

that part of the said Parish of Mansfield, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Lawrence, Mansfield, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Lawrence, Mansfield.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edwyn, Bishop of Southwell (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Lawrence, Mansfield, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees or dues to be received in respect of the publication of banns and of the solemnization or performance of marriages, churchings and burials should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Lawrence, Mansfield, being:—

"All that part of the Parish of Mansfield, in the County of Nottingham and in the Diocese of Southwell, which is bounded upon the east by the Extra-Parochial Place or Liberty known as Rufford Abbey, upon the north-east and upon the north by the Parish of Mansfield Woodhouse, both in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the west and upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Mansfield Woodhouse from the said Parish of Mansfield at the point where such boundary crosses the middle of the River Maun, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the River Maun, for a distance of 24 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the Bridge which carries Sandy Lane across the said river, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Sandy Lane for a distance of 14 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Gladstone Street, and extending thence first south-westward, then south-eastward and then again south-westward along the middle of Gladstone Street for a distance of 15½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Newgate Lane, and extending thence westward along the middle of Newgate Lane for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bowling Street, and extending thence first southward and then south-westward along the middle of Bowling Street for a distance of 7½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Frederick Street, and extending thence first south-eastward and then south-westward along the middle of Frederick Street for a distance of 4½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road known as Rock Hill, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Rock Hill and along the middle of the road leading to Southwell for a distance in all of 3 miles and 6 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Mansfield

from the said Extra-Parochial Place or Liberty known as Rufford Abbey."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Southwell.
