WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

THE WEIGHTS AND MEASURES (AMENDMENT No. 2) REGULATIONS, 1926, DATED DECEMBER 30, 1926, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER SECTION 5 OF THE WEIGHTS AND MEASURES ACT, 1904 (4 EDW. 7. c. 28) EXTENDING THE PERIOD OF ALLOWANCE FOR CERTAIN WEIGHING AND MEASURING APPLIANCES.

The Board of Trade, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them in this behalf by Section 5 of the Weights and Measures Act, 1904, (4 Edw. 7. c. 28), and of all other powers, if any, in that behalf, do hereby make the following Regulations, viz.:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Weights and Measures (Amendment No. 2) Regulations, 1926.

2. The period of twenty years specified in Regulation 14 (b) of the Weights and Measures Regulations, 1907 (S.R. & O. 1907, No. 698), during which certain weights, measures or instruments stamped prior to the first day of January, 1908, may continue in use and be re-stamped notwithstanding that they do not comply with the requirements of those Regulations, shall be extended for a further period of five years, and the said Regulation 14 (b) shall be construed as if a period of twenty-five years had been specified therein in lieu of one of twenty years.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the additional Weights and Measures Regulation made by the Board of Trade and dated 27th September, 1926 (S.R. & O. 1926, No. 1348), an Inspector may continue, for a period of ten years from 1st January, 1927, to re-stamp any self-indicating or semi-self-indicating machine previously in use by a trader in his district, which was stamped prior to that date, provided that the indications of the machine are correct within the appropriate allowances as prescribed by the Weights and Measures Regulations, 1907 (S.R. & O. 1907, No. 698), and the stamp of verification on any such machine shall not be obliterated solely on the ground of error, unless the error exceeds that permitted under the last mentioned Regulations.
