WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 (33 & 34 Vict., c. 52) to 1906 (6 Edw. VII, c. 15), it was, amongst other things, enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the 29th day of October, 1901, between His late Majesty King Edward VII and His late Majesty the King of the Belgians for the extradition of criminals, which Treaty was amended by the supplementary Conventions concluded on the 5th March, 1907, and the 3rd March, 1911:
