(a) for prescribing the manner in which overseers are to furnish to the registration officers particulars of persons qualified and liable to serve as jurors or qualified to serve as special jurors:

(b) for authorizing the sheriff to require information to be furnished to him in writing or otherwise by persons summoned to attend on juries with respect to their sex and their professions, callings or businesses, and for imposing on persons who fail to furnish the required information or who furnish false information a penalty to be recovered on summary conviction not exceeding five pounds in respect of any one offence:

(c) for making such adaptations in any enactments as are necessary for giving full effect to the said Act:

(d) otherwise for carrying that Act into effect:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon Him by the said

Act, and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The name of any person appearing in the electors lists for the Autumn Register for any year who is qualified and liable to serve as a juror shall be marked with the letter "J" and the name of any person so appearing who is qualified to serve as a special juror shall be marked with the letters "SJ" in manner following, that is to say:—

The said letter or letters shall (subject to any variation authorized by the Secretary of State in any particular case) be printed in heavy type and inserted in Column (3) of the Register, immediately after the names of the juror concerned, as in the following example:—

Whitehead, Albert Stanley—J
Longmore, William—SJ.

2.—(1) The particulars to be furnished by the overseers to the registration officer under sub-section (3) of section 1 of the said Act, shall be furnished in the following manner, that is to say, the overseers shall, as the registration officer may require,—

(a) furnish the registration officer with a list of all the persons in their parish, or where the parish consists of more than one registration unit, in each registration unit in their parish, who are qualified and liable to serve as jurors, showing in the case of each

person the address of his qualifying premises in that unit and elsewhere in the parish and the value of those premises for the purposes of assessment to the poor rate or inhabited house duty and his occupation, and whether that person is qualified to serve as a special juror:

(b) insert in copies of the electors lists and lists of claimants, if any, the marks required by this Order to be inserted in the electors lists for the Autumn Register against the names of the persons in those lists who are qualified and liable to serve as jurors, or qualified to serve as special jurors, as the case may be, and to transmit to the registration officer the copies so marked.

(2) If the registration officer, for the purpose of his duties under the said Act, requires any particulars in addition to those provided in manner aforesaid he may send to the overseers a demand for further information on Form C of heading I of Schedule I to the Representation of the People Order, or on a form similar thereto, and the overseers shall complete and return the form.

3. Where an application is made to the registration officer by any person marked as a juror to have the mark placed against his name removed, notification by the registration officer of his decision under sub-section (5) of section one of the said Act shall be given to that person on or before the fifteenth day of September in any year.

4.—(1) If, where the registration officer under paragraph 21 of the First Schedule to the Representation of the People Act, 1918, allows a claim made by any person to be registered as a voter, the registration officer considers that person to be qualified and liable to serve as a juror, he shall give that person notice that he will be marked as a juror unless within five clear days thereafter he gives notice of objection to the registration officer, and in any case in which the registration officer is of opinion that any person who has made a claim to be registered as a voter would, if so registered, be qualified and liable to serve as a juror, he shall include in any notice issued under the said paragraph as to the time and place at which the claim of that person to be so registered will be considered, a notice that if the claim is allowed that person will be marked as a juror unless he gives notice of objection to being so marked in manner aforesaid.

(2) The decision of the registration officer on any objection made by any person under this Article shall be notified on or before the fifteenth day of September in any year.

(3) If any person is aggrieved by the decision of the registration officer on any such objection or by his failure to notify his decision, he may apply to a court of summary jurisdiction under sub-section (5) of section 1 of the said Act, in the same manner as if the registration officer had refused to comply with an application made to him under sub-section (4) of the said section or had failed to notify his decision thereon.

5. Sub-section (2) of section two of the said Act shall have effect as if the reference therein to persons marked in the electors lists as jurors or special jurors included a reference to persons whose names are on the list of claimants and who receive notice in accordance with Article 4 (1) of this Order that they will be marked as jurors.

6.—(1) Any sheriff by whom a jury summons is issued may require the person to whom the

summons is issued to furnish to him in writing information with respect to his sex, profession, calling or business.

(2) If any person required by a sheriff to furnish information in pursuance of this Article fails to furnish in writing to the sheriff the required information within three days after the date on which the jury summons is received by him, or furnishes false information, he shall be liable on summary conviction in respect of each offence to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

(3) Where a sheriff requires information to be furnished in pursuance of this Article, he shall for the purposes of facilitating the furnishing of the information enclose with the jury summons an officially-stamped postcard on which the information may be given.

7.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Juries Order, 1923.

(2) The Juries Order, 1922, and the Jurors (Information as to Professions) Order, 1922, are hereby revoked.

RULES PUBLICATION ACT, 1893.

INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

In conformity with the provisions of section 1 of the Statute 56 & 57 Victoria, Chapter 66, notice is hereby given that the Secretary of

State for India in Council proposes, with the advice and assistance of the Civil Service Commissioners, at the expiry of forty (40) days from the date of this Gazette to make revised rules as shown below in pursuance of the power conferred on him by section 97 of the Government of India Act.

INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

REGULATIONS FOR COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS TO BE HELD IN INDIA.

For Rule 5, which at present is as follows:—

“(5) If limitation is decided upon, the Local Government of Madras, and of the United Provinces, shall be responsible for the due representation of Coorg and Ajmer Merwara respectively on the Quota Committees appointed by them, and the Local Government of the Punjab shall in like manner be responsible for the due representation of the North-West Frontier Province and Delhi,”

it is proposed to substitute the following:—

“(5) In a case where the region for which the Local Government of a Governor's province is required to set up a Quota Committee includes territory other than the Governor's province the Local Government shall be responsible for the due representation of that other territory on the Quota Committee.”

In Rule 9, which at present is as follows:—

“(9) A candidate must have attained the age of 21 and must not have attained the age of 23 on the first day of August in the year in which the examination is held, or be in a position to claim such a concession under the provisions of the Appendix to these Regulations as will render him eligible,”

it is proposed to cancel all words after “held.”

For Rule 11, which at present is as follows:—

“(11) A candidate must be of good moral character,”

it is proposed to substitute the following:—

“(11) Every candidate shall satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that his character is such as to qualify him for employment in the Indian Civil Service.”

For Rule 19, which at present is as follows:—

“(19) A candidate for a science on the higher grade (subjects 37, 39, 41, 43, 45, 47) must have undergone two years' laboratory training in an institution authorised to prepare candidates in that subject for a University degree and must send in a voucher to that effect from the head of the institution. For candidature for a science on the lower grade or Geography or Experimental Psychology (subjects 36, 38, 40, 42, 44, 46, 48, 50) a similar voucher of one year's laboratory training is required,”

it is proposed to substitute the following:—

“(19) A candidate for any of the subjects numbered 35 to 47 must have undergone laboratory training in an institution authorised to prepare candidates in that subject for

a University degree and must send in a voucher to that effect from the head of the institution, two years' laboratory training being required for a science on the higher grade and one year's training for a science on the lower grade. For candidature for Geography or Experimental Psychology or Engineering or Agriculture (subjects 48, 50, 53, 54) a certificate of one year's training in an institution authorised to prepare candidates in that subject for a University degree is required.”

In addition to the above changes it is proposed to make a few verbal changes in other rules.

It is intended that the revised rules shall come into operation for the competitive examination to be held in India in January and February, 1924. Copies may be obtained from the Secretary, Judicial and Public Department, India Office, S.W. 1.

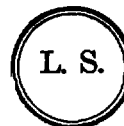

DRESSMAKING AND WOMEN'S LIGHT CLOTHING TRADE BOARD
(SCOTLAND).

DEFINITIONS, CONDITIONS AND PROVISIONS GOVERNING THE APPLICATION
OF THE MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES EFFECTIVE IN THE TRADE
UNDER THE TRADE BOARDS ACTS.

PART I.

DEFINITIONS.

FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE APPLICATION OF THE MINIMUM RATES OF
WAGES FIXED BY THE TRADE BOARD:—

SECTION I.

Definition of Retail Branch of the Trade.

THE RETAIL BRANCH of the trade is that branch of the trade specified in Part IV of this Notice, in which it is the usual practice for the employer to supply the garment direct to the wearer.

SECTION II.

Definition of Learner and conditions to be complied with.

A FEMALE LEARNER is a worker who:—

- (a) Is employed by an employer who provides such Learner with reasonable facilities for practically and efficiently learning one of the branches of trade as carried on by the employer or the various processes involved in the making of any of the articles specified in the definition of the trade referred to in Part IV of this Notice; and

Certificates of Learnership required.

- (b) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a Learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a Female Learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such Learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of Learnership.

SECTION III.

Definition of Homeworker.

The expression "HOMEWORKER" means a worker who works in her own home or any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART II.

PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR
FEMALE LEARNERS.

SECTION I.

With respect to Female Learners in the Retail Branch of the Trade (as defined in Section I of Part I of this Notice):

Advances.

- (a) The advances to be given to Learners shall become due on the completion of each 12 months of employment in the Retail Branch of the trade.

Completion of Learnership.

- (b) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner and be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to Workers other than Learners on the completion of four years of employment in the Retail Branch of the trade.

SECTION II.

With respect to Female Learners in the Wholesale Manufacturing and all other branches of the trade *except* the Retail Branch:—

Advances.

- (a) The advances to be given to Learners shall become due on the completion of each six months of employment, after the age of 14 years, in the Wholesale Manufacturing or any other branch of the trade *except* the Retail Branch.

PART II.—*continued.*

Completion of Learnership.

(b) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner, and be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rates applicable to Workers other than Learners upon the fulfilment of the conditions appropriate to her, as set out below:—

<i>Age of Entering upon Employment.</i>	<i>Conditions.</i>
Under 15 years of age	The completion of not less than three years of employment <i>and</i> the attainment of the age of 18 years.
15 and under 16 years of age	The completion of not less than two years of employment <i>and</i> the attainment of the age of 18 years.
16 years of age and over	The completion of two years of employment.

(c) No Female Learner shall be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to Workers other than Learners until she has attained the age of 18 years, notwithstanding any employment she may have had. Provided that, in determining the age of entry and the length of employment all service prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded.

SECTION III.

Certification of Learners.

An application for a Learner's Certificate must be made to the Trade Board in respect of every Worker whom it is desired to employ at the special lower rates fixed for Learners. Unless a Learner's Certificate has been obtained, or application has been made which has been acknowledged and is still under consideration, and the other conditions of Learnership laid down in Section II of Part I of this Notice are complied with, the minimum rate payable is that for Workers other than Learners.

PART III.

PROVISIONS RELATING TO OVERTIME RATES FOR ALL WORKERS.

SECTION I.

Normal Number of Hours of Work.

In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board HAVE DECLARED THE NORMAL NUMBER OF HOURS OF WORK IN THE TRADE to be as follows:—

In any week	46
On any day (other than Saturday)	8½
On Saturdays	4

Provided that any other day (not being Sunday) may be substituted by an employer for Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours of work on such substituted day shall be 4, and the normal number of hours on Saturday shall be 8½.

Provided also that all time worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply

SECTION II.

Overtime Rates.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of all time worked by a worker, WHETHER ENGAGED ON TIME-WORK OR ON PIECE-WORK, in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

- (1) For the FIRST TWO HOURS of Overtime on any day, except Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER.
- (2) For Overtime AFTER THE FIRST TWO HOURS of Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF.
- (3) For all time worked on SUNDAYS AND CUSTOMARY PUBLIC AND STATUTORY HOLIDAYS, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE-TIME.
- (4) For all time worked in any week in excess of 46 hours, the Overtime Rate shall be TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of this Section. The Overtime Rate shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds 8½, or in the case of Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor) exceeds 4, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 46.

PART III—*continued.*

Provided—

- (a) That where it is the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.
- (b) That where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rates shall only be payable in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required after 50 hours have been worked.
- (c) That where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out above shall apply in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

PART IV.

APPLICABILITY OF MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES.

SECTION I.

Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts the minimum rates of wages which are effective in the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade (Scotland) apply to all workers in Scotland in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade as specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 29th March, 1920 (as varied by the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920), and as set out below:

SECTION II.

Specification of the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade.

The trade as specified in the above-mentioned Regulations is as follows:—

Those branches of the Women's Clothing Trade that are engaged in the making of Non-Tailored Garments, namely, the making from textile or knitted fabrics of (a) non-tailored wearing apparel (other than handkerchiefs) worn by women or girls, or by children without distinction of sex, or (b) boys' ready-made washing suits or sailor suits, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of garments to be worn by women or girls or by children without distinction of sex;

INCLUDING:

- (1) All operations and processes of cutting, making, or finishing by hand or machine of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-ropes, jumpers, sports-coats, neckwear, tea-gowns, dressing-gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, undershirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby-linen, or similar non-tailored articles;
- (2) The making of field bonnets, sun bonnets, boudoir caps or infants' millinery, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of any of the articles mentioned in paragraph (1) above;
- (3) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of any of the above-mentioned articles;
- (b) The cleaning of any of the above-mentioned articles, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of such garments;
- (4) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of such articles, other than hand embroidery or hand-drawn-thread work on articles made of linen or cotton or of mixed linen and cotton;
- (5) The following processes if done by machine:—thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring;
- (6) Laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, packing, warehousing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the making, altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of any of the above-mentioned articles;

BUT EXCLUDING:—

- (a) The making of knitted articles; the making of underclothing, socks and stockings, from knitted fabrics; and the making from knitted fabrics of articles mentioned in paragraphs (1) and (2) above, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabrics;
- (b) The making of gloves, spats, gaiters, boots, shoes and slippers;
- (c) The making of headgear, other than the articles mentioned in paragraph (2) above;
- (d) The branches of trade covered by the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919;
- (e) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments;

- (f) The making of women's collars and cuffs and of nurses' stiff washing belts where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of men's or boys' shirts or collars;
- (g) Warehousing, packing and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises;

AND EXCLUDING also any processes or operations included in the Appendix to the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920.

NOTE.—The employment of women, young persons and children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920, and the Education (Scotland) Act, 1918.

SUPPLEMENTARY DISTRIBUTION.

It has been decided to make a Supplementary distribution of Naval Prize Money, to begin on Wednesday, the 8th instant. No applications should be made earlier. The full value of one share in the supplementary distribution earned by thirty months' qualifying service is ten shillings, with a minimum allocation of five shillings, and the arrangements for the payment of those entitled to participate who are not now serving are as under:—

2. Applications are first invited in respect of those whose surnames begin with the letters A, E, L and S, and should be made in accordance with the instructions in paragraph 4. Public notice will be given in the Press as it becomes possible to deal with further groups, and no action can be taken on applications made out of order.

3. The qualifications for participation are the same as for the first distribution, and only those entitled to share in the previous distributions should apply.

4. Payment to the Imperial Naval Forces will be made in the following manner:—

(a) To Warrant Officers and men of the Royal Naval Reserve resident in Great Britain or the Northern Government Area, Ireland, through Registrars, R.N.R., from whom they will receive notifications of the sums due without application. Should they not receive such notification within a month of the appearance of the Admiralty notices relating to their particular cases (see paragraph 2) they should then make application,

either in person or by letter, to the Registrar, R.N.R. (Superintendent of Mercantile Marine Office), nearest to their place of residence.

(Men who have changed the address given on their Protection and Identity Certificate or on final discharge from the Naval Reserve, should—if they have not already done so—at once notify the change to the nearest Registrar, R.N.R., or, if more convenient, direct to the Registrar-General of Shipping and Seamen, Tower Hill, London, E. 1, quoting the number and letter of their Certificate R.V.2).

(b) To all other Officers, and to men of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Royal Naval Air Service, Royal Naval Reserve except as provided in (a), Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve and Mercantile Marine serving under Naval Engagements, by the Accountant-General of the Navy, Prize Branch, Cornwall House, Stamford Street, London, S.E. 1.

Applications for which no official forms are required, should be made as follows:—

Officers: By letter, signed by claimant and accompanied by a Certificate of Service or Appointment or other evidence of Identity.

Men: By letter, signed by claimant, stating the address of nearest Money Order Office, and in all Royal Navy, Royal Marine, Royal Naval Air Service and Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve cases, enclosing Service Certificate, and when notation of previous payments was made on any other Certificate, that one as well. In Mercantile Marine cases the Continuous Discharge Certificate, or war period extract therefrom, certified at a Mercantile Marine Office with impressed Stamp of Office, must be forwarded with the application, and in Royal Naval Reserve cases the R.N.R. Certificate of Discharge (R.V.8 or variants), or Protection and Identity Certificate or Certificate R.V.2, if in the possession of the applicant.

(c) To representatives of all Officers and men deceased, by the Accountant-General of the Navy, to whom applications should be made by letter signed by the actual claimant, addressed as shown in (b) above.

5. In all cases in which by reason of an adjustment having been necessary, the supplementary payment is not strictly proportionate to the previous ones, an explanation will be given for the information of the claimant, but while the distribution is in progress it will not be possible to undertake correspondence without delaying payments and holding up the return of Service Certificates, etc., and the acceptance of the amounts remitted will not prejudice a further adjustment later if required.

6. No assignments of Prize Money can be recognised.

7. Payment to those still serving (including Officers on Half Pay and Royal Air Force, late Royal Naval Air Service) will be made later through the Ships or Depots, etc., in which they are borne, except that Officers on Half Pay will be paid by the Accountant-General of the Navy. No applications should be made pending the issue of specific directions in Fleet Orders on the subject.

By His Excellency Major-General Sir William Fry, K.C.V.O., C.B., Lieutenant-Governor of the said Isle, etc., etc.

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to make a new Order for regulating the importation of animals into this Island.

Now I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, and under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon me by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, do hereby Order as follows:—

1. No animal shall be landed in this Island unless accompanied by a Licence issued by the Government Secretary or the Chief Clerk, Government Office.

2. An animal shall only be landed in this Island at the Port named in the Licence, and travel by the route specified in the Licence.

3. The Licence must accompany the animal on the Voyage, and must be delivered by the Master of the vessel or his representative to the Police Officer in charge of the Police Station at the Port of arrival.

4. The animal must be taken at once to the destination specified in the Licence without coming into contact with other animals, and on arrival at the place of destination must be kept isolated from other animals for a period of seven days in the case of pedigree animals imported for breeding purposes, and fourteen days in the case of all other animals.

5. An animal may be moved from the place of destination to a Slaughter House for slaughter at any time within the period of isolation.

6. An animal will be liable to detention at the Government Lairs or other place if found by an Inspector under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts to be suffering from contagious or infectious disease, or is suspected of having been in contact with an animal suffering from such disease, and will be subject to such special treatment and isolation as may be approved by the Lieutenant-Governor.

7. An animal will be liable to detention at the Government Lairs or other place if an outbreak of a scheduled disease has occurred in or near the district from which the animal has been brought whilst the animal is in transit.

8. A Licence to import an animal will expire at the end of Eighteen days from the date of issue.

9. An animal landed under this Order and removed into the Government Lairs shall, while detained in such Lairs, be supplied with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water by the owners or consignees thereof.

10. The Superintendent of the Government Lairs shall have power to forbid persons entering the same without permission from himself.

11. The Superintendent of the Government Lairs shall keep in a book to be provided for the purpose a record of all animals moved into or out of the Lairs.

Animals Suffering from Tuberculosis.

12. Any animal removed to the Government Lairs, which, on being examined by an Inspector under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, is found to be showing symptoms of tuberculosis, shall, at the option of the owner or the consignee, either be at once removed from the Lairs to the nearest public abattoir and there slaughtered under inspection, or sent back by such owner or consignee at his own expense to the port from which such animal was shipped.

Importation of Animals from Abroad.

13. It shall not be lawful to land in this Island any animal brought from any country or place outside Great Britain, Ireland and the Channel Islands.

14. It shall not be lawful to land in this Island:—

(a) The carcase of an animal which has died or been slaughtered on board a vessel while in a port in any country outside Great Britain, Ireland and the Channel Islands, or during the passage from any such port to this Island, or thereafter while in any port in this Island; or

(b) The dung of any such animal; or

(c) Any fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about any such animal unless they have been scraped and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and subsequently disinfected, and unless the permission of the Chief Constable has been obtained.

15. The Principal Officer of Customs and Excise in this Island, or any Officer of Police, may seize and detain any carcase, dung, fittings, pens, hurdles or utensils landed in contravention of this Order, and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Government Office with a view to the destruction or disposal of such carcase, dung, fittings, pens, hurdles or utensils.

Interpretation.

16. In this Order—

“Government Lairs” means such place or places as the Lieutenant-Governor may from time to time appoint for the detention of Animals under this Order.

“Animal” for the purpose of this Order means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, calves, sheep, lambs, goats and swine.

“Disease” for the purpose of this Order means Cattle Plague (that is to say, Rinderpest, or the disease commonly called Cattle Plague), Contagious Pleuro-pneumonia of Cattle, Foot-and-Mouth Disease, Sheep-pox, Sheep Scab, Swine Fever (that is to say, the disease known as Typhoid Fever) of

Swine, Soldier, Purples, Red Disease, Hog Cholera or Swine Plague), or Anthrax.

"Carcase" means the carcase of an animal, and part of a carcase, and the meat, flesh, bones, hide skin, hoofs, horns, offal or other part of an animal, separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof.

Repeal.

17. The Animals (Importation) Order, 1917, is hereby repealed.

Commencement.

18. This Order shall come into operation on the day of the date hereof.

Short Title.

19. This Order may be cited as "The Animals (Importation) Order, 1923."

To empower the Corporation to lay pipes in private streets, to purchase, erect, maintain and let dwelling houses for their employees, to supply gas fittings, to require the use of anti-fluctuators with gas engines and the provision of a valve where high pressure air is used, to refuse to supply persons in debt for other premises, to make a minimum charge for stand-by supplies of gas, to supply and purchase gas in bulk, and to lay down pipes for ancillary purposes.

4. To make provision as to charges to be made for gas supplied by means of prepayment meters, and for the hire of prepayment meters and fittings to be used therewith.

5. To make provision with reference to the cutting off supplies to consumers in certain cases, and for payment by occupiers of premises of the cost of reconnecting supplies.

6. To enable the Corporation to make specifications with regard to the minimum size and the material of the pipes with the fittings thereof which are to be laid by the owner or occupier of any premises on those premises either in the first instance or on the occasion of any renewal.

7. To empower the Corporation to compel consumers to repair piping or appliances which may be found to be in a dangerous condition.

8. To amend the obligations of the Corporation as to giving a supply of gas in any case where the capacity of a main is insufficient for the purpose.

9. To amend the powers and obligations of the Corporation with respect to the application of revenue and deficiency of receipts in respect of the Gas Undertaking.

10. To confer upon the Corporation other powers commonly conferred upon Gas Undertakings, and to enact all such provisions as may be deemed expedient for effecting the purposes aforesaid, or any of them.

11. To incorporate with the Order all or some of the provisions of the Gas Works Clauses Acts, with or without modification, and to incorporate, amend, extend or repeal some of the provisions of the Newbury Borough Extension Act, 1878, and any Act or Order affecting the Corporation.

12. Any local or other public authority, company or person desiring to bring before the Board of Trade any objection to the draft Order may do so by registered letter, addressed to the Director of Gas Administration, Board of Trade, Great George Street, London, S.W. 1, and despatched on or before the 3rd July, 1923.
