

Curtis Darley, of the Royal Air Force, in recognition of his gallantry in endeavouring to save life.

On the night of the 27th September, 1919, a Vickers-Vimy Aeroplane, piloted by Captain Cecil Hill Darley, brother of Squadron Leader (then Flight Lieutenant) Darley, who was acting as Navigation Officer, made a forced landing by Lake Bracciano, some twenty miles north of Rome, when on a flight from England to Egypt.

On the following morning, in taking off, the aeroplane failed to clear a telegraph pole, and crashed, immediately bursting into flames. Squadron Leader Darley was thrown clear, but at once rushed to the blazing wreckage and displayed very conspicuous bravery and devotion in persistent, but unavailing, attempts to rescue his brother, who was pinned in the pilot's seat. His efforts to release his brother were only brought to an end by his collapse. He sustained such severe burns that he was a patient in hospital for over eighteen months.

BUTTON-MAKING TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS OTHER THAN HOME- WORKERS.

This Notice sets out the Minimum Rates of Wages for Male and Female Workers, other than Home-workers, as varied by the Trade Board and confirmed by an Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 13th July, 1922, together with the Minimum Rates (as set out in the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice V (6), dated 13th October, 1921), which are not affected by the variation and which remain in operation.

The Minimum Rates of Wages set out in the Schedule below are effective as follows:—

(1) The General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate marked † and the Overtime Rates based thereon, as from 17th October, 1921;

(2) All the other Minimum Rates (and the provision set out in Section III of Part III of the Schedule) as from 1st August, 1922.*

* Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 7th August, 1922.
