On the 16th the Count d'Efree intended to fail with the French Fleet out of the Road of Barcelona, the Men of War being ordered back to Toulon, and the Galleys to Marfeilles; The French King fent a Letter on the 21th to the Archbishop of Paris, to cause Te Deum to be Sung for the taking of Barcelona; The Government of this place is given to the Lieutenant General Count de Coigny, who does not so much propose advantage by it, seeing a Peace is like so soon to remove him, as he hopes to be thereby Entitled to some Couriers come frequently other Advancement. from Poland, but little is faid of what they bring; thô in general they cannot but own that the Saxon Party prevails there; and that the Prince of Conti has for this reason laid aside the thoughts of going thither. We hear nothing further concerning Pointy; and they are here in great fear that some ill accident has befallen him since the Frigat called Le Fort and the other Veffel lately arrived at Brest, lest him; A French Frigat of 40 Guns arrived at Rochelle the 13th from the West-Indies; This Ship was one of the Sieur de Renaud's Squadron, but stayed behind him in those parts, and was in the Expedition to Cartagena; having on board the Sieur de Casse, Governor of Petit-Guaves; but a difference arifing after that place was taken, between him and the Sieur de Painty, they parted; and this Vessel leaving Pointy at Cartagena, carried the Sieur de Casse back to Petit-Guaves; and from thence returned home; The faid Sieur de Casse makes great Complaints against Pointy for not giving the Buckaneers their part of the Plunder, which they deferved so well, having lost 6 or 7 of their Companions, but Pointy's Friends have an Answer for them already, which is, that the Booty was nothing near fo considerable as the common report makes it, and that they expected more than their proportion came to; 'Tis certain, that in this Expedition we lost in all above 1800 Men. There has fallen of late abundance of Rain in all parts of this Kingdom, which has done a great deal of harm to the Harvest.
