WHEREAS by the Isle of Man (War Legislation) Act, 1914, His Majesty has power to extend to the Isle of Man any Act which, in the opinion of His Majesty, was passed for the purpose of meeting any emergency created by the present War, subject to adaptations for the purpose of making the Act applicable to the Isle of Man:

And whereas by Section 4 of the War Emergency Laws (Continuance) Act, 1920, it is declared that any Order in Council made under the said Act, extending any enactment or regulation to the Isle of Man, may be revoked by Order in Council:

And whereas the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks (Temporary Rules) Acts, 1914, and any Rules which had been issued by His Majesty thereunder, were extended to the Isle of Man by Order in Council of the 7th day of January, 1915:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Acts and Rules should no longer extend to the Isle of Man:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council of the 7th day of January, 1915, shall be revoked.

WHEREAS by the first section of the Colonial Probates Act, 1892, it was enacted as follows:—

"Her Majesty the Queen may, on being satisfied that the Legislature of any British Possession has made adequate provision for the recognition in that Possession of all Probates and Letters of Administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom, direct by Order in Council that this Act shall, subject to any exceptions and modifications specified in the Order, apply to that Possession; and thereupon while the Order is in force, this Act shall apply accordingly":

And whereas His Majesty the King is satisfied that the Legislature of the British Possession hereinafter mentioned has made adequate provision for the recognition in that Possession of Probates and Letters of Administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue, and in exercise of the powers by the above recited Act in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and

with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Colonial Probates Act, 1892, shall apply to the British Possession hereunder mentioned:—

The Colony of the Gambia.

And the Right Honourable Winston L. Spencer Churchill, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
