WHEREAS at Trianon, on the 4th day of June, 1920, a Treaty of Peace with Hungary (hereinafter referred to as "the Treaty") was signed on behalf of His Majesty:

And whereas it was provided in the Treaty that the property of nationals of the former Kingdom of Hungary within the territory or under the control of an Allied or Associated State might be constituted a pledge for enemy liabilities upon the conditions laid down in the Treaty:

And whereas by the *Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Act*, 1921, it was provided that His Majesty might make such appointments, establish such offices, make such Orders in Council, and do such things as appeared to him to be necessary for carrying out the Treaty, and for giving effect to any of the provisions thereof:

And whereas by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means, and by Decree

of His Highness the Sultan of Egypt, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction in Egypt:

And whereas there is now in Egypt certain property of nationals of the former Kingdom of Hungary under the control of His Majesty, and it is expedient to make provision for charging such property with the payment of the liabilities for which it may be constituted a pledge by the Treaty in the manner hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. All property, rights and interests in Egypt belonging to nationals of the former Kingdom of Hungary at the date when the Treaty comes into force (not being property, rights or interests acquired under any general licence issued by or on behalf of His Majesty) and the net proceeds of their sale, liquidation, or other dealings therewith, so far as such property, rights and interests or such net proceeds are vested in or otherwise under the control of the custodian of enemy property or other British authority under the Trading with the Enemy Acts or the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations issued from time to time by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief

the British Forces in Egypt, are hereby charged:—

(a) First, with payment of the amounts due in respect of claims by British nationals with regard to their property, rights and interests, including companies and associations in which they are interested in territory of the former Kingdom of Hungary, or debts owing to them by Hungarian nationals, and with payment of any compensation awarded by the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal or by an arbitrator appointed by that Tribunal in pursuance of paragraph (e) of Article 232 of the Treaty, and with payment of claims growing out of acts committed by the former Austro-Hungarian Government or by any Hungarian authorities since the 28th July, 1914, and before the 12th August, 1914.

(b) Secondly, with payment of the amounts due in respect of claims by British nationals with regard to their property, rights and interests in the territories of Germany, Austria, Bulgaria, and Turkey in so far as those claims are not otherwise satisfied.

Provided that any particular property, rights or interests so charged may at any time, if the High Commissioner thinks fit, be released from the charge so created.

2. In the application and enforcement of the charge created by this Order the claims of or debts owing to British nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt shall enjoy priority over the claims of or debts owing to other British nationals.

3. All decisions of the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal constituted under Section VI of Part X of the Treaty, if within the jurisdiction of that Tribunal, shall be final and conclusive, and binding on all courts.

4. For the purpose of enforcing the attendance of witnesses before the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal, whether sitting in Egypt or not, and compelling the production before the Tribunal of documents, the High Commissioner shall have power to issue orders which shall have the like effect as if the proceedings before the Tribunal were an action in the Supreme Court, and the order were a formal process issued by that Court in the due exercise of its jurisdiction, and shall be enforceable by that Court accordingly, and disobedience to any such order shall be punishable as contempt of court.

5. Sections IV, V and VI of Part X of the Treaty relating to property, rights and interests, to contracts, prescriptions and judgments, and to the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal, and all provisions of the said Treaty affecting or relating to the charge created by this Order shall have full force and effect as law.

6. The time at which the periods of prescription or limitation of right of action referred to in Article 235 of the Treaty shall begin again to run shall be at the expiration of ten months after the coming into force of the Treaty, and the period to be allowed within which presentation of negotiable instruments for acceptance or payment, and notice of non-acceptance or non-payment or protest may be made under Article 236, shall be ten months from the coming into force of the Treaty.

7. Rules made during the war by any recognised exchange or commercial association providing for the closure of contracts entered into before the war by an enemy, and any action taken thereunder are hereby confirmed, subject to the provisos contained in paragraph 4

(a) of the Annex to Section V of Part X of the Treaty.

8. The power under "The Egypt Order in Council, 1915," to make King's Regulations, shall extend to the issue of regulations for the purpose of enforcing the charge created by this Order, and for making such arrangements as may be required for establishing and assessing the claims and debts for the payment of which the property charged is rendered liable, and for the payment, in whole or in part, of the sums due.

9. In this Order the term "British nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt" means persons who are subject to "The Egypt Order in Council, 1915," and who are so resident or carrying on business.

10. Egyptian nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt shall share in the benefit of the charge created by this Order on the same terms as British nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt, provided that during the war such Egyptian nationals were treated by the former Austro-Hungarian Government as enemies, and that their property was subjected by the former Austro-Hungarian Government to exceptional war measures.

11. The *Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921*, shall not apply to Egypt, except so far as may be consistent with the provisions of this Order or of any Proclamation issued by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief the British Forces in Egypt, or with any rules or directions given thereunder.

12. This Order may be cited as "The Egypt (Treaty of Peace, Hungary) Order in Council, 1921," and shall be read as one with "The Egypt Order in Council, 1915."

13. This Order shall be deemed to have had effect as from the date when the Treaty of Peace came into force.

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 7th day of February, 1921, to approve of Sub-Lieutenants (including Acting Lieutenants) on the Retired and Emergency Lists of the Royal Navy being eligible, at our discretion, for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant on completion of two years' service after being

called out, including service prior to retirement or resignation, or on attaining three years' seniority, whichever is the earlier date.

"And whereas we consider that corresponding provision should be made for the promotion of Mates or Acting Lieutenants (ex Mates) and Mates (E) or Acting Engineer Lieutenants (ex Mates (E)) on both the Retired and Emergency Lists of the Royal Navy:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council to approve the Regulations contained in the attached Schedule.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

" SCHEDULE.

" ADVANCEMENT OF OFFICERS OF THE ROYAL NAVY ON THE RETIRED AND EMERGENCY LISTS.

"(I.) Mates and Acting Lieutenants (ex Mates) on the Retired or Emergency List to be eligible to be advanced to the rank of Lieutenant (confirmed) as from the dates on which they would have been due normally for that advancement on the Active List (*i.e.*, on attaining seniority as Mate varying between 2 years and 3 years, or somewhat over—according to the results of their examinations, service, &c.) and, in the case of Acting Lieutenants, who have not completed their courses for the rank of Lieutenant with their acting seniority, provided that, to be eligible for promotion before attaining three years' seniority as Mate, Officers must have

- (a) served not less than two years as Mate on the Active List,
- (b) obtained a Watchkeeping Certificate,
- (c) been recommended for promotion before retirement.

"(II.) Mates (E) on the Retired or Emergency List who were promoted under the normal Regulations to be eligible for promotion to the rank of Engineer Lieutenant as from the dates on which they would have been due normally for that advancement on the Active List (*i.e.*, on attaining between two and three years' seniority as Mate (E), provided that, to be eligible for this promotion before attaining three years' seniority as Mate (E), Officers must have

- (a) served not less than two years as Mate (E) on the Active List,
- (b) been recommended for promotion before retirement.

"(III.) Acting Engineer Lieutenants promoted to that rank from Mate (E) under the special War regulations laid down in King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, Appendix X, Part V, Section I, and placed on the Retired or Emergency List as Acting Engineer Lieutenants, to be eligible to be confirmed in the rank of Engineer Lieutenant, with their acting seniority, on completing one year's seniority in the rank of Acting Engineer Lieutenant."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by His late Majesty's Order in Council bearing date the 28th March, 1903, and subsequent Orders in Council, it is provided that certain Commissioned Warrant Officers, now styled Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank, and Warrant Officers shall be eligible for promotion to the rank or corresponding rank, of Lieutenant as a reward for long and zealous service, and that these Officers should be granted the rank or corresponding rank of Lieutenant-Commander on attaining eight years' seniority in the rank or corresponding rank of Lieutenant:

"And whereas we are of opinion that similar advancement should be open to Commissioned Wardmasters and Warrant Wardmasters, and that the establishment of Commissioned Wardmasters authorised by Your Majesty's Order in Council bearing date the 7th September, 1916, should be increased:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the arrangements shown in the annexed Schedule:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence therein."

" SCHEDULE.

"Commissioned Wardmasters to be eligible for promotion to the relative rank of Lieutenant with the title of Wardmaster Lieutenant.

"Wardmaster Lieutenants on attaining eight years' seniority as such to have the relative rank of Lieutenant-Commander with the title of Wardmaster Lieutenant-Commander.

" Pay.

"Pay of Wardmaster Lieutenants and Wardmaster Lieutenant-Commanders to be on the scales authorised for Lieutenants and Lieutenant-Commanders promoted from Warrant Rank (Non-Mechanical Branch).

" Retired Pay, &c.

"Retired Pay, Widows' Pensions and Compassionate Allowances for children to be on the scales and payable under the conditions authorised for Lieutenants and Lieutenant-Commanders promoted from Warrant Rank.

“ The establishment of Officers of the Sick Berth Branch to be as follows :—

- 1 Wardmaster Lieutenant.
- 4 Commissioned Wardmasters.
- 15 Warrant Wardmasters.

“ The above number of Commissioned Wardmasters to be temporary pending the operation of the rule under which deserving Warrant Officers are promoted to Commissioned Officer from Warrant Rank after 10 years' service as Warrant Officer.”

WHEREAS by paragraph (c) of sub-section (2) of Section 4 of the Scottish Board of Health Act, 1919, it is provided that His Majesty may by Order in Council transfer to the Scottish Board of Health any powers and duties in Scotland of any Government Department which appear to His Majesty to relate to

matters affecting or incidental to the health of the people;

And whereas by sub-section (4) of the said Section it is provided that His Majesty may by Order in Council make such incidental, consequential and supplemental provisions as may be necessary or expedient for the purpose of giving full effect to any transfer of powers or duties by or under that Section and may make such adaptations in the enactments relating to such powers and duties as may be necessary to make exercisable by the Board and the officers thereof the powers and duties so transferred;

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Scottish Board of Health (Factories and Workshops Transfer of Powers) Order, 1921.

(2) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

2.—(1) On and after the date of this Order the powers and duties of the Secretary of State under the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, so far as they relate to the supervision and enforcement of the provisions of the Sections of that Act set out in the Schedule to this Order, shall be transferred to the Scottish Board of Health.

(2) References to inspectors in the said Act shall, so far as relates to powers and duties conferred and imposed on inspectors with reference to the provisions of the Sections set out in the said Schedule, be deemed to be references to inspectors appointed by the Scottish Board of Health.

3. References to the Scottish Board of Health shall be substituted for references to the Secretary of State in sub-section (5) of Section 110 of the said Act, and in Section 120 of the said Act so far as that Section relates to proceedings for the enforcement of any of the provisions of the Sections set out in the said Schedule.

And whereas a majority of the whole Council of the County Borough of Salford did, on the 9th day of May, 1919, agree to petition, and the Council of the said Borough thereupon petitioned, His Majesty for the alteration of the boundaries of the Wards of the said Borough:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 30th day of May, 1919, to refer the Petition of the said Council to a Committee of His Privy Council:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 11th day of July, 1919, to approve the Report of the said Committee to the effect that, no Petition having been presented against a compliance with the prayer of the said Petition within the time limited by Statute in that behalf, it rested with the Secretary of State to appoint a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme in accordance with the provisions of the said Section 30 of The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882:

And whereas on the 29th day of June, 1920, the Right Honourable Edward Shortt, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did appoint Edward Henry Chapman, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for carrying into effect the prayer of the said Petition:

And whereas by Section 30 (5) of The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is provided that, in case of alteration of Wards, the Commissioner shall so apportion among the altered Wards the Councillors for those Wards as to provide for their continuing to represent as large a number as possible of their former constituents:

And whereas the said Commissioner has accordingly prepared the following Scheme, dated the 7th day of May, 1921:—

SCHEME FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING THE BOUNDARIES OF AND APPORTIONING THE COUNCILLORS AMONG THE WARDS OF THE COUNTY BOROUGH OF SALFORD.

**MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ACTS,
1882 AND 1893.**

County Borough of Salford.

“Whereas Her late Majesty Queen Victoria was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in Her by The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, to fix the number of wards into which the County Borough of Salford should be thenceforth divided, and to order and direct that the said County Borough should be divided into sixteen Wards, which Order was made on the ninth day of May, 1892:

“And whereas, on the twenty-third day of May, 1892, the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her said Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did, in pursuance of the thirtieth Section of the said Act, duly warrant and appoint Charles Neve Creswell, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, to be a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the

Boundaries of the Wards of the County Borough of Salford and for apportioning the Councillors among them, as in the said Act provided and directed.

“And whereas on the twenty-first day of June, 1892, the said Charles Neve Creswell did, in pursuance of the said Warrant of Appointment, thereby determine the boundaries of the said sixteen Wards into which the said County Borough should be divided and did number and name the said Wards and did, in further pursuance of the said Act and by virtue of the powers vested in him by the said Warrant of Appointment, thereby assign and apportion three Councillors to each and every of the said sixteen Wards.

“And whereas on the fifth day of August, 1892, Her said Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did approve the said Scheme of the said Commissioner and did order the same to be published in the London Gazette, and the said Scheme was so published accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 23rd day of June, 1921, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for effecting the union of two neighbouring Benefices, that is to say, the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Cuddington and the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Dinton both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Buckingham and in the Diocese of Oxford:

“ Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Hubert Murray, Bishop of Oxford, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the

union of the said two Benefices of Cuddington and Dinton duly made their report to the said Bishop of Oxford and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Oxford signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

“ And whereas we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

“ And whereas both of the said Benefices of Cuddington and Dinton are now full the Reverend James Percy Taylor being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Cuddington and the Reverend Edward Charles Stukeley being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Dinton:

“ Now, therefore, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England with the consent of the said Hubert Murray, Bishop of Oxford (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

“ 1. That the said Benefice of Cuddington and the said Benefice of Dinton shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Cuddington with Dinton,’ but the parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

“ 2. That if upon the day when an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant, the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith; and if the said Benefice of Dinton only shall be then vacant the said union shall also take effect forthwith if the Incumbent of the other of the said two Benefices shall consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of the said Benefice of Cuddington, and the then Incumbent of Dinton shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice; and if the said Benefice of Cuddington only shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Dinton; and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant, then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Dinton if the Incumbent at that time of the said Benefice of Cuddington shall have been instituted to Cuddington subsequently to the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or if instituted before that date shall consent to become the Incumbent of the United Benefice; but if he shall have been instituted to Cuddington before that date and shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of the Benefice of Cuddington following such avoidance of the Benefice of Dinton and the then Incumbent of Dinton shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

“ 3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Cuddington shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

“ 4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective patrons shall present or nominate

to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the first turn of every series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination shall belong to and be exercised by the patron of the said Benefice of Dinton and the second and third turns of every such series of three turns shall belong to and be exercised by the patrons of the said Benefice of Cuddington.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the patrons affected together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time so prescribed:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the Consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Oxford has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, against the said Scheme, or any part thereof, by any person who has made objection, as aforesaid, to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas neither of the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme is situate in a City or Municipal Borough:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme, and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Oxford.

pared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 23rd day of June, 1921, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for effecting the union of two neighbouring Benefices, that is to say the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Geldeston and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Stockton both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Norfolk and in the Diocese of Norwich:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Bertram, Bishop of Norwich, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Geldeston and Stockton duly made their report to the said Bishop of Norwich and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Norwich signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas the said Benefice of Geldeston is now full the Reverend Arthur Howard Colborne Edlin being the present Incumbent thereof and the said Benefice of Stockton is at present vacant:

"And whereas the said Arthur Howard Colborne Edlin has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Bertram, Bishop of Norwich (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Geldeston and the said Benefice of Stockton shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Geldeston with Stockton' but the parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect, and the said Arthur Howard Colborne Edlin if he is then Incumbent of the said Benefice of Geldeston shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Geldeston shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, the patron of the said Benefice of Stockton, having the right upon the

first presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate right of presentation, and the patron of the said Benefice of Geldeston having the right of presentation upon the second presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate turn thereafter.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the patrons affected together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas certain objections have been stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time so prescribed:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Norwich has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, against the said Scheme, or any part thereof, by any person who has made objection, as aforesaid, to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas neither of the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme is situate in a City or Municipal Borough:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme, and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act:

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Norwich.

The Governing Body of Shrewsbury School having, on the 8th day of March, 1921, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by the Public Schools Act, 1868, and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, made a Scheme (which was sealed on the 8th day of

August, 1921) in the terms appended hereto for further amending and altering the original Scheme (approved by Order in Council of the 12th day of February, 1876), for the removal of the said School from its former site, the said Scheme is hereby published in the London Gazette in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Act.

And notice is hereby given, that any person, body of persons, or body corporate, authorized in that behalf by the said Act, may, within two months after the publication of this notification, petition His Majesty in Council to withhold His approval from the whole or any part of the said Scheme.

SCHEME FOR FURTHER AMENDING AND ALTERING THE SCHEME APPROVED BY ORDER IN COUNCIL OF THE 12TH DAY OF FEBRUARY, 1876, FOR THE REMOVAL OF SHREWSBURY SCHOOL FROM ITS ACTUAL SITE.

Whereas by the Public Schools Act, 1868, 31 and 32 Vic., cap. 118, it is *inter alia* enacted as follows:—

Section 25. Any Scheme authorized to be made under this Act may contain all powers and provisions that may be thought expedient for carrying into effect its objects; and where any Scheme authorizes the purchase or acquisition of any lands there shall be deemed to be incorporated with such Scheme "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845," with the exception of the provisions relating to the purchase of lands otherwise than by agreement, and of the provisions relating to entry upon land, to intersected lands, and to the recovery of forfeitures, penalties and costs and of the provisions relating to access to the special Act.

By Section 26 it is provided (among other things) that the new Governing Body of Shrewsbury School may, if they deem it expedient, at any time after the passing of the Act, lay a Scheme before Her Majesty in Council for the removal of the School from its actual site to some other place, and may provide in such Scheme for the sale or mortgage of any property belonging to or held in trust for such School, and for its appropriation to building or other purposes, and for the purchase of other property and for the erection of new buildings on the property so purchased, and generally for all matters required to effect such removal in a convenient manner, to the same extent as if such Governing Body were the absolute owners of any property they might be dealing with under this section as purchasers, vendors or otherwise.

And whereas divers other Acts of Parliament have since been passed continuing and enlarging the powers conferred by the above mentioned Act; and in particular it was by the second section of the Public Schools Act, 1869, enacted that "Any Governing Body established for any of the Schools to which the said Act (meaning the said Public Schools Act, 1868) applies shall, as in the case of Westminster School, be a Body Corporate with perpetual succession and a Common Seal and with power to hold lands for the purposes of the School for which it is established without license of mortmain."

And whereas the Governing Body of Shrewsbury School did on the twenty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, propose (by virtue and in pursuance of the powers above mentioned) a Scheme for the removal of the said School in the terms

following (so far as material for the purposes of the now proposed Amending Scheme), that is to say:—

1. With a view to the removal of Shrewsbury School from its actual site the Governing Body may purchase the messuages, buildings and several pieces of land situate at Kingsland, near Shrewsbury, and more particularly described in the Schedule hereto (that is to say, in the Schedule to the Scheme now being recited), and delineated upon the map or plan thereof annexed hereto (that is to say, to the Scheme now being recited), and thereon coloured pink (which messuages and land are delineated on the plan annexed hereto and thereon coloured *pink*).

2. The Governing Body may appropriate the said pieces of land or such part thereof as they may deem necessary for the use of the School, and may either alter and adapt to the purposes of the School any of the existing buildings on the said pieces of land, or may pull down the existing buildings thereon, or any of them, and erect such new buildings thereon as they may deem requisite for the use of the School (including residences for the Masters), and may lay out any further part of the said land as a playground for the scholars or gardens for the Masters or any like purposes.

3. As soon as in the opinion of the Governing Body the new site should be ready the School shall be removed to such new site.

And after making provision for raising funds to defray the expenses of carrying the Scheme into effect (clause 5) and limiting the rate of interest at which money should be borrowed by the Governing Body on Mortgage (Clause 6) it was provided by Clause 9 that no person dealing with the Governing Body should be bound to enquire whether any disposition purporting to be made under the powers hereby conferred was in fact proper or authorized;

And whereas the said scheme (hereinafter referred to as "the original scheme") was duly laid before and approved and sanctioned by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria of Blessed Memory in Council on the 12th day of February, 1876.

And whereas the Governing Body, having in the year 1878 completed the purchase of the messuage, buildings and pieces of land described in the schedule to the original scheme, with the exception of a piece of land therein mentioned, and having removed the School to its new site, thereafter became convinced that, owing to the insufficient area of the land originally purchased and the increasing number of the Scholars, it was necessary to take any favourable opportunity which might occur of providing additional adjoining land for the purposes of the School, and accordingly the Governing Body purchased divers other lands adjacent to the lands mentioned in the schedule to the original scheme, and ultimately by an Order of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council, dated the 28th day of October, 1892, an Amending Scheme made by the Governing Body of the said School was duly sanctioned, by which Amending Scheme the original scheme was altered so as to be read and construed as though the lands so purchased as aforesaid (other than such parts as had been resold) and which lands other than as aforesaid were delineated upon the plan thereto annexed and thereon coloured pink and blue, and are delineated on the plan annexed

hereto, and therein coloured green, had been described in the said schedule to the original scheme and had been thereby authorized to be purchased.

And whereas in the year 1912 the late Right Honourable Henry de Vere, Baron Barnard, the then chairman of the Governing Body, purchased a piece of land containing 26,840 square yards and delineated on the plan annexed to the scheme next hereinafter recited, and thereon coloured pink, and delineated on the said plan annexed hereto and thereon coloured yellow, at the price of one thousand one hundred and seventy pounds, with a view of giving to the Governing Body the option of taking over the same upon the terms of repaying to him the said purchase money with interest and costs.

And whereas by a Deed dated the seventeenth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, the Governing Body took an assignment from one Edward Branthwaite Moser of a piece of leasehold land containing 2,865 square yards or thereabouts, delineated and coloured blue on the plan annexed to the amending scheme next hereinafter recited, and on the said plan annexed hereto, together with the house erected thereon by the said Edward Branthwaite Moser, and theretofore used as a boarding house for boys at the said school of which he was an Assistant Master.

And whereas by an Order of His Majesty King George V. in Council, dated the fourteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, an amending scheme made by the Governing Body of the said School was duly sanctioned, by which amending scheme the original scheme was altered so as to be read and construed as though (a) the said piece of freehold land which the said Baron Barnard had so purchased as aforesaid, and (b) the said piece of leasehold land and boarding house acquired by the Governing Body from the said Edward Branthwaite Moser as aforesaid had been respectively comprised in the schedule to the said original scheme, and delineated on the plan thereto annexed, and thereon coloured pink, and that the adoption by the Governing Body of the purchase and acquisition of the said freehold piece of land by the said Baron Barnard on the terms aforesaid, and the acquisition by the Governing Body of the said piece of leasehold land and boarding house on the terms aforesaid should be deemed to have been authorized by the said original scheme.

And whereas by an Indenture dated the twenty-third day of November, 1912, and made between the said Baron Barnard of the first part, Alfred Barnes Deakin and Benjamin Blower of the second part, and the Governing Body of the third part, the said piece of freehold land so purchased by the said Baron Barnard as aforesaid was duly conveyed by him to the Governing Body.

And whereas in the year 1920 it became necessary to provide further housing accommodation for the Assistant Masters of the said School and a site for an additional Boat-House, and accordingly by an agreement dated the 30th day of January, 1920, made between Gladys Mary Milnes of the one part, and the Governing Body of the other part, the said Gladys Mary Milnes agreed to sell and the Governing Body agreed to buy the messuage land and hereditaments described in the first schedule to the amending scheme next hereinafter recited and delineated and coloured

orange on the plan annexed thereto, and also on a plan annexed hereto, at the price of three thousand two hundred and fifty pounds, conditionally upon the Privy Council approving of an Amending Scheme authorizing the purchase of the said premises upon the terms of such agreement.

And whereas by an Indenture dated the eleventh day of September, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and made between the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Shrewsbury of the one part, and the Reverend Cyril Argentine Alington, the then Head Master of the School, Walter Dodsworth Haydon and Cuthbert William Mitford, Assistant Masters, of the said School (thereinafter and hereinafter in this recital called "the Lessees") of the other part, the piece or parcel of land described in the second schedule to the amending scheme next hereinafter recited and delineated on the plan annexed thereto and therein and on the plan annexed hereto coloured brown, was demised unto the lessees as joint tenants for the term of ninety-nine years from the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, at the yearly rent of six pounds ten shillings, and subject to the covenants by the lessees and conditions therein contained, including a covenant that the lessees would within three years after the execution of the said lease erect and complete upon the said piece of land a messuage with suitable outbuildings and other conveniences of not less than the aggregate yearly value of sixty pounds at least, exclusive of the ground rent thereby reserved.

And whereas the said Cyril Argentine Alington, Walter Dodsworth Haydon and Cuthbert William Mitford, in accordance with the said covenants in that behalf, erected a house upon the said piece of land suitable for the occupation of unmarried Assistant Masters at the said School at a cost in the whole of £2,330 4s. 5d., which was eventually defrayed out of funds in which the Governing Body were interested.

And whereas by an Indenture dated the ninth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, and made between the said Cyril Argentine Alington, Walter Dodsworth Haydon and Cuthbert William Mitford of the one part, and the Governing Body of the other part, it was agreed and declared that the said Cyril Argentine Alington, Walter Dodsworth Haydon and Cuthbert William Mitford should stand possessed of the said leasehold premises for all the residue of the term, estate and interest granted therein by the said lease upon trust for the Governing Body.

And whereas ultimately by an Order of His Majesty King George V. in Council, dated the twenty-second day of July, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, an amending scheme made by the Governing Body of the said School, and sealed on the twenty-first day of April, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, was duly sanctioned, by which amending scheme the original scheme was altered as follows, that is to say:—

1. That the original scheme should throughout be read and construed as though

(a) The messuage, land and hereditaments described in the first schedule thereto and delineated and coloured orange on the plan annexed thereto and on the plan annexed hereto.

(b) And the said leasehold premises described in the said second schedule thereto

and delineated and coloured brown on the said plan annexed thereto and on the said plan annexed hereto had been respectively described in the schedule to the said original scheme and delineated on the plan thereto annexed and thereon coloured pink, and in particular that the said agreement of the 30th day of January, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, and the carrying into effect thereof and the adoption by the said Indenture of the ninth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, by the Governing Body of the acquisition by the said Cyril Argentine Alington, Walter Dodsworth Haydon and Cuthbert William Mitford of the said lease of the eleventh day of September, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and the erection of the messuage thereon in manner aforesaid and the carrying into effect of the said adoption and Indenture by assignment of the said leasehold premises to the Governing Body might respectively be deemed to have been authorized by the said original scheme.

2. That the said original scheme should be read and construed as though it had by Clause 6 provided that no moneys should be borrowed by the Governing Body on mortgage of any part of the property of the School to be effected under Article 5 at any higher rate of interest than 6 per cent. or such higher rate as the current bank rate for the time being might be.

And whereas by a deed dated the eighteenth day of February, 1921, and made between the said Cyril Argentine Alington, Walter Dodsworth Haydon and Cuthbert William Mitford (thereinafter and in this recital called the Trustees) of the one part and the Governing Body of the other part, the Governing Body took an assignment from the Trustees of the leasehold premises comprised in the said Indenture of Lease dated the eleventh day of September, one thousand nine hundred and eleven.

And whereas, owing to the rapid development of the School and the difficulty of obtaining suitable accommodation for the boys in the School, it has for some time past been necessary for the Governing Body to take any favourable opportunity which might occur of acquiring additional adjoining land for the purposes of the School.

And whereas in the month of June, one thousand nine hundred and twenty the freehold messuages, land and hereditaments described in the first schedule hereto were on offer for sale, and the Governing Body were advised that it was very desirable to acquire the same on account both of their position and of the pressing need for further accommodation for boys in the School in view of the following circumstances; it was known that the Reverend William S. Ingrams, who was the owner of a leasehold house called No. 7, The Schools, which was occupied by him as a boarding house for boys at the School, would shortly retire, and that from the date of his retirement (which actually took place on the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-one) that house would cease to be available for that purpose.

Therefore it became necessary to provide other accommodation for the boys (some twenty-seven in number) who were housed at No. 7, The Schools.

The Governing Body, however, were averse to increasing their capital indebtedness by borrowing money on mortgage for the purchase of

the said premises described in the said first schedule hereto, whereupon the Venerable Henry Edward James Bevan, Archdeacon of Middlesex; Charles Richard Nairne Routh, of Christ Church, Oxford; and Harold Bevir, of Devereux Chambers, Temple, London, being desirous of benefiting the School in which they had been educated arranged to purchase the said premises for five thousand pounds, and to make over the same to the Governing Body in consideration of a yearly rent charge of three hundred pounds for a period of twenty years as from the nineteenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and twenty.

And whereas accordingly by an Indenture dated the nineteenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, and made between William Everall of the one part and the said Henry Edward James Bevan, Charles Richard Nairne Routh and Harold Bevir of the other part in consideration of the sum of five thousand pounds paid by the said Henry Edward James Bevan, Charles Richard Nairne Routh and Harold Bevir to the said William Everall the said premises described in the first schedule hereto were granted by the said William Everall unto and to the use of the said Henry Edward James Bevan, Charles Richard Nairne Routh and Harold Bevir, their heirs and assigns as joint tenants subject to the existing rights of the Corporation of Shrewsbury in connection with a tank on and a pipe conveying conduit water through part of the said premises.

And whereas it is considered by the Governors that the aforesaid arrangement for acquiring the said premises described in the said first schedule hereto in consideration of an annual rent charge of three hundred pounds for twenty years is advantageous to the School, as it will render it unnecessary to borrow the purchase money on mortgage, and a considerable portion of the said rent charge will be recouped by the rent which will accrue from letting the said premises to the Head Master for use as a boarding-house for boys at the School.

And whereas by an agreement dated the twenty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, and made between George Butler Lloyd of the one part and the Governing Body of the other part the said George Butler Lloyd agreed to sell and the Governing Body agreed to buy the leasehold hereditaments described in the second schedule hereto at the price of three thousand one hundred and fifty pounds, which was paid by the Governing Body to the said George Butler Lloyd on or before the signing of such agreement; and it was by the agreement now in recital provided that the Governing Body should be entitled to the possession or receipt of the rents and profits of the said leasehold premises as from the signing of such agreement as from which date the said leasehold premises should be at the risk of the Governing Body and all outgoings should be borne and discharged by them.

And whereas in due course after the execution of the lastly hereinbefore recited agreement the Governing Body entered into possession of the said leasehold premises and are now in possession or receipt of the rents and profits thereof.

And whereas the said agreement of the twenty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, was entered into by the Governing Body under the following circumstances. The said leasehold premises were

at the date of such agreement in the occupation of Mr. Walter Henry Moore, an assistant master at the School, for the residue of a term of fourteen years, which expired on the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-one.

The said George Butler Lloyd was under the necessity of selling the same premises and the said Walter Henry Moore was unwilling or unable to purchase the same, and there was no other house in the neighbourhood which would accommodate the boys (some thirty-three in number) housed at the said leasehold premises; accordingly the Governing Body were practically obliged to purchase the said leasehold premises. The said George Butler Lloyd was unwilling to accept three thousand one hundred and fifty pounds for the said premises (which in the opinion of the Governing Body was a moderate price) unless the same was paid on the signing of the contract. Under the circumstances the said George Butler Lloyd is a trustee of the said leasehold premises for the Governing Body.

And whereas it is apprehended that the Governing Body had not power under the original scheme or the said amending schemes to acquire the said freehold premises described in the said first schedule hereto or the said leasehold premises described in the said second schedule hereto.

And whereas it was impracticable to include the now proposed scheme in the said amending scheme, which was sealed on the twenty-first day of April, one thousand nine hundred and twenty.

The Governing Body of Shrewsbury School do hereby propose, by virtue of and in pursuance of the powers above mentioned, to alter the original scheme as follows (that is to say):—

1. The original scheme shall throughout be read and construed as though

(a) The freehold messuages, land and hereditaments described in the first schedule hereto.

(b) And the said leasehold premises described in the said second schedule hereto had been respectively described in the schedule to the said original Scheme and delineated on the plan thereto annexed and thereon coloured pink, and in particular that the Governing Body may be authorized to acquire the said freehold premises described in the said first schedule hereto, in consideration of a yearly rent charge of three hundred pounds for twenty years from the nineteenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, or on such other terms as may be agreed upon between the said Henry Edward James Bevan, Charles Richard Nairne Routh, and Harold Bevir, or the survivors or survivor of them, or other the persons for the time being entitled to or having power to convey the said freehold premises and the Governing Body, and that the said agreement of the twenty-first of December, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, and the carrying into effect thereof may be deemed to have been authorized by the said original scheme.

The FIRST SCHEDULE above referred to:

First, all that messuage or dwelling-house known as "Ridgemount," with the building, lands and hereditaments situate at Kingsland, in the parish of Meole Brace, in the county of

LICENSING RULES, 1921.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by section twelve of the Licensing Act, 1921 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), I hereby make the following Rules with respect to the procedure of licensing justices in the exercise of the powers conferred upon them under Part I of the Act:—

1. These Rules may be cited as the Licensing Rules, 1921.

2. The powers exercisable by licensing justices under the Act are:—

(a) The power of making orders under sections 1 (1) (b) of the Act.

(b) The power of making orders under sections 1 (2) and 2 (2) of the Act.

(c) The power of granting certificates under section 3 (2) of the Act.

3. These powers are ordinarily exercisable by licensing justices at their general annual licensing meeting, but they are exercisable also at any transfer sessions held between the passing of the Act and the general annual licensing meeting in 1922.

4. Where it is intended to consider any proposal to make or vary any order referred to in paragraphs (a) or (b) of rule 2, the clerk to the justices shall cause a notice thereof in Form I as set out in the schedule to these rules, or a form to the like effect, to be published in two local newspapers circulating in the licensing district, and, if the justices think fit, in such further manner as they may direct.

5. Upon the consideration of any proposal referred to in the preceding rule, the justices shall take such steps as seem to them fit for the purpose of ascertaining local opinion with respect to the matter in hand, and shall allow any person to address them who appears to them to be qualified to give expression to any such opinion.

6. The certificate referred to in paragraph (c) of Rule 2 shall not be granted unless the applicant for the certificate has, one week at least before the meeting or sessions at which the application is made, sent to the superintendent of police of the district and to the clerk to the licensing justices notice of his intention to make the application. The notice shall be signed by the applicant or by his authorised agent, and shall state the address of the licensed premises or club in respect of which

the application is made. The notice to the superintendent may specify the date (not being less than fourteen days later) on which, if a certificate is granted, the applicant intends to begin to avail himself of the provisions of section 3 of the Act, and where a date is so specified the notice will, if a certificate is granted, be sufficient compliance with the provisions of that section requiring notice to be given to the superintendent of the police.

The justices shall satisfy themselves in such manner as they think fit as to whether the arrangement of the premises and the nature of the business there carried on are such as to justify the grant of a certificate, having regard to the provisions of the said section 3.

7. If any question arises as to the withdrawal of any such certificate, notice in writing may be served on the holder of the certificate, not less than seven days before the commencement of the general annual licensing meeting; and where such notice has been served the justices shall consider whether the certificate shall be withdrawn, and in any such case the procedure before the justices shall be the same, *mutatis mutandis*, as in the case of opposition to the renewal of a licence, and the provisions of the Licensing (Consolidation) Act, 1910, in relation to such procedure shall apply accordingly, with the necessary modifications.

8. Any orders or certificates made or granted under the Act and these rules shall be in the appropriate form set out in the schedule to these rules, or in a form to the like effect. Any orders made by justices under the Act and these rules shall be published in the manner prescribed by Rule 4 hereof.

9. Subject as aforesaid, the powers of justices under the Act at any meeting or sessions shall be exercised in accordance with the procedure ordinarily adopted with respect to other business transacted thereat, and any provisions of the Licensing (Consolidation) Act, 1910, in relation to such procedure shall apply accordingly.

And whereas as regards certain of the said applications, patents have, in pursuance of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1916, been duly granted to the Custodian:

And whereas the expression "vested patent" as hereinafter used means such interest, share, rights or title, in, of or to a British patent as may, by reason or on account of the late war between the United Kingdom and Hungary, have been so vested in or granted to the Custodian as aforesaid, and the expression "vested application" as hereinafter used, means such benefit and rights of or in respect of any application for the grant of a British patent as may, by reason or on account of the late war, have been so vested in the Custodian as aforesaid:

And whereas it is expedient that such Order or Orders and directions as are hereinafter contained shall be made and given in regard to vested patents and vested applications:

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Section 5 (1) of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914, and/or the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921, and of all other powers (if any) them hereunto enabling, do hereby order and direct as follows:

1. (i) Subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, the Custodian shall forthwith divest himself of the vested patents and of the vested applications in favour, as the case may be, of the respective persons who were at the commencement of the late war between the United Kingdom and Hungary, or would but for such war, and the relative Vesting Orders now be entitled thereto.

Provided always that if by any Order made under the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Acts, or any of them, which may affect any vested patent or vested application, any condition was imposed upon the Custodian which might operate so as to prohibit him from dealing with such patent or application, the prohibiting condition shall be and stand discharged upon the Board of Trade certifying to that effect, but so nevertheless that such divesting as aforesaid shall not take effect as regards such patent or application unless and until the Board of Trade shall so certify:

2. Subject to the provisions of this Order dealings in regard to a restored patent are permitted between British nationals and Hungarian nationals (as respectively defined by the said Treaty of Peace Order).

3. An assignment or assurance *inter vivos* of a restored patent or a restored application shall not be made nor shall any licence be granted under a restored patent except after notice to and with the consent of the Board of Trade, and any such purporting assignment or assurance *inter vivos* or any such purporting licence which may be made or granted except after such notice and with such consent shall be void and of no effect. And any devolution of a restored patent or of a restored application otherwise than by an assignment or assurance *inter vivos* shall not be operative unless and until assented to by the Board of Trade.

4. A restored patent shall remain and be subject to any licence under or in respect thereof which may have been granted by the Board of Trade under the Patents, Designs and Trade Marks (Temporary Rules) Acts, 1914 (a), or by the Custodian under Section 5 (1) of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914, and any such licence shall with the additional rights, powers and privileges next hereinafter conferred upon the Licensee be and remain as valid and effectual as if this Order had not been made:

Provided always that, in addition to any other rights, privileges or powers to which he may be entitled, the Licensee exclusive or otherwise, as the case may be, shall be deemed to have and shall have all the rights, privileges and powers of such a Licensee under the provisions of Section 1 of the Patents and Designs Act, 1919 (b):

Provided further that all powers which by or under any such licence as aforesaid may have been given to or vested in the Board of Trade or the Custodian shall as regards any powers given to or vested in the Custodian be and be deemed to have been transferred to the Board of Trade, and as to all such powers whether given to or vested in the Board of Trade or given to or vested in the Custodian shall be and remain exercisable by the Board of Trade.

5. The Board of Trade have and shall continue to have power upon the application of any person to grant to or in favour of the applicant a compulsory licence under any restored patent upon such terms as to Royalty or otherwise as may be thought fit (a) if in the opinion of the Board of Trade it is in the public interest that such licence shall be granted, or (b) if the Patentee shall refuse to grant to the applicant a licence upon reasonable terms. And for the purpose of and in connection with the exercise of such power the Board of Trade shall have all the powers of the Comptroller of Patents, Trade Marks and Designs (hereinafter called the Comptroller) under the Patents and Designs Act, 1919, in a case in which abuse of the monopoly rights has been established.

6. The Board of Trade shall, as regards any licence which has been or may be granted under any restored patent, whether the licence is granted as mentioned in Clause 4 hereof or as mentioned in Clause 5 hereof, have power upon the application of the Licensee or of the Patentee to make such revisions or amendments in the licence as may be thought fit whether as regards the Royalty payable thereunder or otherwise, and any such revision or amendment may consist of or include a provision which will preclude the Patentee (a) from importing into the United Kingdom any goods the importation of which would, if effected by a person other than the Patentee, be an infringement of the patent, and/or (b) from working or using the patented invention in the United Kingdom.

7. Notwithstanding anything herein contained, the Board of Trade shall, as regards any restored patent or restored application, have power either without or upon the application of any person interested to expropriate, take over or sell any such patent or the patent rights under any such application on such terms as to indemnity purchase, consideration or otherwise as may be determined by a special Tribunal to be nominated by the Lord Chancellor for the time being, but so that the President or Chairman of such Tribunal shall be a high judicial officer or a barrister of not less than ten years' standing, and in such cases the Board of Trade shall be deemed to have all the powers of the patentee or proprietor, and may make a good title to any transfer, licence or other assurance, provided always that the power hereby conferred shall not be exercised unless in the opinion of the Board of Trade the exercise thereof is necessary for the National Defence or in the public interest or for securing the due fulfilment of all the obligations undertaken by Hungary in the Treaty of Peace.

8. All Royalties and/or other monies which but for this provision would by virtue of anything done under or in pursuance of any provision contained in this Order be payable to a Hungarian National shall be divided and paid as follows, namely:—

(a) in the case of voluntary dealings—75 per cent. of such Royalties and/or other monies shall be paid to the Administrator under the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921, for the purposes of the Office of such Administrator and the remaining 25 per cent. thereof shall be paid to the other party or parties who may be concerned;

(b) in every other case the whole of such Royalties and/or other monies shall be paid to the Administrator under the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921, for the purposes of the Office of such Administrator.

Provided always that any Royalties under any such licence as is mentioned in Clause 4 hereof which have accrued prior to the date upon which the patent shall have become a restored patent or which may thereafter accrue shall be retained by or paid to the Custodian as the case may be.

9. The conditions imposed by and other provisions contained in Clauses 3 to 8 of this Order, upon or in regard to restored patents and restored applications shall not, except as hereafter mentioned, apply as regards vested patents or vested applications of which the Custodian shall have divested himself under the

directions contained in Clause 1 (i) hereof in favour of persons who, by or by virtue of or in pursuance of the Treaty of Peace have ceased to be Hungarian Nationals; provided nevertheless that as regards such patents as last mentioned:—

(i.) The Patents shall remain and be subject to any licence under or in respect thereof which may have been granted by the Board of Trade under the Patents, Designs and Trade Marks (Temporary Rules) Acts, 1914, or by the Custodian under Section 5 (1) of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914, and any such licence shall be and remain as valid and effectual as if this Order had not been made.

(ii.) The Board of Trade shall as regards any licence which has been granted as aforesaid under the patent, have power upon the application of the Licensee or of the patentee to make such revisions or amendments in the Licence as may be thought fit, whether as regards the Royalty payable thereunder or otherwise.

10. Any application to be made under any provision herein contained shall be made to the Comptroller.

11. The Board of Trade may from time to time make such rules as may be necessary or expedient for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Order, and by any such rules may regulate the procedure to be followed, and may prescribe the payment of fees and fix the amount thereof, and any such rules whilst in force shall be of the same effect as if the same were contained in this Order.

12. This Order shall not nor shall anything herein contained apply to any patent or application for the grant of a patent which has been effectually dealt with in or for the purpose of the liquidation of any business or company as regards which a Winding-up Order has been made under or in pursuance of the Trading with the Enemy Acts, 1914 to 1918, or any of them.

13. The Board of Trade may at any time revoke or vary this Order and any provisions herein contained as well as any rules made under Clause 11 hereof.

Notwithstanding anything herein contained the Board of Trade shall, as regards any restored copyright, have power either without or upon the application of any person interested to expropriate, take over or sell any such copyright on such terms as to indemnity, purchase consideration or otherwise as may be determined by a special Tribunal to be nominated by the Lord Chancellor for the time being, but so that the President or Chairman of such Tribunal shall be a high judicial officer or a barrister of not less than ten years' standing, and in such case the Board of Trade shall be deemed to have all the powers of the owner of the copyright and may make a good title to any transfer licence or other assurance provided always that the power hereby conferred shall not be exercised unless in the opinion of the Board of Trade the exercise thereof is necessary for the National Defence or in the public interest or for securing the due fulfilment of all the obligations undertaken by Hungary in the Treaty of Peace.

8. All Royalties and/or other monies which but for this provision would by virtue of anything done under or in pursuance of any provision contained in this Order be payable to a Hungarian national shall be divided and paid as follows, namely:—

PROPOSAL TO VARY GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES, PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES AND OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under that Act, and the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, for the branches of the trade covered by the Trade Boards (Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving) Order, 1913, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they PROPOSE TO VARY the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice F. (5) dated 30th July, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 28th July, 1920, the Variations proposed being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on the days allowed as holidays under Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—In lieu of the Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Trade Board's Notice F. (5), dated 30th July, 1920, the proposed Overtime Rates for Male and Female workers to apply in substitution for the minimum rates which would otherwise be applicable in respect of all hours worked by Male and Female workers in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

(a) For Male and Female Workers employed on Time-Work:—

(1) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and the holidays specified above the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter Times the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(2) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and the holidays specified above, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half Times the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, *i.e.*, Time-and-Half.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and the days allowed as holidays under Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, *i.e.*, Double Time.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter Times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (2) and (3) of Sub-paragraph (a) of this Section.

(b) For Male and Female Workers employed on Piece-Work:—

1.—(1) Male Workers of 24 years of age and over;

(2) Female Workers of 24 years of age and over in the classes specified in Section I (b)

of Part I of the Schedule to this Notice; and

(3) All other Female Workers of 18 years of age and over:—

Who are employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed, One-Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed or the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-section (a) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half or Double Time respectively.

II.—(1) Male Workers under 24 years of age;

(2) Female Workers under 24 years of age in the classes specified in Section I (b) of Part I of the Schedule to this Notice; and

(3) All other Female Workers under 18 years of age:

Who are employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate proposed, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed or the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-Section (a) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half, or Double Time respectively.

SECTION III.—Notwithstanding anything contained in Sections I and II of this Part of this Notice:—

(1) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.

(2) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week on which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

PART IV.

The above Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the Trade specified in the Trade Board's (Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving) Order, 1913, and set out in Part IV of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice F. (5) dated 30th July, 1920.

NOTE.—The employment of Female Workers, Young Persons and Children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for that branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates, Guaranteed Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for all Female Workers employed in Great Britain, excluding the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands, set out in their Notice dated 30th May, 1921, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 27th May, 1921, and to Vary the Overtime Rates for Female Workers employed in the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands, set out in their Notice dated 4th November, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 2nd November, 1920, the proposed Variations being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

This Notice is issued with the Consent of the Minister of Labour

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

*Female Workers Employed in Great Britain
other than those specified in Part II.*

SECTION I.—Proposed Variation of General Minimum Time-Rates for Female Workers other than those employed in the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands.

Workers under 15 years of age, from 13s. to 12s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 3d. per hour.

Proposed Variations.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, from 17s. to 16s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 4d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, from 22s. to 20s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 5d. per hour.

(b) The Proposed Minimum Rate for Workers of 18 years of age and over who have had less than 12 months' experience in the branches of trade specified in paragraph (a) above shall be:—

Proposed Variations.

During the period of employment required to complete the 1st Six Months of such experience, from 26s. to 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6½d. per hour.

During the period of employment required to complete the 2nd Six Months of such experience, from 29s. to 27s. 6d. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6¾d. per hour.

SECTION II.—Proposed Variation of Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Female Workers other than those employed in the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands.

Proposed Variations.

Female Workers (all ages), from 9½d. to 9d. per hour.

SECTION III.—Proposed Variation of Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-Workers other than those employed in the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands.

Workers under 15 years of age, from 12s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 3d. per hour.*

Workers of 18 years of age and over, from 28s. to 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6½d. per hour.

(a) The Proposed Minimum Rates for Workers of 16 and under 18 years of age who have had less than six months' experience in the branches of trade specified in paragraph (a) of the proviso to Section I above shall be:—

Proposed Variations.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, from 17s. to 16s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 4d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, from 21s. to 20s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 5d. per hour.

(b) The Proposed Minimum Rate for Workers of 18 years of age and over who have had less than 12 months' experience in the branches of trade specified in paragraph (a) of the proviso to Section I above shall be:—

During the period of employment required to complete the 1st Six Months of such experience, from 26s. to 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6½d. per hour.

During the period of employment required to complete the 2nd Six Months of such experience, from 28s. to 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 6½d. per hour.

SECTION IV.—Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for Time-Workers employed in Great Britain.

(I) The Trade Board have declared, in accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	48 hours.
On Saturday	5 „

Provided that:—

All hours worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

(II) The Proposed Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a female worker employed on time work in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

(a) For all hours worked in excess of 5 on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, for the first two hours, and One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half, thereafter, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(b) For all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(c) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours

and Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-sections (a) and (b) of this Section.

(d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece-workers.

Provided that, where, in the case of workers to whom the Shops Act applies, the day which under that Act constitutes the weekly short day (half holiday) is a day other than Saturday, and in the case of other workers another day is substituted for Saturday, under the provisions of Section 43 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the above provisions shall apply as though such half holiday or short day were substituted for Saturday and Saturday were substituted for such half holiday or short day.

NOTE.—The hours which women, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART II.

Female Workers Specially Employed for Emergency Work, or whose Employment is of a Casual Nature.

SECTION I.—Proposed Variation of General Minimum Time-Rates for Female Workers other than those employed in the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands:—

(c) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours

and Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-section (b) of this Section.

(d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece-Workers.

Provided that, where, in the case of workers to whom the Shops Act applies, the day which under that Act constitutes the weekly short day (half holiday) is a day other than Saturday, and in the case of other workers another day is substituted for Saturday, under the provisions of Section 43 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the above provisions shall apply as though such half holiday or short day were substituted for Saturday and Saturday were substituted for such half holiday or short day.

NOTE.—The hours which women, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART III.

The proposed Minimum Rates set out in this Notice shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Female Workers employed in the areas and of the classes specified in Parts I and II of this Schedule in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919 (that is to say, the laundering of articles of every description and all processes and operations incidental thereto performed by way of trade or for the purpose of gain), as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, by virtue of which all processes of laundering and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles specified in the Appendices to the three last mentioned Orders are excluded from the scope of the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919.

No variation is proposed in the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Guaranteed Time-Rates at present effective for Female Workers employed in the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands, which are set out in the Trade Board's Notice W. (5), dated 4th November, 1920.

by a licence in the Form F set forth in the First Schedule to the said Order of 1908, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the county of Suffolk, and the following conditions, which shall be specified in the licence, are complied with:—

(i) The swine shall be moved to the place of destination specified in the licence and not elsewhere, and shall be there detained and kept separate from all other swine for twenty-eight days, unless they are slaughtered on such premises before the expiration of that period, or are moved under and in accordance with the conditions of a licence, in the Form C set forth in the said First Schedule, to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse in the same Scheduled Area.

(ii) The swine shall be moved by the nearest available route without unnecessary delay, and during the movement shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all swine not being moved with a licence under this Order.

(iii) After completion of the movement the licence shall forthwith be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest police-station in the same district by the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing such movement.

2. A copy of a licence issued under this Order shall be sent by the Inspector granting the same to the Local Authority of the district in which the place of destination specified in the licence is situate.

3. A licence under this Order shall for the purposes of the above-mentioned Orders be treated as a licence under those Orders.
