

dredging operations, or other naval or military purposes, to reserve any area for such operations or purposes, the area will be marked by buoys coloured Green and White, or by posts coloured Red, and after twenty-one days' warning notice has been issued by the Admiralty, and published in the London Gazette, prohibiting within the area so marked either trawling, or anchoring and kedging, or trawling, anchoring and kedging, or trawling, anchoring, kedging and passing through the said area, no vessel shall act in contravention of the said warning notice, unless compelled to do so by stress of weather or to avoid accident; nor when such area is uncovered or nearly uncovered at low water shall any person pass through or remain in it, unless by permission of and under such arrangements as may from time to time be made by the Officer in charge of such operations.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

9. When one of His Majesty's vessels or other vessel, being either in charge of one of His Majesty's Officers or over 2,500 tons gross register, intends to pass between the Dockyard Port of Devonport and Plymouth Sound she shall hoist the Red Ensign over 'M' Flag (International Code—Alphabetical) by day, or a red light by night at the foremast head, and all other of His Majesty's vessels present in the Port and the Signal Station flagstaff at Mount Wise shall hoist the Pilot Jack by day, or show position lights (two white lights vertical, 8 feet apart, hoisted at the Peak, or, if no gaff, hoisted abreast the maintop in the middle line of the ship or on the Ensign Staff) by night, as a general warning. For the same purpose there shall be hoisted on the flagstaffs at Longroom and North and South Dockyard Signal Stations by day only a Ball over Red Burgee when the vessel flying the Red Ensign over 'M' Flag at the foremast head is proceeding from Sound to Hamoaze or when the said vessel is proceeding from Hamoaze to Sound a Red Burgee over Ball, and all traffic outwards between Rubble Bank and Melampus Light Buoy is to cease when the Ball over Red Burgee is hoisted, and all traffic inwards between Melampus Light Buoy and the Rubble Bank is to cease when the Red Burgee over Ball is hoisted; and all other vessels under way in the Dockyard Port of Devonport or in the narrow waters of Plymouth Sound shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the Red Ensign over 'M' Flag or showing a Red Light at the foremast head; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

20. No vessel shall pass another vessel in the narrow waters of Plymouth Sound. Steamers navigating with the tide shall have priority of passage through the narrow waters of the Sound over steamers navigating against the tide, and a steamer navigating against the tide shall ease her engines and wait until a steamer navigating with the tide has passed clear.

mitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

The Warden and Fellows of Merton College, Oxford, respectfully submit for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council the following amending Statute which was duly made in accordance with the provisions of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, section 54, having been passed unanimously at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for the purpose, and held on the 9th day of December, 1922.

It was resolved at the said General Meeting—

That Statute V. 5 (b), as amended in 1905, be further amended so as to read:—

"The scale of payment shall be as follows:—£200 a year after twenty-one years' service, with an addition of £33 a year up to thirty years' service; £500 a year after thirty years' service and upwards."

EX PARTE THE PRESIDENT AND FELLOWS OF
ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE, IN THE UNIVERSITY OF
OXFORD.

A STATUTE, made to amend certain Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), in relation to St. John's College, in the University of Oxford, duly passed at General Meetings of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, on the 14th day of May and the 22nd day of June, 1920, by the votes of the whole number of persons present and voting, and submitted to His Majesty the King in Council.

Whereas in Statute III., clause 13, paragraph 1, of the Statutes of the said College, it is enacted:—"The President and Fellows may, if they think fit, from time to time at any stated General Meeting elect, without public notice or examination, to an Ordinary Fellowship any Professor or Public Reader in the University, any Sub-Librarian or Assistant-Librarian in the Bodleian Library, or any person whose attainments in Literature, Science, or Art, shall in their judgment qualify him to be a Fellow, and who shall undertake, if required, to perform any definite literary, scientific or educational work
