

Yarmouth, July 12. Yesterday morning failed on the Back of these Sands a Fleet of about 50 Sail from *Hull*, with 3 Dutch Men of War bound to *Holland*. At the same time came up a laden Fleet of Colliers for the River; and yesterday came into this Road His Majesty's Ships the *Garland*, *Winchelsea*, *Mermayd*, and *Bedford* Galley, with the Merchantmen bound to *Russia*. This morning went through our Road a Laden Fleet from *Hull* of about 20 Sail bound to *London* with their Convoy. Here is now a great Fleet of Light Colliers, who will sail with the first opportunity of Wind.

Deale, July 13. On the 19th the *Rochester*, *Oxford*, and *Burlington*, came into the *Downes* from the Coast of *Holland*; and yesterday failed the Outward-bound Merchantmen, under Convoy of several Men of War.

Whitehall, July 14. Capt. Price, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the *Centurion*, in his Letters dated the 6th Instant before *Goree*, gives an account, That he failed the day before from *Margate* Road, and had seen the Merchant and Transport Ships under his Convoy, safe in *Offend*, *Zealand*, the *Goree*, and the *Maese*, after which the Men of War he had with him, returned to the *Downes*.

Capt. Beaumont lay off *Dunkirke* with the Squadron under his Command; as likewise Rear-Admiral *Vandergoes* with a Squadron of Dutch Men of War. *Dunkirke* was still at *Dunkirke*, with his Topmasts down.

London, July 12. This day at an Admiralty Sessions held in the *Old-Baily*, Gerard Bedford, Edward Lyne, and John Oldfield, were Tryed upon an Indictment for Feloniously and Piratically taking an English Vessel called the *Thomas and Jane* near the *Downes*, and being found Guilty, Judgment of Death passed upon them, as in Cases of Piracy.
