PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Order of Her Majesty Queen Victoria in Council dated the 5th day of March, 1885, and made in pursuance of the powers given to Her Majesty by "The Saint Vincent, Tobago, and Grenada Consti-tution Act, 1876," after reciting that Her Majesty in Council had by an Order in Council of even date therewith approved the draft of Letters Patent (which now bear date the 17th day of March, 1885), constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Windward Islands, comprising the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, Tobago, and Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies, it was ordered that the Legislative Council of Grenada should consist of such persons as were Members thereof immediately before the publication in the Island of the said Letters Patent, and of such other persons as might be thereafter appointed in pursuance of the said Letters Patent, and that the said Council should have the powers prescribed in the said Letters Patent, and should exercise the same in the manner and with the forms in the said Letters Patent directed:

And whereas by the said recited Act power was reserved to Her Majesty in Council from

time to time to alter or amond the constitution of the Legislature of the Island of Grenada:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty in Council dated the seventeenth day of November, 1888, the Colony of Tobago was united into the Colony of Trinidad:

And whereas it hath seemed fit to His Majesty to make further and other provision for the Government of the Windward Islands comprising the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, and Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies, and with that object His Majesty in Council hath, by an Order in Council of even date herewith, approved the Draft of Letters Patent revoking the said Letters Patent of the 17th day of March, 1885, and constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Windward Islands, comprising the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies, and hath ordered that the Right Honourable James Henry Thomas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do cause a Warrent to be prepared for His Majesty's Poya! Signature, for passing under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom Letters Patent conformable to the said draft:

And whereas it is therefore necessary again to declare the constitution of the Legislature of the Island of Grenada:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers in His Majesty vested in virtue of "The Saint Vincent, Tobago, and Grenada Constitution Act, 1876," it is hereby ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, as follows:

I. This Order may be cited as the Grenada (Legislative Council) Order in Council, 1924.

II. In this Order "His Majesty" includes His Majesty's Heirs and successors; "Secretary of State" means one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; "Governor means the Governor and Commander-in-Chiei for the time being of the Windward Islands and includes every person for the time being administering the Government of the Windward Islands; "the Island "and "Grenada" mean the Island of Grenada and its Dependencies; "the Council" means the Legislative Council in and for the Island of Grenada and its Dependencies, which Council shall be known as the Legislative Council of Grenada.

III. There shall be in and for Grenada a Legislative Council, constituted as hereinafter

IV. The Council shall consist of the Governor, of seven ex officio Members, of three Nominated Members and of five Elected Members.

The ex officio Members shall be the persons for the time being lawfully discharging the functions of the respective offices of Colonial Secretary, of Attorney-General, of Treasurer, and of such other offices not exceeding four in number at any one time as may from time to time be designated by His Majesty by an Order in His Privy Council, or through a Secretary of State.

The Nominated Members shall be such persons not holding any office in the public service of the Island, and not exceeding three in number at any one time, as His Majesty may from time to time appoint by any Instruction or Warrant under His Sign Manual and Signet, or as the Governor in pursuance of Instructions from His Majesty through a Secretary of State may from time to time appoint under the Public Seal of the Island.
The Elected Members shall be persons to

be elected as hereinafter provided.

V. The ex officio Members of the Council shall take precedence of the other members, and shall rank among themselves in the order in which their offices are hereinbefore named, or as may be otherwise prescribed by His Majesty or through a Secretary of State. Until the first dissolution of the Council, the other members shall rank among themselves in the order of date of their appointment or election, and two or more members appointed or elected on the same day shall rank in the alphabetical order of their names. Thereafter the Nominated Members shall rank after the ex officio Members in the order of the date of their appointment and in the case of any two or more of them appointed on the same day in the alphabetical order of their names: and the Elected Members shall rank after the Nominated Members, and among themselves in the order of date of their election, and in the case of any two or more of them being elected on the same day according to the number of votes obtained by each, and in the case of any two or more of them receiving the same number of votes, in the alphabetical order of their names.

- VI. No person shall be capable of being elected a Member of the Council, or, having been elected, shall sit or vote in the Council,
 - (1) Is the holder of any office of emolument under the Crown, or under a Municipal Corporation within the Island; or
 - (2) Is a minister of religion; or,
 - (3) Is the returning officer of the district for which the election is held; or,
 - (4) Is not a male person; or,
 - (5) Is not entitled to vote at the election of a Member of the Council for some electoral district.

The term "Minister of Religion" in this clause and in Clause VIII. means any clergyman, minister, priest, or other person who exercises spiritual functions or performs the offices of religion for or in respect to any Christian or other church, community, or body within Grenada.

The term "office of emolument" in this clause does not include a pension or other allowance to an officer who has ceased to be in the service of the Crown or of a Municipal Corporation.

No person shall be capable of being elected a Member of the Council for any electora! district, or having been elected, shall sit or vote in the Council, unless he possesses a clear annual income of £200, and either has resided in that electoral district for twelve months immediately preceding the day of election, or is the owner of real property situate in that electoral district of the value of at least £500 above all charges and encumbrances affecting the same.

VII. Every who, person having returned as an Elected Member of the Council, but not having been at the time of his election qualified to be an Elected Member, shall sit or vote in the Council, shall for every day on which he sits or votes, and every person who shall sit or vote in the Council after his seat has become vacant shall for every day on which he sits or votes after his seat has become vacant, be liable to a penalty of £20 to be recovered by action in the Supreme Court of Grenada by any person who shall sue for the

VIII. If any Elected Member of the Council shall, by writing under his hand, addressed to the Governor, resign his seat in the Council, or shall cease to possess an income or property qualification as required by Clause VI. of this Order, or shall, without the leave of the Governor previously obtained, be absent from the sittings of the Council for three months, or shall make any declaration or acknowledgment of allegiance to any Foreign State or Power, or shall become a citizen or subject of any Foreign State or Power, or shall be adjudicated a bankrupt, or shall be sentenced in any part of His Majesty's dominions to death, penal servitude, or imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve months, or shall have any direct or indirect pecuniary interest in any contract with the Government of Grenada for or on account of the Public Service otherwise than as a member and in common with the other members of an incorporated company consisting of more than twenty-five persons, or shall accept any office of emolument under the Crown or under a Municipal Corporation within Grenada, or shall become a Minister of Religion, his seat in the Council shall thereupon become vacant.

Whenever it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the Governor that the seat of an Elected Member has become vacant, the Governor shall, as soon as possible, issue a writ for the election of a new member in the place of the member whose seat has become vacant, but if any question shall arise as to the fact of such vacancy, it shall be referred to and decided by the Supreme Court of Grenada.

IX. The Nominated Members of the Council shall hold their seats until the next dissolution of the Council after their appointment, unless previously removed by His Majesty by virtue of an Instruction or Warrant under His Sign Manual and Signet or through a Secretary of State or suspended by the Governor under the power for that purpose hereby vested in him, or unless they shall previously resign their Nominated Members may again be appointed in the same manner as aforesaid to the next Council after a dissolution or to any subsequent Council.

X. If any Nominated Member of the Council shall, without the leave of the Governor previously obtained, be absent from the sittings of the Council for three months, or shall make or acknowledgment declaration allegiance to any Foreign State or Power, or shall become a citizen or subject of any Foreign State or Power, or shall be adjudicated a bankrupt, or shall be sentenced in any part of His Majesty's dominions to death or penal servitude, or to imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve months, or shall have any direct or indirect pecuniary interest in any contract with the Government of Grenada for or on account of the public service otherwise than as a member and in common with the other members of an incorporated company consisting of more than twenty-five persons, his seat in the Council shall thereupon become vacant.

XI. The Governor may, by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, suspend any Nominated Member from the exercise of his functions as a Member of the Council. Every such suspension shall be forthwith reported by the Governor to His Majesty through a Secretary of State, and shall remain in force unless and until either it shall be removed by the Governor by an instrument under the said Seal or it shall be disallowed by His Majesty through a Secretary of State, and such disallowance shall be published in the Grenada Government Gazette.

XII.—1. Whenever any person sitting as an ex officio Member of the Council shall be administering the Government of the Island, or whenever any person shall be lawfully discharging the functions of more than one of the offices the holders of which are ex officio Members of the Council, the Governor may, by an Instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, appoint some other person holding office in the public service of the Island to be provisionally a Member of the Council during the period of such administration, or for so long as the functions of the said offices continue to be discharged by one person as aforesaid, as the case may be. Any persons so appointed shall have precedence next after the ex officio Members and amongst themselves according to the date of their appointment to be provisionally Members of the Council.

2. Whenever any Nominated Member shall, by writing under his hand, resign his seat in the Council, or shall die or be suspended from the exercise of his functions as a Member of the Council, or be declared by the Governor, by an instrument under the Public Scal of the Island, to be incapable of exercising his functions as a Member of the Council, or be temporarily absent from Grenada, or shall by reason of his being appointed either permanently or temporarily to an office in the public service of the Island become disqualified to sit as a Nominated Member, the Governor may, by an Instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, appoint some person not holding any office in the public service of the Island to be provisionally a Nominated Member of the Council in the place of the Member so resigning or dying, or being suspended or declared incapable, or temporarily absent, or becoming either permanently or temporarily the holder of an office in the public service of the Island.

Every such provisional appointment may be disallowed by His Majesty through a Secretary of State, or may be revoked by the Governor by any such instrument as aforesaid.

XIII. The Governor shall without delay report for His Majesty's approval or disallowance through a Secretary of State every provisional appointment of any person as a Member of the Council.

XIV. Every person provisionally appointed as hereinbefore provided shall be to all intents and purposes a Member of the Council until his appointment shall be disallowed, or revoked, or superseded by the permanent appointment of a Nominated Member of the Council, or until the person in whose place he has been appointed shall cease to administer the Government of the Island or shall cease to discharge the functions of more than one of the offices the holders of which are ex officio Members of the Council or shall be relieved from suspension or declared by the Governor, by an Instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, to be capable of exercising the functions of a Member of the Council, or shall return to Grenada, or shall cease to be disqualified as aforesaid, as the case may be.

XV. No Member of the Council shall sit or vote therein until he shall have taken and subscribed the following oath before the Governor, or some person authorized by the Governor to administer such oath:-

"I, A.B., do sincerely promise and swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King George the Fifth, His heirs and successors according to law."

"So help me God."

Provided that every person authorised by law to make an affirmation instead of taking an oath may make such affirmation instead of the said oath.

XVI. For the purpose of the election of Members of the Council, Grenada shall be divided into five electoral districts to be defined by order of the Governor in Executive Council.

One member shall be elected for each of the

said electoral districts.

XVII. Every person shall be entitled to be registered as a voter for any one electoral district, and, when registered, to vote at the election of a Member of the Council for such district, who is qualified as follows, that is to

(1) Being a man, has attained the age of twenty-one years, or, being a woman, has attained the age of thirty years.

(2) Is under no legal incapacity.
(3) Is a British subject.
(4) Has resided in Grenada for two years at least previous to the date of registration, or is domiciled in Grenada and is resident therein at the date of such registration, and, in either case, possesses some one of the following qualifications:-

(a) has a net income of at least thirty

pounds per annum;

(b) is the owner of real property within Grenada of the value of at least one hundred and fifty pounds above all charges and encumbrances affecting the same;

(c) is paying rent in respect of real property situate within Grenada at the rate of at least twelve pounds per annum:

(1) That no person shall be registered as a voter or be entitled to vote for the election of a Member of the Council who has been convicted of perjury in any Court in His Majesty's Dominions, or who has been sentenced by any such Court to death, or penal servitude, or imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve months, and has not either suffered the punishment to which he was sentenced or such other punishment as by competent authority may have been substituted for the same or received a free pardon from His Majesty.

(2) That no person shall be registered as a voter in any year who has within twelve calendar months immediately preceding the 1st day of January in that year received any relief from public or parochial funds.

(3) That no person shall be registered as a voter unless he shall with his own hand have subscribed his name to his claim to be registered, and written thereon the date of such subscription.

XVIII. As soon as possible after the coming into operation of this Order a register shall be made in each of the said electoral districts of the persons entitled to vote at the election of Members of the Council, and shall come into force at such time as shall be appointed by the Governor by Proclamation to be published in the Grenada Government Gazette. after a fresh register shall be made triennially in each such district and every such register shall come into force at such time as shall be appointed by any law enacted by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Council.

No person who is not registered as a voter shall vote at any such election.

XIX. For the purpose of every general elec-tion of Members of the Council, and for the purpose of the election of members to supply vacancies caused by death, resignation, or otherwise, the Governor shall issue writs of ϵ lection under the Public Seal of the Island, addressed to the returning officers of the respective electoral districts for which members are to be returned. Every such writ shall specify the day and place of election, and the day on which it is returnable to the Governor; upon receipt of such writ the returning officer shall proceed to hold the election thereby directed; and after such election he shall certify the return of the member elected by endorsement on the writ, and shall return the writ so endorsed to the Governor within the time for that purpose specified therein. He shall also, as soon as possible, give public notice of the candidate elected, and in the case of a contested election of the number of votes given for each candidate whether elected or not.

XX. In the case of a poll at an election of a Member of the Council the votes shall be given by ballot. The ballot of each voter shall consist of a paper (in this Order called a ballot paper) showing the names and description of the candidates. Each ballot paper shall have a number printed on the back, and shall have attached to it a counterfoil with the same number printed on the face. At the time of voting the ballot paper shall be marked on both sides with an official mark and delivered to the voter within the polling station, and the number of such voter on the register of voters shall be marked on the counterfoil, and the voter having secretly marked his or her vote on the paper, and folded up the paper so as to conceal his or her vote, shall place it in a closed box in the presence of the officer presiding at the polling station after having shown to him the official mark at the back.

Any ballot paper which has not on its back the official mark, or on which a vote is given to more than one candidate, or on which anything except the said number on the back is written or marked, by which the voter can be identified, shall be void and not counted.

After the close of the poll the ballot boxes shall be sealed so as to prevent the introduction of additional ballot papers and shall be taken charge of by the returning officer, who shall, in the presence of such agents (if any) of the candidates as may be in attendance, open the ballot boxes and ascertain the result of the poll by counting the votes given to each candidate, and shall forthwith declare to be elected the candidate to whom the majority of the votes have been given.

The decision of the returning officer as to any question arising in respect of any ballot paper shall be final, subject to reversal on petition questioning the election or return.

XXI. Whenever there is an equality of votes between candidates at any election of a Member of the Council, and the addition of a vote would entitle any of such candidates to be declared elected, the returning officer, if he is a registered elector of the electoral district for which the election is held, may give such additional vote, but the returning officer shall not, in any other case, be entitled to vote at an election for which he is the returning officer.

XXII. A petition complaining of an undue return or undue election of a Member of the Council, in this Order called an election petition, may be presented to the Supreme Court by any one or more of the following persons, that is to say,—(1) some person who voted or had a right to vote at the election to which the petition relates, (2) some person claiming to have had a right to be returned at such election, (3) some person alleging himself to have been a candidate at such election.

XXIII. Every election petition shall be tried before the Supreme Court in the same manner as a suit commenced by a writ of summons. At the conclusion of the trial, the Chief Justice determine whether the Member of Council whose return or election is complained of or any and what other person was duly returned or elected, or whether the election was void, and shall certify such determination to the Governor, and, upon such certificate being given, such determination shall be final; and the return shall be confirmed or altered, or a writ for a new election shall be issued, as the case may require, in accordance with such determination.

XXIV. At the trial of an election petition the Chief Justice shall, subject to the provisions of this Order or of any Proclamation to be made by the Governor, have the same jurisdiction, and powers, authority, and witnesses shall be subpænaed and sworn in the same manner, as nearly as circumstances will admit, as in a trial of a civil action in the Supreme Court, and shall be subject to the

same penalties for perjury.

XXV. Subject to the provisions of this Order, the election of Members of the Council shall be held and the registration of voters for the election of such members shall be effected at such times, in such places, and in such manner and form, and by such officers, and with such provisions for ascertaining the qualifications of voters and candidates, and all questions and disputes arising with regard to any such matters shall be determined by such tribunals and in such manner, as may from time to time be ordained by any law or laws enacted by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council, and in the meantime, and until provision has been made for the purposes aforesaid by the enactment of any such Law or Laws as aforesaid, as shall be directed by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be issued by the Governor and published in the Grenada Government Gazette. Every Proclamation made in pursuance of this clause shall from the publication thereof have the same force and effect as if it had been a Law enacted by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council as aforesaid.

XXVI. The following persons shall be deemed guilty of bribery within the meaning of this Order:

- (1) Every person who directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, gives, lends, or agrees to give or lend, or offers, promises, or promises to procure or to endeavour to procure, any money or valuable consideration to or for any voter, or to or for any person on behalf of any voter, or to or for any other person in order to induce any voter to vote or refrain from voting, or corruptly does any such act as aforesaid on account of such voter having voted or refrained from voting at any election.
- (2) Every person who directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, gives or procures, or agrees to give or procure, or offers, promises, or promises to procure or to endeavour to procure, any office, place, or employment to or for any voter, or to or for any person on XXVIII. Every person who directly or behalf of any voter, or to or for any other indirectly, by himself or by any other person

person in order to induce such voter to vote or refrain from voting, or corruptly does any such act as aforesaid on account of any voter having voted or refrained from voting

at any election.
(3) Every person who directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, makes any such gift, loan, offer, promise, procurement, or agreement as aforesaid to or for any person in order to induce such person to procure, or endeavour to procure, the return of any person as an elected Member of the Council, or the vote of any voter at any election.

(4) Every person who, upon or in consequence of any such gift, loan, offer, promise, procurement, or agreement, procures or engages, promises or endeavours to procure the return of any person as an elected Member of the Council, or the vote of any

voter at any election.

(5) Every person who advances or pays, or causes to be paid, any money to or to the use of any other person, with the intent that such money, or any part thereof, shall be expended in bribery at any election, or who knowingly pays or causes to be paid, any money to any person in discharge or repayment of any money wholly or in part expended in bribery at any election.

(6) Every voter who, before or during any election, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person in his behalf, receives, agrees, or contracts for any money, gift, loan, or valuable consideration, office, place, or employment for himself or for any other person, for voting or agreeing to vote, or for refraining or agreeing to refrain from

voting at any election.

(7) Every person who, after any election, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, receives any money or valuable consideration on account of any person having voted or refrained from voting, or having induced any other person to vote or refrain from voting at any election.

(8) Every person who directly or indirectly corruptly pays any rate or tax on behalf of any other person for the purpose of enabling him to be registered as a voter in order thereby to influence his vote at any future election, and every person on whose behalf, and with whose privity, any such payment as last aforesaid is made.

XXVII. The following persons shall be deemed guilty of treating within the meaning of this Order:

- (1) Every person who corruptly, by himself or by any other person, either before, during, or after an election, directly or indirectly, gives or provides or pays wholly or in part the expense of giving or providing any food, drink, entertainment, or provision to or for any person for the purpose of corruptly influencing that person, or any other person, to vote or to refrain from voting, at such election, or on account of such person or any other person having voted or refrained from voting at such election.
- (2) Every voter who corruptly accepts or takes any such food, drink, entertainment, or provision.

on his behalf, makes use of or threatens to make use of, any force, violence, or restraint, or inflicts or threatens to inflict, by himself or by any other person, any temporal or spiritual injury, damage, harm, or loss upon or against any person, in order to induce or compel such person to vote or refrain from voting or on account of such person having voted or refrained from voting at any election, or who by abduction, duress, or any fraudulent contrivance, impedes or prevents the free exercise of the franchise of any voter, or thereby compels, induces, or prevails upon any voter either to give or refrain from giving his vote at any election, shall be guilty of undue influence within the meaning of this Order.

XXIX. Every person who at an election applies for a bailot paper in the name of another person, whether that name be the name of a person living or dead, or of a fictitious person, or who, having voted once at any election, applies at the same election for a ballot paper in his own name, shall be guilty of personation within the meaning of this Order.

XXX. Every person who is guilty of bribery, treating, or undue influence, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding one year, or to be fined any sum not exceeding two hundred pounds.

XXXI. Every person who is guilty of personation, or of aiding, abetting, counselling, or procuring the commission of the offence of personation, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years.

XXXII. Every person who is convicted of bribery, treating, undue influence, or personation, or of aiding, counselling, or procuring the commission of the offence of personation, shall (in addition to any other punishment) be incapable during a period of seven years from the date of conviction—

- (1) Of being registered as a voter, or voting at any election of a Member of the Council.
- (2) Of being elected a member of the Council, or, if elected before his conviction, of retaining his seat as such member.

 XXXIII. Every person who—
- (1) Votes, or induces or procures any person to vote, at any election, knowing that he or such other person is prohibited by this Order, or by any law, from voting at such election;
- (2) Before or during an election knowingly publishes a false statement of the withdrawal of a candidate at such election for the purpose of promoting or procuring the election of another candidate;

shall be guilty of an illegal practice, and shall, on summary conviction thereof, be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, and be incapable, during a period of five years from the date of conviction, of being registered as a voter, or voting at any election of a Member of the Council.

XXXIV. Every person who-

(1) Forges or counterfeits, or fraudulently defaces or destroys, any ballot paper or the official mark on any ballot paper: or

official mark on any ballot paper; or
(2) Without due authority supplies a ballot paper to any person; or,

(3) Fraudulently puts into any ballot box any paper other than the ballot paper which he is authorised by law to put in; or,

(4) Fraudulently takes out of the polling

station any ballot paper; or,

(5) Without due authority destroys, takes, opens, or otherwise interferes with any ballot box or packet of ballot papers then in use for the purposes of any election; or,

(6) Not being duly registered as a voter, votes at the election of a Member of the

Council;

shall be guilty of misdemeanour, and be liable, if he is a returning officer or presiding officer, or clerk employed at a polling station, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding two hundred pounds, and, if he is any other person, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

Any attempt to commit any offence specified in this clause shall be punishable in the manner in which the offence itself is punishable.

In any information or prosecution for an offence in relation to the ballot boxes, ballot papers, and other things in use at an election, the property in such ballot boxes, ballot papers, or things may be stated to be in the returning officer at such election.

XXXV. Every officer, clerk and agent, in attendance at a polling station shall maintain and aid in maintaining the secrecy of the voting in such station, and shall not communicate, except for some purpose authorised by law, before the poll is closed, to any person any information as to the name or number on the register of voters of any voter who has or has not applied for a ballot paper or voted at that station, and no person shall interfere with or attempt to interfere with a voter when marking his vote, or otherwise attempt to obtain in the polling station any information as to the candidate for whom any voter in such station is about to vote or has voted, or as to the number on the back of the ballot paper given to any voter at such station.

Every officer, clerk and agent in attendance at the counting of the votes shall maintain and aid in maintaining the secrecy of the voting and shall not attempt to ascertain at such counting the number on the back of any ballot paper or communicate any information obtained at such counting as to the candidate for whom any vote is given in any particular ballot paper. No person shall, directly or indirectly, induce any voter to display his ballot paper after he has marked it so as to make known to any person the name of the candidate for whom or against whose name he has so marked his vote.

Every person who acts in contravention of the provisions of this clause shall be liable, on summary conviction before a Magistrate to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

XXXVI. In the preceding clauses twentysix to thirty-five words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

XXXVII. It shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, to make laws for the peace, order and good government of Grenada.

XXXVIII. Subject to the provisions of this Order the Council shall, in the transaction of business and passing of laws, conform as nearly as may be to the directions as to the transaction of business and passing of laws by the Council from time to time conveyed to the Governor in Instructions under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, but no law enacted by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, shall be invalid by reason that in the enactment thereof any such Instructions were not duly observed.

XXXIX. Subject to the provisions of this Order and such Instructions as aforesaid, the Council may from time to time make Standing Rules and Orders for the regulation of its own

proceedings.

And until any such Rules and Orders shall be made, and subject to any Rules and Orders to be so made, the Standing Rules and Orders Legislative Council of Grenada at present in force, shall remain in force and apply, so far as the same are applicable thereto, to the Council established by this Order.

XL. The Governor, if present, or, in his absence, any Member of the Council appointed by him in writing, or in default of such appointment, or in the absence of the member so appointed, the member present who stands first in order of precedence, shall preside at every meeting of the Council.

XLI. All questions proposed for decision in the Council shall be determined by a majority of the votes of the members present, and the Governor or other presiding member shall have an original vote on all such questions, and also a casting vote if the votes shall be equally

XLII. The Council shall not be disqualified for the transaction of business by reason of any vacancy or vacancies among the ex officio,

Nominated, or Elected Members.

XLIII. Until otherwise provided by the Council, no business except that of adjournment shall be transacted unless there shall be present five members besides the Governor or presiding member.

XLIV. It shall be competent for any Member of the Council to propose any question for debate therein; and such question, if seconded by any other Member, shall be debated and disposed of according to the Standing Rules and Orders: Provided always, that no Ordinance, vote, resolution, or question, the object or effect of which may be to dispose of or charge any part of His Majesty's revenue arising within Grenada, or to revoke, alter, or vary any such disposition or charge, shall be proposed, except by the Governor or with his consent: And provided further, that no vote, resolution or question, the object or effect of which may be to suspend the Standing Orders of the Council, shall be proposed except by the Governor or with his consent.

XLV. The sessions of the Council shall be held at such times and places as the Governor shall from time to time by Proclamation appoint. There shall be at least one session of the Council in every year, and there shall not be an interval of twelve months between the last sitting in one session and the first

sitting in the next session.

XLVI. The Governor may at any time, by Proclamation, prorogue or dissolve the Council.

XLVII. The Governor shall dissolve the Council at the expiration of three years from the date of the return of the first writs at the last preceding general election, if it shall not have been sooner dissolved.

XLVIII. A general election shall be held at such time, within two months after every dissolution of the Council, as the Governor

shall by Proclamation appoint.

XLIX. His Majesty doth hereby reserve to Himself, His heirs and successors, full power and authority from time to time to revoke alter or amend this Order as to Him or them shall seem fit; and nothing herein contained shall affect His or their undoubted right, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, to make from time to time all such laws as may to Him or them appear necessary for the peace, order, and good government of Grenada.

L. This Order shall come into operation on a date to be fixed by the Governor by Proclamation in the Grenada Government Gazette, and shall be published in such Gazette; and from such date so fixed as aforesaid the Order in Council dated the fifth day of March, 1885. declaring the constitution of the Legislative Council for the Island of Grenada and its Dependencies shall be and the same is hereby revoked, but without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder.

And the Right Honourable James Henry Thomas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary

directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by an Order of Her Majesty Queen Victoria in Council dated the 5th day of March, 1885, and made in pursuance of the powers given to Her Majesty by "The Saint Vincent, Tobago, and Grenada Constitution Act, 1876," and by an Act of the Legislature of the Island of Saint Vincent, known as The Constitution Act, 1876," after reciting that Her Majesty in Council had by an Order in Council of even date therewith approved the draft of Letters Patent (which now bear date the 17th day of March, 1885) constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Windward Islands, comprising the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, Tobago, and Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies, it was ordered that the Legislative Council of Saint Vincent should consist of such persons as were Members thereof immediately before the publication in the Island of the said Letters Patent, and of such other persons as might be thereafter appointed in pursuance of the said Letters Patent, and that the said Council should have the powers prescribed in the said Letters Patent, and should exercise the same in the manner and with the forms in the said Letters Patent directed:

And whereas by the Act last above recited power was reserved to Her Majesty in Council from time to time to alter or amend the Legislature of the Island of Saint Vincent, or any of the forms or powers thereof:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty in Council dated the Seventeenth day of November, 1888, the Colony of Tobago was united

into the Colony of Trinidad:

And whereas it hath seemed fit to His Majesty to make further and other provision for the Government of the Windward Islands comprising the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, and Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies, and with that object His Majesty in Council hath, by an Order in Council of even date herewith, approved the Draft of Letters Patent revoking the said Letters Patent of the 17th day of March, 1885, and constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Windward Islands, comprising the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies, and hath ordered that the Right Honourable James Henry Thomas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do cause a Warrant to be prepared for His Majesty's Royal Signature, for passing under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom Letters Patent conformable to the said draft:

And whereas it is therefore necessary again to declare the constitution of the Legislature of the Island of Saint Vincent. and the powers and forms thereof:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers in His Majesty vested in virtue of "The Saint Tobago, and Grenada Constitution Act, 1876 '' it is hereby ordered by His Majesty. by and with the advice of His Privy Council. as follows:

I. This Order may be cited as the Saint Vincent (Legislative Council) Order in Council.

II. In this Order "His Majesty" includes His Majesty's heirs and successors; "Secre-tary of State" means one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; "Governor means the Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the time being of the Windward Islands and includes every person for the time being administering the Government of the Windward Islands; "the Island" and "Saint Vincent" mean the Island of Saint Vincent and its Dependencies; "the Council" means the Legislative Council in and for the Island of Saint Vincent and its Dependencies, which Council shall be known as the Legislative Council of Saint Vincent.

III. There shall be in and for Saint Vincent a Legislative Council, constituted as hereinafter mentioned.

IV. The Council shall consist of Governor, of four ex officio Members, of one Nominated Member and of three Elected

The ex officio Members shall be the persons for the time being lawfully discharging the functions of the respective offices of Colonial Secretary, of Attorney-General, of Treasurer, and of one other office to be from time to time designated by His Majesty by an Order in His Privy Council, or through a Secretary of State.

The Nominated Member shall be such a person, not holding any office in the public service of the Island, as His Majesty may from time to time appoint by any Instruction or Warrant \

under His Sign Manual and Signet, or as the Governor in pursuance of Instructions from His Majesty through a Secretary of State may from time to time appoint under the Public Seal of the Island.

The Elected Members shall be persons to be

elected as hereinafter provided.

V. The ex officio Members of the Council shall take precedence of the other members, and shall rank amongst themselves in the order in which their offices are hereinbefore named. or as may be otherwise prescribed by His Majesty or through a Secretary of State. Until the first dissolution of the Council, the other members shall rank among themselves in the order of date of their appointment or election, and two or more members appointed or elected on the same day shall rank in the alphabetical order of their names. Thereafter the Nominated Member shall rank after the ex officio Members: and the Elected Members shall rank after the Nominated Member, and among themselves in the order of date of their election, and in the case of any two or more of them being elected on the same day according to the number of votes obtained by each, and in the case of any two or more of them receiving the same number of votes, in the alphabetical order of

VI. No person shall be capable of being elected a Member of the Council, or, having been elected shall sit or vote in the Council,

(1) Is the holder of any office of emolument under the Crown, or under a Municipal Corporation within the Island; or,

(2) Is a minister of religion; or,

(3) Is the returning officer of the district for which the election is held; or,

(4) Is not a male person; or,(5) Is not entitled to vote at the election of a Member of the Council for some electoral

The term "Minister of Religion" in this clause and in clause VIII. means any clergyman, minister, priest, or other person who exercises spiritual functions or performs the offices of religion for or in respect to any Christian or other church, community, or body within Saint Vincent.

The term "office of emolument" in this clause does not include a pension or other allowance to an officer who has ceased to be in the service of the Crown or of a Municipal

Corporation.

No person shall be capable of being elected a Member of the Council for any electoral district, or having been elected shall sit or vote in the Council, unless he possesses a clear annual income of £200, and either has resided in that electoral district for twelve months immediately preceding the day of election, or is the owner of real property situate in that electoral district of the value of at least £500 above all charges and encumbrances affecting the same.

person who, having VII. Every returned as an Elected Member of the Council, but not having been at the time of his election qualified to be an Elected Member, shall sit or vote in the Council, shall for every day on which he sits or votes, and every person who shall sit or vote in the Council after his seat has become vacant shall for every day on which he sits or votes after his seat

has become vacant, be liable to a penalty of £20 to be recovered by action in the Supreme Court of Judicature of Saint Vincent by any person who shall sue for the same.

III. If any Elected Member of the Council shall, by writing under his hand, addressed to the Governor, resign his seat in the Council, or shall cease to possess an income or property qualification as required by clause VI. of this Order, or shall, without leave of the Governor previously obtained, be absent from the sittings of the Council for three months, or shall make any declaration or acknowledgment of allegiance to any Foreign State or Power, or shall become a citizen or subject of any Foreign State or Power, or shall be adjudicated a bankrupt, or shall be sentenced in any part of His Majesty's dominions to death, penal servitude, or imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve months, or shall have any direct or indirect pecuniary interest in any contract with the Government of Saint Vincent for or on account of the Public Service otherwise than as a member and in common with the other members of an incorporated company consisting of more than twenty-five persons, or shall accept any office of emolument under the Crown or under a Municipal Corporation within Saint Vincent, or shall become a minister of religion, his seat in the Council shall thereupon become vacant.

Whenever it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the Governor that the seat of an Elected Member has become vacant, the Governor shall, as soon as possible issue a writ for the election of a new member in the place of the member whose seat has become vacant, but if any question shall arise as to the fact of such vacancy, it shall be referred to and decided by the Supreme Court.

IX. The Nominated Member of the Council shall hold his seat until the next dissolution of the Council after his appointment, unless previously removed by His Majesty by virtue of an Instruction or Warrant under His Sign Manual and Signet or through a Secretary of State or suspended by the Governor under the power for that purpose hereby vested in him, or unless he shall previously resign his seat. The Nominated Member may again be appointed in the same manner as aforesaid to the next Council after a dissolution or to any subsequent Council.

X. If the Nominated Member of the Council shall, without the leave of the Governor previously obtained, be absent from the sittings of the Council for three months, or shall make any declaration or acknowledgment of allegiance to any Foreign State or Power, or shall become a citizen or subject of any Foreign State or Power, or shall be adjudicated a bankrupt, or shall be sentenced in any part of His Majesty's dominions to death or penal servitude, or to imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve months, or shall have any direct or indirect pecuniary interest in any contract with the Government of Saint Vincent for or on account of the Public Service otherwise than as a member and in common with the other members of an incorporated company consisting of more than twenty-five persons, his seat in the Council shall thereupon become

XI. The Governor may, by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island suspend

the Nominated Member from the exercise of his functions as a Member of the Council. Every such suspension shall be forthwith reported by the Governor to His Majesty through a Secretary of State, and shall remain in force unless and until either it shall be removed by the Governor by an instrument under the said Seal or it shall be disallowed by His Majesty through a Secretary of State, and such disallowence shall be published in the Saint Vincent Government Gazette.

XII.—1. Whenever any person sitting as an ex officio Member of the Council shall be administering the Government of the Island, or whenever any person shall be lawfully discharging the functions of more than one of the offices the holders of which are ex officio Members of the Council, the Governor may, by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, appoint some other person holding office in the public service of the Island to be provisionally a Member of the Council during the period of such administration, or for so long as the functions of the said offices continue to be discharged by one person as aforesaid, as the case may be. Any persons so appointed shall have precedence next after the ex officio members and amongst themselves according to the date of their appointment to be provisionally Members of the Council.

2. Whenever the Nominated Member shall, by writing under his hand, resign his seat in the Council, or shall die or be suspended from the exercise of his functions as a Member of the Council, or be declared by the Governor, by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, to be incapable of exercising his functions as a Member of the Council, or be temporarily absent from Saint Vincent, or shall by reason of his being appointed either permanently or temporarily to an office in the public service of the Island become disqualified to sit as a Nominated Member, the Governor may, by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, appoint some person not holding any office in the Public Service of the Island to be provisionally a Nominated Member of the Council in the place of the Member so resigning or dying, or being suspended or declared incapable, or temporarily absent, or becoming either permanently or temporarily the holder of an office in the Public Service of the Island.

3. Every such provisional appointment may be disallowed by His Majesty through a Secretary of State, or may be revoked by the Governor by any such instrument as aforesaid.

XIII. The Governor shall without delay report for His Majesty's approval or disallow-ance through a Secretary of State every provisional appointment of any person as a Member of the Council.

XIV. Every person provisionally appointed as hereinbefore provided shall be to all intents and purposes a Member of the Council until his appointment shall be disallowed or revoked, or superseded by the permanent appointment of a Nominated Member of the Council, or until the person in whose place he has been appointed shall cease to administer the Government of the Island or shall cease to discharge the functions of more than one of the offices the holders of which are ex officio Members of the Council, or shall be relieved from suspension or declared by the Governor by an instrument under the Public Seal of the

Island to be capable of exercising the functions of a Member of the Council, or shall return to Saint Vincent, or shall cease to be disqualified

as aforesaid, as the case may be.

XV. No Member of the Council shall sit or vote therein until he shall have taken and subscribed the following oath before the Governor, or some person authorized by the Governor to administer such oath:—

"I, A.B., do sincerely promise and swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King George the Fifth, His heirs and successors according to law."

'' So help me God.''

Provided that every person authorized by law to make an affirmation instead of taking an oath may make such affirmation instead of the said cath.

XVI. For the purpose of the election of Members of the Council, Saint Vincent shall be divided into three electoral districts to be defined by order of the Governor in Executive Council

One member shall be elected for each of the said electoral districts.

XVII. Every person shall be entitled to be registered as a voter for any one electoral district, and, when registered, to vote at the election of a Member of the Council for such district, who is qualified as follows, that is to say:—

- (1) Being a man, has attained the age of twenty-one years, or, being a woman, has attained the age of thirty years.
 - (2) Is under no legal incapacity.

(3) Is a British subject.

- (4) Has resided in Saint Vincent for two years at least previous to the date of registration, or is domiciled in Saint Vincent and is resident therein at the date of such registration, and, in either case, possesses some one of the following qualifications:—
 - (a) has a net income of at least thirty pounds per annum;
 - (b) is the owner of real property within Saint Vincent of the value of at least one hundred and fifty pounds above all charges and encumbrances affecting the same;
 - (c) is paying rent in respect of real property situate within Saint Vincent at the rate of at least twelve pounds per annum:

Provided-

- (1) That no person shall be registered as a voter or be entitled to vote for the election of a Member of the Council who has been convicted of perjury in any Court in His Majesty's Deminions, or who has been sentenced by any such Court to death, or penal servitude, or imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve menths, and has not either suffered the punishment to which he was sentenced or such other punishment as by competent authority may have been substituted for the same or received a free pardon from His Majesty.
- (2) That no person shall be registered as a voter in any year who has within twelve calendar months immediately preceding the 1st day of January in that year received any relief from public or parochial funds.

(3) That no person shall be registered as a voter unless he shall with his own hand

have subscribed his name to his claim to be registered, and written thereon the date of such subscription.

XVIII. As soon as possible after the coming into operation of this Order a register shall be made in each of the said electoral districts of the persons entitled to vote at the election of Members of the Council, and shall come into force at such time as shall be appointed by the Governor by Proclamation to be published in the Saint Vincent Government Gazette. Thereafter a fresh register shall be made triennially in each such district and every such register shall come into force at such time as shall be appointed by any law enacted by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Council.

No person who is not registered as a votershall vote at any such election.

XIX. For the purpose of every general election of Members of the Council, and for the purpose of the election of members to supply vacancies caused by death, resignation, or otherwise, the Governor shall issue writs of election under the Public Seal of the Island, addressed to the returning officers of the respective electoral districts for which members are to be returned. Every such writ shall specify the day and place of election, and the day on which it is returnable to the Governor; upon receipt of such writ the returning officer shall proceed to hold the election thereby directed; and after such election he shall certify the return of the member elected by endorsement on the writ, and shall return the writ so endorsed to the Governor within the time for that purpose specified therein. shall, also, as soon as possible, give publicnotice of the candidate elected, and in the case of a contested election, of the number of votes given for each candidate whether elected or not.

XX. In the case of a poll at an election of a Member of the Council the votes shall be given by ballot. The ballot of each voter shall consist of a paper (in this Order called a ballot paper) showing the names and description of the candidates. Each ballot paper shall. have a number printed on the back, and shall have attached to it a counterfoil with the same number printed on the face. At the time of voting the ballot paper shall be marked on both sides with an official mark and delivered to the voter within the polling station, and the number of such voter on the register of voters shall be marked on the counterfoil, and the voter having secretly marked his or her vote on the paper, and folded up the paper so as to conceal his or her vote, shall place it in a closed box in the presence of the officer presiding at the polling station after having shown to him the official mark at the back.

Any ballot paper which has not on its back the official mark, or on which a vote is given to more than one candidate, or on which anything except the said number on the back is written or marked, by which the voter can be identified, shall be void and not counted.

After the close of the poll the ballot boxes shall be sealed so as to prevent the introduction of additional ballot papers and shall be taken charge of by the returning officer, who, shall, in the presence of such agents (if any) of the candidates as may be in attendance,

open the ballot boxes and ascertain the result of the poll by counting the votes given to each candidate, and shall forthwith declare to be elected the candidate to whom the majority of the votes have been given.

The decision of the returning officer as to any question arising in respect of any ballot paper shall be final, subject to reversal on petition questioning the election or return.

petition questioning the election or return. XXI. Whenever there is an equality of votes between candidates at any election of a Member of the Council, and the addition of a vote would entitle any of such candidates to be declared elected, the returning officer, if he is a registered elector of the electoral district for which the election is held, may give such additional vote, but the returning officer shall not, in any other case, be entitled to vote at an election for which he is the returning officer.

XXII. A petition complaining of an undue return or undue election of a Member of the Council, in this Order called an election petition, may be presented to the Supreme Court by any one or more of the following persons, that is to say,—(1) some person who voted or had a right to vote at the election to which the petition relates, (2) some person claiming to have had a right to be returned at such election, (3) some person alleging himself to have been a candidate at such election.

XXIII. Every election petition shall be tried before the Supreme Court in the same manner as a suit commenced by a writ of summons. At the conclusion of the trial, the Chief Justice shall determine whether the Member of Council whose return or election is complained of or any and what other person was duly returned or elected, or whether the election was void, and shall certify such determination to the Governor, and, upon such certificate being given, such determination shall be final; and the return shall be confirmed or altered, or a writ for a new election shall be issued as the case may require, in accordance with such determination.

XXIV. At the trial of an election petition the Chief Justice shall, subject to the provisions of this Order or of any Proclamation to be made by the Governor, have the same powers, jurisdiction, and authority, and witnesses shall be subpensed and sworn in the same manner, as nearly as circumstances will admit, as in a trial of a civil action in the Supreme Court, and shall be subject to the

same penalties for perjury.

XXV. Subject to the provisions of this Order, the election of Members of the Council shall be held and the registration of voters for the election of such members shall be effected at such times, in such places, and in such manner and form, and by such officers, and with such provisions for ascertaining the qualifications of voters and candidates, and all questions and disputes arising with regard to any such matters shall be determined by such tribunals and in such manner, as may from time to time be ordained by any law or laws enacted by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council, and in the meantime, and until provision has been made for the purposes aforesaid by the enactment of any such Law or Laws as aforesaid, as shall be directed by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be issued by the Governor and pub-

lished in the Saint Vincent Government Gazette. Every Proclamation made in pursuance of this clause shall from the publication thereof have the same force and effect as if it had been a Law enacted by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council as aforesaid.

XXVI. The following persons shall be deemed guilty of bribery within the meaning of this Order:—

(1) Every person who, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, gives, lends, or agrees to give or lend, or offers, promises, or promises to procure or to endeavour to procure, any money or valuable consideration to or for any voter, or to or for any person on behalf of any voter, or to or for any other person in order to induce any voter to vote or refrain from voting or corruptly does any such act as aforesaid on account of such voter having voted or refrained from voting at any election.

(2) Every person who, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, gives or procures, or agrees to give or procure, or offers, promises, or promises to procure or to endeavour to procure, any office, place, or employment to or for any voter, or to or for any person on behalf of any voter, or to or for any other person in order to induce such voter to vote or refrain from voting, or corruptly does any such act as aforesaid on account of any voter having voted or refrained from voting at any election.

(3) Every person who, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, makes any such gift, loan, offer, promise, procurement, or agreement as aforesaid to or for any person in order to induce such person to procure, or endeavour to procure, the return of any person as an elected Member of the Council, or the vote

of any voter at any election.

(4) Every person who, upon or in consequence of any such gift, loan, offer, promise, procurement, or agreement, procures or engages, promises or endeavours to procure the return of any person as an elected Member of the Council, or the vote of any

voter at any election.

(5) Every person who advances or pays, or causes to be paid, any money to or to the use of any other person, with the intent that such money, or any part thereof, shall be expended in bribery at any election, or who knowingly pays or causes to be paid, any money to any person in discharge or repayment of any money wholly or in part expended in bribery at any election.

(6) Every voter who, before or during any election, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person in his behalf, receives, agrees, or contracts for any money, gift, loan, or valuable consideration, office, place, or employment for himself or for any other person, for voting or agreeing to vote, or for refraining or agreeing to refrain from voting at any election.

(7) Every person who, after any election. directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, receives any money or valuable consideration on account of any person having voted or refrained from

voting, or having induced any other person to vote or refrain from voting at any election.

(8) Every person who, directly or indirectly, corruptly pays any rate or tax on behalf of any other person for the purpose of enabling him to be registered as a voter in order thereby, to influence his vote at any future election, and every person on whose behalf, and with whose privity, any such payment as last aforesaid is made.

XXVII. The following persons shall be deemed guilty of treating within the meaning

- (1) Every person who corruptly, by himself or by any other person, either before, during, or after an election, directly or indirectly, gives or provides or pays wholly or in part the expense of giving or providing any food, drink, entertainment, or provision to or for any person for the purpose of corruptly influencing that person, or any other person, to vote or to refrain from voting, at such election, or on account of such person or any other person having voted or refrained from voting at such election.
- (2) Every voter who corruptly accepts or takes any such food, drink, entertainment, or provision.

XXVIII. Every person who, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, makes use of or threatens to make use of, any force, violence, or restraint, or inflicts or threatens to inflict, by himself or by any other person, any temporal or spiritual injury, damage, harm, or loss upon or against any person, in order to induce or compel such person to vote or refrain from voting or on account of such person having voted or refrained from voting at any election, or who by abduction, duress, or any fraudulent contrivance, impedes or prevents the free exercise of the franchise of any voter, or thereby compels, induces or prevails upon any voter either to give or refrain from giving his vote at any election, shall be guilty of undue influence within the meaning of this Order.

XXIX. Every person who at an election applies for a ballot paper in the name of another person, whether that name be the name of a person living or dead, or of a fictitious person, or who, having voted once at any election, applies at the same election for a ballot paper in his own name, shall be guilty of personation within the meaning of this Order.

XXX. Every person who is guilty of bribery, treating, or undue influence, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding one year, or to be fined any sum not exceeding two hundred pounds.

XXXI. Every person who is guilty of personation, or of aiding, abetting, counselling, or procuring the commission of the offence of personation, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years.

XXXII. Every person who is convicted of bribery, treating, undue influence, or personation, or of aiding, counselling, or procuring the commission of the offence of personation, shall (in addition to any other punishment) be incapable during a period of seven years from the date of conviction-

(1) Of being registered as a voter, or voting at any election of a Member of the

Council.

(2) Of being elected a member of the Council, or, if elected before his conviction, of retaining his seat as such member.

XXXIII. Every person who—
(1) Votes, or induces or procures any person to vote, at any election, knowing that he or such other person is prohibited by this Order, or by any law, from voting at such election;

(2) Before or during an election knowingly publishes a false statement of the withdrawal of a candidate at such election for the purpose of promoting or procuring the

election of another candidate;

shall be guilty of an illegal practice, and shall, on summery conviction thereof, be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, and be incapable, during a period of five years from the date of conviction, of being registered as a voter, or voting at any election of a Member of the Council.

XXXIV. Every person who-

(1) Forges or counterfeits, or fraudulently defaces or destroys, any ballot paper or the

official mark on any ballot paper; or
(2) Without due authority supplies a

ballot paper to any person; or
(3) Fraudulently puts into any ballot box any paper other than the ballot paper which he is authorised by law to put in; or

(4) Fraudulently takes out of the polling

station any ballot paper; or

(5) Without due authority destroys, takes, opens, or otherwise interferes with any ballot box or packet of ballot papers then in use for the purposes of any election; or

(6) Not being duly registered as a voter, votes at the election of a Member of the

Council;

shall be guilty of misdemeanour, and be liable, if he is a returning officer or presiding officer, or clerk employed at a polling station, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding two hundred pounds, and, if he is any other person, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding fifty

Any attempt to commit any offence specified in this clause shall be punishable in the manner in which the offence itself is punishable.

In any information or prosecution for an offence in relation to the ballot boxes, ballot papers, and other things in use at an election, the property in such ballot boxes, ballot papers, or things may be stated to be in the returning officer at such election.

XXXV. Every officer, clerk and agent, in attendance at a polling station shall maintain and aid in maintaining the secrecy of the voting in such station, and shall not communicate, except for some purpose authorised by law, before the poll is closed, to any person any information as to the name or number on the register of voters of any voter who has or has not applied for a ballot paper or voted at that station, and no person shall interfere with or attempt to interfere with a voter when marking his vote, or otherwise attempt to obtain in the polling station any information as to the candidate for whom any voter in such station is about to vote or has voted, or as to the number on the back of the ballot paper given to any voter at such station.

Every officer, clerk and agent in attendance at the counting of the votes shall maintain and aid in maintaining the secrecy of the voting and shall not attempt to ascertain at such counting the number on the back of any ballot paper or communicate any information obtained at such counting as to the candidate for whom any vote is given in any particular ballot paper. No person shall, directly or indirectly, induce any voter to display his ballot paper after he has marked it so as to make known to any person the name of the candidate for whom or against whose name he has so marked his vote.

Every person who acts in contravention of the provisions of this clause shall be liable, on summary conviction before a Magistrate, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

XXXVI. In the preceding clauses twentysix to thirty-five words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

XXXVII. It shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, to make laws for the peace, order and good government of Saint Vincent.

XXXVIII. Subject to the provisions of this Order the Council shall, in the transaction of business and passing of laws, conform as nearly as may be to the directions as to the transaction of business and passing of laws by the Council from time to time conveyed to the Governor in Instructions under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, but no law enacted by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, shall be invalid by reason that in the enactment thereof any such Instructions were not duly observed.

XXXIX. Subject to the provisions of this Order and such Instructions as aforesaid, the Council may from time to time make Standing Rules and Orders for the regulation of its own proceedings.

And until any such Rules and Orders shall be made, and subject to any Rules and Orders to be so made the Standing Rules and Orders of the Legislative Council of Saint Vincent at present in force, shall remain in force and apply, so far as the same are applicable thereto, to the Council established by this Order.

XL. The Governor, if present, or, in his absence, any Member of the Council appointed by him in writing, or in default of such appointment, or in the absence of the member so appointed, the member present who stands first in order of precedence, shall preside at every meeting of the Council.

XLI. All questions proposed for decision in the Council shall be determined by a majority of the votes of the members present, and the Governor or other presiding member shall have an original vote on all such questions, and also a casting vote if the votes shall be equally divided.

XLII. The Council shall not be disqualified for the transaction of business by reason of any

vacancy or vacancies among the ex officio, Nominated, or Elected Members.

XLIII. Until otherwise provided by the Council, no business except that of adjournment shall be transacted unless there shall be present four members besides the Governor or presiding member.

XLIV. It shall be competent for any Member of the Council to propose any question for debate therein: and such question, if seconded by any other Member, shall be debated and disposed of according to the Standing Rules and Orders: Provided always, that no Ordinance, vote, resolution, or question, the object or effect of which may be to dispose of or charge any part of His Majesty's revenue arising within Saint Vincent, or to revoke, alter, or vary any such disposition or charge, shall be proposed, except by the Governor or with his consent: And provided further, that no vote, resolution or question, the object or effect of which may be to suspend the Standing Orders of the Council, shall be proposed except by the Governor or with his consent.

XLV. The sessions of the Council shall be held at such times and places as the Governor shall from time to time by Proclamation appoint. There shall be at least one session of the Council in every year, and there shall not be an interval of twelve months between the last sitting in one session and the first sitting in the next session.

XLVI. The Governor may at any time, by Proclamation, prorogue or dissolve the Council.

XLVII. The Governor shall dissolve the Council at the expiration of three years from the date of the return of the first writs at the last preceding general election, if it shall not have been sooner dissolved.

XLVIII. A general election shall be held at such time, within two months after every dissolution of the Council, as the Governor shall by Proclamation appoint.

XLIX. His Majesty doth hereby reserve to Himself, His heirs and successors, full power and authority from time to time to revoke, alter or amend this Order as to Him or them shall seem fit; and nothing herein contained shall affect His or their undoubted right, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, to make from time to time all such laws as may to Him or them appear necessary for the peace, order, and good government of Saint Vincent.

L. This Order shall come into operation on a date to be fixed by the Governor by Proclamation in the Saint Vincent Government Gazette, and shall be published in such Gazette; and from such date so fixed as aforesaid the Order in Council dated the fifth day of March, 1885, declaring the constitution of the Legislative Council for the Island of Saint Vincent and its Dependencies shall be and the same is hereby revoked, but without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder.

And the Right Honourable James Henry Thomas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland bearing date at Westminster the Seventeenth day of March 1885, Her Majesty Queen Victoria did constitute the office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, Tobago, and Saint Lucia, and the Dependencies thereof (which said Islands and their Dependencies are therein referred to as the Windward Islands), and did amongst other things provide for the establishment of a Legislative Council in each of the said Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, Tobago and Saint Lucia, and did further reserve to Herself, Her heirs and successors, Her and their undoubted right with the advice of Her or their Privy Council, from time to time to make all such laws as might appear necessary for the peace, order and good Government of any of the said Islands:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty in Council dated the Seventeenth day of November 1888 the Colony of Tobago was united into the Colony of Trinidad:

And whereas it hath seemed fit to His Majesty to make further and other provision for the Government of the Windward Islands now comprising the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, and Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies, and with that object His Majesty in Council hath, by an Order in Council of even date herewith, approved the Draft of Letters Patent revoking the said Letters Patent of the 17th day of March 1885, and constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Windward Islands, comprising the Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies, and amongst other things making fresh provision for the establishment of a Legislative Council in and for the Island of Saint Lucia to be constituted in such manner and having such powers as are directed by Order of His Majesty in Council, and hath ordered that the Right Honourable James Henry Thomas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do cause a Warrant to be prepared for His Majesty's Royal Signature, for passing under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom Letters Patent conformable to the said draft:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of all the powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

I. This Order may be cited as the Saint Lucia (Legislative Council) Order in Council, 1924.

II. In this Order "His Majesty" includes His Majesty's heirs and successors; "Secretary of State" means one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; "Governor" means the Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the time being of the Windward Islands and includes every person for the time being administering the Government of the Windward Islands; "the Island" and "Saint

Lucia "mean the Island of Saint Lucia and its Dependencies; "the Council" means the Legislative Council in and for the Island of Saint Lucia and its Dependencies, which Council shall be known as the Legislative Council of Saint Lucia.

III. There shall be in and for Saint Lucia a Legislative Council, constituted as hereinafter mentioned.

IV. The Council shall consist of the Governor, of six ex officio Members, of three Nominated Members and of three Elected Members.

The ex officio Members shall be the persons for the time being lawfully discharging the functions of the respective offices of Colonial Secretary, of Attorney-General, of Treasurer, and of such other offices not exceeding three in number at any one time as may from time to time be designated by His Majesty by an Order in His Privy Council, or through a Secretary of State.

The Nominated Members shall be such persons not holding any office in the public service of the Island, and not exceeding three in number at any one time, as His Majesty may from time to time appoint by any Instruction or Warrant under His Sign Manual and Signet, or as the Governor in pursuance of Instructions from His Majesty through a Secretary of State may from time to time appoint under the Public Seal of the Island.

The Elected Members shall be persons to be

elected as hereinafter provided.

V. The ex officio Members of the Council shall take precedence of the other members, and shall rank amongst themselves in the order in which their offices are herein-before named, or as may be otherwise prescribed by His Majesty or through a Secretary of State. Until the first dissolution of the Council, the other members shall rank among themselves in the order of date of their appointment or election, and two or more members appointed or elected on the same day shall rank in the alphabetical order of their names. Thereafter the Nominated Members shall rank after the ex officio Members in the order of the date of their appointment and in the case of any two or more of them appointed on the same day in the alphabetical order of their names: and the Elected Members shall rank after the Nominated Members, and among themselves in the order of date of their election, and in the case of any two or more of them being elected on the same day according to the number of votes obtained by each, and in the case of any two or more of them receiving the same number of votes, in the alphabetical order of their names.

VI. No person shall be capable of being elected a Member of the Council, or, having been elected, shall sit or vote in the Council, who—

(1) Is the holder of any office of emolument under the Crown, or under a Municipal Corporation within the Island; or,

(2) Is a minister of religion; or

(3) Is the returning officer of the district for which the election is held; or,

(4) Is not a male person; or,

(5) Is not entitled to vote at the election of a Member of the Council for some electoral district.

The term "Minister of Religion" in this clause and in clause VIII means any clergyman, minister, priest, or other person who exercises spiritual functions or performs the offices of religion for or in respect to any Christian or other church, community, or body within Saint Lucia.

The term "office of emolument" in this clause does not include a pension or other allowance to an officer who has ceased to be in the service of the Crown or of a Municipal Cor-

poration.

No person shall be capable of being elected a Member of the Council for any electoral district, or having been elected shall sit or vote in the Council, unless he possesses a clear annual income of £200, and either has resided in that electoral district for twelve months immediately preceding the day of election, or is the owner of real property situate in that electoral district of the value of at least £500 above all charges and encumbrances affecting the same.

VII. Every person who, having been returned as an Elected Member of the Council, but not having been at the time of his election qualified to be an Elected Member, shall sit or vote in the Council, shall for every day on which he sits or votes, and every person who shall sit or vote in the Council after his seat has become vacant shall for every day on which he sits or votes after his seat has become vacant, be liable to a penalty of £20 to be recovered by action in the Royal Court of Saint Lucia by any person who shall sue for the same.

VIII. If any Elected Member of the Council shall, by writing under his hand, addressed to the Governor, resign his seat in the Council, or shall cease to possess an income or property qualification as required by Clause VI of this Order, or shall, without leave of the Governor previously obtained, be absent from the sittings of the Council for three months, or shall make any declaration or acknowledgment of allegiance to any Foreign State or Power, or shall become a citizen or subject of any Foreign State or Power, or shall be adjudicated a bankrupt, or shall be sentenced in any part of His Majesty's Dominions to death, penal servitude, or imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve months, or shall have any direct or indirect pecuniary interest in any contract with the Government of Saint Lucia for or on account of the Public Service otherwise than as a member and in common with the other members of an incorporated company consisting of more than twenty-five persons, or shall accept any office or emolument under the Crown or under a Municipal Corporation within Saint Lucia, or shall become a minister of religion, his seat in the Council shall thereupon become vacant.

Whenever it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the Governor that the seat of an Elected Member has become vacant, the Governor shall, as soon as possible issue a writ for the election of a new member in the place of the member whose seat has become vacant, but if any question shall arise as to the fact of such vacancy, it shall be referred to and decided by the Royal Court of Saint Lucia.

IX. The Nominated Members of the Council shall hold their seats until the next dissolution of the Council after their appointment, unless previously removed by His Majesty by virtue

of an Instruction or Warrant under His Sign Manual and Signet or through a Secretary of State or suspended by the Governor under the power for that purpose hereby vested in him, or unless they shall previously resign their seats. The Nominated Members may again be appointed in the same manner as aforesaid to the next Council after a dissolution or to any subsequent Council.

X. If any Nominated Member of the Council shall, without the leave of the Governor previously obtained, be absent from the sittings of the Council for three months, or shall make any declaration or acknowledgment of allegiance to any Foreign State or Power, or shall become a citizen or subject of any Foreign State or Power, or shall be adjudicated a bankrupt, or shall be sentenced in any part of His Majesty's Dominions to death or penal servitude, or to imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve months, or shall have any direct or indirect pecuniary interest in any contract with the Government of Saint Lucia for or on account of the Public Service otherwise than as a member and in common with the other members of an incorporated company consisting of more than twenty-five persons, his seat in the Council shall thereupon become vacant.

XI. The Governor may, by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island suspend any Nominated Member from the exercise of his functions as a Member of the Council. Every such suspension shall be forthwith reported by the Governor to His Majesty through a Secretary of State, and shall remain in force unless and until either it shall be removed by the Governor by an instrument under the said Seal or it shall be disallowed by His Majesty through a Secretary of State, and such disallowance shall be published in the Saint Lucia Gazette.

XII.—1. Whenever any person sitting as an ex officio Member of the Council shall be administering the Government of the Island, or whenever any person shall be lawfully discharging the functions of more than one of the offices the holders of which are ex officio Members of the Council, the Governor may by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, appoint some other person holding office in the public service of the Island to be provisionally a Member of the Council during the period of such administration, or for so long as the functions of the said offices continue to be discharged by one person as aforesaid, as the case may be. Any persons so appointed shall have precedence next after the ex officio members and amongst themselves according to the date of their appointment to be provisionally Members of the Council.

2. Whenever any Nominated Member shall, by writing under his hand, resign his seat in the Council, or shall die or be suspended from the exercise of his functions as a Member of the Council, or be declared by the Governor by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island to be incapable of exercising his functions as a Member of the Council, or be temporarily absent from Saint Lucia, or shall by reason of his being appointed either permanently or temporarily to an office in the public service of the Island become disqualified to sit as a Nominated Member, the Governor may, by an instrument under the Public Seal of the

Island, appoint some person not holding any office in the Public Service of the Island to be provisionally a Nominated Member of the Council in the place of the Member so resigning or dying, or being suspended or declared incapable, or temporarily absent, or becoming either permanently or temporarily the holder of an office in the Public Service of the Island.

3. Every such provisional appointment may be disallowed by His Majesty through a Secretary of State, or may be revoked by the Governor by any such instrument as aforesaid.

XIII. The Governor shall without delay report for His Majesty's approval or disallowance, through a Secretary of State, every provisional appointment of any person as a Nominated Member of the Council.

XIV. Every person provisionally appointed as herein-before provided shall be to all intents and purposes a Member of the Council until his appointment shall be disallowed or revoked, or superseded by the permanent appointment of a Nominated Member of the Council, or until the person in whose place he has been appointed, shall cease to administer the Government of the Island or shall cease to discharge the functions of more than one of the offices the holders of which are ex officio Members of the Council, or shall be relieved from suspension or declared by the Governor by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Island to be capable of exercising the functions of a Member of the Council, or shall return to Saint Lucia, or shall cease to be disqualified as aforesaid, as the case may be.

XV. No Member of the Council shall sit or vote therein until he shall have taken and subscribed the following oath before the Governor, or some person authorized by the Governor to administer such oath:—

"I, A.B., do sincerely promise and swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King George the Fifth, His heirs and successors according to law.

" So help me God."

Provided that every person authorized by law to make an affirmation instead of taking an cath may make such affirmation instead of the said oath.

XVI. For the purpose of the election of Members of the Council, Saint Lucia shall be divided into three electoral districts to be defined by order of the Governor in Executive Council.

One member shall be elected for each of the said electoral districts.

XVII. Every person shall be entitled to be registered as a voter for any one electoral district, and, when registered, to vote at the election of a Member of the Council for such district, who is qualified as follows, that is to say:—

(1) Being a man, has attained the age of twenty-one years, or, being a woman, has attained the age of thirty years.

(2) Is under no legal incapacity.

(3) Is a British subject.
(4) Has resided in Saint Lucia for two years at least previous to the date of registration, or is domiciled in Saint Lucia and is resident therein at the date of such registration, and, in either case, possesses some one of the following qualifications:—

(a) has a net income of at least thirty pounds per annum;

(b) is the owner of real property within Saint Lucia of the value of at least one hundred and fifty pounds above all charges and encumbrances affecting the same;

(c) is paying rent in respect of real property situate within Saint Lucia at the rate of at least twelve pounds per annum:

Provided-

(1) That no person shall be registered as a voter or be entitled to vote for the election of a Member of the Council who has been convicted of perjury in any Court in His Majesty's Dominions, or who has been sentenced by any such Court to death, or penal servitude, or imprisonment with hard labour or for a term exceeding twelve months, and has not either suffered the punishment to which he was sentenced or such other punishment as by competent authority may have been substituted for the same or received a free pardon from His Majesty.

(2) That no person shall be registered as a voter in any year who has within twelve calendar months immediately preceding the 1st day of January in that year received any relief from public or parochial funds.

(3) That no person shall be registered as a voter unless he shall with his own hand have subscribed his name to his claim to be registered, and written thereon the date of such subscription.

XVIII. As soon as possible after the coming into operation of this Order a register shall be made in each of the said electoral districts of the persons entitled to vote at the election of Members of the Council, and shall come into force at such time as shall be appointed by the Governor by Proclamation to be published in the Saint Lucia Gazette. Thereafter a fresh register shall be made triennially in each such district and every such register shall come into force at such time as shall be appointed by any law enacted by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Council.

No person who is not registered as a voter shall vote at any such election.

XIX. For the purpose of every general election of Members of the Council, and for the purpose of the election of members to supply vacancies caused by death, resignation, or otherwise, the Governor shall issue writs of election under the Public Seal of the Island, addressed to the returning officers of the respective electoral districts for which members are to be returned. Every such writ shall specify the day and place of election, and the day on which it is returnable to the Governor; upon receipt of such writ the returning officer shall proceed to hold the election thereby directed; and after such election he shall certify the return of the member elected by endorsement on the writ, and shall return the writ so endorsed to the Governor within the time for that purpose specified therein. shall, also, as soon as possible, give public notice of the candidate elected, and in the case of a contested election of the number of votes given for each candidate whether elected or not.

XX. In the case of a poll at an election of a Member of the Council the votes shall be

given by ballot. The ballot of each voter shall consist of a paper (in this Order called a ballot paper) showing the names and description of Each ballot paper shall have the candidates. a number printed on the back, and shall have attached to it a counterfoil with the same number printed on the face. At the time of voting the ballot paper shall be marked on both sides with an official mark and delivered to the voter within the polling station, and the number of such voter on the register of voters shall be marked on the counterfoil, and the voter having secretly marked his or her vote on the paper, and folded up the paper so as to conceal his or her vote, shall place it in a closed box in the presence of the officer presiding at the polling station after having shown to him the official mark at the back.

Any ballot paper which has not on its back the official mark, or on which a vote is given to more than one candidate, or on which anything except the said number on the back is written or marked, by which the voter can be identified, shall be void and not counted.

After the close of the poll the ballot boxes shall be sealed so as to prevent the introduction of additional ballot papers and shall be taken charge of by the returning officer, who shall, in the presence of such agents (if any) of the candidates as may be in attendance, open the ballot boxes and ascertain the result of the poll by counting the votes given to each candidate, and shall forthwith declare to be elected the candidate to whom the majority of the votes have been given.

The decision of the returning officer as to any question arising in respect of any ballot paper shall be final, subject to reversal on petition questioning the election or return.

XXI. Whenever there is an equality of votes between candidates at any election of a Member of the Council, and the addition of a vote would entitle any of such candidates to be declared elected, the returning officer, if he is a registered elector of the electoral district for which the election is held, may give such additional vote, but the returning officer shall not, in any other case, be entitled to vote at an election for which he is the returning officer.

XXII. A petition complaining of an undue return or undue election of a Member of the Council, in this Order called an election petition, may be presented to the Royal Court of Saint Lucia by any one or more of the following persons, that is to say,—(1) some person who voted or had a right to vote at the election to which the petition relates, (2) some person claiming to have had a right to be returned at such election, (3) some person alleging himself to have been a candidate at such election.

XXIII. Every election petition shall be tried before the Royal Court in the same manner as an action instituted by a writ or summons. At the conclusion of the trial, the Chief Justice shall determine whether the Member of Council whose return or election is complained of or any and what other person was duly returned or elected, or whether the election was void, and shall certify such determination to the Governor, and, upon such certificate being given, such determination shall be final; and the return shall be confirmed or altered, or a writ for a new election shall be issued as the case may require, in accordance with such determination.

XXIV. At the trial of an election petition the Chief Justice shall, subject to the provisions of this Order or of any Proclamation to be made by the Governor, have the same powers, jurisdiction, and authority, and witnesses shall be subpœnaed and sworn in the same manner, as nearly as circumstances will admit, as in a trial of a civil action in the Royal Court, and shall be subject to the same penalties for perjury.

XXV. Subject to the provisions of this Order, the election of Members of the Council shall be held and the registration of voters for the election of such members shall be effected at such times, in such places, and in such manner and form, and by such officers, and with such provisions for ascertaining the qualifica-tions of voters and candidates, and all questions and disputes arising with regard to any such matters shall be determined by such tribunals and in such manner, as may from time to time be ordained by any law or laws enacted by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council, and in the meantime, and until provision has been made for the purposes aforesaid by the enactment of any such law or laws as aforesaid, as shall be directed by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be issued by the Governor and published in the Saint Lucia Every Proclamation made in pur-Gazette. suance of this clause shall from the publication thereof have the same force and effect as if it had been a law enacted by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council

XXVI. The following persons shall be deemed guilty of bribery within the meaning of this Order:—

- (1) Every person who directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, gives, lends, or agrees to give or lend, or offers, promises, or promises to procure or to endeavour to procure, any money or valuable consideration to or for any voter, or to or for any person on behalf of any voter, or to or for any other person in order to induce any voter to vote or refrain from voting, or corruptly does any such act as aforesaid on account of such voter having voted or refrained from voting at any election.
- (2) Every person who directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, gives or procures, or agrees to give or procure, or offers, promises, or promises to procure or to endeavour to procure, any office, place, or employment to or for any voter, or to or for any person on behalf of any voter, or to or for any other person in order to induce such voter to vote or refrain from voting, or corruptly does any such act as aforesaid on account of any voter having voted or refrained from voting at any election.
- (3) Every person who directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, makes any such gift, loan, offer, promise, procurement, or agreement as aforesaid to or for any person in order to induce such person to procure, or endeavour to procure, the return of any person as an elected Member of the Council, or the vote of any voter at any election.
- (4) Every person who, upon or in consequence of any such gift, loan, offer, promise,

procurement, or agreement, procures or engages, promises or endeavours to procure the return of any person as an elected Member of the Council, or the vote of any voter at any election.

- (5) Every person who advances or pays, or causes to be paid, any money to or to the use of any other person, with the intent that such money, or any part thereof, shall be expended in bribery at any election, or who knowingly pays or causes to be paid, any money to any person in discharge or repayment of any money wholly or in part expended in bribery at any election.
- (6) Every voter who, before or during any election, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person in his behalf, receives, agrees, or contracts for any money, gift, loan, or valuable consideration, office, place, or employment for himself or for any other person, for voting or agreeing to vote, or for refraining or agreeing to refrain from voting at any election.
- (7) Every person who, after any election, directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, receives any money or valuable consideration on account of any person having voted or refrained from voting, or having induced any other person to vote or refrain from voting at any election.
- (8) Every person who directly or indirectly corruptly pays any rate or tax on behalf of any other person for the purpose of enabling him to be registered as a voter in order thereby to influence his vote at any future election, and every person on whose behalf, and with whose privity, any such payment as last aforesaid is made.

XXVII. The following persons shall be deemed guilty of treating within the meaning of this Order:—

- (1) Every person who corruptly, by himself or by any other person, either before, during, or after an election, directly or indirectly, gives or provides or pays wholly or in part the expense of giving or providing any food, drink, entertainment, or provision to or for any person for the purpose of corruptly influencing that person, or any other person, to vote or to refrain from voting, at such election, or on account of such person or any other person having voted or refrained from voting at such election.
- (2) Every voter who corruptly accepts or takes any such food, drink, entertainment, or provision.

XXVIII. Every person who directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, makes use of or threatens to make use of, any force, violence, or restraint, or inflicts or threatens to inflict, by himself or by any other person, any temporal or spiritual injury, damage, harm, or loss upon or against any person, in order to induce or compel such person to vote or refrain from voting or on account of such person having voted or refrained from voting at any election, or who by abduction, duress, or any fraudulent contrivance, impedes or prevents the free exercise of the franchise of any voter, or thereby compels, induces, or prevails upon any voter either to give or refrain from giving

his vote at any election, shall be guilty of undue influence within the meaning of this Order.

XXIX. Every person who at an election applies for a ballot paper in the name of another person, whether that name be the name of a person living or dead, or of a fictitious person, or who, having voted once at any election, applies at the same election for a ballot paper in his own name, shall be guilty of personation within the meaning of this Order.

XXX. Every person who is guilty of bribery, treating, or undue influence, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding one year, or to be fined any sum not exceeding two hundred pounds.

XXXI. Every person who is guilty of personation, or of aiding, abetting, counselling, or procuring the commission of the offence of personation, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years.

XXXII. Every person who is convicted of bribery, treating, undue influence, or personation, or of aiding, counselling, or procuring the commission of the offence of personation, shall (in addition to any other punishment) be incapable during a period of seven years from the date of conviction—

(1) Of being registered as a voter, or voting at any election of a Member of the Council;

(2) Of being elected a Member of the Council, or, if elected, before his conviction, of retaining his seat as such member.

XXXIII. Every person who-

- (1) Votes, or induces or procures any person to vote, at any election, knowing that he or such other person is prohibited by this Order, or by any law, from voting at such election;
- (2) Before or during an election knowingly publishes a false statement of the withdrawal of a candidate at such election for the purpose of promoting or procuring the election of another candidate;

shall be guilty of an illegal practice, and shall, on summary conviction thereof, be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, and be incapable, during a period of five years from the date of conviction, of being registered as a voter, or voting at any election of a Member of the Council.

XXXIV. Every person who-

(1) Forges or counterfeits, or fraudulently defaces or destroys, any ballot paper or the official mark on any ballot paper; or

(2) Without due authority supplies a

ballot paper to any person; or

(3) Fraudulently puts into any ballot box any paper other than the ballot paper which he is authorized by law to put in; or

he is authorized by law to put in; or
(4) Fraudulently takes out of the polling station any ballot paper; or

(5) Without due authority destroys, takes, opens, or otherwise interferes with any ballot box or packet of ballot papers then in use for the purposes of any election; or

(6) Not being duly registered as a voter, votes at the election of a Member of the Council;

shall be guilty of misdemeanour, and be liable, if he is a returning officer or presiding officer, or clerk employed at a polling station, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding two hundred pounds, and, if he is any other person, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

Any attempt to commit any offence specified in this clause shall be punishable in the manner in which the offence itself is punishable.

In any information or prosecution for an offence in relation to the ballot boxes, ballot papers, and other things in use at an election, the property in such ballot boxes, ballot papers, or things may be stated to be in the returning officer at such election.

XXXV. Every officer, clerk and agent, in attendance at a polling station, shall maintain and aid in maintaining the secrecy of the voting in such station, and shall not communicate, except for some purpose authorized by law, before the poll is closed, to any person any information as to the name or number on the register of voters of any voter who has or has not applied for a ballot paper or voted at that station, and no person shall interfere with or attempt to interfere with a voter when marking his vote, or otherwise attempt to obtain in the polling station any information as to the candidate for whom any voter in such station is about to vote or has voted, or as to the number on the back of the ballot paper given to any voter at such station.

Every officer, clerk and agent in attendance at the counting of the votes shall maintain and aid in maintaining the secrecy of the voting and shall not attempt to ascertain at such counting the number on the back of any ballot paper or communicate any information obtained at such counting as to the candidate for whom any vote is given in any particular ballot paper. No person shall, directly or indirectly, induce any voter to display his ballot paper after he has marked it so as to make known to any person the name of the candidate for whom or against whose name he has so marked his vote.

Every person who acts in contravention of the provisions of this clause shall be liable, on summary conviction before a Magistrate, to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour, or to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

XXXVI. In the preceding clauses twentysix to thirty-five words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

XXXVII. It shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, to make laws for the peace, crder and good government of Saint Lucia.

XXXVIII. Subject to the provisions of this Order the Council shall, in the transaction of business and passing of laws, conform as nearly as may be to the directions as to the transaction of business and passing of laws by the Council from time to time conveyed to the Governor in Instructions under His Majesty's Sign Manuel and Signet, but no law enacted by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, shall be invalid by

reason that in the enactment thereof any such Instructions were not duly observed.

XXXIX. Subject to the provisions of this Order and such Instructions as aforesaid, the Council may from time to time make Standing Rules and Orders for the regulation of its own proceedings.

And until any such Rules and Orders shall be made, and subject to any Rules and Orders to be so made, the Standing Rules and Orders of the Legislative Council of Saint Lucia at present in force, shall remain in force and apply, so far as the same are applicable thereto, to the Council constituted under this Order.

XL. The Governor, if present, or, in his absence, any Member of the Council appointed by him in writing, or in default of such appointment, or in the absence of the member so appointed, the member present who stands first in order of precedence, shall preside at every meeting of the Council.

XLI. All questions proposed for decision in the Council shall be determined by a majority of the votes of the members present, and the Governor or other presiding member shall have an original vote on all such questions, and also a casting vote if the votes shall be equally divided.

XLII. The Council shall not be disqualified for the transaction of business by reason of any vacancy or vacancies among the ex officio, Nominated, or Elected Members.

XLIII. Until otherwise provided by the Council, no business except that of adjournment shall be transacted unless there shall be present five members besides the Governor or presiding member.

XLIV. It shall be competent for any Member of the Council to propose any question for debate therein: and such question, if seconded by any other Member, shall be debated and disposed of according to the Standing Rules and Orders: Provided always, that no Ordinance, vote, resolution, or question, the object or effect of which may be to dispose of or charge any part of His Majesty's revenue arising within Saint Lucia, or to revoke, alter, or vary any such disposition or charge, shall be proposed, except by the Governor or with his consent: And provided further, that no vote, resolution or question, the object or effect of which may be to suspend the Standing Orders of the Council, shall be proposed except by the Governor or with his consent.

XLV. The sessions of the Council shall be held at such times and places as the Governor shall from time to time by Proclamation appoint. There shall be at least one session of the Council in every year, and there shall not be an interval of twelve months between the last sitting in one session and the first sitting in the next session.

XLVI. The Governor may at any time, by Proclamation, prorogue or dissolve the Council.

XLVII. The Governor shall dissolve the Council at the expiration of three years from the date of the return of the first writs at the last preceding general election, if it shall not have been sooner dissolved.

XLVIII. A general election shall be held at such time, within two months after every dissolution of the Council, as the Governor shall by Proclamation appoint.

XLIX. His Majesty doth hereby rescrive to Himself, His heirs and successors, full power

and authority from time to time to revoke alter or amend this Order as to Him or them shall seem fit; and nothing herein contained shall affect His or their undoubted right, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council, to make from time to time all such laws as may to Him or them appear necessary for the peace, order, and good government of Saint Lucia.

L. This Order shall come into operation on a date to be fixed by the Governor by Proclamation in the Saint Lucia Gazette, and shall be

published in such Gazette.

And the Right Honourable James Henry Thomas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

REGULATIONS FOR THE APPOINTMENT CHEMISTS, CLASS II, IN THE GOVERNMENT LABORATORY.

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. Candidates must have attained the age of 23 and must not exceed the age of 30 on a date to be fixed in respect of the competition in which they are to take part. Candidates born on the governing date would be admitted on the day they attained the age of 23, but not on the day on which they attained the age of 30.

2. A candidate must be a natural-born British subject and born of a father also a natural-born British subject; provided that exception may be made in the case of candidates serving in a civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, and provided that exception may be made as to the father in the case of candidates who have served in His Majesty's Armed Forces between 4th August,

1914, and 11th November, 1918.
3. Until further order preference will be given to candidates who have served in His Majesty's Forces between 4th August, 1914,

and 11th November, 1918.

FORMATION OF THE STEPNEY UNION.

Parishes of Limehouse, Saint George in the East, and Whitechapel, and Hamlet of MILE END OLD TOWN.

Whereas the Metropolitan Borough Stepney comprises the Parishes of Limehouse, Saint George in the East, and Whitechapel, and the Hamlet of Mile End Old Town, and the laws for the relief of the poor are administered by a separate board of guardians for each of the Parishes and for the Hamlet

aforesaid;

And whereas a representation having been made to the Minister of Health that the Parishes and the Hamlet aforesaid should be united for the administration of the laws for the relief of the poor, so as to form a union conterminous with the Metropolitan Borough of Stepney, the Minister directed a local inquiry to be held and a report has been made to the Minister on the inquiry:

Now, therefore, the Minister of Health, in pursuance of Section 26 of the Poor Law Amendment Act, 1834, and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, hereby Orders as follows:-

PART I.

SHORT TITLE, INTERPRETATION AND COMMENCEMENT.

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Stepney Union Order, 1925.
 2. In this Order, unless the context other-
- wise requires-

"Officers" includes servants;
Orders" means orders, rules and regulations issued by the Minister of Health, and his predecessors;
"The appointed day" means the 1st day

of April, 1925;
"The Borough" means the Metropolitan

Borough of Stepney;
"The existing Parishes" means the Parishes of Limehouse, Saint George in the East, and Whitechapel, and the Hamlet of Mile End Old Town;
"The new Union" means the Stepney

Union formed by this Order.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the 1st day of April, 1925:

Provided that this Order shall operate as

from such day earlier than that day as may be necessary for the following purposes, viz.:-

- (1) the proceedings relating to the election of guardians directed by this Order;
- (2) the proceedings preliminary to the first meeting of the guardians of the new Union and to the transaction of the business to be performed at that meeting; or
- B) the preparation of any precept or contribution order to be made on or after the 1st day of April, 1925.

PART II.

FORMATION OF THE NEW UNION AND CONSTITU-TION, &C., OF BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

- 4. On the appointed day-
- (1) The existing Parishes shall be united for the administration of the laws for the relief of the poor, and shall form a union to be called the Stepney Union;
- (2) The new Union shall form part of the Metropolitan Asylum District, and shall be represented on the board of management of that District by four elective members.
- 5.—(1) The number of elective guardians of the new union shall be forty, of whom twentytwo shall represent the Parishes of Limehouse and Whitechapel, as united by this Order for the purposes of the election of guardians, six shall represent the Parish of Saint George in the East, and twelve shall represent the Hamlet of Mile End Old Town.
- (2) For the purposes of the election of guardians-
 - (a) The Parishes of Limehouse and Whitechapel shall be united;
 - (b) Those united parishes, the Parish of Saint George in the East and the Hamlet of Mile End Old Town shall be divided into wards, each of which shall be conterminous with and bear the same name as each of the wards into which the Borough is divided for the election of councillors of the Borough;

- (c) The number of guardians to be elected for each ward shall be that specified in column 2 of the Schedule to this Order opposite the name of the ward in column 1 of that Schedule.
- 6.—(1) An election of guardians of the new Union for each ward constituted by this Order shall be held before the appointed day, and, subject to the provisions of this Article, the election shall be conducted in accordance with the rules contained in the Guardians (London) Election Order, 1898, as amended by the Local Elections (Alteration of Rules) Order, 1919, applicable to an election to fill ordinary vacancies.
- (2) For the purposes of such election, the Town Clerk of the Borough, or in the event of his inability to act, such other person as the Mayor of the Borough may appoint, shall be the returning officer.
- (3) The day of election shall be Monday, the 16th day of March, 1925, and notice of the election shall be published not later than Friday, the 20th day of February, 1925, and Part a of the First Schedule to the Election Order of 1898 shall have effect accordingly.
- (4) The board rooms of the boards of guardians of the existing Parishes shall be deemed to be board rooms of the board of guardians of the new Union for the purposes of the Election Order of 1898.
- (5) For the purpose of the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1894, relating to the qualification of guardians, the new Union shall be deemed to have been formed on the 1st day of February, 1924.
- 7.—(1) The guardians of the new Union elected at the election directed by this Order shall come into office on the appointed day, and the persons in office as guardians for the existing Parishes shall retire from office on that day.
- (2) The guardians of the new Union shall retire from office on the 15th day of April in the year 1928, and in every third year thereafter.
- (3) Nothing in this Article shall affect the continuance in office of the guardians of any of the existing Parishes under and for the purposes of the Dissolved Boards of Management and Guardians Act, 1870, the Poor Law (Dissolution of School Districts and Adjustments) Act, 1903, and the Poor Law Authorities (Transfer of Property) Act, 1904.
- 8.—(1) The first meeting of the guardians of the new Union shall be held on such day in the month of April, 1925, and at such time and place, as may be fixed by the returning officer at the first election of those guardians.
- . (2) The returning officer at the first election of guardians of the new Union shall give at least three days' notice of the date, time and place of the first meeting of the guardians, and of the business to be transacted at that meeting, to each guardian elected at the first election of guardians.
- 9. Any district of any of the existing Parishes for the purpose of the relief of the poor or vaccination, as such district exists immediately before the appointed day, shall be a district of the new Union for the like purpose, until such district shall be altered in pursuance of any provision in that behalf.

PART III. Officers.

10. Notwithstanding anything in any Order which may be applied to the new Union, the clerks and the treasurers of the guardians of each of the existing Parishes shall, subject to Section 2 of the Dissolved Boards of Management and Guardians Act, 1870, cease to hold their offices on the day of the first meeting of the guardians of the new Union, and at that meeting the first business, after the election of a chairman, shall be the appointment of a clerk and a treasurer to the guardians of the new Union:

Provided that those guardians may, if they think fit, at their first meeting, appoint persons temporarily to either of such offices, for a period not exceeding six months after the appointed day, or for such extended period as may be allowed by the Minister of Health.

11.—(1) All officers of the guardians of any of the existing Parishes (not being officers to whom the preceding Article of this Order extends), who are in office immediately before the appointed day, shall, on the appointed day, be transferred to and become officers of

the guardians of the new Union.

- (2) Any officer transferred by this Article, who on or before the 1st day of October, 1925, shall have attained the age of fifty years, or shall have completed not less than twenty-five years service under any authority or authorities to whom the Poor Law Officers' Superannuation Act, 1896, applies, may, at any time during the period between the appointed day and the 1st day of October, 1925. relinquish his office.
- (3) The guardians of the new Union may, at any time during the period between the appointed day and the 1st day of April, 1926, determine that any officer transferred by this Article shall cease to hold his office.
- (4) Any officer transferred by this Article shall, until he relinquishes or otherwise ceases to hold his office under one of the foregoing provisions of this Article, be subject to any regulations applying to that office which may be in force within the new Union upon the appointed day, but, save as aforesaid, shall continue in his existing office upon the terms, conditions and scale of salary which, on the date of this Order, apply to that officer in respect of his office.
- 12.—(1) Where any officer, in office immediately before the appointed day, shall be deprived of any office, or shall suffer any direct pecuniary loss by reason of this Order, or by anything done in pursuance or in consequence of this Order, the Minister of Health may, if he sees fit, award such compensation as may, in his opinion, be equitable.
- (2) Any officer transferred by Article 11 of this Order, who shall relinquish his office under the power in that behalf contained in subdivision (2) of that Article, shall be deemed, for the purposes of this Article, to be deprived of that office.
- (3) Any compensation awarded under this Article shall be paid by such persons, out of such fund, and in such manner, as the Minister of Health may direct.
- 13.—(1) If, at the first meeting of the guardians of the new Union, it shall be found necessary, for the purpose of providing for the

relief of the poor, or the performance of vaccination, to fill any vacant office to which Article 11 of this Order extends, it shall be the duty of the guardians of the new Union, at that meeting, either to appoint a qualified person to that office, or to arrange for such an appointment at a future meeting of the guardians, and to make provision for the discharge of the duties of the office until an appointment is made by them.

Notwithstanding any order requiring notice by advertisement or otherwise before an appointment of an officer is made, the guardians of the new Union may, at their first meeting, make a fresh appointment of a qualified person to an office.

PART IV.

SUPPLEMENTARY PROVISIONS.

- 14. For the purpose of any adjustment which may become necessary in consequence of this Order, the provisions of the Poor Law (Dissolution of School Districts and Adjustments) Act, 1903, shall apply.
- 15.—(1) All orders issued under the authority of the Acts relating to the relief of the poor, or under the Vaccination Acts, 1867 to 1907, which immediately before the appointed day are in force in the existing Parish of Limehouse shall extend and apply to the new Union.
- (2) All orders in force immediately before the appointed day and applying to-
 - (a) any separate infirmary or separate school maintained by the guardians of any of the existing Parishes; or
 - (b) any separate institution in which poor persons are lodged and maintained by any such guardians as aforesaid, not being an institution to which the Poor Law Institutions Order, 1913, applies;

shall continue to apply to such infirmary, school or institution.

(3) Any order to which either of the foregoing sub-divisions of this Article applies shall have effect with the substitution for the guardians of any of the existing Parishes of the guardians of the new Union.

(4) Nothing in this Order shall affect any order in force, immediately before appointed day, in any of the existing Parishes, whereby provision is made for the remuneration by salary of a vaccination officer.

- 16. Every person, who, immediately before the appointed day, has acquired, or is in the course of acquiring, a status of irremovability from any of the existing Parishes, shall be deemed to have acquired, or to be in the course of acquiring, a status of irremovability from the new Union.
- 17. The accounts of the guardians of the existing Parishes, and of their officers, shall be made up to the day of the first meeting of the guardians of the new Union instead of to the 31st day of March, 1925, and shall be audited by the district auditor in like manner, and subject to the like incidents and consequences, as if this Order had not been made.
- 18. For the purpose of contributions to the common fund of the new Union, the assessable value of each of the existing Parishes shall be based on the valuation list of that Parish for the time being in force.

19. All precepts or contribution orders issued or made before the appointed day shall be as valid in law as if this Order had not been made.

20. Any contract for the performance of vaccination, made by the guardians of any of the existing Parishes, and in force immediately before the appointed day, shall have effect with the substitution for the guardians of the existing Parish of the guardians of the new Union.

21. Nothing in this Order shall restrict the powers of the Secretary of State or of the Minister of Health or of the London County Council under the Local Government Act, 1888, or the Local Government Act, 1894.

22. Nothing in this Order shall affect the term of office of the representatives of the existing Parishes on the board of management of the Metropolitan Asylum District, or the provisions of the Borough of Stepney (Adjustment) Scheme, 1902.

23. If any question, difference, or difficulty arises in relation to any matter dealt with in this Order, the Minister of Health may provide for the determination of the question or differ-

ence, or the removal of the difficulty.
