WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 5th day of April, 1921 (C.W. 3798/21), in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, and other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to authorize the payment of allowances on the following scale to the Senior Lieutenant of vessels in Full or Reserve Commission:

A. *Ships in Full Commission.*

When Senior of a ship allowed by authorized

complement a Captain in Command, but not allowed a Commander—

To Warrant Officers, Commissioned Warrant Officers, Mates, Sub-Lieutenants, Lieutenants and Lieutenant Commanders 2s. 6d.

When Senior of a ship allowed by authorized complement a Commander, Lieutenant Commander or Lieutenant in Command—

To Warrant Officers, Commissioned Warrant Officers, Mates, Sub-Lieutenants, Lieutenants and Lieutenant Commanders 1s. 6d.

B. *Ships in Reserve.*

To Warrant Officers, Commissioned Warrant Officers, Mates, Sub-Lieutenants, Lieutenants and Lieutenant Commanders—

For grouped ships of and above Light Cruiser status, whether commanded by a Captain or by a Commander. } Parent Ship } 2s. 6d. }
Tenders } 1s. 6d. }

For ships of and above Light Cruiser status when not grouped and for Destroyer Depôt Ships, Flotilla Leaders and Minelayers 1s. 6d.

"And whereas certain vessels not coming under either of these categories have reduced or special complements and the numbers borne are sufficient in our opinion to justify the payment of Senior Lieutenant's allowance:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction as from the 1st July, 1919, the payment of Senior Lieutenant's allowance at the discretion of the Admiralty, but not in excess of the rates allowed for vessels in Full Commission, for all vessels which are allowed special complements (*i.e.* for all Vessels in Commission other than those with Full or Reserve Commission Complements).

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Territorial Force and should be respectively known by the titles specified in the second Column of the said Schedule:

And whereas the Seaford Company 1st Volunteer Battalion Royal Sussex Engineers was by virtue of that Order transferred as part of the 1st Volunteer Battalion Royal Sussex Engineers detailed in the first Column of the said Schedule to the Territorial Force and became and is now a unit of the Territorial Force known by the title of the Works Company Sussex (Fortress) Royal Engineers Territorial Force which said unit is a part of the Sussex (Fortress) Royal Engineers Territorial Force specified in the second Column of the said Schedule:

And whereas the Trustee named in the first Column of the Schedule to this Order holds the property described and set opposite to his name in the second Column of that Schedule in trust for the unit of the Territorial Force mentioned in the Third Column of that Schedule for the purposes and subject to the limitations mentioned in the deed referred to in the fourth Column of that Schedule, and it is expedient that such property should be transferred from that Trustee to the County Association mentioned in the fifth Column of that Schedule:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that as from the date of this Order the said property shall be by virtue of this Order transferred from the said Trustee to and vested in the said County Association subject to any charges thereon and to any liabilities in or towards the discharge of which the said property is properly applicable, and shall be held by the said County Association for the benefit of the said unit of the Territorial Force or for such other purposes as the Association with the consent of the said unit (to be ascertained in manner prescribed by regulations of the Army Council) shall direct but so that the interest of any beneficiary other than the said unit shall not without the consent of such beneficiary be effected.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 7th and 8th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 94, of the Act of the 13th and 14th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94, and of the Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme or Representation, bearing date the 17th day of March, 1921, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the 7th and 8th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 94, of the Act of the 13th and 14th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94, and of the Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, of the New Parish of Audenshaw, of the New Parish of Droylsden, and of the New Parish of Saint George, Abbey Hey, all in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Manchester:

“ Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 29th day of January, 1840, and published in the London Gazette on the 17th day of April, 1840, part of the Parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the said County of Lancaster and at that time in the Diocese of Chester, but now in the said Diocese of Manchester, was assigned as a Chapelry District to the consecrated Church of Saint Peter, situate in the said Parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, and such Chapelry District was named ‘ The Saint Peter's District ’:

“ And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 23rd day of May, 1844, and published in the London Gazette on the 3rd day of the following month a separate District for spiritual purposes was constituted out of the said Chapelry District of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, and the said District was named ‘ The District of Audenshaw ’:

“ And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 7th day of October, 1844, and published in the London Gazette on the 22nd day of the same month, part of the Chapelry District of All Saints, Newton, within the original limits of the Parish of Manchester, in the said County of Lancaster, and at that time in the said Diocese of Chester, but now in the said Diocese of Manchester, was constituted a separate District for spiritual purposes, and the said District was named ‘ The District of Droylsden ’:

“ And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 2nd day of February, 1899, and published in the London Gazette on the following day, a separate District for spiritual purposes was constituted out of the Parish of Saint James, Gorton, within the original limits of the said Parish of Manchester, and the said Dis-

trict was named ‘ The District of Saint George, Abbey Hey ’:

“ And whereas the said Chapelry District of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, the said District of Audenshaw, the said District of Droylsden and the said District of Saint George, Abbey Hey, have become New Parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, by the Act of 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, and by the above-mentioned Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94:

“ And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, of the said New Parish of Audenshaw, of the said New Parish of Droylsden, and of the said New Parish of Saint George, Abbey Hey, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned:

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said Diocese of Manchester, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or Representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or Representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, of the said New Parish of Audenshaw, of the said New Parish of Droylsden, and of the said New Parish of Saint George, Abbey Hey, shall be altered so that (First) All those portions of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, which are described in the First Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from such New Parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Audenshaw; and (Secondly) All that portion of the said New Parish of Audenshaw which is described in the Second Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured purple shall be dissevered from such New Parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne; and (Thirdly) All that portion of the said New Parish of Audenshaw which is described in the Third Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured yellow shall be dissevered from such New Parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Droylsden; and (Fourthly) All that portion of the said New Parish of Audenshaw which is described in the Fourth Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such New Parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Saint George, Abbey Hey.

“ And we further represent, recommend, and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending, or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them

in accordance with the provisions of the herein-before-mentioned Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

“ THE SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

“ THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

“ The territory to be dissevered from the New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Manchester, and to be annexed to the New Parish of Audenshaw, in the same County and Diocese, being:—

“ I. All that portion of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, which is bounded upon the south-east and upon the south by the said New Parish of Audenshaw, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-west and upon the north-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Audenshaw from the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, at the centre of the bridge which carries the Guide Bridge Junction Line of the London and North Western Railway across the Manchester and Ashton-under-Lyne Canal, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 35½ chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Birch Street across the said line of railway, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Birch Street for a distance of 20 chains or thereabouts to a point at or near the southern side of Kelvin Street upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, from the said New Parish of Audenshaw.

“ II. And also that portion of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, which lies to the south-west of a line running along the middle of Pottinger Street and of a line in continuation thereof.

“ THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

“ The territory to be dissevered from the said New Parish of Audenshaw and to be annexed to the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, being:—

“ All that portion of the said New Parish of Audenshaw which lies to the north-east of a line running along the middle of Pottinger Street.

“ THE THIRD SCHEDULE.

“ The territory to be dissevered from the said New Parish of Audenshaw and to be annexed to the New Parish of Droylsden, in the said County and Diocese, being:—

“ All that portion of the said New Parish of Audenshaw which is bounded upon the west by the New Parish of Saint Clement, Higher Openshaw, in the said County and Diocese, upon the north-west by the said New Parish of Droylsden, upon the north by the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-east and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Ashton-under-Lyne, from the said New Parish of Audenshaw, at the centre of Audenshaw Bridge, which carries Manchester Road across the Manchester and Ashton-under-Lyne Canal, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Manchester Road for a distance of 14½ chains or thereabouts to a point

opposite to the northern end of the wall or fence forming the western boundary of the premises attached to the house known as Audenshaw Hall, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of 6½ chains or thereabouts to its southern end, and continuing thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of 6 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the line of the Great Central Railway, and extending thence westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 26 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Audenshaw from the said New Parish of Saint Clement, Higher Openshaw.

“ THE FOURTH SCHEDULE.

“ The territory to be dissevered from the said New Parish of Audenshaw and to be annexed to the New Parish of Saint George, Abbey Hey, in the said County and Diocese, being:—

“ All that portion of the said New Parish of Audenshaw which is bounded upon the west partly by the said New Parish of Saint Clement, Higher Openshaw, and partly by the said New Parish of Saint George, Abbey Hey, upon the south by the New Parish of Christ Church, Denton, in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Christ Church, Denton, from the said New Parish of Audenshaw, crosses the western edge of the Audenshaw Reservoirs, and extending thence first north-westward and then north-eastward along the edge of the said reservoirs for a distance of 53 chains or thereabouts to the angle on the northern side distant 7 chains or thereabouts from the western extremity of the said reservoirs, and extending thence in a straight line due north for a distance of 11 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the line of the Great Central Railway, and extending thence westward along the middle of such line of railway for a distance of 30 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Audenshaw from the said New Parish of Saint Clement, Higher Openshaw.”

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme or Representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such Scheme or Representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively either signified their assent or offered no objection thereto:

And whereas a period of more than one calendar month has elapsed since drafts of the said Scheme or Representation were transmitted to the said Patrons and Incumbents:

And whereas the said Scheme or Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like

advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Manchester.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 1st day of March, 1864, and published in the London Gazette on the 4th day of the same month, part of the said Parish of Manchester was annexed as a separate District to the consecrated Church of Saint Barnabas, situate at Openshaw, within the original limits of such Parish, and the said District was named 'The District of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw':

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 6th day of August, 1874, and published in the London Gazette on the 11th day of the same month, a separate District was annexed to the consecrated Church of Saint Cross, situate at Clayton, in the New Parish of Droylsden and within the original limits of the said Parish of Manchester, and the said District was named 'The District of Saint Cross, Clayton':

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the 26th day of June, 1879, and

published in the London Gazette on the 4th day of the following month, a separate District was annexed to the consecrated Church of All Saints, situate at Gorton, within the original limits of the said Parish of Manchester, and the said District was named 'The District of All Saints, Gorton':

"And whereas the said District of Saint James, Gorton, the said District of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw, the said District of Saint Cross, Clayton, and the said District of All Saints, Gorton, have under the provisions of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, become New Parishes of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and by the above mentioned Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94:

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint James, Gorton, the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw, the said New Parish of Saint Cross, Clayton, and the said New Parish of All Saints, Gorton, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned:

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the herein-

before mentioned Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"THE SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the New Parish of Saint Cross, Clayton, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Manchester, and to be annexed to the New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw, in the same County and Diocese, being:—

"All that portion of the said New Parish of Saint Cross, Clayton, which is bounded upon the south-west partly by the New Parish of Christ Church, Bradford, in the said County and Diocese, and partly by the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw, upon the south by the last-named New Parish, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east, upon the north and upon the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the Stockport Branch of the Manchester and Ashton-under-Lyne Canal where the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw, the New Parish of Saint Clement, Higher Openshaw, in the said County and Diocese, and the said New Parish of Saint Cross, Clayton, all meet and extending thence first north-westward and then northward along the middle of the said Stockport Branch of the Manchester and Ashton-under-Lyne Canal for a distance of 17 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the said Manchester and Ashton-under-Lyne Canal, and extending thence westward along the middle of such Canal for a distance of 19 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Clayton Lane across it, and extending thence southward along the middle of Clayton Lane for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southern side of Chatham Street, and extending thence south-westward in a straight line for a distance of 25 chains or thereabouts to the junction of Colliery Lane with Colliery Street, and continuing thence south-westward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Cross, Clayton, from the said New Parish of Christ Church, Bradford.

STATUTES to alter and amend the Statutes in relation to the University of Cambridge made under "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877" (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48), which amending Statutes are now submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

We, the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars of the University of Cambridge, in pursuance of the power given to us by the 53rd Section of the said Act, do hereby alter and amend the Statutes made under the said Act in relation to our said University in manner following:—

STATUTE A.—CHAPTER II.

Degrees.

By repealing in Section 1a intituled "Research Students" the second paragraph, commencing with the words "Research students shall pursue such studies," and ending with the words "at the time prescribed by the University," and substituting therefor the following three paragraphs:—

Research students shall pursue such studies and satisfy such conditions as the

University may from time to time prescribe by grace.

Having done all that is required by the Statutes and Ordinances of the University for admission to the Degree of Master of Letters or Master of Science, they may be admitted to incept in Letters or Science, and shall afterwards be created Masters of Letters or Masters of Science at the time prescribed by the University.

Having done all that is required by the Statutes and Ordinances of the University for admission to the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy, they may be admitted to the title of Doctor Designate in Philosophy, and shall afterwards be created Doctors of Philosophy at the time prescribed by the University.

By deleting from each of the paragraphs of Section 20 intituled "Admission to Degrees in absence," the words "but the name of the candidate shall be published to the University at least three days before the proposal of the Grace for his Degree."

STATUTE B.—CHAPTER XV.

By inserting in Statute B, Chapter XV, intituled "For certain Professorships" after the words "The following Professors shall be elected hereafter in accordance with the provisions of Chapter IX for elections to certain Professorships, viz.," and before the words "The Arabic (Sir Thomas Adams's) Professor" the following words:—

- "The Regius Professor of Divinity."
- "The Regius Professor of Hebrew."
- "The Regius Professor of Greek."

STATUTE C.

The Regius Professorship of Greek.

By repealing the paragraph numbered 1 in this Statute and substituting therefor the following paragraph to form an amended paragraph number 1:—

1. The Regius Professor of Greek shall be elected hereafter in accordance with the provisions of Statute B, Chapter IX, for elections to certain Professorships.

Statute for the Regius Professorships of Divinity, Hebrew and Greek.

By repealing paragraph 1 of this Statute and substituting therefor the following paragraph to form an amended paragraph 1:—

1. There shall be three Professors in the University, to be called respectively the Regius Professor of Divinity, the Regius Professor of Hebrew, and the Regius Professor of Greek; they shall be elected hereafter in accordance with the provisions of Statute B, Chapter IX, for elections to certain Professorships.

By repealing paragraphs 3, 4 and 5 of this Statute and by adding to the Statute the following paragraph to form paragraph number 16 of the same Statute:—

16. In the event of a vacancy occurring in any one of the three Professorships before the constitution of an Electoral Board for that Professorship in accordance with the provisions of Statute B, Chapter IX, the election on that occasion shall be made in

accordance with the regulations hitherto in force for the said Professorship.

The General Minimum Time Rates for Learners under 14 years of age shall be 9s. per week of 48 hours, or 2½d. per hour, and from the age of 14 years they shall be entitled to the amounts shown in Column I. above as if they had commenced at 14.

The Minimum Rates for Learners set out in this Section are subject to the following conditions:—

(i.) The weekly rates set out above are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent by the learner in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

(ii.) The advances to be given to Learners commencing at under 21 years of age shall become due as from the first Monday in January and July of each year, the Learner being entitled to her first advance from the first Monday in January or July as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.

(iii.) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner and be entitled to the full General Minimum Time Rate applicable to her under Section I. of Part I. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice dated 7th May, 1920, upon the fulfilment of the following conditions:—

The General Minimum Time-Rate for Learners under 14 years of age shall be 6s. per week of 48 hours or 1½d. per hour, and from the age of 14 years they shall be entitled to the amounts shown in Column I. above, as if they had commenced at 14.

The Minimum Rates for Learners set out in this Section shall be subject to the following conditions:—

(i.) The weekly rates set out above are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent by the learner in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

(ii.) The advances to be given to Learners shall become due as from the first Monday in January and July of each year, the Learner being entitled to her first advance from the first Monday in January or July, as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.

(iii.) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner and be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to workers other than learners upon the fulfilment of the conditions appropriate to her as set out below:—

Age of entering upon employment.	Conditions.
Under 15 years of age ...	The completion of not less than three years' employment and the attainment of the age of 18 years.
15 and under 16 years of age ...	The completion of not less than two years' employment and the attainment of the age of 18 years.
16 years of age and over ...	The completion of two years' employment.

(iv.) No Female Learner shall be held to be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to workers other than learners until she has attained the age of 18 years, notwithstanding any employment she may have had. Provided that, in determining the age of entry and the length of employment, all service prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded.

PART II.

Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for Certain Classes of Female Learners.

As respects the classes of worker for whom variation in the General Minimum Time-Rates is proposed in Part I. of this Schedule, Overtime Rates calculated on the proposed General Minimum Time-Rates specified in Section II. of Part I. of this Schedule, in the manner set out in Part III. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice H.M. (2), dated 7th May, 1920, shall apply in substitution for the proposed General Minimum Time-Rates specified in Section II. of Part I. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board, in the Schedule to their Notice H.M. (2), to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART III.—DEFINITION.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definition shall apply:—

A Female Learner is a worker who:

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade specified in Part IV. of this Schedule by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, and held subject to compliance with the conditions contained in this Part of this Notice, or has made an application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or

registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

PART IV.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in England and Wales of the classes specified in Part I. of the Schedule to this Notice in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Hat, Cap and Millinery) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

The making from any material of men's, women's, or children's headgear, or the trimming thereof;

including:—

Warehousing, packing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the making or trimming of men's, women's or children's headgear;

but excluding:—

(1) The casting and making of solid metal helmets;

(2) The making of rubberised or oilskin headgear where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of other rubberised or oilskin articles;

(3) The making of nurses' or servants' caps, chefs' caps, hospital ward caps, or similar articles;

(4) The making of field bonnets, sun-bonnets, boudoir caps, or infants' millinery where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-ropes, jumpers, sports' coats, neck-wear, tea-gowns, dressing gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, under-skirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby linen or similar articles;

(5) The making of fur hats, where made in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of furs or furriers' skins into garments, rugs, or similar articles;

(6) The making of knitted headgear and the making of headgear from knitted fabrics where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabrics;

(7) Warehousing and packing of men's, women's or children's headgear and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made or trimmed on the premises.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 23rd April, 1921. Such objections should be in

writing and signed by the person making the Objection (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade Board (England and Wales), 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4. It is desirable that Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM (LIQUOR CONTROL).

ORDER (AMENDING AND CONSOLIDATING) OF THE CENTRAL CONTROL BOARD (LIQUOR TRAFFIC) FOR THE WELSH AREA.

Any person contravening any provision of this Order or of the Liquor Control Regulations is liable to imprisonment for six months with hard labour and a fine of £100.

WE, the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic), in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Acts and Regulations relating to the Defence of the Realm, hereby make the following Order:—

Limits of Area.

1. The Area to which this Order applies is the Welsh Area, being the area comprising the Principality of Wales, the County of Monmouth and the County Borough of Newport.

Hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold.

A.—*For consumption ON the Premises.*

2. (1) The days and hours on and during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption on the premises shall be restricted, and be as follows:—

On Weekdays:

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 10 p.m.

On Christmas Day (not falling on a Sunday) and Good Friday:

The hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 7 p.m. and 10 p.m.

Except on the days and between the hours aforesaid no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club any intoxicating liquor to be consumed on the premises; or

(b) Consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

B.—*For consumption OFF the Premises.*

(2) The days and hours on and during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption off the premises shall (subject to the additional restrictions as regards spirits) be restricted, and be as follows:—

On Weekdays:

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.

On Christmas Day (not falling on a Sunday) and Good Friday:

The hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Except on the days and between the hours aforesaid no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club or (except as hereinafter expressly provided) despatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed off the premises; or

(b) Take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

Additional Restrictions as to Spirits.

3. In addition to the above general restrictions as to hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied, the sale and supply of spirits in licensed premises and clubs shall be subject to the following special restrictions, that is to say:—

(a) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in or taken or (save as hereinafter expressly provided) despatched from any licensed premises or club except on weekdays and during the hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m.

(b) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be taken from any licensed premises or club in any open vessel.

(c) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club or be despatched or taken therefrom on Christmas Day or Good Friday.

(d) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in or taken from any refreshment room in any railway station.

Conditions as to Distribution.

4. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent—

(a) Sell, supply, distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor from any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle unless before the liquor is despatched it has been ordered and the quantity, description and price thereof, together with the name and address of the person to whom it is to be supplied, has been entered in a delivery book or invoice, which shall be carried by the person delivering the liquor, and in a day book which shall be kept on the premises from which the liquor is despatched.

(b) Carry or convey in any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle while in use for the distribution or delivery of intoxicating liquor any such liquor not entered in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(c) Distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor at any address not specified in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(d) Refuse to allow any constable to examine such van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle or such delivery book or invoice.

(e) Solicit or canvass for orders for, or collect or receive payment for intoxicating liquor except at the licensed premises.

(f) Send or cause to be sent or leave or cause to be left to or at any premises, or to

or with any person, any order form for intoxicating liquor.

(g) Cause or permit any payment for intoxicating liquor to be made on his behalf by any person in the service or employment of the vendor of the liquor, or, being a person in such service or employment, make any such payment as the agent or on behalf of the purchaser of the liquor.

Hours of Opening for the Supply of Food and Non-intoxicants.

5. Notwithstanding any provisions of this Order or of the law relating to licensing or the sale of intoxicating liquor:—

(a) Licensed premises may be opened for the supply of food and non-intoxicating liquor at the hour of 5.30 in the morning on all days, and be kept open for this purpose from that hour until the evening closing hour prescribed by the general provisions of the Licensing Acts, and until the hour of 10 p.m. on Sundays; and

(b) Refreshment houses may be kept open for this purpose at any time during which they may be kept open under the general provisions of the said Acts.

Saving Provisions.

6. Nothing in the foregoing provisions of this Order shall be deemed to prohibit, in cases where the same is otherwise lawful:

(a) The consumption of intoxicating liquor by any person in any licensed premises or club where he is residing, or the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time to any such person during the hours between 10 p.m. and 11 p.m. on week-days, and between 9 p.m. and 11 p.m. on Sundays; or

(b) The sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time, and the consumption of intoxicating liquor at such meal to and by any person in any licensed premises or club during the hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 6.30 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Sundays; or

(c) The consumption of intoxicating liquor at a meal by any person in any licensed premises or club at any time within half an hour after the conclusion of the afternoon and evening hours during which the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor is permitted by this Order;

Provided that the liquor was sold or supplied and served during such hours at the same time as the meal and for consumption at the meal; or

(d) The sale or supply of spirits to any person producing a certificate in writing, dated and signed by a duly qualified medical practitioner, that the spirits are immediately required for medicinal purposes and specifying the quantity of spirits required;

Provided that the quantity sold or supplied shall not exceed the quantity specified in such certificate; or

(e) The despatch from licensed premises of intoxicating liquor in any horse-drawn or motor van, lorry or similar vehicle at any time of the day up to 9 p.m. on week days; or

(f) The sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises and

the consumption of intoxicating liquor on the premises—

(1) On week-days during any specified hours after the hour of 10 p.m. (including the early morning hours of the day following) under a special order of exemption or licence granted in pursuance of section 57 or section 64 of the Licensing (Consolidation) Act, 1910, and

(2) During any specified hours between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on week-days under such special order of exemption or licence granted in pursuance of the said sections of the said Act for any public ceremony or gathering or like special occasion involving the assembly of and necessitating the provision of accommodation for considerable numbers of persons.

Credit prohibited.

7. No person shall—

(1) (a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply in any licensed premises or club or despatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed either on or off the premises; or

(b) Consume any intoxicating liquor in or take it from such premises or club; unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is supplied or despatched or taken away;

Provided always that if the liquor is sold or supplied for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time and is consumed at such meal, this provision shall not be deemed to be contravened if the price of the liquor is paid together with the price of such meal and before the person partaking thereof quits the premises.

(2) Introduce or cause to be introduced into the area any intoxicating liquor unless it is paid for before it is so introduced.

Long Pull prohibited.

8. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent in any licensed premises or club sell or supply to any person as the measure of intoxicating liquor for which he asks an amount exceeding that measure.

Dilution of Spirits.

A.—Compulsory.

9. (a) No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent—

(1) Sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club for consumption on or off the premises or despatch therefrom any whisky, brandy, rum or gin unless reduced to 30 degrees under proof.

(2) Introduce or cause to be introduced into the area any whisky, brandy, rum or gin unless reduced to 30 degrees under proof.

B.—Permissive.

(b) The sale of whisky, brandy, rum and gin reduced to a number of degrees under proof which falls between 30 and 35 is hereby permitted.

(c) In determining whether an offence has been committed under the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts by selling to the prejudice of the purchaser whisky, brandy, rum or gin not adulterated otherwise than by an admixture of water, it shall be a

good defence to prove that such admixture has not reduced the spirit more than 35 degrees under proof.

Explanatory Provisions.

10. (a) Nothing in this Order authorises any licensed premises to be kept open for the sale of intoxicating liquor except during the hours permitted under the general provisions of the Licensing Acts.

(b) The prohibition under this Order of the sale, supply and consumption of intoxicating liquor except on and during certain days and hours is not subject to the exceptions provided for in the Licensing Acts with respect to *bonâ fide* travellers and the supply of intoxicating liquor at railway stations, or any other provisions in those Acts enabling intoxicating liquor to be supplied during closing hours in special cases.

(c) The expression "licensed premises" includes any premises or place where the sale of intoxicating liquor is carried on under a licence.

(d) This Order does not affect the sale or despatch of intoxicating liquor to a trader for the purposes of his trade or to a registered club for the purposes of the club.

(e) This Order does not affect the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor to or in any canteen where the sale of intoxicating liquor is carried on under the authority of a Secretary of State or of the Admiralty, or to any authorised mess of officers or non-commissioned officers of His Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces.

Production of Order.

11. The secretary of every club to which this Order applies and every holder of a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor shall keep in the club or in the licensed premises a copy of this Order, and shall produce the same for inspection when required so to do by any police officer or by any member of the club or by any customer on the licensed premises.

Revocation of Previous Orders.

12. Save as hereinafter provided, this Order shall be substituted for the Orders of the Board now in force in the said area, which said Orders are hereby revoked:

Provided always that the Orders of the Board relating to the sale of light beer, the sale of medicated wines and the sale of intoxicating liquor under new excise licences, and any special Order made with reference to any particular licensed premises or club or any specified class or description of such premises or clubs now in force in the said area shall remain in full force.

Commencement of Order.

13. This Order shall come into force on the second day of May, 1921.

Any person contravening any provision of this Order or of the Liquor Control Regulations is liable to imprisonment for six months with hard labour and a fine of £100.

WE, the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic), in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Acts and Regulations relating to the Defence of the Realm hereby make the following Order:—

Limits of Area.

1. The Area to which this Order applies is the West Gloucestershire Area, being the area comprising the Petty Sessional Divisions of Lydney, Coleford and Newnham, in the County of Gloucester.

Hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold.

A.—For consumption ON the Premises.

2.—(1) The days and hours on and during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption on the premises shall be restricted and be as follows:—

On Weekdays:

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 10 p.m.

On Christmas Day (not falling on a Sunday) and Good Friday:

The hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 7 p.m. and 10 p.m.

Except on the days and between the hours aforesaid no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club any intoxicating liquor to be consumed on the premises; or

(b) Consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

B.—For Consumption OFF the Premises.

(2) The days and hours on and during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption off the premises shall (subject to the additional restrictions as regards spirits) be restricted and be as follows:—

On Weekdays:

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.

On Christmas Day (not falling on a Sunday) and Good Friday:

The hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Except on the days and between the hours aforesaid no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club or (except as hereinafter expressly provided) dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed off the premises; or

(b) Take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

Additional Restrictions as to Spirits.

(c) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club or be dispatched or taken therefrom on Christmas Day or Good Friday.

(d) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in or taken from any refreshment room in any railway station.

Conditions as to Distribution.

4. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent—

(a) Sell, supply, distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor from any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle unless before the liquor is dispatched it has been ordered and the quantity, description and price thereof together with the name and address of the person to whom it is to be supplied has been entered in a delivery book or invoice, which shall be carried by the person delivering the liquor, and in a day book which shall be kept on the premises from which the liquor is dispatched.

(b) Carry or convey in any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle while in use for the distribution or delivery of intoxicating liquor, any such liquor not entered in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(c) Distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor at any address not specified in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(d) Refuse to allow any constable to examine such van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle or such delivery book or invoice.

(e) Solicit or canvass for orders for, or collect or receive payment for, intoxicating liquor except at the licensed premises.

(f) Send or cause to be sent or leave or cause to be left to or at any premises, or to or with any person, any order form for intoxicating liquor.

(g) Cause or permit any payment for intoxicating liquor to be made on his behalf by any person in the service or employment of the vendor of the liquor, or, being a person in such service or employment, make any such payment as the agent or on behalf of the purchaser of the liquor.

Hours of Opening for the Supply of Food and Non-intoxicants.

5. Notwithstanding any provisions of this Order or of the law relating to licensing or the sale of intoxicating liquor:—

(a) Licensed premises may be opened for the supply of food and non-intoxicating liquor at the hour of 5.30 in the morning on all days and be kept open for this purpose from that hour until the evening closing hour

Provided that the liquor was sold or supplied and served during such hours at the same time as the meal and for consumption at the meal; or

(d) The sale or supply of spirits to any person producing a certificate in writing, dated and signed by a duly qualified medical practitioner, that the spirits are immediately required for medicinal purposes, and specifying the quantity of spirits required;

Provided that the quantity sold or supplied shall not exceed the quantity specified in such certificate; or

(e) The dispatch from licensed premises of intoxicating liquor in any horse-drawn or motor van, lorry or similar vehicle, at any time of the day up to 9 p.m. on week-days; or

(f) The sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises and the consumption of intoxicating liquor on the premises—

(1) On week-days during any specified hours after the hour of 10 p.m. (including the early morning hours of the day following) under a special order of exemption or licence granted in pursuance of section 57 or section 64 of the Licensing (Consolidation) Act, 1910, and

(2) During any specified hours between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on week-days, under such special order of exemption or licence granted in pursuance of the said sections of the said Act for any public ceremony or gathering or like special occasion involving the assembly of and necessitating the provision of accommodation for considerable numbers of persons.

Credit Prohibited.

7. No person shall—

(1) (a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply in any licensed premises or club or dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed either on or off the premises; or

(b) Consume any intoxicating liquor in or take it from such premises or club;

unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is supplied or dispatched or taken away;

Provided always that if the liquor is sold or supplied for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time and is consumed at such meal, this provision shall not be deemed to be contravened if the price of the liquor is paid together with the price of such meal and before the person partaking thereof quits the premises.

(2) Introduce or cause to be introduced into the area any intoxicating liquor unless it is paid for before it is so introduced.

Long Pull Prohibited.

8. No person shall, either by himself or by any servant or agent in any licensed premises or club sell or supply to any person as the measure of intoxicating liquor for which he asks an amount exceeding that measure.

Dilution of Spirits.

A. Compulsory.

9. (a) No person shall, either by himself or by any servant or agent—

(1) Sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club for consumption on or off the premises, or dispatch therefrom any whisky, brandy, rum or gin unless reduced to 30 degrees under proof.

(2) Introduce or cause to be introduced into the area any whisky, brandy, rum or gin unless reduced to 30 degrees under proof.

B.—Permissive.

(b) The sale of whisky, brandy, rum and gin reduced to a number of degrees under proof which falls between 30 and 35 is hereby permitted.

(c) In determining whether an offence has been committed under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act by selling to the prejudice of the purchaser, whisky, brandy, rum or gin not adulterated otherwise than by an admixture of water, it shall be a good defence to prove that such admixture has not reduced the spirit more than 35 degrees under proof.

Explanatory Provisions.

10. (a) Nothing in this Order authorises any licensed premises to be kept open for the sale of intoxicating liquor except during the hours permitted under the general provisions of the Licensing Acts.

(b) The prohibition under this Order of the sale, supply and consumption of intoxicating liquor, except on and during certain days and hours, is not subject to the exceptions provided for in the Licensing Acts with respect to *bonâ-fide* travellers and the supply of intoxicating liquor at railway stations or any other provisions in those Acts enabling intoxicating liquor to be supplied during closing hours in special cases.

(c) The expression "licensed premises" includes any premises or place where the

Production of Order.

The secretary of every club to which this Order applies and every holder of a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor shall keep in the club or in the licensed premises a copy of this Order, and shall produce the same for inspection when required so to do by any police officer or by any member of the club or by any customer on the licensed premises.

Revocation of Previous Orders.

12. Save as hereinafter provided, this Order shall be substituted for the Orders of the Board now in force in the said area, which said Orders are hereby revoked:

Provided always that the Orders of the Board relating to the sale of light beer, the sale of medicated wines and the sale of intoxicating liquor under new excise licences, and any special Order made with reference to any particular licensed premises or club or any specified class or description of such premises or clubs, now in force in the said area, shall remain in full force.

ORDER (AMENDING AND CONSOLIDATING) OF THE CENTRAL CONTROL BOARD (LIQUOR TRAFFIC) FOR THE LONDON AREA.

Any person contravening any provision of this Order or of the Liquor Control Regulations is liable to imprisonment for six months with hard labour and a fine of £100.

WE, the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic), in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Acts and Regulations relating to the Defence of the Realm, hereby make the following Order:—

Limits of Area.

1. The area to which this Order applies is the London Area, being the area comprising the City of London, the Metropolitan Police District, the Urban District of Watford in the County of Herts, the Petty Sessional Division

of Romford in the County of Essex, the Urban District of Dartford, and the Parishes of Darenth, Stone, Sutton-at-Hone, Swanscombe and Wilmington in the County of Kent.

Hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold.

A.—For Consumption ON the Premises.

2. (1) The hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption on the premises shall be restricted and be as follows:—

On Weekdays:—

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 10 p.m.

On Sundays, Christmas Day and Good Friday:—

The hours between 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. and between 7 p.m. and 10 p.m.

Except between the aforesaid hours no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club any intoxicating liquor to be consumed on the premises; or

(b) Consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

B.—For Consumption OFF the Premises.

(2) The hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption off the premises shall (subject to the additional restrictions as regards spirits) be restricted and be as follows:—

On Weekdays:—

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.

On Sundays, Christmas Day and Good Friday:—

The hours between 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. and between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Except between the aforesaid hours no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club, or (except as hereinafter provided) dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed off the premises; or

(b) Take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

Additional Restrictions as to Spirits.

3. In addition to the above general restrictions as to hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied, the sale and supply of spirits in licensed premises and clubs shall be subject to the following special restrictions, that is to say:—

(a) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in or taken or (save as hereinafter expressly provided) dispatched from any licensed premises or club, except on weekdays and during the hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m.

(b) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be taken from any licensed premises or club in any open vessel.

(c) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club or be dispatched or taken therefrom on Christmas Day or Good Friday.

(d) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in or taken from any refreshment room in any railway station.

Conditions as to Distribution.

4. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent—

(a) Sell, supply, distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor from any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle unless before the liquor is dispatched it has been ordered and the quantity, description and price thereof together with the name and address of the person to whom it is to be supplied, has been entered in a delivery book or invoice, which shall be carried by the person delivering the liquor, and in a day book which shall be kept on the premises from which the liquor is dispatched.

(b) Carry or convey in any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle while in use for the distribution or delivery of intoxicating liquor, any such liquor not entered in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(c) Distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor at any address not specified in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(d) Refuse to allow any constable to examine such van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle or such delivery book or invoice.

(e) Solicit or canvass for orders for, or collect or receive payment for, intoxicating liquor except at the licensed premises.

(f) Send or cause to be sent or leave or cause to be left to or at any premises, or to or with any person, any order form for intoxicating liquor.

(g) Cause or permit any payment for intoxicating liquor to be made on his behalf by any person in the service or employment of the vendor of the liquor, or, being a person in such service or employment, make any such payment as the agent or on behalf of the purchaser of the liquor.

Hours of Opening for the Supply of Food and Non-intoxicants.

5. Notwithstanding any provisions of this Order or of the law relating to licensing or the sale of intoxicating liquor—

(a) Licensed premises may be opened for the supply of food and non-intoxicating liquor at the hour of 5 in the morning on all days and be kept open for this purpose from that hour until the evening closing hour prescribed by the general provisions of the Licensing Acts; and

(b) Refreshment houses may be kept open for this purpose at any time during which they may be kept open under the general provisions of the said Acts.

Saving Provisions.

6. Nothing in the foregoing provisions of this Order shall be deemed to prohibit, in cases where the same is otherwise lawful:

(a) The consumption of intoxicating liquor by any person in any licensed premises or club where he is residing, or the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption

at a meal supplied at the same time to any such person between the hours of 10 p.m. and 11 p.m.; or

(b) The consumption of intoxicating liquor at a meal by any person in any licensed premises or club at any time within half an hour after the conclusion of the afternoon and evening hours during which the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor is permitted by this Order;

Provided that the liquor was sold or supplied and served during such hours at the same time as the meal and for consumption at the meal; or

(c) The sale or supply of spirits to any person producing a certificate in writing dated and signed by a duly qualified medical practitioner that the spirits are immediately required for medicinal purposes and specifying the quantity of spirits required;

Provided that the quantity sold or supplied shall not exceed the quantity specified in such certificate; or

(d) The dispatch from licensed premises of intoxicating liquor in any horse-drawn or motor van, lorry, or similar vehicle, at any time of the day up to 9 p.m. on week-days; or

(e) The dispatch from licensed premises of intoxicating liquor in casks for the purpose of delivery during the restricted hours permitted by the Metropolitan Streets Act, 1867, and the City of London Streets Traffic Act, 1909, at any place where the provisions of the said Acts apply; or

(f) The sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises and the consumption of intoxicating liquor on the premises—

(1) On week-days during any specified hours after the hour of 10 p.m. (including the early morning hours of the day following) under a special order of exemption or licence granted in pursuance of section 57 or section 64 of the Licensing (Consolidation) Act, 1910, and

(2) During any specified hours between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on week-days under such special order of exemption or licence granted in pursuance of the said sections of the said Act for any public ceremony or gathering or like special occasion involving the assembly of and necessitating the provision of accommodation for considerable numbers of persons.

Credit Prohibited.

7. No person shall—

(1) (a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply in any licensed premises or club or dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed either on or off the premises; or

(b) Consume any intoxicating liquor in or take it from such premises or club; unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is supplied or dispatched or taken away;

Provided always that if the liquor is sold or supplied for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time and is consumed at such meal, this provision shall not be deemed to be contravened if the price of the liquor is paid together with the price of such meal and before the person partaking thereof quits the premises.

(2) Introduce or cause to be introduced into the area any intoxicating liquor unless it is paid for before it is so introduced.

Long Pull Prohibited.

8. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent in any licensed premises or club sell or supply to any person as the measure of intoxicating liquor for which he asks an amount exceeding that measure.

*Dilution of Spirits.**A.—Compulsory.*

9. (a) No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent—

(1) Sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club for consumption on or off the premises or dispatch therefrom any whisky, brandy, rum or gin unless reduced to 30 degrees under proof.

Except between the hours respectively prescribed no person shall—

(ii) Consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(iii) Permit any person to consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

B.—For Consumption OFF the Premises.

(2) The hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption off the premises shall (subject to the additional restrictions as regards spirits) be restricted, and be the same in each case as the hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied for consumption on the premises, except that in each case such sale or supply for consumption off the premises shall cease in the evening one hour earlier than the sale or supply for consumption on the premises.

Except between the hours respectively prescribed no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club for consumption off the premises or (except as hereinafter expressly provided) dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor; or

(b) Take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

Additional Restrictions as to Spirits.

Hours during which Intoxicating Liquor may be sold.

A.—For Consumption ON the Premises.

2. (1) The hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption on the premises shall be restricted and be as follows:—

On Week-days:—

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 10 p.m.

On Sundays, Christmas Day and Good Friday:—

The hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 7 p.m. and 10 p.m.

Except between the aforesaid hours no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club any intoxicating liquor to be consumed on the premises; or

(b) Consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

B.—For Consumption OFF the Premises.

(2) The hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption off the premises shall (subject to the additional restrictions as regards spirits) be restricted and be as follows:—

On Week-days:—

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.

On Sundays, Christmas Day and Good Friday:—

The hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Except between the aforesaid hours no person shall—

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club, or (except as hereinafter expressly provided) dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed off the premises; or

(b) Take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

Additional Restrictions as to Spirits.

3. In addition to the above general restrictions as to hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied, the sale and supply of spirits in licensed premises and clubs shall be subject to the following special restrictions, that is to say:

(a) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in or taken or (save as hereinafter expressly provided) dispatched from any licensed premises or club, except on week-days and during the hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m.

(b) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be taken from any licensed premises or club in any open vessel.

(c) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club or be dispatched or taken therefrom on Christmas Day or Good Friday.

(d) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in or taken from any refreshment room in any railway station.

Conditions as to Distribution.

4. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent—

(a) Sell, supply, distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor from any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle unless before the liquor is dispatched it has been ordered and the quantity, description and price thereof together with the name and address of the person to whom it is to be supplied has been entered in a delivery book or invoice, which shall be carried by the person delivering the liquor, and in a day book which shall be kept on the premises from which the liquor is dispatched.

(b) Carry or convey in any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle while in use for the distribution or delivery of intoxicating liquor, any such liquor not entered in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(c) Distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor at any address not specified in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(d) Refuse to allow any constable to examine such van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle or such delivery book or invoice.

(e) Solicit or canvass for orders for, or collect or receive payment for, intoxicating liquor except at the licensed premises.

(f) Send or cause to be sent or leave or cause to be left to or at any premises, or to or with any person, any order form for intoxicating liquor.

(g) Cause or permit any payment for intoxicating liquor to be made on his behalf by any person in the service or employment of the vendor of the liquor, or, being a person in such service or employment, make any such payment as the agent or on behalf of the purchaser of the liquor.

Hours of Opening for the Supply of Food and Non-intoxicants.

5. Notwithstanding any provisions of this Order or of the law relating to licensing or the sale of intoxicating liquor:—

(a) Licensed premises may be opened for the supply of food and non-intoxicating liquor at the hour of 5.30 in the morning on all days, and be kept open for this purpose from that hour until the evening closing hour prescribed by the general provisions of the Licensing Acts; and

(b) Refreshment houses may be kept open for this purpose at any time during which they may be kept open under the general provisions of the said Acts.

Saving Provisions.

6. Nothing in the foregoing provisions of this Order shall be deemed to prohibit, in cases where the same is otherwise lawful:

(a) The consumption of intoxicating liquor by any person in any licensed premises or club where he is residing, or the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time to any such person between the hours of 10 p.m. and 11 p.m.; or

(b) The consumption of intoxicating liquor at a meal by any person in any licensed premises or club at any time within half an hour after the conclusion of the afternoon and evening hours during which the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor is permitted by this Order;

Provided that the liquor was sold or supplied and served during such hours at the same time as the meal and for consumption at the meal; or

(c) The sale or supply of spirits to any person producing a certificate in writing dated and signed by a duly qualified medical practitioner that the spirits are immediately required for medicinal purposes and specifying the quantity of spirits required;

Provided that the quantity sold or supplied shall not exceed the quantity specified in such certificate; or

(d) The dispatch from licensed premises of intoxicating liquor in any horse-drawn or motor van, lorry, or similar vehicle, at any time of the day up to 9 p.m. on week-days; or

(e) The sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises and

the consumption of intoxicating liquor on the premises—

(1) On week-days during any specified hours after the hour of 10 p.m. (including the early morning hours of the day following) under a special order of exemption or licence granted in pursuance of section 57 or section 64 of the Licensing (Consolidation) Act, 1910, and

(2) During any specified hours between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on week-days under such special order of exemption or licence granted in pursuance of the said sections of the said Act for any public ceremony or gathering or like special occasion involving the assembly of and necessitating the provision of accommodation for considerable numbers of persons.

Credit Prohibited.

7. No person shall—

(1) (a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply in any licensed premises or club or dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed either on or off the premises; or

(b) Consume any intoxicating liquor in or take it from such premises or club;

unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is supplied or dispatched or taken away;

Provided always that if the liquor is sold or supplied for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time and is consumed at such meal this provision shall not be deemed to be contravened if the price of the liquor is paid together with the price of such meal and before the person partaking thereof quits the premises.

(2) Introduce or cause to be introduced into any of the areas any intoxicating liquor unless it is paid for before it is so introduced.

Long Pull Prohibited.

8. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent in any licensed premises or club sell or supply to any person as the measure of intoxicating liquor for which he asks an amount exceeding that measure.

Dilution of Spirits.

A.—Compulsory.

9. (a) No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent—

(1) Sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club for consumption on or off the premises or dispatch therefrom any whisky, brandy, rum or gin unless reduced to 30 degrees under proof.

(2) Introduce or cause to be introduced into any of the areas any whisky, brandy, rum or gin unless reduced to 30 degrees under proof.

B.—Permissive.

(b) The sale of whisky, brandy, rum and gin reduced to a number of degrees under proof which falls between 30 and 35 is hereby permitted.

(c) In determining whether an offence has been committed under the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts by selling to the prejudice of the purchaser whisky, brandy, rum or gin not adulterated otherwise than by an admixture of water, it shall be a good defence to prove that such admixture has not reduced the spirit more than 35 degrees under proof.

Explanatory Provisions.

10. (a) Nothing in this Order authorises any licensed premises to be kept open for the sale of intoxicating liquor except during the hours permitted under the general provisions of the Licensing Acts.

(b) The prohibition under this Order of the sale, supply and consumption of intoxicating liquor except during certain hours is not subject to the exceptions provided for in the Licensing Acts with respect to *bona-fide* travellers and the supply of intoxicating liquor at railway stations or any other provisions in those Acts enabling intoxicating liquor to be supplied during closing hours in special cases.

(c) The expression "licensed premises" includes any premises or place where the sale of intoxicating liquor is carried on under a licence.

(d) This Order does not affect the sale or dispatch of intoxicating liquor to a trader for the purposes of his trade, or to a registered club for the purposes of the club.

(e) This Order does not affect the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor to or in any canteen where the sale of intoxicating liquor is carried on under the authority of a Secretary of State or of the Admiralty, or to any authorised mess of officers or non-commissioned officers of His Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces.

Production of Order.

11. The secretary of every club to which this Order applies and every holder of a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor shall keep in the club or in the licensed premises a copy of this Order and shall produce the same for inspection when required so to do by any police officer or by any member of the club or by any customer on the licensed premises.

Revocation of Previous Orders.

12. Save as hereinafter provided, this Order shall be substituted for the Orders of the Board now in force in the said areas, which said Orders are hereby revoked:

Provided always that the Orders of the Board relating to the sale of light beer, the sale of medicated wines and the sale of intoxicating liquor under new excise licences, and any special Order made with reference to any particular licensed premises or club or any specified class or description of such premises or clubs, now in force in the said areas shall remain in full force.

Commencement of Order.

13. This Order shall come into force on the Second day of May, 1921.

In the Urban District of Cuckfield—

Broad-street, London-road between Mill Hall and the footpath leading to Wyllies-lane, London-lane and Church-street.

In the Rural District of Cuckfield, Parish of Lindfield—

Black Hill-road, High-street to Spring-lane, Scrase Bridge-lane, Sunte-avenue, Balcombe-road and Borde Hill-lane.
