His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned:—

No. 1012 Sepoy Ishar Singh, 28th Punjabis, Indian Army.

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty on the 10th April, 1921, near Haidari Kach (Waziristan). When the convoy protection troops were attacked, this Sepoy was No. 1 of a Lewis Gun Section. Early in the action he received a very severe gunshot wound in the chest, and fell beside his Lewis gun. Hand-to-hand fighting having commenced, the British officer, Indian officer, and all the Havildars of his company were either killed or wounded, and his Lewis gun was seized by the enemy.

Calling up two other men, he got up, charged the enemy, recovered the Lewis gun, and, although bleeding profusely, again got the gun into action.

When his Jemadar arrived he took the gun from Sepoy Ishar Singh and ordered him to go back and have his wound dressed.

Instead of doing this the Sepoy went to the medical officer, and was of great assistance in pointing out where the wounded were, and in carrying water to them. He made innumerable journeys to the river and back for this purpose. On one occasion, when the enemy fire was very heavy, he took the rifle of a wounded man and helped to keep down the fire. On another occasion he stood in front of the medical officer who was dressing a wounded man, thus shielding him with his body. It was over three hours before he finally submitted to be evacuated, being then too weak from loss of blood to object.

His gallantry and devotion to duty were beyond praise. His conduct inspired all who saw him.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the period 30th July, 1920, to the 8th August, 1920, during the withdrawal from Diwanieh to Hillah, and especially for his daring reconnaissances, firstly on the 1st August, 1920, when he rode ahead of a cavalry screen into Guchan and, having arranged for co-operation with the garrison at that place, returned with very valuable information, and secondly, on the 4th August, 1920, near Jerbuiyah, on which occasion he had to be called back owing to the danger of his being cut off by the enemy.

*Awarded the Military Cross.*

Lt. Charles Edgar Littledale, Lab. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the attempt to relieve the garrison of Rowanduz, August 28th to 30th, 1920. Lt. Littledale, with one British subordinate, two Levy officers, and 20 Sowars, started from Erbil for Rowanduz on the 28th August. On the 30th August he was joined by another party of 15 Sowars and 62 infantry. With this party he gallantly attacked Batas, but met with great opposition. The greater part of his men were forced to retire, but one Arab officer and four men stood by Lt. Littledale, and with these he kept off the insurgents and covered the extrication of his force. Subsequently, although attacked from all sides by a force estimated at 400 rifles, he brought the majority of his party safely back to Erbil.

7817437 Pte. A. G. Fry, 5th Armd. Mot. Bty., M.G.C. (Bath).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in action east of Saidgi, N.W. Frontier, India, on the 13th June, 1921. Pte. Fry was a reserve driver of an armoured car which had broken down about three miles east of Saidgi. The enemy had rushed the car and climbed on top of it, and attempted to kill the crew. The driver of the car was killed. The crew succeeded in driving off the enemy, who retired and took up a position under cover and continued to shoot at the car. Communication to Saidgi was impossible. The serjeant in charge of the car asked for a volunteer to get out of the car and proceed to Saidgi to report the situation. Pte. Fry volunteered for this duty, and under heavy fire left the car and proceeded to Saidgi, where he arrived in a very exhausted state. The information which he brought in did much to clear up the situation.
