

At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 29th day of *January*, 1923.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 11th day of January, 1923, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the County of Kent now vested in us:

"Whereas the property particulars whereof are set forth in the Schedule hereunder written, is now vested in us not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but in possession, and we are desirous of selling the same or some portion thereof for the improvement of our Common Fund:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty that we may be authorized and empowered to sell or dispose of and duly to transfer or convey from time to time all or part of the said property described in the said Schedule for such consideration as shall appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Canterbury.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of Folkton, in the East Riding of the County of York, 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new Burial Ground in the Civil Parish of Folkton, in the East Riding of the said County of York, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 21st November, 1922, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 2nd January, 1923, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

FOLKTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Folkton, and in the Churchyard attached thereto. Provided that

(a) In the two walled graves now existing in the said Churchyard in which are interred the bodies of the Reverend John Farrar Wilkinson, and of members of the Tate family, burial may be allowed at their decease of Mary Margaret Hephzibah Wilkinson and Emily Jane Tate respectively, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In the earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, in which is interred the body of Candler Birdsall, the burial may be allowed at their decease of the bodies of Jane Birdsall and Mary Anne Birdsall, subject to the condition that no part of the coffins containing the bodies shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
