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Cadiz, October 29. N. S.

THere are now in this Bay two Spanish Men of War, who will sail with the first opportunity of Wind, to join the Spanish Armada which cruises off Cape St. Vincent. The last week arrived here a Vessel from Argiers with 400 Portuguese redeemed out of Slavery; They tell us, that the Forces of that Government which marched the last Summer against the Emperor of Morocco, were come back, after having defeated several Parties of his Troops, and made a great Booty of Prisoners and Cattle; and that the Dey of Argiers intends to return into the Dominions of Muly Ismael the next year with a greater Army. The Moores are still before Ceuta, but have all this while made so little progress in the Siege, that we do not apprehend the Place to be in any danger.

Vinice, Nov. 10. The Senate give out Commissions for new Levies to be made this Winter to augment their Forces in the Levant; and several Men of War are building, which will be ready for the Service of the next year. The News of the loss of the Popes Galley called the *St. Alexander*, is confirmed; she was cast away the 6th of the last month on the Coast of Calabria; and of 60 Soldiers with their Officers, and 200 Slaves that were on board her, few escaped. The last Letters from Dalmatia say, that the Morlaques have lately made several ExcurSIONS into the Turkish Territories with good success; and in the last they defeated one of the Enemies Parties; and took 200 Prisoners.

Milan, Nov. 9. The German Troops continue their march in small Bodies through the Territories of the Republick of Venice and the *Valtelline*. The Marquis de Leganez, our Governor, is gone to Turin; and the Prince of Commercy to Vienna.

Turin, Nov. 12. The Marquis de Leganez arrived here the 8th Instant from Milan; The Marschal de Catinat came hither the same day, having been met out of Town by the Duke of Savoy, and saluted by the Guns of the Citadel. The Rearmost of the French Troops passed the Mountains yesterday; all the Provisions and Ammunition they left in the Magazines here, are to be carried to the Citadel of Pignerol, and the Wagons and Mules, that are necessary for this purpose, are provided by the Dukes Order. The Magistrates of Pignerol have sent Deputies to his R. High. to desire that the Town may be enclosed with a slight Wall, but they have been answered, That this is not in his power to grant, and that they may make their application to the French King to see if they can obtain it. A Review is appointed of all the Cavalry in the Dukes Service at Villanova, and it's believed the greatest part will be disbanded.

Warsaw, Nov. 17. The Crown General Jablonowski, sent lately Deputies to the Confederated Forces, encamped near Lemberg, to propose to them all reasonable Satisfaction concerning their Arrears, and other Demands; But they refused to receive the Deputies in their Camp; and have chosen the Sieur Baranowski to be their General, and obliged him to take an Oath, that he will discharge that Trust faithfully; upon which the Crown General has sent to them to name a Place where Persons deputed on both sides, may meet to adjust their Pretensions. The Confederated Forces in Lithuania continue likewise together, and 'tis reported that they have defeated some Troops sent against them by Prince Sapieha their General. Several of the Senators labour very earnestly to reconcile the Misunderstanding between the Queen and Prince James, which first arose about dividing the late Kings Treasure, and has since been increased by new accidents, to such a degree, that the Prince does not visit her, tho' she was lately very ill. The French are not wanting to improve these Discords; and their Ambassador employs all his Credit as well as the Money he has received from France, to make an Interest for the Prince of Conti. The Tartars that made the late Irruption into the Country about Lemberg, are retired with their Booty to Caminice, but threaten to return very shortly, which occasions a great allarm on the Frontiers of this Kingdom. The Envoy from Moscow, now residing here, has acquainted the Primate, that the Czar, his Master, is resolved to continue the War against the Turks and Tartars, and that great preparations are making throughout his Dominions for this purpose.

Vienna, Nov. 14. There passes at present nothing of moment in Hungary; the Troops on both sides being gone to their Winter Quarters; The Turks have strong Garisons at Belgrade and Temeswar, the first consisting of 8000, and the other of 5500 men; They have likewise posted Troops along the Save; And to secure the Country against their ExcurSIONS during the Winter, the Imperialists have lodged a sufficient number of Forces near the Frontiers. Count Teckelej, who served the last Summer in the Grand Signior's Army, and stayed at Belgrade some time after the Sultans departure, is ordered to return to Constantinople. The Imperial Officers have Orders to hasten their Recruits: And the Emperor's Council meet almost every day to find out ways to raise Money for the Service of the War the next year. The Imperial Ministers and the Venetian Ambassador have had several Meetings with the Envoy of Moscow about renewing the Alliance against the Turks for 3 years. The Elector of Saxony designs in few days to return to Dresden.

Frankfort, Nov. 21. Here is to be a Meeting on the 5th of the next month of the Deputies of the Circles of Bavaria, Franconia, Suabia, the Upper and Lower-Rhine, and Westphalia, to consult together about augmenting their Forces which are to serve on the Rhine the next Summer, as also to keep a sufficient Army on foot, as well in time of Peace as War, to defend their Frontiers against any sudden surprize from France. The Landgrave of Hesse has left it to the Emperor to determine the Matter in dispute between his Troops and the Palatins concerning their Winter Quarters.

Paris, Nov. 23. There is yet no time set for the departure of Monsieur *Courtil* and Monsieur *Harley*, the French Plenipotentiaries. Monsieur de *Bourgeois*, Ambassador at the Court of *Denmark*, who had leave to come home some time ago, about his private Affairs, will pur-
 hence to-morrow on his return thither. The last Letters from *Brest* say, that the *Sieur de Pointy's* Squadron was ready to go to the Road. They write from *Dunkirk* of the 19th, that 3 French Privateers had brought in there a Packet Boat that was going for *England*; as also a great Merchant Ship of 50 Guns, bound from *Amsterdam* to *Cadix*; but the latter proves to be a Venetian. There is a Complaint made against the *Baillie de Noyelles*, who commands the French Gallies, for avoiding to fight the Spanish Gallies when he met them lately on the Coast of *Catalonia*; and he is coming to Court to justify himself. The two young Princes of *Poland, Alexander and Constantin*, are arrived here; They are at present *Incognito*; 'tis said, the French King intends to make them Knights of the *Holy Ghost*; and that they will buy Estates in *France*. This week was published here an Edict creating Officers, who are to be Appraisers and Sellers of all Movable Goods within all the Towns and Cities of this Kingdom, except *Paris*; and these Offices are to be sold, to make part of the Funds for the next year.

Brussels, Nov. 25. The Elector of *Barbaria* and the Elector of *Cologne* went hence this morning to *Antwerp*. The Duke of *Wirtemberg* is come hither to Review the Troops of this Garrison, and intends afterwards to visit all our Frontier Places. A Party of 200 French came the 21th Instant to *Hall*, but upon the motion of our Troops retired again without attempting any thing.

Hague, Nov. 27. N. S. The King of *Spain* has appointed Don *Quiras*, his Envoy Extraordinary residing here, and the Count de *Tilmont*, one of the Council of State at *Brussels*, to be his Plenipotentiaries at the Treaty of a General Peace. Monsieur *Calliere* has desired Passports for the French Plenipotentiaries, but has been answered, That the Preliminaries must be first adjusted, and the Place of Treaty agreed on. They write from *Madrid* of the 8th of this month, that the King of *Spain* had another Fit of his Ague the 31th past, and afterwards two other light Fits, but was very well again when these Letters came away; The Queen was perfectly recovered, and was present at the Celebration of the Kings Birth-day on the 6th of *November*: The same Letters say, that the King of *Spain* has resolved, and accordingly issued his Orders, to allow a free Exportation of Gold and Silver, both Coined and Uncoinced, upon paying for the same a Duty of 3 per Cent. 'Tis confirmed from *Portugal*, that Monsieur *Genes*, who endeavoured with several French Ships to enter into the *South-Sea*, was driven back by bad Weather, and forced to put into one of the Ports of *Brazil*, to repair the damage they had sustained.

Dublin, Nov. 14. The Parliament met here on the 12th of this month, and adjourned till the 16th day of *March* next. The *William* Packet-Boat coming from *Holyhead* with 2 Mails of the 3d and 5th Instant, and about 80 Passengers, among whom was Brigadier *Fitzpatrick*, and several other Officers whose Names we do not yet know, was on Tuesday last in the evening cast away in a violent Storm near a place called *Sarson* in this Bay, and all the Persons on board, except the Master and a Boy, are lost. At the same time another Vessel was driven on the *South-Bank*, where she quickly broke in pieces, and all on board were drowned. The *John* of *London*, Capt. *Ford* Commander, arrived at *Kinsale* the 19th Instant from *Plymouth*, to carry from thence 370 French Prisoners to *France*.

Falmouth, Nov. 16. Yesterday came in here His Majesty's Ship *Penderis* from *Plymouth*. The same day failed the *Spanish-Expedition* for *Corunna*; and the *St. George* Galley, *George King* Commander, for *Cadix*, but the Wind coming contrary, they were both put back the same evening.

Plymouth, Nov. 17. On the 15th Instant arrived in this Port a Venetian Ship, *Anthony Ventano* Master, laden with Currans from *Zant*. And yesterday was brought in a French Prize of 30 Guns, taken by 4 Dutch Merchant Ships in the *Streights Mouth*; she is laden with Fish from *Newfoundland*.

Weymouth, Nov. 18. The *Antegoa* of *Bristol*, bound from *Corke*; and the *Elizabeth* of *Corke*, both for *Ostend*; The *Pensylvania-Merchant* from *Pensylvania*; The *Speakers-Prize* from *Virginia*; and the *Antegoa* Frigate of and from *Antegoa*, bound to *London*, were on the 16th Instant by a violent Storm at *S. E.* put into our Road, and the last of them driven ashore and lost, but all the Seamen and Passengers saved. The rest of the Ships rid out the Storm that night, and the next day got safe into Harbour.

Hull, Nov. 18. We have had of late very Stormy Weather, but do not hear of any considerable loss on our Coast. Yesterday arrived here 12 Sail of Merchant Ships belonging to this place from *Amsterdam* under Convey of two Dutch Men of War, who are gone for *Swafsh*; and with them some Vessels for *Scotland*. There came in with these Ships a Vessel from *Hamburg*, who accidentally fell in with them; The said Vessel left 16 Sail of Merchant Ships the 16th Instant off *Tarmouth*, under Convey of Capt. *Robinson*, bound from *Hamburg* to *London*.

Kendall, Nov. 15. On Thursday last *William Fleming* Esq; was Elected one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of *Wiltshire*, in the place of *Sir John Louther*, Bar. now Lord Viscount *Lonsdale*, by the unanimous Choice of a great appearance of Freeholders.

Kensington, Nov. 19. This day the Right Honourable *Sir Joseph Williamson* was, by His Majesty's Command, Sworn One of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.
