The Home Secretary gives notice that, in pursuance of Section 2 (1) of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920, he has made an Order authorising the employment on two day-shifts of women and young persons of 16 years of age and over in covering wires at the works of The Concordia Electric Wire Co., Ltd., Trent Mills, New Sawley, Derbyshire, subject to the conditions that no worker shall be employed in the afternoon shift for more than two consecutive weeks and that suitable messroom accommodation and facilities for sitting shall be provided.
