NAVAL AND MARINE PAY AND PENSIONS ACT, 1865.

Notice is hereby given, that His Majesty in Council was pleased, on the 25th June, 1925, to approve a Memorial from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty containing regulations under the above mentioned Act, governing the scales and conditions of awards of pensions and gratuities to the widows, and allowances to the children and other dependant relatives of Officers, Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank and Warrant Officers of the Naval and Marine Forces and Coast Guard Service.

The following Address was presented to The KING on the occasion of the opening by His Majesty of the New Canadian Building in Trafalgar Square on the 29th ultimo:—

HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR CANADA.

May it please Your Majesty:—

The very keen interest Your Majesties have ever evinced in the welfare and progress of Overseas Dominions is no where realised more

than in Canada, and the gracious act of opening this building to-day, will be deeply appreciated from one end of the Dominion to the other. We retain lively recollections of the visit of Your Majesties, of the all too brief sojourns in Canada of the Princess Louise and the Duke of Connaught, while the present-day visits of The Prince of Wales to his ranch in the West are looked forward to with pleasure. It has for years past been felt that the various Canadian official activities in the Empire's capital city ought to be assembled at a central point, and when the Canadian Government found that this site—the former home of the Union Club—was available, they seized the opportunity of using it as a dignified, conspicuous and convenient location for carrying on their work here and also for making known the advantages and opportunities our country offers to our fellow subjects. It will, in addition, serve as an easily accessible centre for the many Canadians who visit this country in ever increasing numbers on business or pleasure. The re-construction has been carried out by a talented architect, Mr. Warwick, aided by efficient contractors whose staff have laboured diligently.

As representing my Government and the people of Canada, I ask Your Majesty to declare this building open, with the full assurance that within these walls we shall be able to carry on a useful work that will redound to the credit of our country and in some part assist in maintaining a community of interest in the great Commonwealth of Nations, of which Your Majesty is the head, and which are contributing so much to the happiness and prosperity of mankind.
