

ments and in respect of Patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which Scheme together with the Consents in writing of the Right Honourable Jane, Baroness de Saumarez, O.B.E., being the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of Coddendam with Crowfield (in case the same were now vacant) and of the Reverend Walter Wyles the Incumbent of the same Benefice has been transmitted to us for our consideration.

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said Scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

"And we recommend that there shall be charged upon the income of the Benefice of Coddendam an annual sum or charge amounting to One hundred and twenty five pounds in favour of the Benefice or Perpetual Curacy of Crowfield to be received and enjoyed by the Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Crowfield for ever, such annual sum or charge to be due and payable by the Incumbent for the time being of the Benefice of Coddendam on the first day of October and the first day of April in every year, and that the Incumbent for the time being of the Benefice or Perpetual Curacy of Crowfield shall for recovering the sum or charge so proposed to be made annually payable to him as such Incumbent have as against the Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Coddendam all such remedies and powers as may by law then in force be had for the recovery of a debt.

2. The reference to the Restoration of Order in Ireland Act, 1920, section one (1) and (4) in the Schedule to the principal Order shall be construed as extending to and shall include the regulations made in pursuance of the said Act.
