WHEREAS by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance or other lawful means, His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in Persia:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Persia (Amendment) Order in Council, 1921," and shall be read as one with the Persia Order in Council, 1889, hereinafter called "the Principal Order."

2. The following provisions are substituted for Articles 12 to 15 inclusive of the Principal Order:—

(1) A register of British subjects shall be kept in the office of every Consulate in Persia.

(2) Every British subject resident in Persia shall, in the month of January of each year, be registered at the Consulate of the Consular District within which he resides, provided that if some other Consulate is more easy of access, he may, with the assent of the Consular Officer, be registered there. A British subject arriving in Persia must apply for registration within one month after his arrival; provided that a person who fails to apply for or to obtain registration within the time limited by this Article may be registered at any time if he excuses his failure to the satisfaction of the Consular Officer.

(3) Where a person is in possession of a valid British passport, the Consular Officer shall, on the first registration of any such person, endorse on the passport without further fee than that provided for in sub-article (6) hereunder a certificate of registration in such form as may be prescribed by the Secretary of State. Where any such person applies for the renewal of the registration and produces his passport, the renewal of the registration shall without further fee than that provided for in sub-article (6) hereunder be endorsed thereon.

(4) Every person who has not previously been registered applying to be registered under this Order shall, unless excused by the Consular Officer, attend personally for that purpose at the Consulate, but any person applying for the renewal of his registration need not attend personally unless directed by the Consular Officer so to do, provided that the registration of the wife or wives of a man who is registered under this Order may, if living with him, be effected without their personal attendance being required, and provided also that the registration of minors being his relatives in whatever degree, living with the head of a family who is registered under this Order, may be effected without their personal attendance being required.

(5) A person registered in any register of British subjects established under the provisions of any Order in Council which have been repealed shall be registered under the provisions of this Order, unless the Consular Officer is satisfied after enquiry that the previous registration was erroneous or that such person is not entitled to registration under the provisions of this Order.

(6) Every person shall, on every registration of himself, and on every renewal of the registration, pay a fee of two shillings and sixpence, or such other fee as the Secretary of State from time to time appoints. The amount of the fee may be uniform for all persons, or may vary according to the position and circumstances of different classes, if the Secretary of State from time to time so directs, but may not in any case exceed five shillings.

(7) Where any person applies to be registered, he shall be entitled without a fee to the assistance of the Consular Officer in the preparation of any affidavit that may be required.

(8) The Consular Officer may require the production of such evidence that an applicant for registration is entitled to the status of a British subject as he may see fit, but

subject to such directions as may be issued by the Secretary of State.

(9) If any British subject neglects to obtain registration under the provisions of this Order, he shall not be entitled to be recognised or protected as a British subject in Persia, and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two pounds for each instance of such failure, but he shall, although not registered, be subject to the jurisdiction of His Majesty's Courts in Persia.

3. From and after the commencement of this Order, Articles 12 to 15 inclusive of the Principal Order are hereby repealed, but such repeal shall not prejudice any rights, obligations or liabilities accrued thereunder.

4.—(1) This Order shall take effect as soon as it is first exhibited in the public office of the Consul-General at Teheran, and that date is in this Order referred to as the commencement of the Order.

(2) For that purpose the Consul-General shall on the receipt by him of a certified printed copy of the Order, cause the same to be affixed and exhibited conspicuously in that office. He shall also keep the same so affixed and exhibited during one month from that first exhibition.

(3) Proof shall not in any proceeding or matter be required that the provisions of this Article have been complied with, nor shall any act or proceeding be invalidated by any failure to comply with any such provisions.

1. 5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than two o'clock (Saturday twelve o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are dated.

7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the

House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

BRITISH NATIONALITY AND STATUS OF ALIENS ACTS, 1914 AND 1918.

In the Matter of Ludwig Neider-Hofheim.

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalization.

Whereas I am satisfied that Ludwig Nieder-Hofheim, to whom a certificate of naturalization numbered A8568 was granted on the 15th October, 1895, has shown himself by act to be disloyal and disaffected to His Majesty, and has since the date of the grant of the certificate been for a period of not less than seven years ordinarily resident out of His Majesty's Dominions otherwise than as a representative of a British subject, firm, or company carrying on business, or an institution established, in His Majesty's Dominions, or in the service of the Crown, and has not maintained substantial connection with His Majesty's Dominions, and that the continuance of the certificate is not conducive to the public good:

Now, therefore, by this Order, made in pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by Section 7 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Acts, 1914 and 1918, I revoke the said certificate, and I direct such revocation to have effect from the date hereof, and I further order the said certificate to be given up and to be cancelled.

And I further direct that Alice Nieder-Hofheim, the wife of the said Ludwig Nieder-Hofheim, shall cease to be a British subject.

Provided that workers who commence employment in the trade at or over the age of 19 shall receive for a period of 12 months a General Minimum Time-Rate of 2s. per week of 48 hours, i.e., 7d. per hour. Provided also that this General Minimum Time-Rate shall be increased by 5s. per week of 48 hours, i.e., 1½d. per hour, in the case of any such worker who is 23 years of age or over. Workers to whom this proviso applies shall, on the expiration of 12 months' employment in the trade, receive such General Minimum Time-Rates as they may be entitled to under the provisions of this Part of this Schedule.

SECTION VII.

The weekly rates, set out in Section VI of this Part of this Schedule are based on a week of 48 hours and are subject to a proportionate decrease according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

SECTION VIII.

In cases where a worker is employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ORDINARY worker an amount not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable. Providing that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies this condition, regard shall not be had to the earnings of workers under 22 years of age.

PART II.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3(1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board HAVE DECLARED THE NORMAL NUMBER OF HOURS OF WORK IN THE TRADE to be as follows:—

IN ANY WEEK	48
ON ANY DAY OTHER THAN SATURDAYS, SUNDAYS AND CUSTOMARY PUBLIC AND STATUTORY HOLIDAYS	9

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays and hours worked on Saturdays (subject to the provisions set out below) shall be regarded as Overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

(A) FOR MALE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK:—

(1) ON ANY DAY OTHER THAN SATURDAYS, SUNDAYS, AND CUSTOMARY PUBLIC AND STATUTORY HOLIDAYS:—

(a) For the first two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER.

(b) For the second two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF.

(c) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE TIME.

Provided that where it is the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rates specified in sub-paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this paragraph shall not be payable on any day (other than Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays) until the number of hours worked exceeds 9½, 11½ and 13½ respectively.

(2) ON SATURDAY in respect of:—

(a) That class of worker who customarily attends on SIX DAYS a week:—

For all Overtime worked after the first five hours of work:—

(i) For the first four hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half times the General

Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF.

(ii) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE TIME.

NOTE.—During the first five hours worked on Saturday, the Minimum Rate applicable to the class of workers specified in this sub-paragraph is the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate set out in Part I of this Schedule.

(b) That class of worker who customarily attends on FIVE DAYS a week:—

(i) For the first two hours of Overtime (that is to say, for the first two hours worked on Saturday), One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER.

(ii) For the second two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF.

(iii) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE TIME.

(3) ON SUNDAYS AND CUSTOMARY PUBLIC AND STATUTORY HOLIDAYS:—

For all time worked, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rates otherwise applicable, *i.e.* DOUBLE TIME.

NOTE.—The Overtime Rates set out in paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) of this Sub-Section are payable as provided above in respect of all hours of Overtime worked on any day, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (1) (b) and (c), (2) (a) and (b) (ii) and (iii), and (3) of this Sub-Section.

Provided that where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

(5) Where it is, or may become, the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out in this Section shall apply to workers in like manner as if in the provisions of this Schedule as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substi-

tuted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

(B) FOR MALE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE-WORK:—

(i) **MALE WORKERS OF 22 YEARS OF AGE AND OVER** employed on Piece-work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates, each of which would yield in the circumstances of the case, to an **ORDINARY** worker not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate, or to the appropriate Piecework Basis Time-Rate according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-Section (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-work, were **TIME-AND-A-QUARTER**, **TIME-AND-A-HALF**, or **DOUBLE TIME** respectively.

(ii) **MALE WORKERS UNDER 22 YEARS OF AGE** employed on Piece-work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates, each of which would yield in the circumstances of the case to an **ORDINARY** worker not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-Section (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-work, were **TIME-AND-A-QUARTER**, **TIME-AND-A-HALF**, or **DOUBLE TIME** respectively.

PART III.

SECTION I.—For the purpose of this Schedule the following definitions shall apply:—

(a) A **MEASURE CUTTER** is a person who is employed in any process of Measure Cutting, and is capable of taking a complete set of measures, and of cutting any garment for a Male Person from model patterns, and has sufficient technical knowledge to draft men's trousers and alter the balance and distribution of widths, lengths, etc., for any garment for a Male Person (excluding alterations to stock patterns).

(b) A **CUTTER** (other than a Measure Cutter or Knife Cutter or Knifeman) is a person who is employed in:—

(i) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings or other materials;

(ii) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings or other materials;

(iii) Cutting cloth or linings or other materials; and

(iv) Dividing; that is, the process ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their assistants of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut and of assembling them into suitable bundles for making-up.

(c) A **KNIFE CUTTER** or **KNIFEMAN** is a person who is wholly or mainly employed on Band, Electric or Hand Knife processes.

(d) A **FITTER-UP** is a person who is employed in Fitting-up; that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, baisting or machining, which consists of preparing or fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being baisted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing or fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances, sewing, baisting or machining, forming no part or process of fitting-up.

(e) A **TAILOR** is a person who is employed in Sewing by hand in the process of making a garment or portion of garment.

(f) A **PRESSER** is a person who is employed in Pressing-off by hand or by machine.

(g) A **MACHINIST** is a person who is employed in Machining other than as a Plain Machinist as defined in Sub-Section (j) of this Section and is capable of machining any garment throughout.

(h) A **PASSER** is a person who is employed in examining Garments, either in the processes of being made-up or upon their completion.

(i) AN **UNDER-PRESSER** is a person who is employed in pressing processes other than Pressing-off.

(j) A **PLAIN MACHINIST** is a person who is employed in the process of making-up Plain Sleeves, Facings, Linings, Inside Pockets, Quilting and Padding.

(k) A **WAREHOUSEMAN** is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., the assembling, keeping, storing and distributing of stock, but **EXCLUDING** such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Porter.

(l) A **PACKER** is a person employed wholly or mainly upon the operation of packing goods and materials but **EXCLUDING** such operations included in the definitions of a Porter or Warehouseman.

(m) A **Porter** is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., unpacking, moving, loading or unloading of goods or materials, but **EXCLUDING** such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Warehouseman.

SECTION II.—The expression "London District" means the Metropolitan and City of London Police Districts.

SECTION III.—The expression "Heavy Cotton Clothing" means articles of clothing for Male Persons made wholly or mainly of cords, moles or other fustians, jeans, drills or other similar cotton material, but excluding gabardine raincoats.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, the respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule apply to all **MALE WORKERS** in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 15th January, 1920, and set out in Section II below.

SECTION II.—The Section of the Tailoring Trade specified in the above-mentioned Regulations is as follows:—

MEN'S AND BOYS' ready-made and wholesale bespoke tailoring; and all men's and boys' retail bespoke tailoring carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments; and any other branch of men's and boys' tailoring which is not included within the scope of the Regulations, dated 12th December, 1919, with respect to the constitution and proceedings of a Trade Board in Great Britain for Retail Bespoke Tailoring;

INCLUDING:—(1) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or remaking of men's or boys' tailored garments, except where included within the scope of the above-mentioned Regulations with respect to Retail Bespoke Tailoring;

(b) The cleaning of such garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of the garments;

(2) The lining with fur of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments;

(3) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the above-mentioned branches of tailoring;

(4) All warehousing, packing and other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the branches of tailoring in question.

But excluding:—(1) The making of headgear;

(2) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments;

(3) The making of boys' ready-made washing suits or sailor suits, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of garments to be worn by women or girls, or by children without distinction of sex.

NOTE.—The employment of young persons and children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and to the provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART V.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

Signed by Order of the Trade Board and in pursuance of an Order of the Minister of Labour confirming the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied by the Trade Board and set out above and specifying the 17th day of April, 1922, as the date from which they should become effective.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (1) (b) and (c), (2) (a) and (b) (ii) and (iii), and (3) of this Sub-section.

Provided that where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

(5) Where it is, or may become, the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out in this Section shall apply to workers in like manner as in the provisions of this Schedule as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

(B)—FOR FEMALE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE-WORK:—

(1) FEMALE WORKERS employed as CUTTERS, TRIMMERS or FITTERS-UP as defined in Section I of Part IV of this Schedule, and all FEMALE LEARNERS, employed on Piece-work, shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield in the circumstances of the case to an Ordinary Worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable (or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been made effective not less than the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable), an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-section (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, TIME-AND-A-HALF, or DOUBLE TIME respectively.

(2) ALL OTHER FEMALE WORKERS, employed on Piece-Work, shall receive in respect of each Hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ORDINARY worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, or to the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-Section (A) of this Section if the worker had been em-

ployed on Time-Work, were TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, TIME-AND-A-HALF, or DOUBLE TIME respectively.

PART IV.

For the purpose of this Schedule the following definitions shall apply:—

SECTION I.—CUTTERS, TRIMMERS and FITTERS-UP are workers who are substantially occupied in one or more of the following processes:—

(a) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings, or other materials.

(b) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings, or other materials.

(c) Cutting cloth or linings or other materials.

(d) Trimming; that is, the process as ordinarily carried on of cutting and assembling together the linings and fittings of garments.

(e) Dividing; that is, the process as ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their Assistants, of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut, and of assembling them into suitable bundles for making-up.

(f) Fitting-up; that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, baisting, or machining, which consists of preparing and fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being baisted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing and fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances; sewing, baisting or machining forming no part or process of fitting-up.

SECTION II.—A FEMALE LEARNER is a worker who:—

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring by an employer who provides the Learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a Learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a Female Learner on her first employment, in any branch or branches of Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring, specified in Part V of this Schedule, without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such Learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a Learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes, and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

SECTION III.—A HOME-WORKER is a worker who works in her own home, or in any place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART V.

SECTION I.—Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, the respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule apply to all FEMALE WORKERS in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, and dated 15th January, 1920, and set out in Section II below.

SECTION II.—The Section of the Tailoring Trade specified in the above-mentioned Regulations is as follows:—

MEN'S AND BOYS' Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring; and all Men's and Boys' Retail Bespoke Tailoring carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments; and any other Branch of Men's and Boys' Tailoring which is not included within the scope of the Regulations, dated 12th December, 1919, with respect to the Constitution and Proceedings of a Trade Board in Great Britain for Retail Bespoke Tailoring;

INCLUDING:—

(1) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of men's or boys' tailored garments, except where included within the scope of the above-mentioned Regulations with respect to Retail Bespoke Tailoring;

(b) The cleaning of such garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of the garments;

(2) The lining with fur of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments;

(3) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the above-mentioned branches of tailoring;

(4) All warehousing, packing, and other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the branches of tailoring in question;

BUT EXCLUDING:—

(1) The making of headgear;

(2) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments;

(3) The making of boys' ready-made washing suits or sailor suits, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of garments to be worn by women or girls, or by children without distinction of sex.

NOTE.—The employment of women, young persons and children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART VI.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than de-

ductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

Signed by Order of the Trade Board and in pursuance of an Order of the Minister of Labour confirming the minimum rates of wages as varied by the Trade Board and set out above and specifying the 17th day of April, 1922, as

the date from which they should become effective.

Provided that a worker who commences employment in the trade at or over the age of 19 shall receive, until the completion of 12 months' employment, a General Minimum Time-Rate of 28s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 7d. per hour. Provided also that this General Minimum Time-Rate shall be increased by 5s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.*, 1½d. per hour, in the case of any such worker who is 22 years of age or over. A worker to whom this proviso applies shall for the purpose of determining whether he has completed 12 months' employment be entitled to include all previous employment in the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke section of the Tailoring Trade coming within the scope of the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain). On the expiration of 12 months' employment he shall receive such General Minimum Time-Rates as he may be entitled to under the provisions of this Part of this Schedule.

SECTION II.—

For the purpose of determining whether a worker has completed the required period of employment or experience in the processes or occupations specified in the appropriate sub-section of Section I above he shall be entitled to include all previous employment or experience in the respective processes or occupations in (a) the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade as defined in Section II of Part IV of this Schedule, and/or (b) the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Section of the Tailoring Trade coming within the scope of the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain).

SECTION III.—

In cases where a worker is employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ORDINARY worker an amount not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable as set out in Section I above. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies this condition regard shall not be had to the earnings of workers under 22 years of age.

NOTE.—The employment of children under 14 years of age is subject to the provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART II.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE WORKERS

(All Ages).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section (3) (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board Have Declared The Normal Number of Hours of Work in The Trade to be as follows:—

In any Week	48
On any Day other than Saturday, Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays	9

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays and hours worked on Saturday (subject to the provisions set out below) shall be regarded as Overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of all hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

(A) For Male Workers employed on Time Work.

(1) On ANY DAY other than Saturday, Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays:—

(a) For the first two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER.

(b) For the second two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF.

(c) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE TIME.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates specified in paragraphs A (1) (a), (b) and (c) of this Section shall not be payable on any day (other than Saturday, Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays) until the number of hours worked exceeds 9½, 11½ and 13½ respectively.

(2) On Saturday in respect of:—

(a) That class of worker who customarily attends on SIX DAYS a week:—

For all Overtime worked after the first five hours of work:—

(i.) For the first four hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, **TIME-AND-A-HALF**.

(ii.) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, **DOUBLE TIME**.

NOTE.—During the first five hours worked on Saturday, the Minimum Rate applicable to the class of workers specified in paragraph (2) (a) is the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Part I of this Notice.

(b) That class of worker who customarily attends on **FIVE DAYS** a week:—

(i.) For the first two hours of Overtime (that is to say, for the first two hours worked on Saturday), One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, **TIME-AND-A-QUARTER**.

(ii.) For the second two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, **TIME-AND-A-HALF**.

(iii.) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, **DOUBLE TIME**.

(3) On Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays:—

For all time worked, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, **DOUBLE TIME**.

NOTE.—The Overtime Rates set out in Paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) of this Sub-section are payable as provided above, in respect of all hours of Overtime worked on any day, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, **TIME-AND-A-QUARTER**, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (1) (b) and (c), (2) (a), (2)(b) (ii.) and (iii.), and (3) of this Sub-section.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

(5) Where it is, or may become, the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out in this Section shall apply to workers in like manner as if in the provisions of this notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday," and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

(B) For Male Workers employed on Piece-Work.

(i.) Male Workers of 22 years of age and over employed on Piece-work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which

would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, or the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-section (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were **TIME-AND-A-QUARTER**, **TIME-AND-A-HALF**, or **DOUBLE TIME** respectively.

(ii.) Male Workers under 22 years of age employed on Piece-work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate or to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-section (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-work, were **TIME-AND-A-QUARTER**, **TIME-AND-A-HALF** or **DOUBLE TIME** respectively.

NOTE.—The hours which young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshops Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART III.

For the purpose of this Schedule the following definitions shall apply:—

(a) A Measure Cutter is a person who is capable of taking a complete set of measures and of cutting any garment for a female person from model, patterns and sketches.

(b) A Cutter (other than a Measure Cutter or Knife Cutter or Knifeman) is a person who is employed in—

(i.) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings or other materials;

(ii.) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings or other materials;

(iii.) Cutting cloth or linings or other materials; and

(iv.) Dividing; that is, the process ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their assistants of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut and of assembling them into suitable bundles for making-up.

(c) A Knife Cutter or Knifeman is a person who is wholly or mainly employed on Band, Electric or Hand Knife processes.

(d) A Fitter Up is a person who is employed in Fitting-up; that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, baisting or machining, which consists of preparing or fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being baisted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing or fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances, sewing, baisting or machining forming no part or process of fitting-up.

(e) A Tailor is a person who is employed in Sewing by hand in the process of making a garment or portion of garment.

(f) A Presser is a person who is employed in Pressing-off by hand or by machine.

(g) A Machinist is a person who is employed in Machining other than as a Plain Machinist as defined in Sub-section (j) of this Section and is capable of machining any garment throughout.

(h) A Passer is a person who is employed in examining Garments, either in the processes of being made-up or upon their completion.

(i) An Under Presser is a person who is employed in pressing processes other than Pressing-off.

(j) A Plain Machinist is a person who is employed in the process of making-up Plain Sleeves, Facings, Linings, Inside Pockets, Quilting and Padding.

(k) A Warehouseman is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., the assembling, keeping, storing and distributing of stock, but EXCLUDING such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Porter.

(l) A Packer is a person employed wholly or mainly upon the operation of packing goods and materials, but EXCLUDING such operations included in the definitions of a Porter or Warehouseman.

(m) A Porter is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., unpacking, moving, loading or unloading of goods or materials, but EXCLUDING such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Warehouseman.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, the respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule apply to all Male Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume trade as specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 20th November, 1919, and set out in Section II below.

The Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade as specified in the above-mentioned Regulations is as follows:—

SECTION II.—

Women's, Girls' and Children's Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring, and all Women's, Girls' and Children's Retail Bespoke Tailoring carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments, and any other branch of women's, girls' and children's tailoring, which is not included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board;

including—

(1) All operations and processes of cutting, making or finishing by hand or machine

of coats, costumes, tailored skirts, coat-frocks, mantles, service clothing or similar garments made by tailoring processes;

(2) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments, except where included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board;

(b) The cleaning of such garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of the garments;

(3) The lining with fur of any of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments;

(4) (a) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments other than hand embroidery or hand-drawn thread work on garments made of linen or cotton or of mixed linen or cotton;

(b) The following processes, if done by machine—namely, thread-drawing, thread clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring;

(5) Warehousing, packing and all other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned branches of tailoring;

But excluding—

(1) Those branches of women's or girls' bespoke tailoring and all operations or processes covered by the Trade Boards (Tailoring) Order, 1919;

(2) The making of head-gear;

(3) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments;

(4) Warehousing, packing and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises.

PART V.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

(b) For the second two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., TIME-AND-A-HALF.

(c) For Overtime, after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., DOUBLE-TIME.

Provided that where it is the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates specified in paragraphs A (1) (a), (b) and (c) of this Section shall not be payable on any day (other than Saturday, Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays) until the number of hours worked exceeds 9½, 11½ and 13½ respectively.

- (2) On Saturday in respect of :—

(a) That class of worker who customarily attends on Six Days a week :—

For all overtime worked after the first five hours of work :—

(i) For the first four hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., TIME-AND-A-HALF.

(ii) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., DOUBLE-TIME.

NOTE.—During the first five hours worked on Saturday the Minimum Rate applicable to the class of worker specified in paragraph 2 (a) is the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate set out in Part I of this Schedule.

(b) That class of worker who customarily attends on Five Days a week :—

(i) For the first two hours of Overtime (that is to say, for the first two hours worked on Saturday), One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., TIME-AND-A-QUARTER.

(ii) For the second two hours of Overtime One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., TIME-AND-A-HALF.

(iii) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE TIME.

(3) On Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays:—

For all time worked, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE-TIME.

NOTE.—The Overtime Rates set out in paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) of this Sub-section are payable as provided above in respect of all hours of Overtime worked on any day, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (1) (b) and (c), (2) (a), (2) (b) (ii) and (iii) and (3) of this Sub-section.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

(5) Where it is, or may become, the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out in this Section shall apply to workers in like manner as if in the provisions of this Schedule as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

(B) FOR FEMALE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE-WORK:—

(1) FEMALE WORKERS employed as CUTTERS, TRIMMERS or FITTERS-UP as defined in Section I of Part IV of this Schedule, employed on Piece-Work, and all FEMALE LEARNERS, employed on Piece-Work, shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an *Ordinary* worker, not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates applicable (or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate is applicable not less than the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable) an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-section (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, TIME-AND-A-HALF, or DOUBLE-TIME respectively.

(2) ALL OTHER FEMALE WORKERS employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an *Ordinary* worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, One-

Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate or the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-section (A) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, TIME-AND-A-HALF, or DOUBLE-TIME respectively.

NOTE.—The hours which Female Workers, Young Persons and Children are allowed to work are subject to the Provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—For the purpose of this Schedule the following definitions shall apply:—

CUTTERS, TRIMMERS and FITTERS-UP are workers who are substantially occupied in one or more of the following processes, that is to say:—

(a) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings, or other materials.

(b) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings, or other materials.

(c) Cutting cloth or linings, or other materials.

(d) Trimming, that is, the process as ordinarily carried on of cutting and assembling together the linings and fittings of garments.

(e) Dividing, that is, the process as ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their Assistants, of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut, and of assembling them into suitable bundles for making up.

(f) Fitting-up, that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, basting, or machining, which consists of preparing and fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being basted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing and fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances; sewing, basting or machining forming no part or process of fitting-up.

SECTION II.—A FEMALE LEARNER is a worker who:—

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment, in the branch or branches of the trade described in Part V. of this Schedule, without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

SECTION III.—The expression "HOME-WORKER" means a worker who works in her own home or in any place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART V.

SECTION I.—Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, the respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule apply to all Female Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade as specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 20th November, 1919, and set out in Section II. below.

SECTION II.—The Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade as specified in the above-mentioned regulations is as follows:—

Women's, Girls', and Children's Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring, and all Women's, Girls' and Children's Retail Bespoke Tailoring carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments, and any other branch of women's, girls' and children's tailoring which is not included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board.

Including—

(1) All operations and processes of cutting, making or finishing by hand or machine of coats, costumes, tailored skirts, coat-frocks, mantles, service clothing, or similar garments made by tailoring processes;

(2) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments, except where included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board;

(b) The cleaning of such garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of the garments;

(3) The lining with fur of any of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments;

(4) (a) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments other than hand-embroidered or hand-drawn threadwork on garments made of linen or cotton or of mixed linen and cotton;

(b) The following processes if done by machine, namely, thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling, and paring;

(5) Warehousing, packing, and all other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned branches of tailoring.

But excluding—

(1) Those branches of women's or girls' Bespoke Tailoring and all operations or processes covered by the Trade Boards (Tailoring) Order, 1919;

(2) The making of head-gear;

(3) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments;

(4) Warehousing, packing and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises.

PART VI.

The above Minimum Rates of wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION I.—Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, the proposed Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule shall apply to the CLASSES OF WORKERS specified in this Notice in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the Retail Bespoke Section of the Tailoring Trade as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 12th December, 1919, and set out in Section II of Part V of the Schedule to the said Notice R.B. (15) issued by the Trade Board, dated 21st February, 1922.

SECTION II.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these proposed Minimum Rates of Wages.

NOTE—The employment of Women, Young Persons and Children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and to the provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

The Trade Board will consider any OBJECTIONS to the above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 22nd April, 1922. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11, Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE
(GREAT BRITAIN) ORDER OF 1922
(No. 22).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Application of Order to Scheduled Districts.

1. Parts I, III and IV of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Order," are hereby applied, subject to the modifications hereinafter appearing, to the several districts described in the First Schedule hereto, each of which shall be a Scheduled District for the purposes of that Order.

Prohibited Area.

2. The area described in the Second Schedule hereto shall be a Prohibited Area for the purposes of the Principal Order.

Movement into Scheduled Districts.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Principal Order, animals may be moved for any purpose into any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule hereto from premises not situated within any Scheduled District for the purposes of the Principal Order if accompanied throughout the movement by a licence granted under this Order.

Movement from one Scheduled District to another of Animals intended for Immediate Slaughter.

4.—(1) Notwithstanding anything contained in the Principal Order, an animal intended for immediate slaughter may be moved from any premises situate within any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule hereto (but not within the Prohibited Area) to any slaughter-house in another such Scheduled District, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted under this Order.

(2) An animal intended for immediate slaughter may also be moved from any farm premises within any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule hereto (but not within the Prohibited Area) to a market or sale authorised by the Local Authority under the Principal Order in any such other Scheduled District as aforesaid, if accompanied

by a Movement Licence granted under this Order.

(3) Where any animal is moved with a licence granted under this Article it shall be moved as far as practicable by railway and shall not be untrucked or moved on any road outside a Scheduled District.

Holding of Farm Sales.

5.—(1) No sale of cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be held on any farm premises in any Scheduled District for the purposes of the Principal Order, unless it is authorised by a licence granted by the Local Authority under this Article. No such sale shall be licensed to be held on any premises situate within a radius of one mile from any place which is, for the time being, declared to be a place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

(2) No licence shall be granted for the movement of animals to any farm premises for the purpose of sale thereon.

Disinfection and Cleansing of Vehicles used for the Conveyance of Animals in Scheduled District.

6.—(1) Any float, cart, van or other vehicle (other than a railway truck) used for the conveyance of any animal or carcase thereof (not being a dressed carcase) into, within, or out of any Scheduled District shall, as soon as practicable after each occasion on which it is so used, and before any other animal is placed therein, be disinfected and cleansed by, and at the expense of, the person using the same for such purpose in the manner following:—

(a) The floor of the vehicle, and all other parts thereof with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact, and all dung, litter or other thing that has been in contact with or used by such animals whilst being conveyed therein, shall be thoroughly saturated with carbolic acid or other suitable disinfectant.

(b) The same parts of the vehicle shall thereafter be scraped and swept out, and all dung, litter and sweepings shall be effectually removed from contact with animals and buried or otherwise destroyed.

(2) Every rope, net or other apparatus used in connection with any such conveyance of animals as aforesaid otherwise than on a railway shall, as soon as practicable after being so used, and before being used for other animals, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority by being thoroughly saturated with a solution of carbolic acid or other suitable disinfectant.

(3) If the person using any such vehicle or thing for the conveyance of an animal fails to disinfect and cleanse it as required by this Article, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894, and it shall be lawful for the Local Authority, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the offence, to cause such vehicle or thing to be disinfected and cleansed and to recover summarily the expenses of such disinfection and cleansing from such person.

(4) Where the power of causing any vehicle or thing to be disinfected and cleansed under this Article is exercised by a Local Authority, the owner of the vehicle or thing and the person using the same shall give all reasonable facilities for that purpose, and any person failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Slaughter within 48 hours of Animals moved with a Licence to a Slaughterhouse.

7. Where animals are moved to a slaughterhouse with a licence under the Principal Order or this Order the animals on arrival at the slaughterhouse shall be detained therein until slaughtered, and shall be slaughtered therein within forty-eight hours of their arrival thereat.

Modification of Principal Order as regards Granting of Movement Licences.

8.—(1) A Movement Licence granted under the Principal Order or this Order shall be granted only by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises to which the animals are to be moved are situate. Except in the case of movement from a Landing Place for Irish Animals or from premises not situated in any Scheduled District a licence so granted shall not be available unless and until it is countersigned by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District from which the animals are to be moved, who shall endorse upon the licence the route by which the animals are to be moved and the date and time of the countersignature. No licence shall be granted or countersigned by an Inspector of any Local Authority if in his opinion it is undesirable to grant or countersign it, or if the intended movement is to or from any premises situate within a radius of one mile of any place which is for the time being declared to be a place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease, or if the intended movement would involve movement on a road which is within a radius of one mile of any such place. Provided that for the purpose of the granting or countersigning of a licence any premises on which Foot-and-Mouth Disease has existed since 23rd January, 1922, and on which all animals thereon have been slaughtered, shall cease to be regarded as a place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease at the expiration of twenty-eight days from the date upon which the slaughter of the stock was completed, if the final disinfection of the premises has been completed to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Ministry.

(2) In any case in which the issue of a movement licence by an Inspector of the Local Authority is prohibited by this Article a licence may be issued by an Inspector of the Ministry if he considers it necessary that the animals should be allowed to be moved.

(3) A movement licence granted under this Order shall be available for three days from the time it is countersigned, and no longer.

(4) In the case of every movement of animals authorised by a licence under this Order, the licence shall accompany the animals throughout the movement.

Prohibition of Movement out of Scheduled Districts.

9. Except as specifically provided in Article 4 of this Order no animals shall be moved out of any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule hereto for any purpose, and the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Great Britain) Order of 1922 (No. 16) shall not be deemed to authorise the movement of any sheep out of any such Scheduled District.

Detention of Wintering Sheep.

10. The provisions of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Great Britain) Order of 1922 (No.

19) which relate to sheep moved to wintering quarters in an "Infected Area" shall be read and have effect as if they related also to sheep moved to wintering quarters in any district described in the First Schedule hereto.

Offences.

11. If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of this Order, the owner and the person for the time being in charge of the animal in respect of which, as the case may be, the same is done or omitted to be done, and the occupier of the premises concerned shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Revocation.

12. The Orders described in the Second Schedule hereto are hereby revoked.

Commencement.

13. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-second day of April, nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

14. This Order may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (GREAT BRITAIN) ORDER OF 1922 (No. 22).

Inns, Boarding-houses, Schools, etc.
