

# The London Gazette.

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Malaga, October 23. N. S.

**T**HE 19th instant arrived here the *Anne-Galley*, Capt. Daly, in 22 days from *Newfoundland*. The 20th was forced in here by bad Weather the *Anna Galley*, Capt. Greiner, with 3 Dutch Ships of 44, 36, and 26 Guns from *Scanderoon* and *Smirna*, but last from *Messina*, whence they parted 20 days ago.

Cadiz, Octob. 29. The Spanish Armada failed hence the first of this month, and are now cruising off Cape Saint Vincent; and some other Ships will be ready to sail in two or three days to reinforce them. Within this Fortnight 11 fail of English Ships are arrived here at several times, laden with Fish from *Newfoundland*; They left 8 or 9 French Privateers on that Coast, who had done some Mischief; but the Settlement of St. John's held out still.

Madrid, Octob. 30. The King and Queen of Spain are very well again; and have received the Compliments of the Grandees and other Persons of Quality, upon their Recovery; and Preparations are making for great Rejoicings, and a Bull Feast to be on Sunday next, His Catholic Majesty's Birth day. The Spanish Forces in *Catalonia* are gone into Winter Quarters.

Corunna, Nov. 17. The Spanish Expedition Packet-Boat arrived here last night, in 5 days from *Falmouth*, having in her Voyage hither taken a French Vessel of two Guns, and 16 *Parcereros*, belonging to *Marseilles*; she came from *Saly* laden with Wool and Hides. They write from *Madrid* of the 8th instant, That the King of Spain was again indisposed, with some little return of his Ague.

Leghorne, November 5. The second instant came into this Road a French Ship called the *Seriaz*, of about Sixty Guns, commanded by the Marquis de *Palas*; and the same day went out again to join three other French Men of War, in whose Company he came from *Toulon*. The *Chenay-Galley*, Capt. John Mayne Commander, arrived here yesterday in 32 days from *Newfoundland*, laden with Poor Jack. Capt. Kent, of the *Slaughter-Galley*, took 4 days ago, near *Piombino*, a French Ship called the *Joseph*, Monsieur Louis *Amad* Commander, bound to *Tunis*, and carried her to Port *Hercule*.

Milan, Nov. 7. The German Troops continue their march out of this Country, part of them by the way of *Como*, and the rest through the Territories of *Venice*; Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy*, and my Lord *Galloway*, are now in this City.

Turin, Nov. 9. The Marquis de *Herberville*, Governor of *Pignerol*, after having Demolished the Fortifications of the Town of *Pignerol*, is entred with the French Garison into the Citadel; and the Marquis de *la Pierre* commands in the Town for the Duke of *Savoy*; The French keep still the Fortress of *Montmelian*, and the Citadel of *Nice*. Their Forces, that were lately Encamped at *Cannes*, are all marched towards *Provence*, where the greatest part of them are to Winter.

Venice, November 9. We have received Letters from the Venetian Fleet, dated the 30th of September; which give the following Account. The Captain-General sailed from *Porto Porro* in July, and after having cruised several days in the *Archipelago*, understanding that the Turkish Fleet, commanded by the Captain-Bassa *Mezzomuro*, was at *Spalmsadori*, and shewed no Inclination of coming out to Engage him, he left the Men of War at *Andros*, and went with the Gallies towards the Gulf of *Eugena*, to make some attempt upon the Enemy by Land, or at least to draw

their Fleet out of Port. Soon after the Captain-General was informed, that the Turkish Fleet had appeared near *Negrepont*; consisting of 36 Men of War, with divers Gallies, and other small Vessels; whereupon he returned with the Gallies to rejoin the Men of War, and then sailed with the whole Fleet, to meet the Enemy. On the 22th of August, the two Fleets came in sight of each other, and about Noon 7 or 8 of the foremost Ships on both sides were engaged, the rest not being able to come up, through the calmness of the Weather; The Fight continued between the Ships above-mentioned, till the Night put an end to it. The 23th the Enemy retired towards *Scira*, and the Venetians pursued them; but the Turks got into Port, where they staid several days to repair the Damage the Ships, that fought, had sustained, three of which were very much disabled, and one made unfit for further Service; They lost 3 Gallies, and had about 500 Men killed, and 300 wounded: Several of the Venetian Ships were likewise much damaged in their Sails, Masts and Rigging, and had about 200 Men killed and wounded. The Captain-General after this failed to *Andros*. In the beginning of September, the two Fleets being at Sea, had again fight of each other; but the Turks bore away with all the sail they could make. On the 19th of September, the Captain-General sent home the Pope's and Maltese Gallies, and sailed himself with the Venetian Gallies and Galleasses to *Napoli di Romania*, to take in Provisions and other Necessaries, which having done he returned to the *Archipelago* about the 28th of the last Month, being reinforced with 3 Men of War. The Turks left 3 of their Ships in the Port of *Scira*, who were not in a Condition to put to Sea, and the Captain-General had sent some Men of War to endeavour to destroy them.

Warsaw, Nov. 13. The *Tartars* have made a great Ravage in the Country about *Lemberg*, and have carried away a great number of People, among whom are divers Persons of very good Condition. The Difference between the Queen and her Son, Prince *James*, cannot yet be made up; The Interests of the latter are supported by the Emperor's Ambassador here, and great Endeavors are used by several Persons of the chiefest Quality to reconcile them. We hear from *Lithuania*, that there has been some Action between the Forces Prince *Sapaha* had drawn together, and the Confederated Troops, and that the first were worsted and lost 300 Men.

Vienna, Nov. 10. The States of *Hungary* and *Transylvania* are now assembled to regulate the Winter-Quarters for the Imperial Troops. In the mean time the Officers are ordered to begin their Recruits. 'Tis said at Court, that the Emperor's Forces, which are coming back from *Italy*, will be employed to Reinforce the Confederate Army on the *Rhine* the next Summer. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is shortly expected at this Court.

Frankfort, Nov. 18. The States of *Franconia* and *Saxony* intend to augment their Forces against the

next year, and will have 2 Meeting very soon for that purpose. The States of the Upper Rhine are likewise going to meet, to consider of the Preparations to be made for the next Campaign. The French have strong Garisons in all their Frontier Places, and particularly at *Philipsburgh*; and for this reason the Allies have Reinforced the Troops posted at *Eppingen*, and other Places near the *Rhine*, for Security of the Country against their Excursions during the Winter. The Dispute continues between the *Hessian* and *Palatine* Troops, about their Winter-Quarters.

*Hamburgh, Nov. 20.* The Treaty between *Denmark* and *Holstein* goes on but slowly; and it has been lately interrupted by a new Dispute concerning the Winter-Quarters of the *Holstein* Troops, that are returned from the Campaign on the *Rhine*; The King of *Denmark* will not allow them to Winter in *Holstein*; and there was a talk at first, that they would force their way; but the Mediators are endeavouring to accommodate this Matter: In the mean time the *Holstein* Troops remain in the Country, which is called the Four Lands belonging to this City; and the Duke of *Holstein* has declared, That they shall attempt nothing to the Prejudice of the King of *Denmark*. They write from *Dresden*, That the young Electoral Prince of *Saxony* was Christened there with a great deal of Solemnity, and was named *Fredericus Augustus*. The Elector of *Saxony* continues still at *Vienna*.

*Paris, November 19.* The French Troops, who served this last Summer in *Italy*, have all repassed the Mountains, and are come back to *Provence*, and the *Mareschal de Catinat* was by our last Letters arrived at *Grenoble*, in his way hither. They talk here very much of a Peace, and make great haste to send away the Plenipotentiaries appointed for the Treaty, who, it's said, will set out on Wednesday next, on their Journey to *Mons*, where they are to stay till farther Order; They take with them a great Train and Equipage. At the same time they are Regulating the State of the War for the next Year, and intend to augment their Troops in *Flanders* and *Germany*, with those come back from *Italy*. They use great Diligence at *Brest* in setting out the *Sieur Pointy's* Squadron. Divers Principal Officers of the Army, that was lately in *Flanders*, are already arrived here.

*Brussels, Nov. 21.* They write from *Namur*, that the New Works at the Gate of *St. Nicholas* are quite finished, which consist in two Half Bastions, and a Curtain faced with Stone, with a deep Ditch; and that they are making likewise some new Works at the Fort of *Coehorne*. The French Troops of *Mareschal Villeroi's* Army, are gone to Winter in *France*, their Quarters being assigned at *Rheims*, *Chalons*, and other Places. 'Tis said, That *Mareschal Catinat* is to serve in *Flanders* the next year.

*Hague, Nov. 23.* N. S. The Duke of *Wurtemberg* came last Wednesday to *Malines*, to review the Troops quartered in that Place, and the Country thereabouts. The French are filling their Magazines on the Frontiers; The *Mareschal de Ecijfers* is gone to the French Court, and is shortly expected again in *Flanders*. The last German Letters say, That Prince *Lewis of Baden* designs to go to *Vienna* towards the latter end of this Month, to adjust the Preparations for the next Campaign; and that the Circles of *France* and *Swabia* have resolved to keep 8 Batallions and 7 Squadrons of the *Munster* and *Saxe-Gotha* Troops, besides their own, this Winter.

*Falmouth, Nov. 14.* The 11th at night arrived here the Spanish Express on, in 52 hours from *Coranna*. This day came in the *Argentine* Brigat, *William Trumbly* Comman-

der, laden with Wine and Oil, in 28 days from *Legoria*. At the same time put into this Port the *St. Louise* of *Amsterdam*, bound to *St. Ubes*.

*Plimouth, Nov. 15.* The 13th instant in the Evening sailed out of this Port His Majesty's Ships the *Harwich* and *Terrible*, having under their Convoy divers Merchant Ships from the *West-Indies*, and other Vessels bound to the Eastward. The same day came in the *Lincolne* and *Demiss*, with several Merchant Ships from the *Dowries*.

*Tarmouth, Nov. 19.* On Saturday last was seen from *Lowstoffs* in the Offin, about 30 sail of Ships, supposed to be the East Country Fleet bound for the River. The same day came into our Road *Francis Dawson* of *Shildie*, from *Russia*; he says, the rest of the Ships came out some days before him; and yesterday appeared on the back of the Sands divers great Ships bound to the Southward, which are thought to be the Fleet from *Russia*.

*Deale, Nov. 16.* The *Smirna* Merchant came in this day with divers Merchant Ships from the Westward.

*Portsmouth, Nov. 17.* Since the bringing in of the *St. Lewis* Privateer, of 38 Guns and 220 Men, belonging to *St. Malo*, by His Majesty's Ship the *Expedition*; The *Medway* has taken and brought in two other Privateers, one called the *Rainbow*, of 30 Guns, but can carry 6 more, and 208 Men; and the other, the *Geger* of 14 Guns and 80 Men, both of *St. Malo*.
