### EXPLOSIVES' ACT, 1875.

Notice is hereby given, in accordance with the provisions of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that, after the expiration of forty days from the date hereof, it is proposed to submit to His Majesty in Council, in pursuance of the Explosives Act, 1875, a draft of an Order in Council exempting an explosive made by impregnating absorbent carbonaceous material with liquid air or oxygen under certain conditions from the provisions of the last-named Act.

And notice is hereby further given that, in accordance with the provisions of the first-named Act, copies of the proposed draft Order in Council can be obtained by any public body, within forty days of the date of this notice, at the Privy Council Office, Whitehall.

The following are the Regulations to be observed:—

1. Gentlemen who have been presented and who wish to attend the Levée, should make a written application, as detailed below.

2. No applications can be received from gentlemen wishing to be presented. Their names must be forwarded by the gentleman making the presentation.

3. All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists of the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines, of whatever rank, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty. All Civil Officers of the Admiralty will follow the same rule.

4. All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists of the Army, except those on the

Indian and Colonial Establishments, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Secretary, The War Office, but Officers of the Household Cavalry or the Brigade of Guards should communicate with the Comptroller, Ceremonial Department, St. James's Palace.

5. All Officers of the Royal Air Force, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with, and obtain their cards through the usual channels.

6. All Officers of the Indian Civil Service and of the Indian Army, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Secretary of State at the India Office, Whitehall.

7. All Officers of the Colonial Service and Colonial Forces, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Colonial Office, Whitehall, with the exception of Officers of the local Forces of the self-governing Dominions, who will apply to the Secretary, War Office, for their cards for attendance or for presentation, supporting their application in all cases by a credential from the Governor-General, Governor, Officer commanding the local Forces, or the representative in London of the Dominion concerned.

8. Lords Mayor and Mayors, High Sheriffs, Sheriffs, Recorders, Chairmen of Quarter Sessions, Metropolitan Police Magistrates and other Stipendiary Magistrates, and all gentlemen connected with the Home Office, will make their applications through the Private Secretary to the Secretary of State for the Home Department.

9. Chairmen of County Councils, and all gentlemen connected with the Ministry of Health, will make their applications through the Private Secretary to the Minister of Health.

10. Judges, Law Officers, King's Counsel, and all Legal Officials holding appointments under the Crown, other than those already mentioned, will make their applications through the Private Secretary to the Lord Chancellor.

11. Similarly, all gentlemen connected with the Foreign Office or any other Government Department, will communicate with and obtain their cards for attendance or presentation from the Department under which they serve.

12. Peers, Bishops, His Majesty's Lieutenants for Counties, Deputy Lieutenants for Counties, Members of Parliament, Officials connected with the Houses of Parliament, Clergy of all Denominations, and all gentlemen other than the above mentioned, should communicate with the Comptroller, Ceremonial Department, St. James's Palace.

of the Pyx Jury were delivered to the King's Remembrancer, viz :—

# TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE LONDON MINT.

## VERDICT.

We, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the first day of March, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, before the King's Remembrancer at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the city of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's silver coins in the Pyx of the Royal Mint in London, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Mint from the first day of January, One thousand nine hundred and twenty, to the thirty-first day of December, One thousand nine hundred and twenty, both days inclusive. We found that there were no gold coins in the said Pyx. We ascertained that the number of coins of silver in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took all the coins, except one sixpence and one threepence, from each of such packets of silver coins as were made before the 31st day of March, 1920, and one coin from each of such packets of silver coins as were made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, making altogether 110 sixpences, 4 fourpences, 231 threepences; 4 twopences and 12 pence made before the 31st day of March, 1920, and 174 half-crowns, 88 florins, 108 shillings, 45 sixpences and 50 threepences made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, and we weighed separately each of the said silver coins so taken out, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as so amended, was plus forty-five thousandths of an ounce (+ '045 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted such of the said silver coins so taken out and weighed as were made before the 31st day of March, 1920, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Trial Plate made of pure silver (as prescribed by the Coinage Act, 1920) produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as so amended, was plus sixty-two hundred thousandths (or + '00062), and that therefore the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We then melted such of the said silver coins so taken out and weighed as were made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Trial Plate made of pure silver produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Acts, 1891 and 1920, and we found that the amount of variation from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as so amended, was plus one hundred and forty-one hundred thousandths (or + '00141), and that therefore the said metal was within the

prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said silver coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue four half-crowns, two florins and three shillings made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, one sixpence made before the 31st day of March, 1920, one sixpence made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, one threepence made before the 31st day of March, 1920, and one threepence made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such half-crowns weighed respectively—the first 218·673 grains, the second 217·941 grains, the third 218·071 grains, and the fourth 217·965 grains, that such florins weighed respectively—the first 174·713 grains and the second 174·051 grains, that such shillings weighed respectively—the first 87·416 grains, the second 87·485 grains, and the third 87·434 grains, that such sixpence made before the 31st day of March, 1920, weighed 43·671 grains, that such sixpence made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, weighed 43·686 grains, that such threepence made before the 31st day of March, 1920, weighed 21·655 grains, and that such threepence made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, weighed 21·805 grains. We then assayed the said four half-crowns, the said two florins, the said three shillings, the said two sixpences, and the said two threepences separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such half-crowns to be—the first 499·30, the second 500·00, the third 498·80, and the fourth 503·57, of such florins to be the first 503·45, and the second 501·50, of such shillings to be—the first 502·77, the second 503·95, and the third 498·90, of such sixpence made before the 31st day of March, 1920, to be 924·88, of such sixpence made on and after the 31st day of March, 1920, to be 503·05, of such threepence made before the 31st day of March, 1920, to be 924·73, and of such threepence made on or after the 31st day of March, 1920, to be 502·05.

#### TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE PERTH BRANCH MINT.

##### VERDICT.

We, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the first day of March, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Perth, in the State of Western Australia, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the

Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the first day of January, One thousand nine hundred and twenty, to the thirty-first day of December, One thousand nine hundred and twenty, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took two coins from each of such packets of gold coins, amounting altogether to eighty-eight sovereigns or twenty-shilling pieces, and to four half-sovereigns or ten-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus four thousandths of an ounce (+·004 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was minus two hundred thousandths (or -·00002), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue four sovereigns and one half-sovereign, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively—the first 123·260 grains, the second 123·297 grains, the third 123·233 grains, the fourth 123·320 grains, such half-sovereign weighed 61·613 grains. We then assayed the said four sovereigns and one half-sovereign separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be, the first 916·63, the second 916·60, the third 916·68, and the fourth 916·57 respectively, and the millesimal fineness of such half-sovereign to be 916·56.

#### TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE MELBOURNE BRANCH MINT.

##### VERDICT.

We, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the first day of March,

One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the city of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Melbourne, in the State of Victoria, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the first day of January, One thousand nine hundred and twenty, to the thirty-first day of December, One thousand nine hundred and twenty, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took the only coin from the first packet and fifteen coins from each of the remaining packets of gold coins, amounting altogether to seventy-six sovereigns or twenty-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus one-thousandth of an ounce (+ '001 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard gold Trial Platé produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was minus eleven hundred thousandths (or - '00011), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue two sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively—the first 123'182 grains, the second 123'337 grains. We then assayed the said two sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be, the first 916'56, and the second 916'71.

We, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the first day of March, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the city of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Sydney, in the State of New South Wales, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the first day of January, One thousand nine hundred and twenty, to the thirty-first day of December, One thousand nine hundred and twenty, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took twenty coins from each of such packets of gold coins, amounting altogether to eighty sovereigns or twenty-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act, as so amended, was plus one thousandth of an ounce (+ '001 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was minus nineteen hundred thousandths (or - '00019), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue two sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively—the first 123'309 grains and the second 123'267 grains. We then assayed the said two sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be—the first 916'56 and the second 916'58.

##### PROPOSAL TO FIX GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF FEMALE WEAVERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Jute Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Piece-Rates for certain classes of Female Weavers.

The Proposed General Minimum Piece-Rates shall apply to the weaving of all Hessian, floor-cloth and linoleum goods in ordinary Hessian looms as generally existing in Dundee at the date of this Notice, but shall not apply to cloth woven in looms the reed space of which is 32 inches or narrower.

The proposals are in substitution for the proposals contained in the Notice J (10), issued by the Trade Board, and dated 9th April, 1921, which has been withdrawn by the Trade Board.

Full information with regard to the actual Piece-Rates and the conditions of their application may be obtained from the Secretary of the Jute Trade Board (Great Britain) at the address given below.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to their Proposals to fix which may be lodged with them within two months from 14th May, 1921. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Jute Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Jute Trade in Great Britain as specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they PROPOSE TO VARY the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers at present fixed and set out in the Notices J. Provided that in cases where a Weaving Mistress has immediate responsibility for the instruction of not more than one Female Weaving Learner, the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate set out above shall only apply where the Weaving Mistress is paid by the employer in respect of such responsibility the sum of not less than 5s. per week in addition to her own earnings on piece-work.

## PART III.

*Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers employed on Time-work.*

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 48.

On any day (other than Saturday), 8½.

On Saturday, 4½.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—In lieu of the Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Trade Board's Notices J (5) and J (8) dated 22nd October, 1920, and 1st April, 1921, respectively, the Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of Hours worked by Male or Female workers Employed on Time-Work in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

(a) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable as specified in Parts I and II of this Schedule, i.e., Double Time.

(b) For Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable as specified in Parts I and II of this Schedule, i.e., Time-and-a-Half.

(c) For all time worked in any week, in excess of 48 hours One-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable as specified in Parts I and II of this Schedule, i.e., Time-and-a-Half except where a higher amount is payable under Sub-Section (a) of this Section.

(d) The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds 8½, or in the case of Saturday exceeds 4½, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided that in the case of those classes of

workers in the Municipal Burgh of Brechin, the Parish of Brechin, the Municipal Burgh of Forfar, the Parish of Forfar, the Burgh of Kirriemuir, the Parish of Kirriemuir, the Burgh of Blairgowrie, the Burgh of Carnoustie or the Parish of Logie Pert, who in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend for nine hours per day on five days of the week and for three hours on Saturday, the Overtime Rate proposed in Sub-Section (b) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first quarter of an hour in excess of 8½ hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, but shall be payable in respect of all hours worked on any such day in excess of nine hours.

Provided also that in the case of those classes of workers in the areas specified in the first proviso to this Section who, in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend only on five days a week, the Overtime Rate proposed in Sub-Section (b) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first three-quarters of an hour in excess of 8½ hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, but shall be payable on any such day in respect of all hours worked in excess of 9½ hours.

NOTE.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

## PART IV.

The proposed General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Parts I and II of this Schedule are weekly rates based on a week of 48 hours and are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

## PART V.

For the purpose of this Notice a Female Weaving Learner shall be deemed to mean a Female Worker who is:—

(a) Definitely and effectively learning weaving under the immediate instruction of a Weaving Mistress; and

(b) Employed under conditions such that she shall cease to be employed on time work and shall be employed on piece-work at the earliest date practicable.

## PART VI.

The respective proposed Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male and Female workers in Great Britain of the classes specified in this Schedule, in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, that is to say:—The preparing, spinning or weaving (a) of jute or (b) of jute and any other fibre, except flax or hemp;

*Including*:—(1) The preparing and spinning of waste reclaimed at any stage; and

(2) All packing, despatching, warehousing, storing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned work; but

*Excluding*:—(1) The calendering, bleaching, dyeing or finishing of any of the above-mentioned materials; and

(2) The preparing or spinning of materials required for the making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding), (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords), (c) core for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine), (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles, when such preparing or spinning is carried on in the same factory or workshop as the said making or re-making; and

(3) The making or repair of sacks or bags; and also

(4) The weaving of carpets, rugs or mats.

## PART VII.

SECTION I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall be without prejudice to Workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

## PART VIII.

The Trade Board further give notice that the above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages for Male and Female Workers, as specified in Part I. and Section I. of Part II. of this Schedule, are in substitution for the proposed minimum rates of wages set out in the Notices J (7), and J (9) issued by the Trade Board, dated the 15th January, 1921, and 9th April, 1921, respectively, which are hereby withdrawn.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 14th May, 1921. Such Objections should be in writing, and signed by the person making same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Jute Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4. It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.
