PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 14th day of May, 1926 (N.L. 1084/26), in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions or other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, seaman or marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas by Orders in Council bearing dates the 12th day of December, 1885, and the 12th day of October, 1925, we are empowered to place on the retired list, irrespective of age or service, Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces who are in our opinion unfit for or unworthy of further employment and to grant to such Officers such rates of retired pay or such gratuity as we think fit within the limits prescribed in the said Orders in Council:

“And whereas the Schedule annexed to the said Order in Council bearing date the 12th day of October, 1925, provides that the rate of retired pay for Officers retired for the above reasons shall be in every case lower by not less than 10 per cent. than the rate which might have been granted had the Officer been placed on the retired list for incapacity:

“And whereas we are of opinion that Officers who have lost service as the result of sentence by Court Martial should be eligible at our discretion for retired pay at a rate lower by not less than 10 per cent. than the amount of retired pay to which but for their loss of service as the result of sentence by Court Martial such Officers would have been eligible if placed on the retired list for incapacity, or for retired pay at a rate not exceeding the rate for which, if placed on the retired list for incapacity, such Officers would have been eligible in virtue of their service as reduced by sentence of Court Martial, whichever rate is the lower:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the substitution of the Schedule hereto annexed for the Schedule annexed to Your Majesty's Order in Council of the 12th day of October, 1925, with effect as from that date.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.

“ SCHEDULE.

“1. An Officer who in the opinion of the Admiralty by reason of an act or acts of misconduct or through intemperate or irregular habits of life has become unfit for or is unworthy of further employment may be placed on the retired list irrespective of age or service whether he has been tried by Court Martial or not.

“2. An Officer placed on the retired list under Clause 1 may be granted such rate of retired pay or such gratuity as the Admiralty

in their discretion may think fit, provided that:—

(i) Retired pay be not granted to any Officer who would not have been eligible therefor if placed on the retired list for incapacity.

(ii) The maximum rate of retired pay shall be the lower of the two following rates, viz.:—

(a) The rate admissible on the incapacity scale, after crediting the Officer with any service lost as the result of sentence by Court Martial, less 10 per cent., or

(b) The rate admissible on the incapacity scale calculated upon the Officer's service as reduced by sentence of Court Martial.

(iii) The gratuity be not in excess of that for which the Officer might have been eligible if retired for incapacity.

"3. An Officer who has been dismissed the Service or dismissed with disgrace by sentence of Court Martial or whose name has been removed from the list of Officers, or who has been allowed to resign his commission or warrant to avoid trial by Court Martial may be awarded a compassionate allowance, but the grant of such an allowance and its duration, if granted, shall be entirely at the discretion of the Admiralty. No Officer may, however, be awarded a compassionate allowance in excess of the retired pay or gratuity which might have been granted to him if placed on the retired list under Clause 1 of this Schedule.

"4. Nothing in this Schedule shall prejudice or affect the power of the Admiralty to discharge or dismiss Officers or shall confer on any person who has been removed from His Majesty's Service any right to half pay, retired pay or pension, compassionate allowance or gratuity.

"5. The expression 'An Officer' in this Schedule shall include Commissioned Officers, Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank, Warrant Officers and Subordinate Officers of all ranks in the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Act, 1920, provision has been made for the enforcement in England and Ireland of maintenance orders made by a Court in any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom to which the said Act extends:

And whereas by the said Act it is amongst other things provided that where His Majesty

is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the Legislature of any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom for the enforcement within that part of maintenance orders made by Courts within England and Ireland, His Majesty may by Order in Council extend the said Act to that part, and thereupon that part shall become a part of His Majesty's Dominions to which the said Act extends:

And whereas on the 6th day of December, 1922, the Irish Free State was established under the provisions of an Act of Parliament shortly entitled the Irish Free State Constitution Act, 1922 (Session 2):

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied that the Legislature of the part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom, hereinafter mentioned, has made reciprocal provisions for the enforcement within that part of maintenance orders made by Courts within England and Ireland:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above recited Act in His Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. The Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Act, 1920, shall apply to the part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom hereunder mentioned:—

VICTORIA.

2. Nothing in this Order shall affect the making, registration, confirmation or enforcement in the Irish Free State of any maintenance order as defined in sections 10 and 11 of the said Act.

And the Right Honourable Leopold Charles Stennett Amery, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS it is provided by the Colonial Prisoners Removal Act, 1884, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time to direct that the said Act shall apply, as if, subject to the conditions, exceptions, and qualifications (if any) contained in the Order, any place out of His Majesty's dominions in which His Majesty has jurisdiction, and which is named in the Order, were a British possession and part of His Majesty's dominions, and to provide for carrying into effect such application:

And whereas His Majesty has power and jurisdiction within the Somaliland Protectorate:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance and exercise of the powers in this behalf by

the said Act of Parliament or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The Colonial Prisoners Removal Act, 1884, shall apply to and take effect within the Somaliland Protectorate as if that Protectorate were a British possession and part of His Majesty's dominions.

2. In order to carry out the application of the said Act to the Somaliland Protectorate the Governor, or any person or persons lawfully discharging the functions of Governor, may exercise all powers vested by the said Act in the Governor of a British possession.

3. This Order may be cited as the Somaliland Protectorate (Colonial Prisoners Removal) Order, 1926.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 18th day of March, 1926, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called ‘ the said Benefice ’) of Crewe (otherwise Crewe Green), in the County of Chester and in the Diocese of Chester:

“ Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Crewe (otherwise Crewe Green) is now limited and settled to uses under which the Most Honourable Robert Offley Ashburton, Marquess of Crewe, K.G., is tenant for life thereof free from incumbrances, and the said Robert Offley Ashburton, Marquess of Crewe, is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said Benefice in case the same were now vacant:

“ And whereas the said Robert Offley Ashburton, Marquess of Crewe, is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of

Crewe (otherwise Crewe Green) should be transferred in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed:

“ And whereas the Right Reverend Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned in token of his willingness to accept jointly with the other persons hereinafter mentioned the transfer of the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage hereinafter recommended and proposed and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary:

“ And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Crewe (otherwise Crewe Green) which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same Benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the New Parish of Crewe (otherwise Crewe Green):

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Robert Offley Ashburton, Marquess of Crewe, being the person whose consent as Patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the 1st and 2nd years of Her said late Majesty Chapter 106 (in testimony of which consent he has signed and sealed this Scheme), with the consent of the said Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), and with the consents of the persons to whom together with the said Robert Offley Ashburton, Marquess of Crewe, and the said Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester, it is hereinafter recommended and proposed that the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage should be transferred, that is to say, with the consents of the Venerable John Henry Thorpe, Clerk in Holy Orders and Archdeacon of Macclesfield, of the Honourable George Charles Colville, M.B.E., of Number 66, Eccleston Square, London, and of the Reverend Edward Armitstead, of The Rectory, Barthomley, in the said County of Chester, Clerk in Holy Orders (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Crewe (otherwise Crewe Green) shall be transferred to the said Robert Offley Ashburton, Marquess of Crewe; Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester; John Henry Thorpe; George Charles Colville; and Edward Armitstead, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Robert Offley Ashburton, Marquess of Crewe; Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester; John Henry Thorpe; George Charles Colville; and Edward Armitstead, their

heirs and assigns for ever as Trustees upon the trusts declared by a certain Indenture already prepared and intended to be executed by the said Robert Offley Ashburton, Marquess of Crewe; Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester; John Henry Thorpe; George Charles Colville; and Edward Armitstead.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 25th day of February, 1926, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Foxcote and a part of the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Wellow, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Somerset and in the Diocese of Bath and Wells:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend St. John Basil Wynne, Bishop of Bath and Wells, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to inquire into and report upon the union of the Benefice of Writhlington in the said County and Diocese with the said Benefice of Foxcote and a part of the said Benefice of Wellow duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Bath and Wells and therein recommended the union of the said Benefice of Foxcote and a part of the said Benefice of Wellow but did not recommend the inclusion in the United Benefice so recommended to be constituted of the said Benefice of Writhlington, and the said Bishop of Bath and Wells signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical

Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for effecting the union so recommended based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas the said Benefice of Wellow is now full, the Reverend Prebendary Le Gendre George Horton-Starkie being the present Incumbent thereof and the said Benefice of Foxcote is now vacant:

"And whereas only one Parsonage House will be left standing or remaining within or belonging to the United Benefice when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect, namely, the Parsonage House belonging to the said Benefice of Foxcote, but such house is considered by the Commissioners appointed by the said Bishop of Bath and Wells as aforesaid to be unsuitably situated for a house of residence for the Incumbent of such proposed United Benefice:

"And whereas it is contemplated that the said Parsonage House now belonging to the said Benefice of Foxcote shall be sold as hereinafter recommended and that the net proceeds to arise from such sale together with such other funds as may be forthcoming shall be used for the provision of a Parsonage House at Shoscombe in the Parish of the said Benefice of Wellow as a house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice hereinafter recommended and proposed to be constituted:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said St. John Basil Wynne, Bishop of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That a part of the said Benefice of Wellow (containing no Parish Church), that is to say, all that part of the said Benefice of Wellow including the Hamlet of Shoscombe which lies to the west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the Parish of Hemington from the Parish of Wellow at the junction of roads leading (a) to Stony Littleton, (b) to Hussage Hill and Wellow Village and (c) to Tucker's Grave Inn, and extending thence north-westwards and in a straight line for a distance of about a mile and a quarter to the eastern corner of Wellow Cemetery and extending thence north-westwards and in a straight line for a distance of about 970 yards to the junction of roads leading (a) to White Ox Mead (b) to Upper Hayes and Twinhoe Green and (c) towards Shoscombe Hamlet, and extending thence due northwards and in a straight line for a distance of about 1,200 yards to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Wellow from the Parish of Combe Hay (all which part is more particularly delineated and set forth upon the Map or Plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured yellow), shall be severed from the said Benefice of Wellow, and the part of the said Benefice of Wellow so severed and the said Benefice of Foxcote shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Foxcote with Shoscombe' and one Parish for ecclesiastical purposes and for such other purposes as in the said Measure provided but no part of the endowments of the said Benefice of Wellow shall be transferred or annexed to the United Benefice.

" 2. That the Church of the Parish of Foxcote shall be the Parish Church of the United Parish and that the Table of Fees for the said Parish of Foxcote shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the Table of Fees for the United Parish.

" 3. That with the consent of the said Le Gendre George Horton-Starkie (testified, by his signing this Scheme) the union shall take effect upon the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme, and the Patron of the said Benefice of Foxcote shall thereupon be at liberty to present or nominate an Incumbent to the United Benefice.

" 4. That so soon as conveniently may be after the said union has taken effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Foxcote and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and that the net proceeds of such sale shall be appropriated by us towards the cost of providing a new house at Shoscombe as the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

" 5. That after the said union has taken effect the Patronage of the United Benefice shall belong wholly to the Patron of the said Benefice of Foxcote.

" Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England, or of any Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies entitled under the same Measure to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Bath and Wells has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme has proceeded with an appeal to His Majesty in Council against the said Scheme or any part thereof within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, that is to say, the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, and the Act of the 61st and 62nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 28, and the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure, 1921, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 11th day of February, 1926, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, that is to say, the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, and the Act of the 61st and 62nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 28, and the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure, 1921, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous Benefices situate within the Metropolis, and within the Diocese of London, namely, the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, and the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union:

" Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, has caused Proposals for a Scheme for effecting an union of the said two Benefices to be laid before us, which Proposals were prepared under the 7th and 8th sections of the first mentioned Act and were approved by the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, and were assented to by the Patrons of the said two Benefices to be affected thereby, that is to say, by the Venerable Ernest Edward Holmes, Clerk in Holy Orders and Archdeacon of London, as the Patron, in right of his Archdeaconry, of the said Benefice and Vicarage of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, and also by the Right Honourable Stanley Baldwin, now First Lord of Your

Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, the Patron, in right of the Crown, of the said Benefice and Vicarage of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch:

"And whereas the said Proposals comprised amongst other things the severance of a portion of the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, and its union with the contiguous Benefice of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, situate within the Metropolis and within the said Diocese of London:

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said Benefice of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, and of the said Benefice of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter contained should be made as are hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the said Benefice of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, is now full, the Reverend Francis Edward Birch, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent thereof, the said Benefice of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, is also now full, the Reverend William Backhouse Gowan, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent thereof, but the said Benefice of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, is now vacant:

"And whereas the said Francis Edward Birch has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

"And whereas no Parochial Church Council has been constituted for the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch:

"And whereas the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron of the said Benefice of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, and the said Ernest Edward Holmes, as such Patron as aforesaid, and the said Stanley Baldwin, acting on behalf of the Crown, as such Patron as aforesaid, and the Parochial Church Councils or Vestries of the said Parishes and of the New Parish of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, respectively are willing that the Scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said Proposals, and this present Scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly, but otherwise is based upon the said Proposals:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, (in testimony whereof he has to this Scheme set his hand and Episcopal Seal), and with the consent of the said Ernest Edward Holmes, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Stanley Baldwin, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consents of the Parochial Church Council of the said Parish of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, of the Vestry of the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, and of the Parochial Church Council of the said New Parish of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, (in testimony of which consents this Scheme is signed in the case of each of the said Parochial Church Councils by the Chairman and two other Members present at a Meeting of the same Parochial Church Council duly convened for

the purpose of giving such consent and in the case of the said Vestry by the Chairman of a Meeting of the same Vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this Scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned as follows:—

"PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself, and certain immediate incidents thereof we recommend and propose:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, and the said Benefice of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, be united into one Benefice under the style of 'The Benefice of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch,' which said United Benefice is hereinafter called the United Benefice.

"2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect, and the said Francis Edward Birch, if he is then the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice and it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said Diocese of London to admit the said Francis Edward Birch to the United Benefice without any form or fee of or for presentation and he shall thereupon become the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"PART II.

"As to the Parish Church of the United Benefice and the Church of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, and certain matters connected therewith, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect the Church of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, shall become and thereafter continue to be the Parish Church of the United Benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect if the tables of fees used in the two Churches be alike in all particulars, the table of fees used in the Church which will become the Church of the United Benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the United Parishes, but if such tables of fees be not alike in all particulars the same shall be of no authority and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the use of the United Parish.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the register books of baptisms, marriages and burials of the New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, shall be transferred to the Church of the said New Parish of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, but the marriage registers (in duplicate) shall in the first place be sent by the Incumbent of the United Benefice to the Registrar General to be closed officially.

"4. That upon the union taking effect the fabric of the Church of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, shall be left standing and shall be used for any purpose or purposes authorised by the 19th section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860, so long as the Bishop of the Diocese shall by his licence permit.

"5. That if such licence shall be refused or hereafter withdrawn the font, communion

table, sacramental plate, furniture and fittings of the Church of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, or such of them as the Parochial Church Council of the United Benefice shall select, shall be transferred to the Church of the United Benefice; but such of these articles as shall not be claimed by the said Parochial Church Council for the Church of the United Benefice shall be transferred to such Church or Chapel within the Diocese of London as the Bishop may select; provided always that any articles which shall not be appropriated in any of the above ways, except the font, communion table and sacramental plate, may be sold and the proceeds shall be dealt with in the same manner as the proceeds of any sale of the materials and site of the said Church as herein-after mentioned.

" 6. That in the event of the Bishop of the Diocese refusing or withdrawing the said Licence he shall certify this fact in writing to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and the said Church shall, as soon as may be after the receipt by us of such certificate from the Bishop, be taken down and its materials and site, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof, shall be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the 17th section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.

" 7. That in the event of the materials and site of the said Church of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, being sold, the proceeds of such sale or sales shall be applied towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a new Church within the limits of the Metropolis or its vicinity and the balance (if any) of such proceeds shall be added to and form part of the fund created by the 22nd section of the last mentioned Act.

" PART III.

" As to the endowments and the parsonage house of the United Benefice, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

" 1. That upon the union taking effect all the existing endowments of the Vicarage of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, and a sum of £50 per annum forming part of the existing endowments of the Vicarage of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice.

" 2. That upon the union taking effect a further sum of £50 per annum forming part of the existing endowments of the said Vicarage of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, shall be transferred and annexed to the Vicarage of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, by way of augmentation of the endowments of the latter Vicarage, and the further sum of £200 per annum representing the residue of the existing endowments of the said Vicarage of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, shall be held by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall be appropriated for the augmentation or the endowment of such Benefice or Benefices or intended District within the Diocese of London as shall be in the Patronage of Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors and as shall be

selected by the First Lord of Your Majesty's Treasury.

" 3. That upon the union taking effect the present Parsonage House of the Benefice of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, shall be the Parsonage House of the United Benefice, and the present Parsonage House of the Benefice of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, shall be vested in us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, and that the net annual rent which may be derived from the letting of such Parsonage House pending such sale or sales and the net proceeds arising from such sale or sales shall form one aggregate fund and shall be applied by us for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a Parsonage House (or the purchase, enlargement or alteration of any existing house suitable with or without alteration for a Parsonage House) for and within the limits of such Benefice or intended District within the Diocese of London as the Bishop may select.

" 4. That upon the union taking effect the sum of £700 which is held by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as a fund for the improvement of the present Parsonage House of the Benefice of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, shall be added to the fund created under the 22nd Section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.

" PART IV.

" Upon the subject of Patronage, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

" That upon the union taking effect the Patronage of the United Benefice shall be vested in the said Ernest Edward Holmes, Archdeacon of London, and his successors in the same Archdeaconry for ever.

" PART V.

" As to a portion of the New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, and as to the Benefice of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

" That upon the union taking effect all that portion of the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Shoreditch, which lies to the east of the middle of Boundary Street, the north of the middle of Church Street and the east of the middle of Ebor Street, shall be severed from the said United Benefice and shall be united to the contiguous Benefice of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, the Patronage whereof is vested in the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, and his successors in the same Bishopric."

And whereas the said Scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Right Reverend William, Lord Bishop of Exeter, has, under Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, made a Representation to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the following terms:—

"We, William, Lord Bishop of Exeter, in pursuance of the 26th Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"There is in the County of Devon and Diocese of Exeter the Benefice or Vicarage of Hartland the Parish whereof contains a population of 1,488 persons or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for 650 persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of Hartland is £379 or thereabouts.

"There is also in the same County and Diocese the Benefice or Vicarage of Welcombe the Parish whereof contains a population of 168 persons or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for 150 persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of Welcombe is £224 or thereabouts.

"That it appears to us and we do hereby represent to your Grace that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, a portion of the Parish of Hartland (the boundaries of which are more particularly described in the Scheme annexed to this Representation and also delineated on the Ordnance Map annexed thereto and thereon coloured pink) may be advantageously separated therefrom and be annexed to the said Parish of Welcombe to which it is contiguous.

"The Patron of the Benefice of Hartland is Henry Terrell Peard of Croydon, in the County of Surrey, Solicitor, and The Reverend Ivon Lancelot Gregory is the Incumbent thereof. The Patron of the Benefice of Welcombe is The Right Reverend The Lord Bishop of Exeter and The Reverend Alfred John Richard Wheeler is the Incumbent thereof.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, we, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing annexed to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to us that the alterations above proposed may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to Ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and we do hereby submit the same together with the consents in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents of the said Benefices to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with such Scheme you may

certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate from the said Parish of Hartland and annex to the said Parish of Welcombe all that part of the Parish of Hartland lying South of the line extending from Dixon's Well along the road running eastwards to the point of junction between such road and Green Lane, thence along the boundary line dividing Tosberry Moor from Bursdon Moor and Welsford Moor from Summerwell Moor as far as Seckington Water, and thence along Seckington Water as far as its junction with Clifford Water, the boundaries of which are delineated on the Ordnance plan annexed hereto and coloured pink.

"That the Incumbent of the Benefice of Welcombe shall have sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within such portion so to be separated from Hartland.

"That any inhabitants of such portion shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Welcombe but shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the Parish Church of Hartland.

"That any inhabitants of the aforesaid portion shall have such and the same right to have Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings and Burials solemnised and performed in the Parish Church of Welcombe as they might have had in the Parish Church of Hartland.

"That all fees Ecclesiastical offerings and emoluments which may arise from the said portion so to be separated from Hartland shall belong to the Incumbent of Welcombe.

"That no alterations shall be made in the Patronage of the said Benefice or either of them.

"CONSENTS.

"We, Henry Terrell Peard of Croydon, in the County of Surrey, Solicitor, the Patron or Person entitled to present or nominate to the Benefice of Hartland, The Reverend Ivon Lancelot Gregory the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Hartland, The Right Reverend The Lord Bishop of Exeter the Patron or Person entitled to present or nominate to the Benefice of Welcombe and The Reverend Alfred John Richard Wheeler the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Welcombe hereby respectively signify to your Grace our several consents to the Scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"In testimony whereof we have hereunto set our respective hands this thirtieth day of March 1926.

TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE PRETORIA BRANCH MINT.

VERDICT.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the second day of March one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Pretoria in the Union of South Africa, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the 1st day of January one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five to the 31st day of December one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took 2 coins from each of such packets of gold coins, amounting altogether to 122 sovereigns or twenty-shilling pieces, and to 24 half-sovereigns or ten-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was nil of an ounce (nil oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus seven hundred thousandths (or +.00007), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue 4 sovereigns and 2 half-sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively, the first 123.229 grains, the second 123.185 grains the third 123.338 grains, the fourth 123.299 grains, and that such half-sovereigns weighed respectively, the first 61.656 grains, and the second 61.705 grains.

We then assayed the said 4 sovereigns and 2 half-sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be, the first 916.86, the second 916.89, the third 916.65, the fourth 916.79 respectively, and the millesimal fineness of such half-

sovereigns to be, the first 916.76, the second 916.89 respectively.

TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE LONDON MINT.

VERDICT.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the Second day of March, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's gold and silver coins in the Pyx of the Royal Mint in London, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Mint, from the First day of January, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, to the Thirty-first day of December, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins, both of gold and silver, in each packet produced to us, corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took six coins from each of such packets of gold coins, amounting altogether to 114 sovereigns or twenty-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus one thousandth of an ounce (+.001 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus twelve hundred thousandths (or +.00012), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue 3 sovereigns and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respec-

tively, the first 123.373 grains, the second 123.384 grains, the third 123.410 grains.

We then assayed the said three sovereigns separately and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be the first 916.69, the second 916.75, the third 916.72 respectively.

We also took four coins from each of such packets of silver coins, making altogether 44 half-crowns, 32 florins, 80 shillings, 152 sixpences, 1 fourpence, 29 threepences, 1 twopence, and 1 penny, and weighed each of the said silver coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the said Coinage Act, 1891, except in the case of one sixpence which weighed 43.282 grains, and therefore was less than the remedy by .008 of a grain. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as so amended was minus one thousandth of an ounce (-.001 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said silver coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Trial Plate made of pure silver (as prescribed by the Coinage Act, 1920) produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Acts 1891 and 1920, and we found that the amount of variation from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as so amended, was plus fifty-five hundred thousandths (+.00055), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said silver coins in bulk and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue 1 half-crown, 1 florin, 1 shilling, 1 sixpence, and 1 threepence, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such half-crown weighed 217.734 grains, that such florin weighed 175.147 grains, that such shilling weighed 87.360 grains, that such sixpence weighed 43.432 grains, and that such threepence weighed 21.755 grains. We then assayed the said half-crown, the said florin, the said shilling, the said sixpence, and the said threepence separately and we found the millesimal fineness of such half-crown to be 503.5, of such florin to be 501.3, of such shilling to be 501.4, of such sixpence to be 499.6, and of such threepence to be 501.0.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the Second day of March One thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Sydney in the State of New South Wales, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the 1st day of January One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five to the 31st day of December One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took two coins from each of such packets of gold coins, amounting altogether to 102 sovereigns or twenty-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus one thousandth of an ounce (+001 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus one hundred thousandth (or +00001), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue 3 sovereigns and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively, the first 123.197 grains, the second 123.201 grains, the third 123.247 grains.

We then assayed the said 3 sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be, the first 916.73, the second 916.60, the third 916.70 respectively.

TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE PERTH
BRANCH MINT.

VERDICT.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the Second day of March One thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Perth in the State of Western Australia, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the 1st day of January One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five to the 31st day of December One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took 3 coins from each of such packets of gold coins, amounting altogether to 93 sovereigns or twenty-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus two thousandths of an ounce (+002 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was minus six hundred thousandths (or -00006), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue 3 sovereigns and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively, the first 123.237 grains, the second 123.288 grains, the third 123.351 grains.

We then assayed the said 3 sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be, the first 916.72, the second 916.76, the third 916.68 respectively.

TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE MELBOURNE BRANCH MINT.

VERDICT.

We, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the Second day of March One thousand nine hundred and twenty six, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the city of London, have made the assays and trials of His Majesty's gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Melbourne in the State of Victoria, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the 1st day of January One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, to the 31st day of December One thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took 4 coins from twenty four of the packets and all the coins from the remaining packet of gold coins, amounting altogether to 97 sovereigns or twenty-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was nil of an ounce (nil oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was minus one hundred thousandth (or -00001), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue 3 sovereigns and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereigns weighed respectively, the first 123·255 grains, the second 123·269 grains, the third 123·198 grains.

We then assayed the said 3 sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereigns to be, the first 916·73, the second 916·61, the third 916·91 respectively.

ORDER dated 31st May, 1926, made by the Treasury under sub-section 5 of Section 13 of the Finance (No. 2) Act, 1915, as applied by sub-section 4 of Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries (Customs Duties) Act, 1925.

Whereas it is provided by sub-section (4) of Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries (Customs Duties) Act, 1925, that for the purpose of and in connection with the duties imposed by this Act, the enactments set out in the Second Schedule to this Act (which contain provisions relating to other duties of customs) shall have effect as if they were enacted in this Act and in terms made applicable to the duties imposed by this Act.

And whereas sub-section (5) of Section 13 of the Finance (No. 2) Act, 1915, which is set out in the Second Schedule to the Safeguarding of Industries (Customs Duties) Act, 1925, provides that the Treasury may by order exempt any articles mentioned in the order which are liable to any new import duty from that duty if they are satisfied that, having regard to the small value of the article, it is inexpedient that the duty should be charged.

And whereas, having regard to the small value of the articles specified in the Schedule to this Order, it is inexpedient that duty should be charged under the Safeguarding of Industries (Customs Duties) Act, 1925, on those articles.

Now therefore, we, being two of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the powers conferred on us by the said sub-section 5 of Section 13 of the Finance (No. 2) Act, 1915, as applied by subsection (4) of Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries (Customs Duties) Act, 1925, hereby order as follows:—

The articles mentioned in the Schedule to this Order shall be exempt from the duty imposed on the said articles by the Safeguarding of Industries (Customs Duties) Act, 1925.

(1) Any complete article of a value not exceeding three halfpence and included within the following descriptions as specified in the first column of the First Schedule to the Safeguarding of Industries (Customs Duties) Act, 1925, namely:—

Knives with one or more blades made wholly or partly of steel or iron, other than surgical knives or knives for use in machines.

Scissors, including tailors' shears and secateurs, made wholly or partly of steel or iron.

Razors, other than safety razors.

Carving forks.

Knife sharpeners wholly or partly of steel.

(2) Knives of a length when opened not exceeding 1½ inches and of a value not exceeding 9d. and scissors of a length not exceeding 1½ inches and of a value not exceeding 9d. (the measurement in either case including any handle or article used as a handle).

DANGEROUS DRUGS ACT, 1920.

(10 & 11 Geo. V., Chap. 46.)

Notice is hereby given, under the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that the Secretary of State for the Home Department proposes, after the expiration of forty days from this date, to make Regulations under Section 7 of the Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920 (10 & 11 Geo. V., Chap. 46) amending the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1921 (S.R. & O. 1921, No. 865).

The principal effect of the new Regulations is to carry out the recommendations contained in the report of the Ministry of Health Committee on morphine and heroin addiction which was published in February, 1926. Opportunity has also been taken to remove the ambiguity which existed as to the requirements of Regulation 5 of the principal Regulations regarding the particulars to be inserted in prescriptions and to include a new Regulation requiring retail chemists to keep their stocks of Dangerous Drugs under lock and key.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS FOR THE COMPETITIVE SELECTION OF JUNIOR ASSISTANTS IN THE NATIONAL GALLERY AND THE TATE GALLERY.

N.B.—These regulations are liable to alteration from time to time. Competitions under these regulations do not take place at fixed intervals, but are held only on the occurrence of vacancies.

1. Candidates must have attained the age of 22 and must not exceed the age of 30 on a date to be fixed in respect of the competition in which they are to take part.

In reckoning age for competition the following allowances will be made, viz.:—

(a) Candidates who have served or are serving in the Army, Navy, or Air Force may deduct from their actual age any time during which they have so served.

(b) Candidates who have served for two full consecutive years in the Royal Irish Constabulary may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service.

(c) Candidates who have served in any established civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they may have spent in such service.

2. Candidates must be natural-born British subjects and born of a father also a natural-born British subject; provided that exception may be made in the case of candidates serving in a civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, and provided that exception may be made as regards the father in the case of candidates who have served in His Majesty's Armed Forces during the Great War between the 4th August, 1914, and the 11th November, 1918.

3. Until further order preference will be given to candidates who have served in His Majesty's Naval, Military, or Air Forces between the 4th August, 1914, and the 11th November, 1918.

No person will be eligible who obtained from any tribunal established under the Military Service Acts, 1916 to 1918, exemption from service in His Majesty's Forces under those Acts on the ground of a conscientious objection to the undertaking of military service, or, although not so exempted, declined to comply with obligations imposed upon him by those Acts.

4. The Trustees of the National Gallery will take such steps as they think most appropriate to make known the existence of any vacancy or vacancies which they desire to fill on any one occasion, and the Civil Service Commissioners will satisfy themselves that the steps taken have been such as to secure all desirable publicity.

5. No person actually serving in the Army, Navy or Air Force will be eligible for admission to the examination unless he produces to the Civil Service Commissioners, when called upon to do so, the permission of his Commanding Officer to attend the examination, dated before the commencement of the competition, and given in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be issued.

Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination before the commencement of the competition.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

6. Application shall be addressed in the first instance to the Keeper of the National Gallery, and shall be made on the appropriate form. After the last day for application has been reached the authorities of the Department shall scrutinise all the applications received and recommend to the Commissioners such candidates as appear to them qualified for the duties of the posts in question. They shall then forward to the Civil Service Commissioners all the application forms received, who may then, if dissatisfied with the candidates presenting themselves, take such steps in consultation with the authorities of the Gallery as they may think fit to obtain other candidates. The list of qualified candidates shall then be settled by agreement between the Civil Service Commissioners and the authorities of the National Gallery.

7. Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they have received such systematic education, general or technical, or general and technical together, as in their opinion fits them for the post. The Commissioners may, if in doubt, submit any or all of the candidates to a qualifying examination to test such education, or any part of it.

8. Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character. Female candidates must be unmarried or widows and will be required to resign their appointments on marriage.

Until further order, and other things being equal, preference will be given by the Selection Board to candidates who are debarred from active employment by a physical impairment due to the War and not of a nature to interfere with the discharge of ordinary administrative duties.

9. Candidates who are recommended by the authorities of the Department and are accepted by the Civil Service Commissioners as possessing the requisite qualifications will be summoned to an interview before a Selection Board, who will recommend for the vacancies existing those candidates who appear to them to possess the highest qualifications, and their decision will be final. The Selection Board shall be nominated by the Commissioners in consultation with the authorities of the Department who shall be represented on the Selection Board, and if practicable one of the Commissioners shall be

the Chairman. The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidate's record of experience and education, any recommendations that they may receive from persons named by any candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidate as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above evidence they will frame their decisions.

10. Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons will disqualify them for appointment. The Selection Board will disregard spontaneous recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's work, whether at school, at the University, in the Forces, or otherwise.

11. If a qualifying examination is held, each candidate subjected thereto will be required to pay a fee of £3. A Selected Candidate will be required to pay a fee of £8, towards which the fee paid at the qualifying examination (if any) will count, before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.

The Minister of Health gives notice, in pursuance of the above named Regulations, that he hereby recognises for the purpose of item (b) of the Second Schedule to the Regulations, *i.e.*, lard, dripping, edible tallow and similar rendered fats, each of the Official Certificates of which particulars are given in the Schedule hereto as evidence that the meat to which it relates has been derived from an animal which was free from disease at the time of slaughter and has been dressed or prepared and packed with all necessary precautions for the prevention of danger to public health.

The recognition applies only if the label is securely affixed to the package containing the meat, and if the label has not in any other circumstances or on any other occasion been used as an Official Certificate.

The label hereby recognised as an Official Certificate for meat imported from the Netherlands is in substitution for the label of which particulars were given in Part I. of the Schedule to the Notice published in the London Gazette of 9th October, 1925.

SHEEP DIPPING (REGULATION) ORDER
OF 1926.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts,

1894 to 1925, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Prescribed Period of Immersion of sheep in an approved sheep dip.

1.—(1) Where by any Order of the Minister or by any regulation of a Local Authority made thereunder the dipping of sheep is required, the sheep shall be dipped by a thorough immersion of the whole body, including the head and ears, in a sheep dip approved by the Minister for sheep scab or purporting to be so approved. The sheep shall remain in the bath for not less than one minute.

(2) In the Note at the foot of the Second Schedule to the Sheep Scab Order of 1920, relating to the required period of immersion in certain sheep dips approved by the Minister for Sheep-Scab, the words "one minute" shall be substituted for the words "half a minute", and the said Order shall be read and have effect accordingly.

2. This Order may be cited as the SHEEP DIPPING (REGULATION) ORDER OF 1926.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 2ND JUNE, 1926.)

IMPORTATION OF CARCASSES (PROHIBITION) ORDER OF 1926

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1925, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Prohibition of landing in Great Britain of Animal Carcasses and certain Animal Products from the Continent of Europe.

1. The landing in Great Britain of a carcase or part of a carcase as defined in this Order brought from any country on the Continent of Europe other than Ireland, the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man is hereby prohibited: Provided that this prohibition shall not apply to—

(a) fully cured bacon and ham, lard or rendered fat, cooked or preserved meats or meat essences;

(b) hides and skins which have been dried, dry-salted or wet-salted; but hides or skins which have been wet-salted shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by a duly authorised officer of the Government of the country in which the port of shipment is situated to the effect that he is satisfied that the hides or skins have been wet-salted for a period of fourteen days. Such certificate shall be delivered to an officer of Customs and Excise at the port of landing.

Interpretation.

2. In this Order "carcase" means the carcase of any cattle, sheep, pigs or goats, and includes meat, hides, skins, hair, bones, bone

meal, hoofs, hoof meal, horns, horn meal, offal, blood, dried blood and blood meal, or any other part of a carcase separately or otherwise or any portion thereof.

Offences.

3. If any carcase or part of a carcase is landed in Great Britain in contravention of this Order the owner thereof and the importer and the occupier of the place of landing and the person causing, directing or permitting the landing and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed shall each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall take immediate effect, provided that it shall not apply to a consignment which according to the ship's papers was shipped before midnight on the third/fourth day of June, nineteen hundred and twenty-six.

Short Title.

5. This Order may be cited as the IMPORTATION OF CARCASSES (PROHIBITION) ORDER OF 1926.

The wages payable for employment of male workers wholly or mainly as sheep-tenders or bullock-tenders, except in the case of such workers under 18 years of age who are not in sole charge of animals, shall be wages at not less than the rates set out in Clause 1 above with in addition an inclusive weekly sum of 4s. 6d., and in the case of such workers under 18 years of age who are not in sole charge of animals an inclusive weekly sum of 3s. in respect of employment in connection with the duties of feeding, cleaning, bedding-down, and mucking-out stock or other similar duties in connection with the immediate care of animals.

5. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and ending on the first Sunday in November, and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.
