WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 27th day of July, 1922, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of the Benefice (being an United Benefice) of Kirby Bedon with Whitlingham with part of the neighbouring Benefice (being an United Benefice) of Framingham Earl with Bixley, and for effecting the union of the residue of the said Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley with the neighbouring Benefice (being a Rectory) of Framingham Pigot, all of which Benefices are situate in the County of Norfolk and in the Diocese of Norwich:

“ Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Bertram, Bishop of Norwich, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the

said Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Whitlingham with a portion of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley and further to inquire into and report upon the union of the said Benefice of Framingham Pigot with the remaining portion of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Norwich, and therein recommended the severance from the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley of the Benefice of Bixley and the union of the said Benefice of Bixley so severed with the neighbouring Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Whitlingham, and therein further recommended the union of the remaining portion of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley with the neighbouring Benefice of Framingham Pigot and the terms for effecting the said two unions, and the said Bishop of Norwich signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

“ And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the two unions of Benefices so recommended as aforesaid which Scheme is based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

“ And whereas all of the said Benefices of Kirby Bedon with Whitlingham, Framingham Earl with Bixley and Framingham Pigot are now full, the Reverend Edward Herring Kinder being the present Incumbent of the United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Whit-

lingham, the Reverend Alfred Edward Alston being the present Incumbent of Framingham Earl with Bixley, and the Reverend Ernest Mansfield Feast being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Framingham Pigot:

"And whereas the said Edward Herring Kinder has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Bixley and Whitlingham, and the said Ernest Mansfield Feast has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice of Framingham Pigot with Framingham Earl, if and when the unions which are hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

"And whereas only one Parsonage House will be left standing or remaining within or belonging to the United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Bixley and Whitlingham when the unions which are hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect, namely, the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Whitlingham, and such Parsonage House will accordingly become the Parsonage House of such United Benefice:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Bertram, Bishop of Norwich (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That a portion of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley, that is to say, the Benefice of Bixley shall be severed from the remaining portion of the United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley, and that the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley after the severance of such portion as aforesaid, and the said Benefice of Framingham Pigot shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Framingham Pigot with Framingham Earl,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That the severed portion of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley and the said United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Whitlingham shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Bixley and Whitlingham,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

3. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley shall be vacant, the unions shall forthwith take effect, but if the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley be not then vacant, then the said unions shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley.

"4. That upon the said unions taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Framingham Pigot shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Framingham Pigot with Framingham Earl, and so soon as conveniently may be the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Framingham Earl, and the site and appurten-

ances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and that out of the net proceeds of such sale we shall first appropriate a sum not exceeding two hundred pounds sufficient in our opinion to defray the cost of reasonable structural improvements to the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Framingham Pigot and intended to be the Parsonage House of the United Benefice of Framingham Pigot with Framingham Earl as aforesaid, and the balance of such net proceeds shall be held and invested by us as to one moiety thereof for the benefit of the said United Benefice of Framingham Pigot with Framingham Earl, and as to the other moiety thereof for the benefit of the said United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Bixley and Whitlingham.

"5. That after the said unions have taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice of Framingham Pigot with Framingham Earl from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, the Patron of the said Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley having the right upon the first presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate right of presentation, and the Patron of the said Benefice of Framingham Pigot having the right of presentation upon the second presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate turn thereafter.

"6. That after the said unions have taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Bixley and Whitlingham from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, that in each series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination the Patron of the said Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Whitlingham shall have the first and third turns and the Patron of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley shall have the second turn.

"7. That upon the said unions taking effect the endowments of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley shall be divided and apportioned as follows, that is to say, there shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Bixley and Whitlingham (1) All those corn rents arising within the parish of Bixley payable to the clerical rector under the terms of an Award dated the 8th October, 1805, in pursuance of the Enclosure Act, 39 & 40 Geo. III, c. 33, and (2) a sum of £602 14s. 10d. Metropolitan £3 per cent. per annum Consolidated Stock at present held by us in favour of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley, and there shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice of Framingham Pigot with Framingham Earl all other the endowments of the said United Benefice of Framingham Earl with Bixley.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to

the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patrons affected, together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, after giving full consideration to such objections, have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Norwich has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Act against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas part of the United Benefice of Kirby Bedon with Whitlingham (a Benefice affected by the said Scheme) is situate in the City or Municipal Borough of Norwich:

And whereas the said Scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Norwich.

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Bertram, Bishop of Norwich, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said Benefice of Thurton with a portion of the said United Benefice of Carleton with Ashby and further to inquire into and report upon an union of the said Benefice of Claxton with the remaining portion of the said United Benefice of Carleton with Ashby duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Norwich and therein recommended the severance of the Benefice of Carleton from the said United Benefice of Carleton with Ashby and the union of the said Benefice of Carleton so severed with the neighbouring Benefice of Claxton and therein further recommended the union of the remaining portion of the said United Benefice of Carleton with Ashby that is to say the Benefice of Ashby with the neighbouring Benefice of Thurton and the terms for effecting the said two unions and the said Bishop of Norwich signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for effecting the two unions of Benefices so recommended as aforesaid, which Scheme is based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas the said Benefices of Thurton, Carleton with Ashby and Claxton are all at present vacant:

"And whereas there is no Parsonage House at present belonging to either of the said Benefices of Thurton or Claxton and only one Parsonage House will be left standing or remaining within or belonging to the United Benefice of Thurton with Ashby when the unions which are hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect, namely the Parsonage House at Ashby and such house will accordingly become the Parsonage House of the United Benefice of Thurton with Ashby:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Bertram, Bishop of Norwich (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That a portion of the said United Benefice of Carleton with Ashby, that is to say, the Benefice of Carleton shall be severed from the said United Benefice of Carleton with Ashby and the Benefice of Carleton so severed and the said Benefice of Claxton shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Claxton with Carleton,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices of Claxton and Carleton shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That the said Benefice of Carleton with Ashby after the severance of such portion as

aforsaid and the said Benefice of Thurton shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Thurton with Ashby' but the Parishes of the said Benefices of Thurton and Ashby shall continue distinct in all respects.

" 3. That the said unions shall take effect upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette.

" 4. That after the said unions have taken effect the whole right of Patronage of and presentation to the United Benefice of Claxton with Carleton shall belong to the present Patron of the said Benefice of Claxton, and the whole right of Patronage of and presentation to the United Benefice of Thurton with Ashby shall belong to the present Patrons of the said Benefice of Thurton.

" 5. That upon the said unions taking effect all the glebe situate within the Parishes of Ashby and Thurton and all the Tithe Rentcharges arising within the said Parish of Ashby such glebe and Tithe Rentcharges being part of the endowments at present belonging to the said united Benefice of Carleton with Ashby and all capital sums of money and stocks (if any) representing or being the produce of the sale redemption or other conversion of any part or parts of the said glebe or Tithe Rentcharges shall become and be part of the endowments of the United Benefice of Thurton with Ashby and all the other endowments of the said United Benefice of Carleton with Ashby, shall become and be part of the endowments of the United Benefice of Claxton with Carleton.

" Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of Radcliffe, in the County of Lancaster, 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853; as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new Burial Ground in the Township of Radcliffe, in the said County of Lancaster, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited; and that Burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 16th April, 1923, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 28th May next; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in the said Township save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

Radcliffe.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of St. Thomas, Radcliffe, and in the Churchyard attached thereto. Provided that

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, and in which the bodies of not more than three persons have

been buried at the date of this Order, the burial may be allowed of the body of the widow or widower of a person heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

The following Statutes made by the Governing Body of Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge, on the 8th day of May, 1923, and sealed on the same day, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of them having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877."

STATUTES to alter and amend the Statutes of Sidney Sussex College in the University of Cambridge, which amending Statutes were duly made at a Meeting of the Governing Body of the College, specially summoned for this purpose, and held on the eighth day of May one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three, and having been passed at such Meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the persons present and voting, are now submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

We the Master, Fellows and Scholars of the said College, in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th Section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do hereby alter and amend the Statutes of our said College in manner following, that is to say:—

By repealing Chapter IVa, intituled "Of a Research Fellowship" and substituting therefor the following new Statute:—

Chapter IVa.

Of Research Fellowships.

1. At a College Meeting, of which at least one month's notice shall have been sent to all the Fellows, the Governing Body may, by the vote of a majority of their number, elect any person of marked ability in arts or science to a Research Fellowship for a period of two years, with power to re-elect for a further period of one year. Research Fellows so elected shall receive one dividend of the same amount as that paid to Fellows under Chapter XIX, paragraph 2.

2. After providing for all Scholarships chargeable on the Taylor Scholarship Fund the Governing Body may also in like manner as in the last preceding paragraph elect any person of marked ability in mathematics or natural sciences to a Taylor Research Fellowship for a period of two years, with power to re-elect for a further period of one year, and a Research Fellow elected under this paragraph shall receive a stipend not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) from the Taylor Scholarship Fund.

3. Research Fellows shall not be members of the Governing Body, but shall be allowed such privileges with respect to commons, the occupation of rooms and other advantages as the Governing Body may from time to time determine.

4. It shall be the duty of Research Fellows to devote their whole time to research, and they shall not engage in any work other than research, except by the permission of the Governing Body.

By repealing in Chapter XIII, intituled "Of the Bursar, the annual College Officers and the Audit of Accounts" the two concluding sentences of the second paragraph and substituting therefor the two following sentences:—

"The Bursar shall submit his accounts, duly audited, to a College Meeting, once a year, within sixty days after Michaelmas. The Master shall give at least four weeks' notice of this Meeting to all the Fellows."

By substituting in Chapter XIX, intituled "Of Dividends," the word "yearly" for the word "half yearly" in the opening part of the second paragraph, and also in the third paragraph of this Statute.

By substituting the sum of "two hundred and fifty pounds (£250)" for the sum of "one hundred and twenty-five pounds (£125)" in the concluding part of the second paragraph and also in the third paragraph of the same Statute.

The following Address was presented to The KING on Thursday, the 31st ultimo, on the occasion of the laying of the foundation stones of the new Hospital Buildings and the opening of the new Anatomy Building at University College, Gower Street, W.C.:—

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE HOSPITAL
AND MEDICAL SCHOOL

and

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON,
UNIVERSITY COLLEGE.

May it please Your Majesty. We are assembled in Your gracious presence and in that of Her Majesty the Queen, for the purposes of promoting important developments in medical education in the Capital of Your Empire.

Shortly after the conclusion of the Great War, Your Majesty's Government provided the means of establishing at the Medical School of University College Hospital whole-time Professorships in Medicine and Surgery. Attracted by the establishment of these Professorial Chairs and by the other plans in contemplation at the Medical School of the Hospital and at University College, the Rockefeller Trustees selected these Institutions as the recipients for a great International Gift, in order to put them in a position to realise a co-operative programme for the improvement of medical education and research.

This Gift, although made in two portions, one to the Medical School and the other to the College, has a single aim, which is indicated by the fact that these two Institutions, each with its functions clearly defined, form constituent parts of a co-operative educational centre within the University of London.

The scheme, so far as it affects University

College, involves the erection of new buildings for Anatomy and the closely allied sciences of Histology and Embryology, and for the extension of facilities for the teaching of Physiology and Pharmacology.

As regards University College Hospital and Medical School, the scheme necessitates the erection of a new Nurses' Home, the provision of 120 additional beds for the purposes of the Medical and Surgical Units, and 60 additional beds for the purpose of a new Obstetric Unit, with corresponding laboratory accommodation, and a special laboratory for Biochemistry.

For this comprehensive scheme, the Rockefeller Trustees have presented the munificent sums of £370,000 to the College and £835,000 to the Medical School from the funds placed at their disposal by Mr. John D. Rockefeller for "the promotion of the well-being of mankind throughout the world."

The Medical School and the College are deeply sensible of the responsibility involved in their acceptance of these gifts, but their record in the past, both in training medical men and women for the service of the State and in advancing medical knowledge and practice through scientific method, enables them to look with confidence to the discharge of the great new duties that will fall upon them.

In making their Gift, the Rockefeller Trustees realised that the increased accommodation entailed would impose an extra financial burden on the Hospital and very properly left to the people of this country the obligation of making provision for the additional expenditure. But by this scheme the Hospital will be able to render so much more effective service to the sick, especially in the Department of Obstetric Surgery, than has hitherto been possible, that the fullest reliance, it is thought, can be placed on those who believe in maintaining the system of Voluntary Hospitals to provide the funds annually required.

Your Majesty and Her Majesty the Queen have always taken such an intimate interest in all that concerns the welfare of Your people, that there is no need to enlarge further on the advantages that may accrue, not only to London, but to the Empire and indeed the whole world, from this munificent donation. There can surely be no more striking example of the painstaking care with which the Trustees appointed by Mr. Rockefeller give effect to the ideals that lie behind his great conception or of the fidelity to those ideals with which they execute the great Trust that has been laid upon them.

In conclusion, on behalf of the Hospital, the Medical School, and the College, we respectfully crave permission to express our grateful pleasure at the honour conferred upon us by the presence among us of Your Majesties, and to assure Your Majesties of our sincere and lasting loyalty and devotion.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

On behalf of The Queen and Myself I thank you for your loyal and dutiful Address. It gives Us much pleasure to come here to-day for the double purpose of laying the foundation-stones of the new Obstetric Hospital and Nurses' Home of University College Hospital and of opening the new Anatomy Building of University College.

We are all conscious of the significance of the occasion. This is no ordinary extension

of a hospital or a college. The vast scale of the new development which we are inaugurating would be enough in itself to render it remarkable. There can be but few instances on record in which any foundation has received, like this College and Medical School, £1,200,000 from a single benefactor in a single gift. And the magnificent generosity of the Rockefeller Trustees is the more impressive since it is bestowed by a citizen of the United States of America upon a College and Hospital in London and thus upon the people of Great Britain and the Empire. It has been said that science knows no frontiers, and, indeed, the declared purpose of the Trustees is "to promote the well-being of mankind throughout the world." That they should have selected the University of London to receive this princely endowment is not merely a high and well-deserved compliment, and the creation of yet another bond to the ties of sympathy and friendship which unite us with the United States, but it is also the evidence and declaration of their conviction that the progress of science and the welfare of mankind are not delimited by national or racial boundaries, and that work done here in London for the relief of human suffering, the improvement of medical education, and the advance of science is a service to the whole world.

It is not, however, only the magnitude of the endowment which lends importance to this occasion. These buildings are designed for new and far-reaching developments in the traditional organisation of British medical education. I understand that this College and Medical School were selected by the Rockefeller Trustees for their benefaction, from among many equally distinguished institutions, partly because the situation is central and yet affords room for expansion, and partly because the close connection of the Hospital and Medical School with the College provides favourable opportunities for that intercourse between Medicine and other branches of learning which is the surest defence against the evils of a narrow specialism; but still more because the authorities of University College Medical School had already established what has come to be known as the "unit system" of medical teaching; and the Trustees, being convinced of the value of this reform, were desirous of supplying the resources for carrying it out in an English University on a scale worthy of its importance both to education and research.

The essence of the unit system, as explained in the memorandum on Medical Education in England, recently published by the Ministry of Health, lies in effecting the closest possible correlation between the science and the art of Medicine, between research and education; and between theory and practice; and as a means to this end in placing the chief branches of medical education each under the direction of a head who is free to devote his whole time to teaching, research and hospital practice. This is a substantial development of the traditional British system, which entrusts the clinical teaching of medicine to men of distinction who are actively engaged as private practitioners. No appreciation can be too great for the devotion with which eminent physicians and surgeons have given, and are giving, their services to the treatment of hospital patients and the training of students. But the advance of knowledge and the ever rising standard of

medical education has necessitated reorganisation, which will give impetus to the more effective training and equipment of the British practitioner, with corresponding benefits to the health, well-being and happiness of the people. The underlying principle is as old as Ecclesiasticus: "The wisdom of a learned man cometh by opportunity of leisure; and he that hath little business shall become wise." Its specific application to medical teaching and research is new, in this country at all events.

There are two features in the Scheme of which The Queen has learned with particular satisfaction. The first is the Maternity Hospital and the Obstetric Unit of which it forms a part. The Queen has always been actively interested in the care of maternity and infant life, and keenly conscious of its fundamental importance to the national health. It is unfortunately true that the present position is not wholly satisfactory, and that every year many lives are lost in childbirth, and many women suffer injuries to health, which might be prevented if better facilities for treatment were available. Two of the chief requisites for bringing about a better state of things are to ensure that medical men are well and efficiently trained for their work, and to provide maternity hospitals in which patients may be received.

The Queen is also gratified that in allocating the endowment the claims of the nursing service have not been overlooked, provision having been made for the establishment of a new Nurses' Home. We are deeply conscious how vital to the cause of public health it is that the nation should possess a body of nurses adequate in number, efficiently trained for their work, and bent on maintaining the high standard of unselfish devotion which has been the glory of English nursing. We are glad to find that the Medical School fully recognises the necessity of giving their nurses not only a thorough and scientific training in their craft, but also appropriate facilities for rest and recreation, without which continuous efficiency in their exacting duties is impossible.

The privilege of accepting this munificent gift of the Rockefeller Trustees imposes obligation upon the staff to fulfil the ideals which it represents, and upon the public to furnish the necessary support entailed. It is inconceivable that Englishmen should decline to welcome this generous challenge from our kinsmen across the Atlantic to a friendly rivalry in medical skill, devotion and beneficence. I cordially wish God-speed to this great enterprise.

DEFINITIONS, CONDITIONS AND PROVISIONS GOVERNING THE APPLICATION OF ALL THE MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES EFFECTIVE IN THE TRADE UNDER THE TRADE BOARDS ACTS.

PART I

DEFINITIONS.

For the purpose of the application of the Minimum Rates of Wages fixed by the Trade Board, the following definitions shall apply :—

SECTION I.—A FEMALE LEARNER is a worker who :—

- (a) Is employed by an employer who provides such Learner with reasonable facilities for practically and efficiently learning the branch of the Trade as carried on by him and the various processes involved in the making of any of the articles specified in the definition of the trade set out in Part IV of this Notice; and
- (b) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, and held subject to compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, or has made an application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a Learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an Employer may employ a Female Learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such Learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a Learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes, and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

SECTION II.—The expression "HOMEWORKER" means a worker who works in her own home or any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART II.

PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE LEARNERS.

SECTION I.—With respect to Female Learners in all branches of the trade *other than* the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap making branch :—

- (a) The advances to be given to Learners shall become due on the completion of each twelve months of employment in any branch of the trade other than the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap Making branch.
- (b) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner and be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to workers other than Learners on the completion of 4 years' employment in any branch of the trade other than the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap Making branch.

SECTION II.—With respect to Female Learners in the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap Making branch of the trade :—

- (i) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner and be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to workers other than Learners upon the fulfilment of the conditions appropriate to her as set out below :—

Age of entering upon employment.	Conditions.
Under 15 years of age	The completion of three years' employment <i>and</i> the attainment of the age of 18 years.
15 and under 16 years of age	The completion of two years' employment <i>and</i> the attainment of the age of 18 years.
16 years of age and over	The completion of two years' employment.

- (ii) No Female Learner shall be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate for workers other than Learners until she has attained the age of 18 years, notwithstanding any employment she may have had. Provided that in determining the age of entry and the length of employment all service prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded.

PART III.

PROVISIONS RELATING TO OVERTIME RATES.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board HAVE DECLARED THE NORMAL NUMBER OF HOURS OF WORK IN THE TRADE TO BE AS FOLLOWS :—

In any week	46
On any day (other than Saturday)	8½
On Saturday	5

Provided that any other day (not being Sunday) may be substituted by an Employer for Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours of work on such substituted day shall be five, and the normal number of hours on Saturday shall be 8½.

Provided also that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as overtime to which the overtime rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—With respect to workers in all branches of the Trade *other than* the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap Making branch :—

The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker, WHETHER EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK OR ON PIECE-WORK, in excess of the declared normal number of hours, shall be as follows :—

- (1) For the first two hours of overtime on any day, except Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER.
- (2) For overtime after the first two hours of overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all overtime on Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF.
- (3) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE-TIME.
- (4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 46, the Overtime Rate shall be TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, except in so far as higher overtime rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of this Section. The Overtime Rate shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday), the number of hours worked exceeds 8½ or, in the case of Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), exceeds five, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 46.

Provided—

- (a) That where it is the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the daily Overtime Rate shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.
- (b) That where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the weekly Overtime Rate shall only be payable in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required after 50 hours have been worked.
- (c) That where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out above shall apply in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

SECTION III.—With respect to workers in the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap Making branch of the Trade:—

The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker WHETHER EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK OR ON PIECE-WORK in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

- (1) For the first two hours of Overtime subsequent to the first half-hour of Overtime, *i.e.*, FOR THE FIRST TWO HOURS IN EXCESS OF 9 HOURS, on any day except Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-QUARTER.
- (2) For Overtime after the first two-and-a-half hours of Overtime, *i.e.*, ALL HOURS IN EXCESS OF 11 HOURS, on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF.
- (3) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE-TIME.
- (4) For all hours worked in excess of two hours of Overtime in any week, *i.e.*, ALL HOURS IN EXCESS OF 48 HOURS, the Overtime Rate shall be TIME AND A-QUARTER, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of this Section.

Provided—

- (a) That where it is the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the daily Overtime Rate shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.
- (b) That where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the weekly Overtime Rate specified in paragraph (4) of this Section shall only be payable in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required after 50 hours have been worked.
- (c) That where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out above shall apply in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

Note.—As respects workers in the Wholesale Cloth Hat and Cap Making Branch of the Trade, during the first half-hour in excess of 8½ hours on any day except Saturdays (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays and during the first two hours in excess of 46 hours in any week, the minimum rate applicable is the appropriate general minimum time-rate or piecework basis time-rate, except in so far as a higher rate may be payable under the provisions of paragraph (3) of this Section.

PART IV.

APPLICABILITY OF MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES.

SECTION I.—Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts the Minimum Rates of Wages which are effective in the Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade (Scotland) apply to all workers in Scotland in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade as specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 31st March, 1920.

SECTION II.—The Trade as specified in the above-mentioned Regulations is as follows:—

The making from any material of men's, women's or children's headgear, or the trimming thereof;

Including:—

- (4) The making of field bonnets, sun-bonnets, boudoir caps, or infants' millinery where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-ropes, jumpers, sports coats, neckwear, tea-

gowns, dressing gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, under-skirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby linen or similar articles;

(5) The making of fur hats where made in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of furs or furriers' skins into garments, rugs, or similar articles;

(6) The making of knitted headgear and the making of headgear from knitted fabrics where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabric;

(7) Warehousing and packing of men's, women's and children's headgear and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made or trimmed on the premises.

NOTE.—The employment of women, young persons and children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920, and the Education (Scotland) Act, 1918.
