On Saturday our Army Foraged, being covered by a strong Detachment under the Command of the Earl of Albemarle. Yesterday the Mareschal de Villeroy's Army Foraged between Asche and Grimberg, which giving some allarm, His Majesty got immediately on Horseback, and all the Dragoons marched out of the Line; but the Enemy soon after retired, and our Troops return'd within the Lines; some Deserters came in, and a Party of ours brought in 20 French Troopers with their Horses. We have advice from Germany, That the French have passed the Rhine with all their Horse and moit of their Foot at Fort Louis, and were Encamped near Raftat; And the Prince of Baden was marching toward them; so that we may expect to hear something considerable from those Parts.

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Hague, July 9. N.S. Monsieur de Bosen, Ambassador of Saze, having received advice by an Express, that the Elector of Saxony his Master is chosen King of Poland; he notified the same yesterday to all the Ministers here, and this day the Imperial and English Ambassadors, as also those of other Princes, went to visit Monsieur de Bosen, and to congratulate with him thereupon. This News has extremely surprized the French, who were so consident of the Prince of Conti's Election, that they talk'd of it as a thing that could not fail; 'Tis certainly a very great blow to them, having, after so vast an Expense, broke all their Measures in those Parts, and with the Turks, against whom the War will now be carried on very vigoroully on that side.
