His Morning one Simon Van Hant, laden from Holland with leveral Commodities to a confide-, rable value, in ended for London, ran his Veffel on flore ner Deal Caftle; the Veflet being a Galliot Hoy of 100 Tuns, much broken; but the greateft part of her lading like to be preferved.

Venice, Dec. 22. From Meffina we are advised, that the 17th paft, Sir Daniel Harvy, Ambassadour from His Majefty of .reat Britain, sailed by that place, intended for Con frantinop.e, and that three Corfairs of Tripoli have been cruising in that Gulf, where they seiled three French ships and one E:rk.

Here are late'y arrived three fhips from Candia, and upon them fome perfons of Honour, who have liber y given them for some rime to vifit this place; they came from thence the 26th of the laft mone h, by whole report, as well as by the imp m of all the Letters brought with them from the principal Commanders there, we are affu ed, that the Garrifon is full of courage and refo ution to defend that place to the laft against the Turks, and are plentifully provided with all neceffaries, having within the Town above to elve thoufand able and well reiolved men, amongst whom are accounted the 1:00 French la ely arrived, molt of them reformed Officers, and well experienced in Military affairs, who had in feveral fallies given evident proofs also of their valor. They tell us, that the Turks have wi horawn themfelves to a farther diftance from before the Fort di Sabionera, but, continue ftill with much obflinscy before the to t 5t, Andres endeavouring by their advancing upon the ikour, to flut up the entry into the Haven; upon whom, feveral brisk fallies had been made with confiderable exe ution, in one of them. especially, the Tarks were very sensible of their valour, wherein, the French marching out in four divisions under the Command of the Dake de Roannez, who is fill owned there by his ancient Title of de la Feuillade, b at offthe Enemy with extraordinay fl ughter, but not with ut the lofs of many of their own party; and the bener.to beat off the. Turks from their defi, n, our people were labouring hard at their Mines, and had two ready to fpring about the point of the Fort St. Andre, which if they fucceede faccording to the confidence they had in them, they intend d at the fame time to make a lufty fally and hoped to diflodge the Turks for this winter.

The Senare has ordered General Vertmiller to be fent into Dalmatia with the Title of Great Mafter of the Attillery, and the allowants of 4000 Ducats yearly for his fub-, fiftance.

The Count Strafoldi at "ving lately at Palms Nova from Viewna with intentions to pair indenly for Candia to Command a Regiment of thole Germans lately feat for that fervice, was upon his embarking at Talia Vento intendingfor this place, anfortunately downed with 18 other perfors, the Bark being overfet by the rudenels and fully o. the Scamen.

Care is taken for the dispolal of the Religious out of the Covents lately soppressed by the Popos Dispensation, most of whom are to be made Priests; on whom they intend to settle Punsions for lie.

Segnior And e Contarini, Andre Pifani, and Nicolo Sagredo at appointed Commissioners, to take care of the Sequefied 8 evenues of those Houles, and that the maneys arising from them be rightly disposed of. Legorn, Decemb. 29. A fhip lately arriving from the Levant, informs us, that the 6.h inflant arrived at Smirnateveral E glifh thips with a Man of War, having on board his Excellency Sir Paniel Harvey : His N'al fly of Great Britain's Ambaffadour, bound for Conflantinople: They farther tell us, that about 900 Janua ies and a ely put into Chios, intended for Canca. for the re-inforcement of the Tunkufh Army; and that fome French Men of War were gone towards the Dardanelles, intende me for Canfaatinople; where they are to attend the French Ambaffadoure who having concluded his Negotiati 1 there, is preparing for his return; onely waiting for their arrival.

From P-sma we are rel, that the Count San Secondo one of the Principal S bjects to that Duke, is la ely empleied thence to Rome, in quality of Ambaffadour to the Pope; with Inftructions to adjoudt the long disputed bulinefs of Castro: and tis faid fince the refforing of it has met with to many difficulties, to compound for it for a confidetable fum of moneys to be advanced by the Pope; who is allo to quit him of the Γ ebt of 1600 thousand Crowns which is already owing to the Church. From Venice they write that the Pope in favour to that Republick, and to enable them with more cale to defray the vaft expences I ing on them in making their defence againft the Ottoman power, freely gave them leave to raile Moneys upon the Lands of leveral Converts within their jurifdiction, and to diffolve their O errs of Religions but in return defined that the Republick would in recompenie to the Church, diffencie with their Law, (prohibiting the giving of any Lands to Religious roundations) till the charity of well diffoled people thould hav made up only as much ar was upon this urgent neceffity taken aways but to this point the Republick fince they had put it out of their powers to propole a y diffentiation for that Laws but have to far comply'd with him, as to give leave o oth r Ecclefiaftical foundations, to purchas all o what pirt they ployle of thole Lands which are by the P pes permiffion to be alienated.

Hambourgh, fan. 1. The Luxenbourgh Leavies for the affiltance of the Republick of Venice in the defence of Candia being compleated, are now upon their march, all of them full of zeahand courage for the fervice, having before their depatture, Proclamation made amon ft them giving free liberty to all fuch as diffike i that march, to leave the fervice and to flay at home, which in all the sumber was accepted of only by two difeated perform, whole indiffortions excuded them, and one other who for his want of courage was publickly flript from his Soldiers coat, which was immediately befowed upon another, who freely offered himfelf to fill his place.

From Warfaw we are advited , that fince the leparation of the ate Affembly, there have been feveral leffer meetings of the Nobility for the prefervation of the peace of the Kingdo 3, which they intend to put into fur e p flure, as may i probability prevent al dif rder and have in all places agreed, that the Arrar ban be in readinefs, and the whole Countrey put into a poflure of defende, fo as to be in arms upon any occations which may offer themielvest

The Crown forces are faid to be diffatisfied with their Winter Quarters, and contra y to the Orders from their General Sobiesky, to have pu themlelves on their march, raking the way towards, Berefensko : The faid General is not yet latisfied with the advances of money from the Clergy, which they were to pay for their Exemption from Quarrering of Soldiers, the Sum which they have offered of 300 -thousand Francks - being not thought fufficient : whereupon the Bishop of Promi Aie and the Palatine of Rava have had le veral Conference with the General ; but as yet they are not come to any refolu ion.

General Paz, who commands the forces in Lysbuania, being diffatisfied with some practices of the Prince Radze. ville upon the Army, occasioning disputes upon the point of Quarters ; and thereby suspected to intend the drawing the forces into a Confederatio : 4 has lately changed his Quart ters, and is rawn towards Pyrezcie.

They fpeak cor fidently of the promiting hopes the Prince of Lorrain has to fucceed in the tucceffron, and as confidently, that the Prince of Conde has by his Letter to the Bishop, of B. fiers, declared, that he has no ambition for the Crown of Poland, but on the contrary prefies him to folliche all his friends on the behalf of the Duke of Newbourg. The time appointed for the election, is in Fune next enfueing, but the Diet to allemble the 2 d of May, which time, and the Gith to be propoled to all perfors concerned in the Ele-Aion, was sgreed upon by the generality of the late Alfembly -though there wanted not to reperfons, who emploied their

endeavors to m ke opposition. From Stockholme we are rold, that the King, Queen-Mother, and the greatest part of the Senato's, are again vetorned thither ; where feveral Councils have been held about the weighty affairs of the Kingdom.

The Baron de Bafferøde Envoye Extraordinaty from His Imperial Majefty; is fill there ; but may in few dayes departs intending to be prefer at an Affembly which is in little time to be held with the Deputies of feveral other Princes, brc. where fomewhat may be refolved to his fatiffaction in the affairs for which he was emple ed to that

Paris, yan. 16. The number of the Forces intends ed to march towards the Frontiers of Lorrain are encrealed to about 16 thousand men , and amongst them 24 Companies of the Regiment of the French Guards, and 8 Com-panies of the Swiffes 3 the reft drawn our of the Garilons of Artois , excepting onely 3 Troops of His Majesties Houshold. The Mareshal de Crequy is gone to Verdun the place appointed for their Rendezvouz : from whence he is to acquaint the Duke of Lorrain with His Majefties plea-fure , that he forthwith lay down his arms : His Majefty thaving issued out an Act of Garranty to the faid Duke, to the Electors Palatine and Mentz, and all other Princes and States interefied in the business of the Wildfang 5 and matters thereon depending : promiting to protect them f om all violence, and to proceed with his whole power against the Aggreffor, till the differences now on foot can be ami-cably composed. He has also dispatched a Declaration to He has also dispatched a Declaration to " the Conftable of Caftille, affuring him he has i this 10 0ther defign, than to oblige the Duke of Lorrain to fubrit a the Order of the Emperour, and to preferve the publick Peace.

On Sunday laft in the Morning arrived here at the Cost two Officers of the Duke of Lorrain's army ; inform ng His Majefty that in Obedience to his (ommands they had quitted the faid Dukes fervice : giving account that the Dukes forces consisted of about 6000 Her nd near as many Foot : and that he expected of B 5 of Horfe from Germany, but that his forces' w et formed into a Body.

Letters of the 28th of November from Candia tell os, that Council of war being called upon the arrival of the French olunteers, and other forces, with the 1700 Germans, it was rdered, that the general Saily which was much defired ould be deferred till the 10th of December, by which time hey expected the arrival of the Knights of Maltha, with the ldiers intended thither.
