And whereas an Order in Council was made on the 8th February, 1855, directing the discontinuance of burials in certain places within the City of Canterbury, from the time specified in such Order:

And whereas the said Order in Council of the 8th February, 1855, was varied by Orders in Council of the 26th February, 1897, the 16th February, 1903, the 28th March, 1903, the 25th June, 1903, and the 13th April, 1915, so far as it affected burials in Canterbury Cathedral:

And whereas it seems fit to His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the said Orders in Council be further varied:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, notwithstanding anything in the said Orders in Council of the 8th February, 1855, 26th February, 1897, 16th February, 1903, 28th March, 1903, 25th June, 1903, and 13th April, 1915, in the grave now existing in the Cloisters of the said Cathedral in which the body of the late Very Reverend Henry Wace, Dean of Canterbury, has been buried, the burial may be allowed of the body of his widow, subject to the condition that the coffin will be wholly and permanently embedded in and covered with a layer, or layers, of good cement concrete not less in any part than six inches in thickness.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1855, it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit:

And whereas an Order in Council was made on the 7th day of April, 1854, directing the discontinuance of burials, in, amongst other places, the Paradise Burial Ground adjoining Chichester Cathedral:

And whereas the said Order in Council of the 7th day of April, 1854, was varied by the Order in Council of the 24th day of September, 1855:

And whereas it seems fit to His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the said Orders in Council of the 7th day of April, 1854, and the 24th day of September, 1855, should be further varied:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that notwithstanding anything in the said Orders in Council of the 7th day of April, 1854, and the 24th day of September, 1855, in Johnson's Vault in the said Paradise Burial Ground adjoining Chichester Cathedral the burial may be allowed of the body of the late Thomas Weller-Poley provided that no human remains be disturbed and that within a period of twenty-four hours after the deposit of the coffin in the vault, the coffin be wholly and permanently embedded in, and covered with a layer or layers of good cement concrete, not less in any part than six inches in thickness.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Right Reverend Frank Theodore, Lord Bishop of Winchester, has, under Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, made a Representation to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the following terms:—

"We, Frank Theodore, Lord Bishop of Winchester, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"There is in the Isle of Wight and Diocese of Winchester the Vicarage or Benefice of Arreton the Parish whereof contains a population of One thousand eight hundred and sixty or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for four hundred persons and there is also situate in the said Parish the unconsecrated church or chapel of St. Mark with accommodation for two hundred persons.

"The net annual value of the said Benefice of Arreton is Two hundred and twenty-four pounds or thereabouts.

"There is also in the Isle of Wight and the same Diocese the Rectory or Benefice of Wootton the Parish whereof contains a population of One hundred and forty-three or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for One hundred and forty persons.

"The net annual value of the said Benefice of Wootton is Two hundred and eighty pounds or thereabouts.

"There is within the Parish of Arreton a Conventional District known as the District of Wootton Bridge in which is situate the said church or chapel of St. Mark. The said District and Church is served by a Curate in Charge.

"The Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England by an Instrument dated the twenty-fourth day of October, One thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-ninth day of the same month in consideration of a benefaction now consisting of a sum of Three hundred and seventy-five Pounds Southern Railway Four Pounds per cent. Debenture Stock, a sum of Sixty Pounds Southern Railway Five Pounds per cent. Guaranteed Preference Stock
