

carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect":

And whereas by section 6 of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, enacted "That any such scheme, or modification, as aforesaid may be drawn up according to the regulations and directions in the hereinbefore in part recited Act contained, subject to the consent in writing of the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, under his or their hands, notwithstanding the vacancy of such benefice or benefices; and that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council thereupon to make an Order for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect; and that such Order being registered in the registry of the Diocese as directed by the hereinbefore in part recited Act shall come into operation and shall be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever notwithstanding such vacancy or vacancies":

And whereas by section 8 of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, further enacted: "That when by any Order of His Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof duly nominated and licensed thereto and his successors shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid":

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, certified to His Majesty in Council, by his Report dated the 18th day of November, 1922, as follows:—

"The undersigned Cosmo Gordon, by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England and Metropolitan in pursuance of an Act passed in the 1st and 2nd years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria intituled 'An Act to abridge the holding of Benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the Clergy' doth hereby report to Your Majesty, as follows:—

"That there is in the County and Diocese of York the Parish of Easington, which includes the Chapelry and Township of Liverton, the boundaries of which said Township of Liverton are well known and defined.

"That the said Parish of Easington is a Benefice in the said County and Diocese of York and is styled and known as the Rectory of Easington.

"That according to the last census the population of the said Parish of Easington exclusive of the said Chapelry of Liverton is 853 persons.

"That according to the same census the

population of the said Chapelry and Township of Liverton is 1,147 persons.

"That there is within the boundaries of the said Chapelry and Township of Liverton a Consecrated Chapel sufficient for the accommodation of the Inhabitants of the said Township.

"That it is proposed that the said Chapel situate at Liverton aforesaid together with the said Chapelry of Liverton shall be severed from the said Parish of Easington and shall be constituted a separate Benefice and Parish for Ecclesiastical purposes under the name or style of the Vicarage of Liverton.

"That the net annual value of the said Rectory of Easington is Nine hundred and ten pounds (£910).

"That it is proposed by the present Scheme that the Tithes belonging to the Benefice situate within the said Chapelry and Township of Liverton, and the Mines and endowments thereof, as more particularly set forth in the first and second schedules hereto annexed shall be transferred to the Chapel at Liverton aforesaid when constituted a separate Benefice and Parish, as and for and in aid of the maintenance and Benefit of the Minister thereof.

"That the Patronage of the said Benefice of Easington is vested in Your Majesty through Your Majesty's Lord High Chancellor who is a consenting party to the said Scheme.

"That the said Rectory of Easington is now vacant.

"That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament passed in the Session held in the 1st and 2nd years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, and of the 2nd and 3rd years of the same reign, Chapter 49, the said Chapelry and Township of Liverton may advantageously be separated from the said Rectory and Parish of Easington and be constituted a separate Parish and Benefice for all Ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the first mentioned Act the said Archbishop has prepared a Scheme in writing appended to this Report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration above mentioned may best be effected, and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such Scheme he doth by this Report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty to the intent that Your Majesty in Council in case it shall be thought expedient so to do may make an Order for carrying such Scheme into effect."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Archbishop and the consent of the Patron of the said Benefice are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"That the said Chapelry and Township of Liverton shall be severed from the said Parish and Benefice of Easington and be constituted a separate Benefice and Parish for all Ecclesiastical Purposes under the name or style of The Vicarage of Liverton of which the said Chapel situate within the said Chapelry and Township of Liverton shall be the Parish Church.

"That the proposed separate Parish and Benefice of Liverton shall be subject to the same Ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the Benefice of Easington and the Incumbent of the proposed new Parish shall have exclusive charge of souls within the limits of the same.
