

" And we further recommend and propose that the said Church of All Saints, Falmouth, shall as from the day last mentioned be and for that purpose we hereby specify the same Church as the Parish Church of the said New Parish of All Saints, Falmouth.

" And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of Patronage of the said proposed District or New Parish and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in the said Walter, Bishop of the said Diocese of Truro, and his successors for ever.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

" THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

" The New Parish of All Saints, Falmouth, comprising:—

" All those contiguous portions of the Parish of Falmouth and of the Parish of Budock, both in the County of Cornwall and in the Diocese of Truro, which taken together, are bounded upon part of the north-west and upon the north by the New Parish of Penwerris, in the said County and Diocese, upon the north-east by Falmouth Harbour and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east, upon the south, upon the south-west, upon the west and upon the remaining part of the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary of the said Parish of Falmouth at a point in the middle of the pierhead of the Prince of Wales' Pier, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said pier and in a straight line in continuation thereof for a distance in all of 8½ chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the road called Market Strand, and extending thence southward along the middle of Market Strand for a distance of 1½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Killigrew Street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Killigrew Street for a distance of 4 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the north-eastern side of Market Place, and extending thence south-westward and in a straight line across Market Place for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the northern end of the road called Berkeley Place, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Berkeley Place for a distance of 5½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Quarry Hill and the road called Berkeley Vale, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Berkeley Vale for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Brook Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Brook Street for a distance of 4½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Killigrew Road and Trelawney Road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Tre-

lawney Road for a distance of 25½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Wood Lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Wood Lane for a distance of 16½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Western Terrace and Pennance Road, and extending thence first south-westward and then southward along the middle of Pennance Road for a distance of 42½ chains or thereabouts to its southern end at Swanpool Beach, and extending thence in a straight line due south for a distance of 1¼ chains or thereabouts, to the low water mark of ordinary tides in Falmouth Bay on the southern boundary of the said Parish of Falmouth, and extending thence first westward and then south-westward along the southern boundary of the said Parish of Falmouth (thereby following the said low water mark) for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the boundary which divides the said Parish of Budock from the said Parish of Falmouth, and extending thence first westward and then in various directions along the last mentioned boundary for a distance of 77 chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary crosses the middle of the Falmouth Branch Line of the Great Western Railway, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 41½ chains or thereabouts to the point where such line of railway is crossed by the footpath leading from the house and premises known as Tregoniggle to Union Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last mentioned footpath for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the southern side of Union Road, and extending thence north-eastward and in a straight line across Union Road for a distance of 12 yards or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the western end of the footpath leading from Union Road to the Penryn Road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last mentioned footpath for a distance of 7½ chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the angle formed by the boundary which divides the said Parish of Budock from the said Parish of Falmouth, and extending thence first south-eastward to and then north-eastward along the last mentioned boundary (thereby following the southern side of the last mentioned footpath) for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Penwerris from the said Parish of Falmouth."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patron and to the Incumbents of the Parishes out of which it is intended that the District, recommended in such Scheme to be constituted, shall be taken, and such Patron and the Incumbent of the Parish of Falmouth have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the Incumbent of the Parish of Budock has offered an objection to the said Scheme:

And whereas a period of more than one calendar month has elapsed since the transmission of such drafts as aforesaid:

And whereas notwithstanding the said objection the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:
