“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as

are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Schedule III of Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to approve a new constitution for the Schoolmaster Branch, and regulations are laid down in Section XI of that Schedule, and in Schedule V, Section IX, Clause X of the aforesaid Order in Council for the retired pay or gratuities to be granted to Schoolmasters, R.N., on retirement:

“And whereas the recommendations embodying these regulations which were submitted for Your Majesty's approval were based on a misconception of the decisions arrived at by Your Majesty's Government regarding the retirement of Officers of the Royal Navy in their application to the Schoolmaster Branch:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by

Your Order in Council, to sanction the cancellation of Section XI of the regulations contained in Schedule III and of Clause X in Schedule V, Section IX of Order in Council of the 22nd January, 1920, and to approve, with effect from the 1st April, 1919, the regulations contained in the attached Schedule which correctly set forth the intentions of Your Majesty's Government with regard to the retired pay and gratuities to be allowed to the Schoolmaster Branch.

" SCHEDULE.

" REGULATIONS REGARDING THE RETIRED PAY OF SCHOOLMASTERS, R.N.

" 1. The existing provision under which Schoolmasters of Warrant Rank may be allowed to retire at any age, at the discretion of the Admiralty, to be retained.

" *Retirement with Retired Pay.*

" 2.—(A) Schoolmasters (Old System—entered as ratings) to be granted retired pay according to their ranks on the scale for Commissioned Officers from Warrant rank and Warrant Officers, except when retired below the age of 40 at their own request or for inefficiency.

" (B) Schoolmasters (New System—entered in Warrant rank) to be granted retired pay according to their ranks on the scale for Commissioned Officers from Warrant rank and War-

rant Officers except when retired below the age of 40 at their own request or for inefficiency, or when invalided below that age and before promotion to Commissioned rank.

" 3. Schoolmasters (New System) if invalided before attaining the age of 40 years and before attaining Commissioned rank, to be granted retired pay—

(a) of £10 for each year's seniority up to 10 years;

(b) of £120 if they have attained 10, but not 11, years' seniority; and

(c) of £120 with an increment of £5 for each year's seniority in excess of 10, if they have attained 11 or more years' seniority.

" 4. Time served as Schoolmaster Candidate not to reckon.

" *Retirement with Gratuity.*

" 5.—(A) Schoolmasters (Old and New System) who may be allowed to retire below the age of 40 years to receive a gratuity according to scale A in the following table.

" (B) Schoolmasters (Old and New System) who are found to be inefficient or unworthy of further employment may be retired below the age of 40 years, at the discretion of the Admiralty, with a gratuity according to scale B in the following table:—

	A.	B.
(1) With less than five years' seniority in Warrant rank.	Nil.	Nil.
(2) With more than five, but less than ten, years from date of promotion to Warrant rank.	A gratuity of £20 for each completed year of such service.	A gratuity of £10 for each completed year of such service.
(3) With more than ten, but less than 15, years from date of promotion to Warrant rank.	A gratuity of £30 for each completed year of such service.	A gratuity of £15 for each completed year of such service.
(4) With more than 15 years from date of promotion to Warrant rank.	A gratuity of £40 for each completed year of such service.	A gratuity of £20 for each completed year of such service.

N.B.—In the case of Schoolmasters (New System) the date of advancement to Probationary Schoolmaster counts for this purpose as the date of promotion to Warrant rank.

" 6. The cancellation of Section XI of the regulations contained in Schedule III of Order in Council of the 22nd January, 1920, to be without prejudice to the validity of any award which may have been made thereunder prior to the 1st April, 1919.

" 7. The foregoing provisions not to prejudice or affect the powers of the Admiralty under Order in Council of the 13th May, 1901, or any

subsequent Order in Council amending that Order."

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time by Order in Council to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, to make rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried or used, and the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by His Majesty's vessels and other vessels navigating the waters of the Port and of the approaches thereto:

And whereas Scapa Flow is a "Dockyard Port" within the meaning of the said Act:

And whereas it appears expedient to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service that the limits of the Dockyard Port of Scapa Flow should be defined:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, and so far as regards the rule contained in the Second Schedule hereto, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PRELIMINARY.

1. This Order (which term shall include the Schedules hereto) shall take effect from one calendar month from the date hereof.

2. The terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as in the said Dockyard Ports Regulation Act.

DESCRIPTION OF LIMITS.

Dockyard Port of Scapa Flow.

3. For the purposes of the said Act and of this Order the term "Dockyard Port of Scapa Flow" shall mean all the waters, bays, creeks, lakes and pools, so far as the tide flows, lying between the following limits:—

On the West at Hoy Sound a line running west (true), from Black Craig on the Mainland (Hoy Sound) until it meets the meridian drawn north (true) from the Kame of Hoy.

On the East a line drawn east (true), from Grim Ness Point (South Ronaldshay), imme-

diately east (true) of the 108 foot summit of the Hill at Grim Ness, until it meets the meridian drawn south (true) from Rose Ness lighthouse (mainland).

On the South a line drawn at Brims Ness (Hoy) east (true) until it meets the west shore of South Ronaldshay Island near Hoston Head.

DELINEATION OF LIMITS.

4. On the chart accompanying this Order are marked all the limits referred to therein.

PENALTIES.

5. Any infringement of the regulations contained in the First Schedule appended hereto shall render the person infringing liable to the penalty prescribed in clause 13 of the said Schedule.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES.

6. Nothing in this Order shall affect the authority of the Stromness Harbour Commissioners or of the Orkney Harbour Commissioners under the respective Acts of Parliament relative thereto, but the regulations and rules contained in this Order shall be observed in the areas under the management of the above-mentioned authorities so far as they relate to those areas.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE DOCKYARD PORT OF SCAPA FLOW AND OF HIS MAJESTY'S PROPERTY THEREIN, AND FOR ANCHORING, BERTHING, MOORING AND BREAMING IN THAT PORT.

1. All merchant or other private vessels shall be subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master.

2. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence in writing from the King's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of the forts, or to any Government moorings, buoys, breakwaters, jetties, piles or vessels in the Dockyard Port.

3. Moorings for His Majesty's Ships, mark buoys, and other aids to navigation, and such other buoys as may be required for any purpose in connection with naval operations, may be placed by the King's Harbour Master in such positions as he may from time to time consider the requirements of His Majesty's Service demand.

4. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored or moored within seventy-five fathoms from the centre of any Government moorings, nor in such a position as to be liable to foul any of His Majesty's Ships at those moorings.

5. No person shall lay moorings for private vessels in the Dockyard Port without the permission in writing of the King's Harbour Master, and all such moorings shall be in such positions as the King's Harbour Master shall deem fit, and shall be forthwith removed on the requisition of the King's Harbour Master to that effect.

6. If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any

Government moorings, or any electric cables, or moorings of buoys, the master, or other person having the charge or command of such vessel, shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice thereof to the King's Harbour Master, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings or cables without doing damage to the same.

7. No vessel shall anchor on the line of any electric cable laid down in the Dockyard Port, when such line is indicated by whitewashed posts, or other discernible marks erected on shore, and a warning has been conveyed to mariners by notice issued by the Admiralty and published in the Edinburgh Gazette.

8. No boats are to approach within 100 feet of any Government Establishment, afloat or ashore, unless proceeding to or from the same on duty or with permission from the King's Harbour Master, and no fishing from boats shall be carried on within the same distance from any Government Establishment.

9. No merchant or other private vessel shall make fast to, or lie at, any of the buoys marking the channels or shoals in the Dockyard Port.

10. Merchant and other private vessels moored, anchored, or placed within the Dockyard Port shall, when directed to do so by the King's Harbour Master, remove to such position as he shall direct. If from having no crew on board or from any other cause the vessel does not remove as directed, the King's Harbour Master may remove the said vessel and recover the expense incurred in so doing from her owner.

11. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in any part of the Harbour without the written permission of the King's Harbour Master.

12. Whenever it may be necessary for mining or gunnery operations or experiments, dredging operations, or other Naval purposes, to reserve any area for such operations or purposes, the area will be marked by buoys coloured green and white, or by posts coloured red: and after 21 days' warning notice has been issued by the Admiralty, and published in the Edinburgh Gazette, prohibiting within the area so marked either trawling, or anchoring and kedging, or trawling, anchoring and kedging, or passing through the said area, no vessel shall act in contravention of the said warning notice, unless compelled to do so by stress of weather, or to avoid accident; nor, when such area is uncovered or nearly uncovered at low water, shall any person pass through it, or remain in it, unless by permission of, and under such arrangements as may from time to time be made by, the officer in charge of such operations.

PENALTIES.

13. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the said regulations in this Schedule so far as they relate to his vessel, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the said regulations, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of ten pounds.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

SIGNALS FOR DREDGERS.

A dredger when at work or in position for working shall carry the following lights and signals, viz.:—

Lights between Sunset and Sunrise.

(a) *Forward*.—In the forward part of the dredger at a height of not less than 20 and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, a white light in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

(b) *Amidships*.—Three such white lights placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet apart, at right angles to the keel and with the apex uppermost the base of the triangle to be at least 10 feet higher than the forward light and to be also higher than and clear of the framework, funnels, or other erection upon the dredger. If so moored or working as to make it necessary to prohibit the passage of vessels on one or both sides, a red light or lights in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile, is, or are, to be substituted for the lower light or lights of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

(c) *Aft*.—One such white light at or near the stern of the dredger and at such a height that it shall not be less than 15 feet lower than the forward light.

Signals between Sunrise and Sunset.

Amidships.—Three black balls of not less than 2 feet in diameter placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet apart, at right angles to the keel, with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be higher than and clear of the framework, funnels or any other erection upon the dredger. If so moored or working so as to make it necessary to prohibit passage on one or both sides, a red flag or flags at least 5 feet in the hoist is, or are, to be substituted for the lower ball or balls of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

Signal in Fog.

In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms a dredger at work or in position for working shall at intervals of not more than one minute sound a gong rapidly for about 5 seconds.

PENALTIES.

Note.—The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which the rule in this Schedule relates must observe and cause to be observed the provisions of this rule as far as they relate to his vessel, and any such master by his wilful default infringing or causing any infringement of any of the provisions of this rule is guilty of a misdemeanour.

"and where, under the provisions contained in the said Annex, the creditor has notified an enemy debt as due to him and the debt so notified has been admitted or found due to that creditor under the said provisions, payment by the Clearing Office of the sum credited to it in respect of that debt shall be made only to the creditor by or on whose behalf the debt was so notified, except that in the event of the death, bankruptcy, liquidation, or lunacy of the said creditor, payment by the Clearing Office shall be made to the person entitled by law to stand in his place."

2. In paragraph (xviii) of Article one of the principal Order, as so amended as aforesaid, for the words "sixteen months" there shall be substituted the words "nineteen months."

3. This Order may be cited as the Treaty of Peace (Amendment) (No. 2) Order, 1921, and this Order shall be included amongst the Orders which may be cited together as the Treaty of Peace Orders, 1919 to 1921.

WHEREAS by sub-sections (3) and (4) of Section 3 of the Ministry of Health Act, 1919, it is provided that His Majesty may by Order in Council transfer from the Minister of Health to any other Government Department any of the powers and duties of the Minister which appear to His Majesty not to relate to matters affecting or incidental to the health of the people, and may by Order in Council make such incidental, consequential and supplemental provisions as may be necessary or expedient for the purposes of giving full effect to such transfer:

And whereas the Minister of Health as successor to the Local Government Board exercises and performs under divers statutes certain powers and duties relating to the registration of electors and the conduct of elections, which appear to His Majesty not to affect or be incidental to the health of the people, and it is expedient that the said powers and duties should be transferred to the Secretary of State:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Ministry of Health (Registration and Elections, Transfer of Powers) Order, 1921.

(2) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

2.—(1) As from the date of this Order, the powers and duties of the Minister of Health, as successor to the Local Government Board, set out in the Schedule to this Order, shall be transferred to the Secretary of State, and the enactments specified in the first column of the said Schedule shall be read as though the Secretary of State were substituted for the Local Government Board in those enactments:

(2) For the purposes of paragraphs (d) and (e) of sub-section (1) of Section 57 of the Local Government Act, 1888, of Section 71 of the Local Government Act, 1894 (but only so far as regards Orders made by a county council relating to elections), and of sub-section (3) of Section 31 of, and paragraph (27) of the First Schedule to the Representation of the People Act, 1918, the Secretary of State shall

be substituted for the Local Government Board in those Sections, sub-sections or paragraphs, as the same may be.

(3) References to the Secretary of State shall be substituted for references to the Local Government Board or to the Minister of Health, as the case may be, in the Representation of the People Order, as amended by any subsequent Order, and in any other Order, Regulations or Rules made by the Local Government Board or by the Minister of Health in pursuance of the Representation of

the People Act, 1918, as amended by any subsequent Act, or of any of the powers or duties hereby transferred to the Secretary of State.

3. Any duties heretofore assigned to the Registrar-General by the Minister of Health in relation to any of the powers and duties of the Minister hereby transferred to the Secretary of State shall, as from the date of this Order, be performed by the Registrar-General under the control and direction of the Secretary of State.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Ministry of Health (Factories and Workshops Transfer of Powers) Order, 1921.

(2) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

2.—(1) On and after the date of this Order, the powers and duties of the Secretary of State under the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, so far as they relate to the supervision and enforcement of the provisions of the Sections of that Act set out in the Schedule to this Order, shall be transferred to the Minister of Health.

(2) References to inspectors in the said Act shall, so far as relates to powers and duties conferred and imposed on inspectors with reference to the provisions of the Sections set out in the said Schedule, be deemed to be references to inspectors appointed by the Minister of Health.

3. References to the Minister of Health shall be substituted for references to the Secretary of State in sub-section (5) of Section 110 of the said Act, and in Section 120 of the said Act so far as that Section relates to proceedings for the enforcement of any of the provisions of the Sections set out in the said Schedule.

WHEREAS by the Representation of the People Acts, 1918 to 1920, power is conferred on His Majesty to make provision for various matters by Order in Council:

And whereas by the Representation of the People Order His Majesty was pleased by Order in Council to make provision for various matters under those Acts:

And whereas by section 13 (2) of the Representation of the People Act, 1918 (in this Act referred to as "the Act"), the rules contained in the First Schedule to that Act may be altered by Order in Council:

And whereas by section 40 (2) of the Act, any Order in Council made thereunder may be revoked or varied as occasion requires by any subsequent Order in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon him by those Acts and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. The following Rule shall be inserted after Rule 13 of the Representation of the People Order:—

"13A. The following paragraph shall be added to Rule 23 of the First Schedule to the Act (which provides for the correction of lists):—

"The registration officer shall expunge the name of any naval or military voter who has, under sub-section (1) of section five of this Act, taken steps to prevent his being registered in the constituency so as to enable him to be registered in respect of an actual residence qualification in another constituency."

2. The following Rule shall be substituted for Rule 45 of the Representation of the People Order:—

“45. As respects constituencies in Great Britain—

(a) The Spring Register for 1921 shall remain in force unless otherwise ordered until the 15th day of October, 1921, and shall be kept published until the coming into force of the next succeeding register;

(b) The Autumn Register for 1921 shall come into force on the 15th day of October, 1921, and shall remain in force unless otherwise ordered until the 15th day of

April, 1922, and in connection with that register the registration dates shall be, as respects England and Wales, the dates specified in the third Column, and as respects Scotland, the dates specified in the fourth column, of Part I of Schedule X to this Order.”

3. In Rule 47 of the Representation of the People Order the words “the Autumn Register, 1921,” shall be substituted for the words “the Spring Register, 1921.”

4. The following Schedule shall be substituted for Schedule X to the Representation of the People Order:—

WHEREAS it is provided by section six of the *Juries Act, 1918*, that His Majesty may by Order in Council modify in such manner as he thinks advisable for the purpose of avoiding unnecessary expense and labour any of the provisions of the *Juries Act, 1825*, and the *Juries Act, 1862*, as to the preparation of the lists of men qualified and liable to serve as jurors, so as to provide that any such list may be prepared by altering or supplementing the last previous list and as to the place and manner of the publication thereof; and that any Order in Council made under the said section may be varied or revoked by any subsequent Order so made:

And whereas it is provided by section one of the *Sex Disqualification (Removal) Act, 1919*, that a person shall not be exempted by sex or marriage from the liability to serve as a juror:

And whereas His Majesty by the *Jury List Order, 1920*, made provision with respect to the preparation and publication of jury lists in the year 1920:

And whereas it is now desirable to make similar provision for the present year:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The provisions of this Order shall have effect with respect to the preparation and publication of jury lists in the year 1921.

2. In this Order the expression "the existing list" means the list, in whatever manner prepared, in force for the year 1921.

3. The overseers in making out the jury list for their respective parishes and townships may, as they think best, in all the circumstances of the case, either proceed as directed by section eight of the *Juries Act, 1825*, or proceed in the manner following, that is to say:—

The overseers may take copies of the existing list and strike out therefrom the names of all such persons appearing therein as are dead or have removed from the parish or township or have attained the age of sixty-five years or are otherwise not qualified and liable to be included in the list for the parish or township, and shall then proceed to make out a fresh supplemental list in which shall be included the names of all persons qualified and liable to be included in the jury list for the parish or township whose names are not included in the existing list.

The overseers shall make out any such fresh list in the same form as is prescribed with respect to jury lists by section eight of the *Juries Act, 1825*, as amended by any subsequent enactment.

4. If the overseers proceed by making out a supplemental list the existing list revised as aforesaid and the fresh supplemental list made out as aforesaid shall be read together as if the names in the fresh supplemental list were inserted in proper alphabetical order in their proper places in the existing list revised as aforesaid, and shall together constitute the jury list for the parish or township.

5. The overseers, instead of fixing a copy

of the jury list upon the principal door of every church, chapel and other public place of religious worship in manner required by section nine of the *Juries Act, 1825*, shall before the first Sunday in September deposit or exhibit the jury list at such place in the parish as they think most suitable for the purpose of enabling persons desirous of so doing to inspect the same, and shall on the first three Sundays in the month of September fix upon the principal door of every church, chapel or other public place of religious worship within the parish or township a notice stating that the jury list has been made out and specifying the place at which the list is deposited or exhibited in accordance with the provisions of this Order, and attention shall be called in the notice to the fact that liability for jury service has been extended by section five of the *Juries Act, 1918*, to persons between the ages of sixty and sixty-five.

6. Every inhabitant of the parish or township shall at any time during the three weeks next after the first Sunday in September be entitled to inspect the jury list free of charge.

7. The precept to be issued under section four of the *Juries Act, 1862*, may be in the form set out in the Schedule to this Order, or as near thereto as may be, instead of in the form set out in the Schedule to that Act.

8. Any reference to the jury list, or to the making of the jury list, in the *Juries Act, 1825*, or the *Juries Act, 1862*, shall be construed as a reference to the jury list as made, and the making of the jury list, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, and the provisions of sections forty-five and forty-six of the *Juries Act, 1825*, which relate respectively to penalties on overseers and to penalties on clerks of the peace and others for neglect of duty under that Act shall apply to refusal or neglect to comply with the provisions of this Order as they apply to refusal or neglect to comply with requirements of that Act.

9. This Order may be cited as the *Jury List Order, 1921*.

PRECEPT FOR RETURNING LIST OF JURORS.

To the overseers of the poor of the parish [or township] of in the County of

You are hereby required to make out before the first day of September next and in manner hereinafter directed a true list containing the names of all persons, being subjects of the King or aliens having been domiciled in England or Wales for ten years or upwards, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty-five residing within your parish [or township] qualified to serve upon juries; that is to say, of every person who has in his or her own name or in trust for him or her, a clear income of ten pounds by the year in lands or tenements, whether freehold, copyhold or customary tenure, or of ancient demesne, situate in the said county, or in rents issuing out of any such lands or tenements, or in such lands, tenements, and rents taken together, in fee simple or fee tail, or for his or her own life, or for the life of any other person, and also of every such person who has a clear income of twenty pounds by the year in lands or tenements situ-

ate in the said county, held by lease for the absolute term of twenty-one years, or some longer term or for any term of years determinable on any life or lives and also of every such person who is a householder in your parish [or township], and is rated or assessed to the poor rate or to the inhabited house duty on a value of not less than twenty pounds [if in Middlesex thirty pounds].

You are required to make out the said list in one of the two following ways, either—

(a) You shall make out the said list in alphabetical order and write the Christian name and surname of every person at full length and the place of abode, title, quality, calling or business, and the nature of qualification of that person, in the manner prescribed by the Juries Act, 1825;

or

(b) You shall take a copy of the jury list for the year nineteen hundred and twenty-one as made out under the Jury List Order, 1920, (hereinafter referred to as "the existing list"), and shall strike out therefrom the names of all such persons appearing therein as are dead, or have removed from your parish [or township] or have attained the age of sixty-five years or are otherwise not qualified and liable to be included in the list for your parish [or township] and you shall also make such corrections or alterations therein as may be necessary and proper in respect of the place of abode, title, quality, calling or business, and the nature of the qualification of any person whose name remains therein, and you shall next proceed to make out a supplemental list in which shall be included the names of all persons qualified and liable to be included in the jury list for your parish [or township] whose names are not included in the existing list.

If you proceed by making out a supplemental list you shall do so in alphabetical order and shall write at full length the Christian name and surname of every person whose name is to be included therein, and the place of abode, title, quality, calling or business, and the nature of the qualification of that person in the manner prescribed by the Juries Act, 1825. You shall append to the existing list revised as aforesaid and to the supplemental list a note stating that the existing list as revised and the supplemental list are to be read together as if the names in the supplemental list were inserted in proper alphabetical order in their proper places in the existing list, and you shall insert at the foot of each sheet in the existing list in which any names in the supplemental list are to be so treated as being inserted the following note:—"For further names, see the supplemental list annexed hereto."

You are also required to specify in the list which of the persons named therein are, in your judgment, qualified as special jurors and to specify in every case the nature of the qualification and the occupation and the rating or assessment of every such person.

Every person is qualified and liable to serve as a special juror who is, an esquire, or a person of higher degree, or a banker or merchant, or who occupies a private dwelling-house rated or assessed to the poor rate or the inhabited house duty on a value of not less than one hundred pounds in a town containing, according

to the last census, 20,000 inhabitants and upwards, or rated or assessed to the poor rate or to the inhabited house duty on a value of not less than fifty pounds elsewhere than in such a town, or who occupies premises other than a farm rated or assessed as aforesaid on a value of not less than one hundred pounds or a farm rated or assessed as aforesaid on a value of not less than three hundred pounds.

If you have not a sufficient number of forms you must apply to me for more; and in order to assist you in making out the list you are to refer to the poor rate, and you may, if you think proper, apply to any collector or assessor of taxes, or any other officer who has the custody of any house tax, land tax, or other tax assessment for your parish [or township], and take from thence the names of persons qualified.

In the case of a married woman the word "married," in the case of a widow the word "widow," and in the case of an unmarried woman the word "spinster" shall be inserted in brackets after her name.

In making out the list you are to omit the names of any of the following persons:—

Peers.

Members of Parliament.

Judges

Clergymen

Roman Catholic Priests.

Ministers of any congregation of Protestant Dissenters and of Jews whose place of meeting is duly registered, provided they follow no secular occupation except that of a schoolmaster.

Barristers-at-law, certificated conveyancers, and special pleaders if actually practising.

Solicitors and proctors, if actually practising and having taken out their annual certificates, and their managing clerks, and notaries public in actual practice.

Officers of the Supreme Court of Judicature and clerks of the peace or their deputies, if actually exercising the duties of their respective offices.

Magistrates of the Metropolitan Police Courts, their clerks, ushers, doorkeepers, and messengers.

Coroners.

Goalers and keepers of houses of correction and all subordinate officers of the same.

Keepers in public lunatic asylums.

Members and licentiates of the Royal College of Physicians in London, if actually practising as physicians.

Members of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, if actually practising as surgeons.

Apothecaries certificated by the Court of Examiners of the Apothecaries Company and all registered medical practitioners and pharmaceutical chemists, if actually practising as apothecaries, medical practitioners, or pharmaceutical chemists, respectively.

Officers of the Navy, Army and Air Force, while on full pay.

Soldiers of the Regular Army.

Men of the Regular Air Force.

Officers and men of the Territorial Force.

The members of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board and of the Port of London Authority.

The masters, wardens and brethren of the corporation of Trinity House of Deptford Strand.

Pilots licensed by the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, Kingston-upon-Hull, or Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and all masters of vessels in the buoy and light service employed by either of those corporations, and all pilots licensed under any Act of Parliament or charter for the regulation of pilots.

The household servants of His Majesty.
Officers of the Post Office.

Commissioners of Customs and Excise and officers, clerks, or other persons acting in the management and collection of the Customs and Excise.

Commissioners of Inland Revenue and officers or persons appointed by the Commissioners of Inland Revenue or employed by them or under their authority, or direction in any way relating to the duties of Inland Revenue.

General and additional Commissioners of Income Tax holding certificates under the Income Tax Act, 1842.

Sheriffs' officers and servants.

High constables.

Officers of the rural and metropolitan police.

Officers of the House of Lords and Commons.

Dentists registered under the Dentists Act of 1878 or any enactment amending the same.

Any other persons exempt by virtue of any Act of Parliament.

You are to note that under the provisions of section five of the Juries Act, 1918, persons between the ages of sixty and sixty-five are qualified and liable for jury service, and you shall therefore not strike out of the existing lists the name of any person by reason only that he has since the date on which those lists were made attained the age of sixty years, and you shall take care to include in the new list or in the supplemental list (as the case may be) the names of all persons between the ages of sixty and sixty-five, being persons otherwise qualified and liable to be included in the jury list and whose names are not included in the existing lists.

When you have made out such list or such supplemental list you are authorized to order a sufficient number of copies thereof to be printed, the expense of which printing will be allowed you by the parish [or township], except that if you have not made a new list but have made a supplemental list only you are not authorized to order such supplemental list to be printed unless it contains thirty names or upwards.

You are next required before the first Sunday in September to deposit or exhibit a copy of the new list or, if you have not made a new list, then copies of the existing list revised as aforesaid and signed by you with a copy of the supplemental list appended thereto at such place within your parish [or township] as you shall think most suitable for the purpose of enabling persons desirous of so doing to inspect the same, and you shall also on the first three Sundays in September fix upon the principal door of every church, chapel, or other public place of religious worship within your parish [or township] a notice to the following effect, inserting in the first paragraph the time and place of which you will be previously informed by the Clerk to the Justices:—

“Take notice that the jury list for the parish [or township] of _____ has

been made out and is deposited or exhibited at _____ and that all objections to the list will be heard at the Petty Sessions holden on the _____ day of September next, at the hour of _____ at _____

“The attention of all persons concerned is called to the fact that liability for jury service has been extended by section five of the Juries Act, 1918, to persons between the ages of sixty and sixty-five, and the names of all such persons being otherwise qualified and liable for jury service have been included in the said list.”

You must allow any inhabitant of your parish [or township] at any time during the three weeks next after the first Sunday in September next to inspect the list so deposited or exhibited as aforesaid free of charge; and you must also produce the said list at the Petty Sessions and there answer all such questions as shall be put to you by His Majesty's Justices of the Peace there present touching the list: and these several matters you are in nowise to omit, upon the peril that may ensue.

WHEREAS by the Children Act, 1908, it was, amongst other things, enacted that His Majesty may by Order in Council under the Metropolitan Police Courts Acts, 1839 and 1840, provide for the establishment of one or more separate Juvenile Courts for the Metropolitan Police Court District, and for assigning as a division to each such Court such portion of that district as may be specified in the Order:

And whereas by the Metropolitan Police Courts Acts, 1839 and 1840, it was, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, with the advice of His Privy Council, to alter the number of Magistrates appointed to any of the Police Courts theretofore established, and to order that a Police Magistrate or Magistrates shall attend regularly at any Police Court or Courts thereafter to be established, either daily or on such days or times as His Majesty, by the advice aforesaid, shall order:

And whereas by divers Orders in Council made under the said Acts such Police Court Divisions as to His Majesty from time to time has seemed fit have been constituted within the Metropolitan Police District and the extent thereof defined respectively, and such divisions have been assigned to the Police Courts continued or established under the said Acts:

And whereas by the Juvenile Courts (Metropolis) Act, 1920, it was, amongst other things, enacted that an Order in Council made under the Children Act, 1908, for the establishment of Juvenile Courts for the Metropolitan Police Court District may, notwithstanding anything in the Metropolitan Police Courts Act, 1840, provide for such Courts being held elsewhere than in the buildings used as Metropolitan Police Courts, and for every such Court being

constituted of a Police Magistrate nominated by the Secretary of State, and two Justices of the Peace for the County of London, of whom one shall be a woman, and both of whom shall be chosen from amongst a panel of such Justices nominated for the purpose by the Secretary of State:

His Majesty is pleased, therefore, with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that

(1) Juvenile Courts shall be established at the buildings mentioned in the first column of the schedule attached to this Order; and divisions shall be assigned to them as described in the second column of the said schedule.

(2) The said Juvenile Courts shall be held on the days and at the hours specified in the third column of the said schedule or on such other days and at such other hours as may from time to time be approved by a Secretary of State: provided that a Juvenile Court which would in pursuance of the foregoing provision have been held on Christmas Day, Good Friday or a day appointed for a public fast or thanksgiving, may be held on the preceding day, or if the preceding day is a Sunday, on the day following.

(3) Each Court shall be constituted of a Police Magistrate nominated by the Secretary of State and two Justices of the Peace for the

County of London, of whom one shall be a woman, and both of whom shall be chosen from amongst a panel of such Justices nominated for the purpose by the Secretary of State.

Provided that a Police Magistrate may sit alone in any case where he considers that it would be impracticable for the court to be constituted in manner aforesaid, or that it would be inexpedient in the interests of justice to adjourn the business of the court.

(4) The Justices who are to sit at the several sittings of the Courts aforesaid shall be chosen by the panel, or, if necessary, by the Police Magistrate, and in case of the absence of the Police Magistrate through illness, leave or other cause, his place shall be taken by another Police Magistrate, or by a barrister-at-law in practice for at least seven years appointed or a Justice of the Peace approved by the Secretary of State.

(5) The Orders made on the 12th day of August, 1913, and the 13th day of April, 1918, so far as they relate to the Juvenile Courts for the Bow Street, Marlborough Street, Westminster, Old Street, Thames, North London, Lambeth, and the South-Western Police Court divisions are hereby revoked.

(6) This Order shall come into operation on the 4th day of July, 1921.

“BOROUGH OF MACCLESFIELD.

“Scheme for the alteration of Ward Boundaries made in pursuance of Section 30 of the

"The said portion of the No. 3 South West Ward now by this Scheme transferred to and made part of the No. 2 North West Ward shall comprise so much of the area of No. 3 South West Ward as originally assigned in the said Order in Council in Article II. hereof mentioned, as is contained within a line commencing at the point at which the No. 2 North West Ward Boundary in the centre of Chester Road meets the centre of Ivy Road, thence, Southward along the centre of Ivy Road for a distance of 503 yards to a Point opposite the South garden wall of Ivy House; thence, Westward following the said South garden wall and Boundary Fence adjoining Ivy House between garden Numbered 550 and Field Numbered 547 for a distance of 454 yards to the Point where the said Fence meets the Fence of Field Numbered 553 on the 25-inch Ordnance Survey Map, Edition 1909; thence, Southward following the Fence between Fields Numbered 553 and 552 on the said Ordnance Map for a distance of 198 yards to the Boundary of the Borough between Fields Numbered 554 and 543 on the said Ordnance Map; thence, Westward following the Boundary of the Borough to the Point at which the same crosses the Chelford Road; thence, Eastward along the centre of Chelford Road to the Point at which the same meets Chester Road; thence, along the centre of Chester Road to the Point first hereinbefore described, and which said added area is edged dark blue on the 6-inch Ordnance Survey Map, 1911 Edition annexed hereto.

"No. 3 South West Ward shall comprise that part of the area of the Borough which formed the No. 3 South West Ward as originally assigned and described in the said Order in Council in Article II. hereof mentioned less that portion of the said area which by this Scheme is transferred to and now forms part of the adjoining No. 2 North West Ward, the said area constituting the new No. 3 South West Ward being indicated in pink on the said map annexed hereto, the boundary of the said Ward being clearly set forth thereon.

"The said Map is marked 'Map of the Wards of the Borough of Macclesfield as altered 1921' and is signed by me as constituting an integral part of this Scheme and in the event of any discrepancy between the Map and the description herein, the Map shall prevail.

(b) In the application of the provisions of Article 3 of the Principal Order to works of which the country of origin is Czecho-Slovakia the date of this Order shall be substituted for the Commencement of the Act and for the Commencement of the Principal Order.

(c) In the application to such works of Sections 1 (2) (d) and 19 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the Commencement of the Act in Section 19 (7) and 19 (8) wherever that expression occurs, and the 22nd day of February, 1921, for the passing of the Act.

(d) In the application to such works of the provisions of Section 24 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the Commencement of the Act wherever that expression occurs in Sub-section (1) (a) and for the 26th July, 1910, in Sub-section (1) (b).

(e) In the application of the Copyright Act, 1911, to existing works, nothing in this Order shall derogate from any rights in literary or artistic works restored in favour of nationals of Czecho-Slovakia by virtue of Article 258 of the Treaty of Peace between the Allied and Associated Powers and Austria signed at Saint Germain-en-Laye, September 10th, 1919.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the 31st day of December, 1886, and published in the London Gazette on the 7th day of the following month, part of the New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Bingley, in the said County of York, and at that time in the said Diocese of Ripon, but now in the said Diocese of Bradford, was assigned as a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Michael and All Angels, situate at Cottingley, and the said District Chapelry was

named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley':

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh in Council, bearing date the 5th day of March, 1910, and published in the London Gazette on the 11th day of the same month, part of the said District Parish of Shipley cum Heaton, was assigned as a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Peter, situate at Shipley, and the said District Chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Shipley':

"And whereas the said District Chapelry of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, the said District Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley, and the said District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Shipley, have become New Parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, by the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, and by the above-mentioned Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94:

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, the said New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley, and the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Shipley, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Arthur, Bishop of Bradford (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or Representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, the said New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley, and the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Shipley, shall be altered so that all those portions of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Shipley, and of the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon coloured pink, shall be dis severed from such New Parishes, and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The Schedule to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley, in the County of York and in the Diocese of Bradford, being:—

"I. All that portion of the New Parish of Saint Peter, Shipley, in the said County and

Diocese, which is bounded upon the south-east by the New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, in the said County and Diocese, upon the north-west by the said New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley, from the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Shipley, at a point in the middle of the stream which flows past the eastern side of the Church of Saint Michael and All Angels, Cottingley, and situate to the north of the footpath leading from New Close to the said Church and at a distance of 100 yards precisely measured in a straight line from the middle of the Old Bingley Road, and extending thence first south-eastward then eastward and then again south-eastward in a line parallel with and at a distance of 100 yards from the middle of the said road for a distance of 55 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Shipley, from the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton.

"II. And also all that portion of the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, which is bounded upon the south-west by the New Parish of Saint Peter, Allerton, upon the west by the District Parish of Wilsden cum Allerton, both in the said County and Diocese, upon the north by the above described portion of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Shipley, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Shipley, from the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, crosses the middle of Stonley Ridge Road, and extending thence first south-westward and then southward along the middle of the said road for a distance of 21 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Haworth Road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Haworth Road for a distance of 4 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the roadway leading to the Chellow Heights Reservoir, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said roadway for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to the gate at the entrance to the said reservoir, and extending thence in a straight line due south-west for a distance of 28½ chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, from the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Allerton."

And whereas the said Scheme or Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law imme-

diately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Bradford.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called the 'said Benefice') of Exhall (near Coventry), in the County of Warwick and in the Diocese of Coventry:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Exhall is vested for an estate in fee simple free from incumbrances in the Right Reverend Huyshe Wolcott, now Bishop of Coventry, in his private capacity:

"And whereas the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Coventry, is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Exhall, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said Diocese of Coventry:

"And whereas the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Coventry, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned in token of such his desire, and also in token of his willingness as such Bishop to accept such transfer, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese, which, by the Acts in the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts recited, or by some or one of them is made necessary:

to make better provision for the cure of souls in the Parish or District, in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Exhall:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Coventry (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of, and presentation to, the said Benefice of Exhall now vested in him, the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Coventry, in his private capacity, as aforesaid, shall be transferred to himself the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Coventry, and his successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Coventry, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Coventry.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether Extra-Parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Ham-

let, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a Separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, Parochial or Extra-Parochial, so as to form a Separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend William, Lord Bishop of Exeter, hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 18th day of August, 1920, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, William, Bishop of Exeter, in pursuance of the Twenty-sixth Section of the Pluralities Act, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"There is in the County of Devon and Diocese of Exeter the Benefice or Vicarage of Milton Abbot, the Parish whereof contains a population of Five hundred or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church of Milton Abbot for Three hundred and ninety persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of Milton Abbot is Four hundred and forty-four pounds or thereabouts.

"There is also in the same County and Diocese the Benefice or Vicarage of Brentor, the Parish whereof contains a population of Five hundred or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church of Brentor for Two hundred and fifty persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of Brentor is Two hundred and ninety-two pounds or thereabouts.

"There is also in the same County and Diocese the Benefice or Vicarage of Marystowe, the Parish whereof contains a population of Six hundred and forty-one or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Churches of Marystowe for Three hundred and eighty persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of

Marystowe is Three hundred and sixty pounds or thereabouts.

"That it appears to me and I do hereby represent to your Grace that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, a small portion of the Parish of Milton Abbot (the boundaries of which are more particularly described in the Scheme annexed to this Representation and also delineated on the Ordnance Map annexed thereto and therein edged with Green) may be advantageously separated therefrom and be annexed to the said Parish of Brentor to which it is contiguous and also a small portion of the said Parish of Milton Abbot (the boundaries of which are more particularly described in the Scheme annexed to this Representation and also delineated on the said Ordnance Map annexed thereto and therein edged with Yellow) may be advantageously separated therefrom and be annexed to the said Parish of Marystowe to which it is contiguous.

"The Patron of the Benefice of Milton Abbot is His Grace the Most Noble Herbrand The Duke of Bedford, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter and the Reverend Douglas William Henry is the Incumbent thereof.

"The Patron of the Benefice of Brentor is The Right Reverend William, by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Exeter, and the Reverend Alfred Rand Overy Apps is the Incumbent thereof.

"The Patrons of the Benefice of Marystowe are Onera Mary Georgiana Tremayne and Harriet Maude Tremayne, of Sydenham Lew Down in the County of Devon, Spinsters, and The Venerable Archdeacon Ernest Frederick Newman is the Incumbent thereof.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the Twenty-sixth Section of the Pluralities Act, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, I, the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a Scheme in writing annexed to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do hereby submit the same together with the consents in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents of the said Benefices to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with such Scheme you may certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council.

"Provided always that the said Scheme and the payment of the yearly sums therein specified shall only become operative from the date when an Order in Council is sealed authorizing the Union of the said Benefice of Milton Abbot with the adjoining Benefice of Dunterton in our Diocese for which a Representation to His Majesty in Council is now pending."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate from the said Parish of Milton Abbot and annex to the said Parish of Brentor all that part of the Parish of Milton Abbot the boundaries of which are

delineated on the Ordnance Map hereto annexed and edged with green.

"That the Incumbent of the Benefice of Brentor shall have sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within such portion so to be separated from Milton Abbot.

"That any inhabitants of such portion shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Brentor but shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the Parish Church of Milton Abbot.

"That any inhabitants of the aforesaid portion shall have such and the same right to have Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings and Burials solemnised and performed in the Parish Church of Brentor as they might have had in the Parish Church of Milton Abbot.

"That all Fees, Ecclesiastical Offerings and Emoluments which may arise from the said portion so to be separated from Milton Abbot shall belong to the Incumbent of the Benefice of Brentor.

"That the whole of the Tithe Rent Charge arising out of land proposed to be separated from Milton Abbot and added to the Parish of Brentor together with all Glebe Land, if any, in the area so to be separated is to remain the property of the Incumbent of Milton Abbot as heretofore, but the Incumbent of Milton Abbot cum Dunterton shall pay to the Incumbent of Brentor the yearly sum of Thirty pounds payable yearly on the First of January.

"It is also proposed to separate from the said Parish of Milton Abbot and annex to the said Parish of Marystowe all that part of the Parish of Milton Abbot the boundaries of which are delineated on the Ordnance Map hereto annexed and edged with yellow.

"That the Incumbent of the Benefice of Marystowe shall have sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within such portion so to be separated from Milton Abbot.

"That any inhabitants of such portion shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Marystowe but shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the Parish Church of Milton Abbot.

"That any inhabitants of the aforesaid portion shall have such and the same right to have Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings and Burials solemnised and performed in the Parish Church of Marystowe as they might have had in the Parish Church of Milton Abbot.

"That all fees, Ecclesiastical Offerings and emoluments which may arise from the said portion so to be separated from Milton Abbot shall belong to the Incumbent of the Benefice of Marystowe.

"That the whole of the Tithe Rent Charge arising out of land proposed to be separated from Milton Abbot and added to the Parish of Marystowe together with all the Glebe Land, if any, in the area so to be separated is to remain the property of the Incumbent of Milton Abbot as heretofore, but the Incumbent of Milton Abbot cum Dunterton shall pay to the Incumbent of Marystowe the yearly sum of Fifty pounds payable yearly on the First of January.

"That no alteration shall be made in the Patronage of the said Benefices or any of them.

"We, the Most Noble Herbrand, Duke of Bedford, the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the Benefice of Milton Abbot

(in case the same were now vacant), The Reverend Douglas William Henry, Incumbent of the said Benefice of Milton Abbot, The Right Reverend William, by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Exeter, the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the Benefice of Brentor (in case the same were now vacant), The Reverend Alfred Rand Overy Apps, Incumbent of the said Benefice of Brentor, Onera Mary Georgiana Tremayne, and Harriet Maude Tremayne of Sydenham Lew Down in the County of Devon, Spinsters, the Patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the Benefice of Marystowe (in case the same were now vacant), and the Venerable Archdeacon Ernest Frederick Newman, Incumbent of the said Benefice of Marystowe, hereby respectively signify to your Grace our several consents to the Scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON ACT, 1898.

Notice is hereby given, in pursuance of the above-named Act, that the following amendment of Statute 108 of the Statutes of the University of London has been made by the Senate, and that copies of the amended Statute can be obtained on application to the Secretary to the Senate, University of London, South Kensington, S.W. 7.

Statute 108 of the Statutes of the University to be amended by adding to clause (5) the words "and Bachelor of Dental Surgery"; the said Statute as so amended running as follows:—

"108. The following degrees may be granted by the University (that is to say):—

- "(1) Bachelor and Doctor of Divinity;
- "(2) Bachelor and Master of Arts and Doctor of Literature;
- "(3) Bachelor and Doctor of Laws;

THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (BENEFIT) (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS, 1921,* MADE BY THE MINISTER OF LABOUR UNDER THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1920.

Whereas by the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, the Minister of Labour is empowered to make Regulations for prescribing the manner in which claims for Unemployment Benefit may be made.

And whereas the Minister of Labour has made the Unemployment Insurance (Benefit) Regulations, 1920 (hereinafter referred to as the Principal Regulations), for regulating the manner in which such claims are to be made.

And whereas it is desirable to amend the said Principal Regulations.

Now, therefore, the Minister of Labour, by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the said Act and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations for amending the said Principal Regulations:

1. In Part II of the Principal Regulations, after proviso (c) to paragraph (1) of Regulation 4, of the said Principal Regulations, there shall be inserted as an additional proviso the words following:—

(d) Where in the opinion of the Minister an exceptional amount of unemployment exists either generally or in any particular district and it is expedient that all or any specified class of insured contributors should be excused from personal attendance and signature of the Register on any days on which they would under these Regulations have been liable to attend and sign the Register, an insured contributor shall, if he complies with such conditions (if any) as may be imposed by the Minister, be excused either from personal attendance or from signing the Register or from both as the Minister may direct, and shall not be disqualified from receipt of benefit by reason only of the fact that he has not so attended or signed as the case may be.

2. Where by these Regulations any words are directed to be inserted in the Principal Regulations, copies of the Principal Regulations printed under the authority of His Majesty's Stationery Office after these Regulations come into force may be printed with the words inserted as these Regulations require, and the Principal Regulations shall be construed as if they had at the time these Regulations come into force been made with such additions.

3. These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Benefit) (Amendment) Regulations, 1921.

DRESSMAKING AND WOMEN'S LIGHT CLOTHING TRADE BOARD
(SCOTLAND).PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR A CERTAIN CLASS OF FEMALE
LEARNERS IN THE DRESSMAKING AND WOMEN'S LIGHT CLOTHING TRADE.

WHEREAS In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, and the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, for the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade in Scotland, as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, and dated 29th March, 1920, as varied by the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking Order), 1920, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they PROPOSE TO VARY the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated 23rd September, 1920, and made effective under an Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 17th September, 1920, in their application to a certain class of FEMALE WORKERS, so that in lieu of such Minimum Rates the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for the class of Female Workers specified in the Schedule set out below, shall be as shown therein.

PART II.

*Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for
Female Learners in the Dressmaking and
Women's Light Clothing Trade other than
the Retail Branch.*

Overtime Rates calculated on the Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages specified in Section I. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule, in the manner set out in Part III. of the Schedule to the Notice W.D.S. (2) issued by the Trade Board and dated 23rd September, 1920, shall apply in substitution for the Proposed Minimum Rates set out in Section I. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board, in the Schedule above referred to, to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART III.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

SECTION I.—A Female Learner is a worker who—

- (a) is employed during the whole or a

substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, and held subject to compliance with the conditions contained in this section, or has made an application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership:

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this

section, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

SECTION II.—The Retail Branch of the Trade is that branch of the Trade specified in Part IV. of this Schedule, in which it is the usual practice for the employer to supply the garment direct to the wearer.

PART IV.

The above proposed minimum rates of wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Scotland of the class specified in Part I. of this Schedule who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 29th March, 1920, as varied by the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, that is to say:—

Those branches of the Women's Clothing Trade that are engaged in the making of Non-Tailored Garments, namely the making from textile or knitted fabrics of (a) non-tailored wearing apparel (other than handkerchiefs) worn by women or girls or by children without distinction of sex, or (b) boys' ready-made washing suits or sailor suits, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of garments to be worn by women or girls or by children without distinction of sex; *Including:—*

(1) All operations or processes of cutting, making or finishing by hand or machine of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-ropes, jumpers, sports coats, neckwear, tea-gowns, dressing-gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, undershirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby-linen or similar non-tailored articles;

(2) The making of field bonnets, sun-bonnets, boudoir caps or infants' millinery where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of any of the articles mentioned in paragraph (1) above.

(3)—(a) The altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of any of the above-mentioned articles;

(b) The cleaning of any of the above-mentioned articles, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of such garments;

(4) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of such articles other than hand embroidery or hand-drawn thread work on articles made of linen or cotton or of mixed linen and cotton;

(5) The following processes if done by machine:—thread drawing, thread clipping, top sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring;

(6) Laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, packing, warehousing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the making, altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of any of the above-mentioned articles;

But excluding:—

(a) The making of knitted articles; the making of underclothing, socks and stockings, from knitted fabrics; and the making from

knitted fabrics of articles mentioned in paragraphs (1) and (2) above, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabrics;

(b) The making of gloves, spats, gaiters, boots, shoes and slippers;

(c) The making of headgear, other than the articles mentioned in paragraph (2) above;

(d) The branches of trade covered by the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919;

(e) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments;

(f) The making of women's collars and cuffs and of nurses' stiff washing belts where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of men's or boys' shirts or collars;

(g) Warehousing, packing, and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises;

And excluding also any processes or operations included in the Appendix to the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 2nd June, 1921. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade Board (Scotland), 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and, so far as possible, with reasons, what is objected to.

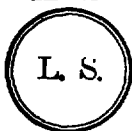
