The KING has been pleased, by Warrant under His Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, bearing date the 31st instant, to appoint the Reverend Henry Thomas Robinson Briggs, Rector of St. Mary Magdalene, Cricket-Malherbie, in the County of Somerset, to the Living of St. Paul, Ramsbottom, in the County of Lancaster and Diocese of Manchester, void by the cession of the Reverend James Preston, M.A.

His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to George Livermore, a trainee at the Enham Village Centre for Disabled Ex-Service Men, in the following circumstances:—

Livermore served in the Royal Air Force during the war and was discharged in 1919 with a disability pension on account of a gun-shot wound in the foot. He was undergoing a course of training in French polishing at the Enham Village Centre, Andover, and on March 7th, 1923, was, together with other disabled men, in a room where some beeswax mixed with turpentine was being heated on a stove. This caught fire, and Livermore, realising the danger, seized a walking stick and with the crooked end lifted the blazing bucket and made for the door. His clothing was alight, but notwithstanding serious burns he gallantly made his way to the doorway, when he was compelled to drop the bucket. When the fire occurred some of the men in the room managed to escape through the windows but all the men were in various degrees disabled and some were unable to escape. As it was, some of the men were slightly burnt, while Livermore himself sustained severe injuries causing him intense suffering. He had to lose part of his left arm while his right hand and arm were severely burnt. There is no doubt that Livermore realised the danger to his comrades if the building caught fire and without hesitation risked his life on their behalf.
