

Norton, of the Parish of Northfield and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Agnes, Cotteridge, all in the County of Worcester and in the Diocese of Birmingham, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of the bridge which carries Raddlebarn Road across the Worcester and Birmingham Canal where the boundaries of the New Parish of Saint Stephen, Selly Hill, the New Parish of Saint Wulstan, Selly Oak, both in the said County and Diocese, and the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Selly Oak, all meet, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Raddlebarn Road for a distance of  $14\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to its junction with Willow Road at a point almost opposite to the eastern end of the fence forming the northern boundary of the house and premises known as Woodlands (Nurses' Home) and extending thence first westward to and then south-westward along the said fence for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its western end, and extending thence westward in a straight line for a distance of  $12\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to the junction of Linden Road with Oaktree Lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of Oaktree Lane for a distance of 23 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries such lane across Griffin's Brook, and extending thence first westward and then in various directions along the middle of Griffin's Brook for a distance of 48 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries Griffin's Brook Lane across such stream, and extending thence first south-eastward and then south-westward along the middle of Griffin's Brook Lane for a distance of  $9\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cob Lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of Cob Lane for a distance of 12 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Haygreen Lane and Woodlands Park Road upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Selly Oak, from the said Parish of Northfield, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Haygreen Lane (thereby following the last mentioned boundary) for a distance of 3 chains or thereabouts to a point distant 50 yards precisely measured in a direct line from the middle of Woodlands Park Road, and extending thence southward in a line parallel to and at a distance of 50 yards from the middle of Woodlands Park Road for a distance of  $46\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to the fence forming the northern boundary of the house and premises known as Middleton Hall, and extending thence eastward along such fence for a distance of 2 chains or thereabouts to its eastern end on the western side of Woodlands Park Road, and extending thence first eastward to and then southward along the middle of Woodlands Park Road for a distance in all of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to its junction with Middleton Hall Road and Northfield Road upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Northfield from the said Parish of King's Norton, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of Northfield Road (thereby following for a small distance the boundary which divides the said Parish of King's Norton from the said New Parish of Saint Agnes, Cotteridge) for a distance of  $40\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to its junction with Selly Oak Road, and extending thence northward along the

middle of Selly Oak Road for a distance of 29 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the culvert which carries such road across Beaumont Brook, and extending thence first eastward and then in various directions along the middle of Beaumont Brook (thereby passing between the houses and premises known as Numbers 70 and 72 Franklin Road) for a distance of 30 chains or thereabouts to the point where such brook reaches the western side of Franklin Road, and extending thence in a straight line due east (thereby crossing Franklin Road, the northern portion of Cotteridge Park, and the Birmingham West Suburban line of the London Midland and Scottish Railway) for a distance of  $15\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Worcester and Birmingham Canal upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Agnes, Cotteridge, from the Consolidated Chapelry of the Ascension, Stirchley, in the said County and Diocese, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said Worcester and Birmingham Canal (thereby following in part the last mentioned boundary, in part the boundary which divides the said Consolidated Chapelry of the Ascension, Stirchley, from the said Parish of King's Norton, and in part the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Selly Hill, from the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Selly Oak) for a distance of 75 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the Raddlebarn Road across the said canal where the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Selly Hill, the said New Parish of Saint Wulstan, Selly Oak, and the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Selly Oak, all meet, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Birmingham.
