And whereas by Her late Majesty's Order in Council dated the 29th day of November, 1898, the payment of these allowances is authorized in the case of Pensioners admitted to other than Naval Hospitals or Infirmaries at the expense of Greenwich Hospital funds:

" And whereas we consider that the limita-

tion of the allowances of 3s., 4s., or 5s. a week or upwards to Pensioners having wives or

families involves hardship in some cases:

THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES LOANS (SCOTLAND) REGULATIONS, 1924, DATED 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1924, MADE BY THE SECRETARY FOR SCOTLAND UNDER SECTION 1 (1) OF THE LOCAL AUTHORI-TIES LOANS (SCOTLAND) ACT, 1924 (14 & 15 GEO. 5, c. 36).

In pursuance of Section 1 (1) of the Local Authorities Loans (Scotland) Act, 1924 (14 and 15 Geo. 5, c. 36), I, the Right Honourable William Adamson, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do hereby make the following regulations:—

1. It shall be lawful for any local authority in Scotland who shall, whether before or after the date of these Regulations, have issued stock under the Local Authorities Loans (Scotland) Acts, 1891 and 1893 (54 and 55 Vict., c. 34 and 56 Vict., c. 8), to create and issue stock of a different class from any stock already issued by such authority and so that some or all of the terms and conditions on which the same is issued, including the rate of dividend payable thereon and the period after which the same shall become redeemable, may not be the same as those of any stock previously created

A separate Stock (Dividends) Fund Account of the Consolidated Loans Fund established under Section 9 of the Local Authorities Loans (Scotland) Act, 1891, and a separate Stock (Redemption) Fund Account of the Consolidated Loans Fund shall be kept for every class of Stock, the accounts for each class of Stock being distinguished by number or otherwise.

2. The provisions of the Local-Authorities Loans (Scotland) Acts, 1891 and 1893, as modified by these Regulations shall extend and apply to stock issued in pursuance of these Regulations.

These Regulations may be cited as the Local Authorities Loans (Scotland) Regulations, 1924.

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to declare, and it is hereby declared—

- (a) that certain profits or gains arising from the business of shipping which are chargeable to British Income Tax are also chargeable to the Income Tax payable under the law in force in Norway; and
- (b) that the arrangements contained in the said agreement between His Majesty's Government and the Royal Norwegian Government have been made with a view to the granting of relief in cases where profits or gains arising from the business of shipping are chargeable both to British Income Tax and to the Income Tax payable in Norway.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that this Declaration may be cited as the Relief from Double Income Tax on Shipping Profits (Norway) Declaration, 1925.

SCHEDULE.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT AND THE ROYAL NORWEGIAN GOVERNMENT.

His Britannic Majesty's Government and the Royal Norwegian Government, being desirous of concluding an Agreement for the reciprocal exemption from income tax in certain cases of profits accruing from the business of shipping, have agreed as follows:—

Article 1.

His Britannic Majesty's Government agree to take the necessary steps under section 18 of the Act of Parliament of the United Kingdom, known as the Finance Act, 1923, for exempting from income tax (including super-tax) chargeable in Great Britain and Northern Ireland for the year of assessment 1923-24 commencing on the 6th day of April, 1923, and for every subsequent year of assessment, any profits which accrue from the business of shipping carried on by an individual resident in Norway or by a company managing and controlling such business in Norway.

Article 2.

The Royal Norwegian Government agree that the powers reserved to His Majesty the King of Norway by the provisions contained in paragraph 28 of the Norwegian Country Taxation Law and paragraph 23 of the Norwegian Town Taxation Law, or any like powers which may hereafter be conferred on His Majesty the King of Norway, shall not be exercised so as to render liable to income tax in Norway any profits which accrue from the business of shipping carried on by an individual resident in Great Britain or Northern Ireland or by a company managing and controlling such business in Great Britain or Northern Ireland.

Article 3.

The expression "the business of shipping" means the business carried on by an owner of ships, and for the purposes of this definition the expression "owner" includes any charterer.

Article 4.

This Agreement shall cease to have effect if and so soon as either the relief to be granted under article 1 hereof in respect of income tax in Great Britain and Northern Ireland cease to have legal effect or income tax in Norway is charged on the profits mentioned in article 2 hereof.

(a) that certain profits or gains arising from the business of shipping which are chargeable to British Income Tax are also chargeable to the Income Tax payable under the law in force in Sweden; and

(b) that the arrangements constituted by the said undertaking and declaration made by His Majesty's Government and the Royal Swedish Government have been made with a view to the granting of relief in cases where profits or gains arising from the business of shipping are chargeable both to British Income Tax and to the Income Tax payable in Sweden.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that this Declaration may be cited as the Relief from Double Income Tax on Shipping Profits (Sweden) Declaration, 1925.

Undertaking and Declaration by His Majesty's Government and the Royal Swedish Government.

His Britannic Majesty's Government and the Royal Swedish Government, being desirous of concluding an Agreement for the reciprocal exemption from income tax in certain cases of profits accruing from the business of shipping, have agreed as follows:—

Article 1.

In consideration of the declaration contained in article 2 hereof, His Britannic Majesty's Government undertake to take the necessary steps under section 18 of the Act of Parliament of the United Kingdom, known as the Finance Act, 1923, for exempting from income tax (including super-tax) chargeable in Great Britain and Northern Ireland for the year of assessment 1923-24 commencing on the 6th day of April, 1923, and every subsequent year of assessment, any profits which accrue from the business of shipping carried on by an individual resident in Sweden or by a company managing and controlling such business in Sweden.

Article 2.

The Government of His Majesty the King of Sweden hereby declare that, under the laws of Sweden relating to income and property tax ("inkomst- och förmögenhetsskatt") and to tax on immovable property and on income ("bevillning av fast egendom samt av inkomst"), tax is not chargeable on profits which accrue from the business of shipping carried on by an individual resident in Great Britain or Northern Ireland or by a company managing and controlling such business in Great Britain or Northern Ireland.

Article 3.

The expression "the business of shipping" means the business carried on by an owner of ships, and for the purposes of this definition the expression "owner" includes any charterer.

Article 4.

The arrangements made in accordance with article 1 shall cease to have effect if and so soon as the laws of Sweden cease to give the relief indicated in the declaration contained in article. 2.

(a) that any profits or gains arising from the business of shipping which are chargeable to British Income Tax are also chargeable to Income Tax payable under the law

in force in any foreign State; and

(b) that arrangements, as specified in the declaration, have been made with the Government of that foreign State with a view to the granting of relief in cases where such profits and gains are chargeable both to British Income Tax and to the Income Tax payable in the foreign State;

then, unless and until the declaration is revoked by His Majesty in Council, the arrangements specified therein shall, so far as they relate to the relief to be granted from British Income Tax, have effect as if enacted in that Act, but only if and so long as the arrangements, so far as they relate to the relief to be granted from the Income Tax payable in the foreign State, have the effect of law in the foreign State:

And whereas the agreement set out in the Schedule to this Declaration has been made between His Majesty's Government and the

Royal Danish Government:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to declare, and it is hereby declared—

(a) that certain profits or gains arising from the business of shipping which are chargeable to British Income Tax are also chargeable to the Income Tax payable under the law in force in Denmark; and

(b) that the arrangements contained in the said agreement between His Majesty's Government and the Royal Danish Government have been made with a view to the granting of relief in cases where profits or gains arising from the business of shipping are chargeable both to British Income Tax and to the Income Tax payable in Denmark.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that this Declaration may be cited as the Relief from Double Income Tax on Shipping Profits (Denmark) Declaration, 1925.

SCHEDULE.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT AND THE ROYAL DANISH GOVERNMENT.

His Britannic Majesty's Government and the Royal Danish Government, being desirous of concluding an agreement for the reciprocal exemption from income tax in certain cases of profits accruing from the business of shipping, have agreed as follows:—

Article 1.

The Government of His Britannic Majesty agree to take the necessary steps under Section 18 of the Act of Parliament of the United Kingdom known as the Finance Act, 1923, for exempting from income tax (including supertax) chargeable in Great Britain and Northern Ireland for the year of assessment 1923-24 commencing on the 6th day of April, 1923, and for every subsequent year of assessment, any profits which accrue from the business of shipping carried on by an individual resident in Denmark or by a company managing and controlling such business in Denmark.

Article 2.

The Royal Danish Government agree to take the necessary steps under article 50 of the laws of the Kingdom of Denmark No. 149 of the 10th April, 1922, for exempting from income tax chargeable in Denmark for the tax year 1923-24 commencing on the first day of April, 1923, and for every subsequent tax year, any profits which accrue from the business of shipping carried on by an individual resident in Great Britain or Northern Ireland or by a Company managing and controlling such business in Great Britain or Northern Ireland.

Article 3.

The expression "the business of shipping" means the business carried on by an owner of ships, and for the purposes of this definition the expression "owner" includes any charterer.

Article 4.

This agreement shall cease to have effect if and so soon as either the relief to be granted under Article 1 hereof in respect of income tax in Great Britain and Northern Ireland, or the relief to be granted under article 2 hereof in respect of income tax in Denmark, ceases to have legal operation.

In witness whereof the undersigned, duly authorised to that effect, have signed this agreement and have affixed thereto their seals.

(b) that arrangements have been made with the Government of any such possession whereby, in respect of any profits, only the duty which is higher in amount is to be payable, and the amount of such duty is to be apportioned between the respective Exchequers in proportion to the amount of duty which would otherwise have been payable in the United Kingdom, and in that possession respectively:

And whereas by virtue of the provisions of Article 2 of the Excess Profits Duty Ordinance, 1919 (Ordinance No. XXIV of 1919) of the Island of Malta, it was provided that there should be charged, levied and paid on the aggregate amount by which the profits (thereinafter called "excess profits") arising each year from any trade or business to which that Ordinance applied, in the period between the 4th day of August, 1914, and the 31st day of

July, 1919, exceeded, by more than one hundred pounds, the pre-war standard of profits as defined for the purposes of that Ordinance, a duty (in that Ordinance referred to as "excess profits duty") at the rates therein set forth:

And whereas by virtue of the provisions of Article 3 of the said Ordinance, it was further provided that a duty at the rates set forth in Article 2 of the said Ordinance should be charged, levied and paid on profits (thereinafter included under the name of "excess profits") arising from newly started trades or businesses during or within the period established in the said Article 2, provided that such rates be chargeable on profits made in excess of a margin of ten per cent. per annum on the capital:

· And whereas the Island of Malta is one of

His Majesty's possessions:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Finance Act, 1917, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered and declared that under the law in force in the Island of Malta excess profits duty was chargeable for the period between the 4th day of August, 1914, and the 31st day of July, 1919, in respect of profits in respect of which excess profits duty was also payable in Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and that arrangements have been made with the Government of the Island of Malta whereby in respect of any such profits only the duty which is higher in amount is to be payable and that the amount of such duty is to be apportioned between the respective Exchequers in proportion to the amount of duty which would otherwise have been payable in Great Britain and Northern Ireland or in the Island of Malta respectively

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, to make rules concerning

the Lights or Signals to be carried or used, and the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by His Majesty's vessels, and other vessels, navigating the waters of the Port and of the approaches thereto:

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act certain Regulations and Rules were made by Orders in Council dated the 30th day of March, 1914, and the 4th day of September, 1918, with reference to the Dockyard Port of Portland:

And whereas it appears expedient to amend and add to such Rules as hereinafter provided:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order shall take effect from one

calendar month from the date hereof.

2. The following Rule shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Port of Portland and shall be read and construed as though inserted in the Second Schedule of the said Order in Council, dated the 30th day of March, 1914, in the position indicated by the number prefixed thereto:—

12. When it is specially necessary to keep clear any of the channels between the breakwaters because a large number of His Majesty's Ships, or a very large vessel, or a Royal Yacht is entering or leaving the harbour, a red oblong flag with a white diagonal bar from the inner upper corner will be hoisted by day, or three red lights vertical by night at the flagstaff at "A" Head. By day, while this flag is flying on the Northern arm of the flagstaff at "A" Head of the North-eastern breakwater, no vessel shall enter the North Ship Channel, and while it is flying on the Southern arm no vessel shall enter the East Ship Channel, and while it is flying at the masthead no vessel shall enter either Channel. By night, while the three red vertical lights are showing at "A" Head no vessel shall enter either channel.

shall from the time mentioned in the Order be leviable throughout His Majesty's Dominions, and further that Colonial Light Dues shall not be levied in any British Possession unless the Legislature of that Possession has, by address to the Crown or by Act or Ordinance duly passed, signified its opinion that the Dues ought to be levied:

And whereas the Great Basses Lighthouse, the Little Basses Lighthouse, and the Minicoy Lighthouse are Lighthouses which have been duly erected under and pursuant to the said

Section:

And whereas by Orders in Council, dated respectively the 22nd day of May, 1883, the 9th day of May, 1892, the 29th day of June, 1896, the 10th day of August, 1903, the 21st day of October, 1912, and the 6th day of February, 1917, the Dues leviable in respect of the said Lighthouses for the Classes of Ships therein respectively mentioned were duly fixed:

And whereas by Order in Council, dated the 14th day of July, 1922, His Majesty directed that, as from the 1st day of October, 1922, or from the time of the receipt of notice of that Order, if that be later, by the Officers authorised to collect Light Dues, the Dues thenceforth to be levied should be as follows, that is to say, in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse, three-eighths of one penny per ton, and in respect of the Minicoy Lighthouse one-eighth of one penny per ton, of the burden of every ship on every voyage in which she passes or derives benefit from the said Lights respectively, subject in each case to a reduction of 25 per cent.:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the said Dues should be altered in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers so vested in Him by the above recited provisions, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth by this Order in Council order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Colonial Light Dues (Great and Little

Basses and Minicoy) Order, 1925."

2. As from the 1st day of April, 1925, or from the time of the receipt of this Order, if that be later, by the Officers authorised to collect Light Dues, the Dues thenceforth to be levied shall be as follows, that is to say, in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse, three-sixteenths of one penny per ton, and in respect of the Minicoy Lighthouse, one-sixteenth of one penny per ton of the burden of every ship on every voyage in which she passes or derives benefit from the said Lights respectively.

And whereas by Section 1 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, provision, as is more particularly therein mentioned, is made for applying to foreign ships when in ports in the United Kingdom certain sections of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, which relate to loadline, without prejudice to any direction of His Majesty in Council given under the said Section 445 of the last-mentioned Act:

And whereas the Board of Trade have certified that certain statutory regulations which have been approved by the Danish Government relating to overloading, so far as regards the assignment of loadlines to Danish ships are equally effective with the corresponding regulations in force in this country respecting the assignment of loadlines to British merchant ships:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council doth direct that on proof that Danish ships have complied with the aforesaid Danish regulations, such ships shall not, when in ports of the United Kingdom, be liable to detention for non-compliance with the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts relating to overloading, nor shall there arise any liability to any fine or penalty which would otherwise arise for non-compliance with those provisions.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers conferred by the Foreign Marriage Act, 1892, or otherwise enabling Him in this behalf is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The following Articles are respectively substituted for Articles 9 and 10 of "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1913" (S.R. & O. 1913, No. 1270):—

- 9. If the non-resident party has dwelt in a place in Great Britain or Northern Ireland, notice shall be given by that party in like manner and on payment of the like fee as if that party were about to be married in that place, and in England, Wales or Northern Ireland shall be given to the Superintendent Registrar or Registrar, and in Scotland shall be given by proclamation of banns; and the Superintendent Registrar or Registrar shall deal with the notice and give a certificate for marriage in like manner and on payment of the like fee as in the case of a marriage in his district; and the Sessions Clerk of the parish in which the banns were proclaimed in Scotland shall, in like manner and on payment of the like fee as in the case of a marriage in his district, give a certificate of proclamation of such banns.
- 10. If the non-resident party has dwelt in any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside Great Britain and Northern Ireland, notice shall be given by that party—
 - (a) in accordance with any law of that part of His Majesty's Dominions or, in the case of India, of the Governor-General of India in Council, as the case may be, giving effect to these Regulations, or to any repealed or future Order in Council under the Foreign Marriage Act; or

(b) in like manner as if the party were about to be married in that place;

and a certificate by a marriage registrar or other like officer, of the giving of such notice, shall be obtained by such party, subject always to the law in force permitting of such notice being given and to the said officer being empowered to issue such certificate.

- 2. In Article 11 of "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1913," the words "any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside Great Britain and Northern Ireland" are substituted for the words "any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the British Islands"; and in Article 22 of the said Order in Council the words "British Islands" are struck out.
- 3. This Order shall come into operation on the 6th day of February, 1925.
- 4.—(1) This Order may be cited as "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1925," and this Order and "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1918," may be cited together as "The Foreign Marriages Orders in Council, 1913 and 1925."
- (2) All copies of "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1913," which are printed after the coming into operation of this Order shall be printed with the amendments, whether by way of substitution, addition or omission, required by this Order.

- 1. This Order may be cited as the "Somaliland Order in Council 1925" and shall be read as one with the Principal Order.
- 2. Article 10 of the Principal Order is amended by the substitution for paragraph (a) therein appearing of the following. . . .
 - (a) There shall be formed a Court to be called the Protectorate Court, which shall be held either by the Governor or, at the Governor's direction, by the Secretary to the Administration and which shall have all the powers of a Sessions Court in India.

3. His Majesty may from time to time revoke alter add to or amend this Order.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the

Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Cauldon and the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Waterfall, both in the County of Stafford and in the Diocese of Lichfield:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to each of the said Benefices of Cauldon and Waterfall is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in Captain Robert John Aldborough Henniker, of Number 81, Savile Park Road, Halifax, in the County of York:

" And whereas the said Robert John Aldborough Henniker is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to each of the said Benefices of Cauldon and Waterfall, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop of Lichfield for the time being:

"And whereas the Right Reverend John Augustine, now Bishop of Lichfield, is willing to accept such transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said John Augustine, Bishop of Lichfield, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

" And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefices of Cauldon and Waterfall which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same Benefices more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the Parishes or Districts in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parishes of Cauldon and Waterfall:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Robert John Aldborough Henniker (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said John Augustine, Bishop of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to each of the said Benefices of Cauldon and Waterfall now vested in him, the said Robert John Aldborough Henniker as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said John Augustine, Bishop of Lichfield, and his successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said John Augustine, Bishop of Lichfield, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Lichfield.

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the Parish (sometime District under the Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850) of Saint Peter, Blackley, and partly out of the Parish (sometime District under the Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850) of Saint Andrew, Blackley, both within the original limits of the Parish of Manchester, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Manchester:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said Parishes of Saint Peter, Blackley, and Saint Andrew, Blackley, are Parishes wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said Parish of Saint Peter, Blackley, and of the said Parish of Saint Andrew, Blackley, which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed District any

consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the

purposes of Divine Worship:

"And whereas we are satisfied that an adequate and permanent maintenance for the support of the Minister of the said proposed District, and when the said District shall have become a New Parish then for the support of the Incumbent thereof, will be secured as from the date of the licensing or appointment of such Minister or Incumbent by the payment of a sum of not less than £150, which will be annually provided out of the moneys received by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under the provisions of the said Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850:

'And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the aforesaid improvements a sum of £1,100 (being a sum which does not exceed 2 years' income of the See) should be provided by his borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to

the Bishopric of Liverpool:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Albert Augustus, Bishop of the said Diocese of Liverpool (testified by his having affixed his signature and Episcopal Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorised to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding £1,100 and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by Deed for a term of 30 years or until the said sum of £1,100, with interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following, that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of 12 months of the said term computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of 12 months so computed and at the end of every

such like period of 12 months thereafter, pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one twenty-fifth part of the said principal sum of £1,100 until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of 12 months computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of £4 per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of 40 days after the same shall have become due it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale. And that such mortgage Deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Albert Augustus, now Bishop of the said Diocese of Liverpool, as every succeeding Bishop of the same Diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said United Benefice of Alkmonton with Yeaveley is vested in D'Oyley Scott Ransom, of Number 24, Low Pavement, Nottingham, Solicitor, and in the Vicar or Incumbent for the time being of the Vicarage of Shirley, in the said County of Derby and in the said Diocese of Southwell, alternately:

"The net annual value of the said Benefice of Arreton is Two hundred and twenty-four

pounds or thereabouts.

"There is also in the Isle of Wight and the same Diocese the Rectory or Benefice of Wootton the Parish whereof contains a population of One hundred and forty-three or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for One hundred and forty persons.

"The net annual value of the said Benefice of Wootton is Two hundred and eighty pounds

or thereabouts.

"There is within the Parish of Arreton a Conventional District known as the District of Wootton Bridge in which is situate the said church or chapel of St. Mark. The said District and Church is served by a Curate in

Charge.

"The Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England by an Instrument dated the twenty-fourth day of October, One thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-ninth day of the same month in consideration of a benefaction now consisting of a sum of Three hundred and seventy-five Pounds Southern Railway Four Pounds per cent. Debenture Stock, a sum of Sixty Pounds Southern Railway Five Pounds per cent. Guaranteed Preference Stock

and a sum of Two hundred and forty Pounds ' Southern Railway Five Pounds per cent. Preference Stock which was secured for the benefit of the said Parish and Benefice of Arreton made a grant of a yearly sum of Twenty Pounds to the Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Arreton conditionally upon the employment of an Assistant Curate at Wootton Bridge.

"The aforesaid District of the said Parish of Arreton known as Wootton Bridge with a total population of eight hundred or thereabouts is the northern part of the said Parish of Arreton lying to the south of Wootton. Within the area of the said District is situate the said church or chapel of St. Mark which is distant about four miles from the Parish Church of Arreton and about half a mile from the Parish Church of Wootton.

"That it appears to us and we do hereby represent to your Grace that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, the major portion being the northern portion of the District of Wootton Bridge which portion is more particularly delineated on the plan annexed to the Scheme appended to this Representation and is thereon verged red may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Arreton and be annexed to the said Parish of Wootton to which it is contiguous.

Edward Arthur Willis-Fleming, Esquire, is the Patron of the said Benefice of Arreton and the Reverend Alfred Marshall Parkes is the present Incumbent thereof. Francis Cameron Macpherson, Esquire, is the Patron of the said Benefice of Wootton and the Reverend George Cyril Seymour is the present Incumbent thereof.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, we, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing annexed to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to us that the alterations above proposed may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested; and we do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Patrons of both of the said Benefices of Arreton and Wootton and also the consents of the Incumbents of the said Benefices to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with such Scheme you may certify the same and such Consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:-

" Scheme.

"That there shall be separated from the Ecclesiastical Parish of Arreton and annexed to the Parish of Wootton the major portion being the northern portion of a certain District of the said Parish of Arreton known as Wootton Bridge the boundaries of which are delineated on the plan annexed hereto and thereon verged red.

"That the Incumbent of Wootton shall have sole and exclusive cure of souls within the portion of such District so to be separated from Arreton and annexed to Wootton.

'That the inhabitants of such portion shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Wootton but shall cease to be entitled to any right of accommodation in the Parish Church of Arreton except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Parish Church of Arreton and who may not be willing to relinquish and

give up the same.
"That the inhabitants of the aforesaid portion shall have such and the same right to have marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials solemnized and performed in the said Parish Church of Wootfon as they might have had in

the Parish Church of Arreton. That no alteration shall be made in the endowments of the said Benefices or either of them except that with the consent of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England there shall be transferred to the said Benefice of Wootton as an addition to the endowments of that Benefice the sums of Stock (viz.:—Three hundred and seventy-five Pounds Southern Railway Four Pounds per cent. Debenture Stock, Sixty Pounds Southern Railway Five Pounds per cent. Guaranteed Preference Stock and Two hundred and forty Pounds Southern Railway Five Pounds per cent. Preference Stock) and the grant of the yearly sum of Twenty Pounds hereinbefore mentioned.

"That no alteration shall be made in the Patronage of the said Benefices or either of them.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES. (DATED 9TH FEBRUARY, 1925.)

STIRLINGSHIRE (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1925.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1922, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:-

Power to make Regulations.

1.—(1) The Local Authorities of the Districts specified in the Schedule to this Order may, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, make Regulations, with a view to the prevention of worrying of cattle (including sheep), for requiring that dogs or any class of dogs shall, during all or any of the hours between sunset and sunrise, be kept by the owners thereof under control in manner prescribed by the Regulations.

(2) The Regulations may apply to the whole or any part of the Districts, and may exempt any class of dogs either generally or under prescribed conditions.

Confirmation of Regulations.

- 2.—(1) Regulations made under this Order shall not take effect unless and until they have been submitted to and confirmed by the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries.
- (2) A copy of any Regulations made by a Local Authority under this Order, signed and certified by the Clerk of that Local Authority to be a true copy and to have been duly confirmed shall be evidence, until the contrary is proved, in all legal proceedings, of the due making, confirmation and existence of the Regulations, without further or other proof.

Seizure of Dogs where Regulations are Contravened.

3. Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against a Regulation made under this Order may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by Section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Extension of Definition in Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

4. Dogs shall be animals for the purposes of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):—

Section forty-three (powers of police)
Section forty-four (powers of inspectors);
and also for the purposes of all other sections
of the said Act containing provisions relative
to or consequent on the provisions of those
sections and this Order, including such sections
as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.
