A PROCLAMATION

REVOKING, SO FAR AS IT RELATES TO THE ISLAND OF SAINT HELENA, THE PROCLAMATION OF 3RD FEBRUARY, 1898, APPLYING PARTS OF THE COINAGE ACT, 1870, TO CERTAIN COLONIES.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by virtue of a Proclamation of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, dated the 3rd day of February, 1898, certain parts of the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by section two and the schedule of the Coinage Act, 1891, were applied, with the modifications specified in the Proclamation, to the Island of Saint Helena:

And whereas by virtue of the Coinage Act, 1870, it is lawful for Us, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to revoke any Proclamation previously made under that Act:

And whereas We are minded, in exercise of the powers reserved in the Order in Council making provision for the government of Saint Helena made by Her said Majesty on the 27th day of July, 1863, to make further provision as to the coinage of Our said Island by Order in Council, and it is expedient that, in the event of such further provision being so made, the said recited Proclamation should be revoked so far as relates to Our Island of Saint Helena:

Now, therefore, We, with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows:—

The said Proclamation of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, shall, as from the date of the commencement of any Order in Council making further provision as to the coinage of Our said Island of Saint Helena, be revoked so far as relates to that Island, and accordingly the said Act shall as from that date cease to apply to and to be in force in Our said Island.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Twelfth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, and in the Sixteenth year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 17th day of September, 1925 (N.L. 2567/25), in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is

enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions or other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an officer, seaman, or marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

" And whereas by Orders in Council bearing dates the 12th day of December, 1885, and the 13th day of May, 1901, we are empowered to place on the retired list, irrespective of age or service, Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces who are in our opinion unfit for or unworthy of further employment and to grant to such Officers such rates of retired pay or such gratuity as we think fit within the limits prescribed in the said Orders in Council:

" And whereas by Orders in Council bearing dates the 23rd day of October, 1876, the 13th day of May, 1901, and the 18th day of June, 1914, we are empowered to grant to officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces who have been dismissed from Your Majesty's Service by Court-Martial or have been allowed to resign their commissions to avoid trial by Court-Martial compassionate allowances or gratuities at such rates as we think fit within the limits prescribed in the said Orders in Council:

" And whereas by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, Your Majesty was graciously pleased to establish fresh rates of retired pay, pensions and gratuities for Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces who might be retired on or after the 1st day of April, 1919, as well as for all such Officers previously retired who had served in a service capacity between the 4th day of August, 1914, and the 31st day of March, 1919, except officers retired under the Order in Council bearing date the 13th day of May, 1901:

" And whereas by Your Order in Council bearing date the 21st day of April, 1922, Your Majesty was graciously pleased to empower us to place on the retired list with rates of pay or gratuity appropriate to their service and rank on the active list any Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces who might be judged by us to be unfit for further employment by reason of incapacity or peculiarity of temper or other defect not amounting to misconduct and not caused by intemperate or irregular habits of life:

" And whereas by Your Order in Council bearing date the 6th day of February, 1925, Your Majesty was graciously pleased to authorize suitable rates of retired pay or gratuity for such Officers in cases where such provision had not previously been made:

" And whereas we are of opinion that in consequence of these changes it is necessary to prescribe fresh limits within which we should be empowered to grant retired pay, gratuities or compassionate allowances to Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces who are unfit for or unworthy of further employment or who are dismissed from Your Majesty's Service by Court-Martial or who may be allowed to resign their commissions or warrants to avoid trial by Court-Martial:

" We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to repeal the aforesaid Orders in Council bearing dates the 23rd day of October, 1876, the 13th day of May, 1901, and the 18th day of June, 1914, without prejudice, however, to the validity of anything that may have been done thereunder, and to substitute therefor the provisions contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and further to direct that retired pay at a rate not exceeding that permissible under rule 2 of the said Schedule may be granted with effect from a date not earlier than the 1st day of April, 1919, to any Officer placed on the retired list on or after that date for any of the causes mentioned in rule 1 of the Schedule, as well as to any Officers previously so placed on the retired list who had served in a service capacity between the 4th day of August, 1914, and the 31st day of March, 1919.

" The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

" SCHEDULE.

" 1. An Officer who in the opinion of the Admiralty by reason of an act or acts of misconduct or through intemperate or irregular habits of life has become unfit for or is unworthy of further employment may be placed on the retired list irrespective of age or service whether he has been tried by Court-Martial or not.

" 2. An Officer placed on the retired list under Clause 1 may be granted such rate of retired pay or such gratuity as the Admiralty in their discretion may think fit, provided that

" (i) Retired pay be not granted to any Officer who would not have been eligible therefor if placed on the retired list for incapacity.

" (ii) The rate of retired pay be in every case lower by not less than 10 per cent. than the rate which might have been granted had the Officer been placed on the retired list for incapacity.

" (iii) The gratuity be not in excess of that for which the Officer might have been eligible if retired for incapacity.

" 3. An Officer who has been dismissed the Service or dismissed with disgrace by sentence of Court Martial or whose name has been removed from the list of Officers, or who has been allowed to resign his commission or warrant to avoid trial by Court Martial may be awarded a compassionate allowance, but the grant of such an allowance and its duration, if granted, shall be entirely at the discretion of the Admiralty. No Officer may, however, be awarded a compassionate allowance in excess of the retired pay or gratuity which might have been granted to him if placed on the retired list under Clause 1 of this Schedule.

" 4. Nothing in this Schedule shall prejudice or affect the power of the Admiralty to discharge or dismiss Officers or shall confer on any person who has been removed from His Majesty's Service any right to Half Pay, retired pay or pension, compassionate allowance or gratuity.

" 5. The expression 'An Officer' in this Schedule shall include Commissioned Officers,

Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank, Warrant Officers and Subordinate Officers of all ranks in the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines."

"And whereas we consider that Royal Marines, Gunnery Instructors, Land Service, should be granted an inclusive rate of extra duty pay, when employed, of 1s. 6d. a day without any other non-substantive pay, as now authorized for other Gunnery Instructors, Royal Marines, appointed under the revised arrangements sanctioned by Order in Council of the 11th October, 1923:

"We beg leave most humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorize us to make payment accordingly, with effect from the 13th January, 1925.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorise us to make payment accordingly, at our discretion.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

“ Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

“ And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 11th day of October, 1923, to make special provision, *inter alia*, in regard to the award of retired pay to Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines who are disabled while seconded to the Royal Air Force and paid at Royal Air Force rates of pay: and by Your Order in Council bearing date the 25th day of June, 1925, to make corresponding provision for the grant of pensions and allowances to the widows, children, and other dependent relatives of such Officers in the event of their death from wounds, injuries or disease directly attributable to the conditions of service in the Royal Air Force :

“ And whereas Your Majesty was further graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 26th day of May, 1925, to approve, *inter alia*, of Commissioned Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines being attached to the Royal Air Force for service with the Fleet Air Arm and continuing to receive the normal emoluments of their rank in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines together with a special allowance in respect of their Air duties :

“ And whereas Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines so attached to the Royal Air Force will be granted temporary Royal Air Force commissions and be eligible for advancement in rank in the Royal Air Force according to Air Force Regulations, irrespective of their rank in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines, and we consider that special provision should be made for the retired pay of these officers who may be retired on account of injury or disablement certified by the competent medical authority as attributable to the conditions of service during the period of attachment, and for the award of pensions and allowances to the widows, children or other dependent relatives of such Officers in the event of their death from wounds, injuries or disease certified by the competent medical authority as directly attributable to the conditions of service during attachment, and that such provision should take into account the temporary Air Force rank held by these Officers :

“ We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the application of the regulations laid down in the

attached schedule to Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines who may be attached to the Royal Air Force for service in the Fleet Air Arm.

“ The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

“ SCHEDULE.

“ Regulations relating to the award of Retired Pay to Officers of the Royal Navy or Royal Marines who are retired on account of sickness or injury attributable to the conditions of the service while attached to the Royal Air Force for service with the Fleet Air Arm and to the award of pensions or allowances to the widows, children or other dependent relatives of ‘ attached ’ Officers who die of wounds, injuries or disease directly attributable to the service.

“ 1. A Naval or Marine Officer who under the provisions of the Order in Council dated 26th May, 1925, has been attached to the Royal Air Force for service with the Fleet Air Arm and while serving therewith has held a temporary Royal Air Force commission, if invalidated on account of sickness or injury certified by the competent medical authority to be attributable to the conditions of the service during the period of attachment, shall be dealt with, for the purpose of the award of retired pay, as under the Royal Air Force Regulations appropriate to his rank in that Force or under Naval Regulations appropriate to his rank in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines, whichever would be more to his advantage.

“ 2. In the event of an Officer who has been attached to the Royal Air Force for service with the Fleet Air Arm and has held a temporary Royal Air Force commission during such attachment, dying of wounds, injury or disease certified by the competent medical authority to be directly attributable to the conditions of the service during the period of attachment, his widow, children or other dependent relatives shall be dealt with, for the award of pensions or allowances, as under the Royal Air Force Regulations appropriate to his rank in that Force, or under Naval Regulations appropriate to his Naval or Marine rank, whichever would be more to their advantage.

“ 3. The award of retired pay to an Officer, or of pension or allowances to his widow, children or other dependants as under Royal Air Force Regulations, to be subject to the following conditions :—

“ (i) Where the award under Royal Air Force Regulations is dependent on length of service in a Royal Air Force rank or ranks, previous service in an equivalent, or any Naval or Marine rank shall not be taken into account.

“ (ii) In the event of an Officer being invalidated or dying after return to the Royal Navy or the Royal Marines, the award as under Royal Air Force Regulations shall not exceed that to which he or his dependants would have been entitled had he been invalidated on the date of termination of his temporary commission in the Royal Air Force.”

“And whereas Your Majesty was pleased, by Your Order in Council of the 25th May, 1922, to authorize the payment of an allowance of 3d. a day to Naval ratings allocated for duty with hydrophones in vessels of Your Majesty's Navy not carrying Submarine Detector ratings :

“And whereas we consider that this allowance should be extended to ratings allocated for duty with hydrophones in vessels of Your Majesty's Navy notwithstanding the fact that Submarine Detector ratings may also be borne and paid therein :

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorize the payment as from the 6th July, 1925, of an allowance of 3d. a day to Naval ratings employed on Hydrophone duties, in the circumstances stated in the preceding paragraph.

within which it shall not be lawful for vessels, or for any particular description of vessels, to lie or be moored (and any such space is in the said Act and in this Order referred to as a “prohibited space”):

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act a Regulation was made by Order in Council, dated the 7th day of September, 1916 :

And whereas it is expedient to repeal the said Order in Council and Regulation :

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Him by the said first recited Act, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and on the joint recommendation of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council dated the 7th day of September, 1916, shall cease to operate as from one month from the date hereof.

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service :

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, to make rules concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried or used, and the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by His Majesty's vessels and other vessels, navigating the waters of the Port and of the approaches thereto :

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act certain Regulations and Rules were made by Orders in Council dated the 16th day of December, 1912, the 9th day of February, 1914, the 4th day of September, 1918, the 21st day of December, 1920, and the 13th day of October, 1922, with reference to the Dockyard Port of Portsmouth :

And whereas it appears expedient to amend such Rules as hereinafter provided :

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order shall take effect from one calendar month from the date hereof.

2. Clause 9 of the Second Schedule to the said Order in Council dated the 16th day of December, 1912, is hereby repealed.

3. The following Rule shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Port of Portsmouth, and shall be read and construed as though inserted in the Second Schedule of the said Order in Council dated the 16th day of December, 1912, in the position indicated by the number prefixed thereto:—

9. Steam vessels approaching or leaving Clarence pier, Ryde pier, or other piers are to confine themselves to the lanes of approach marked by pecked lines on the Admiralty charts, in which lanes anchorage is prohibited.

And whereas by sub-section (1) of Section 2 of the Ministry of Pensions Act, 1916, as amended by Section 1 of the War Pensions Act, 1920, it is enacted that there shall be transferred to the Minister of Pensions (hereinafter referred to as "the Minister"), certain powers and duties of the Admiralty with respect to pensions and grants to persons who have served as officers or men:

And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty by the Minister that it is desirable to make further provision with respect to the re-assessment of pre-war disability of certain seamen and marines who served again in the Great War:

And whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, having taken the said proposals into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof and to sanction the provisions set forth in the Regulations hereto annexed.

REGULATIONS WITH RESPECT TO THE RE-ASSESSMENT OF PRE-WAR DISABILITY OF CERTAIN BRITISH SEAMEN AND MARINES WHO SERVED AGAIN IN THE GREAT WAR.

1. A seaman or marine granted a pre-war pension who rejoined or re-enlisted during the Great War and is in receipt of pension for any other disability attributable to or aggravated by Great War Service, may be granted, in lieu of his pre-war and Great War pensions, a pension in respect of his total degree of disablement in accordance with the Regulations annexed to the Order in Council of the 11th day of June, 1920, for the pensions of seamen and marines disabled, etc., in the Great War (hereinafter referred to as "the Regulations of 1920").

2.—(1) A seaman or marine who fulfils the conditions set forth in the preceding Article, and who, having been invalidated before the Great War, had, prior to such invaliding,

(a) if a continuous service man of the Royal Navy, completed a total service of not less than 10 years on the continuous and general service system, and was in the opinion of the Minister prevented by such invaliding from completing time for Long Service Pension; or,

(b) if a non-continuous service man of the Royal Navy, or if a Marine, completed a total service of not less than 14 years, and was in the opinion of the Minister prevented by such invaliding from completing time for Long Service Pension,

may be granted, in lieu of his pre-war and Great War pensions, a pension under Article 1 (1) of the Regulations of 1920 in respect of his total degree of disablement, and be granted in addition an allowance in respect of his service, calculated at the following rates:—

(2) A seaman or marine who was invalidated and granted a permanent pension for a pre-war disability which was and remains aggravated by Great War service and who fulfils the conditions set forth at (a) or (b) in (1) above may be granted, in lieu of any other pension, a pension under Article 1 (1) of the Regulations of 1920 and in addition a service allowance in accordance with the scale set forth in (1) above.

3. A seaman or marine who fulfils the conditions of Article 1 of these Regulations and whose pre-war pension has been re-assessed under the provisions of the Order in Council of 7th February, 1921, may be granted in lieu of his Great War pension a pension at the rates shown in the Schedule to the Regulations annexed to the Order in Council of the 14th January, 1919, for the pensions of seamen and marines disabled in the Great War (together with an addition of 20 per cent. thereof) in respect of his total degree of disablement.

4. The provisions of the preceding Articles shall not apply, or shall cease to apply, in any case in which the disablement resulting either

from the Great War disability or the pre-war disability is less than 20 per cent. of total disablement.

5. There may be added to the service allowance specified in the foregoing Articles additions for good conduct badges and medals at the rates and under the conditions set forth in the Order in Council of 7th February, 1921. Chief Petty Officers, Petty Officers and Leading Rates of the Royal Navy, and Non-commissioned Officers of the Royal Marines may receive the additions in respect of petty time at the rates and under the conditions set forth in the Order in Council of 7th February, 1921.

6. A seaman or marine who

(1) fulfils the conditions of Article 2 (1) hereof except that his pre-war disability is not attributable to service, or

(2) fulfils the conditions of such Article 2 (1) but whose disablement resulting from his pre-war disability is less than 20 per cent. of total disablement,

may be granted, in lieu of his pension for his Great War and pre-war disabilities, a Great War pension for his Great War disability under Article 1 (1) of the Regulations of 1920 and the service allowance for which he may be eligible according to the scale set forth in Article 2 (1).

7. A seaman or marine in receipt of a permanent pension for a pre-war disability who rejoined or re-enlisted during the Great War and who has been granted a gratuity or allowance under Article 1 (3) of the Regulations of 1920, or whose pension under Article 1 (1) of such Regulations has ceased, may have the pension for his pre-war disability re-assessed according to the scales and under the conditions laid down in the Order in Council of the 6th February, 1922.

8. Where a seaman or marine has incurred a disability attributable to service before the Great War, and, having continued to serve, is in receipt of a Great War pension for a different disability, there may be substituted for such pension a pension under the Regulations of 1920, based upon his total degree of disablement. If he is or becomes eligible for gratuity or final weekly allowance in respect of his Great War disablement, his pre-war disability shall be assessed or re-assessed as in the previous Article.

9.—(1) A seaman or marine who, being in receipt of any service allowance under these Regulations, rejoins or re-enlists shall cease to draw such allowance.

(2) No seaman or marine shall be entitled to the benefit of these Regulations unless he gave satisfactory service in the Great War.

(3) No seaman or marine shall be entitled to the benefit of these Regulations while in receipt of a pension by virtue of the Order in Council of 8th May, 1919.

10. These Regulations shall, so far as applicable, be read with the Regulations of 1920 provided that:—

(1) Any pension granted under these Regulations shall be deemed to be granted under Article 1 of the Regulations of 1920, but the degree of disablement for the purposes of Articles 1a, 2, 6 and 6a of those Regulations shall be the degree of disablement due to the Great War disability.

(2) In the application of Article 6 of the Regulations of 1920, the allowance under

Article 6 to a seaman or marine in receipt of a pension and service allowance under these Regulations shall not in any case under paragraph (1) (a) or (1) (c) of that Article be less than the sum of such pension and service allowance, and in any case under paragraph (1) (b) of that Article shall not be less than such sum reduced by 19s.

In this paragraph "pension" shall include any allowance which would be payable in respect of a wife or child.

(3) For the purpose of Article 3 of the Regulations of 1920 "disablement pension" in that Article shall mean any pension (together with any additions thereto) granted under these Regulations.

(4) For the purposes of Article 24a of the Regulations of 1920, the following shall apply:—

11. Unless the context otherwise requires:—

(1) "Pre-war pension" means a permanent pension granted in respect of a pre-war disability attributable to service.

(2) "Service" means service which is allowed to reckon for Long Service pension under clause (3) of the Schedule to the Order in Council of 7th February, 1921, revising rates of long service pensions.

(3) "Total degree of disablement" means the degree of disablement existing at any assessment due to the combined effect of a disability attributable to or aggravated by Great War Service and a pre-war disability.

(4) References to the Regulations of 1920 shall include references to the Regulations annexed to the Order in Council of the 14th January, 1919, for the pensions of seamen and marines disabled, etc., in consequence of the war.

12. The provisions of these Regulations shall take effect as from 1st April, 1919, provided that where a seaman or marine is in receipt of a pension for a pre-war disability and has been awarded a pension, gratuity, or allowance under the Regulations of 1920, such pension shall not be re-assessed if it is more to his advantage to continue to receive it at the pre-war rate.

13. The Minister of Pensions may issue such detailed instructions as he may deem necessary with respect to carrying these Regulations into effect.

" Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Ernest, Bishop of Worcester, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Berrow and Pendock duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Worcester and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Worcester signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

" And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

" And whereas both of the said Benefices of Berrow and Pendock are now full, the Reverend Jeremiah John Edwards being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Berrow and the Reverend Henry Fraser Crennell being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Pendock:

" Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Ernest, Bishop of Worcester (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

" 1. That the said Benefice of Berrow and the said Benefice of Pendock shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of ' The

United Benefice of Berrow with Pendock,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

" 2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith: and if one only of the said two Benefices shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the other of the said two Benefices: and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of that one of the said two Benefices which shall last be avoided after the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme.

" 3. That upon the union taking effect a part of the endowments of the United Benefice, that is to say, the endowments at present belonging to the said Benefice of Berrow, shall be charged with a sum of £100 per annum as a fund for the payment of the expenses of providing clerical or lay assistance for the Incumbent of the United Benefice, particularly with a view to securing adequate services and pastoral supervision within and for the Parish of Pendock, which said fund of £100 per annum shall be held and administered by the Incumbent of the United Benefice but shall be applicable only to the purposes aforesaid.

" 4. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Berrow shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

" 5. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, that (a) if under any of the provisions of Clause 2 of this Scheme an Incumbent of the said Benefice of Berrow shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice then in each series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to the United Benefice to be made after the union the Patron of the said Benefice of Pendock shall have the first and the third turns, and the Patrons of the said Benefice of Berrow shall have the second turn, but (b) if under any of the provisions of Clause 2 of this Scheme an Incumbent of the said Benefice of Pendock shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice then in each series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to the United Benefice to be made after the union the Patrons of the said Benefice of Berrow shall have the first turn and the Patron of the said Benefice of Pendock shall have the second and the third turns.

" Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England or of any Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, and Notices have been transmitted to

the persons or bodies entitled under the same Measure to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make certain alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Worcester has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Worcester.

ing Scheme for effecting the union of two neighbouring Benefices, that is to say the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Little Cressingham and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Threxton, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Norfolk and in the Diocese of Norwich:

“Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Bertram, Bishop of Norwich, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Little Cressingham and Threxton duly made their report to the said Bishop of Norwich and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Norwich signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

“And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

“And whereas both of the said Benefices of Little Cressingham and Threxton are now full, the Reverend George Todd being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Little Cressingham and the Reverend Charles Thomas Mourilyan being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Threxton:

“Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Bertram, Bishop of Norwich (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

“1. That the said Benefice of Little Cressingham and the said Benefice of Threxton shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Little Cressingham with Threxton’ and that such United Benefice shall be included in and form part of the Rural Deanery of Breccles but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

“2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant, the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith: and if the said Benefice of Threxton only shall be then vacant the said union shall also take effect forthwith if the Incumbent of the other of the said two Benefices shall consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of the said Benefice of Little Cressingham and the then Incumbent of Threxton shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice: and if the said Benefice of Little Cressingham only shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Threxton: and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant, then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Threxton if the Incumbent at that time of the said Benefice of Little Cressingham shall have been instituted to Little Cressingham subsequently to the date of the publication in the London Gazette

of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or if instituted before that date shall consent to become the Incumbent of the United Benefice: but if he shall have been instituted to Little Cressingham before that date and shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of the Benefice of Little Cressingham following such avoidance of the Benefice of Threxton and the then Incumbent of Threxton shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

“3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Little Cressingham shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

“4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, that in each series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the United Benefice after the union, the Patron of the said Benefice of Threxton shall have the first turn and the Patron of the said Benefice of Little Cressingham shall have the second and third turns.

“Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending, and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts; or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patrons affected together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 25th June, 1925, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 10th August next, and such Order has been published in the *London Gazette*, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

LLANFIHANGEL-Y-CREUDDYN.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church in the said Parish, and in the Churchyard attached thereto. Provided that:—

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

(c) In the said Churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 12TH OCTOBER, 1925.)

ELY AND DISTRICT SWINE FEVER INFECTED AREA ORDER OF 1925.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1925, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Area to which this Order applies.

1. This Order applies to the Area described in the First Schedule hereto, referred to in this Order as "the Infected Area."

Restriction on Movement of Swine into, out of, or within the Infected Area.

2.—(1) The movement of swine into or out of the Infected Area, or along or across any road or other highway, or by water, within the Infected Area, is prohibited except with a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority in accordance with this Order. Provided that this Order shall not affect or prevent the movement of swine through the Infected Area direct by railway, without avoidable delay if the animals are not untrucked within such Area.

(2) No swine shall be permitted by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon any road or other highway in the Infected Area.

Markets etc. of Swine in Infected Area to be restricted to Fat Swine only.

3. No market, sale or exhibition of swine shall be held in any market, fairground, sale-yard or place of exhibition in the Infected Area, unless it is restricted to fat swine intended for immediate slaughter, and then only in accordance with the following conditions, namely:—

(a) A licence shall be obtained from the Local Authority authorising the holding of the market, sale or exhibition.

(b) All swine exposed at such market, sale or exhibition shall be removed therefrom direct to a slaughterhouse, and shall be accompanied by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority specifying the slaughterhouse to which the swine are to be moved.

Licences for Movement of Swine into Infected Area.

4. Where the movement required is governed by the Regulation of Movement of Swine Order of 1922, the licence necessary under that Order shall be sufficient authority for the movement of swine into the Infected Area. Where the movement is not affected by the Regulation of Movement of Swine Order of 1922, a licence for the movement of swine into the Infected Area may be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place from which the swine are to be moved. The licence, which may be granted for movement for any purposes, shall be in the Form C with the necessary adaptation. No declaration is required to be produced to obtain the licence.

Licences for Movement of Swine within or out of the Infected Area.

5.—(1) Licences may be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority for the following movements of swine from premises within the Infected Area to premises in or outside the Infected Area, viz.:—

From premises in the Infected Area (other than a market, fairground, saleyard or place of exhibition)—

(a) to a licensed market, sale or exhibition in the Infected Area (licence Form C); or

(b) to a slaughterhouse in or outside the Infected Area (licence Form C); or

(c) to private premises in or outside the Infected Area (licence Form A, or, if for breeding purposes, Form C); or

(d) to a vessel direct for shipment or to any premises for detention until shipment (licence Form C).

From a licensed Market, sale or exhibition in the Infected Area

to a slaughterhouse either within or outside the Infected Area (licence Form C).

(2) Before a licence (Form A) or (Form C) is granted under paragraphs (c) and (d) of this Article the owner of the swine, or his authorised agent, shall sign and produce or send to the Inspector a declaration in the Form B set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order. The Inspector shall retain the declaration, and before granting the licence shall satisfy himself as far as practicable as to the correctness of the statements contained therein. No declaration is required before granting a licence for movement of swine to a licensed market, sale or exhibition, or to a slaughterhouse.

Conditions of Movement.

Detention and Isolation at Destination for 27 days of Swine moved with Licence (Form A).

Marking of Swine moved to a Slaughterhouse.

6.—(1) Swine moved with a licence (Form A) shall not, for a period of 27 days after arrival at the place of destination specified in the licence, be moved therefrom except to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse, and then only if the swine are marked before the movement commences in the manner described in the next following paragraph of this Article, and are accompanied by a licence (Form C). Swine while detained during the said period of 27 days shall be kept separate from all other swine. This Article does not prohibit the movement of the carcase of a pig slaughtered on the premises during the said period of 27 days.

(2) Where swine are moved with a licence under this Order to a slaughterhouse, they shall, before the movement to the slaughterhouse commences, be marked by and at the expense of the owner, by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine, thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long, and on arrival at the slaughterhouse the swine shall be detained there until slaughtered.

(3) Swine while being moved with a licence under this Order shall be moved as far as practicable by the nearest available route and without avoidable delay to the place of destination specified in the licence and not elsewhere, and shall be kept separate as far as practicable from all other swine.

Provisions as to Licences.

7.—(a) Licences may be granted under this Order only by an Inspector of the Local Authority in whose district the movement commences;

(b) A movement licence shall not be granted by an Inspector if, in his opinion, it is undesirable to grant it, or for any movement of swine, which is prohibited by the Regulation of Movement of Swine Order of 1922;

(c) Copies of licences authorising movement into the district of another Local Authority shall be sent by the Inspector issuing such licences to such other Local Authority;

(d) Licences must be delivered up at, or sent by post to the nearest Police Station or to an officer of the Local Authority, immediately after completion of the movement by the owner or person in charge;

(e) Licences (other than licences—Form C—specifically marked “for Breeding purposes”), shall only be available for eight days including the day of issue, and shall accompany the animals throughout the movement. Licences (Form C) specifically marked “for Breeding purposes” shall be available for 28 days, inclusive of the date thereof. If required for the purpose of service, the swine referred to therein may be moved under the authority of the licence to the same premises either on one or two occasions within the said period of 28 days, and back to the original premises from which it was moved. The swine shall, on return to the original premises, be detained thereon for a period of 28 days from the date of return; provided that where movement on two occasions takes place under the licence the said period of 28 days detention shall commence on the date of return after the second movement;

(f) Licences shall be produced by the person in charge of the swine moved therewith on demand to an Inspector or Constable, and such person shall if required by such Officer give his name and address.

Forms.

8. The Licences (Forms A and C) required for use under this Order shall be in the forms set forth in the Second Schedule to the Regulations of Movement of Swine Order of 1922, with the necessary adaptations. The declaration (Form B) shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order.

Terms.

9. “Slaughterhouse” includes bacon factory; other terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the Regulation of Movement of Swine Order of 1922.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

10. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

11. Any contraventions of this Order or of the conditions of any licence issued thereunder, or the making of any false statement in any declaration required thereunder, shall be deemed to be an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and renders the offender liable to prosecution.

Commencement.

12. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-sixth day of October, nineteen hundred and twenty-five.

13. This Order may be cited as the ELY AND DISTRICT SWINE-FEVER INFECTED AREA ORDER OF 1925.
