Malaga, March 26. N. S.

**T**HE 18th Instant called in here the *Phoenix*, Capt. *Jacobs*, in 28 days from *Walterford*, bound to *Venice*, and failed again the 21th. The *Eagle* Galley from *Zant* failed the same day for *Cadiz*; and yesterday departed the *Gospright*, and the *Jeffry*-Galley both from *Scanderoon*; they left the *Priscilla* in the *Offin*. The *Martin* Galley, and the *Levant* Galley, are arrived here from *Bristol*.

*Madrid*, April 3. Their Catholick Majesties continue in perfect Health. New Levies are made in all these Parts for the Service of *Catalonia*, and all other necessary Preparations are continued for the Campaign on that side. Letters from *Cadiz* of the 18th Instant say, the Viceroy who came home with the *Flora* from the *West-Indies*, died some days before at *Port St. Mary's*.

*Corunna*, April 14. The 11th Instant arrived here the *Spanish-Alliance* Packet-Boat, in 3 days from *Fatmouath*. His Majesty's Ship the *Barwick*, commanded by the Lord *Hamilton*, failed this morning for *Vigo*. Four of the Dutch Ships that went with the Dutch Convoy from *Bilboa*, are returned to *St. Antonio*, having escaped from the French Men of War who attack'd the said Convoy.

*Warsaw*, April 10. All the Endeavours that have been hitherto used to break the Confederacy of the Troops in *Upper Poland*, proving ineffectual, the Senate have now under Consideration what remains to be done, in the present Circumstances of Affairs, to preserve the Publick Peace, and secure the Freedom of the Election, which is to be the next Month; and being of Opinion, that the best means that can be made use of for this Purpose, is, that all the Gentlemen should appear in the Field, the Primate has been desired to send out Circular Letters to Summon them against the time of the Election in the manner that has been practised formerly in like Occasions.

*Vienna*, April 13. As the Season advances, so the Preparations for the Campaign are hastned; Great quantities of all sorts of Military Provisions are sent to *Hungary*, and repeated Orders have been dispatched to all the Troops to be in a readiness to march by the beginning of the next month. The Elector of *Saxony* continues to have frequent Conferences with the Imperial Ministers, to regulate Matters in relation to the next Campaign: The Emperor has not yet declared who shall Command the Army under him. We have an account from *Sclavonia*, that a strong Party of our Husars passed the *Save* lately, and meeting a Convoy that was going with Provisions to *Belgrade*, they attackt and defeated the *Turks* that were appointed for their Guard, killing above 100 Janiaries, and bringing away a very considerable Booty of laden Horses and Camels. The Bishop of *Passaw* is expected here to morrow, to receive his Dispatches; after which he will proceed on his Embassy to *Poland*.

*Francfort*, April 21. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is come to *Guntzburg*, where he will make a stay of a few days: In the mean time the Forces of the

Allies draw together near *Hailbron*; and will Encamp at *Eppingen* so soon as there is Forage to be found in the Field. They continue to work on the Lines and Fortifications that are making near the River *Neckar*, in which Service a great number of Peasants are constantly employed. The Marquis *d'Uxelles*, one of the French General Officers, is come to *Landaw*; The last advices from those Parts say, the French are not in such forwardness to take the Field as has been reported; and that 'twill be the middle of the next Month before their Troops can draw together; They continue to provide a great many Boats and small Vessels on the *Rhine*, and to make Preparations for some great Enterprize.

*Cologne*, April 23. Letters from *Ausbourg* of the 18th of this Month advise, That the States of the Circle of *Suabia* had been assembled several days; that they had agreed to furnish their Quota of Troops for the Army of the Empire, and had appointed Deputies to assist on their part at the General Meeting of the Six Circles which is to be held at *Francfort* in the beginning of the next Month. The Deputies of the Circle of *Westphalia* are still assembled here. The *Brundenburgh* Forces that were quartered in this Country are marched towards the *Meuse*.

*Paris*, April 22. The French King has taken a review of the Troops of his Household, and order'd Detachments out of them to serve this Campaign; The Musketeers begun their march this day. Marechal *Villeroy* will part hence in few days for *Flanders*; Marechal *Choiseul* and Marechal *Catinat* for *Germany*, and the Duke *de Vendosme* for *Catalonia*; and the Marechals *de Tourville* and *d'Estree* are to Command on the Sea Coasts. The News from *Flanders* of the Allies having taken the Camp of *Deynse*, which the Marechal *de Boufflers* intended to possess himself of, gives them a mortification at this Court. The Difficulties the French Ministers meet with in raising Money, increase every day; None of the Edicts that have been published of late answer expectation; and they can expect no better success of any new Projects. The Squadron of 5 Men of War and 3 or 4 Fire-ships, Commanded by the Marquis *de Nesmond*, are fitting at *Brest*, and may be ready to go to Sea by the end of this Month. We have yet no News of Monsieur *Pointy*; but every Body concludes he is gone to the *West-Indies*. The Princes *Alexander* and *Constantin* went hence this day, in order to return to *Poland*.

*Brussels*, April 24. The Elector of *Bavaria* has taken the Camp at *Deynse*, to the great disappointment of the French, who were on their march to possess themselves of it; and his Electoral Highness has caused the *Avenues* to be Fortified, and has there above 30000 Men, most Foot, the greatest part of the Horse remaining in the Garrisons, for the conveniency of their subsisting, till there be Forage in the Field. The Forces commanded by the Prince *de Vandemont*, are at present posted in several small Bodies; one towards *Louvain*; another about half a League from this City; and a third near *Waterlo*; and this last Camp being most exposed to the Enemy, they are casting

casting up several Works for its greater Security. The French Troops move towards the Frontiers, and are preparing to Encamp. Last Sunday in the Evening happened here a very violent Storm, accompanied with Thunder and Lightning; the latter set the Steeple of the Great Church on Fire, and did other mischief.

Hague, April 26. N. S. The Imperial Ministers having removed the Difficulties about the Preliminaries, it's believed the Conferences will be began in few days. The Spanish Plenipotentiaries have desired of the French a List of the Reunions they offer to restore in the Spanish Netherlands, and in all probability this will be soon adjusted. A Squadron of Dutch Men of War sailed last Tuesday out of the Texell to cruize to the Northward; and at the same time Lieutenant-General Allmond failed with 6 Men of War for England. The Elector of Bavaria, according to the last Letters from Flanders, continued with the Army under his Command at Dejnse, and is Fortifying that Camp; Prince Vaudemont has divided his Army in 3 Bodies, which are Encamp'd near Louvain, Waterloo, and Brussels. The Letters come in this day from Stockholm say, the King of Sweden was very ill, and past all hopes of Recovery.

Falmouth, April 17. Yesterday arrived the Spanish Alliance from the Groyne; whence she came on the 7th Instant; and the same day was chased by 5 Ships under French Colours, two of them of about 70 Guns each. We have an account that a Suedish Ship of 500 Tuns, bound home from St. Ubes, was cast away lately near Scilly, and all the Men lost. A Dutch Privateer called the Cortine, is come in from cruising on the French Coasts, where she took 3 French Prizes laden with Salt, Wine and Brandy.

Portsmouth, April 20. The 18th Instant came to Spithead 6 great Dutch Men of War from the Texell; one of them a Vice Admiral. The Newfoundland Convoy failed the 17th from St. Helens.

Whitehall, April 19. The Right Honourable the Earl of Dorset and Middlesex having resigned into His Majesty's Hands the Office of Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, His Majesty has conferred the same upon the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, to whom His Majesty was pleased to deliver the White Staff this morning.

Kerfington, April 21. Dom Luis de Cunes, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, had this day his Publick Audience of his Majesty, to which he was Conducted in His Majesty's Coach, in the usual Manner, by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury do hereby give Notice, That on Friday next at Three of the Clock in the Afternoon, the Subscribers for Circulating the Bills authorized to be issued at the Exchequer, are desired to meet at the Guildhall in London, to chuse Trustees for managing the Monies that are or shall be subscribed for the said Bills, which (after the Issuing of His Majesty's Royal Proclamation pursuant to the Act of Parliament in that behalf) are according to the same Act, to be received in all Payments to His Majesty, as well those for Customs and Excise, as all other Taxes, Aids, and Revenues whatsoever.

Whereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, certain Duties are laid upon Leather; and whereas it is thereby Enacted, That all Tanners, Leather-Dressers, Carriers, Leather-Sellers, Shoe-makers, Coach-makers, Colter-makers, Bridle-Cutters, Saddlers, and all other Makers, Dressers, or Workers in Leather, having on the 20th of April 1697, in his or their Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person in Trust for them any Stock or quantity of Leather not made into Wares being for Sale, shall pay after the Rate of 12l. 10s. per Cent. of the true Value of such Leather, and shall deliver to the proper Officer a Particular in Writing of the whole Quantity, Kinds and Values of their Stocks of such Leather on or before the First of May 1697. under the Penalty of 20l. And the said Officers are empowered to enter the Shops, Warehouses, or other Places, to view and take an account of the said Stocks. And whereas the Lords Commissioners of His

Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to the Power of the said Act, have Authorized the present Commissioners of Excise to put the said Act in Execution; These are to give notice, That the said Commissioners of Excise have appointed the Officers of Excise to execute the same under them, that is all Tanners and other Persons aforesaid, delivering to the Officer of Excise of their respective Divisions, or as they respectively do dwell, true Particulars and Valuations of their Stock of Leather, may avoid the said Penalty, and all other Penalties relating thereunto.

And whereas by an Act of the said Sessions, granting to His Majesty a Duty of 6d. per Bushel on Malt, it is therein Enacted, that all Maltsters, or makers of Malt for Sale, Sellers and Retailers of Malt, Brewers, Distillers, Innkeepers, Victualers and Vinegar-makers, and all other Persons in trust for them, who shall be possessed of any Malt on the 20th of April, 1697. shall make a true and particular Entry thereof, at the Office of Excise, within the Limits of which they shall respectively inhabit, within six days thereafter, on pain to forfeit the Sum of 50l. and the Malt of which no such Entry shall be made: The Commissioners of Excise, who are empowered to put the said Act in Execution, do hereby give notice to all Persons concerned accordingly.

The Commissioners appointed by His Majesty's Commission under the Great Seal of England, for taking Subscriptions to enlarge the Capital Stock of the Bank of England, do hereby give notice, That on Monday the 26th day of this Instant April, at 8 of the Clock in the Morning, at Mercer's Hall in Cheapside, the Books for taking the said Subscriptions will be Opened, and will so continue every day after (Sundays excepted) from the hours of 8 to 12 in the Morning, and from 3 to 7 in the Afternoon, to the 24th of day of June next.
