“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions or other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an officer, Seaman or Marine therein shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas we consider that a special

allowance should be payable to Naval ratings required to be available for service in aircraft working with Your Majesty's Navy:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction, as from the 9th September, 1921, payment to Telegraphist ratings of Your Majesty's Navy employed as Aerial Gunners and Assistant Observers of allowances of 1s. a day during preliminary training and of 2s. a day continuously thereafter whilst detailed for aerial duties.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, on the 30th day of November, 1882, made an Order in Council entitled "The Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1882":

And whereas His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, on the 4th day of July, 1908, made an Order in Council entitled "The Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1908":

And whereas it is expedient to amend the same:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1921, and where not inconsistent therewith shall be read as one with the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1882, the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1883, the Cyprus Courts of Justice Amendment Order, 1902, the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1908, the Cyprus Courts of Justice Amendment Order, 1909, the Cyprus Courts of Justice Amendment Order, 1910, and the Cyprus Courts of Justice Amendment Order, 1917, and the said Orders and this Order may be cited together as the Cyprus Courts of Justice Orders, 1882 to 1921.

2. Clause 3 of the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1882, shall be construed and read as if the following definition were therein substituted for the definition of "English Law":—

"English Law" shall mean the Common Law, the Rules of Equity, and the statutes of general application, which were in force in England on the 5th November, 1914, save in so far as other provision has been made or shall be made by Cyprus Statute Law.

3. Clause 28 of the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1882, as amended by the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1908, is hereby amended as follows:—

(1) Sub-clause (1) of the said clause shall be read as if £10 were inserted throughout as the limit of value instead of the sums of £5 and £2 mentioned therein.

(2) The last paragraph of sub-clause (1) of the said clause shall be read as if £20 were inserted therein instead of £10.

(3) The first proviso to sub-clause (2) of the said clause shall be read as if "£20 instead of £10" were inserted therein instead of "£10 instead of £2."

4. Sub-clause (b), (c) and (d) and the proviso to sub-clause (e) of clause 48 of the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1882, as amended by the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1908, and the Schedules referred to therein are hereby repealed without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder and the said clause shall henceforth be read as if the following were inserted as sub-clause (b) thereof:—

(b) If a complaint is brought before a Magisterial Court constituted as aforesaid of an offence committed within the local jurisdiction of the Court being one of the offences following, namely:—

(i) Wilfully receiving or taking the control and disposition of property not being of the value of over ten pounds knowing it to have been stolen;

(ii) Any offence under any Post Office, Customs, Excise, or other Revenue Law where the fixed or maximum fine does not exceed ten pounds, or with the consent of the Crown where the fixed or maximum fine exceeds ten pounds;

(iii) Any other offence punishable with imprisonment not exceeding three years or a fine or both if there is no question of compensation or if the amount for which the guilty person would be liable for compensation does not exceed ten pounds;

the Court, if it think it expedient so to do, having regard to all the circumstances of the case, and if the accused consents to the case being tried summarily by the Court may deal summarily with the offence and adjudge the accused, if found guilty of the offence, to be imprisoned with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding six months, and may in addition thereto or instead thereof impose a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

5. Clause 207 of the Cyprus Courts of Justice Order, 1882, shall henceforth be read and take effect as if the following proviso had been added thereto:—

Provided also that in any Cypriot action in respect of money goods or other property movable or immovable or for damages of the value or to an amount not exceeding fifty pounds the President or one of the Ordinary Judges shall have all the powers of the full Court for the purpose of hearing and determining the same.

6. This Order shall come into force on and from a day to be appointed in that behalf by the High Commissioner, which shall be notified by Proclamation to be published in the Cyprus Gazette.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, and of the Act of the 61st and 62nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 23, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 28th day of July, 1921, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, and of the Act of the 61st and 62nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 23, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the follow-

ing Scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices situate within the Metropolis, and within the City and Diocese of London, namely, the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with the Vicarage of All Hallows Staining annexed, and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Saint Catherine Coleman, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union:

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, has caused proposals for a Scheme for effecting an union of the said two Benefices to be laid before us, which proposals were prepared under the 7th and 8th sections of the firstly mentioned Act, and were approved by the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, and were assented to by the Patrons of the two Benefices to be affected thereby, and the same proposals were also assented to, subject to certain modifications, by the Vestries of the Parishes concerned, that is to say, by the Vestry of the Parish of Saint Catherine Coleman and by the United Vestry of the Parishes of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with All Hallows Staining:

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two Benefices should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto, and to the other matters hereinafter contained, should be made as are hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the said Benefice of Saint Catherine Coleman is now vacant, and the said Benefice of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with All Hallows Staining, is now full, the Reverend Tom Wellard, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent thereof:

"And whereas the said Tom Wellard has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

"And whereas the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron of the said Benefice of Saint Catherine Coleman, and the Trustees of the Advowson of Saint Olave, Hart Street, as the Patrons of the said Benefice of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with All Hallows Staining, and the Vestries of the said Parishes respectively are willing that the Scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals, and this present Scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly, but otherwise is based upon the said proposals:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron, in Right of his See, of the said Benefice and Rectory of Saint Catherine Coleman (in testimony whereof he has to this Scheme set his hand and his Episcopal Seal), and with the consents of Robert Gresley Hall, of Number 24, Mark Lane, in the said City of London, Esquire, Arthur Taylor Young, of Number 29, Mark Lane, in the said City of London, Esquire, Herbert George Pole, of Number 40, Trinity Square, in the said City of London, Esquire, Douglas Odell Kerr, of Number 59, Mark Lane, in the said City of London, Esquire, Basil Carter Sharpe, of Number 41, Crutched Friars, in the said City of London, Esquire, Sidney Howard Cotton, of Number 59, Mark Lane, in the said City of London, Esquire, Max Alexander

Tosetti, of Number 39, Crutched Friars, in the said City of London, Esquire, Herbert William Myatt, of Number 4, New London Street, in the said City of London, Esquire, and Sir Herbert Acton Blake, K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., of Trinity House, Trinity Square, in the said City of London, the Trustees of the Advowson of Saint Olave, Hart Street, as the Patrons of the said Benefice and Rectory of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with All Hallows Staining (in testimony whereof they have to this Scheme set their hands and seals), and with the consents of the United Vestry of the said Parishes of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with All Hallows Staining, and of the Vestry of the said Parish of Saint Catherine Coleman (in testimony of which consents this Scheme is signed in the case of each of the said Vestries by the Chairman of a meeting of the same Vestry, duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this Scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned, as follows:—

"PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself, and certain immediate incidents thereof, we recommend and propose:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with All Hallows Staining, and the said Benefice of Saint Catherine Coleman be united into one Benefice under the style of 'The United Benefice of Saint Olave, Hart Street, and All Hallows Staining, with Saint Catherine Coleman,' which said United Benefice is hereinafter called 'the United Benefice.'

"2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, the union shall forthwith take effect and the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with All Hallows Staining, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, and it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said Diocese of London to admit to the United Benefice such first Incumbent without any form or fee of or for presentation and he shall thereupon become the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"PART II.

"As to the Parish Church of the United Benefice and the Church of Saint Catherine Coleman and certain officers of the same and certain matters connected therewith, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect the Church of Saint Olave, Hart Street, shall become and thereafter continue to be the Parish Church of the United Benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the font, communion table, sacramental plate, bells, and other furniture and fittings of the Church of Saint Catherine Coleman, or such of them as the Vestry of the United Benefice shall select, shall be transferred to the Church of the United Benefice, but such of those articles as shall not be claimed by the said vestry shall be appropriated to the Church or Churches of the proposed new District or Districts hereinafter mentioned, or to such other Church or Chapel within the Diocese of London as the Bishop may select.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the

table of fees used in the Church which will become the Church of the United Benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united Parishes.

"4. That, if upon the union taking effect Miss Mary Ann Abel, who is now the Sextoness of the Church of Saint Catherine Coleman shall hold office, her service shall be dispensed with and by way of compensation for the loss of her office she shall, out of any moneys to be received by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under the provisions of Part V of this Scheme, receive for the remainder of her life a yearly sum or pension of £38 16s. 0d. Provided always that it shall be lawful for us, if we shall see fit, to advance the said yearly sum or pension, or any part thereof, out of the fund created by the 22nd section of the said Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 142.

"5. That upon the final closing of the Church of Saint Catherine Coleman, the register books of baptisms, marriages, and burials of the Parish of Saint Catherine Coleman shall be transferred to the Church of the United Benefice, a safe being provided for their custody out of the moneys to be received by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under the provisions of Part V of this Scheme, and any monuments in Saint Catherine's Church which may not be claimed by those, who, under the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860, have a right to claim them, shall be re-erected in the Church of the United Benefice or placed in some suitable position in the Churchyard of Saint Catherine Coleman.

" PART III.

"As to the endowments of the United Benefice we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"That upon the union taking effect all the properties, revenues and income constituting the endowments (present and future) of the Rectory of Saint Olave, Hart Street, with All Hallows Staining and of the Rectory of Saint Catherine Coleman shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice, subject to the payments which are contemplated and recommended by Part IV of this Scheme.

" PART IV.

"Upon the subject of Patronage and of a certain new District or Districts, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That the Patronage of the said United Benefice shall be vested in the said Trustees of the Advowson of Saint Olave, Hart Street.

"2. That one or, if the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the Bishop of London so decide, two ecclesiastical districts within the limits of the Metropolis or its vicinity as defined by the said Union of Benefices Act, 1898 (such district or districts then having been or then being about to be formed or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, authorizing the formation or constitution of such districts) shall be selected by the Bishop of London as the district or districts for which a Church or Churches shall be built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended.

"3. That the Patronage of such new district or districts shall be vested in the Bishop of London for the time being.

"4. That the first or as the case may be the one Church built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended shall be consecrated by the name and style of Saint Catherine.

"5. That as an endowment for the first of the said new districts there shall be paid to the Minister or Incumbent of such new district by the Incumbent of the said United Benefice by quarterly payments upon the usual quarter days in each year an annual sum equal year by year to the amount of that part of the income of the United Benefice arising in the year from the present endowments of the said Rectory of Saint Catherine Coleman after the payment of all charges upon those endowments and after the deduction of an annual sum of £50 to be retained by the Incumbent of the said United Benefice as an augmentation of the income of his Benefice in view of the expenses to be incurred by him in connection with the collection and disbursement of such endowments; and until such new district shall have been constituted, the payment hereby directed to be made to the Incumbent of such new district shall be made to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to be accumulated by us towards the endowment of such new district.

" PART V.

"As to the Church of Saint Catherine Coleman and the site and appurtenances thereof, and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials, site, furniture or fittings of the same Church, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That as soon as conveniently may be after the union has taken effect the Church of Saint Catherine Coleman be taken down.

"2. That subject to the provisions contained in clause 2 of Part II. of this Scheme the furniture or fittings (other than the font, communion table and sacramental plate) and the materials and site of the said Church, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof, but exclusive of the Churchyard, which is at present used as an open space and is intended to continue to be so used, shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, subject to the provisions contained in the 17th section of the said Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 142.

"3. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as aforesaid, of the site and materials and furniture, or fittings of the said Church, shall form one aggregate fund and shall be applied as follows, that is to say:—

"(a) for the payment of the gratuity which is contemplated by Clause 4 of Part II of this Scheme, and for the provision of a safe for the custody of the register books of baptisms, marriages and burials of the Parish of Saint Catherine Coleman, as mentioned in Clause 5 of Part II of this Scheme,

"(b) for the payment to the Churchwardens of the United Benefice of a sum of £100 per annum for the maintenance of the Churchyard of Saint Catherine Coleman as an open space, the provision of seats, and the payment of an attendant,

"(c) for the payment to the Church-

wardens of the United Benefice of a sum of £100 per annum for the repair of the fabric and the renewal of the furniture of the Parish Church of the United Benefice,

"(d) for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a new Church within the limits of the said first new district constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid and as the Church of such new district,

"(e) for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a Parsonage House or the purchase (and, if required, enlargement or alteration) of any existing suitable house for a Parsonage House within the limits of the said first new district constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid, and as the Parsonage House of such new district.

"The remainder (if any) of the said proceeds to be added to the fund created under the 22nd section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860, unless in the opinion of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and of the Bishop of London it should seem expedient that the same or any part thereof should be applied for or towards the provision of a Church or a Church and Parsonage House for a second new district, in which case such second new district shall be formed or legally constituted in the manner contemplated by clause 2 of Part IV of this Scheme, and its Patronage shall be vested as provided by clause 3 of Part IV of this Scheme.

"Provided always that this Scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval, which by the 17th section of the said Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 142, are made requisite to the sale or letting or appropriation under the powers conferred by that Act of the site of any church, shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the Church of Saint Catherine Coleman and of the site thereof, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All which we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, and of the Act of the 61st and 62nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 23, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 14th day of July, 1921, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, and of the Act of the 61st and 62nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 23, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous Benefices situate within the Metropolis, and within the Diocese of Southwark, namely, the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Saint Paul, Deptford, and the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Saint Mark, Deptford, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union:

"Whereas the Right Reverend Cyril Forster, Bishop of the said Diocese of Southwark, has caused proposals for a Scheme for effecting an union of the said two Benefices to be laid before us, which proposals were prepared under the 7th and 8th sections of the firstly mentioned Act, and were approved by the said Cyril Forster, Bishop of the said Diocese of Southwark, and were assented to by the Patron of the two Benefices to be affected thereby, that is to say, by the said Cyril Forster, Bishop of Southwark, as the Patron in right of his See of the said Benefice and Rectory of Saint Paul, Deptford, and also of the said Benefice and Vicarage of Saint Mark, Deptford, and the same proposals were also assented to by the Vestries of the Parishes concerned, that is to say, by the Vestry of the Parish of Saint Paul, Deptford, and by the Vestry of the Parish of Saint Mark, Deptford:

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two Benefices should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter contained should be made as are hereinafter mentioned:—

"And whereas the said Benefice of Saint Paul, Deptford, is now full, the Reverend Andrew Amos, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent thereof, and the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Deptford, is vacant:

"And whereas the said Andrew Amos has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

"And whereas the said Cyril Forster, Bishop of the said Diocese of Southwark, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron of the said Benefice of Saint Paul, Deptford, and also of the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Deptford, and the Vestries of the said Parishes respectively, are willing that the Scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals, and this present Scheme does embody the same modifications accord-

ingly, but otherwise is based upon the said proposals:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Cyril Forster, Bishop of Southwark (in testimony whereof he has to this Scheme set his hand and Episcopal Seal), and with the consents of the Vestry of the said Parish of Saint Paul, Deptford, and of the Vestry of the said Parish of Saint Mark, Deptford (in testimony of which consents this Scheme is signed in the case of each of the said Vestries by the Chairman of a meeting of the same Vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this Scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned, as follows:—

"PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof we recommend and propose:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Saint Paul, Deptford, and the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Deptford, be united into one Benefice under the style of 'The Benefice of Saint Paul with Saint Mark, Deptford,' which said United Benefice is hereinafter called 'the United Benefice.'

"2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, the union shall forthwith take effect and the said Andrew Amos, if he is then the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Saint Paul, Deptford, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, and it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said Diocese of Southwark to admit the said Andrew Amos to the United Benefice without any form or fee of or for presentation and he shall thereupon become Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"PART II.

"As to the Parish Church of the United Benefice and the Church of Saint Mark, Deptford, and certain matters connected therewith, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect the Church of Saint Paul, Deptford, shall become and thereafter continue to be the Parish Church of the United Benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the table of fees used in the Church which will become the Church of the United Benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the United Parish.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the register books of baptisms, marriages, and burials of the Parish of Saint Paul, Deptford, and of the Parish of Saint Mark, Deptford, shall be placed in the custody of the Incumbent of the United Benefice and shall so continue.

"PART III.

"As to the endowments and the parsonage house of the United Benefice, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect all the existing endowments of the Rectory of Saint Paul, Deptford, and all the existing endowments of the Vicarage of Saint Mark, Deptford, shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the present Parsonage House of the Benefice of Saint Paul, Deptford, shall be the Parsonage House of the United Benefice.

"PART IV.

"Upon the subject of Patronage, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"That the whole right of Patronage of the United Benefice shall be vested in the said Cyril Forster, Bishop of Southwark, and his successors for ever.

"All which we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Southwark.

The following Addresses were presented to the King on the 8th instant on the occasion of the opening by His Majesty of the Manchester Royal Exchange:—

CITY OF MANCHESTER.

TO THEIR MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTIES
THE KING AND QUEEN.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTIES:

We, Your Majesties' loyal and faithful subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the City of Manchester in Council Assembled; humbly approach Your Majesties with the homage of devoted allegiance for the purpose of offering to Your Majesties a warm and cordial welcome on the occasion of Your Majesties' visit to Manchester to open the Manchester Royal Exchange as now extended. Such extension, made under the powers of an Act of Parliament which received the assent of Your Majesty the King in the year 1913, has been necessitated by the great expansion of Trade and Commerce in the wide area of which Manchester is the centre. This expansion has been very largely due to the construction by the citizens of Manchester of the Manchester Ship Canal, which was inaugurated by Her Majesty Queen Victoria in the year 1894, and of which an important extension was opened by His Majesty King Edward the Seventh in the year 1905. We rejoice that by means of such Canal we have been instrumental in fostering and developing the industrial activities of this busy portion of Your Majesties' Dominions, and thereby have largely contributed to the necessity for increasing the size of an Institution, which exists, and has always existed, in the most cordial and friendly relations with the Municipality of this City.

We feel and humbly represent to Your Majesties that the graceful act of Your Majesties in opening the Royal Exchange as now enlarged will prove a valuable stimulus to the trade, not merely of the City and district, but of the Nation at large.

Your Majesties have honoured Manchester with previous visits, and we recall the expressions of unbounded affection with which Your Majesties were everywhere received on those occasions. We rejoice in having this opportunity of again testifying to the devoted patriotism and loyalty of the Citizens of Manchester to Your Majesties, and we fervently pray that by Divine providence You may be enabled to continue Your noble work of promoting peace and of encouraging the hopes and aspirations of Your loyal and faithful subjects for the amelioration and betterment of the inhabitants in all parts of your Empire.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

I thank you for your loyal Address, and for the warmth of the welcome which the citizens of Manchester have extended to Us.

We recall with pleasure the visit which We paid to Manchester in the course of Our tour in Lancashire eight years ago, and We have observed with satisfaction the indications of the progress which the city has made since 1913. The extension of your Exchange, necessitated by the expansion of your trade, affords in itself a gratifying proof of vitality and vigour in the commerce and industry of Manchester and of the busy district of which it is the centre.

I am much interested to learn that you attribute this expansion of the trade of Manchester to the construction of the Ship Canal. I rejoice to hear that this striking feat of modern engineering has fulfilled the purpose with which it was undertaken, and that Manchester, which thirty years ago was an inland city thirty-five miles from the sea, has now risen to a very high position among the ocean ports of the United Kingdom. You have good reason to be proud of the insight, courage and perseverance of those citizens of Manchester who conceived that enterprise and in spite of many difficulties carried it to a triumphant conclusion. You remind Me that the canal was first inaugurated by the late Queen Victoria and that an important extension was opened by My beloved Father. It is a source of much satisfaction to Me that My house should be so intimately connected with the fortunes of this daring and successful work.

I am happy to be assured of your belief that Our presence to-day for the purpose of reopening the Royal Exchange will prove a stimulus to trade. I am deeply conscious how intimately the well-being of the nation is bound up with the prosperity of our national industry and commerce, in which the City of Manchester and the County of Lancashire take so important a part.

I am sorely troubled by the present widespread unemployment, which is causing so much suffering to so many of My people. It is my sincere hope that the efforts of My Ministers to alleviate present and prevent future unemployment may be successful.

I earnestly pray that, by the blessing of Divine Providence, the united efforts of all classes of the community may wipe out the evil effects of the great war, restore the productive

and commercial activity of the nation, and thus bring employment, well-being and happiness to all My people.

MEMBERS, PROPRIETORS AND DIRECTORS OF THE MANCHESTER ROYAL EXCHANGE.

TO THEIR MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTIES KING GEORGE V. AND QUEEN MARY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTIES.

We, your Majesties' dutiful and faithful subjects, the Members, Proprietors, and Directors of the Manchester Royal Exchange, humbly desire, on the occasion of your gracious visit to this Exchange, to be permitted to express our loyal and ardent attachment to your Majesty's Throne and Person, and to your Majesty the Queen.

The first Exchange was built in 1729, the second in 1809, and the third in 1867 to 1874, of which the present reconstruction and extension was begun in June, 1914.

The Manchester Royal Exchange is the world's greatest place of assembly of traders for business transactions, and now covers 8,222 square yards, or about 1½ acres of land.

The Great Hall, which provides the largest floor space (practically 8,000 square yards) on one level to be found anywhere, is surmounted by two large and four smaller glazed domes giving light to the interior, the pinnacles of which are 130 feet above the street level. Around the Great Hall are ranged suites of offices occupied by business firms; in fact, every facility for the transaction of business, including a Post and Telegraph Office, Reading Room, and a Telephone Department, with 53 lines, is provided.

The Exchange is the centre of the largest industrial area in your Empire, having a population of some 9,000,000 people within a radius of 50 miles.

The membership of the Exchange numbers between 11,000 and 12,000.

The chief interests are those associated with the Cotton Industry. In 1920 about 2,000 firms were represented on the Exchange connected with the spinning and manufacturing of textile fabrics, operating 60,000,000 spindles and about 800,000 looms, in which is invested some £300,000,000 capital.

Three-quarters of the product of these looms is sent abroad to various parts of your Empire and to other countries of the world. The value of this cloth in 1920 was £315,733,164, and of yarns exported in that period the value was £47,824,983.

These figures show the great position the Manchester Royal Exchange holds in the trade and commerce of this Empire, and how important are its functions in the maturing of business transactions necessary to secure the trade providing employment for the great mass of workers whose existence is dependent upon the marketing of the commodities they produce.

We recall with pleasure the fact that it was within the walls of the previous Exchange building, 70 years ago, i.e., on the 10th October, 1851, that Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, of revered memory, received the welcome of the City on the occasion of her first visit to Manchester, when she was accompanied by His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, and by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then

Prince of Wales. By Her Majesty's gracious command, in commemoration of her visit, the Institution then took the name of the "Royal Manchester Exchange."

We are profoundly conscious that the commercial prosperity of your Majesty's dominions is in great measure dependent upon the security afforded to industrial enterprise, both by the settled form of Government at home and by the friendly relationships with all Foreign Powers maintained under your Majesty's governance.

Recognising as we do that the preservation of peace is essential to the best interests of British commerce, we welcomed your Majesty's gracious message of two years ago commending the cause of the League of Nations to all the citizens of your Empire.

We earnestly pray that Almighty God may bless and further your Majesties in all the duties of your exalted station, and that He will vouchsafe to your Majesties every happiness in private and family life, and it is our fervent hope that your Majesties may be spared for many years to reign over a loyal, prosperous, and united people in this Kingdom, and in your Majesty's Empire and Dominions beyond the seas.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

I thank you for your loyal and dutiful Address and for the cordial expression of your good wishes for The Queen and Myself.

It is a great pleasure to Us to meet you to-day in the Manchester Royal Exchange, and I feel a particular gratification in discharging at your request the duty of opening this building after its reconstruction. The long history of the Exchange as an institution and its connection with the revered memory of Queen Victoria would suffice by themselves to give it a claim on Our regard; and the striking figures which you have brought to Our notice reveal the immense scope of the interests represented and the vast scale of the business done within its walls, and bear eloquent testimony to its unique importance in the world of British industry and commerce. The Exchanges have played a great part in the evolution of the modern business world; they have been the chief agency in transforming the hand-to-mouth operations of the old economic system into that steady rhythm of production and distribution which is the ideal of modern business organisation. In this process the Manchester Exchange has led the way. Its position as the great distributive centre for cotton yarns and fabrics makes its operations a matter of vital importance to the prosperity of British commerce and to the well-being of the whole country. It is, therefore, of good omen for the future of British trade and a cause of rejoicing to everyone who has the national welfare at heart that the membership and the transactions of your Exchange have so greatly increased. I congratulate you most sincerely on the fortunate necessity for this latest enlargement of an institution which has already been so many times enlarged and extended.

I note with interest that the ceremony of to-day marks the completion of an undertaking which was begun immediately before the outbreak of the late terrible war. I earnestly hope that we may accept this as an indication that the interruption to the normal course of trade caused by the war is coming to an end

and that the great trading community of Manchester will soon be able to pick up the broken threads of its economic development.

I share to the full your aspirations for the preservation of peace and of friendly relations with foreign Powers. The attachment of Manchester to the cause of peace is a tradition of long standing; and, indeed, the value of peace is a lesson which your own circumstances must constantly bring home to you. Your staple industry derives all its raw material from abroad, and looks to overseas markets to take much of its finished product. It is typical of the dependence of these Islands on foreign trade and of that international character of modern business which makes it impossible for any great manufacturing or mercantile community to live an isolated or self-sufficient life.

It is My earnest hope and prayer that the ceremony in which we are taking part to-day may prove to be the starting point for steady and ever-increasing development in the trades which are centred in this Exchange, and that this in its turn may serve to promote cordial and friendly relations between our own country and the peoples, whether within or without My Empire, who are united with it by commercial ties.

COAL MINES ACT.

THE EXPLOSIVES IN COAL MINES ORDER OF THE 5TH OCTOBER, 1921.

In pursuance of the power conferred upon them by Section 61 of the Coal Mines Act, 1911, (a) and under the provisions of the Mining Industry Act, 1920, (b) the Board of Trade hereby make the following Order:—

(1) The Explosives in Coal Mines Order of the 1st September, 1913, (c) as amended by the Explosives in Coal Mines Orders of subsequent dates, shall be amended and shall take effect as if the explosive named and defined in the Schedule to this Order were named and defined in the First Schedule to that Order, and in all respects as if the Schedule to this Order formed part of the First Schedule to that Order.

(2) So much of the Schedule to the Explosives in Coal Mines Order of the 25th August, 1920, (d) as relates to the Explosive Super-Excellite No. 4 is hereby repealed.

(3) This Order may be cited as the Explosives in Coal Mines Order of the 5th October, 1921,

(1) That the explosive shall be used only when contained in a case of paper thoroughly waterproofed with (a) a mixture of ceresine and resin or (b) paraffin wax;

(2) That the explosive shall be used only with a detonator or electric detonator of not less strength than that known as No. 6 (i.e., the detonator or electric detonator to be used shall possess an effective detonative strength as great as, or greater than, that of one containing 15 grains of a composition consisting in every 100 parts by weight of 80 parts of fulminate of mercury and 20 parts of chlorate of potassium);

(3) That the greatest weight of the explosive which may be used in any one shot-hole shall not exceed 22 ounces;

(4) That the explosive has been made at the works of Nobel's Explosives Company, Limited, at Ardeer, in the county of Ayr;

(5) That the explosive is in all respects similar to the sample submitted to test on the 17th day of March, 1920;

(6) That each cartridge, in addition to any marking required in the Third Schedule to this Order, shall also be clearly marked with the words "Not more than 22 ounces in any one shot-hole"; and

(7) That in addition to the marking on the outer package required by an Order of the Secretary of State, made under the Explosives Act, 1875, and in force for the time being, such outer package shall bear the words "As defined in the List of Permitted Explosives"; and, further, that each inner package shall be clearly marked with the words "Permitted Explosive, to be used only with not less than No. 6 detonator," and also with the name of the explosive, the name of the manufacturer, the date and place of manufacture, and the nature and proportion of the ingredients.

Four ounces of *Super-Cliffite No. 3* gave a swing of 2.77 inches to the Ballistic Pendulum

compared with a swing of 3.27 inches given by four ounces of Gelignite containing 60 per cent. of nitro-glycerine.

CHAIN TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES IN THE HAND HAMMERED CHAIN TRADE.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under that Act for the Hand Hammered and Dollied or Tommied Chain Making Trade in Great Britain hereby give Notice that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Time Rates for Hand Hammered Chain Making varied by them and set out in the Notice dated 1st October, 1920, as set out below:

By reducing the minimum rates or lowest time rate for making from iron supplied by the employer Hand Hammered Chain up to and including 11/32 of an inch:

Where the employer provides (in addition to the iron) the workshop where the work is carried out and the tools and the fuel, to 7½d. per hour.

Where the worker provides (in respect of iron provided by the employer) the workshop where the work is carried out and the tools and the fuel or any one of these three heads of outlay, to 10d. per hour.

No variations are proposed in the General Minimum Time Rates for learners as set out in the Notice dated 1st October, 1920.

The Trade Board also give similar Notice that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Piece Rates for making Hand Hammered Chain varied by them on the 1st October, 1920, the proposed variation comprising a reduction in the General Minimum Piece Rates in question of approximately 12½ per cent. in each case.

The Trade Board also give similar Notice that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Piece Rates for learners (as defined in the said Notice dated 1st October, 1920) in their third and fourth six months of employment as learners (but not in any other case) by providing that the General Minimum Piece Rates payable to such learners shall be respectively 80 per cent. and 90 per cent. of the General Minimum Piece Rates above specified.

Further information as to the proposed variation in the minimum rates of wages may be obtained on application to the Secretary of the Chain Trade Board (Great Britain) at the address shown below.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 14th October, 1921. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary at the address given below.

It is desirable that the objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

Piece-work Basis Time-Rates.

SECTION I.—For Male Workers employed in Stamping, Burnishing, Spinning (including Setting), Dipping, Staining, Sawing, Turning or Cutting (other than Cutting on Wet Lathes), 1s. 7½d. per hour.

In the case of all Male Workers employed on Piece-work in Stamping, Burnishing, Spinning (including Setting), Dipping, Staining, Sawing, Turning or Cutting (other than Cutting on Wet Lathes), each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than 1s. 7½d. per hour to an ordinary Male Worker (*i.e.*, a male worker of ordinary skill and experience in these processes).

SECTION II.—Female Workers (other than Home Workers), 8½d. per hour.

In the case of all Female Workers (other than Home-Workers) employed on Piece-work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than 8½d. per hour to an Ordinary Female Worker (*i.e.*, a female worker of ordinary skill and experience in the circumstances in question).

PART III.

Overtime Rates.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby declare for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates set out in Section II of this Part of this Schedule the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	48
On Saturday	5

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—Overtime Rates calculated on the Minimum Rates of Wages specified in

Parts I and II of this Schedule in the manner specified below shall apply in substitution for the minimum rates set out in Parts I and II of this Schedule in respect of all hours worked in excess of the normal number of hours of work in the trade declared by the Trade Board as set out in Section I of this Part of this Schedule, that is to say:—

(a) Male and Female Workers employed on Time-Work:—

(1) For all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be twice the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time.

Provided that the said Overtime Rate shall not apply—

(i) In respect of time worked on Good Friday in the case of workers who are given Easter Tuesday as a holiday in lieu of Good Friday; or

(ii) In respect of time worked on Easter Tuesday in the case of workers who are given Good Friday as a holiday in lieu of Easter Tuesday.

(2) For all hours worked in excess of five on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the general minimum time-rate applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraph (1) of sub-section (a) of this section.

(3) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the general minimum time-rate applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraph (1) of sub-section (a) of this section.

(b) Female Workers employed on Piece-Work:—

Female Workers employed on Piece-Work shall receive, in respect of each hour worked in excess of 48 hours in any week, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, at least 8½d. per hour to an Ordinary Worker, the sum of 1d. per hour.

Note.—The hours which Female Workers, Young Persons and Children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trades Boards Acts, to all workers (other than Home-Workers) in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Button-Making) Order, 1919, and as set out below.

SECTION II.—The Trade as specified in the above-mentioned Order is as follows:—

The manufacture of buttons, button-moulds, upholsterers' buttons or upholsterers' button-headed nails (excluding the shanks), from any material by the process of cutting, sawing, stamping, pressing, turning, drilling, fancying, grinding, barrelling, polishing, japanning, lacquering, dyeing,

colouring, painting, varnishing, sewing, crotchetting or the covering of button moulds;

Including—

(a) The manufacture of studs, links, or parts thereof, from any material other than metal, where such manufacture is carried on in association with or in conjunction with button-making, so as to provide a common or interchangeable form of employment for workers;

(b) The manufacture of shanks for buttons where carried on in association with or in conjunction with button-making;

(c) The carding of any of the above articles, wherever carried on;

(d) All despatching, packing, warehousing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above articles;

But Excluding—

(e) The manufacture of wooden button moulds;

(f) The covering of button moulds where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of wearing apparel.

PART V.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between Employers and Workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

A Brazier of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Brazier and who

an expert in brazing in all classes of metal except aluminium.

A Brazier of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is also an expert in brazing aluminium or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Burnishers:

A Burnisher of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on burnishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.

A Burnisher of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Burnisher and who is an expert hook and straight Burnisher at the vice and satisfactorily burnishes deep thin shell work at the lathe.

A Burnisher of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is an expert in speed and quality in all classes of work or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Drop-Stampers:

A Drop-Stamper of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on drop-stamping and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.

A Drop-Stamper of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Drop-Stamper and who undertakes all classes of deep or shallow work in all strengths of the metal used.

A Drop-Stamper of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is an expert in all classes of work or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Dippers who are also Bronzers:

A Worker of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on dipping and bronzing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.

A Worker of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Dipper and Bronzer and who is an all-round Dipper and Bronzer and also does art bronzing and colouring, or electro-plating or has a knowledge of electro-plating.

A Worker of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, also has an expert knowledge of art bronzing or metal colouring or electro depositing and solutions or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Brass Polishers:

A Polisher of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on polishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II or Grade III as hereinafter defined.

A Polisher of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Polisher and is

an expert in all processes of any class of common work and can emery-bob and mop best work.

A Polisher of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II, as above defined, is also an expert in all processes of both common and best work or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

B.—General Minimum Time-Rates (as fixed and as varied) for Female Workers.

* SECTION I.—For Female Workers who are employed as Polishers or as Drop-Stampers:—

(a) Workers of 18 years of age and over:—
During first 12 months of employment after the age of 18, 11d. per hour.

After completion of 12 months of employment after the age of 18, 1s. per hour.

Provided that, in the case of Female Workers entering the branches of the trade specified in this Section for the first time at or over the age of 18 years, the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable during the first two months of employment shall be 10d. per hour.

(b) Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 9½d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 6d. per hour.

* SECTION II.—For Female Workers who are employed as Hand-Brush-Japanners and are capable of finishing all classes of work, Hand-Brush-Lacquers, Blow-Pipe-Braziers or Solderers using ordinary Hand-Iron or Blow-Pipe with Bar Solder:—

(a) Workers of 18 years of age and over:—

During first 12 months of employment after the age of 18, 10d. per hour.

After completion of 12 months of employment after the age of 18, 11d. per hour.

Provided that, in the case of Female Workers entering the branches of the trade specified in this Section for the first time at or over the age of 18 years, the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable during the first two months of employment shall be 9d. per hour.

(b) Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 5d. per hour.

SECTION III.—For all Female Workers not included in Sections I and II of this Part of this Schedule:—

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 8d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

PART II.

Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates.

A.—Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates (as Varied) for all Male Workers (all Ages).

The Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate for any class of Male Workers shall be 10 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate for such class, as set out in Part I A of this Schedule.

B.—Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates (as Fixed and as Varied) for Female Workers.

* SECTION I.—(a) For all Female Workers who are employed as Polishers or as Drop-Stampers, 1s. 1d. per hour.

(b) For all Female Workers who are employed as Hand-Brush-Japanners and are capable of finishing all classes of work, Hand-Brush-Lacquers, Blow-Pipe-Braziers or Solderers using ordinary Hand-Iron or Blow-Pipe with Bar Solder, 1s. per hour.

SECTION II.—For all Female Workers not included in Section I of this Part of this Schedule:—

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 9d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 8d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

NOTE.—In the case of all Workers employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than the equivalent of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate to an Ordinary Worker, *i.e.*, a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question.

PART III.

Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (All Ages).

SECTION I.—In accordance with section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	47
On Saturday	4½

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether employed on time-work or on piece-work, in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

(a) For all hours worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double-Time.

(b) For all hours worked in excess of four-and-a-half on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

(c) For all hours worked in excess of 47 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours and Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime

Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-Sections (a) and (b) of this Section.

NOTE.—(1) The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

(2) The Minimum Rates for Overtime set forth in Section II of this Part of this Schedule are effective, as respects workers to whom the General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates marked * apply, as from 27th June, 1921.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919.

SECTION II.—The Trade as specified in the above-mentioned Order is as follows:—

The manufacture from metals (other than precious metals) by the processes of cold stamping or cold pressing (including cutting or piercing) of cabinet fittings, window fittings, curtain accessories, stationers' sundries, drapers' sundries, fittings for gas or electric light, fittings for suit-cases or handbags or purses, buckles, eyelets, ferrules, labels, collar studs, tie-clips, thimbles, photograph frames, stamped chains, bells, fancy nails (excluding the shanks), parts of safety razors (excluding the blades), parts of braces or suspenders, corset steels or busks, whistles, tin-openers, medals or any similar articles or metal parts of such articles;

Including:—

(a) The operations of annealing, hardening, barrelling, polishing, bronzing, nickelling, lacquering, japanning, non-vitreous enamelling, tinning or assembling, where these operations are carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of such stamped or pressed metal articles;

(b) The operations of carding, boxing, packeting, labelling, weighing, packing, warehousing or despatching, where these operations are incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of such stamped or pressed metal articles;

But excluding:—

(a) The operations specified in the Trade Boards (Hollow-ware) Order, 1913;

(b) The making of buttons or any operations incidental thereto;

(c) The making of coffin furniture or any operations incidental thereto;

(d) The making of pins, hairpins, hooks and eyes, hair-curlers, snap-fasteners or safety pins or any operations incidental thereto;

(e) The making of steel pens and the making of stationers' metal sundries or other similar metal articles when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the making of steel pens, so as to provide a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers;

(f) The minting of coinage of the realm;

(g) The process of hand-embossing.

PART V.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these minimum rates of wages.

The Form of this Consolidating Notice has been approved by the Minister of Labour in accordance with Paragraph 8 of the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918.

This Notice sets out all the Minimum Rates of Wages which have been fixed or varied by the Trade Board and are effective under the Trade Boards Acts and takes the place of the Notice H.B. (4) issued by the Trade Board and dated 13th November, 1920.

The Minimum Rates set out in the Schedule below are effective as follows:—

1. The General Minimum Time-Rates marked †, and the Overtime Rates based thereon, as from 15th November, 1920.

2. In all other cases, as from 17th October, 1921.*

* NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full-pay period, but in no case later than 23rd October, 1921.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 4¾d. per hour.†

Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.†

Workers under 14½ years of age, 3d. per hour.†

Workers of 16 and under 16½ years of age, 5d. per hour.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 3¾d. per hour.

Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

Workers under 14½ years of age, 3d.† per hour.

Provided that in the case of any worker who enters the trade for the first time at or over the age of 16 years, and who is employed on Time-work, the General Minimum Time-Rates payable during the worker's first 12 months' employment shall be the Minimum Rates set out

in Section III above applicable to a worker in the immediately junior age group in lieu of the General Minimum Time-Rates otherwise applicable.

Provided also that the Minimum Rates set out in Sections I, II and III above shall not apply to Hand-loom Weavers (other than Damask Seating Hand-loom Weavers).

SECTION I.—For all Female Workers employed in one or more of the occupations specified in Section I of Part III of this Schedule, 9½d. per hour.

SECTION III.—In the case of all Female Workers employed on Piece-work in one or more of the occupations specified in Sections I or II of Part III of this Schedule each Piece-Rate must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate as set out in Sections I and II respectively of this Part of this Schedule, to an Ordinary Worker, i.e., a female worker of ordinary skill and experience in those occupations.

PART V.

Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (except Hand-Loom Weavers other than Damask Seating Hand-Loom Weavers).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade in any week to be 48.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in respect of hours worked by Workers of the classes specified in Parts I and III of this Schedule in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be:—

A.—Workers employed on Time-Work:—

(1) For the first four hours of Overtime in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter.

B.—Workers employed on Piece-Work:—

Workers employed on Piece-work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime a Piece-Rate which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker, at least the equivalent of the appropriate

Piece-work Basis Time-Rate or General Minimum Time-Rate, as the case may be, with the addition of:—

(1) As respects each of the first four hours of Overtime in any week, a sum equivalent to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate or General Minimum Time-Rate, as the case may be;

(2) As respects each hour in excess of four hours of Overtime in any week, a sum equivalent to One-Half of the appropriate

Piece-work Basis Time-Rate or General Minimum Time-Rate, as the case may be;

(3) As respects each hour of employment on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, a sum equivalent to the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate or General Minimum Time-Rate, as the case may be.

Provided that the Overtime Rates set out in this Part of this Notice shall *not* apply to Hand-loom Weavers (other than Damask Seating Hand-loom Weavers).

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are to be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION III.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the Minimum Rates.

The form of this Consolidating Notice has been approved by the Minister of Labour in accordance with Paragraph 8 of the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918.

PROPOSAL TO CANCEL GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATES FOR HOME-WORKERS FOR CARDING SAFETY PINS, SNAP FASTENERS, HOOKS AND EYES, AND HOOKS AND LOOPS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Pin, Hook and Eye and Snap Fastener Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Pin, Hook and Eye and Snap Fastener) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to cancel the following General Minimum Piece-Rates for Home-Workers for Carding Safety Pins, Snap Fasteners, Hooks and Eyes, and Hooks and Loops at present Fixed and set out in Part II of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice O. (8), dated 9th September, 1921, that is to say:—

General Minimum Piece-Rates for Home-Workers which it is Proposed to Cancel:—

A.—For Carding Safety Pins (Assorted Sizes):

B.—For Carding Snap Fasteners:—

1.—Where Back-Boards are supplied to the Home-Worker by the Employer, 7½d. per great gross.

2.—Where Back-Boards are not supplied to the Home-Worker, 11½d. per great gross.

C.—(1) For Carding Hooks and Eyes:—

12 Hooks and Eyes per Card.

Sizes 00 and 0, 4s. per gross cards.

„ 1 to 8 (inclusive), 3s. per gross cards.

(2)—For Carding Hooks and Loops:—

12 Hooks and Loops per Card.

Sizes 00 and 0, 4s. 9½d. per gross cards.

„ 1 to 8 (inclusive), 3s. 7½d. per gross cards.

In the application of the above General Minimum Piece-Rates for Carding Hooks and Eyes or Hooks and Loops, the following conditions shall apply:—

Articles to be carded shall be given out to the Home-Worker, separate sizes in separate packets, and Hooks separate from Eyes or Loops.

NOTE.—Cottons, needles, twine and wrappers must be provided by the employer.

If, and when, the General Minimum Piece-Rates set out above are cancelled, as proposed; all Home-workers employed on piece-work will be entitled to be paid piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than 6½d. per hour to an ordinary worker (i.e., a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question), in accordance with the General Minimum Time-Rate of 6½d. per hour set out in Part I of the Trade Board's Notice O. (8), dated 9th September, 1921, which it is not proposed to cancel.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Notice of Proposal to Cancel which may be lodged with them within two months from 18th October, 1921. (8), dated 12th November, 1920.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Proposed Minimum, that is to say Lowest, Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

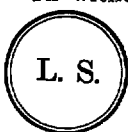
