- 9. MADE-UP TEXTILES TRADE BOARD. (GREAT BRITAIN).

DEFINITIONS, CONDITIONS AND PROVISIONS GOVERNING THE APPLICATION OF THE MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES EFFECTIVE IN THE TRADE UNDER THE TRADE BOARDS ACTS.

PART I.

DEFINITION OF A LEARNER.

For the purpose of the application of the Minimum Rates of Wages fixed by the Trade Board:-

A LEARNER IS A WORKER WHO:-

- (i) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of his or her time in learning one of the following processes:-
 - (a) Machining,

(b) Cutting,
(c) Awl and Needle Stitching,
(d) Operations performed by Palm and Needle Hands (including the Roping of Tents and Coal Sacks, where carried on),

(e) Flag-Making (that is to say ALL the branches of Flag-Making included within the scope of the Trade Board, as specified in Part IV of this Notice, carried on in the establishment in which the Learner is employed, provided that these branches include the making of Heraldic and Lettered Flags and the Union Jack),

and is provided by the employer with every facility for such learning;

(ii) Has received a certificate or has made an application for such certificate in accordance with the rules laid down by the Trade Board. Provided that in granting or withholding such certificate the Trade Board may take into consideration whether,
