

court, with part of the French Forces from the *Moselle*, have joined them; The rest are marched to *Marschal Chouffal's* Army on the *Rhine*. The *Prince de Bergeycke*, Governor of this City, has demanded of the Magistrates, by Order of the *Electeur of Bavaria*, 150000 Florins for the Expences of the new Works that are now making for the better defence of this City. The Troops of *Munster*, being 4 or 5000 Men, have passed the *Meuse*, and are marching this way.

From Cackleberg, July 1. His Majesty continues in this Camp; and the *Electeur of Bavaria* at *Neuelle* near *Deyse*; and the *Enemies* Armies under *Marschals Villeroi, Boufflers* and *Catinat*, at *Issingut, Papinge*, and *Vive St. Eloy*. 4000 Men of the Forces of *Hesse*, commanded by the Count *de Lippe*, arrived here the 28th; We continue to cast up several Works for the security of *Brussels* when the Army is removed. Yesterday the Horse made a general Forage towards *Relegem*; Their Guard being 2000 Foot and 1000 Horse, commanded by *Lieutenant General la Forest*.

Hague, July 2. N. S. There have passed Visits between the Imperial and French Ambassadors, according to the usual practice; Count *Cannitz* and Count *Straatman*, who arrived first, made the first Visit, and the French did the like to *Baron Seyler*, who arrived after them. The Spanish Ambassadors went this day to *Delf*, and made their Visit to the French in the same manner. The Pensionary of *Holland* parted hence last Sunday, to attend His Majesty in the Army. The Fleet of Dutch Merchant Ships from the *Streights* (which put into *Milford-Haven*) are arrived in the *Texell*; and the 11 Dutch Men of War commanded by the Count *de Nassau*, who convoyed them from *England*, are returned to join the Fleet. The Yachts and Transport Ships sailed out of the *Maese* two days ago with their Convoy for *England*.

Dublin, June 19. Yesterday the Lords-Justices in Council ordered Two Proclamations to be issued, one to give notice, That 'tis His Majesty's Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which is adjourned to the 27th of July next, shall then meet and continue to sit for the Dispatch of Business. The other Proclamation prohibits the Exportation of Corn from any part of this Kingdom.

Plymouth, June 22. The Wind coming Easterly, the Homeward-bound *Virginia* and *Barbadoes* Fleet are put into this Port, with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships commanded by Rear-Admiral *Benbow*. Vice-Admiral *Mitchell*, with the Squadron under his Command, is in *Torbay*. His Majesty's Ship the *Defiance* is come in here from the Eastward, with the *Purveyor* Storeship bound hither, and about 28 other Vessels.

London, June 25. The *Centurion* and *Royal-Transport* are arrived in the River with the Yachts and Transport Ships from *Holland*. On Friday last was Launched at *Deptford* a new Ship of 80 Guns called the *Rainclagh*.
