AMENDMENT OF NO. 41 OF THE STATUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY.

The Senate have this day adopted a Resolution for the amendment of No. 41 of the Statutes of the University, as follows:—

[*Note.*—The amendment consists in the omission from Clause (ii) of the following words:—

“ of three years' standing ” in line 1;
“ from the date of their first degree or ”
in line 2; and
“ a degree higher than that of Bachelor ”
in line 3;

and the insertion of the words:—

“ the age of 21 years ” after the word
“ attained ” in line 3.]

41. The persons who shall be entitled to be registered as members of Convocation shall be the following (that is to say):—

(i) The Graduates who on the day fixed for the coming into force of these Statutes are qualified according to the existing regulations of the University to become members of Convocation but have not yet been registered;

(ii) All other Graduates who shall have attained the age of 21 years provided always that if and whenever the Senate shall by any Statute create any new degree the holders thereof shall not unless Convocation so determine be entitled to be registered;

(iii) All members of the three Standing Committees of the Senate who are not already members of Convocation during their tenure of office.
