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TUESDAY, 5 APRIL, 1921.

At the Court at Windsor Castle, the 1st day of April, 1921.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Emergency Powers Act, 1920, it is provided, amongst other things, as follows:—

“ 1. (1) If at any time it appears to His Majesty that any action has been taken or is immediately threatened by any persons or body of persons of such a nature and on so extensive a scale as to be calculated, by interfering with the supply and distribution of food, water, fuel, or light, or with the means of locomotion, to deprive the community, or any substantial portion of the community, of the essentials of life, His Majesty may, by proclamation (hereinafter referred to as a Proclamation of Emergency), declare that a state of emergency exists.

“ No such proclamation shall be in force for more than one month, without prejudice to the issue of another proclamation at or before the end of that period.

“ (2) Where a Proclamation of Emergency has been made the occasion thereof shall

forthwith be communicated to Parliament, and, if Parliament is then separated by such adjournment or prorogation as will not expire within five days, a proclamation shall be issued for the meeting of Parliament within five days, and Parliament shall accordingly meet and sit upon the day appointed by that proclamation, and shall continue to sit and act in like manner as if it had stood adjourned or prorogued to the same day.

“ 2. (1) Where a Proclamation of Emergency has been made, and so long as the proclamation is in force, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order, to make regulations for securing the essentials of life to the community, and those regulations may confer or impose on a Secretary of State or other Government Department, or any other persons in His Majesty's service or acting on His Majesty's behalf, such powers and duties as His Majesty may deem necessary for the preservation of the peace, for securing and regulating the supply and distribution of food, water, fuel, light, and other necessities, for maintaining the means of transit or locomotion, and for any other purposes essential to the public safety and the life of the community, and may make such

provisions incidental to the powers aforesaid as may appear to His Majesty to be required for making the exercise of those powers effective:

"Provided that nothing in this Act shall be construed to authorise the making of any regulations imposing any form of compulsory military service or industrial conscription:

"Provided also that no such regulation shall make it an offence for any person or persons to take part in a strike, or peacefully to persuade any other person or persons to take part in a strike."

And whereas a Proclamation of Emergency under the said Act has been made by His Majesty and is now in force:

And whereas in pursuance of the powers above recited it is expedient to make such provision as hereinafter appears:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Power to Take Possession of Land, etc.

1. It shall be lawful for the Minister of Transport, the Board of Trade and any other Department approved by His Majesty for the purpose, and any person duly authorised by a department on whom powers are conferred by this regulation, where it appears necessary to do so, to take possession of any land, buildings or works (including works for the supply of gas, electricity or water and of any sources of water supply) and any property (including plant, machinery, equipment and stores) used or intended to be used in connection therewith.

If after any such department or person has issued a notice that that department or person has taken or intends to take possession of any moveable property in pursuance of this regulation, any person having control of any such property sells, removes or secretes it without the consent of the department or person he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Without prejudice to the foregoing powers it shall be lawful for the Minister of Transport and for the Commissioners of Works to take possession of any land, buildings or other property for the purpose of providing accommodation in connection with any scheme of road transport or for housing persons engaged thereon or of feeding or supplying necessaries to such persons.

Power to Take Possession of Food, Forage, Material and Stores.

2. It shall be lawful for the Admiralty, Army Council, Air Council, Minister of Transport, Commissioners of Works, and any other department approved by His Majesty for the purpose, to take possession of any food, forage, material or stores, and any articles required for or in connection with the production thereof.

If, after any such department has issued a notice that they have taken or intend to take possession of any food, forage, material, stores or article in pursuance of this regulation, any person having control of any such food, forage, material, stores or article without the consent of the department sells, removes or secretes the same, or deals therewith in any way contrary to any conditions imposed in any licence, permit or order that may have been granted in respect thereof, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Road Transport.

3. (1) The Minister of Transport may by order:—

(a) regulate, restrict, or give directions with respect to, the use for the purposes of road transport or the sale or purchase of any horses or vehicles in use or capable of being used for the purpose of road transport:

(b) take possession of any such horses or vehicles as aforesaid, or require them to be placed at the disposal of the Minister, or of any person specified by the Minister in that behalf, either absolutely or by way of hire, and either for immediate or future use:

(c) require persons owning, or having in their possession or under their control, any such horses or vehicles as aforesaid to make to the Minister, or to any person specified by the Minister in that behalf, returns giving the prescribed particulars with respect to those horses and vehicles, and require any such returns to be verified in the prescribed manner:

(d) require persons owning, or having in their possession or under their control, any such horse or vehicle as aforesaid to give notice in the prescribed manner before disposing thereof, or allowing it to pass out of their possession or control:

(e) prohibit the carriage of goods of any class by road, and prescribe the radius or distance within which goods of any class may be carried by road:

(f) provide for the giving of directions with respect to the carriage of goods on any particular vehicles, or by any particular route, or to any particular clearing house or depot:

(g) regulate the priority in which goods are to be carried by road and vehicles used for the purposes of road transport:

(h) prescribe the conditions on which, and the rates at which, horses or vehicles may be hired for the purpose of road transport and goods carried by road, and the conditions on which goods so carried or to be carried are to be loaded or discharged:

(i) make such other provisions in relation to road transport as appear to the Minister necessary or expedient.

(2) Any order under this regulation may be made so as to apply either generally to all horses and vehicles, or to horses or vehicles of any class, or to horses or vehicles belonging to any particular owner.

(3) For the purpose of testing the accuracy of any return made to the Minister under this regulation, or of obtaining information in the case of failure to make a return, or to give any prescribed notice, any person authorised in that behalf by the Minister may enter any premises belonging to or in the occupation of the person who has made or has failed to make the return, or on which the person so authorised has reason to believe that any horses or vehicles with respect to which a return has been required under this regulation are kept, and may carry out such inspection and examination (including the inspection and examination of books) as he may consider necessary for testing the accuracy of the return, or for obtaining such information.

(4) No individual return or part of a return made, and no information obtained, under this regulation, shall without lawful

authority be published or disclosed by any person except for the purpose of a prosecution under this regulation.

(5) If in any case the Minister is of opinion that it is expedient to obtain information from any person in connection with any horses or vehicles, the Minister may, without making an order for the purpose, require or authorise any person on his behalf to require that person to furnish him or any person so authorised with that information, and where the Minister or any person so authorised so requires any information to be furnished the provisions of this regulation shall apply to information furnished and the furnishing of the information as they apply to returns made and the making of returns.

(6) In this regulation the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by an order made under this regulation, and the expression "horse" includes "mule."

(7) If any person:

(a) acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of this regulation or of any order or requirement made thereunder; or

(b) sells, removes or secretes any horse or vehicle so as to, or with intent to, defeat, obstruct or delay the operation of any order made under this regulation or any directions duly given in pursuance of any such order; he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Tramways and Light Railways.

4. The Minister of Transport for the purpose of making the most efficient use of the materials or plant belonging to a tramway or light railway undertaking may, by order, require the whole or any part of the rolling-stock, materials and plant, including permanent way, of any such undertaking to be placed at his disposal or at the disposal of any person or body of persons named by him.

Where any such order has been made the Minister or any such person or body of persons may take possession of such portions of the rolling-stock, materials or plant of such undertaking as they may require, and may remove them and make use of them for the purposes of any other tramway or light railway.

(2) If any person fails to comply with the provisions of any order made under this regulation or wilfully hinders or impedes the execution of any such order, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Power to Direct Traffic on Highways.

5. Where with a view to preventing congestion of traffic on, or excessive damage to, public highways the Minister of Transport considers it is expedient to do so, he may by order regulate or provide for the regulation of transport on public highways, and may by such order provide for directions being given for prescribing the routes to be followed and restricting the types of vehicles to be used, and if any person affected by the order fails to comply with the provisions thereof or with any directions given thereunder he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Driving Licences.

6. The Minister of Transport or any person appointed by him for the purpose may grant to any person a licence to drive a motor car

during the period for which the proclamation of emergency is in force which shall have effect as if granted under the Motor Car Act, 1903, and may suspend during that period any licence granted under that Act.

Canals.

7.—(1) Where the Minister of Transport is of opinion that it is expedient that this regulation should be applied to any canals, the Minister may by order apply this regulation, subject to any exceptions for which provision may be made in the order, either generally to all canals or to canals in any special area or to any special canals.

(2) Any canals to which this regulation is so applied shall, by virtue of the order, pass into the possession of the Minister as from the date of the order, or from any later date mentioned in the order, and the owner of every such canal and every person concerned in the management or working thereof, and where the owner of the canal is a company, every director of the company, shall comply with the directions of the Minister as to the management and user of the canal, and if he fails to do so he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(3) In this regulation the expression "canal" includes all buildings, barges, machinery and plant used in connection with the working of the canal.

(4) Where the Minister has taken possession of any canal, the Minister may by order prohibit persons, not being the owner of the canal, who own any barges used thereon, or any machinery or plant used in connection with the loading or unloading of any such barges, from disposing of any such barges, machinery or plant, without the consent of the Minister or some person or body of persons acting on his behalf, and if any person acts in contravention of any such order, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(5) The Minister shall have power by order to apply this regulation to undertakings of carriers by canal in like manner and with the like consequences as in the case of canals, and for the purposes of this provision the expression "carrier by canal" means a person, not being an owner of a canal, who carries on the business of transporting goods by canal, and the expression "undertaking" includes all buildings, barges, machinery and plant used by the owner thereof in connection with such business.

Ports and Harbours.

8. The Board of Trade or any other Government Department approved by His Majesty for the purpose may by order close to traffic any port or harbour or any part of any such port or harbour and issue any directions which may be necessary for regulating the traffic in any such ports and harbours, and if any Dock or Harbour Company or Authority fails to comply with any such order or directions, they shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Shipping.

9.—(1) The Board of Trade or any other Government Department approved by His Majesty for the purpose may make orders regulating, restricting or giving directions with respect to the nature of the trades in which ships are to be employed, the traffic to be carried therein, and the terms and conditions

on which the traffic is to be carried, the ports at which cargo is to be loaded or discharged or passengers embarked or disembarked (including directions requiring ships to proceed to specified ports for the purpose of loading or unloading cargo or embarking or disembarking passengers), the ports at which consignees of cargo are to take delivery thereof, and other matters affecting shipping where it appears to the department necessary or expedient to make any such order for the purpose of making shipping available for the needs of the country in such manner as to make the best use thereof having regard to the circumstances of the time or for providing and maintaining an efficient supply of shipping.

(2) The Board of Trade or any other Government Department approved as aforesaid may where it appears to the department necessary or expedient for such purposes as aforesaid, by order, requisition or require to be placed at the disposal of the department, in order that they may be used in the manner best suited for the needs of the country any ships or any cargo space or passenger accommodation in any ships, or any rights under any charter, freight engagement or similar contract affecting any ship, and require ships so requisitioned to be delivered to the department or to any person or persons named by the department at such times and at such places as the department may require.

(3) Any order made under this regulation affecting any ship may be served on the owner of the ship, and shall be deemed to be sufficiently served if sent by registered post addressed to the managing owner or other person to whom the management of the ship is entrusted by or on behalf of the owner at his registered address.

(4) Any order under this regulation may be made either so as to apply generally to all ships or to apply to ships belonging to any particular owner, or to ships of any class or description, or so as to apply to any specified ship, and if the fulfilment by any person of any contract is interfered with by the necessity on the part of himself or any other person of complying with any such order that necessity shall be a good defence to any action or proceedings taken against that person in respect of the non-fulfilment of the contract so far as it is due to that interference.

(5) If the owner, master, or other person in charge of a ship, or any other person affected by an order under this regulation acts in contravention of or fails to comply with any provisions of the order, or aids or abets any other person, whether or not such other person is in Great Britain, in doing anything which if done in Great Britain would be a contravention of any such provisions, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(6) Where before the date of these regulations any ship or any cargo space or passenger accommodation in any ship or any rights under any charter, freight engagement, or similar contract affecting any ship has been requisitioned by the Shipping Controller or the Board of Trade, this regulation shall, after that date, apply as if the same had been requisitioned in pursuance of this regulation.

Priority in Transport.

10. Without prejudice to any other powers possessed by him, whether under these regulations or otherwise, the Minister of Transport

may by order regulate the priority in which passengers or goods are to be carried by railway, light railway, tramway, or canal; and if any person acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of any such order he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Clearances and Unloading of Ships.

11.—(1) The clearance of any ship whether to ports beyond the seas or coastwise may be refused except under such conditions as the Commissioners of Customs and Excise may allow and any clearance granted may be withdrawn.

(2) Subject to the general directions of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, the collector or other chief officer of Customs at any port or place in the United Kingdom may prohibit the unloading of any goods or any class of goods from ships, or from any particular ship, in that port or place; and if any goods are unloaded from any ship in contravention of such prohibition, any person unloading the same shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Prohibition of Export.

12. The Board of Trade may by order prohibit, except under such conditions as their licence may allow, the shipment of any goods for exportation or carriage coastwise whether as merchandise or as ship's stores, and if any goods are shipped or brought to a quay or other place or waterborne for shipment in contravention of such prohibition, the shipper thereof or his agent shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Coal Mines.

13.—(1) The Board of Trade may take possession, or if already in possession may retain possession, and may from time to time as may be deemed expedient, relinquish and resume possession of:—

(a) All or any coal mines, collieries and colliery buildings and property, including plant, machinery, equipment, stores and rolling stock, for the time being used, or intended to be or usually used, for the purposes of the production, treatment, or manufacture of coal;

(b) All or any buildings and property for the time being used, or intended to be or usually used or which may be deemed requisite for the purposes of the storage, distribution, supply and disposal of coal;

(c) All or any railway wagons (not being wagons belonging to any railway company) for the time being used, or intended to be or usually used, for the purposes of transport of coal;

(d) Any stocks of coal, wheresoever situate and by whomsoever held;

(e) Any plant, machinery, vehicles or articles which may be deemed requisite for the purposes of maintaining the supply and distribution of coal.

(2) The Board of Trade may give directions:—

(a) As to the management and user of any coal mine or any property of which possession may be taken as aforesaid;

(b) As to the production, manufacture, treatment, transport, storage, distribution, supply, disposal and use of any coal;

- (c) As to the fixing of prices of coal;
 (d) As to the making and supplying of records, returns and information, and the verification thereof.

(3) The owner, agent and manager of every coal mine and every officer thereof, and every owner and person for the time being in possession of any such property as aforesaid, and where any such owner or possessor is a company, every director of the company, and every person engaged or employed in the production, manufacture, treatment, transport, storage, distribution, supply and disposal of coal, and every person using coal shall comply with the directions so given as aforesaid.

(4) The Board of Trade may cause inquiries to be held by any person or persons with respect to any matters to which any of the powers hereby conferred relate.

(5) The Board of Trade may provide for the exercise by any person or body of persons approved by them of any powers conferred upon the Board by this regulation.

(6) The taking or retaining of any coal mine, or of any factory, workshop, premises, or plant shall not affect the liability of the actual owner, agent or manager of the mine under the Coal Mines Acts, 1887 to 1919, or any Act amending the same, or the liability of the actual owner or occupier of such factory, workshop, premises or plant under the Factory and Workshop Acts, 1901 to 1911.

(7) For the purposes of this regulation the expression "coal" shall include the products of coal, and gas and electricity made from or by means of coal whether for lighting, heating or any other purpose.

(8) The powers of the Board of Trade under this regulation shall, subject to the directions of the Board, be exercised by the Secretary for Mines.

(9) If any person fails to comply with any direction of the Board of Trade or the Secretary for Mines under this regulation, or obstructs any person acting on behalf of the Board under this regulation he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Gas, Water and Electricity.

14.—(1) It shall be lawful for the Board of Trade or for the Minister of Transport by order to require the owners of any undertakings for the supply of gas, water, or electricity to comply with any directions given by the Board or Minister as to the supply thereof.

(2) Where any such order has been issued, or where in pursuance of the powers conferred by any of these regulations possession has been taken of any works for the supply of gas, water, or electricity, it shall be the duty of the owners of the undertaking and of every officer and servant of the owners and where the owners are a company of every director of the company to comply with any directions which may be given by the Board or Minister, and any person failing so to comply shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Motor Spirit.

15.—(1) The Board of Trade may by order prohibit or regulate the sale, supply, delivery or use of motor spirit, and require any persons owning or having the power to sell or dispose of motor spirit to place the same at the disposal of the Board or of any person authorised by them.

(2) In this regulation the expression "motor spirit" includes any inflammable liquid substance capable of being used for the purpose of driving motor vehicles.

(3) If any person contravenes or fails to comply with any provision of any order made under this regulation he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Telegraph Messages.

16. It shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General to direct that telegraphic messages of such classes or descriptions as he may prescribe shall not be accepted for transmission.

Firearms, &c.

17.—(1) A Secretary of State may by order in any area specified in the order, prohibit either absolutely or subject to such exceptions as he may prescribe, the buying, selling or otherwise dealing in any arms, parts of arms, ammunition or explosive substances, and may by such order require all persons having in their possession any arms, parts of arms, ammunition or explosive substances to keep the same in a secure place approved by the chief officer of police, or to remove them to any place directed by such chief officer of police, and if any person contravenes such an order or direction he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(2) A Secretary of State may by order, in any area specified in the order, prohibit either absolutely or subject to such exceptions as he may prescribe, the carrying or use of arms, parts of arms, ammunition or explosive substances, and if any person contravenes any such order he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(3) If any person by the discharge of firearms or otherwise endangers the safety of any member of any of His Majesty's forces or any police constable or member of any fire brigade or other person who is charged with the execution of any duties under these regulations he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(4) If any person attends or takes part in any meeting or procession having in his possession any firearm or ammunition or any other weapon of offence or explosive substance or any stone or other dangerous missile, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(5) In the application of this regulation to Scotland, references to a Secretary of State shall be construed as references to the Secretary for Scotland.

Injury to Property.

18.—(1) If any person injures or does any act calculated to injure any public building, railway, canal, bridge, road, tramway, telegraph or telephone line, cable, or plant, mine, shop, factory, waterworks, gasworks, electric generating station, or other works or plant used or adapted for use for the supply, storage, or transport of food, fuel, munitions, water, light, heat, or power, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(2) If any person approaches or is in the neighbourhood of or enters any such place as aforesaid with intent to do injury thereto he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations; and notwithstanding that no such act

or injury is committed by him, he shall be deemed to be guilty of such an offence if by reason of his being in possession of any explosive or incendiary substance or lethal weapon or dangerous missile, or otherwise from the circumstances of the case or his conduct or his known character as proved, it appears that his purpose was to do such injury

'Acts Likely to Cause Sedition, &c.

19. If any person attempts or does any act calculated or likely to cause mutiny, sedition or disaffection among any of His Majesty's forces, or among the members of any police force, or any fire brigade, or among the civilian population, or to impede, delay or restrict any measures taken for securing and regulating the supply or distribution of food, water, fuel, light or other necessities for maintaining the means of transit or locomotion, or for any other purposes essential to the public safety or the life of the community, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations:

Provided that a person shall not be guilty of an offence under this regulation by reason only of his taking part in a strike, or peacefully persuading any other person to take part in a strike.

Public Meetings and Processions.

20. Where there appears to be reason to apprehend that the assembly of any persons for the purpose of the holding of any meeting will give rise to grave disorder, and will thereby cause undue demands to be made upon the police or military forces, or that the holding of any procession will conduce to a breach of the peace or will promote disaffection, it shall be lawful for a Secretary of State, or for any mayor, magistrate, or chief officer of police who is duly authorised by a Secretary of State, or for two or more of such persons so authorised, to make an order prohibiting the holding of the meeting or procession, and if a meeting or procession is held or attempted to be held in contravention of any such prohibition, it shall be lawful to take such steps as may be necessary to disperse the meeting or procession or prevent the holding thereof.

In the application of this regulation to Scotland "the Secretary for Scotland" shall be substituted for "a Secretary of State" and "provost" for "mayor."

Unlawful Drilling, &c.

21. A Secretary of State or, in Scotland, the Secretary for Scotland, may by order in any area specified in the order prohibit either absolutely or subject to such exceptions as he may prescribe the practice of or taking part in or being concerned in any exercise, movement, evolution or drill of a military nature, and if any person, other than a member of His Majesty's naval, military or air forces or a constable, practises or takes part in or is concerned in any such exercise, movement, evolution or drill, or is concerned in or assists the promotion or organisation of any such exercise, movement, evolution or drill by persons, other than members of His Majesty's naval, military or air forces or police constables, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Employment of His Majesty's Forces.

22. Where a Secretary of State by order has declared that any service is a service of vital importance to the community, it shall be the duty of every person subject to the Naval Discipline Act or to military law or to the Air Force Act to obey any command given by any superior officer in relation to employment upon or in connection with such service, and every such command shall be deemed to be a lawful command within the meaning and for the purposes of the Naval Discipline Act, the Army Act and the Air Force Act

Obstruction of Officers.

23. If any person obstructs, knowingly misleads, or otherwise interferes with or impedes, or withholds any information in his possession which he may reasonably be required to furnish from, any officer or other person who is carrying out the orders of any Government Department or who is otherwise acting in accordance with his duty under these regulations he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Delegation of Powers.

24. Any Government Department on whom powers or duties are conferred or imposed by these regulations may make arrangements with any other Government Department for the exercise by that Department of those powers or duties, and in such case that Department and the officers thereof shall have and may exercise the same powers and duties as are by these regulations conferred on the first mentioned Department and the officers thereof; and the Minister of Health, or as respects Scotland the Secretary for Scotland, may, by arrangement with any Government Department on whom powers or duties are conferred or imposed by these regulations, confer or impose on any local authorities and their officers any powers and duties in connection with the enforcement of these regulations, and any powers and duties necessary to provide for the due discharge of any functions assigned to local authorities by any Government Department under these regulations.

Compensation.

25. The compensation payable in respect of any property which is requisitioned or of which possession is taken under these regulations shall be such as may be determined in default of agreement by a single arbitrator appointed in England by the Lord Chancellor and in Scotland by the Lord President of the Court of Session, and in assessing the amount of compensation payable in any particular case, regard shall not be had to any increase in the value of the property which is due to the emergency.

Penalties.

26.—(1) If any person contravenes or otherwise fails to comply with any of the provisions of these regulations or any order or direction made or given thereunder, or is guilty of an offence against these regulations, or obstructs any police or other officer or any other person in the execution of his duties under these regulations, he shall be liable on summary conviction to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding three months, or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds,

or to both such imprisonment and fine, and shall be liable to forfeit to the Crown any goods or money in respect of which the offence was committed.

(2) Where the person guilty of any such offence is a corporation, company or society, any director, officer, or trustee, or other person concerned with the management thereof, shall be guilty of the like offence unless he proves that the offence was committed without his knowledge or consent.

(3) For the purpose of the trial of a person for an offence under these regulations, such offence shall be deemed to have been committed either at the place in which the same actually was committed or at any place in which the offender may be, and the court in Scotland shall be the sheriff court.

Arrest without Warrant, &c.

27.—(1) Any police constable may arrest without warrant any person who so acts as to endanger the public safety, or who is guilty, or is suspected of being guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(2) Any police constable may, if authorised by order of a Secretary of State or of a chief officer of police, enter, if need be by force, any premises or place suspected of being used for purposes so endangering the public safety, and may search any part of such place or premises and may seize and detain anything found therein which is suspected of being used for such purposes as aforesaid, and deal with the things so seized in such manner as the Secretary of State may determine.

(3) Any police constable may search any person whom he believes to be in possession of, or to be using or carrying any article, the possession, use or carrying of which by such person is an offence against these regulations, and may seize and detain any such article found on such person.

(4) Any police constable may stop and search any vehicle which he has reason to suspect to be used for any purpose prejudicial to the public safety, or contrary to these regulations, or to be carrying any article, the possession, use or carrying of which is an offence against these regulations, and may seize and detain any such vehicle or any such article found therein.

(5) In the application of this regulation to Scotland "the Secretary for Scotland" shall be substituted for "a Secretary of State."

Attempts to Commit Offences.

28. Any person who attempts to commit, or solicits, or incites, or endeavours to persuade another person to commit, or procures, aids, or abets, or does any act preparatory to, the commission of any act prohibited by these regulations, or any order, directions, rules, or other instrument made thereunder, or harbours any person whom he knows, or has reasonable grounds for supposing, to have acted in contravention of these regulations, or any order, directions, rules, or other instrument made thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Power to Enter Premises.

29. If a justice of the peace is satisfied, by information in writing upon oath laid before

him by an officer of police of a rank not below that of inspector, that any house, land, building, or other premises are being, or are about to be used for any purpose or in any way prejudicial to the public safety, or by persons suspected of attempting to cause mutiny, sedition, or disaffection among His Majesty's forces, or among the members of any police force or fire brigade or among the civil population, the justice may, by order, require the premises either to be closed altogether, or not to be used for any purpose prohibited by the order, or not to be used except in accordance with conditions and restrictions imposed by the order, and if the owner or occupier of the premises, or any other person contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of the order or any conditions or restrictions imposed thereby, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

In the application of this regulation to Scotland, references to a Justice of the Peace shall be construed as references to the Sheriff.

Effect of Regulations on Contracts.

30. If the fulfilment by any person of any contract is interfered with by the necessity on the part of himself or any other person of complying with these regulations or any order or direction thereunder, that necessity shall be a good defence to any action or proceedings taken against that person in respect of the non-fulfilment of the contract so far as it is due to that interference.

Interpretation.

31.—(1) In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires, the expression "chief officer of police"—

(a) with respect to any place in England or Wales, other than the City of London, has the meaning assigned to it by the Police Act, 1890;

(b) with respect to the City of London, means the Commissioner of the City Police;

(c) with respect to Scotland, has the meaning assigned to it by the Police (Scotland) Act, 1890; and

the expression "police constable" includes a special constable.

(2) The Interpretation Act, 1889, shall apply to these regulations as though they were an Act of Parliament.

Saving Provisions.

32.—(1) The powers conferred by these regulations shall be in addition to and not in derogation of any prerogative, right or other power vested in His Majesty.

(2) Any powers conferred on any department or person by any of these regulations shall be in addition to and not in derogation of any other powers of that department or person, whether conferred by statute, regulation or otherwise.

(3) Any order of any government department in force at the date of these regulations under the Defence of the Realm Regulations, whether as originally made or as incorporated in, or continued by any Act of Parliament

shall, unless revoked or varied, continue in force notwithstanding anything in these regulations and shall, if the department so directs, have effect as if made under these regulations.

(4) Any order, direction or instrument which may be made or given by any government department or other authority under these regulations may be added to, revoked or varied from time to time by such department or authority while these regulations continue in force.

Short Title and Extent.

33.—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Emergency Regulations, 1921.

(2) These regulations do not apply to Ireland.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Peter, South Shore, situate in the New Parish (sometime Consolidated Chapelry) of the Holy Trinity, South Shore, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Manchester:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Peter, South Shore, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Manchester, (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, South Shore, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Peter, South Shore, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, South Shore.'

"And with the like consent of the said William, Bishop of Manchester, (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commis-

sioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Peter, South Shore, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees or dues to be received in respect of the publication of banns and of the solemnization or performance of marriages, churchings and burials should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, South Shore, being:—

"All that part of the New Parish (sometime Consolidated Chapelry) of the Holy Trinity, South Shore, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Manchester, which is bounded upon the west by the sea, upon the north by the Particular District of All Saints, Blackpool, in the same County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said Particular District of All Saints, Blackpool, from the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, South Shore, crosses the middle of the Kirkham, Lytham and Blackpool Coast Line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire and London and North Western Joint Railway, near the northern side of the bridge which carries such line of railway across Rigby Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 42½ chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northern side of the road known as Castle Gate, and extending thence westward to and along the northern side of the said road for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the eastern side of Lytham Road, and extending thence first westward to and then northward along the middle of Lytham Road for a distance in all of 17 yards or thereabouts to its junction with Shaw Road and extending thence westward along the middle of Shaw Road for a distance of 15½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Promenade, and continuing thence in precisely the same direction as the latter part of Shaw Road and in a straight line to the sea."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Manchester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Saint Philip and Saint James, Milton, in the County of Stafford and in the Diocese of Lichfield:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Philip and Saint James, Milton, is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Right Honourable Charles Leigh, Baron Norton:

"And whereas the said Charles Leigh, Baron Norton, is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Philip and Saint James, Milton, now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said Diocese of Lichfield:

"And whereas the Right Reverend John Augustine, now Bishop of Lichfield, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said John Augustine, Bishop of Lichfield, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Saint Philip and Saint James, Milton, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the New Parish of Saint Philip and Saint James, Milton:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Charles Leigh, Baron Norton (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said John Augustine, Bishop of Lichfield (in testimony

whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Philip and Saint James, Milton, now vested in him the said Charles Leigh, Baron Norton, as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said John Augustine, Bishop of Lichfield, and his successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said John Augustine, Bishop of Lichfield, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether Extra-Parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted Separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a Separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, Parochial

or Extra-Parochial, so as to form a Separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend William Shuckburgh, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, hath made a Representation in a writing dated the 10th day of September, 1920, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend William Shuckburgh, Bishop of Lincoln, do hereby represent to Your Grace that there is in the County and Diocese of Lincoln the Vicarage and Parish Church of Hale Magna with Hale Parva.

"That the population of the Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva according to the census of 1911 amounts to 812 persons.

"That there is one Church belonging to the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva affording accommodation for 266 persons.

"That the net annual value of the said Vicarage of Hale Magna with Hale Parva is £472 8s. 7d. arising from Tithe Rent Charge, Glebe and Fees.

"That there is a good and sufficient house of residence for the Incumbent of the said Benefice.

"That the said Vicarage of Hale Magna with Hale Parva is in the Patronage of the Right Honourable Frederick, Baron Birkenhead, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting for and on behalf of His Most Gracious Majesty King George the Fifth.

"That there is in the said County and Diocese the Vicarage and Parish Church of Heckington.

"That the population of the said Parish of Heckington according to the census of 1911 amounts to 1,666 persons.

"That there are one Parish Church and one Chapel of Ease belonging to the said Vicarage of Heckington, the Parish Church affording accommodation for 716 persons and the Chapel of Ease affording accommodation for 124 persons.

"That the net annual value of the said Vicarage of Heckington is £371 14s. 1d. arising from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners,

Glebe, Tithe Modus fees and an Endowment of the aforesaid Chapel of Ease.

"That there is a good and sufficient house of residence for the Incumbent of the said Benefice.

"That the said Vicarage of Heckington is in my Patronage in right of my Bishopric.

"That a portion of the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva containing an estimated population of from 25 to 30 persons is upwards of four miles by the nearest road from the Parish Church of Hale Magna with Hale Parva, but it is situated at a distance of three and a half miles by the nearest road from the Church of Heckington.

"That the aforesaid Chapel of Ease stands partly in the Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva and partly in the Parish of Heckington.

"That it appears to me that the said portion of the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva, as shown upon the Plan hereto annexed and thereon edged round with red, may, under the provisions of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva and annexed to the said Parish of Heckington to which it is contiguous.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the 26th Section of the above-mentioned Act of Parliament, I, the said Bishop of Lincoln, have drawn up a Scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do submit the same to Your Grace together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Right Honourable Frederick, Baron Birkenhead, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Patron and the Reverend Frederick McKenzie the Vicar of the said Vicarage of Hale Magna with Hale Parva of me the said William Shuckburgh, Bishop of Lincoln, the Patron, and the Reverend Charles Arthur Norris the Vicar of the said Vicarage of Heckington to the intent that Your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said Scheme certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"That the portion of the Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva which is shown on the Plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured round with red and more particularly described in the Schedule hereto be separated from the said Vicarage and Parish Church of Hale Magna with Hale Parva and annexed to the contiguous Parish of Heckington for all Ecclesiastical purposes and that it shall remain under the same Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction as the said Vicarage and Parish Church of Heckington now are.

"That the Incumbent of Heckington shall have exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the said portion of the Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva so to be annexed to the said Parish of Heckington.

"That Baptisms, Churchings, Marriages and Burials in respect of the Inhabitants of the

said portion of the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva shall be performed and take place in the Church of Heckington and in the Burial Ground thereto belonging, and that the fees for the same and for other Ecclesiastical Offices and all Ecclesiastical Dues and Offerings arising from and in respect of the said portion of the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva so to be annexed to the said Parish of Heckington and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice shall belong and be paid to the Incumbent of the said Parish and Benefice of Heckington.

"That the Inhabitants of the same portion of the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the Church of the Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva or any other Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, but shall be liable, subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act, 1868,' to repair the said Church of the Parish of Heckington.

"That the Inhabitants of the said portion of the Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said Church at Heckington as their Parish Church and to be accommodated with Sittings therein, but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva or in any Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by Faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Parish Church of Hale Magna with Hale Parva and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That nothing herein contained shall affect the endowments of the said Vicarage of Hale Magna with Hale Parva or the said Vicarage of Heckington, nor the Patronage of the said Benefices or any of them.

" CONSENTS.

"We the Right Honourable Frederick, Baron Birkenhead, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, for and on behalf of His Majesty King George the Fifth the Patron entitled to present or nominate to the Vicarage of Hale Magna with Hale Parva, in case the same were now vacant, and I, the Reverend Frederick McKenzie, Incumbent of the said Vicarage of Hale Magna with Hale Parva, we, William Shuckburgh, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, the Patron or person entitled in right of my Bishopric to present or nominate to the said Vicarage of Heckington in case the same were now vacant, and I, the Reverend Charles Arthur Norris, Clerk, the Incumbent of the said Vicarage of Heckington, do hereby severally and respectively signify our consent to the Scheme above proposed and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"Witness our hands the tenth day of September, in the year of Our Lord, One thousand nine hundred and twenty.

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby Report to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend William Shuckburgh, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, has represented unto us amongst other things:—

"That there is in the County and his Diocese of Lincoln the Vicarage of Hale Magna with Hale Parva containing a population according to the census of 1911 of 812 persons.

"That there is also in the same County and Diocese the Vicarage of Heckington containing a population according to the census of 1911 of 1,666 persons.

"That a portion of the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva containing an estimated population of from 25 to 30 persons is upwards of four miles by the nearest road from the Parish Church of Hale Magna with Hale Parva but is situated at a distance of three and a half miles by the nearest road from the Church of Heckington.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said portion of the Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva, the boundaries of which are more particularly described in the Schedule to the hereinafter mentioned Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and delineated on the Plan annexed to the said Scheme and thereon edged round with red, may under the provisions of the Act 1 & 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Hale Magna with Hale Parva and annexed to the Parish of Heckington to which it is contiguous.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Pluralities Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithe Rent Charges and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the consents in writing of the Right Honourable Frederick, Baron Birkenhead, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, for and on behalf of His Majesty King George the Fifth, the Patron entitled to present to the Vicarage of Hale Magna with Hale Parva (in case the same were now vacant), the Reverend Frederick McKenzie, Incumbent of the same Benefice, the said William Shuckburgh, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, the Patron entitled in right of his Bishopric to present to the Vicarage of Heckington (in case the same were now vacant), and the Reverend Charles Arthur Norris, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, has been transmitted to us for our consideration.

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And We, the said Lord Archbishop, being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said Scheme do hereby, pursuant to the

said Pluralities Act, certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

SUPREME COURT.

Notice is hereby given of the following Rules:—

I, the Right Honourable Frederick Lord Birkenhead, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, in pursuance and execution of the powers given by Section 4 of the German Reparation (Recovery) Act, 1921, and all other powers and authorities enabling me in that behalf, make the following Rules:—

Application under s. 4 of the Act.

1. Any application for relief under Section 4 of the German Reparation (Recovery) Act, 1921, may be made either to the Chancery Division or to the King's Bench Division of the High Court and shall be made by way of originating summons.

2. Any application made to the Chancery Division by way of originating summons shall be dealt with according to the ordinary practice of that Division with regard to originating summonses.

3. Any application made to the King's Bench Division by way of originating summons shall come before a Master or a District Registrar in the first instance and shall in general be dealt with according to the practice of that Division. It may be referred to the Judge or a Divisional Court at any stage of the proceedings or during the hearing or may by leave or order of the Judge taking the Commercial List be heard by him or transferred to that list.

4. The proceedings on any application may be transferred from either Division to the other subject to the consent of the President of the Division to which the transfer is proposed to be made.

5. Any originating summons under this Rule may be in the Form or to the effect of the Form in the Schedule to these Rules, and shall provide for the entering of appearance by the defendant.

6. Where an action is commenced or other proceeding taken in respect of a contract to which Section 4 of the Act applies, the relief under that section may be claimed by way of

defence or counterclaim or by way of ordinary summons in such action or other proceeding, and any such summons shall be intitled in the matter of the Act, as well as in the action or proceeding in question, and in the King's Bench Division may be dealt with by a Master or District Registrar.

Power to Hear in Private.

7. The court or a judge may at any stage of the proceedings on an application under the Act order that the case shall thenceforward be heard in private.

Power to Revoke or Vary Orders.

8. Any order made under the Act or these Rules may, should subsequent circumstances render it just so to do, be suspended, discharged, or otherwise varied or altered on application by summons to the court or judge which made such order.

Service or Notice of Proceedings.

9. In any case where any party to any proceedings under the Act or these Rules is out of the jurisdiction service of any originating summons or a copy thereof or of any other proceeding may be ordered by a judge of the High Court and when any such party is absent or out of the jurisdiction or cannot be found or it is uncertain whether he is alive or dead or it is otherwise difficult to serve him the court or judge may proceed on such notice or intimation (if any) of the proceedings whether to any other person or by advertisement or otherwise as the court or a judge shall in its or his absolute discretion think fit. And the provisions of this Rule shall be in addition to and by way of extension and enlargement of the ordinary powers and practice of the court as to proceeding *ex parte* and as to substituted service.

Address for Service.

10. In the course of any proceedings under the Act or these Rules any party may be requested at any time by the other party, or on any attendance by himself or his solicitor before the court or a judge may be required, to furnish an address to which summonses, notices or other documents may be sent by post. And any summons, notice or document subsequently posted in a prepaid envelope directed to the party at that address (or to any address substituted by him therefor by notification in writing) shall unless otherwise ordered be deemed to have been duly served at the time when such envelope would have reached the address in the ordinary course of post. The request to furnish such an address may be sent at the same time and together with the originating summons.

Ordinary Practice of Court to be Followed.

11. The proceedings on any application under the Act shall, so far as not expressly provided for by these Rules, be conducted in accordance with the ordinary practice of the court to which the application is made in dealing with similar matters.

Costs.

12. The costs of any application under the Act shall be in the absolute discretion of the court or judge and the court or judge may, if it or he thinks fit, fix the amount of the costs, and direct that they shall be payable forthwith.

Interpretation.

13. In these Rules the expressions "Court or a Judge" and "Court or Judge" shall include a Master of the Supreme Court (King's Bench Division) and a District Registrar, and "the Act" means the German Reparation (Recovery) Act, 1921.

Short Title and Commencement.

14. These Rules may be cited as the German Reparation (Recovery) Rules, 1921, and shall come into operation forthwith.

EMERGENCY POWERS ACT, 1920.

THE COAL (EMERGENCY) DIRECTIONS, 1921, DATED THE 1ST DAY OF APRIL, 1921, GIVEN BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER THE EMERGENCY REGULATIONS, 1921.

The Board of Trade, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the Emergency Regulations, 1921, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, hereby direct as follows:—

PART I.

Local Authorities.

1. These Directions apply to Great Britain, and in respect of—

(a) England and Wales, the expression "local authority" in these Directions means the mayor, aldermen, and commons of the City of London in common council assembled, the council of a metropolitan borough, the council of a municipal borough or other urban district, the council of a rural district, or the council of the Isles of Scilly;

(b) Scotland, throughout these Directions the expression "local authority" means the council of a county or burgh, or any district committee to which a county council shall delegate its powers and duties under these Directions.

2. It shall be the duty of all local authorities to assist in carrying out these Directions, and in rendering the provisions thereof effective in their districts, for which purpose local authorities may appoint duly authorised officers to act in their districts, and may take such other steps as shall be deemed necessary for the purposes of these Directions; provided that for London and the surrounding neighbourhood the Secretary for Mines (hereinafter called "the Secretary") may by direction define a Metropolitan Coal Area, comprising such districts or parts of districts as he may direct. The Metropolitan Coal Area, when so defined, may for the purposes of these Directions be treated as one district, and the powers under these Directions of the respective local authorities for the said districts or parts of districts shall on notice to them be exercised by the Secretary on their behalf to such extent as is deemed expedient in the interests of the said Area.

PART II.

Household or Domestic.

3. The supply of coal for consumption or otherwise in any dwelling house or in a building adjacent to or connected with a dwelling house and occupied or used as part thereof, or in any premises used or occupied for residential purposes, shall be subject to the provisions contained in this Part of these Directions.

4. It shall not be lawful without the previous consent in writing of the local authority or its duly authorised officer, which consent may be general or special, but, if general, must be with the assent of the Secretary,

(a) To purchase, obtain, take delivery of, or in any way acquire more than 1 cwt. of coal in any week for consumption or otherwise in any premises coming within the scope of this Part of these Directions;

(b) To purchase, obtain, take delivery of, or in any way acquire any coal for consump-

tion or otherwise in such premises as aforesaid where the quantity of coal available for consumption in such premises exceeds 5 cwts.

5. No colliery, factor, coal merchant, coal dealer, or other person whatsoever shall, without the previous consent in writing of the local authority or its duly authorised officer, which consent may be general or special, but, if general, must be with the assent of the Secretary,

(a) sell, supply, deliver, or in any way dispose of coal for consumption or otherwise in any premises coming within the scope of this Part of these Directions in excess of 1 cwt. in any one week;

(b) sell, supply, deliver, or in any way dispose of coal for consumption or otherwise in such premises as aforesaid where the quantity of coal available for consumption in such premises exceeds 5 cwts.

The provisions of this Article shall not apply to coal sold, supplied, delivered, or otherwise disposed of by a colliery, coal factor, coal merchant, or coal dealer to a coal factor, coal merchant or dealer in coal.

6.—(a) Any person may be required by the local authority or its duly authorised officer to register with a named coal merchant or coal dealer for any supply of coal under this Part of these Directions, and in such case shall only acquire his supply from the merchant or dealer with whom he is registered;

(b) The local authority for the purposes of this Part of these Directions shall be the local authority of the district where are situate the premises in respect of which coal is required.

PART III.

Industries and Businesses.

7. The consumption of coal in premises to which this Part of these Directions applies, that is to say, in any factory, workshop, or other business premises, shall be restricted so that not more than 50 per cent. of the weekly average quantity of coal consumed in the four weeks last preceding the date of these Directions coming into force may be consumed in any week after such date, saving as may hereinafter in these Directions be provided:

Provided always that where it is shown to the satisfaction of the local authority that the said weekly average does not afford a fair criterion of the quantity normally consumed in any such premises, regard may be had to the quantity consumed in such premises for the week in the year 1920 most nearly corresponding in date to that in which the consumption is to be regulated hereunder and such quantity may be deemed to be the weekly average for the purposes of these Directions.

8. Where it is deemed by a local authority expedient in the public interest to do so the percentage named in the preceding Article may be increased, and the local authority or its duly authorised officer shall, in such case, issue a permit in writing specifying the extent to which the percentage may be increased and stating the grounds upon which the issue of such permit is deemed to be in the public interest.

9. Any permit given as in the preceding Article provided may, by notice in writing, be cancelled or varied by the local authority or

its duly authorised officer, and the quantity thereby authorised may be increased or may be reduced to any figure not less than 50 per cent. of the said weekly average:

Provided that the said quantity may only be increased where it is deemed to be in the public interest to do so and that the ground upon which such increase is deemed to be in the public interest shall be stated in the said notice.

10. Notwithstanding the provisions of Articles 7, 8 and 9 hereof it shall be lawful, in the case of any factory, workshop, or business premises where the industry or business carried on is such as cannot be properly carried on without a consumption of coal in excess of the quantity prescribed in Article 7, to consume therein without permit, during a period of two weeks from and including the date of these Directions coming into force, such quantity of coal as is required for carrying on the industry or business, provided that the total quantity of coal consumed in the said period shall not in any case exceed 50 per cent. of the stocks of coal which, at the said date, are upon the premises and available for consumption therein.

11. After the conclusion of the said period of two weeks or after the consumption of 50 per cent. of the said stocks, whichever may first occur, no coal may be consumed in any premises where the last preceding Article has operated, unless and until a permit in writing shall have been granted by the local authority stating the quantity of coal that may be consumed in such premises, and such quantity shall not exceed that prescribed in Article 7 unless in the opinion of the local authority or its duly authorised officer there is reason for acting under the provisions of Article 8.

12. The person responsible for the management of an industry or business on any premises to which this Part of these Directions applies, whether as owner, occupier, or manager of the premises or in any other capacity, shall furnish to the local authority, if and when required to do so, a true and complete return in writing showing what stocks of coal are in his possession or available for consumption on the premises, and what quantities of coal were consumed on the premises during the four weeks last preceding the date upon which these Directions come into force.

13.—(a) No coal shall be supplied or acquired for consumption or otherwise upon any such premises as aforesaid unless a permit in writing shall first have been granted by the local authority in respect of such premises, stating the quantity of coal that may be supplied and acquired for consumption thereon.

(b) Before any such permit may be granted a return must have been furnished as provided in Article 12 hereof.

14. For the purposes of this Part of these Directions the term "coal" shall include coke, briquettes, and any other solid fuel of which coal or coke is a constituent.

15. It shall be a contravention of the provisions of these Directions knowingly to make or furnish a return which is false in any particular or to alter any permit which has been given thereunder.

16. In these Directions the expression "business premises" includes any shop and any premises or any part of any premises exclusively used for the purposes of any profession, trade, employment, or vocation.

PART IV.

Coal Stocks.

17. Subject to the Directions of the Secretary for Mines the District Coal and Coke Supplies Committees shall regulate, in the areas for which they have been respectively appointed, the supply and distribution of coal from any stocks which may be or become available in their respective areas for the purposes named. Available stocks for the purposes of this Article shall, subject as aforesaid, consist of any coal at a coal mine within the area of a District Coal and Coke Supplies Committee and any coal coming into the said area in train.

18. The District Coal and Coke Supplies Committees shall have power to take possession of any such available stocks of coal, and to direct the supply of such coal or any part thereof, to any named consignee or destination, and, where coal is allocated from a coal mine, to direct its delivery in the wagons of the coal mine.

19. Any person having in his possession coal which is available for the purposes of this Part of these Directions shall, upon receipt of a demand in writing from the District Coal and Coke Supplies Committee or a person duly authorised by them in that behalf, give possession of the said coal or such part thereof as may be so demanded to any person specified in the said demand.

PART V.

Shipment.

20. No coal shall be shipped either as cargo or bunkers, whether coastwise or foreign, in any vessel at any port in Great Britain unless permission in writing for such shipment shall first have been given by the Secretary for Mines or a person duly authorised by him in that behalf.

21. The Collector of Customs or other the proper officer of Customs at any port in Great Britain, where it is desired to make any such shipment, may give permission as aforesaid on behalf of the Secretary for Mines.

PART VI.

Gas Manufacture.

22. All persons who supply gas, whether under statutory authority or otherwise, shall use the coal required for the production of gas in such a manner as to effect the greatest possible saving in the consumption of coal.

23. With the object of maintaining a supply of gas at adequate pressure during such periods of the day or night when the effective use of it by consumers is most needed, persons who supply gas, whether under statutory authority or otherwise, shall supply the same at other periods of the day or night at pressures so much lower than those prescribed under any special Act or Order applying to their undertaking as may be best calculated to secure a supply of gas at adequate pressure during such first-mentioned periods.

24. All persons supplying gas shall notify the local authority of the district by notice in writing, and shall notify their consumers, by newspaper advertisements and placards, of such periods of the day and night during which the pressure of gas will be insufficient to permit of its effective use in consumers' fittings and apparatus.

25. Where any person supplying or offering to supply gas for reward is by reason of the provisions of these Directions prevented from making a supply or from making a full supply of gas of any prescribed quality to any consumer, such person shall to that extent be relieved of any obligation, whether created by statute or otherwise, to make such supply.

PART VII.

Lighting, Heating, and Power.

26. All lights of the following classes and descriptions shall be extinguished and such lights shall not be lighted at any hour except as provided in Article 27 hereof:—

(a) Sky signs, illuminated facias, illuminated advertisements, and other lights used on, in, or about any premises for the purpose of advertisement or display;

(b) Lights used inside any shop for the purpose of advertisement or display, other than lights maintained solely for the protection of property.

27. It shall be the duty of local authorities to provide that the consumption in their respective districts of gas and electricity for any public lighting shall be reduced to the minimum that may be deemed necessary, provided that such public lamps as the Chief Officer of Police directs to be kept in use for the public safety shall be maintained as he may direct.

28. Where gas or electricity is required for power in any premises within the scope of Part III. of these Directions, its supply and use shall be restricted so that not more than 50 per cent. of the weekly average quantity supplied or used for power in the period covered by the last reading of the meter preceding the date of these Directions coming into force shall be supplied or used in any week after such date, saving as may hereinafter in these Directions be provided:

Provided always, that where it is shown to the satisfaction of the local authority that the said weekly average does not afford a fair criterion of the quantity normally supplied or used in any such premises regard may be had to the average weekly quantity supplied or used in such premises during the period in the year 1920 most nearly corresponding in date to that in which power is required, and such quantity may be deemed to be the weekly average for the purposes of these Directions.

29. Where it is deemed by a local authority expedient in the public interest to do so, the percentage named in the preceding Article may be increased, and the local authority or its duly authorised officer shall in such case issue a permit in writing specifying the extent to which the percentage may be increased, and stating the grounds upon which the issue of such permit is deemed to be in the public interest.

30. Any permit given as in the preceding Article provided may by notice in writing be cancelled or varied by the local authority or its duly authorised officer or by the Secretary for Mines and the quantity thereby authorised may be increased or may be reduced to any figure not less than 50 per cent. of the said weekly average:

Provided that the said quantity may only be increased where it is deemed to be in the public interest to do so, and that the ground upon which such increase is deemed to be in the

public interest shall be stated in such notice as aforesaid.

31. The person responsible for the management of an industry or business on any premises within the scope of Part III. of these Directions, whether as owner, occupier, or manager of the premises, or in any other capacity, shall furnish to the local authority, if and when required to do so, a true and complete return showing what quantities of gas and electricity respectively were supplied or used for power in such premises during any period or periods as to which information may be required.

32. The local authority or its duly authorised officer may direct that any supply of gas or electricity, whether for light, heat, power, or any other purpose, in any premises, whether industrial business, domestic, or of any other description, be diminished or cut off where there is reason to believe that the supply is being abused or used in excess so as to prejudice the interests of the public. Any such direction shall be in writing, and a copy shall be served upon the owner or occupier of the premises to which the direction relates.

PART VIII.

General.

33. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of these Directions, or who neglects or fails to comply with any requirement or obligation imposed on him by or in virtue of these Directions, shall be guilty of a summary offence against the Emergency Regulations, 1921. The expression "person" in these Directions includes any body of persons, whether corporate or unincorporate, and the expression "shop" has the same meaning as in the Shops Act, 1912.

34. A local authority may institute or carry on proceedings for the prosecution of any offence committed within its district against the provisions of these Directions, and any power exercisable by a local authority under these Directions shall also be exercisable by the Secretary, who may direct the suspension of the Directions or any of them in respect of any district, part of a district, or premises where such suspension appears to him necessary in the public interest.

35. In the event of any question arising as to the classification of any premises for the purposes of Parts II. and III. of these Directions respectively, or as to stocks for the purposes of Part IV. hereof, the matter may be referred to the Secretary whose decision shall be final.

36. These Directions may be cited as the Coal (Emergency) Directions, 1921, and shall come into force on the 2nd day of April, 1921.

OVERTIME RATES FIXED FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS. EFFECTIVE AS FROM 4TH APRIL, 1921.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by

the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Jute Trade in Great Britain as specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, having given due notice on 29th October, 1920, of Proposal to Fix Overtime Rates for certain classes of Male and Female Workers, hereby give notice that they have Fixed Overtime Rates for certain classes of Male and Female Workers, and that the Overtime Rates fixed are as shown in the Schedule set out below.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 24th March, 1921, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Overtime Rates Fixed by the Trade Board, and specifying 4th April, 1921,* as the date from which such Overtime Rates shall become effective.

* NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full-pay period, but in any case not later than 10th April, 1921.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

Overtime Rates for Certain Classes of Male and Female Workers.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	48
On any day (other than Saturday)	8½
On Saturday	4¼

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The minimum rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade by those classes of Male or Female Workers employed on Time Work in the Municipal Burgh of Brechin, the Parish of Brechin, the Municipal Burgh of Forfar, the Parish of Forfar, the Burgh of Kirriemuir, the Parish of Kirriemuir, the Burgh of Blairgowrie, the Burgh of Carnoustie of the Parish of Logie Pert, who in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend (i) for nine hours per day on five days of the week and for three hours on Saturday, or (ii) only on five days a week shall be as follows:—

(1) (a) For workers in the areas named above who, in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend for nine hours per day on five days of the week and for three hours on Saturday, the Overtime Rate payable in respect of all hours worked in excess of nine hours on any day, except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, shall be One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half.

NOTE.—During the first quarter of an hour worked in excess of 8½ hours on any day other than Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Mini-

num Rate applicable shall be the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate set out in the Trade Board's Notices dated 3rd June, 1920, or 22nd October, 1920.

(b) For workers in the areas named above, who, in accordance with the established practice of the establishment, attend only on five days a week, the Overtime Rate payable in respect of all hours worked in excess of 9½ hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, shall be One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half.

NOTE.—During the first three-quarters of an hour worked in excess of 8½ hours on any day other than Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Minimum Time-Rate applicable shall be the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate set out in the Trade Board's Notices dated 3rd June, 1920, or 22nd October, 1920.

(2) For all time worked in excess of 4½ hours on Saturdays, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Double Time.

SECTION III.—The minimum rates for Overtime in respect of all time worked in any week in excess of 48 hours by Male or Female Workers employed on Time-Work shall be One-and-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half except where a higher amount is payable under Sub-Section (3) of Section II of Part I of this Schedule or under Sub-Section (b) of Section II of Part II of the Notice issued by the Trade Board and dated 22nd October, 1920.

NOTE.—The number of hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART II.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male and Female Workers specified in this Notice in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

The preparing, spinning or weaving (a) of jute, or (b) of jute and any other fibre except flax or hemp;

Including—

(1) The preparing and spinning of waste reclaimed at any stage, and

(2) All packing, despatching, warehousing, storing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned work.

But Excluding—

(1) The calendering, bleaching, dyeing, or finishing of any of the above-mentioned materials, and

(2) The preparing or spinning of materials required for the making or remaking of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding); (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords);

(c) core for wire ropes; (d) lines; (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine); (f) lanyards; (g) net and similar articles when such preparing or spinning is carried on in the same factory or workshop as the said making or remaking, and

(3) The making or repair of sacks or bags, and also

(4) The weaving of carpets, rugs or mats.

PART III.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

(b) The proposed Minimum Rates for Learners set out in Sub-Section (a) of this Section shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (i.) The Weekly Rates set out above are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent by the Learner in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.
(ii.) The advances to be given to Learners shall become due as from the first Monday in January and July of each year, the Learner being entitled to her first advance from the first Monday in January or July as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.
(iii.) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner and be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to her under Section I. of this Part I. of this Schedule upon the fulfilment of the following conditions:—

14 and under 15 years of age	The completion of not less than 3 years' employment, and the attainment of the age of 18 years.

No Female Learner shall be held to be entitled to the Full General Minimum Time-Rate under Section I. of Part I. of this Schedule until she has attained the age of 18 years, notwithstanding any employment she may have had. Workers commencing employment in the Ostrich and Fancy Feather and Artificial Flower Trade for the first time at and over the age of 19 may serve a period of 6 months at 7d. per hour, and thereafter a period of 6 months at 8½d. per hour.

On the expiration of one year's service in the trade, these workers shall receive such rates as their age may entitle them to under the foregoing provisions.

PART II.

*Proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates.*SECTION I.—*Female Workers.*

(a) All Female Workers other than Homeworkers, 9d. per hour.

(b) Homeworkers, 9d. per hour.

In the case of all female workers employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 9d. per hour to an Ordinary Worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies the foregoing condition, regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers other than learners.

SECTION II.—*Male Workers* (Excepting Workers employed as Dyers in the Feather Trade).

All Male Workers, 1s. 3½d. per hour.

In the case of all male workers employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 1s. 3½d. per hour to an Ordinary Worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies the foregoing condition, regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers of 22 years of age and upwards.

PART III.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (All Ages).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to Declare the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 48.

On any day (other than Saturday), 9.

On Saturday, 5.

Provided that any other day (not being Sunday) may be substituted by an employer for Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours of work on such substituted day shall be 5, and the normal number of hours on Saturday shall be 9.

Provided also that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Trade Board propose to fix Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours as follows:—

(A) *For workers employed on Time-Work:*

(1) For the first two hours of overtime on any day, except Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sundays, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, that is to say, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(2) For overtime after the first two hours of overtime on any day except Sundays, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all overtime on Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), the Overtime Rate shall be one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, that is to say, Time-and-a-Half.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, that is to say, Double-Time.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be Time and a Quarter except in so far as higher overtime rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of this Section. The Overtime Rate shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds 9 or, in the case of Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), exceeds 5, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(B) *For workers employed on Piece-Work:*

Workers employed on Piece-Work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker, not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, a sum equivalent to one-quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, one-half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate or the appro-

priate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the Provisions of paragraph (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half, or Double Time, respectively.

Provided—

(a) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.

(b) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall only be payable after 50 hours have been worked.

(c) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out above shall apply in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

NOTE.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and also to the Provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons, and Children Act, 1920.

PART IV.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

SECTION I.—A female learner is a worker who—

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade specified in Part V. of this Schedule by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, and held subject to compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, or has made an application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

SECTION II.—The expression "Home-worker" shall be held to mean a worker who works in her own home or any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART V.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Workers except Male Workers employed as Dyers in the Feather Trade, in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Ostrich and Fancy Feather and Artificial Flower) Order, 1920, that is to say:—

1.—The preparation throughout of ostrich or fancy feathers from the natural condition to the finished feather product.

2.—The making of artificial flowers, fruit, foliage, grasses, mosses, seeds or pods from paper, wax, textile materials, porcelain, glass, plaster, metal composition, rubber, leather, raffia, coliphane and similar materials.

3.—The preservation of natural flowers, foliage, grasses, mosses, ferns, seeds or pods.

4.—The making of hats of any of the articles specified in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above, when made in or in association with or in conjunction with any business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in any of the operations specified in those paragraphs.

5.—The making of feather garments (including neckwear and muffs), feather trimmings for dresses, feather fans or feather mountings of any description, when made in or in association with or in conjunction with any business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in the preparation of ostrich or fancy feathers.

6.—The cleaning, dyeing or renovating of any of the articles specified in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above, when carried on as a main business or in association with or in conjunction with any business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in any of the operations specified in those paragraphs.

Including:—

7.—(A) Any of the following and similar operations or processes known in the trade as:—

(i) The sorting, stringing, washing, bleaching, dyeing, beating, scraping, laying up, sewing, curling, finishing, sticking, twisting, mounting of ostrich or fancy feathers.

(ii) Pattern-making, dyeing, stiffening, waterproofing, waxing, cutting, stamping, shading, veining, goffing, mould making, mounting, in connection with the manufacture of artificial flowers, fruit, foliage, grasses, mosses, seeds or pods.

(iii) The dyeing, preserving, painting, varnishing, or decorating of natural flowers, foliage, grasses, mosses, ferns, seeds or pods.

(B) The making of any of the articles specified in paragraph 2 above by needlework processes, when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with a business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in any of the operations specified in that paragraph.

(C) The making or mounting of any of the articles specified in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above for cakes or cracker ornaments, except when made or mounted in, or in association with, or in conjunction with, an establishment or business or branch or department or workroom which is mainly engaged in the making of crackers.

(D) The mounting (whether singly or in

festoons or garlands) or assembling of any of the articles specified in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above for the purpose of decoration, when mounted or assembled in a business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in these operations.

(E) The warehousing of, the packing of, and similar operations, in regard to any of the articles specified in paragraphs 1 to 5 above, when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with a business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in any of the operations specified in paragraphs 1 to 6 above.

But excluding:—

8.—(A) The making of any of the articles mentioned in paragraph 2 above in a business or establishment or branch or department or workroom which is mainly engaged in the manufacture of the materials specified in that paragraph, and not of the articles therein specified.

(B) The preparation, making, or preservation of any of the articles specified in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above, when carried out in a business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in the manufacture of stationers' sundries.

(C) The stiffening or preparation of textile materials for the making of any of the articles mentioned in paragraph 2 above, when carried on in a business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in the preparation of textile materials for other purposes.

(D) The making of any of the articles specified in paragraph 2 above wholly from metal, or the mounting thereof when so made, or the making or mounting of plaster flowers, fruits, or foliage, except when made or mounted:—

(i) For funeral tokens, wreaths, or crosses.

(ii) In association with or in conjunction with the making of any of the articles specified in paragraph 2 from any of the materials specified therein.

(iii) For cake or cracker ornaments as specifically mentioned in the operations and processes included in the trade.

(E) The making from rubber of any of the articles mentioned in paragraph 2 above, or the mounting thereof when so made, where carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with a business or establishment or branch or department or workroom mainly engaged in the manufacture of other rubber articles.

(F) All operations covered by the following Orders:—

(i) The Trade Boards (Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving) Order, 1913.

(ii) The Trade Boards (Hat, Cap and Millinery) Order, 1919.

(iii) The Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919.

(iv) The Trade Boards (Toy) Order, 1920.

PART VI.

SECTION I.—The above Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of

contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, or to Agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposed minimum rates of wages which may be lodged with them within two months from 2nd April, 1921. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Ostrich and Fancy Feather and Artificial Flower Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

EMERGENCY.

COAL.

THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES (COAL EMERGENCY) ORDER, 1921, DATED APRIL 2, 1921, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF HEALTH UNDER THE EMERGENCY REGULATIONS, 1921, WHICH WERE ISSUED UNDER THE EMERGENCY POWERS ACT, 1920 (10 & 11 GEO. 5, c. 55).

67092.

The Minister of Health, in exercise of the powers conferred on him by the Emergency Regulations, 1921, and of all other powers in that behalf enabling him, and by arrangement with the Board of Trade, hereby Orders as follows:—

1. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears:—

(a) The expression "Local Authority" means, as the case may be, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled, the Council of a Metropolitan Borough, the Council of a Municipal Borough or other Urban District, the Council of a Rural District, or the Council of the Isles of Scilly;

(b) The expression "District" means the District subject to the jurisdiction of the Local Authority for the purposes of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, or of the Public Health Act, 1875, as the case may be.

2. The Minister of Health hereby confers and imposes upon the Local Authority and upon such of their officers as they may designate or appoint for the purpose the powers and duties necessary to provide for the due discharge within their District, or any part thereof, in conformity with the Emergency Regulations, 1921, of the functions assigned to Local Authorities by the Coal (Emergency) Directions, 1921.

3. The Local Authority may delegate to a committee, with or without restrictions or conditions as they think fit, any of the powers and duties conferred or imposed upon them by this Order.

4.—(1) Any expenses incurred by a Local Authority in the execution of this Order shall be defrayed in like manner as if the expenses had been incurred in the execution of the Public Health Act, 1875, or the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, as the case may be.

(2) Where any Local Authorities have combined for any of the purposes of this Order, any expenses incurred by those Local Authorities thereunder shall be defrayed in such proportions as may be agreed upon, or in default of agreement as may be determined by the Minister of Health.

5. This Order may be cited as "The Local Authorities (Coal Emergency) Order, 1921."

LONDON AND NORTH-WESTERN RAILWAY (WOLVERHAMPTON AND CANNOCK CHASE LIGHT RAILWAY) AMENDMENT ORDER.

To make such provisions as may be deemed necessary for and in connection with the preparation of the autumn register for the year 1922, pursuant to the Representation of the People Act, 1918.

To apply, with or without modification, or to render inapplicable to the provisions hereinbefore referred to the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Acts with respect to the division of the borough into Wards or the alteration of Wards.

To alter the division of the parish of West Ham into Wards for the purposes of the election of Guardians of the West Ham Poor Law Union, and to reduce the number of and define such Wards, and to make provision as to the allocation of Guardians thereto.

To authorize Queen Mary's Hospital for the East End to enclose and stop up the open space in the borough known as Chant-square and the roads and footpaths in or adjoining the same, and to extinguish all rights of way through or over the said square and roads and footpaths, and to enable the said hospital to use the said square and the site of the said roads and footpaths for the erection of buildings thereon, or for any other purpose, and to sell, lease, exchange or otherwise dispose of the said square and the site of the said roads and footpaths, or so much thereof as they shall not require for the purposes aforesaid.

To make provisions with respect to the open space in the borough known as Lyle Park, and to empower the Corporation, notwithstanding the provisions of the Open Spaces Act, 1906, or any Act amending the same, to grant and renew leases of a portion or portions thereof in consideration of the removal of certain tram lines formerly laid down on the said open space and of such other consideration and for such term of years and upon and subject to such terms and conditions as the Corporation may determine.

The Bill will, so far as may be deemed necessary or expedient, vary and extend, or repeal, alter or consolidate the provisions of, among other local and personal Acts, the following (that is to say):—The Local Board of Health for West Ham in Essex Extension of Powers Act, 1867, and any other Act or Order directly or indirectly relating to or affecting the Corporation or the Borough, and will or may incorporate with itself, in extenso, or by reference, and with or without alteration, the provisions or some of the provisions of the various Acts in this Notice referred to, and of the Local Loans Act, 1875, and the Lands Clauses Acts.

The Bill will vary and extinguish all rights and privileges which would interfere with any of its objects and confer other rights and privileges.
