained on application to the Secretariat of the Tribunal. They should be read in conjunction with the provisions of the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919 (Statutory Rules and Orders, 1919, No. 1517, published by H.M. Stationery Office. Price 2d.).

The British Government has provided a Court for the meetings of the Tribunal, and an office for the Secretariat at 21, St. James's Square, London, S.W. 1. Mr. Harold Russell, Barrister-at-Law, has been appointed by the Foreign Office to act as British Secretary and the German Government is also appointing a Secretary, the two to act together as joint Secretaries of the Tribunal.

The High Contracting Parties under the Treaty have agreed that their courts and authorities shall render the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal, direct, all the assistance in their power as regards transmitting notices and collecting evidence. The decisions of the Tribunal are final and conclusive. The place and time of sitting will be determined by the President of the Tribunal, and may be in London, Germany or elsewhere as the convenience of the parties or witnesses may require. The sittings will be public.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by

the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in England and Wales under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, and the Trade Boards (Hat, Cap and Millinery) Order, 1919, having given due Notice on 29th July, 1920, of Proposal to Vary General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for certain classes of Male Workers, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have varied the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated 7th May, 1920, in their application to the classes of Male Workers specified in the Schedule hereto, and that the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied are shown in the Schedule set out below which is incorporated herewith.

The Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 9th November, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied by the Trade Board, and specifying 15th November, 1920,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates of Wages shall become effective.

*NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 21st November, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates.

SECTION I.—(A) For Male Workers employed in the Cloth Hat and Cap Branch of the Trade as (i) Cutters or (ii) Blockers:—

General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 9d. per hour.

Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, 1s. 10½d. per hour.

(B) For the purpose of this Section of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

(i) A Cutter is a Male person employed in marking-in and cutting, using electric machine, band knife, shears or hand knife on any materials other than linings, interlinings, peaks, bazils, or any other trimmings, and who has been so employed for not less than five years after the age of 19.

(ii) A Blocker is a Male person employed in pulling-on and blocking hats and caps by hand, iron or steam, or by hydraulic machine and in making shapes by the French gas block, and who has been so employed for not less than five years after the age of 19.

SECTION II.—(A) For Male Workers employed in the Cloth Hat and Cap Branch of the Trade as (i) Press-Cutters or (ii) Lining Cutters:—

General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 7d. per hour.

Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, 1s. 8½d. per hour.

(B) For the purpose of this Section of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

(i) A Press-Cutter is a Male person employed on any process of press-cutting and

who has been so employed for not less than three years after the age of 19.

(ii) A Lining Cutter is a Male person employed in cutting linings and inter-linings, or in marking-out, laying-up or hooking-up, and who has been so employed for not less than three years after the age of 19.

SECTION III.—For Male Workers employed in the Straw Hat Branch of the Trade who have had not less than five years' experience after the age of 19 and are employed in stiffening straws and all classes of hoods or in blocking straws, hoods or shapes covered by hand or machine:—

General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 7d. per hour.

Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, 1s. 8½d. per hour.

PART II.

Overtime Rates for Certain Classes of Male Workers

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade to be as follows:—

In any week	48
On any day (other than Saturday)	9
On Saturday	5

Provided that any other day (not being Sunday) may be substituted by an employer for Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours of work on such substituted day shall be 5, and the normal number of hours on Saturday shall be 9.

Provided also that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in substitution for the above Minimum Rates of Wages, in respect of Hours worked by the classes of male workers specified in Part I. of this Schedule in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade, shall be as follows:—

(a) For the first two hours of overtime on any day, except Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sundays, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, as set out in Part I. of this Schedule, i.e., time-and-a-quarter.

(b) For overtime after the first two hours of overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all overtime on Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, as set out in Part I. of this Schedule, i.e., time-and-a-half.

(c) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, as set out in Part I. of this Schedule, i.e., double time.

(d) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, the Overtime Rate shall be

one-and-a-quarter times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, as set out in Part I. of this Schedule, except in so far as higher overtime rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (b) and (c) above. The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds 9 or, in the case of Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), exceeds 5, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided—

(a) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.

(b) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall only be payable after 50 hours have been worked.

(c) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out above shall apply in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

NOTE.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART III.

The above respective Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in England and Wales specified in Part I of this Schedule, in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Hat, Cap and Millinery) Order, 1919, that is to say:—The making from any material of men's, women's or children's headgear, or the trimming thereof:—

Including:—

Warehousing, packing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the making or trimming of men's, women's or children's headgear;

But excluding:—

(1) The casting and making of solid metal helmets;

(2) The making of rubberised or oilskin headgear where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of other rubberised or oilskin articles;

(3) The making of nurses' or servants' caps, chefs' caps, hospital ward caps, or similar articles,

(4) The making of field bonnets, sunbonnets, boudoir caps, or infants' millinery where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-ropes, jumpers, sports coats, neckwear, teagowns, dressing gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas,

underclothing, under-skirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby linen or similar articles;

(5) The making of fur hats, where made in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of furs or furriers' skins into garments, rugs, or similar articles;

(6) The making of knitted headgear and the making of headgear from knitted fabrics where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabric;

(7) Warehousing and packing of men's, women's and children's headgear and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made or trimmed on the premises.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the Minimum Rates.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under that Act, for that branch of the Box Trade in Great Britain which is engaged in the making of boxes, or parts thereof, made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip or similar material, having given due notice on 29th May, 1920, of Proposal to Vary, as therein shown, the rates as set out in their Notice Varying and Fixing minimum rates dated 13th November, 1919, and to Fix Overtime Rates, hereby give notice that they have Varied the said General Minimum Time-Rates in their application to certain classes of Male Workers, and have fixed Overtime Rates for Male Workers, and that they have declared the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, and the Minimum Rates of Wages as Varied and Fixed, and the hours declared as aforesaid are shown in the Schedule set out below, which is incorporated herewith:

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 10th November, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the rates as Varied and Fixed by the Trade Board and specifying 15th November, 1920,* as the date from which such minimum rates shall become effective.

*Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding Seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 21st November, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Time-Rates for Certain Classes of Male Workers.

SECTION I.—For Machine Minders (as defined in Section II. of this Part of this Schedule), Die Makers, Forme Setters, Cutters (including Shears and Guillotine) and Head Stock-Keepers (as defined in Section II. of this Part of this Schedule):—

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 36s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 9½d. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 42s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 10½d. per hour.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 48s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 1s. 0½d. per hour.

Workers of 21 and under 22 years of age, 56s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 1s. 2½d. per hour.

Workers of 22 and under 23 years of age, 66s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 1s. 4½d. per hour.

Workers of 23 years of age and over, 76s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 1s. 7½d. per hour.

Provided that in the case of Male Workers entering the trade for the first time at the age of 21 years and over as Machine Minders, Die Makers, Forme Setters, Cutters (including Shears and Guillotine) or Head Stock-Keepers, the General Minimum Time-Rates shall be as follows:—

During the first 12 months of service, 56s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 1s. 2½d. per hour.

During the second 12 months of service, 61s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 1s. 3½d. per hour.

During the third 12 months of service, 68s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 1s. 5½d. per hour.

After 3 years' service, 76s. 6d. per week of 48 hours or 1s. 7½d. per hour.

SECTION II.—For the purpose of this Notice (a) a Machine Minder is a male person who is engaged in setting, adjusting and keeping running paper box machines and in superintending the carrying through of all other operations that can be performed in whole or in part by such machines, and (b) a Head Stock-Keeper is a male person in full charge of unmanufactured stock, of receiving and distributing un-

manufactured stock, and of keeping records, and who either himself orders or passes through to the proper authority requisitions for further stock as required.

PART II.

Overtime Rates for all Male Workers.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby declare the normal number of hours of work in the Trade to be as follows:—

In any Week	48
On any day (other than Saturday) ...	9
On Saturday	5

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker employed in any branch of the Trade specified in Part III of this Schedule in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

(a) For Workers employed on Time-Work:—

(1) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(2) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of sub-paragraphs (2) and (3) of this paragraph.

(b) For Workers other than Learners (as defined in the Notice issued by the Trade Board, dated 13th November, 1919) employed on Piece-Work:—

Workers other than Learners employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, or One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the Provisions of para-

graph (a) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were Double Time, Time-and-a-Half, or Time-and-a-Quarter respectively.

(c) For Learners (as defined in the Notice issued by the Trade Board, dated 13th November, 1919) employed on Piece-Work:—

Learners employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the Provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were Double Time, Time-and-a-Half or Time-and-a-Quarter respectively.

SECTION III.—Provided that—

(a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week the Overtime Rates shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.

(b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rates in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall only be payable after 50 hours have been worked.

NOTE.—The hours which young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART III.

The above Minimum Rates shall, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, apply to all Male Workers in Great Britain of the classes specified above in respect of all time during which they are employed in the trade of making boxes or parts thereof, made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip or similar material.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to Workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

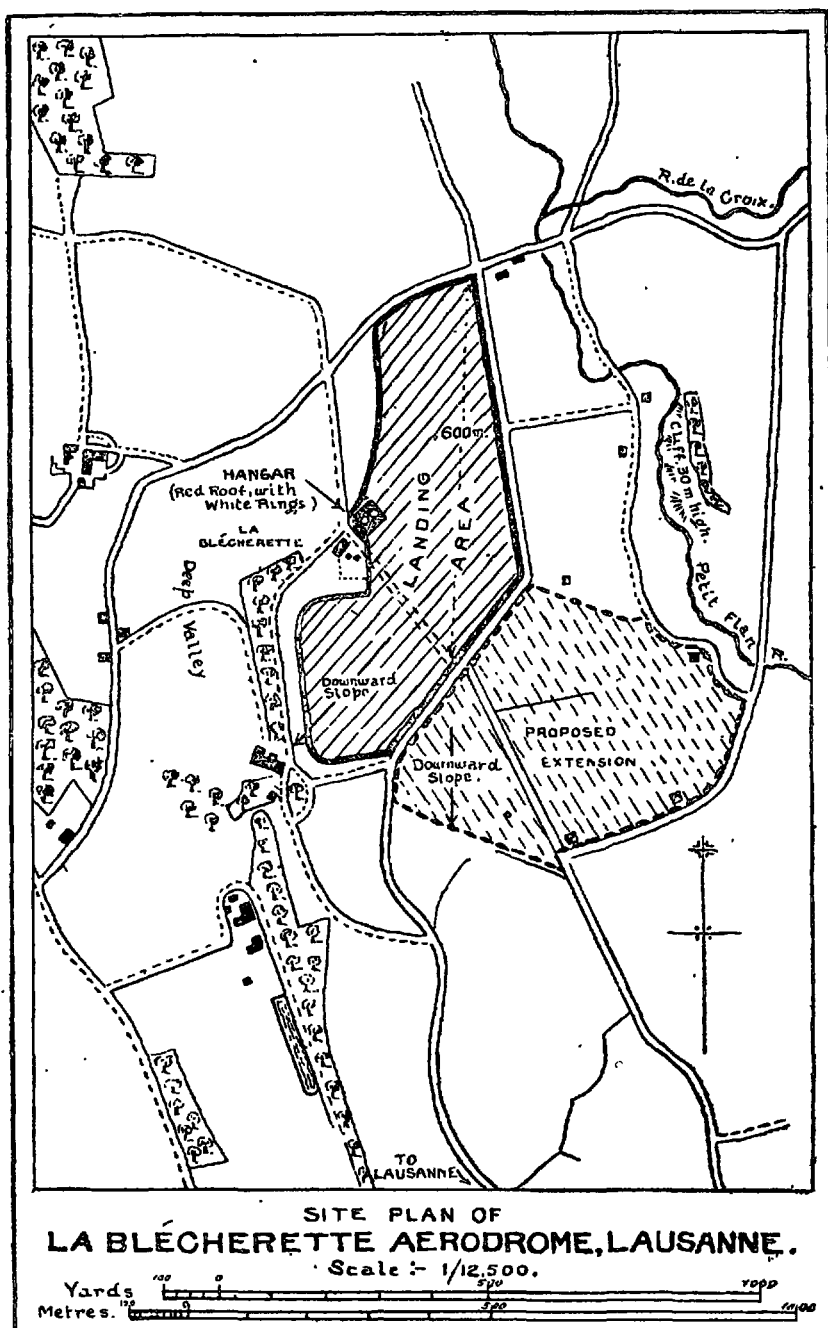

It has a poor landing surface, owing to the existence of ridges and soft patches. Care should be taken to avoid the electric power lines in the vicinity.

The aerodrome at St. Georges will be superseded by a new aerodrome at Cointrin when the preparation of the latter has been completed.

LAUSANNE. (LA BLÉCHERETTE.) Civil aerodrome (*see plan attached*).

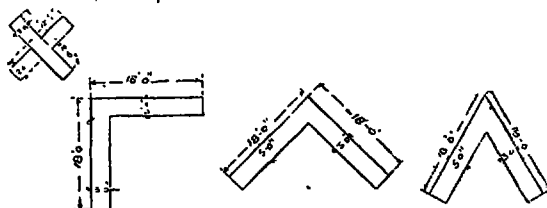


FIG. 1.—DETAILS OF CORNER BRACKETS.

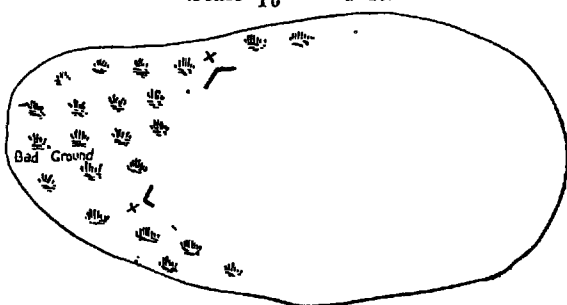

(Showing fenced aerodrome with one side having bad ground.)

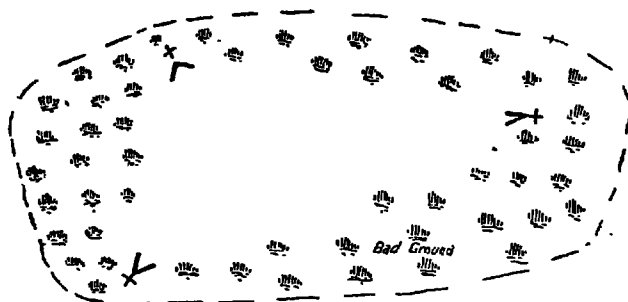


FIG. 3.—UNFENCED GROUND.

DESTRUCTIVE INSECTS AND PESTS
ACTS, 1877 AND 1907.WART DISEASE OF POTATOES (IM-
PORTED SCOTTISH SEED POTATOES)
ORDER OF 1920.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, hereby orders as follows:—

Commencement.

1. This Order shall come into operation on the fifteenth day of November, nineteen hundred and twenty.

Restrictions on dealings in Scottish Seed Potatoes.

2. (1) In the case of any seed potatoes grown in Scotland and brought after the commencement of this Order into England or Wales, the person in England or Wales by whom the same are so brought or to whom the potatoes are consigned, unless he has received a declaration relating thereto, as set out below, shall notify the fact to the Ministry within seven days after the receipt of the potatoes, and shall not dispose of the potatoes except with the permission of the Minister or of an Inspector of the Ministry:—

(2) The declaration required by this Article is—

(a) *In the case of seed potatoes of an approved immune variety*:—A declaration signed by, or on behalf of, the consignor or the person by whom the potatoes are brought into England or Wales, correctly stating the serial number of the certificate of purity issued in respect of the relative growing crop by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland; or

(b) *In the case of other seed potatoes (i.e., including potatoes of approved immune varieties from crops in respect of which certificates of purity have not been issued)*:—

A declaration signed by, or on behalf of, the consignor or the person by whom the potatoes are brought into England or Wales, correctly stating the reference number allotted by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland to the certificate, issued not more than nine months prior to the date of importation, in respect of the land on which the potatoes were grown to the effect that, so far as the Board are aware, Wart Disease has not occurred thereon nor within one mile of such land.

Production of Declarations and Information to be given.

3. Every person who has or has had in his possession or under his charge, and every person

who as auctioneer, salesman, or otherwise has sold or offered for sale, any seed potatoes grown in Scotland shall, if so required in writing by the Minister or an Inspector, give the Minister or the Inspector, as the case may be, all such information as he possesses as to the persons in whose possession or under whose charge they are or have been, and shall produce for examination by an Inspector the declaration (if any) in his possession prescribed by Article 2 of this Order relating to the potatoes and any records or invoices relating to the sale or purchase of potatoes; provided that any information given under this Article shall not be available as evidence against the person giving the same in any prosecution under this Order, except in respect of an alleged failure to comply with this Article.

Powers of Entry.

4. An Inspector, upon production if so required of his appointment, may for the purpose of enforcing this Order enter any land and any premises and examine any potatoes thereon.

Offences.

5. Every person shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds who does any act in contravention of this Order, or fails to do any act which, by this Order or any notice served on him under this Order, he is required to do.

Definitions.

6. In this Order—

“Minister” and “Ministry” mean the Minister and Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

“Inspector” means, where context permits, an Inspector of the Ministry or an Inspector appointed by the Local Authority and approved by the Minister.

“The Local Authority” means as regards any District the Local Authority for the District under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“Wart Disease” means the disease affecting potatoes which is caused by *Synchytrium endobioticum*, and known as Wart Disease of Potatoes, or Black Scab or Cauliflower Disease.

“An approved immune variety” is a variety approved for the time being by the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries as being immune from Wart Disease;

The expression “person” includes a corporation.

Revocation of Order.

7. The Wart Disease of Potatoes (Scottish Seed Potatoes) Order of 1919 is hereby revoked; provided that such revocation shall not:—

(i) affect the previous operation of such Order or anything duly done or suffered under such Order; or

(ii) affect any right, privilege, obligation or liability acquired, accrued, or incurred under such Order; or

(iii) affect any penalty incurred in respect of any offence committed against such Order; or

(iv) affect any investigation, legal proceeding or remedy in respect of any such right,

privilege, obligation, liability or penalty as aforesaid;

and any such investigation, legal proceeding or remedy may be instituted, continued or enforced, and any such penalty may be imposed as if this Order had not been made.

Application of the Order.

8. This Order shall apply to England and Wales.
