PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 12th day of March, 1924 (C. (2) 7768/23), in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are, from time to time, directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 13th October, 1922, to sanction, *inter alia*, a modified scale of Long Service Pensions and Disability Pensions or Gratuities for Native Petty Officers and men, other than Europeans, of Your Majesty's Naval Service, who were entitled to Pension under existing Regulations:

“And whereas under the Regulations for the government of Your Majesty's Naval Service, Native ratings, other than Europeans, who entered the Naval Service on or after 1st January, 1904, are eligible for the award of compensation on invaliding for causes attribu-

table to the service but are precluded from any such award for long service or on invaliding for non-attributable causes:

“And whereas we are of opinion that the Native ratings who are at present so precluded, should be awarded compensation for long and faithful service, or on invaliding for non-attributable causes:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorize us to award, at our discretion, gratuities for long service or on invaliding for non-attributable causes, to Native Petty Officers and men (British subjects), other than Europeans, entered on or after 1st January, 1904, according to the following scale, and subject to the conditions and restrictions specified:—

“*Long Service.* A gratuity at the rate of 15s. a year for each complete year of qualifying service, together with a rank addition of £1 and 10s. for each year as Petty Officer and Leading Rate respectively, the total award to be conditional upon completion of 22 years' service as for Naval ratings generally.

“*Non-Attributable Invaliding.* Subject to a minimum period of 6 years' service being rendered, a gratuity on a scale similar to the above, except that the rank additions of £1 and 10s. a year shall be allowed only for each complete year of service in excess of 14 years rendered in the capacity of Petty Officer and/or Leading Rate.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence to these proposals.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 28th day of February, 1924 (No. 9A. N.P. (2) 415), in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions and other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council bearing date of 17th May, 1920, it is directed that qualifying service for certain progressive rates of pay in the higher ratings and ranks of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines shall be performed in the same rating as that for which payment is being received:

"And whereas candidates for the Regulating Branch of the Royal Navy are required to serve a period on probation as Acting Regulating Petty Officer and to revert to their former employment in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines if found to be unsuitable for the duties of the Regulating Branch:

"And whereas we consider it desirable that men, who during the probationary period are found to be unsuitable for the duties of the Regulating Branch for reasons other than misconduct and consequently revert to their former position in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines should reckon the time served in the rating of Acting Regulating Petty Officer for purposes of progressive pay in their rating or rank on reversion:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the time served on probation in the Regulating Branch of the Royal Navy in the rating of Acting Regulating Petty Officer, counting as qualifying service for progressive pay in other ratings or ranks of the Royal Navy or Royal Marines to which such Probationers may revert provided that such reversion is not due to misconduct or by the desire of the man concerned; the concession to have retrospective effect from 1st February, 1919.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it is provided by section one of the Forestry (Transfer of Woods) Act, 1923, that His Majesty on the joint representation of the Forestry Commissioners and of the Commissioners of Woods, may by Order in Council make provision for (amongst other matters) the transfer to and vesting in the Forestry Commissioners of any estate, interest, rights, powers and liabilities of the Crown and of the Commissioners of Woods in or in connection with any woods and forests under the management or control of the Commissioners of Woods, or in or in connection with any other property under the management and control of the Commissioners of Woods which at the time of transfer is subject to the same local management as such woods and forests; for the exception or reservation of any mineral or other rights in connection with any property transferred; for any property transferred being held and dealt with by the Forestry Commissioners in like manner in all respects as property acquired by them under the Forestry Act, 1919; and for such consequential and supplemental matters as appear necessary for giving full effect to the Order:

And whereas representations have been made to His Majesty by the Forestry Commissioners and the Commissioners of Woods that provision should be made by Order in Council for the matters hereinafter dealt with in this Order:

And whereas the properties which are the subject of transfer under this Order consist of woods and forests within the meaning of the said Act and of other properties subject at the date of transfer to the same local management as such woods and forests:

And whereas for the purposes of the said representations plans in which certain of the properties which are the subject of transfer under this Order are delineated have been prepared in duplicate and signed by the Commissioners of Woods and sealed with the seal of the Forestry Commissioners and one set of plans has been deposited with the Commissioners of Woods and the other set has been deposited with the Forestry Commissioners:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Forestry (Transfer of Woods) Order, 1924.

(2) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies for the purpose of the interpretation of this Order in like manner as it applies for the purpose of the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

2. On the first day of April, 1924, all the estate, interest, rights, powers and liabilities of the Crown and of the Commissioners of Woods in or in connection with any property under the management or control of the Commissioners of Woods which is situate in any parish mentioned in the first schedule to this Order or is described in the second schedule to this Order shall, subject to the exceptions and reservations set out in the said schedules respectively and to the following provisions of this Order, be transferred to and vest in the Forestry Commissioners.

3. Where any property transferred under this Order adjoins other property which is under the management of the Commissioners of Woods but is not included in the transfer (hereinafter referred to as property retained)

(a) any fences or ditches between the properties shall vest in the Forestry Commissioners, and it shall be the duty of those Commissioners if so required by the Commissioners of Woods to maintain repair and cleanse the same, and where no fence exists, to construct a fence to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Woods;

(b) any ways, water-courses or other rights or easements on, over or under the property retained which appertain to or are reputed to appertain to or are held or enjoyed with the property transferred shall be deemed to be included in the transfer; and

(c) any ways, water-courses or other rights or easements on, over or under the property transferred which appertain to or are reputed to appertain to or are held or enjoyed with property retained shall be deemed not to be included in the transfer.

4.—(1) Subject to the provisions of the Forestry (Transfer of Woods) Act, 1923, and this Order, all property transferred to the Forestry Commissioners under this Order shall be held by them in like manner and they may exercise in relation thereto all the like powers as if the estate, interest, rights and powers therein or in connection therewith which are transferred to them under this Order had been acquired by them under the Forestry Act, 1919, subject to the liabilities so transferred, and they may also exercise in relation thereto any powers which at the time of transfer are exercisable in relation thereto by His Majesty or the Commissioners of Woods: Provided that nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising the Forestry Commissioners to sell, lease, exchange or enclose any land forming part of a royal forest, park or chase except under and in accordance with the terms of such last mentioned powers.

(2) Nothing in this Order shall affect any right of patronage or right of nomination to any benefice which is vested in the Crown or any right of nominating the Official Verderer of the New Forest.

(3) Notwithstanding anything in the foregoing provisions of this Order the exemption from stamp duty granted by section seventy-seven of the Crown Lands Act, 1829, or by any enactment extending that section shall not apply to any instrument relating to property transferred under this Order or to the management of such property.

5. The Office of Keeper of the Gawle-above-the-Wood within the Forest of Dean and also the Office of Keeper of the Gawle-under-the-

Wood within the said Forest which by section thirteen of the Dean Forest (Mines) Act, 1838, were vested in the First Commissioner of Woods and are therein and hereinafter referred to as the Office of Gaveller shall on the 1st day of April, 1924, be transferred to and vest in the Forestry Commissioners together with all the powers, rights and authorities belonging or appertaining to the Office of Gaveller (including the power to appoint a deputy Gaveller) and all such powers, rights and authorities may after the transfer be exercised either by the Forestry Commissioners or by the deputy Gaveller appointed by them, and any instrument required by any Act to be made under the hand or under the hand and seal of the Gaveller may be made under the seal of the Forestry Commissioners.

6. The Commissioners of Woods and the Forestry Commissioners shall preserve in their respective offices the sets of duplicate plans which have been deposited with them respectively for the purposes of this Order.

EXCEPTIONS AND RESERVATIONS.

1. Nothing in this Order shall operate as a transfer of any interest, rights, powers or liabilities of the Crown or the Commissioners of Woods in or in connection with

(a) The manor or Lordship of St. Briavels, the Manors of Staunton and English Bicknor, the Manor and liberty of Newland or any other Manor belonging to the Crown within the Hundred of St. Briavels in the County of Gloucester; or

(b) The property known as the Royal Hotel in the Parish of English Bicknor in the County of Gloucester as the same is described and demised in a Lease dated the 25th April, 1919, and granted to Alethea Mary Caroline Southern; or

(c) Any lands forming part of or adjoining Carisbrooke Castle.

2. There shall be excepted or reserved to His Majesty and be under the management of the Commissioners of Woods all such fisheries or rights of fishing in the River Wye within the Parishes of Whitechurch, Goodrich and Ganarew in the County of Hereford: Dixton Newton in the County of Monmouth and English Bicknor in the County of Gloucester, as are at the date of the transfer vested in His Majesty and under such management, together with all such rights of access over any property transferred by this Order and of user as are incidental to or reasonably necessary for the enjoyment of such fisheries or rights of fishing.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

Salcey Woods Estate.

1. All those lands known as Salcey Woods situate in the Parishes of Piddington, Quinton, Hartwell and Ashton in the County of Northampton and in the Parish of Hanslope in the County of Buckingham and coloured green on a plan signed by the Commissioners of Woods and sealed by the Forestry Commissioners in relation to their joint representation for this Order and marked plan No. 1.

Delamere Woods Estate.

2. All those lands known as Delamere Woods situate in the Parishes of Kingswood, Eddisbury, Oakmere, Delamere and Norley in the County of Chester and coloured green on a plan so signed and sealed and marked plan No. 2.

Bedgebury Woods Estate.

3. All those lands known as Bedgebury Woods situate in the Parishes of Goudhurst, Cranbrook and Hawkhurst in the County of Kent and in the Parish of Ticehurst in the County of Sussex and coloured green on a plan so signed and sealed and marked plan No. 3.

Chopwell Woods Estate.

4. All those lands known as Chopwell Woods situate in the Parish of Chopwell in the County of Durham and coloured green on a plan so signed and sealed and marked plan No. 4.

Clearwell Woods Estate.

5. All those lands known as Clearwell Woods situate in the Parishes of Newland and St. Briavels in the County of Gloucester and coloured green on a plan so signed and sealed and marked plan No. 5.

Tintern Woods Estate.

6. All those lands known as Tintern Woods situate in the Parishes of Penalt, Trelleck, Llandogo, Tintern Parva, Chapel Hill, Trelleck Grange, Newchurch East and St. Arvans in the County of Monmouth and coloured green on a plan so signed and sealed and marked plan No. 6.

Hafod Fawr Estate.

7. All those lands known as Hafod Fawr situate in the Parishes of Maentwrog and Festiniog in the County of Merioneth and coloured green on a plan so signed and sealed and marked plan No. 7.

EXCEPTIONS AND RESERVATIONS.

There shall be excepted or reserved to His Majesty and be under the management of the Commissioners of Woods:—

(i) All mines and minerals lying under the lands first described in this Schedule at a greater depth than two hundred feet;

(ii) All mines and minerals (including rock-salt and salt brine) lying under the lands secondly described in this Schedule;

(iii) All mines and minerals, oils and shales lying under the lands thirdly described in this Schedule;

(iv) All mines and minerals lying under the lands fourthly described in this Schedule;

(v) The right to take and use without payment from any pit now opened or hereafter

to be opened in any of the lands secondly, thirdly and fourthly described in this Schedule all such gravel, sand, stone, marl, and clay as may be required for use on any property which is under the management of the Commissioners of Woods but is not included in the transfer effected by this Order;

(vi) All mines and minerals lying under the lands sixthly described in this Schedule;

(vii) All mines and minerals lying under the lands seventhly described in this Schedule;

together with power to work and get the said mines and minerals hereby excepted or reserved in as full and ample a manner as if this Order had not been made.

WHEREAS, by Section 6 of the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922, it is provided that His Majesty, by Order in Council, may make such adaptations of any enactments so far as they relate to any of His Majesty's Dominions other than the Irish Free State as may appear to Him necessary or proper as a consequence of the establishment of the Irish Free State, and may give effect to any reciprocal arrangements which may be made with the Irish Free State with respect to Unemployment Insurance:

And whereas provision has been made by an Act of the Parliament of the Irish Free State entitled the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1923, for the exclusion from the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, as it applies to the Irish Free State, of employment as master or member of a ship or vessel registered in Great Britain or Northern Ireland but not in the Irish Free State, of which the owner or if there is more than one owner, the managing owner or manager resides or has his principal place of business in the Irish Free State, and it is expedient that reciprocal provision should be made as respects Great Britain and Northern Ireland:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Irish Free State (Unemployment Insurance Arrangement) Order, 1924.

2. Paragraph (b) of Part I of the First Schedule to the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, shall, in its application to Great Britain and Northern Ireland have effect as if the words “(not being a ship or vessel registered in the Irish Free State)” were inserted therein after the word “vessel.”

3. This Order so far as it relates to matters with respect to which the Parliament of Northern Ireland has power to make laws shall notwithstanding anything in Section 6 of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, be subject to alteration or revocation by Act of that Parliament.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the 18th day of August, 1916, and expressed to be made in pursuance of the “Merchant Shipping Act, 1894,” and of the “Mersey Channels Act, 1897,” His Majesty, on the application of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, being the Harbour Trust or Body Corporate owning or exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of the River Mersey and the sea channels or approaches thereto, was pleased to make certain Rules, set forth in the Schedule to such Order, concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the River Mersey and the sea channels or approaches to the River Mersey between the Rock Lighthouse and the furthest point seawards to which such channels or approaches respectively are, for the time being, buoyed on both sides:

And whereas the said Mersey Docks and Harbour Board have applied to His Majesty in Council to make, and have submitted for approval, certain new Rules concerning Lights or Signals to be carried, and the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the River Mersey and the sea channels or approaches thereto within certain specified limits, to be substituted for, and in lieu of, the Rules set forth in the Schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the 18th day of August, 1916, and in such new Rules there are embodied, subject to certain exceptions and additions therein mentioned, the “Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea,” made in pursuance of the “Merchant Shipping Act, 1894,” and which may from time to time be in force:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the “Rules Publication Act, 1893,” have been complied with:

And whereas the new Rules so submitted as aforesaid appear to be reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in Him vested by the “Merchant Shipping Act, 1894,” and by the “Mersey Channels Act, 1897,” and of any other powers Him thereunto enabling, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to declare that the said Order in Council of the 18th day of August, 1916, shall, as from the 21st day of April, 1924, be revoked, and His Majesty is further pleased to make the Rules set forth in the Schedule hereto, and to direct that the same shall continue in operation as from the said 21st day of April, 1924.

SCHEDULE.

NOTE.—The numbers quoted in these Rules refer to the Articles in the General Regulations made on the 13th of October, 1910.

RULES concerning the
LIGHTS OR SIGNALS TO BE CARRIED,
and

concerning the steps for
AVOIDING COLLISION

to be taken, by vessels navigating the River Mersey and the sea channels or approaches

thereto, between the Rock Lighthouse and the furthest point seawards to which such sea channels or approaches, respectively, are for the time being buoyed on both sides.

PRELIMINARY.

1. The "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea" made in pursuance of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," hereinafter called the "General Regulations," are embodied in these Rules and every vessel, of whatever description, used in navigation, when in any part of the River Mersey or in the sea channels or approaches thereto as above defined, shall, on and after the 21st day of April, 1924, observe and obey the General Regulations with the exceptions and additions mentioned in the following Rules.

RULES CONCERNING LIGHTS, SIGNALS, Etc.

2. A sailing vessel under way propelled by machinery and whether under sail or not is to be considered a steam vessel, and shall in all weathers from sunset to sunrise comply with the Rules concerning Lights, etc., contained in Articles 2 and 7 of the General Regulations and shall carry in daytime, at the main masthead, one black ball or shape 2 feet in diameter.

Provided that a vessel of less than 40 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to carry the black ball or shape.

3. A vessel being towed shall, in addition to the lights prescribed by Article 5 of the General Regulations, carry the white light at her stern prescribed by Rule 5 hereof, and if such vessel is a steam vessel with steam up she shall, although being towed, also carry the masthead light prescribed by Article 2 (a), and may carry the additional light allowed by Article 2 (e) of the General Regulations.

4.—(a) A steam vessel, when towing another vessel or vessels or when attached for the purpose of towing or manœuvring such vessel or vessels, shall carry the compulsory lights prescribed by Article 3 of the General Regulations and such steam vessel, when towing or attached as aforesaid to a vessel of 450 feet or upwards in length, shall carry the additional bright white light prescribed by the said Article 3.

(b) Further, a steam vessel, when towing or attached as aforesaid, shall carry abaft the funnel or after-mast a small white light fixed and carried in a lantern so constructed, fitted, and screened that it shall throw an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 12 points of the compass, viz., for 6 points from right aft on each side of the vessel, and such steam vessel, if less than 160 feet in length, shall not carry the stern light prescribed by Rule 5 hereof, but if she is 160 feet or upwards in length she may carry such stern light.

The length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length appearing in her Certificate of Registry.

5. In lieu of Article 10 of the General Regulations, a vessel under way shall carry at her stern a white light. The light shall be fixed and carried in a lantern so constructed, fitted, and screened, that it shall throw an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 12 points of the compass, viz., for 6 points from right aft on each side of the vessel, so as to be visible at a distance of at least 1 mile. Such light

shall be carried as nearly as practicable on the same level as the side lights.

Provided that a vessel within Article 7 of the General Regulations (viz., Steam Vessels of less than 40, and vessels under oars or sails of less than 20, tons gross tonnage respectively, and rowing boats) shall not be obliged to carry the light prescribed by this Rule, but if they do not carry such light they shall, when being overtaken by another vessel, show from the stern a white light or a flare up light as required by Article 10 of the General Regulations.

6. Except as provided for such vessels respectively by Rules 3 and 4 hereof, and Article 15 (e) of the General Regulations, a tug, tender, lighter, or barge, when attached to another vessel, shall not carry any of the lights or give any of the signals prescribed by these Rules or by the General Regulations.

7. When vessels are in sight of one another, a steam vessel under way, in taking any course authorised or required by these Rules or by the General Regulations, shall indicate that course by the following signals on her steam whistle or siren, viz.:—

One short blast to mean, "I am directing my course to starboard."

Two short blasts to mean, "I am directing my course to port."

Three short blasts to mean, "My engines are going astern."

8.—(a) A vessel, when lying at any Stage except the Dingle Oil Jetty, shall carry the lights prescribed by Articles 2 and 5 of the General Regulations and Rule 5 hereof.

(b) A vessel, when lying at the Dingle Oil Jetty, shall carry forward where it can best be seen a white light and at or near the stern a second white light. Each of such lights shall be carried at the same height above the hull of not less than 30 feet and not more than 40 feet, and shall each be so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

9. In lieu of Article 11 of the General Regulations, a vessel, when at anchor, shall carry in the forward part of the vessel, a white light, in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile and at or near the stern of the vessel another such light. The forward light shall be carried at a height so as to be clear of the superstructure or other erections other than the funnel on the vessel, and so that it shall not be less than 20 feet above the hull, and the stern or after light shall be carried at a height not less than 15 feet lower than the forward light.

Provided that a vessel within Article 7 of the General Regulations (viz., Steam Vessels of less than 40, and vessels under oars or sails of less than 20, tons gross tonnage respectively, and rowing boats) when at anchor shall not be obliged to carry the lights prescribed by this Rule, but if they do not carry them each of such vessels shall carry in a place where it can best be seen, and at a height above the gunwale of not less than nine feet, a white light in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

10. A steam vessel, when at anchor, shall, between sunrise and sunset, carry in the forward part of the vessel, a black ball not less than two feet in diameter, and at or near the stern of the vessel, another such ball. The forward ball shall be carried at a height so as to be clear of the superstructure or other erections other than the funnel on the vessel, and so that it shall not be less than 20 feet above the hull, and the stern or after ball shall be carried at a height not less than 15 feet lower than the forward ball.

Provided that a steam vessel within Article 7 of the General Regulations, may carry one such black ball only at a height above the gunwale of not less than 9 feet.

11. A vessel, having on board any explosive, except ships' ammunition, shall, when at anchor, carry a red light, in a globular lantern not less than 10 inches in diameter, six feet above the forward white light prescribed by Rule 9 hereof.

Provided that a vessel entitled to carry and carrying the white light prescribed by the proviso to Rule 9, shall carry the red light above described, not less than 3 feet above such white light.

STEERING AND SAILING RULES.

12. A vessel shall not come into

(i) any of the buoyed channels,

(ii) the main (i.e., the Queen's and Crosby) channel from a side channel,

(iii) a side channel from the main channel, at such a time and in such a manner as to hamper traffic passing up and down such channel (see Articles 27 and 29 of the General Regulations).

13. Every steam vessel under way shall, when it is safe and practicable, keep to that side of the fairway or mid-channel which lies on the starboard side of such vessel.

SOUND SIGNALS FOR FOG, Etc.

14. A vessel of 350 feet or upwards in length, when at anchor, shall, during fog, mist, falling snow or heavy rain storms, whether by day or night,

(1) ring in the forward part of the vessel the Bell prescribed by Article 15 (d) of the General Regulations.

(2) sound at or near the stern of such vessel a loud-toned Gong or a loud-toned Triangle or other loud-toned article that cannot be mistaken for a Bell, Whistle, Siren or Foghorn.

The Bell shall be rung, and the Gong, Triangle, or other article sounded, respectively, for a period of about five seconds at intervals of not more than one minute.

The length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length appearing in her Certificate of Registry.

MARKING OF WRECKS.

PRELIMINARY—CAUTION.

15.—(1) While it may be assumed that care is taken to moor or anchor wreck-marking vessels and buoys securely, and, when lights are used, to fit them with efficient lighting apparatus, yet Mariners should not place undue reliance on wreck-marking vessels and buoys being maintained in position or on their

lights, as, through heavy weather or other causes, they are liable both to drag their moorings and to break adrift, and their lights are liable to be extinguished.

(2) Mariners should regard these marks and lights merely as aids to navigation, and while observing all proper precautions should give due heed to information contained in Notices to Mariners or to Messages received by wireless telegraphy or telephony as to the position and bearings of a wreck, and they should not assume that a wreck has been removed from the position given by such Notice or Message merely because it may not be marked.

16. When two or more vessels and/or buoys are used to mark a wreck a Mariner should not attempt to pass between them.

17. Mariners should always give a wreck mark a wide berth.

18. In the following Rules the words "Watch Vessel" shall mean a vessel used to mark the position of a wreck or other obstruction and the term "Starboard Hand" shall denote that side which would be on the right hand of the Mariner either going with the main stream of flood or approaching the Port from seaward. The term "Port Hand" shall denote the left hand of the Mariner under the same circumstances.

WATCH VESSELS.

19. A light on a Watch Vessel shall be carried in all weathers in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

20. A Watch Vessel shall carry the Lights and Shapes and give the sound Signals following to indicate to the Mariner on which hand he should pass the Watch Vessel:—

(1) LIGHTS.

(i) Between sunset and sunrise the following lights:—

(a) To be passed on the Mariner's Port Hand—Two green lights in a vertical line not less than 6 feet apart from the end of a cross-yard, the lower light to be of a height not less than 15 feet above the hull.

(b) To be passed on the Mariner's Starboard Hand—Three green lights in a vertical line not less than 6 feet apart from the end of a cross-yard, the lowest light to be of a height not less than 9 feet above the hull.

(c) To be passed on either side—Four green lights, two in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, on each end of a cross-yard with a horizontal distance between the lights at either end of the cross-yard not less than 15 feet and not exceeding 25 feet. The height of the two lower lights to be not less than 15 feet above the hull.

(ii) A Watch Vessel shall not carry the lights prescribed for a vessel when at anchor.

(2) SHAPES.

Between sunrise and sunset, green balls or shapes corresponding in number and arrangement to the green lights as detailed above.

(3) SOUND SIGNALS.

A Watch Vessel, during fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain storms, whether by day or night, shall ring a deep-toned bell

at intervals of not more than 30 seconds as follows:—

(a) To be passed on the Mariner's Port Hand—

Two strokes in succession.

(b) To be passed on the Mariner's Starboard Hand—

Three strokes in succession.

(c) To be passed on either side—

Four Strokes in succession.

WRECK-MARKING BUOYS AND BEACONS.

21. When a wreck-marking buoy is used it shall be one of the following shapes, and (if a light is carried) it shall be lighted in one of the manners following to indicate to the Mariner on which hand he should pass the buoy:—

(a) To be passed on the Mariner's Port Hand—

Shape—Can.

Light—If lighted, a green light giving two flashes.

(b) To be passed on the Mariner's Starboard Hand—

Shape—Conical.

Light—If lighted, a green light giving three flashes.

(c) To be passed on either side—

Shape—Spherical.

Light—If lighted, a green light giving one flash.

22. When a wreck-marking buoy or a bell boat beacon is used, fitted with an aerial bell actuated by wave motion, the sounds given by the bell are a warning of danger, and not an indication of the hand on which the buoy or beacon should be passed.

DREDGERS.

23. The word "Dredger" shall mean any Vessel fitted with plant or apparatus for dredging or excavating or fitted with plant or apparatus for eroding or dispersing sand and other material.

24. A Dredger, when at work or in position for working, shall carry the following Lights and Signals, viz.:—

LIGHTS BETWEEN SUNSET AND SUNRISE.

(i.)—(a) *Forward*.—In the forward part of the Dredger, at a height of not less than 20, and not exceeding 40, feet above the hull, a white light, in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

(b) *Amidships*.—Three such white lights placed in triangular form not less than 8 feet apart, the base of the triangle to be at least 10 feet higher than the forward light, and to be also higher than and clear of the framework, funnels, or any other erections upon the Dredger.

(c) *Aft*.—One such white light, at or near the stern of the Dredger, and at such a height that it shall be not less than 15 feet lower than the forward light.

(ii.) A Dredger, when not making any way through the water, shall not carry side or stern lights, but when making way shall carry the

usual red and green side lights and the stern light prescribed by Rule 5 hereof.

SIGNALS BETWEEN SUNRISE AND SUNSET.

Amidships.—Three red balls of not less than 2 feet in diameter placed in triangular form not less than 8 feet apart, the base of the triangle to be higher than and clear of the framework, funnels, or any other erections upon the Dredger.

25. The Lights and Signals required to be carried by Dredgers are to be taken by other vessels as signals that the vessel showing them is not under command, and cannot therefore get out of the way.

26. A Dredger, when not at work or in position for working, shall carry the ordinary Lights and Signals required to be carried by vessels for avoiding collisions, as prescribed by the General Regulations, with the exceptions and additions mentioned in these Rules.

LAUNCHING OF VESSELS.

27.—(a) A shipbuilder or other person (hereinafter called "the shipbuilder") about to launch a vessel into the River to the northward of an imaginary straight line drawn from Eastham Ferry Pier on the Cheshire shore to the northernmost quay of the existing Garston Docks on the Lancashire shore shall at least three days before the date fixed for the launch give to the Secretary of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board notice in writing of the place, day and hour of the proposed launch, by leaving the same with the Secretary at his Office at the Dock Office, Liverpool, and this without prejudice to any other notice which the shipbuilder may be required to give by statute or otherwise.

(b) Upon receiving such notice the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board will issue and publish within the Port of Liverpool a Notice to Mariners giving particulars of the place, day and hour of the launch and the area as hereafter described (called "the launching area") which is to be kept clear as provided by these Rules.

28.—(a) A vessel shall not be anchored or moored on the day of the launch within the launching area or so as to swing into such area until after the launch has taken place, or until the launching flags on the mark boats have been hauled down, and

(b) A vessel anchored or moored prior to the date of the launch within the launching area or so as to swing into such area shall be removed not later than One o'clock on the morning of the launch.

29. At least three hours before the time of the launch the shipbuilder to mark the launching area shall anchor two mark boats in the River suitably dressed with flags in rainbow fashion from stem to stern, the one 300 yards to the northward and the other 600 yards to the southward of the river end of the launch-way, and at a suitable distance out in the River, having regard to the weight of the vessel to be launched, but in no case shall the mark boats be anchored at a greater distance out in the River than 600 yards from the shore from which the vessel is to be launched.

30. The shipbuilder having ascertained that the River in the vicinity is clear of traffic shall ten minutes before the time for the launch

signal to the mark boats, and thereupon the person on each mark boat appointed by the shipbuilder shall immediately display on such boat a red flag 6 feet long by 4 feet broad with the word "LAUNCH" inscribed in large white letters thereon at such a height as to be clear of and to fly well above and distinct from the other flags but in no case less than 20 feet above the hull of the mark boat.

31. So long as the launching flags are displayed on the mark boats a vessel must not come within the launching area as defined by the shore and by three imaginary straight lines the one drawn from the one mark boat to the other mark boat, and another drawn from the northward mark boat to a point on the shore 300 yards to the northward of the river end of the launchway, and the third drawn from the southward mark boat to a point on the shore 600 yards to the southward of the river end of the launchway.

32.—(a) The mark boats shall continue to display the launching flags until the vessel is launched and is under control, or until a signal has been received from the shipbuilder to haul down the same.

(b) If the vessel is not launched within 30 minutes after the launching flags have been displayed upon the mark boats, the shipbuilder shall take steps to prevent the vessel being launched on that day, and the launching flags shall thereupon be hauled down unless there is a risk of the vessel coming off the launchway of her own accord.

33. The shipbuilder shall take means to bring up the vessel which has been launched and have her under control within the launching area.

VESSELS AGROUND IN THE RIVER MERSEY.

34. In lieu of the lights prescribed by Article 11 of the General Regulations to be carried by a vessel aground in or near a fairway, a vessel aground or beached in the River Mersey, southward of an imaginary line drawn from the Rock Lighthouse to the Seaforth Battery, shall carry where they can best be seen, on that part of the vessel which lies towards the fairway, the following distinguishing marks and lights:—

By DAY.—Three black balls or shapes, each 2 feet in diameter, in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 3 feet apart.

By NIGHT.—Three lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 3 feet apart. The highest of these lights shall be white and the middle and lowest shall be red, and shall be so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon for a distance of at least 1 mile.

The lowest of the said balls or shapes and lights shall be not less than 10 feet above the hull, or 10 feet above the level of the highest high water.

Provided that a vessel aground or beached on Tranmere Beach to the westward of an imaginary line drawn from the south-eastward point of Cammell Laird's permanent works to the northern end of Rock Ferry Stage shall not be required to show any lights or shapes.

WHEREAS by Section 445 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that where the Board of Trade certify that the laws and regulations for the time being in force in any foreign country and relating to overloading and improper loading are equally effective with the provisions of that Act relating thereto, His Majesty in Council may direct that on proof of a ship of that country having complied with those laws and regulations she shall not, when in a port of the United Kingdom, be liable to detention for non-compliance with the said provisions of that Act, nor shall there arise any liability to any fine or penalty which would otherwise arise for non-compliance with those provisions:

And whereas by Section 1 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, provision, as is more particularly therein mentioned, is made for applying to foreign ships while they are within any port in the United Kingdom certain sections of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, which relate to loadline without prejudice to any direction of His Majesty in Council given under the said Section 445 of the last-mentioned Act:

And whereas the Board of Trade have certified that certain statutory regulations which have been approved by the Japanese Government relating to overloading, so far as regards the assignment of loadlines to Japanese ships, are equally effective with the corresponding regulations in force in this country respecting the assignment of loadlines to British Merchant ships:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council doth direct that on proof that Japanese ships have complied with the aforesaid Japanese regulations, such ships shall not, when in ports of the United Kingdom, be liable to detention for non-compliance with the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts relating to overloading, nor shall there arise any liability to any fine or penalty which would otherwise arise for non-compliance with those provisions.

WHEREAS by Section 30 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, as amended by Section 2 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1893, it is (amongst other things) provided that, if a majority of the whole Council of a Borough agree to petition, and the Council thereupon petition, the King for the alteration of the number and boundaries of the Wards of the Borough, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, from time to time, by Order in Council, to fix the number of Wards into which the Borough shall be divided, and that the Borough shall be divided into that number of Wards, and that where an Order in Council has been so made the Secretary of State shall appoint a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the

boundaries of the Wards and apportioning the Councillors among them :

And whereas a majority of the whole Council of the Borough of Stafford did on the 11th day of July, 1922, agree to petition, and the Council of the said Borough thereupon petitioned, His Majesty for the alteration of the number and boundaries of the Wards of the said Borough :

And whereas His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 30th day of July, 1923, to fix the number of Wards into which the Borough of Stafford should be henceforth divided, and to order and direct that the number of the said Wards should be four :

And whereas on the 18th day of August, 1923, the Right Honourable William Clive Bridgeman, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did appoint R. C. Maxwell, Esquire, O.B.E., LL.D., Barrister-at-Law, a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the boundaries of such Wards, and for apportioning the Councillors of the said Borough among such Wards :

And whereas the said Commissioner has accordingly prepared the following Scheme, dated the 7th day of January, 1924 :—

“ SCHEME for determining the Boundaries of the Wards and Apportioning the Councillors among the Wards of the Borough of Stafford.

“ (1) Number of Wards.

“ By Order of His Majesty in Council made in that behalf on the 30th day of July, 1923, the number of Wards of the Borough of Stafford was fixed at four.

“ (2) Names of Wards.

“ North Ward.
South Ward.
East Ward.
West Ward.

“ (3) Boundaries of Wards.

“ The North Ward shall include the Area comprised within :—

“ A line commencing at the junction of the Stone Road with the Borough boundary and thence proceeding in a Southerly direction along the centre of the Stone Road, North Street, and Grey Friars to the junction of Grey Friars with Browning Street; thence proceeding in a North-Easterly direction along the centre of Browning Street and Sandon Road to the Borough boundary; and thence in a North-Westerly and Westerly direction along the Borough boundary to the point of commencement.

“ The East Ward shall include the Area comprised within :—

“ A line commencing at the junction of Sandon Road with the Borough boundary and thence proceeding in a South-Westerly direction along the centre of Sandon Road and Browning Street to the junction of Browning Street with Foregate Street; thence in a Southerly direction along the centre of Foregate Street, Gaol Square, Gaolgate Street, Greengate Street, and Bridge Street to the middle point of Green Bridge; thence in an Easterly direction along the centre of the River Sow to the point where the river is crossed by the road known as ‘ Riverway ’; thence in a Northerly direction along the centre of Riverway to the junction of Riverway with Weston Road; thence in an Easterly direction along the centre of Weston Road to the boundary of

the Borough; and thence in a North-Westerly direction along the Borough boundary to the point of commencement.

“ The West Ward shall include the area comprised within :—

“ A line commencing at the junction of the Stone Road with the Borough boundary and thence proceeding in a Southerly direction along the centre of the Stone Road, North Street, Grey Friars, Foregate Street, Gaol Square, Gaolgate Street, Greengate Street, Bridge Street, Lichfield Road to its junction with Wolverhampton Road, and Wolverhampton Road to the centre of the bridge which crosses the Grand Junction line of the London, Midland and Scottish Railway; thence in a North-Westerly direction along the centre of the main line of that railway to its junction with the Shropshire Union Line; thence in a Westerly direction along the North side of the Shropshire Union line to the Borough boundary and thence in a Westerly, Northerly and North-Easterly direction along the Borough boundary to the point of commencement.

“ The South Ward shall include the remaining portion of the Borough, not comprised within the boundaries of the North, East, and West Wards, respectively, as above set out.

“ The boundaries of the Wards as above described are delineated in the Plan which is annexed hereto and forms part of the Scheme.

WHEREAS it is among other things provided by the Copyright Act, 1911, that His Majesty may by Order in Council extend the said Act to any territory under His protection, and that on the making of any such Order the said Act shall subject to the provisions of the Order have effect as if the territories to which it applies were part of His Majesty's Dominions to which the said Act extends:

And whereas by treaty, capitulation, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction within Palestine:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Copyright Act, 1911, or otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The Copyright Act, 1911, shall extend to Palestine, subject to the following modification:—

In the application to existing works of the provisions of Sections 19 (7), 19 (8) and 24 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the 1st day of October, 1920, shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act wherever that expression occurs, and the date of this Order for the 26th day of July, 1910, in Section 24 (1) (b).

2. This Order may be cited as the Copyright Act, 1911 (Extension to Palestine) Order, 1924.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, and of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1921, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 24th day of January, 1924, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, and of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1921, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of two neighbouring Benefices, that is to say the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Dowland and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Iddesleigh, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Devon and in the Diocese of Exeter:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Exeter, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Dowland and Iddesleigh duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Exeter and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Exeter signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas both of the said Benefices of Dowland and Iddesleigh are now full, the Reverend Donald Williams Jackson being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Dowland and the Reverend Joseph Rawle Paramore being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Iddesleigh:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said William, Bishop of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Dowland and the said Benefice of Iddesleigh shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Iddesleigh with Dowland,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant, the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith; and if the said Benefice of Dowland only shall be then vacant the said union shall also take effect forthwith if the Incumbent of the other of the said two Benefices shall consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of the said Benefice of Iddesleigh and the then Incumbent of Dowland shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice; and if the said Benefice of Iddesleigh only shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Dowland; and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant, then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Dowland if the Incumbent at that time of the said Benefice of Iddesleigh shall have been instituted to Iddesleigh subsequently to the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or if instituted before that date shall consent to become the Incumbent of the United Benefice; but if he shall have been instituted to Iddesleigh before that date and shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of the Benefice of Iddesleigh following such avoidance of the Benefice of Dowland and the then Incumbent of Dowland shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

" 3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Iddesleigh shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

" 4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, that in each series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the United Benefice after the union the Patron of the said Benefice of Iddesleigh shall have the first and second turns, and the Patron of the said Benefice of Dowland shall have the third turn.

" Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."
