

year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134; of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49; and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Matthew, Victoria Docks, situate in the New Parish (some time District Chapelry) of Saint Luke, Victoria Docks, in the County of Essex and in the Diocese of Chelmsford:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Matthew, Victoria Docks, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Edwin, Bishop of Chelmsford (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Victoria Docks, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Matthew, Victoria Docks, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, Victoria Docks.'

"And with the like consent of the said John Edwin, Bishop of Chelmsford (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Matthew, Victoria Docks, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of banns and of the solemnization or performance of marriages, churchings and burials should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, Victoria Docks, being:—

"All that part of the New Parish (some time District Chapelry) of Saint Luke, Victoria Docks, in the County of Essex and in the Diocese of Chelmsford, which is bounded upon the south by the New Parish of Saint Mark, Victoria Docks, upon the east by the New Parish of the Ascension, Victoria Docks, upon the north by the New Parish of Saint Andrew, Plaistow, all in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Andrew, Plaistow, from the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Victoria Docks, turns northward along the middle of Freemasons Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Freemasons Road for a distance of 13 chains or

thereabouts to its junction with Russell Road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Russell Road for a distance of 11½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Butchers Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Butchers Road for a distance of 9 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Clever Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Clever Road for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Frederick Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Frederick Road for a distance of 16½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Victoria Dock Road, and extending thence in a straight line due south (thereby crossing the Woolwich Branch Line of the Great Eastern Railway) for a distance of 17 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Royal Victoria Dock upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Victoria Docks, from the said New Parish of Saint Mark, Victoria Docks."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chelmsford.

"Whereas under and by virtue of the several Indentures, particulars whereof are set forth in the Schedule hereunder written, the lands, tenements and hereditaments situate in the Parishes of Winston and Pettaugh aforesaid and particularly described in the same Indentures and Schedule became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us:

"And whereas none of the said lands, tenements and hereditaments is subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but the same are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates
