THE Baron *Scarlatti*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Bavaria*, arrived here the 24th in the Evening; The Queen sent one of her own Coaches to meet him, and gave him presently a private Audience, and a publick one this morning; To the latter he was Conducted by the Captain of the Queen's Guards, and 20 Halbardiers, called *Trabanti*, with all other marks of Esteem and Respect, as well for his Person as Character. The Frontiers of this Kingdom, about *Lemberg*, are very much alarmed by the March of a great Body of *Tartars*, who, it's feared, will do much Mischief, before a sufficient Force can be got together to oppose them.

Vienna, Octob. 31. Prince *Lewis* of *Balen* is shortly expected here from *Germany*, and General *Caprera* from *Hungary*; when a great Council of War will be held at this Court. to take fitting Resolutions concerning the Preparations to be made for the next Year. The Elector of *Saxony* continues still here; and 'tis discouraged, that he will assist the Emperor with a further number of his Forces against the next Campaign. The last Advices from the Frontiers say, The Turkish Troops are all gone to their Winter-Quarters, having left strong Garrisons at *Belgrade* and *Temeswaer*; The Troops that lay near the last of these places, being design'd, as 'twas thought, to make an Inroad into *Transilvania*, are likewise separated; part have repass'd the *Danube*, and the rest have taken their Quarters on the other side of that River. We have an account from *Croatia*, that the Parties which are frequently sent out by the Governor of that Country, do very much annoy the Enemy; and that they are now making Preparations for a considerable Expedition.

Pembroke, November 6. On the 3d instant sailed out of this Port His Majesty's Ships the

Lincoln, *Play Prize*, *St. Malo*, and *Smirna Merchant*, having under their Convoy the Merchant Ships that lately arrived here from *Barbadoes*, with divers other Vessels bound to *London*, and other Ports. The 4th came in a Sloop belonging to *Pennsylvania*, laden with Tobacco from *Virginia*; and this Evening arrived here His Majesty's Ship the *Chester*, from *Plymouth*.

Falmouth, November 7. On the 2d instant arrived here the *Hudsons-Bay-Frigat*, *Nicholas Smithsford* Commander, from *Hudsons Bay*; she came out in Company of the *Bonadventure*, *Seaford*, and *Dering*, but was soon after separated from them in bad Weather. The 4th came in the *Great Russell-Galley*, bound to the *Streights*. Yesterday about 30 sail of Ships were seen off this place, plying to windward; the Wind at South-West: This morning failed the *Folly*, and *Russell Galley*; and in the afternoon about 70 sail appeared in the *Offing*, standing to the Eastward; which we believe to be the Fleet from *Milford*.

Plymouth, November 8. On the 4th came in here a Dutch Ship from the *East Indies*, taken by the French, and retaken by a *Guerrisey-Privateer*. Yesterday the *Germoon* brought in a small French Prize laden with Wine and Brandy; and this day arrived here His Majesty's Ship the *Lincoln*, with divers Merchant-Ships, from *Milford*.

Weymouth, November 9. The *Elizabeth* of this place is come in here from *Milford*, whence she failed the 3d instant in Company of eight Merchant Ships from the *West-Indies*, and divers Coasters, under Convoy of several Men of War. A French Privateer, of eight Guns, is put in here, taken lately by the *Portland*.

Bristol, November 9. Yesterday came in the *Maria Josepha* of *Bilboa*, in 40 days from *Cadiz*; and this day the *Samuel* Sloop from *Antegoa*, but last from *Ireland*.

Newcastle, November 6. On Tuesday last failed a Fleet of about 60 sail of laden Colliers, with the r Convoy.

Yarmouth, November 9. On the 7th came into this Road five Dutch Ships from the *Texell*, and another Yesterday, all bound to the *Streights*. The same day passed through our Road the *Sweepstakes*, with a Fleet of laden Colliers bound for the River.

Portsmouth, November 10. Sir *Cloudestey Showell* continues at *Spithead*. On Friday came in the *Plimouth, York, Portland,* and *South-Sea-Castle*, with two French Vessels, which they took on the French Coast.

London, Novem. 10. This Afternoon at the Sessions of the Admiralty held at the *Old-Baily*, *Joseph Dawson, Edward Foreseth, William May, William Bishop, James Lewis,* and *John Sparkes*, six of the Pyrates of *Every's* Crew, convicted upon several Indictments, received Judgment of Death, as in Cases of Piracy. And *John Murphey*, an Irishman, was indicted of High Treason, for serving on Board a French Privateer, who having taken an English Ship, the said *Murphey* went on Board her, in order to carry her into *France*, as Prize, but the Vessel was afterwards retaken; of which he was found Guilty, and Judgment of Death passed upon him, as in Cases of High-Treason.

Whitehall, Nov. There has been Presented to His Majesty an Address of the President, Council and General Assembly of *Barbadoes*, in behalf of themselves and the rest of the Inhabitants of that Island; wherein they declare, That as they have already sincerely and unanimously subscribed the Association, for Defence of His Majesty's Royal Person and Government against all His Majesty's Enemies at home and abroad, so they deem it their further indispensable Duty by this their hearty Address, to Congratulate his Majesty's wonderful and happy Deliverance from the most barbarous and bloody Assassination lately designed of His Royal Person, by execrable Villains and Monsters of Mankind, who are the Dishonor of the present, and will be the Horror and Detestation of future Ages. And pray that the good Providence of God, which has so often covered His Royal Head in days of Battle, and has disappointed the dark and secret Plots of his Enemies, will still preserve His Majesty from all their wicked Designs, for the Good and Comfort of his own Subjects, and all the Protestant Interest in *Europe*, of whose Deliverance from Popery and French Tyranny his Majesty has been the happy and glorious Instrument; and that His Majesty's Life may be long, and Success and Victory may ever attend all His Royal Undertakings. A very Loyal Address has been likewise presented to His Majesty on the same oc-

asion, from the Grand Jury of the Island of *Barbadoes*.
