

for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bonds of different dates.

8. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

9. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills or Bonds are to be dated.

10. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills and Bonds.

11. Tenders must be made on the printed forms, which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

12. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

A note was addressed to His Majesty's Acting Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs by the Norwegian Chargé d'Affaires in London on the 17th July last, stating that the Norwegian Government considered that the Treaty between Great Britain, France, Germany, Norway and Russia respecting the Independence and Integrity of Norway, signed at Christiania on the 2nd November, 1907, had lapsed as far as Great Britain, France and Norway were concerned, as it was incompatible with the terms of the Covenant of the League of Nations, and that, as regards Germany and Russia, the Treaty had lost its principal basis owing to events which have occurred since it was signed.

2. A note was addressed by the Marquess Curzon of Kedleston to the Norwegian Chargé d'Affaires on the 22nd ultimo, stating that His Majesty's Government agreed to consider the Treaty to be no longer in force.

Under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon the Clearing Office and the Administrator by Article I. (XIV.) of the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Orders, 1920-1921, I hereby prescribe the 30th (thirtieth) day of December, 1922, as the final date by which proofs by British nationals of debts due to them by Austrian nationals or of pecuniary obligations of the Austrian Government under Article 248 of the Treaty of Saint Germain-en-Laye and other claims by British nationals against the Austrian Government, with the payment of which the property rights and interests within His Majesty's Dominions or
