A PROCLAMATION.
GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by the Emergency Powers Act, 1920, it is enacted that if it appears to Us that any action has been taken or is immediately threatened by any persons or body of persons of such a nature and on so extensive a scale as to be calculated, by interfering with the supply and distribution of food,

water, fuel or light, or with the means of locomotion, to deprive the community, or any substantial portion of the community, of the essentials of life, We may, by proclamation, declare that a state of emergency exists:

And whereas on the twenty-seventh day of May last, We did, by and with the advice of Our Privy (Council, declare by proclamation, in pursuance of the said Act, that a state of emergency existed:

And whereas it is enacted by the said Act that no such proclamation shall be in force for more than one month, without prejudice to the issue of another proclamation at or before the end of that period:

And whereas the continued cessation of work in Coal Mines does, in Our opinion, constitute a state of emergency within the meaning of the said Act:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act, We do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby declare that a state of emergency exists.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this twenty-se enth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, and in the Twelfth year of Our reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 27th day of June, 1921

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by the Emergency Powers Act, 1920, it is provided, amongst other

things, as follows:—
"1. (1) If at any time it appears to His Majesty that any action has been taken or is immediately threatened by any persons or body of persons of such a nature and on so extensive a scale as to be calculated, by interfering with the supply and distribution of food, water, fuel, or light, or with the means of locomotion, to deprive the community, or any substantial portion of the community, of the essentials of life, His Majesty may, by proclamation (hereinafter referred to as a pro-clamation of emergency), declare that a state of emergency exists.

"No such proclamation shall be in force for more than one month, without prejudice to the issue of another proclamation at or

before the end of that period.

(2) Where a proclamation of emergency has been made the occasion thereof shall forthwith be communicated to Parliament, and, if Parliament is then separated by such adjournment or prorogation as will not expire within five days, a proclamation shall be issued for the meeting of Parliament within five days, and Parliament shall accordingly meet and sit upon the day appointed by that proclamation, and shall continue to sit and act in like manner as if it had stood adjourned

or prorogued to the same day.
"2. (1) Where a proclamation of emergency has been made, and so long as the proclamation is in force, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order, to make regulations for securing the essentials of life to the community, and those regulations may confer or impose on a Secretary of State or other Government Department, or any other persons in His Majesty's service or acting on His Majesty's behalf, such powers and duties as His Majesty may deem necessary for the preservation of the peace, for securing and regulating the supply and distribution of food, water, fuel, light, and other necessities, for maintaining the means of transit or locomotion, and for any other purposes essential to the public safety and the life of the community, and may make such provisions incidental to the powers aforesaid as may appear to His Majesty to be required for making the exercise of those powers effective

"Provided that nothing in this Act shall be construed to authorise the making of any regulations imposing any form of compulsory military service or industrial conscription:

"Provided also that no such regulation shall make it an offence for any person or persons to take part in a strike, or peacefully to persuade any other person or persons to

take part in a strike."

And whereas a Proclamation of Emergency under the said Act was made by His Majesty on the 31st day of March, 1921, which remained in force for one month, namely, until the 30th day of April, 1921; and His Majesty in Council, by Order, was pleased to make the Emergency Regulations, 1921, which were continued, subject to certain omissions, by Resolutions of both Houses of Parliament, but ceased to have effect at the same time as the said Proclamation:

And whereas a further Proclamation of Emergency was made by His Majesty on the said 30th day of April, 1921, which remained in force for one month, namely, until the 29th day of May, 1921; and His Majesty in Council, by Order, was pleased to make the Emergency Regulations (No. 2), 1921, which were continued without amendment by Resolutions of both Houses of Parliament, but ceased to have effect at the same time as the said Proclamation:

And whereas a further Proclamation of Emergency was made by His Majesty on the 27th day of May, 1921, which continues in force until this day; and His Majesty in Council, by Order, was pleased to make the Emergency Regulations (No. 3). 1921, which were continued without amendment by Resolutions of both Houses of Parliament, but will cease to have effect at the same time as the said Proclamation:

And whereas a new Proclamation of Emergency under the said Act has this day been made by His Majesty, and is now in force:

And whereas in pursuance of the powers above recited it is expedient to make such provision as hereinafter appears:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to ' order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Minister of Transport, the Board of Trade and any other Department approved by His Majesty for the purpose, and any person duly authorised by a department on whom powers are conferred by this regulation, where it appears necessary to do so, to take possession of any land, buildings or works (including works for the supply of gas, electricity or water and of any sources of water supply) and any property (including plant, machinery, equipment and stores) used or intended to be used in connection therewith.

If after any such department or person has issued a notice that that department or person has taken or intends to take possession of any moveable property in pursuance of this regulation, any person having control of any such property, sells, removes or secretes it without the consent of the department or person he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Without prejudice to the foregoing powers it shall be lawful for the Minister of Transport and for the Commissioners of Works to take possession of any land, buildings or other property for the purpose of providing accommodation in connection with any scheme of road transports or for housing persons engaged thereon or of feeding or supplying necessaries to such persons.

It shall be lawful for the Admiralty, Army Council, Air Council, Minister of Transport, Commissioners of Works, and any other department approved by His Majesty for the purpose, to take possession of any food, forage, material or stores, and any articles required for or in connection with the production thereof.

If, after any such department has issued a notice that they have taken or intend to take possession of any food, forage, material, stores or article in pursuance of this regulation, any person having control of any such food, forage, material, stores or article without the consent of the department sells, removes or secretes the same, or deals therewith in any way contrary to any conditions imposed in any licence, permit or order that may have been granted in

respect thereof, he shall be guilty of an offence

against these regulations.

2A. During the continuance in force of these regulations the powers conferred by section 108a of the Army Act and section 108a of the Air Force Act with respect to billeting may, notwithstanding that directions have not been given for embodying all or any part of the Territorial Force, be exercised in the same manner in all respects as if such directions had been given.

3.—(1) The Minister of Transport may by

order:

(a) regulate, restrict, or give directions with respect to, the use for the purposes of road transport or the sale or purchase of any horses or vehicles in use or capable of being used for the purpose of road transport:

(b) take possession of any such horses or vehicles as aforesaid, or require them to be placed at the disposal of the Minister, or of any person specified by the Minister in that behalf, either absolutely or by way of hire, and either for immediate or future use:

- (c) require persons owning, or having in their possession or under their control, any such horses or vehicles as aforesaid to make to the Minister, or to any person specified by the Minister in that behalf, returns giving the prescribed particulars with respect to those horses and vehicles, and require any such returns to be verified in the prescribed
- (d) require persons owning, or having in their possession or under their control, any such horse or vehicle as aforesaid to give notice in the prescribed manner before disposing thereof, or allowing it to pass out of their possession or control:

(e) prohibit the carriage of goods of any class by road, and prescribe the radius or distance within which goods or goods of any

class may be carried by road:

(f) provide for the giving of directions with respect to the carriage of goods on any particular vehicles, or by any particular route, or to any particular clearing house or depôt:

(g) regulate the priority in which goods are to be carried by road and vehicles used

for the purposes of road transport:

(h) prescribe the conditions on which, and the rates at which, horses or vehicles may be hired for the purpose of road transport and goods carried by road, and the conditions on which goods so carried or to be carried are to be loaded or discharged:

(i) make such other provisions in relation to road transport as appear to the Minister

necessary or expedient.

(2) Any order under this regulation may be made so as to apply either generally to all horses and vehicles or to horses or vehicles of any class, or to horses or vehicles belonging to any particular owner.

(3) For the purpose of testing the accuracy of any return made to the Minister under this regulation, or of obtaining information in the case of failure to make a return, or to give any prescribed notice, any person authorised in that behalf by the Minister may enter any premises belonging to or in the occupation of the person who has made or has failed to make the return, or on which the person so authorised has reason to believe that any horses or vehicles with respect to which a return has been required under this regulation are kept, and may carry

out such inspection and examination (including the inspection and examination of books) as he may consider necessary for testing the accuracy of the return, or for obtaining such information.

(4) No individual return or part of a return made, and no information obtained, under this regulation, shall, without lawful authority, be published or disclosed by any person except for the purpose of a prosecution under this

regulation.

(5) If in any case the Minister is of opinion that it is expedient to obtain information from any person in connection with any horses or vehicles, the Minister may, without making an order for the purpose, require or authorise any person on his behalf to require that person to furnish him or any person so authorised with that information, and where the Minister or any person so authorised so requires any information to be furnished the provisions of this regulation shall apply to information furnished and the furnishing of the information as they apply to returns made and the making of returns.

6) In this regulation the expression "prescribed " means prescribed by an order made under this regulation, and the expression

horse" includes "mule."

(7) If any person:—
(a) Acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of this regulation or of any order or requirement made thereunder; or

(b) sells, removes or secretes any horse or vehicle so as to, or with intent to, defeat, obstruct or delay the operation of any order made under this regulation or any directions duly given in pursuance of any such order;

he shall be guilty of an offence against these

regulations.

(8) For the purpose of providing transport for any of the forces of the Crown the Army Council may, by order, exercise all or any of the like powers as are conferred by this regulation on the Minister of Transport, and any order so made by the Army Council shall have the same effect as an order made by the Minister, and all the provisions of this regulation shall apply accordingly.

4.—(1) The Minister of Transport for the purpose of making the most efficient use of the materials or plant belonging to a tramway or light railway undertaking may, by order, require the whole or any part of the rolling-stock, materials and plant, including permanent way, of any such undertaking to be placed at his disposal or at the disposal of any person or

body of persons named by him.

Where any such order has been made, the Minister or any such person or body of persons may take possession of such portions of the rolling-stock, materials or plant of such undertaking as they may require, and may remove them and make use of them for the purposes of any other tramway or light railway.

(2) The Minister of Transport may, by order, restrict in such manner as may be specified in the order the traffic on any tramway or

light railway.

(3) If any person fails to comply with the provisions of any order made under this regulation or wilfully hinders or impedes the execution of any such order, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

5. Where with a view to preventing conges-

tion of traffic on, or excessive damage to, public highways, the Minister of Transport considers it is expedient to do so, he may by order regulate or provide for the regulation of transport on public highways, and may by such order provide for directions being given for prescribing the routes to be followed and restricting the types of vehicles to be used, and if any person affected by the order fails to comply with the provisions thereof or with any directions given thereunder, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

6. The Minister of Transport or any person appointed by him for the purpose may grant to any person a licence to drive a motor car during the period for which the Proclamation of Emergency is in force, and shall have effect as if granted under the Motor Car Act, 1903.

. 7.—(1) Where the Minister of Transport is of opinion that it is expedient that this regulation should be applied to any canals, the Minister may by order apply this regulation, subject to any exceptions for which provision may be made in the order, either generally to all canals or to canals in any special area or to

any special canals.

- (2) Any canals to which this regulation is so applied shall, by virtue of the order, pass into the possession of the Minister as from the date of the order, or from any later date mentioned in the order, and the owner of every such canal and every person concerned in the management or working thereof, and where the owner of the canal is a company, every director of the company shall comply with the directions of the Minister as to the management and user of the canal, and if he fails to do so, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.
- (3) In this regulation the expression "canal" includes all buildings, barges, machinery and plant used in connection with the working of the canal.
- (4) Where the Minister has taken possession of any canal, the Minister may by order prohibit persons, not being the owner of the canal, who own any barges used thereon, or any machinery or plant used in connection with the loading or unloading of any such barges, from disposing of any such barges, machinery, or plant, without the consent of the Minister or some person or body of persons acting on his behalf, and if any person acts in contravention of any such order he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(5) The Minister shall have power by order to apply this regulation to undertakings of carriers by canal in like manner and with the like consequences as in the case of canals, and for the purposes of this provision the expression "carrier by canal" means a person, not being an owner of a canal, who carries on the business of transporting goods by canal, and the expression "undertaking" includes all buildings, barges, machinery and plant used by the owner thereof

in connection with such business.

8.—(1) The Board of Trade or any other Government Department approved by His Majesty for the purpose may by order close to traffic any port or harbour or any part of any such port or harbour and issue any directions which may be necessary for regulating the traffic in any such ports and harbours, and if any Dock or Harbour Company or Authority fails to comply with any such order or directions,

they shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(2) The Board of Trade or any other Government Department approved as aforesaid may by order restrict or prohibit the use for the purpose of any excursion or pleasure traffic of vessels of any description navigating any rivers, ports or harbours, and may restrict in such manner as may be specified in the order the use for any other purpose of such vessels.

Any person who fails to comply with, or acts in contravention of, any such order shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

- 9.—(1) The Board of Trade or any other Government Department approved by His Majesty for the purpose may make orders regulating, restricting or giving directions with respect to the nature of the trades in which ships are to be employed, the traffic to be carried therein, and the terms and conditions on which the traffic is to be carried, the ports at which cargo is to be loaded or discharged or passengers embarked or disembarked (including direction requiring ships to proceed to specified ports for the purpose of loading or unloading cargo or embarking or disembarking passengers), the ports at which consignees of cargo are to take delivery thereof, and matters affecting shipping where it appears to the department necessary or expedient to make any such order for the purpose of making shipping available for the needs of the country in such manner as to make the best use thereof having regard to the circumstances of the time or for providing and maintaining an efficient supply of shipping.
- (2) The Board of Trade or any other Government Department approved as aforesaid may, where it appears to the department necessary or expedient for such purposes as aforesaid, by order, requisition or require to be placed at the disposal of the department, in order that they may be used in the manner best suited for the needs of the country any ships or any cargo space or passenger accommodation in any ships, or any rights under any charter, freight engagement or similar contract affecting any ship, and require ships so requisitioned to be delivered to the department or to any person or persons named by the department at such times and at such places as the department may require.
- (3) Any order made under this regulation affecting any ship may be served on the owner of the ship, and shall be deemed to be sufficiently served if sent by registered post addressed to the managing owner or other person to whom the management of the ship is entrusted by or on behalf of the owner at his registered address.

(4) Any order under this regulation may be made either so as to apply generally to all ships or to apply to ships belonging to any particular owner, or to ships of any class or description, or

so as to apply to any specified ship.

(5) If the owner, master, or other person in charge of a ship, or any other person affected by an order under this regulation acts in contravention of or fails to comply with any provisions of the order, or aids or abets any other person, whether or not such other person is in Great Britain, in doing anything which if done in Great Britain would be a contravention of any such provisions, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(6) Where before the date of these regulations any ship or any cargo space or passenger accom-

modation in any ship or any rights under any charter, freight engagement, or similar contract? affecting any ship has been requisitioned by the Shipping Controller or the Board of Trade, this regulation shall, after that date, apply as if the same had been requisitioned in pursuance of

this regulation.

10. Without prejudice to any other powers possessed by him, whether under these regulations or otherwise, the Minister of Transport may by order regulate the priority in which passengers or goods are to be carried by railway, light railway, tramway, or canal; and if any person acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of any such order he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

11.—(1) The clearance of any ship whether to ports beyond the seas or coastwise may be refused except under such conditions as the Commissioners of Customs and Excise may allow and any clearance granted may be with-

(2) Subject to the general directions of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, the collector or other chief officer of Customs at any port or place in the United Kingdom may prohibit the unloading of any goods or any class of goods from ships, or from any particular ship, in that port or place; and if any goods are unloaded from any ship in contravention of such prohibition, any person unloading the same shall be guilty of an offence against these

regulations.
12. The Board of Trade may by order prohibit, except under such conditions as their licence may allow, the shipment of any goods for exportation or carriage coastwise whether as merchandise or as ship's stores, and if any goods are shipped or brought to a quay or other place or waterborne for shipment in contravention of such prohibition, the shipper thereof or his agent shall be guilty of an offence against

these regulations.

13.—(1) The Board of Trade may take possession, or if already in possession may retain possession, and may from time to time, as may be deemed expedient, relinquish and resume

possession of:

(a) All or any coal mines, collieries and colliery buildings and property, including plant, machinery, equipment, stores and rolling stock, for the time being used, or intended to be or usually used for the purpose of the production, treatment or manufacture

(b) All or any buildings and property for the time being used, or intended to be or usually used or which may be deemed requisite for the purposes of the storage, distribu-

tion, supply and disposal of coal

(c) All or any railway wagons (not being wagons belonging to any railway company) for the time being used, or intended to be or usually used for the purposes of transport of

(d) Any stocks of coal, wheresoever situate

and by whomsoever held:

- (e) Any plant, machinery, vehicles or articles which may be deemed requisite for the purposes of maintaining the supply and distribution of coal.
- (2) The Board of Trade may give directions
 - (a) As to the management and user of any coal mines or any property of which possession may be taken as aforesaid:

(b) As to the production, manufacture, treatment, transport, storage, distribution, supply, disposal and use of any coal:

(c) As to fixing of prices of coal:

(d) As to the making and supplying of records, returns and information, and the verification thereof.

(3) The owner, agent and manager of every coal mine and every officer thereof, and every owner and person for the time being in possession of any such property as aforesaid, and where any such owner or possessor is a company, every director of the company, and every person engaged or employed in the production, manufacture, treatment, transport, storage, distribution, supply and disposal of coal, and every person using coal, shall comply with the directions so given as aforesaid.

(4) The Board of Trade may cause inquiries to be held by any person or persons with respect to any matters to which any of the powers

hereby conferred relate.
(5) The Board of Trade may provide for the exercise by any person or body of persons approved by them of any powers conferred upon

the Board by this regulation.

(6) The taking or retaining of any coal mine, or of any factory, workshop, premises or plant shall not affect the liability of the actual owner, agent or manager of the mine under the Coal Mines Acts, 1887 to 1919, or any Act amending the same, or the liability of the actual owner or occupier of such factory, workshop, premises or plant under the Factory and Workshop Acts, 1901 to 1911.

(7) For the purposes of this regulation the expression "coal" shall include the products of coal, and gas and electricity made from or by means of coal whether for lighting, heating

or any other purpose.

(8) The powers of the Board of Trade under this regulation shall, subject to the directions of the Board, be exercised by the Secretary for

(9) If any person fails to comply with any direction of the Board of Trade or the Scoretary for Mines under this regulation, obstructs any person acting on behalf of the Board under this regulation he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

14.—(1) It shall be lawful for the Board of Trade or for the Minister of Transport by order to require the owners of any undertakings for the supply of gas, water or electricity to comply with any directions given by the Board or

Minister as to the supply thereof.

(2) Where any such order has been issued, or where in pursuance of the powers conferred by any of these regulations possession has been taken of any works for the supply of gas, water or electricity, it shall be the duty of the owner of the undertaking and of every officer and servant of the owners and where the owners are a company of every director of the company to comply with any directions which may be given by the Board or Minister, and any person failing so to comply shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

-(1) The Board of Trade may by order direct that all lights of any specified class or description shall be extinguished or their use restricted to such extent, between such hours, within such area, and in such places of entertainment, hotels, clubs or other premises as may be specified in the order, and if any person having control of any light, or occupying or having control of, or managing, or being in

charge of, premises in or in connection with which any light is used, acts in contravention of any such order, he shall be guilty of an offence

against these regulations.

(2) The Board of Trade or the Minister of Transport may by order direct that the use of lights in public vehicles shall be restricted to such extent as may be specified in the order, and if any person being in charge of any public conveyance in which any light is used acts in contravention of any such order he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations

15.—(1) The Board of Trade may by order prohibit or regulate the sale, supply, delivery or use of motor spirit, and require any persons owning or having the power to sell or dispose of motor spirit to place the same at the disposal of the Board or of any person authorised by

(2) In this regulation the expression "motor spirit" includes any inflammable liquid substance capable of being used for the purpose of driving motor vehicles.

(3) If any person contravenes or fails to comply with any provision of any order made under t1.s regulation he shall be guilty of an

offence against these regulations.

16. It shall be lawful for the Postmaster General to direct that telegraphic messages of such classes or descriptions as he may prescribe

shall not be accepted for transmission.

17.—(1) A Secretary of State may by order in any area specified in the order, prohibit either absolutely or subject to such exceptions as he may prescribe, the buying, selling or otherwise dealing in any arms, parts of arms, ammunition or explosive substances, and may by such order require all persons having in their possession any arms, parts of arms, ammunition or explosive substances to keep the same in a secure place approved by the chief officer of police, or to remove them to any place directed by such chief officer of police, and if any person contravenes such an order or direction he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(2) A Secretary of State may by order, in any area specified in the order, prohibit either absolutely or subject to such exceptions as he may prescribe, the carrying or use of arms, parts of arms, ammunition or explosive substances, and if any person contravenes any such order he shall be guilty of an offence against

these regulations.

(3) If any person by the discharge of firearms or otherwise endangers the safety of any member of any of His Majesty's forces or any police constable or member of any fire brigade or other person who is charged with the execution of any duties under these regulations he shall be guilty of an offence against these

(4) If any person attends or takes part in any meeting or procession having in his possession any firearm or ammunition or any other weapon of offence or explosive substance or any stone or other dangerous missile, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(5) In the application of this regulation to Scotland, references to a Secretary of State shall be construed as references to the Secretary

for Scotland.

18.—(1) If any person injures, or does any act calculated to injure, or to prevent the proper use or working of, any public building, railway, canal, bridge, road, tramway, vehicle,

telegraph or telephone line, cable, or plant, mine, shop, factory, waterworks, gasworks, electric generating station, or any works or plant used or adapted for use for the production, supply, storage, or transport of food. fuel, munitions, water, light, heat, or power, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(2) If any person approaches or is in the neighbourhood of or enters any such place as aforesaid with intent to do injury thereto he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations; and notwithstanding that no such act or injury is committed by him, he shall be deemed to be guilty of such an offence if by reason of his being in possession of any explosive or incendiary substance or lethal weapon or dangerous missile, or otherwise from the circumstances of the case or his conduct or his known character as proved, it appears that

his purpose was to do such injury.

19. If any person attempts or does any act calculated or likely to cause mutiny, sedition or disaffection among any of His Majesty's forces, or among the members of any police force, or any fire brigade, or among the civilian population, or to impede, delay or restrict any measures taken for securing and regulating the supply or distribution of food, water, fuel, light or other necessities for maintaining the means of transit or locomotion, or for any other ourposes essential to the public safety or the life of the community, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations:

Provided that a person shall not be guilty of an offence under this regulation by reason only of his taking part in a strike or peacefully persuading any other person to take part in a

20. Where there appears to be reason to apprehend that the assembly of any persons for the purpose of the holding of any meeting will give rise to grave disorder, and will thereby cause undue demands to be made upon the police or military forces, or that the holding of any procession will conduce to a breach of the peace or will promote disaffection, it shall be lawful for a Scoretary of State, or for any mayor, magistrate, or chief officer of police who is duly authorised by a Secretary of State, or for two or more of such persons so authorised, to make an order prchibiting the holding of the meeting or procession, and if a meeting or procession is held or attempted to be held in contravention of any such prohibition, it shall be lawful to take such steps as may be necessary to disperse the meeting or procession or prevent the holding thereof.

In the application of this regulation to Scotland "the Secretary for Scotland" shall be substituted for "a Secretary of State" and "provost" for "mayor."

21. A Secretary of State or, in Scotland, the Secretary for Scotland, may by order in any area specified in the order prohibit either absolutely or subject to such exceptions as he may prescribe, the practice of or taking part in or being concerned in any exercise, movement, evolution or drill of a military nature, and if any person, other than a member of His Majesty's naval, military or air forces or a constable, practises or takes part in or is concerned in any such exercise, movement, evolution or drill, or is concerned in or assists the promotion or organisation of any such exercise, movement, evolution or drill by persons, other

than members of His Majesty's naval, military or air forces or police constables, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

- 22. Where a Secretary of State by order has declared that any service is a service of vital importance to the community, it shall be the duty of every person subject to the Naval Discipline Act or to military law or to the Air Force Act to obey any command given by any superior officer in relation to employment upon or in comnection with such service, and every such command shall be deemed to be a lawful command within the meaning and for the purposes of the Naval Discipline Act, the Army Act and the Air Force Act.
- 23. If any person obstructs, knowingly misleads, or otherwise interferes with or impedes, or withholds any information in his possession which he may reasonably be required to furnish from, any officer or other person who is carrying out the orders of any Government Department or who is otherwise acting in accordance with his duty under these regulations, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.
- 24. Any Government Department on whom powers or duties are conferred or imposed by these regulations may make arrangements with any other Government Department for the exercise by that Department of those powers or duties, and in such case that Department and the officers thereof shall have and may exercise the same powers and duties as are by these regulations conferred on the first mentioned Department and the officers thereof; and the Minister of Health, or as respects Scotland the Secretary for Scotland may, by arrangement with any Government Department on whom powers or duties are conferred or imposed by these regulations, confer or impose on any local authorities and their officers any powers and duties in connection with the enforcement of these regulations, and any powers and duties necessary to provide for the due discharge of any functions assigned to local authorities by any Government Department under these regulations
- 25. The compensation payable in respect of any property which is requisitioned or of which possession is taken under these regulations shall be such as may be determined in default of agreement by a single arbitrator appointed in England by the Lord Chancellor and in Scotland by the Lord President of the Court of Session, and in assessing the amount of compensation payable in any particular case, regard shall not be had to any increase in the value of the property which is due to the emergency.
- 26.—(1) If any person contravenes or otherwise fails to comply with any of the provisions of these regulations or any order or direction made or given thereunder, or is guilty of an offence against these regulations, or obstructs any police or other officer or any other person in the execution of his duties under these regulations, he shall be liable on summary conviction to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding three months, or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or to both such imprisonment and fine, and shall be liable to forfeit to the Crown any goods or money in respect of which the offence was committed.
- .(2) Where the person guilty of any such offence is a corporation, company or society, any director, officer or trustee, or other person

concerned with the management thereof, shall be guilty of the like offence unless he proves that the offence was committed without his knowledge or consent.

(3) For the purpose of the trial of a person for an offence under these regulations, such offence shall be deemed to have been committed either at the place in which the same actually was committed or at any place in which the offender may be, and the court in Scotland shall be the sheriff court.

27.—(1) Any police constable may arrest without warrant any person who so acts as to endanger the public safety, or who is guilty or is suspected of being guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(2) Any police constable may, if authorised by order of a Secretary of State or of a chief officer of police, enter, if need be by force, any premises or place suspected of being used for purposes so endangering the public safety, and may search any part of such place or premises, and may seize and detain anything found therein which is suspected of being used for such purposes as aforesaid, and deal with the things so saized in such manner as the Secretary of State may determine.

(3) Any police constable may search any person whom he believes to be in possession of, or to be using or carrying any article, the possession, use or carrying of which by such person is an offence against these regulations, any may seize and detain any such article found on such person.

(4) Any police constable may stop and search any vehicle which he has reason to suspect to be used for any purpose prejudicial to the public safety, or contrary to these regulations, or to be carrying any article, the possession, use or carrying of which is an offence against these regulations, and may seize and detain any such vehicle or any such article found therein.

(5) In the application of this regulation to Scotland "the Secretary for Scotland" shall be substituted for "a Secretary of State."

- 28. Any person who attempts to commit, or solicits, or incites, or endeavours to persuade another person to commit, or procures, aids, or abets, or does any act preparatory to, the commission of any act prohibited by these regulations, or any order, directions, rules, or other instrument made thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.
- 29. The Secretary of State may by order direct that during such period as may be specified in the order the time for general purposes in Great Britain shall be two hours in advance of Greenwich mean time, and during the period so fixed, if this regulation so long continues in force, any Order in Council in force under the Summer Time Act, 1916, as continued by the War Emergency Laws Continuance Act, 1920, shall have effect in Great Britain as if "two hours" were substituted for "one hour" in subsection (1) of section one of the first-mentioned Act.
- 30. In the fulfilment oy any person of any contract is interfered with by the necessity on the part of himself or any other person of complying with these regulations or any order or direction thereunder, that necessity shall be a good defence to any action or proceedings taken against that person in respect of the non-fulfilment of the contract so far as it is due to that interference.

31.—(1) In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires, the expression "chief

officer of police "

(a) with respect to any place in England or Wales, other than the City of London, has the meaning assigned to it by the Police

(b) with respect to the City of London, means the Commissioner of the City Police;

(c) with respect to Scotland, has the meaning assigned to it by the Police (Scotland) Act, 1890; and

the expression "police constable" includes

a special constable

(2) The Interpretation Act, 1889, shall apply to these regulations as though they were

an Act of Parliament.

- 32.—(1) Where by any Order in Council or by any Resolution of both Houses of Parliament, for the time being in force, any regulations or words are directed to be added to or omitted from these regulations, or to be substituted for any other regulations or words in these regulations, then copies of these regulations, printed under the authority of His Majesty's Stationery Office, after such direction takes effect, may be printed with the regulations or words added or omitted or substituted for other regulations or words, as such direction requires, and with the regulations and paragraphs thereof numbered in accordance with such direction; and these regulations shall be construed as if they had, at the time when such direction takes effect, been made with such addition, omission or substitution.
- (2) A reference in any document to these regulations or to any provisions thereof shall, unless the context otherwise requires, be construed as referring to these regulations as amended by any Order in Council or Resolution of both Houses of Parliament for the time being in force.

33.—(1) The powers conferred by these regulations shall be in addition to and not in derogation of any prerogative right or other power vested in His Majesty.

(2) Any powers conferred on any department or person by any of these regulations shall be in addition to and not in derogation of any other powers of that department or person whether conferred by statute, regulation or otherwise.

(3) Any order of any government department in force at the date of these regulations under the Defence of the Realm Regulations whether as originally made or as incorporated in or continued by any Act of Parliament shall, unless revoked or varied, continue in force notwithstanding anything in these regulations and shall, if the department so directs, have effect as if made under these regulations.

(4) Any order, direction or instrument which may be made or given by any governorder, direction or instrument ment department or other authority under these regulations may be added to, revoked or varied from time to time by such department or authority while these regulations continue

in force.

5) Any permission or direction given, or order, requirement or appointment made, authority issued, approval given, or other action taken under the Emergency Regulations, 1921, the Emergency Regulations (No. 2) 1921, or the Emergency Regulations (No. 3), 1921, shall be deemed to have been exercised, given, made, granted or taken under the corresponding provisions of these regulations.

34.—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Emergency Regulations (No. 4), 1921.

(2) These regulations do not apply Ireland.

The Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Act, 1920, shall apply to the parts of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom hereunder mentioned:

The Straits Settlements.

his approval of the said Report:
"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the Union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended

in the said Report:
"And whereas the said Benefice of Horrabridge is now full, the Reverend Benjamin Jones being the present Incumbent thereof, and the said Benefice of Sampford Spiney is at

present vacant:

"And whereas the said Benjamin Jones has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, if and when the union which. is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said William Gascoyne Cecil, Bishop of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:-

"1. That the said Benefice of Sampford Spiney and the said Benefice of Horrabridge shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Sampford Spiney with Horrabridge,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect, and the said Benjamin Jones, if he is then Incumbent of the said Benefice of Horrabridge shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"3. That upon the said union taking effect

the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Horrabridge shall become and be the house of residence for the Incum-

bent of the United Benefice.

"4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present and nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, the Patron of the said Benefice of Sampford Spiney having the right of presentation upon the first avoidance of the United Benefice after the union and every alternate right of presentation and the Patron of the said Benefice of Horrabridge having the right of presentation upon the second avoidance of the United Benefice after the union and

every alternate turn thereafter.
"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any

other Act of Parliament."

been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patrons affected together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas neither of the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme is situate in a City or Municipal Borough:

And whereas the said Scheme has been ap-

proved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual; in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Exeter.

Minimum Rates of Wages (as Varied and as Fixed) for Certain Classes of Female and Male Workers.

Effective as from 27th June, 1921.*

In accordance with the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Liabour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919, having given due notice on 22nd October, 1920, of Proposal to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers at present fixed and set out in their Notice dated 9th September, 1920, in respect of cer-tain classes of Female Workers, and to Fix Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Male Workers, and to Vary the Overtime Rates Fixed for Male Workers employed on Piecework set out in their Notice dated 9th September, 1920, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918,

that they have varied the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for the classes of Female Workers specified in Parts I. and II. of this Notice, and have fixed Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Male Workers, and have varied the Overtime Rates fixed for Male Workers employed on Piece-work as set out in their Notice dated 9th September, 1920, and that the Minimum Rates as varied and as fixed, and the Overtime Rates as varied, are as shown in the Schedule set out below.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 13th June, 1921, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates as varied and as fixed by the Trade Board, and specifying 27th June, 1921,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates shall become effective.

Piece-work Basis Time-Rates (as Varied) for Certain Classes of Female Workers (all Ages).

(a) For Female Workers who are employed as Polishers or as Drop Stampers,

1s. 1d. per hour.

(b) For Female Workers who are employed as Hand-Brush-Japanners and are capable of finishing all classes of work, Hand-Brush-Lacquerers, Blow-Pipe-Braziers or Solderers using ordinary Hand-Iron or Blow-Pipe with Bar Solder, 1s. per hour. In the case of all Female Workers employed

on Piece-work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than the equivalent of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate to an ordinary worker, i.e., a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question.

PART III.

Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Male Workers (all Ages).

- (a) The Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for the classes of Male Workers specified in Part I of the Trade Board's Notice dated 16th December, 1920, shall be 10 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates as set out therein
- (b) The Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for all classes of Male Workers other than those specified in paragraph (a) of this Part of this Schedule shall be 10 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates for such classes as set out in Section I of Part I of the Trade Board's Notice dated 9th September, 1920.

Overtime Rates (as Varied) for Male and Female Workers.

Overtime Rates calculated on the Minimum Rates specified in Parts I, II and III of this Notice, in the manner set out in Part III of the Notice issued by the Trade Board, dated 9th September, 1920, shall apply in substitution for the Minimum Rates otherwise applicable as set out in Parts I, II and III of this Notice, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the above-mentioned Notice, dated 9th September, 1920, to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade.

(b) the operations of carding, boxing, packeting, labelling, weighing, packing, warehousing or despatching, where these operations are incidental to or apperpacktaining to the manufacture of such stamped

or pressed metal articles;

But excluding:-

(a) the operations specified in the Trade-Boards (Hollow-ware) Order, 1913;

(b) the making of buttons or any opera-

tions incidental thereto;

(c) the making of coffin furniture or any operations incidental thereto;

(d) the making of pins, hairpins, hocksand eyes, hair-curiers, snap fasteners or safety pins or any operations incidental thereto

- (e) the making of steel pens and the making of stationers' metal sundries or other similar metal articles when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the making of steel' pens so as to provide a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers,

PART VI.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions,. other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:-

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays and hours worked on Saturday (subject to the provisions set out below) shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime

Rates shall apply.

Section II.—In lieu of the Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Trade Board's Notice dated 20th May, 1921, and effective under an order of the Minister of Labour dated 17th May, 1921, the proposed Overtime Rates for Male Workers to apply in substitution for the minimum rates which would otherwise be applicable in respect of all hours worked by Male Workers in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:

(A) For Male Workers employed on Time- \mathbf{Work} :

(1) On any day other than Saturday, Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays:

(a) For the first two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Quarter times the proposed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates specified in paragraphs A (1) (a), A (1) (b), and A (1) (c) of this Section shall not be payable on any day (other than Saturday, Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays) until the number of hours worked exceeds $9\frac{1}{2}$, $11\frac{1}{2}$ and $13\frac{1}{2}$ respectively.

(2) On Saturday in respect of:-

(a) That class of worker who customarily attends on six days a week: For all Overtime worked after the first

five hours of work:

(i) For the first four hours of Over-One-and-a-Half times the pro-Time-Rate posed General Minimum otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half.

(ii) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, twice the proposed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Double Time.

Note.—During the first five hours worked on Saturday, the Minimum Rate applicable to the class of workers specified in paragraph (2) (a) is the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed as set out in Part I of this Notice.

(b) That class of worker who customarily attends on five days a week:

(i) For the first two hours of Overtime (that is to say, for the first two hours worked on Saturday), One-and-a-Quarter Times the proposed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter.

- (ii) For the second two hours of Over-time, One-and-a-Half Times the pro-posed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-
- (iii) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the proposed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Double-Time.
- (3) On Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays: - For all time worked, Twice the proposed General Minimum Time-Rates otherwise applicable, i.e., Double-

Note.—The Overtime Rates set out in Subsections (1), (2) and (3) of this Section are payable as provided above, in respect of all hours of Overtime worked on any day, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, One-and-a-Quarter Times the proposed General Minimum Time-Rate Time-and-aotherwise applicable, i.e., Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (1), (b) and (c), (2), (a) 2 (b)(ii) and (iii) and (3) of this Section.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week on which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

- (5) Where it is, or may become, the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out in this Section shall apply to workers in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."
- (B).—For Male Workers employed on Piece-Work.
 - (i) Male Workers of 22 years of age and over employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed, One-Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed, or the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (A) of this Section if the Worker had been employed on Time-Work, were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half, cr Double-Time respectively.

(ii) Male Workers under 22 years of age employed on Piece-Work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, or to the

appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half, or Double-Time respectively.

Note.—The hours which Young Persons and Children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshops Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART III.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:-

(a) A Measure Cutter is a person who is capable of taking a complete set of measures and of cutting any garment for a female

person from model, patterns and sketches.

(b) A Cutter (other than a Measure Cutter or Knife Cutter or Knifeman) is a

person who is employed in:

(i) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings or other materials;

(ii) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings or other materials;

(iii) Cutting cloth or linings or other materials; and

- (iv) Dividing; that is, the process ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their assistants of dividing, parting, or separating the parts of garments after being cut and of assembling them into suitable bundles for making-up.
- (c) A Knife Cutter or Knifeman is a person who is wholly or mainly employed on Band, Electric or Hand Knife processes.
- (d) A Fitter-up is a person who is employed in Fitting-up; that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, baisting or machining, which consists of preparing or fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being baisted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing or fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances, sewing, baisting or machining forming no part or process of fitting-up.
- (e) A Tailor is a person who is employed in sewing by hand in the process of making a garment or portion of a garment.

(f) A Presser is a person who is employed in Pressing-off by hand or by machine.

(g) A Machinist is a person who is employed in Machining other than as a Plain Machinist as defined in Sub-Section (j) of this Section and is capable of machining any garment throughout.

(h) A Passer is a person who is employed in examining garments, either in the processes of being made-up or upon their com-

pletion.

(i) An Under-Presser is a person who is employed in pressing processes other than Pressing-off.

(j) A Plain Machinist is a person who is employed in the process of making-up Plain Sleeves, Facings, Linings, Inside Pockets, Quilting and Padding.

(k) A Warehouseman is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., the assembling, keeping, storing and distributing of stock, but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Porter.

- (l) A Packer is a person employed wholly or mainly upon the operation of packing goods and materials, but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Porter or Warehouseman.
- (m) A Porter is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., unpacking, moving, loading or unloading of goods or materials, but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Warehouseman.

PART IV.

The above proposed minimum rates of wages set out in this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male Workers in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in a branch of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour dated 20th November, 1919, that is to say:

Women's, Girls' and Children's ready-made and wholesale bespoke tailoring, and all women's, girls' and children's retail bespoke tailoring carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments, and any other branch of women's, girls' and children's tailoring, which is not included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board;

Including:

- (1) All operations and processes of cutting, making or finishing by hand or machine of coats, costumes, tailored skirts, coat-frocks, mantles, service clothing or similar garments made by tailoring processes;
- (2) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments, except where included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board;
- (b) The cleaning of such garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of the garments;
- (3) The lining with fur of any of the abovementioned garments, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments;
- (4) (a) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried on in

association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments other than hand-embroidery or hand-drawn thread work on garments made of linen or cotton, or of mixed linen or cotton;

(b) The following processes, if done by machine—namely, thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring;

(5) Warehousing, packing and all other operations incidental to or apportaining to any of the above-mentioned branches of tailoring;

But excluding:—

(1) Those branches of women's or girls' bespoke tailoring and all operations or processes covered by the Trade Boards (Tailoring) Order, 1919;

(2) The making of head-gear; (3) The making of rubberised or oilskin

garments;

(4) Warehousing, packing and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises. PART V.

The above Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 23rd Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to The Secretary of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, and the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, for the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade in Great Pairties and South Nevember 2018, and the Porter and the Minister of Labour and dated 20th Nevember 2018. Britain as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 20th November, 1919, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they PROPOSE TO VARY the General Minimum Time Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice W.M. (8), dated 20th May, 1921, and effective under an Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 17th May, 1921, the variations proposed being as shown in the Schedule set out below out below

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the Notice of Proposal being given.

The General Minimum Time-Rate for Learners under 14 years of age shall be varied from 2½d. to 2d. per hour. Such Learners shall, from the age of 14, be entitled to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates shown in Column I. above, all employment prior to that age being disregarded.

(i.) The advances to be given to Learners commencing at under 21 years of age shall become due as from the first Monday in January and July of each year, the Learner being entitled to her first advance on the first Monday in January or July as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.

Provided that where it is the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates specified in paragraphs A (1) (a), A (1) (b) and A (1) (c) of this Section shall not be rayable on any day (other than Saturday, Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays) until the number of hours worked exceeds 9½, 11½ and 13½ respectively.

(2) On Saturday in respect of :-

(a) That class of worker who customarily attends on Six Days a week:-For all Overtime worked after the

first five hours of work: (i) For the first four hours of Over-time, One-and-a-Half times the pro-posed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-

(ii) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the proposed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise

applicable, i.e., Double Time.

Note.—During the first five hours worked on Saturday the minimum rate applicable to the class of worker specified in paragraph 2 (a) is the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed as set out in Part I. of this Notice.

> (b) That class of worker who customarily attends on Five Days a week:

> (i) For the first two hours of Overtime (that is to say, for the first two hours worked on Saturday), One-and-a-Quarter times the proposed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter.

(3) On Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays:—

Note:—The Overtime Rates set out in Sub-Sections (1), (2) and (3) of this Section are payable as provided above, in respect of all hours of Overtime worked on any day, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, One-and-a-quarter times the proposed General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (1) (b) and (c) (2) (a), (2) (b), (ii) and (iii), and (3) of this

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the proposed Over- | time Rate shall not be payable in the week on which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

(5) Where it is, or may become, the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out in this Section shall apply to workers in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

(B) For Female Workers Employed on

Piece-Work:

(1) Female Workers employed Cutters, Trimmers and Fitters-up as defined in this Notice, employed on Piece-Work, and all Female Learners, employed on Piece-Work, shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker, not less than the proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable (or where no Piece-Work Basis Time Rate is applicable not less than the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable) an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, or One-nalf of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, or to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-work, were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half, or Double-Time respectively.

(2) All other Female Workers employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker, not less than the proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed, One-Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed or the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were Time-anda-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half, or Double

(d) Trimming, that is, the process as ordinarily carried on of cutting and assembling together the linings and fittings of garments.

(e) Dividing, that is, the process as ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their Assistants, of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut, and of assembling them into suitable bundles for

making up.

(f) Fitting-up, that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, basting, or machining, which consists of preparing and fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being basted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing and fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances; sewing, basting or machining forming no part or process of fitting-up.

SECTION II.—A female learner is a worker

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable

facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. vided that the certification or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment, in the branch or branches of the trade described in Part V. of this Schedule, without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her

parent or guardian.

Section III.—The expression "Homeworker'' means a worker who works in her own home, or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

(1) All operations and processes of cutting, making, or finishing by hand or machine of coats, costumes, tailored skirts, coat-frocks, mantles, service clothing, or similar garments made by tailoring processes;

(2) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments, except where included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailor-

ing Trade Board;

(b) The cleaning of such garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of the garments;

(3) The lining with fur of any of the abovementioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the

(2) The making of head-gear;

(3) The making of rubberised or oilskin

garments;

(4) Warehousing, packing, and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises.

PART VI.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act, to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund

Male workers commencing employment in the Corset Trade for the first time at and over the age of 19 years may serve a period of six months at $7\frac{1}{4}$ d. per hour, and thereafter a period of six months at $8\frac{3}{4}$ d. per hour.

On the expiration of one year's service in the trade, these workers shall receive such rates as their age may entitle them to under the foregoing provisions.

PART II.

Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers.

In lieu of the Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Trade Board's Notice dated 24th November, 1920, Overtime Rates, calculated on the Proposed Minimum Rates specified in Part I of this Schedule, in the manner set out in Part II of the Schedule to the Notice issued by the Trade Board dated 24th November, 1920, shall apply in substitution for the Minimum Rates otherwise applicable, as set out in Part I of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the

number of hours declared by the Trade Board, in the Notice above referred to, to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

Provided that in the application of the above proposed overtime rates to workers who customarily attend on six days a week, any other day, not being Sunday, may be by an agreement in writing between an employer and a worker substituted in place of Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the overtime rates shall apply in like manner as if in the provisions as to Overtime Rates "Saturday" were substituted for such short day, and such short day were substituted for "Saturday."

PART III.

SECTION I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subset to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919, that is to say:

(a) The manufacture of corsets, stays, children's corset bodices, infants' stay bands, bust confiners, such as brassieres and bandeaux when boned or with elastic webbing in their construction.

(b) The manufacture of support or ab-dominal belts and similar articles, except where made in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of surgical

instruments.

(c) The assembling of stocking suspenders in conjunction with or in association with the manufacture of any of the above mentioned articles.

(d) All warehousing, packing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above mentioned articles.

PART IV.

The above proposed General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act, to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposal to vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 25th June, 1921. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Corset Trade Board, 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with

reasons, what is objected to.
